

C-C directors beginning new operations plan

Nomination of an organizational chairman to monitor the special committees and set up dates and times for each committee to regularly meet was the only action item by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce directors at their Wednesday luncheon-meeting.

The organizational chairman's position will be filled by a board member to be named at a future date.

The bulk of the directors' meeting was concerned with various individual and committee reports.

Accountant Don Dorman presented a detailed financial report to assist new directors Mac MacDougal, Jim French and Bill Wilson, who were guests of the outgoing members of the board, to un-

derstand the Chamber's financial situation.

"These reports do not reflect profit and loss or monthly revenue versus obligations," Dorman said.

"The headlines saying 'the Chamber is broke' were just about correct."

Dorman said, although the financial report showed \$4,282 revenue for the end of February, the actual amount on hand the day of the board meeting was \$3,158, as several obligations and salaries had been paid.

He predicted the Chamber would close out the month of March with about \$1,750 in available revenue.

Dorman then pointed out the Chamber's

New skiing area set here

Construction of a new ski area near Eagle Creek Lodge will begin in 45 days, Ralph Rush, Eagle Creek Associates, Incorporated, said Thursday.

To be located off state Highway 532, Eagle Creek Ski and Recreation Area will be developed to bring more people to Ruidoso.

"There are some people who won't drive up to the present area because of the road and they go to Red River or Cloudcroft as an alternative," he said.

"Because this area is lower on the road, we hope to draw more people to Ruidoso. We're not trying to take away from the present ski area."

Construction will be complete by summer and, through extensive use of snow-making equipment, the area should be open for skiing by Thanksgiving, Rush said.

"Based on temperature research, we could be open by Thanksgiving every year and stay open through spring using the snow-making equipment with the 30-million gallon water rights we purchased."


A poma lift and T-bar are planned to serve beginner to expert slopes, and night skiing will be offered, Rush said.

"We hope to have a ski area with kind of a western flavor; one which will appeal to family crowds and children."

Rush added the lodge presently on the site will be renovated to house a restaurant, day care center, ski equipment rental, ski school and lodging.

"We plan to expand and improve the area in the future, but first we'll see what kind of traffic we get. If we get more beginner/intermediate traffic, then we'll develop more beginner/intermediate trails."

In addition to expanding the area's capacity in the future, he said the corporation, whose major stockholders are Rush, Paul Southwick and Jerry Kilmer,





with additional partners of Bob Scribner, Doug Bass, Richard Cothrun, Peter Strobel and Lee Ware, will develop con-

dominiums with tennis courts and a pool. They also plan to expand to include a controlled sledding area.

"In the summertime, we will have mat skiing and instruction, horseback riding and possibly a day camp," Rush said.

monthly overhead totaled a little over \$4,000 and there were outstanding bills totaling approximately \$8,000.

One of the Chamber directors then said income for dues in April, which is "one of the worst months for dues income," would probably total only \$800 to \$900.

Dorman notified the board the WATS Line obligation of over \$2,000 had been paid by Ray Held Incorporated, which has taken over the reservation service.

Ray Held Incorporated also pledged \$900 to the Chamber reducing the obligation to \$1,100.

"We'll owe Ray Held Incorporated \$1,335.77," one of the directors said. "What he's done has taken the phone company off our back."

Dorman also told the attending new directors, who will take their seats in April, a comparison of the last year's and this year's financial pictures "could be misleading."

"A year ago it looked like we had a lot of money on hand, but we're in better shape now than a year ago," he said.

A study of this year's financial reports shows a decrease in the totals of outstanding obligations, while a study of the previous year shows large sums of revenue and profit, with little payment of obligations.

The board also heard reports from various committee representatives.

Dave Wilson and Sunny Hirschfeld of the special events committee reported the committee would like to hold four or five

special fund raising events through the year instead of monthly events designed to raise revenue.

"I feel like we have the community's support, but we can only push it just so far before losing it," Wilson said.

The major projects planned by the committee include an arts festival (enlarging the arts and crafts fair), an auction event, Cadillac party, a Western art show and auction and possibly a family event.

Hirschfeld said the committee plans to schedule monthly special events to benefit the general Chamber membership such as the March event offering tickets to "Casey's Shadow" in Roswell.

The report from the advertising and promotion committee was postponed until next month.

The Reverend Ken Cole presented a brief report on the finance committee in the absence of any committee members.

Highlight of his report was the projected monthly overhead had been cut further to \$2,306.90.

