## Forest fire prevention drive underway

Forest fire resulting from improperly dumped fireplace and charcoal ashes has become one of the biggest single causes of man-related forest fires in the Ruidoso area. Charley Mook, fire prevention officer with the Smokey Bear Ranger District, said to The News Friday in launching the season's first fire prevention drive.

"The spring season," Mook said, "is when visitors as well as Ruidoso residents should be most on their guard."

"As our fire fuels (needles, dry grasses and similar debris) become drier, and the south and southwestern dry winds blow, lowering the humidity, the fire problem is created. But the people will just go ahead and dump outside where they've been dumping all winter, when it wasn't a problem."

"Winds will rekindle the coals. It doesn't take much. You can go to almost anyplace with a fireplace and find ashes that have just been dumped on the ground."

"We've had cases where people vacuum out their fireplaces, then throw the bag out on the lawn, or what have you, and it starts a fire."

Mook keeps figures and compiles statistics on all fires that the forest service has taken suppression action on. His logs are quite complete, including the specific causes of fire as nearly as it can be determined.

In 1976, Mook said that six percent of all the fires in the district were caused by fireplace or charcoal grill residue being improperly disposed of. He added that that year there were only 24 fires in the Smokey Bear District. However, his records show that a full 12 percent of 1977's 64 district fires were caused by the careless disposal of fireplace and charcoal grill ashes and by live briquets. The charcoal briquet, Mook said, "takes a long time to burn out."

One other statistic Mook has compiled indicated that most — in fact 67 percent — of all the man-related fires that have occurred in the district were caused by out of town visitors. Just about all of these were kindled on the weekend, including Monday or Friday during holidays.

"Visitors will come up here and they'll either rent or borrow a cabin," Mook said. "The guy might tell them to be sure and clean out the fireplace before they leave. They may have only built a fire on Friday

night or Saturday, when they get ready to leave on Sunday they gather the ashes up, take them out; they look cold, they're white — there's no flame — there's no smoke and they dump them on the ground and leave them. "The might be half way home before a spark kindles in the fine fuels."

He said don't be fooled by the wet year we've enjoyed so far. "We usually get started (with the fire season) around here about the first of March," Mook said. "With the amount of rain we've been getting this year it is greening up a little better and earlier."

"This is misleading, because the carrier fuels are still drying out."

On the positive side Mook has very definite suggestions.

"The way to prevent this type of fire is through public education, and knowledge," he said.

"The safe way to dispose of ashes is to put them in a metal container, fill it up with water and let it sit for two or three days, then take it out into a clear area and dump them."

Mook said there has never been a year when there wasn't a fire in the Ruidoso area, but he sure wouldn't mind seeing any this year.

## Six-hour power outage caused by vandalism

The six-hour power outage Saturday night in Ruidoso was caused by vandals who shot a high voltage power line located between Tularosa and Ruidoso in half, a spokesman for Community Public Service said today.

Using a high powered rifle, the vandals severed the line causing sets of insulating bells to hit the ground and short out, blacking out most of Lincoln County, eastern Chaves County and all of Otero County except Alamogordo.

While the power outage which began at 4:45 p.m. the Ruidoso Police Department (RPD) logged "hundreds of calls" ranging from a false burglary alarm at Safeway to brawls.

Other calls handled Saturday night

during the blackout included burglary alarms at several local businesses, an injury at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, a man with an electric breathing apparatus needing assistance and local residents curious about the outage.

Lt. Larry Simon, RPD, said the department was assisted by volunteers from White Mountain Search and Rescue and the CBER's Club who were posted at various businesses to guard against vandalism.

He also said the Forest Service had tanker and hot shot crews on stand-by until the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department, which uses an electric Electron alert system could be reorganized.

## Special Olympics meet set at Roswell April 1

The New Mexico Military Institute will play host to the regional Special Olympics meet April 1, the Ft. Stanton Hospital Special Olympic coordinator said Friday.

