

Residents voice disapproval of zoning change

The High density zoning request of an El Paso based developer was voted down last night by the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission after about 40 residents representing nearly 100 lot owners at the Golf Course Estates voiced objection to the change.

In seeking a zoning change from R-1 (single family) to R-2 (multiple family), Andy J. Winton, Winton Enterprises, told the commission and the residents his plans to construct 51 units on lots zoned for 33 units would enhance the property value of the areas.

In a slide presentation, Winton outlined the features of a similar development under construction in Dona Ana County. He said the Golf Course Estates development would feature the same style patio homes as the Dona Ana project.

"They are extremely desirable," Winton said. "The product is of very high quality."

After his presentation, residents of the area congratulated him on the fine homes he was building, saying they had no objection to the style of architecture of the proposed development nor the quality of the homes.

Speaking on behalf of the residents' coalition, Harry Ray told the commission that density was the problem.

"What we object to is the increased density," Ray said, "I don't know about

anyone else, but I think the homes look great."

One resident asked Winton if he would consider building within the existing zoning requirements.

"We're in the business of building patio homes," Winton replied; "that's what we're here for." He added that placing 33 patio homes on the lots would create too much space between the units.

Resident Novella Estes told the group she was concerned with the precedent of allowing the construction of condominiums.

"If this is approved," she asked, "what is to keep this thing from snowballing into a condominium city?"

P&Z Chairman Betty Patton reminded Estes that there are two similar developments in existence in the Golf Course area.

Estes said she knew that, but she saw no reason why it should continue.

"If you run a red light and don't get caught," one resident stated, "it doesn't make it legal to run it again."

His comment was met with cries of approval from the residents.

Commissioner Mike Waldron said the residents in attendance represented the opinions of a substantial number of people with a valid point, and they could not be ignored.

The issue was unanimously voted down with Patton and Commissioner Stormy Edwards stepping down for the vote.

Edwards is the prime developer of Golf

Course Estates. Patton, a real estate agent, bowed to what she called earlier charges of a conflict of interest. Patton had sold lots to a group which in turn sold the lots to Winton Enterprises.

Following the vote Winton said he didn't know what his group would do with the lots.

"We'll probably build the single-family houses," he said.

In other action the commission:

— Approved the plat for Candy's restaurant, acknowledging the restaurant had adequate parking. The issue surfaced at the last formal meeting of the P&Z when R. A. Bennett, a neighboring business owner, said he was having problems with the patrons of Candy's parking on his property.

Building inspector Chuck Brown told

Bennett and the commission that he was satisfied with the parking at Candy's.

Upon hearing the commission say they could legally do nothing about the situation, Bennett said, "I would like to point out her sign is a hazard. When you drive out on the street it blocks (the view)." He added he would build a fence between the two properties to the street.

— Approved the replat of lot 3 block 4 of

the Cree Meadows Heights subdivision.

— Elected Mike Waldron to chair the commission with Jim French to serve as vice-chairman and Erlene Phillips as secretary.

— Took no action on Tim Collins' request to consider the annexation of Alpine Village.

— Voted to allow the plat vacation of Kingswood subdivision, Unit 2.

Tuesday's filing shapes up races

Lincoln County's various political races began to take shape Tuesday when political hopefuls from around the area filed for election.

County filing action was seen in both Carrizozo and Santa Fe. Candidates for legislative districts which include more than one county are required by law to file their declarations with the secretary of state in Santa Fe.

Republican State Senator John Conway of Alamogordo is unopposed in the Republican primary. But, two Democrats, Charlotte C. Jarratt of Ruidoso and Bobby Dan Crenshaw of Carrizozo, filed as candidates for Conway's District 39 seat. The district extends over portions of Otero and Lincoln Counties.

Representative John Bigbee, Republican of Lincoln-Torrance-Baca-Guadalupe, will face the winner of a Democrat primary race between Jose O. Illanueva of Santa Rosa and Jose M. Marquez of La Loma.

County candidates filing in Carrizozo included incumbent G.H. "Shorty" Stoneman and R.C. Nunez, both Democrats, and Republicans Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight and Michael H. Hernandez, all for County Commission District 1 (Hondo Valley).