Other business discussed by the board included:

—Compilation of a list of out-of-town property owners to be used to solicit support of the Chamber.

—Reinstitution of a regular newsletter.

—An increase in contact with the Lodgers' Tax Committee.

The newly elected directors, holdover directors and outgoing directors will meet to elect new officers at noon April 5.

The next meeting of the board will be noon April 19.

Social Security information

"People who earned over \$3,000 and received one or more monthly social security retirement, survivors, or dependent checks in 1977 must submit an annual report of their earnings to social security by April 17," Gordon Lunsford, social security field representative, said today.

"The report shows how much was earned in wages and self-employment income last year, as well as how much beneficiaries expect to earn this year. Information on the report will be used to determine if people were paid the correct amount of benefits for 1977. Also, it will be used to adjust their monthly 1978 social security payments according to their estimated earnings."

"Full social security benefits could be paid to eligible people in 1977 if they earned \$3,000 or less for the year. But, no matter how much they earned for the year, they could be paid their full social security benefits for any month they earned \$250 or less and didn't do substantial work in their own business."

"People who file an annual report after April 17 may suffer a penalty. Those who were 72 or over in all months of 1977 do not need to file a report at all."

Substance abuse seminar conducted at Mescalero

Nearly a half score of educators, counselors and interested citizens converged on the Mescalero Reformed Church Thursday to give presentations in what was billed as Alcohol and Substance Abuse Workshop.

The one-day event featured experts in substance-abuse counseling from centers throughout New Mexico including the Eight Northern Pueblos, Southwest Indian Polytechnic Institute, Southwest Mental Health Center and the New Mexico State Department of Hospitals and Institutions.

Sponsored by the Mescalero Apache Tribe and the Mescalero Apache Rehabilitation Center the workshop was attended by a near-full house of educators, spiritual leaders and other members of the Mescalero community.

The workshop was held, according to Silas Cochise, Director of the Mescalero

Apache Rehabilitation Center, in order to familiarize local counselors with current trends in substance-abuse treatment and prevention.

Charles Kaiser, a member of the state Department of Hospitals and Institutions (DHI) training team, told the group there is plenty of federal money for the implementation and upgrading of counseling centers dealing with substance abuse.

"I've got federal funds and federal resources that need to get out to the various communities," Kaiser said. "We can provide technical assistance, and it's free folks, free."

Kaiser explained the term "substance abuse" is now considered as a replacement and all inclusive term for drug abuse, alcoholism or "the abuse of any foreign substance pumped into the body."

Kaiser outlined several contemporary approaches to the problem including public education, presentation of alternatives to the offender, and early intervention.

"Drug abuse is a behavior," Kaiser said. "learned."

He added most new programs are geared toward teaching persons alternatives to their drug-related life styles. He cited Outward Bound and other similar wilderness-related activities as examples of the "diversion programs" currently stressed.

"The National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) has made a major commitment to prevention and early intervention," Kaiser said, explaining such an approach was likely the most effective.

"The federal people emphasize those programs which cost least, yet have maximum benefits," Kaiser said. He added NIDA was the major funding source for this and similar programs nationwide.

Kaiser outlined the function of the DHI within the bureaucracy which he described as huge.

"NIDA is part of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, the ultimate giant bureaucracy, probably the biggest in history," Kaiser said.

He added individual state agencies, including the DHI's training division, write program proposals to NIDA support centers located throughout the nation.

"These centers consist of a group of directors, and support and training staff available to us free," Kaiser said.

He said the Southwest Regional Support Center is located in Kansas City.

Aside from helping communities implement their own substance abuse programs, Kaiser said the NIDA and the DHI maintain a library of research and resource material which is available to everyone from community centers to individuals.

"All you have to do is write and request the information," Kaiser said. "Our address is 113 Washington Avenue, Santa Fe, New Mexico 87501."

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

Noah's Ark illustrated by Peter Spier has been awarded the Caldecott Medal for 1977. What's the Caldecott Medal? The Caldecott Medal is awarded to the artist of the most distinguished picture book for children published in the United States each year. Frederic G. Melcher donated the first medal in 1938 and it is now

donated annually by his son, Daniel Melcher.

The award, "Caldecott Medal," is named after Randolph Caldecott the famous English illustrator of children's books. Caldecott's childhood spent in Shropshire country is reflected in his pictures of country fairs, hunts, dogs and horses. Caldecott established his reputation when he illustrated Washington Irving's, Old Christmas; but probably his most famous illustrations were done for William Copper's, The Diverting History of John Gilpin, 1878.