Jeanne Culbertson added that 38 people from the Ft. Stanton institution will vie for medals and ribbons in the one-day event produced by the Roswell Jaycees and funded through the Kennedy Foundation.

She added that the regional meet is in preparation for the state meet to be held May 27-28 in Albuquerque.

"We've been having workouts every day," Culbertson said. "The kids have been working hard and they're ready to go."

Culbertson said the Roswell meet, to be attended by teams from about 15 schools and hospitals in the southeast region of New Mexico, will consist of track and field events and swimming.

## McCarty's bid on airport work within estimate

McCarty Construction, Ruidoso, submitted a bid of \$129,085, the only one received for improvements at Ruidoso Municipal Airport at the opening of bids Thursday at village hall.

The engineer's estimate of actual construction cost was just over \$128,000. The original estimate of the entire project was \$160,500 with the revised estimate being \$155,800. The cost will be

divided \$140,000 federal, \$7,800 state and \$7,800 to the village of Ruidoso.


The project includes overlaying portions of existing parallel taxiway, stub taxiways and existing tie down apron; construction of T-hanger apron areas and drainage improvements and marking the pavement areas.

The bid will be submitted to the village trustees at Tuesday's regular meeting at 7:30 p.m., in the Ruidoso Public Library.

## Ruidoso not eligible for EDA programs

Ruidoso qualifies for very few federal Economic Development Administration (EDA) programs because the village enjoys a relatively low unemployment rate and a relatively high median family income the EDA program officer for New Mexico said Thursday.

Fred W. Phelps, in town on an annual monitoring tour, made his remarks to Jim Hine, village administrator, building inspector Chuck Brown and a member of the local media.

He said he would like to program more funds to the area, but added that he was bound by very specific guidelines, which precluded the Ruidoso community from most EDA programs.

EDA money and expertise has been provided for some Ruidoso projects in the past.

"I try to get around once a year and make sure that our services are being properly provided," Phelps said, adding that he monitors all five economic districts within the state.

With headquarters in Austin, Texas, the South west Region of the EDA encompasses a five-state area including Louisiana, Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Arkansas. The function of the Housing and Urban Development subdepartment is to provide funding and assistance for community and county programs within designated economically deprived areas.

As a past 25-year resident of New Mexico and a weekender at Cloudcroft, Phelps is no stranger to the area.

"I would say that once upon a time, I knew all the businessmen in Ruidoso," Phelps said.

He added that he was a charter member and one of the organizers of the Highway 70 Association which brought Highway 70 to the area.

"That was over 30 years ago," he said. "We met at the old Navajo Lodge."

Sanchez, a life long resident of Lincoln County, has been in law enforcement for eleven years, including serving four years as Lincoln County sheriff.







## Junior Girl Scouts attend program on drug abuses

Members of Lana Mook's Junior Girl Scout Troop Thursday night participated in a drug-abuse seminar presented by a local educator and a Ruidoso police detective.

The annual presentation, held in the First Christian Church, was given in an effort to present troop members with the facts surrounding drugs and drug abuse, in the hope that if they are confronted with such a situation they will make an intelligent choice based on fact.

Dub Williams, a Ruidoso educator for 23 years and a recognized authority on the subject of substance abuse, told the group that learned behavior was the basis of drug abuse.

"People have problems," he said, "or they think they have problems and they may use drugs as a vehicle for escape."

He told the girls that young people were his life, and he was concerned with their well being and wanted them to know the facts.

"If I'm going to talk about drugs," he said, "I'm going to talk about cigarettes." He added that cigarettes were the number one abused drug in America, with alcohol a close second.

"There are 10 million alcoholics in the United States," Williams said, adding that the U. S.'s annual bar bill was well into the millions of dollars.

Williams gave the girls a mental look at what he termed the marijuana problem.

"The biggest danger about smoking

marijuana is the unknown," he said. "We don't know what's wrong with it."


One young lass asked why more research was not performed on marijuana.

"Americans have been smoking tobacco for 500 years," Williams said, "and only within the last 15 years has anyone been able to establish the dangers involved. Pot has been a problem for only about 50 years."