George L. "Lee" Straley Jr., a Democrat, is unopposed in his bid for reelection to the District 2 (Carrizozo area) seat.

For County Commission District 3 (Ruidoso), incumbent Chairman John H. Sudderth is unopposed in the Democrat primary, but will face either Patricia K. French or Ben L. Hall in the general.

County Clerk Jane McSwane will not run for the forthcoming term. Her position will be up for grabs between Democrat Barbara J. Ward, current administrative assistant to the county manager, and former clerk Barbara Lovelace, a Republican.

Either incumbent assessor Marion L. Schlarb or Charles A. Neel, both Republicans, will face George P. White, who drew no Democrat opposition, in the general election.

Incumbent Treasurer Mike Kimbrough will run unopposed in both the primary and the general election for the treasurer's position.

For the sheriff's race, incumbent Bill Elliott faces Democratic primary opposition from Melvin "Boots" Nelson. The winner of that race will face either Ernest

Street's repairs committed

Representatives of Continental Telephone and the Village of Ruidoso met Tuesday morning on Roswell street in the village and agreed to upgrade the condition of the street.

Dee Monsen, Continental's local service manager; Frank Potter, village administrative assistant; Clive Joy, the telephone company's state engineer; Dean Coons, Continental's district engineer; and Tom Porter, Underground Electric, reviewed the stages of work performed at the street last fall by the telephone company, Cablevision, and the village.

The group agreed that a base course would be applied to the upper portion of the street, restoring it to the original condition.

Potter explained that a base course is basically gravel with a binder agent added. He said that unlike plain gravel a base course resists the build up of mud on a graveled road.

Under the informal agreement, village equipment will lay down base course purchased by the telephone company.

Potter said a rough estimate of the cost of the material is about \$300. He added that he would ask Jack Lamay, village street superintendent, to calculate the amount of material needed and the cost.

Monsen suggested that perhaps Cablevision was at least partially responsible for the present condition of the street after Coons pointed where the television company had bisected the road with underground cable, and where television cable was left laying above ground.

Monsen said he would meet with Ron Battles, Cablevision manager, in an effort to draw up an agreement whereby the television company would assist in the repairs. He added he would not hold up street repairs to secure such an agreement.

"If he doesn't want to get involved, fine," Monsen said.

During the street-side conference, Coons pointed out several street residents' driveways which the telephone company had graveled last week, and where a grader had smoothed where telephone cable had been placed underground. Signs where someone had hand raked material out of residents' yards were apparent.

The winter-long problems Roswell street residents have had in having the street returned to its original condition surfaced last week when street-resident Patrick McNamara contacted The News.

McNamara said he had been given the run-around by the telephone company and the village with both claiming the other was responsible for repairs to the street.

Several other residents of the street complained of the condition of the street. Telephone and Cablevision company work was being performed in the area in an effort to remove all overhead service lines and place them underground.

Chamber officers elected

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors held a called meeting Wednesday for the election of officers.

Elected were Dave Willson, president; Sunny Hirschfeld, first vice president; Alden Deyo, second vice president, and Eddie Parker, treasurer.

Other matters were discussed including the annual arts and crafts fair, the Chamber newsletter and future involvement with the Mule-O-Rama Association, but no action was taken.

Nogal road pavement seen

Six members of the New Mexico State Highway Department will hold the first of two public hearings to discuss the engineering, social, economic, and environmental impact of the proposed construction of a 5.2 mile stretch of State Road 37 from Angus north to the existing paved section.

The hearing will be held on April 13 at the White Mountain Elementary School beginning at 7 p.m.

According to state highway officials, the

project could go to bid by the end of the year with construction activities commencing as early as next summer.

Designated New Mexico State Project S-1226 (6) the alignment toward Nogal will cut about 13 miles off the trip to Carrizozo from Ruidoso through Capitan. The present dirt road through Nogal is often generally impassible due to mud and snow.

Frank Ripley, highway department public affairs officer explained that an

environmental impact statement has been filed for the project and received a "negative declaration." He explained that the project would not substantially alter the environment of the area because of the existing roadway.