Peter Spier came to America in 1952 from Amsterdam and has since established himself as one of this country's most gifted illustrators. Available at the library are the following books illustrated by Spier: Noah's Ark; The Fox Went Out on a Chilly Night; Gobble, Gobble, Grunt; Fast Slow, High-Low; Crash! Bang! Boom! Also yours, for only the asking is a "Caldecott Bookmark" which lists all the award winning books since 1938.



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News from the Home Economist

While we still have a week of the Lenten season left, you may be looking for a hearty cheese dish. This dish contains two types of cheese and green beans as a bonus for the almost complete meal type dish. Your microwave oven can also be used for this dish by cutting down the baking time to approximately 10 minutes.

MACARONI & CHEESE ITALIAN
6-8 servings
1 package (7 ounce) elbow macaroni
3 tablespoons butter
3 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon oregano, crumbled
Dash of pepper
3 cups milk
3 cups (12 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese
1 package (10 ounce) frozen Italian green beans
1/2 teaspoon salt
12 or 16 thin tomato slices (about 2 medium)

1 tablespoon dry bread crumbs, buttered
1 tablespoon grated Parmesan cheese
Cook macaroni according to package directions; drain. Meanwhile, melt butter in a 2-quart saucepan. Blend in flour, 1 teaspoon salt, oregano and pepper. Cook over low heat until mixture is smooth. Remove from heat. Stir in milk. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Boil and stir 1 minute. Remove from heat; stir in cheese until melted. If necessary, return to low heat to finish melting cheese. (Do not boil.) Yield: 4 1/2 cups sauce. Combine uncooked green beans with macaroni. Place half of macaroni mixture in a 11 1/2 x 7 1/2 x 1 1/2-inch baking dish; sprinkle with 1/4 teaspoon salt. Pour over one-half cheese sauce, arrange half of the tomato slices on top of sauce. Repeat macaroni, salt and cheese sauce layers. Bake in preheated 375 degree oven for 30 minutes. Arrange remaining tomato slices on top; sprinkle tomatoes with bread crumbs and Parmesan cheese. Bake an additional 5 minutes.

News from the County Agent

Range caterpillars will be discussed at a meeting March 22 starting at 1:30 p.m., in the Pioneer Savings and Loan in Roswell. Dr. Ellis Huddleston, professor of botany and entomology, will discuss the results of his research using dimilin. Don Lutch, New Mexico State Department of Agriculture, will discuss the control programs with the landowners. John Durkin, extension entomologist, will discuss the insecticides available to control range caterpillars.

The cattle business has a brighter outlook than it has had in several years. Summer and fall contracts are being written on the best price in several years. Calves expected to weigh under 400 pounds were contracting for 60 to 65 cents per pound; 400-500 pound calves at 55 to 60 cents; and 700 pound steers at 50 to 55 cents per pound. Heifer calves are about 10 cents under steer calves and heifer yearlings 4 to 5 cents under steer yearlings.

Several cattlemen in this area report they did well on the beef cattle they put in the feedlot. They got from 41 to 44 cents on heifers and 43 to 46 cents per pound on steers.

Considering that the helpers would have sold for 31 cents and steers for 38 cents and the gain was about 38 or 39 cents, these producers did very well. I think the cattlegrower needs to ask himself "at what price do I feed my own animals?" If he cannot get this price, then he should consider feeding his cattle.

Disease control in the garden starts when you buy the seed. Choose seeds that are disease resistant. Selecting resistant plants can save you the expense and discouragement of watching garden plants die just as they are about to produce the bounty you expected.

Many varieties of tomatoes, beans and sweet corn are bred for resistance to specific plant diseases. Look on the seed packet itself for this information. Seed companies readily advertise this point as it is a selling point.

If you see the initials VFN behind the name of a tomato, it means that it is resistant to verticillium wilt, fusarium wilt and nematodes.

You can also reduce some of your disease problems by rotating your vegetable plants in the garden. Plant your tomatoes in a different place each year.

New Mexico Magazine writer wins prestigious Western Heritage award

A story in New Mexico Magazine has just captured a national prize, the prestigious Western Heritage award. "Where the Cowboys Hunkered Down," by John Sinclair of Bernalillo, was named the top magazine story of the year by the National Cowboy Hall of Fame and Western Heritage Center.