Dave Pfeffer, detective with the Ruidoso

Police Department, outlined the different uses and types of drugs that the girls might encounter. Pfeffer came equipped with a complete assortment of visual aids containing the actual drugs most often abused.

He reviewed the use of hard drugs in our society, and told the girls that they shouldn't be afraid to help a friend that might be harming himself by using such drugs. He added that they shouldn't feel like tattle-tales or the like.

## Parents taking new view of TV ads for children

"The younger the child, the more vulnerable he can be to television advertising," said Leo Yates, Extension family life specialist at New Mexico State University.

"Preschool children are not capable of setting priorities, determining the importance or quality of a product or evaluating their own nutritional needs. Yet, children continue to be the focus of millions of advertising dollars," Yates said.

The family life specialist said children who are only moderate viewers of television are exposed to some 100 hours of commercials a year. Toys and food are the

two main kinds of products advertised especially for children.

"Toy ads generate the child's desire to own the item, whatever the expense," said Yates. Highly sugared products, including cereals, candy, soft drinks and cookies, and fast-foods like hamburgers, hot dogs and french fries are pushed on TV.

What can parents do? The Extension family life specialist said to become familiar with commercials directed at children. Take the time to sit through three or four hours of Saturday morning television.

"Listen carefully to the advertising messages and what they say and imply. Evaluate what your child is learning from advertisements. Then ask yourself if these are the values acceptable in your family," Yates said.

If you disapprove of an advertising product, claim or message, write the product's manufacturer and send a copy to the television station manager.

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### Painting Tips

**CEILING PAINTING MADE EASY**

Don't let your ceiling scare you. With the proper tools and adequate planning, even the largest ceiling should not take over 45 minutes to complete, and it might even be fun! Here are some tips to make the job faster and easier:

[1] Use the right roller. If you don't have a 9 inch roller, get one! And be sure to ask for a good quality cover with at least a 3/4 inch nap. This combination will carry more paint to the work and give better coverage on rough surfaces.

[2] Use an extension handle. You could set up some sort of scaffolding or move a step ladder about as you paint, but by far the easiest and fastest way is to stand on the floor using a 4-foot handle for 8-foot ceilings or a 6-foot handle for 9 or 10 foot ceilings.

[3] Now we use our stepladder only for cutting in the edges of the ceiling before rolling. Even here, you can attach a corner roller to your long handle and do this job from the floor.

## Wilderness Wisdom

**Dear Wayne** — What is the best method of packaging fish for the freezer and how long can they be kept? **Arnie W., Missouri**

**Dear Arnie** — Most often, fish is packaged for the freezer much the same as beef. It can be wrapped in foil or freezer paper, being certain to seal it against entry of air.

If you have adequate freezer space there is another method you may wish to try. Cut the top from a half gallon waxed paper milk carton. Stack the cleaned fish on end in the carton. Fill with water, completely covering the fish. Set in the freezer. Many people who have used this method believe the fish retain their fresh caught flavor longer. At any rate, freezing in ice will certainly seal them airtight.

At zero degrees or colder they can likely be kept for a year, but most fish will lose a substantial portion of their freshness before then. Trout is one of those which should be eaten within six months.

**Dear Wayne** — How is the gauge of shotguns determined? I know the larger the barrel diameter, the smaller the gauge number, but I can't figure what standard the measurement of gauge is based upon. **Billy N., Illinois**

**Dear Billy** — The system of measurement to establish shotgun gauge is many years old. It is determined by the number of lead balls, the diameter of the shotgun bore, that are required to weigh one pound. By this method, a 12 gauge would require 12 such balls to weigh a pound, a 20 gauge requires 20, and so on. This is the standard for all shotguns except the .410, which is not really a gauge but a caliber designation.