"The alignment will generally follow the existing road and will require some right of way varying from 150 to 200 feet," Ripley said. "The right of way will be fenced and turnouts will be constructed."

Ruidoso Downs Racetrack resurfacing began this week

Construction to rework the entire racing surface began this week at Ruidoso Downs Racetrack, Clarence Darrough, construction supervisor, said Wednesday.

"We're putting the track into real fine shape for racing by removing the old cushion, doing minor grade work,

recompacting the base and then replacing the cushion," he said.

Crews from McCarty Construction of Ruidoso have dug up the superficial layer of the track, transported it to a screening apparatus and then begun grading the underlayer.

"The purpose of the screen is to end up with a uniform material for the top surface. We'll take the screened material and put it back on the newly graded layer and when we're finished it'll be ready for racing," he said.

"All I can guarantee now on account of the weather is we'll have it ready for the season opening May 13 but we'd like to have it ready a week before racing begins for workouts."

Darrough said the construction is "a normal procedure before a racing meet.

Ruidoso Downs has done it in the past but to what extent I don't know.

"Basically I found the track, outside of the quarterhorse straightaway, in favorable condition."

Other maintenance plans at Ruidoso

Downs include resurfacing the parking lots and drainage construction.

Darrough, who came to Ruidoso Downs on special assignment from California, travels "wherever I'm needed to work with track maintenance."

shouldn't be in excellent condition and favorable to horsemen in time for opening May 13," maintenance supervisor Clarence Darrough said Wednesday.

More money directed into Ruidoso stakes

Fifteen stakes races on the 1978 racing calendar at Ruidoso Downs have been increased in purse value, according to General Manager Al Rosa.

"In addition, the starting minimum purse will be \$2,000," Rosa said. "That's an increase of \$100 over last year's starting minimum. Moreover, it's the highest starting minimum purse in Ruidoso history."

The purse boosts come on the heels of the highly successful '77 season when 69 race days produced a total handle of \$28,811,383 and a daily average of \$417,198. Both figures are all-time Ruidoso records.

The 1978 meeting will cover 71 race days, beginning Saturday, May 13, and extending through Labor Day. Added-money increases for the '78 stakes extends from \$500 to \$2,500. The fastest hike (\$2,500) will go into the six-furlong Ruidoso Sprint Championship, putting the added cash at \$12,500.

Hikes of \$1,500 are directed at the 400-yard Three Bars Handicap, the 6 1/2-furlong Governor's Handicap, the seven-furlong Jockey Club Stakes, the four-furlong

Ruidoso Speed Handicap, and the 870-yard Brigand Handicap. Each will now pack added money of \$10,000.

Boosts of \$1,000 each are set for the 5 1/2-furlong Memorial Day Handicap (putting the added purse at \$6,000); the 5 1/2-furlong Futurity Prep Stakes (\$7,500); the 5 1/2-furlong First Lady Handicap (\$7,500); the seven-furlong Roadrunner Stakes (\$7,500); the 870-yard Flying Charm Stakes (\$7,500) and the 550-yard Thad Sandstrom Handicap (\$8,500). The latter, saluting the late president of the All-American Television Network, formerly was the 550 Championship.

Boosts of \$500 will go into the six-furlong Inaugural Purse, the six-furlong Aspen Stakes, and the 400-yard Zia Stakes, which puts the added purses for all three at \$6,500.

The Ruidoso Stakes Schedule, as usual, will be headed by the richest races in the world.

Most prominent is the All-American Quarter Horse Futurity, the 440-yard Labor Day thriller which now channels \$1,280,000 into the grand finale and three

consolation races. That's a hike of \$250,000. Of this amount, \$1,030,000 will ride on the nationally-televised showdown on Labor Day. The winning owner will rake in a fabulous \$437,500 (as compared to the previous \$330,000).

Another brilliant jewel on the stakes schedule is the three-year-old counterpart of the world's richest horserace — the 440-yard All-American Derby. The '78 edition is expected to reach \$650,000.

The two stepping stones to the All-American Futurity are the \$525,000 (est.) Kansas Futurity (350 yards), and the \$450,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity (400 yards).