The competition was extremely stiff, according to Robert D. Davis, publisher of the state-owned magazine.

"Since no awards were given last year, John's story had to compete against all the Western articles, poems and short stories published in 1978 as well as 1977," Davis said. "Needless to say, we're mighty proud of John, and proud that New Mexico Magazine published this delightful feature story."

Sinclair's article, which appeared in the September 1977 issue of the magazine, was a recollection of the days in the 1920s when

the corner of Second and Main in Roswell was the center of the cowboy's world. Sinclair, newly arrived from Scotland, was himself a cowboy on several of the ranches in the Roswell area in those days, and his piece is filled with the memories of a simpler time. Nostalgic paintings by Edmond DeLavy, also of Bernalillo, illustrated the feature.

"Fifty years ago at this time I was probably living alone with my horse and dogs, out with the cattle," Sinclair said. "And I was probably having an Easter dinner of fried potatoes, canned beans, bacon and good strong coffee with canned milk."

Sinclair, who is the author of the well-known book about the Estancia Valley, In Time of Harvest, will be presented with his award — a Remington bronze — April 8 at the Cowboy Hall of Fame in Oklahoma City. His articles have appeared in New Mexico Magazine for 40 years.

Sunland Park jockey works to win

Things can get pretty tough for a jockey making his first appearance at a racetrack and mounts can be hard to come by. But for Steve Valdez, who recently came to Sunland Park with six years of experience on the West Coast (Santa Anita, Hollywood Park and Del Mar) and plenty of acclaim, such was not the case.

The handsome young rider's reputation obviously preceded him. His first weekend on the Sunland turf resulted in a busy schedule of 23 mounts, which transfigured into five wins, five seconds and three thirds.

Valdez set numerous records as an apprentice in California and his mounts'

annual earnings have regularly run in the half-million to million dollar range. In 1973, he received the prestigious Eclipse Award as the leading apprentice in the nation. He won 279 races that year.

But he now has his sights on a new goal. "I think Santa Anita is the best place in the world with the toughest competition. That's where I started and I've always done well out there," he says. "But I've seen California and I wanted to try a new place."

"Most of my family's ridden around here except me. My father (Joe Valdez) and all my uncles were jockeys. My father quit riding in 1963 and he gallops at Santa Anita now. But this was where he finished

his career and I wanted to see what it was like. Billy Powell, who trains here, taught my father how to ride. So I looked him up when I got here and he steered me in the right direction. I want to ride here and then go to Ruidoso."

There's an underlying reason for his sudden urge to ride at Sunland Park and that is to get more experience on quarter horses.

This smiling young man, who emanates confidence and enthusiasm, goes on: "Right now my biggest ambition is to ride in the All-American Futurity. That's like the Kentucky Derby and that's what I'm working for. Maybe it won't happen this year, but as soon as I can make it."

For a jockey who's spent most of his time around the West Coast thoroughbred circuit, it might seem odd for him to set his sights on southwest quarter horse racing. But Valdez started off on quarter horses at the age of 15.

"I started riding quarter horses at a bush track in Victorville, California. It was only a half-mile track and it was good experience. I'd usually win maybe five of the eight races they had everyday, so by the time I headed for Hollywood Park, I'd had quite a few winners."

Considering Valdez' past accomplishments, his ambition for the All-American seems entirely possible. The first two thoroughbred races he ever rode comprised the daily double at Hollywood Park and he won both.

He scored 18 stakes victories his first year, all with sizeable purses. The first was the Debonair Stakes (\$30,000) at Hollywood Park. The largest was the Oak Leaf Stakes (\$100,000) on Divine Grace in October, 1973. The winner's share totaled \$59,940.

Steve's facility with horses became apparent early in his career, and he was in a top stakes event immediately. "I'd only been riding about three weeks and I rode Carven III in the Hollywood Gold Cup (\$175,000 added). It was nationally televised and there was a lot of pressure and excitement. I was real shy about the camera and all the way to the gate I saw spots before my eyes. We were breaking from the outside post so we were the last ones to go in and I was really nervous. "As I recall we did beat one horse. But the winner of that race was Quack, who equalled the American record of 1:39 1/3 seconds for one and a quarter miles. I rode him later on."