**Dear Wayne** — For many years I have wanted to go on a pack trip into the Rocky Mountains for elk hunting, but was not financially able. Now that I can afford to, my wife objects, saying that I am not physically able. I am 64 years old and in good health. I don't know of any serious ailment that would jeopardize my going. Should I forget it, or pursue the possibility further? **Rodney C., Iowa**

**Dear Rodney** — I wouldn't suggest that you should immediately make plans for the trip, but if you're really in as good health as you believe, I don't see why you shouldn't pursue the possibility. The first step would be a complete physical by your doctor. If he confirms your good health, begin to lay plans. In the meantime,

develop a routine of exercise that will put you in shape for what you are likely to encounter.

**Dear Wayne** — Do you believe there is such a thing as the "perfect" all around rifle caliber? **Benney U., Illinois**

**Dear Benney** — Not likely. If there is I haven't heard of it.

The very nature of the countless targets that a rifle may encounter make the idea of one caliber for all nearly impossible. It would be unreasonable to expect a caliber normally used for rhino or elephant to perform equally well on a small varmint at 300 yards.

There are several very versatile calibers available that perform well within the range of small to large animals when loaded with the proper bullet. Even these are outclassed on very small varmints, or very large animals.

It is quite possible that there is an ideal all around caliber for the shooting you will encounter, unless of course, you are a global hunter.

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

### FAIR DECISION

The United States Supreme Court has overruled a circuit court of appeals decision and declared Indians cannot try non-Indians in tribal courts. This is as it should be.

Anyone accused of any criminal act, even if as trivial as a speeding ticket, should have the opportunity through the democratic process, to have a voice in the selection of the judge or jury. This they do not have in a tribal court. — *The Rio Grande Sun*

### FOR MURIEL?

A considerable campaign has been launched in the U.S. Senate in behalf of the Humphrey-Hawkins full employment bill. The gist of the appeal to doubtful Senators is that passage of the bill would be a monument to the memory of the late Senator Hubert Humphrey.

One Senator was recently quoted as saying this sentiment pitch would probably triumph. After all he said, "Muriel is sitting right there." He was referring to the Senator's widow, who has been named to fill Humphrey's Senate seat the rest of this year.

No further monument is needed to Hubert Humphrey. His career is monument enough and his likeableness and liberalism will not be forgotten. But of all the poor reasons ever advanced to obtain passage of another huge spending bill — just about guaranteeing everyone a make-believe federal job, this must rank as the worst-trading on sympathy to obtain legislation not justified on its merits or the current condition of the economy. — *Santa Rosa News*

### U.S. CAN'T KEEP UP

American politicians generally shy away from sponsoring a new draft or mandatory universal service for the young. This concept was junked in the hectic sixties when the nation's youth went on the rampage because of the Vietnam War — with card burning, riots, evasion, etc.

But it's increasingly apparent that the only through some form of modest-pay mandatory service, by young Americans, can the nation keep pace with Russia in arms, thus guaranteeing the nation's security.

A recent Library of Congress study shows military pay and benefits rose 43 percent between 1968 and 1976. That's per capita rise, after allowing for inflation.

The high pay system, used to attract volunteers and keep personnel, is now consuming well over half the sizable defense budget. Since other fixed costs, such as maintenance and upkeep of installations and weapons, consume another major segment of defense money, a lesser percentage is being left each year for weapons purchases and defense modernization.

President Carter has increased the coming defense budget, recognizing the crisis, but his increase is only a pinprick of what's needed. The real cause of the problem — the great and growing percentage of defense appropriations allotted to personnel pay and benefits — is being "politically" ignored.

American youth, as always, will respond to the nation's needs in time of crisis, if properly appraised of the situation and danger. The defense crisis is as real as the energy crisis, and could be more fatal. National, mandatory service, at modest pay, for eighteen months, either in civilian or military capacity, is an eventual must if the U.S. is to keep pace with Russia in arms. — *Santa Rosa News*

SANTA FE — The Apodaca Administration is gearing up for what the governor and his top officials believe is the most important event of his four-year term.