Three-year-old quarter horses, before reaching the All-American Derby, can slug it out in the \$150,000 (est.) Kansas Derby and the \$450,000 (est.) Rainbow Derby.

Basically, racing is scheduled for Thursday through Sunday, but four Wednesday dates are booked for August. First post for Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday cards is 1:30 p.m. Matters will get going a half-hour earlier (1 p.m.) on Sundays.

He added that the tentative schedules for right-of-way acquisition and construction relating to the project will be discussed at the hearing.

Ripley said that all existing bridges will be reconstructed either as box culverts or bridges depending on the projected flow of water they will be expected to channel.

He said that information regarding the proposed design features and environmental documentation will be on display about one week before the public hearing in the following locations: The Ruidoso Post Office, Carrizozo Post Office, Alto Post Office and the Chief Grocery Store at Angus.

Ken Bower, deputy design engineer with the department's technical services, Phil Rios, technical services, Tom Card Jr., design engineer, Luis Duffy, project design engineer, and an unnamed environmentalist and a right-of-way specialist will be in attendance at the public hearing.

The highway department urges all interested persons to attend the meeting. Ripley explained that if the hearing is well attended and all points are discussed, a second hearing will be canceled. He added that this could move the bid date up by a few months.

For others, it is a time for some of that good ol' rest and relaxation. They have worked hard, skied hard, and now they are looking forward to enjoying the warmer days and the slower pace that spring brings in.

A lot of store owners, businesses, and restaurants close up for a week or two and go on vacation. It is their turn to be a tourist.

Sierra Blanca made an amazing recovery from our late opening date. As of April 11, 1978, we will have had 89 total skiing days utilizing the entire mountain, with an additional 20 days on the beginner trails. (129 last year) We have estimated 18,500 less skiers this year over last year's figure of 149,500. This isn't too bad when you consider that we missed Christmas and semester break! However, almost all other statistics prove to be better than last year.

The quality of the snow was better in that it was heavy and provided a denser pack, better base, and came in such a short period of time.

As of Tuesday, April 4, 1978, the records indicate 174 inches of snowfall this season. (There were 173 inches at the end of the 1976-1977 season) The most impressive statistic in our books is our record breaking day of 4,328 skiers one Saturday in February.

This is in direct relationship to the new Lincoln Chair and trail which increased our uphill capacity and accommodated our downhill traffic. We also had 3 other days

that exceeded last year's record day of 4,021.

On top of all this, Roy feels we had the best spring skiing ever. These remarkable facts and figures indicate a lot of hard work and dedication from each one of the employees at Sierra Blanca. To mention a few of the many, L. B. Davis — Office Manager, Denny Grover — Mountain Manager, Rick Vincent — Ski School Director, Bob Vincent, Carla O'Neil, Jack Lavine, and Pat Morrison — Ski School Supervisors, John Okrasinski — Food Services, Riker Davis — Rental Shop Manager, Debra Clarke — Sport Shop Manager, Charlie Martin — General Maintenance, Red Farrus — Lifts and Equipment Repair, Leonard Kanesevich — Gondola Supervisor, Merle Scott — T-Bar Maintenance Supervisor, Ski School Instructors, Pro Patrol, National Patrol, restaurant employees, ladies behind the ticket windows, and a big thanks to all the lift operators.



unusual occurrence. But by now, those of us hearing him were worried, so Mother Nature, Stripper, and this reporter decided to go mobile in search of the accident, while Gray Rat, Grandpa Grump, and Eveready monitored for more transmissions.

The details they related coincided precisely with the information we had . . . with one notable exception . . . the men were positive that the victims had had no CB radio in their vehicle.

Til next week, the Band Aid's clear and standing by . . .

Strange thing happened, Saturday last . . . yours truly happened to hear a breaker say very clearly "I need a police officer; I've had an accident." So, like all good CBers, we answered with "This is a base station; give us your location and we'll landline for you. Do you need an ambulance?" No answer . . . nothing . . . tried again . . . still nothing. In a little while, the same voice was heard again, "I've had an accident on Three Rivers Ranch, five miles east of the trading post, near a river. I can't rouse my friend." This time, several local CBers in this immediate vicinity heard it, but try as we did, no one could get back to the breaker.