Valdez has a career total of 32 stakes victories including triumphs in the Cinderella Stakes (\$27,500) at Hollywood Park in both 1973 and 1974. Among his other accomplishments in 1974 were the Coronado Handicap, the La Brea Stakes and the San Marino Handicap, all in the \$30,000 to \$40,000 purse range.

One of his proudest moments was winning six races in one day to tie the all-time Santa Anita record set by Willie Shoemaker and Laffit Pincay, Jr.

In 1973, he was the nation's seventh ranked jockey in terms of races won. The total earnings of his mounts that same year went over \$2 million.

But along with the glory, the danger of the sport has also played a part in Valdez' career.

"Last year, a horse I was riding broke down and the one behind ran over me, kicking me in the face. That shattered my jaw and I was out about four months. But I came back in June and won my first race back."

The young rider who weighs in at 115 has been associated with some of the top horses in the country. He's ridden both Linda's Chief, whose earnings in 1973 were second only to Secretariat, and Diabolo, who later raced in the Kentucky Derby.

Someone with Valdez's accomplishments might have a tendency to rest on his laurels, but that's not the case.

"I'm here to work," Steve affirms. "I work horses every morning for anybody that needs it, sometimes six or seven a day. Sometimes, it's as many as 12."

Then he says grinning, "I guess I just love to ride."

The 1978 running of the Riley Allison Thoroughbred Futurity is moving briskly on course toward a projected gross purse of \$300,000.

According to Nominations Secretary Donna Stamp, a total of 450 head were originally nominated on November 1.

Of these, 311 were kept eligible via a payment of \$350 each on February 15. In addition, there were four supplemental nominees at \$2,500.

So that means 315 juveniles are still in the running, and the kitty, at this point, stands at \$231,100. Last year at this time, the Allison progress chart showed 291 head eligible, with \$210,350 on deposit.

The 77 Allison finally topped out at \$270,904.

Now ranked as the nation's richest two-year-old thoroughbred race, the Allison Futurity will be contested at five furlongs on Sunday, May 7 — the final day of the season. If that \$500,000 purse is attained, the winning owner will collect \$145,000.

The four supplemental nominees are Utoteum, owned by J.A. Benson and Raymond Wilson of Meadow, Texas; Ruff Racquet, owned by Margaret DuPont and Margaret Bloss of El Paso; Perfect View, owned by Jack French of Tecumseh, Oklahoma; Prospector's Joy, owned by Steve Hawker of Winter Park, Florida.

The final payment is \$500 to pass the entry box for the elimination trials slated for April 29.

Today We Welcome Glorious Spring

With open arms and hearts full of gladness we welcome the arrival of spring, "The Queen of Seasons," today.

Spring is greeted with great joy in all lands the world over, and there is a special welcome in lands of snowy winters when the world awakens from its long sleep under its snowy blanket. Once more I am remembering back to my childhood in Alaska where the violets were blooming on the edge of the melting snow banks in the spring which arrived all in a day.

The miracle of spring is ever new and fills your heart with greater joy each year. To the people of our country to the north, this first day of spring is more welcome than in many a year.

Spring in a mountain country has a charm all its own; and we here in the land of the White Mountain are blessed with an unusually wonderful spring season.

By the way, I have been telling you that the first day of spring is on the twenty-first.

I am sending you this message on the fifteenth of March, and a few moments ago I saw by the almanac that spring is on the twentieth. Today, as I write this, half way through March and only five days away from spring, it is very wintery for this time of year. Last night the temperature was down around twenty, and this morning the water in the metates was frozen solid. The apricot buds still tightly closed. Last year they bloomed on the eleventh, and this was later than usual.

The cedars outside are waving first one way and then the other as first the west wind comes down from the mountain, and then the north wind blows in from Colorado, and then the east wind from the plains of Texas. All of these winds are icy cold as if this were in January.

So you see, although spring is a day or

two early by the calendar; still the spring weather is much cooler than usual; and the spring flowers, fruit blossoms and leaves, are later than in most years. Surely this is on account of the good snow on our mountain and also because of the snowiest and coldest winter in a hundred years in the northern part of our country. Here comes another cold blast into the vale from the north driven in by the north wind, charging with all its might.

Many Spring-Times Rolled Into One

Down in the Pecos valley and over toward Tularosa, where the land begins gradually sloping upward toward the mountain, spring-time weather has already begun and the early flowers in the yards like tulips and daffodils have been blooming for many days. Early bushes like Japanese quince and forsythia have begun blooming. And apricot and peach blossoms have begun the blossom parade.