A week from today marks the end of the existing state government structure and the beginning of the cabinet system, a plan Jerry Apodaca advocated in his 1974 campaign and which he pushed strongly as chief executive.

How well reorganization works will determine the public's attitude about the Apodaca Administration, to a great extent.

Top officials have become concerned, and the governor angered, over published accounts which named Apodaca in connection with Federal investigations into organized crime activities.

Apodaca himself says there should be an investigation of racist motives for the news "leaks" and of possible ties between the U. S. Attorney's office and newspapers publishing the leaks.

His officials, meanwhile, believe the controversy has obscured attention that would normally be paid to the major governmental restructuring.

Even before the controversy unfolded, they were planning ceremonies for next Friday which would usher in the cabinet system. These ceremonies will include the swearing in of various officials and a reception in the governor's offices.

Administration officials also took exception to accounts — heard in Santa Fe and in some cases published — that reorganization will be a way of keeping Apodaca's supporters "cemented in" to key positions in the capitol.

They said the governor has made a policy decision to leave to the next governor the option of keeping sub-cabinet "division chiefs" and other key officials — and that there will be no attempt to place now "exempt" or non-classified personnel into the civil service classification under the State Personnel Office.

Few officials will be involved in transferring from "exempt" to "classified" or the other way, they said, but in any event it will be up to the governor who takes office in January 1979 to select his own cabinet team and make the cabinet system fully operational.

The governor's office is concentrating now on making sure the actual transition goes smoothly. The governor's aides don't want the scene to be marred with stories of missed paychecks or free-floating agencies.

The Department of Finance and Administration (DFA) has put a priority on making sure the reshuffling of agencies and departments doesn't result in skipped paychecks for any of the thousands of state employees.

Among state government veterans, opinions on state government varies from mild skepticism to strong support.

Few claim it will save dollars, but there is general agreement that it will give future governors a better grasp on the sprawling bureaucracy and centralize both power and responsibility in the governor's office.

"It's something the state has needed," says one Apodaca official. "I think people expect too much of it. It'll have to be refined over the years. But it gives the governor a smaller group of people to advise him directly and keep him up to date on what's happening at the lower levels."

Another official added: "There are not going to be fewer people on the payroll. If there are good administrators, hopefully you'll get the job done more efficiently and with less frustration to Joe Citizen."

### PRIME TIME SCHOOL TELEVISION

Here is the first of the six winning entries in the contest sponsored by Prime Time School Television for a student review of a police or detective program on television. It is written by Ann Howard, 13, of Lonsdale, Ark., the daughter of a policeman.

After giving serious thought to the subject of police shows, I find my feelings about them are one-sided. My father has been a policeman for nine years, so I feel that I am fairly sensitive to the reality of these programs.

I think that there is too much emphasis on shooting guns, long car chases and the other violent things around which police shows seem to revolve. Shooting guns is not what a policeman does. Policemen are not people that have their minds programmed for violence. They are very helpful and none go around firing their pistols at people as these programs seem to imply.

The most unrealistic programs, in my opinion, are CHARLIE'S ANGELS, BARETTA and CHiPs. None of the three seem to have the realistic quality that they should. None have any educational values with the small exception of BARETTA, which occasionally has one.

POLICE STORY seems to be the only realistic and educational one of them all. Since it is taken from real-life policemen's stories, it seems only reasonable that it would be believable.

Dramas dealing with law enforcement seem to have a glamorous look to them, meant only to catch good ratings and make the actors who portray policemen look better. Television police dramas are losing the basic honesty and law enforcing ingredients they once had.

Sometimes after watching one of these shows I wonder if the writers of the script ever knew any policemen or the problems they deal with and their feelings about them. If not, then I think they should find out. They should not just assume the truth but get all the facts.

If these shows looked at the whole story of what policemen and law enforcement are all about, I think we could enjoy them more. Kids who only know policemen through television probably think that all policemen are like KOJAK or STARKY AND HUTCH. I believe that everyone is entitled to know the whole story, not just the side television wants you to see.


## CBS: ON THE AIR