At the lower end of the Ruidoso valley down by Riverside, the weeping willows have leafed out and the first apricot blossoms have opened their pink and white petals and sent the first blossom perfume of the spring out on the breeze.

This is a signal to the other growing things farther up the valleys that the spring parade has begun. The earliest fruit blossoms will begin blooming forth farther up the way, and the willow and cottonwood leaves will fall in line.

First bloom the apricot, then the early plum, peach, cherry, pear and apple.

There can be as much as three weeks or a month difference in the blossom time of the fruit trees from Riverside on up to Ruidoso or the upper Bonito valley.

The same pattern follows with the wild flowers. The daisies' wild pink, and many other flowers of the prairies and foothills are now beginning to bloom. And it will be several weeks before the early violets and other spring flowers begin blooming amongst the mountain ferns under the spruce and fir trees of the mountains.

Spring lasts until June twenty-first. And as the beauties of Mother Earth unfold, this will be the most wonderful spring time we have seen in a long time.

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Social Security information

"The 1,822 people in Lincoln County who get social security benefits have a renewed promise from the Federal Government that those checks will keep coming in the months and years ahead," Gordon Lunsford, social security field representative, said today.

"New legislation will provide additional income to assure the financial stability of the social security system well into the next century. The added revenues will come from increases in both the social security tax rate and the 'wage base' — the maximum earnings on which the social security taxes are collected in a year.

"Nobody likes to see taxes go up, but the new revenues offer solid reassurance to the 34 million people in this country who are getting social security checks now. Their payments simply could not have continued beyond the next few years without additional income to the system.

"On wages of \$10,000 a year the social security tax bill will be \$605 in 1978 — only \$20 more than the \$585 payable on the same income in 1977. In 1979 and 1980 the social security tax on \$10,000 in earnings will be \$613. The tax burden will be heavier on those in higher wage brackets because more of their income will be taxable for social security.

"The maximum amount taxed for social security was \$16,500 in 1977, \$17,700 this year, and will go up to \$22,900 in 1979, \$25,900 in 1980, and 29,700 in 1981. Thereafter the base will rise automatically to keep pace with increases in average wages covered by social security."

SANTA FE — Two state agencies dealing with energy issues will be seeking, and expect to receive, assistance from a new Federal research institute in developing energy conservation programs and consumer-oriented aids.

The new Federal-level aid will consist of technical assistance — and in some cases the loaning of temporary staff experts — to state agencies.

Although the Federal energy legislation proposed by President Carter has been stalled in Congress as a result of disagreements over natural gas pricing and regulation, there has been congressional agreement on the need for much stronger state-level action on energy saving plans.

The Federal assistance is likely to come through even though the State Legislature has not made initiatives in developing energy conservation plans.

A proposal by the Public Service Commission for a broad-based committee to help develop energy-saving plans in the utility field failed to be enacted during the 1978 legislative session, for instance. But the commission, which sets gas and electricity rates, has begun steps toward devising a conservation plan for the utilities under its jurisdiction.

As we reported earlier, Congress seems certain to include a strong conservation requirement directed at state utility commissions in its final energy package.

Now, both the Public Service Commission and the Department of Energy and Minerals (a new agency to go into effect March 31) plan to seek assistance from a new entity created within the U.S. Department of Energy to help state-level energy agencies beef up their staffs and general capabilities.

It's called the National Regulatory Research Institute.

The institute's first round of assistance will be from April until September. It will

provide both technical advice and, in some cases, temporary staffers, to state utility commissions and energy departments.

The institute was created by Congress last year as part of the Department of Energy, which in turn was responding to requests from state utility commissions who say they are understaffed in dealing with the utilities they are supposed to regulate.

A survey by the National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners showed that 89 percent of state regulators said they needed "additional economic and technical research on policy issues."

We already have reported that New Mexico's Public Service Commission has placed the "fuel adjustment clause" process as number one on its application to the Federal Institute. The clause, which shows up on utility bills, allows utility companies to pass through to consumers the costs of purchasing fuel for their operations.

In addition, the state's Department of Energy and Minerals plans to apply for assistance from the institute to beef up state government's "data base" on energy issues.

Officials at the department said they are often hampered by a lack of good information on energy matters, even though fuel and mineral development represents one of the fastest-growing and most important parts of the state's economy.

They want to develop a computerized "model" which will enable them to see how pricing changes in one part of the energy picture will affect other categories.

They also plan to seek aid from the institute in expanding consumer-related programs aimed at developing so-called "alternative" energy sources such as wind and solar power.

In the case of both the state department and the utility commission, the application represents a new push toward strengthening state-level programs on energy saving before Washington takes over the field.

He sued, arguing that Ford's ads constituted an implied warranty on his pickup. A jury agreed and ordered Ford to pay the \$500.

This idea — that products ought to do what TV ads say they'll do — hold ominous prospects of a spate of lawsuits from disgruntled consumers.

Will Mrs. Olson get sued when some newlyweds tries her brand and finds she

still makes coffee that tastes like crankcase oil? Will Geritol get it from a wife who says, "My husband takes it every day, and he's as shiftless as ever?"

Will L'eggs be hauled into court by a pantyhose buyer who donned a pair and found her (his?) calves still look like the lower half of a Steinway?

Or will Ford et al come up with a Better Idea? Stay tuned. — Deming Headlight

SIMPLIFICATION

After years of trying, can it be that the Internal Revenue Service finally has succeeded in simplifying its tax returns so the individual taxpayer can understand them? If the number of errors filed with those returns is any indication, yes, it has.

During the first five weeks of 1978, "short" forms 1040A filed showed an error rate of 3.4 percent. For the same period last year, that form was producing an error rate of 10.2 percent. On the "long" 1040 form, errors have dropped from 6.2 percent last year to 4.2 percent for returns filed in the first five weeks this year.

Several long-time computations have been eliminated in this year's forms, especially for taxpayers who do not itemize deductions. The IRS defines "errors" as mistakes limited to addition, subtraction or computation miscalculations.

The first five weeks of a tax season comprise a small part of the total. The early filers traditionally have been taxpayers anticipating a refund. If the lower error rate holds up in the next month, when the procrastinators and taxpayers who owe taxes send in their returns, the IRS can claim simplification success. Taxpayers' pockets may not be any the heavier for it, but making the pay-up process as painless as possible is a step in the right direction. — Alamogordo Daily News



These firms can obtain almost blanket coverage of any given market ... from a specific city to statewide, regional, even national campaigns ... and, chances are good, they can get the job done for, considering the number of prospective tourists, a fraction of a cent a contact. And they guarantee to have this advertising in the hands of a specified number of people ... from hundreds of thousands to millions.

ON BOOSTING HUCKSTERS

Then there's another way to advertise Ruidoso ... that's through the out-of-town salesmen ... touting their product to the skies ... who always have a product they can't guarantee will ever get into the hands of a prospective tourist ... and tourists are the name of the game in Ruidoso.

TERRORISM THE WORLD AT BAY

Terrorist incidents can happen anytime, anyplace—at the Olympics, in the quiet of the Dutch countryside, at any major airport—and continue to do so with alarming frequency. According to a recent CIA report,

there have been more than 1200 transnational terrorist acts in the last decade alone, ranging from the kidnapping of officials of international organizations to the slaying of the former mayor of Barcelona.

On Tuesday, March 21, PBS will present an historic two-hour special with live satellite hookups from Rome, London and Tel Aviv, dealing with this explosive problem. TERRORISM/THE WORLD AT BAY will attempt to understand the enormity of the issue by defining it, by listening to what psychiatrists, journalists, world leaders, police officials and others who've been dealing with terrorism have to say. Additionally, films from Sweden, Canada, England, Germany and Italy will be screened to further illustrate the global crisis and to find out why a handful of people can virtually hold the world at bay.

A terrorist is a man who expects to lose the battles but win the war. There is no set "terrorist personality" but most are middle-class, highly educated and clever. The goals may be different but all terrorists, no matter what they hope to achieve, seem to be getting more and more adept at what they do.

Some of the world's brightest minds will use this special as a forum to work toward a solution. Expected to take part are Dr. Frank Ochberg of the National Institute of Mental Health, U.S. Ambassador Hayward Haman, Peter Janke of the Institute for the Study of Conflict in London, Peter Walton of Scotland Yard, Gen. Rehavam Zeevi, former advisor on counter-terrorist tactics to the Israeli government, Ulrich Wegner, who headed the German S.W.A.T. team that broke the Lufthansa hijack attempt of last October, Walter Lanquar, director of London's Institute of Contemporary History, Michael Ledeen of the Center for Strategy and International Studies at Georgetown University and Wilfred Rasch, director of Forensic Psychiatry at the University of Berlin.