Phoning the report to our local police department, even though it was definitely out of their jurisdiction, was all we felt we could do at the time. They relayed the information to Alamogordo.

Almost an hour passed; then, suddenly, the voice was back, giving the same information. Considering the distance and terrain between our 10-20 and Three Rivers, we assumed the calls were reaching us through a "pipeline," a fairly





Cooking for one or two presents new challenges

Not all of the world is tailor-made for a couple in love. Take an ordinary example like eating. The new bride soon realizes that most recipes and food items were created with a family of four in mind.

Of course, singles and the elderly have long battled the problem of cooking for one or two. But the mound of leftovers are a surprise to the bride who was used to cooking for a house full of hungry brothers and sisters.

But according to Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food specialist at New Mexico State University, cooking for two has many advantages along with the drawbacks. "For example, since you are cooking small, you can afford an occasional splurge on out-of-season fruit that a family of six could never dare," Mrs. Johnson said.

Together with another real advantage to cooking for two. Why not make cooking a joint activity for you and your spouse? This is especially good if you both work and arrive home tired and hungry. "After all, it only seems fair that if you both work to 'bring home the bacon,' you can share in preparing it for the table," the specialist said.

A simple old-fashioned idea like a menu can help solve a lot of the problems associated with cooking for two. This will give you time to find or modify recipes, buy the ingredients and plan for leftovers.

Since breakfast and lunch are often small meals for newlyweds, the nutritional make-up of the evening meal is especially important. Check your day's menu against the Basic Four nutrition guide. This tells you how much of the four food groups — meats, milks, breads, and fruits and vegetables — you need to include each day in your diet.

"You need two or more servings of meats, fish, eggs, dried beans or peanut butter. The needed two or more cups of milk can come partly from cheese or ice cream," Mrs. Johnson said.

Try to eat four or more servings of vegetables and fruits. Plan on one dark green or yellow vegetable every other day and one citrus fruit each day. Finally you'll need four or more servings of breads and cereals.

But just blindly following the Basic Four won't do much good if the food is so unattractive that it's not eaten," the specialist said. "To make the meal a real success — think contrast. Contrast colors, textures, flavors, temperatures and food sizes."

Imagine trying to eat a meal of white fish with tartar sauce, mashed potatoes, cauliflower, white bread and milk — all served on your new white wedding china! Who cares that all groups of the Basic Four are included in this monochlor meal? Instead contrast the colors by substituting a bright vegetable, a tosed vegetable salad with tomatoes, whole wheat bread and chocolate pudding.

Accent hot foods with a cold side dish. Put something soft on the plate if the main dish is crunchy. Also vary the shape of the foods. If you're serving round hamburger patties on round buns with round tomatoes and pickles, add carrot sticks or maybe french fries instead of little potato balls.

Remember that desserts can be nutritious, too. Try a simple dish of fresh fruit or use milk as the basis for puddings, custards or malts," Mrs. Johnson said.

When it comes to actually cooking the food, some of your specialized wedding gifts can really come in handy. If you think your new toaster oven will only toast bread or heat TV dinners, you're wrong. It can

cook everything from the main course to the dessert and use only one-half of the electricity of a standard oven. It will also keep your kitchen cooler during the hot months ahead.

Use a double boiler to keep from scorching small amounts of soup, stew or vegetables. You can also quickly cook small amounts of vegetables by stir-frying in a skillet.

Divide cake batter into small loaf pans or make cupcakes. Freeze the extras. And remember that you can keep a batch of rich butter cookies for weeks in a tightly closed container in the refrigerator.

A large freezer section can really help small families. Use it to store meal sized portions of meats, ready-to-cook foods and heat-and-eat leftovers.

You can use your leftovers to make custom TV dinners. Cover the tray tightly with foil and freeze. The leftovers will seem like new if you haven't had the dish for a while. It's probably best to use these dinners within a month.

Eggs and cheese are great for small-sized entrees. Make a cheese omelet filled with leftover vegetables, or bits of cooked meat.

Now, dress up the plate of food. Although parsley is the universal trim, don't think it's the only way to add color. Use some celery leaves, pickle slices or green onions.

Finally, serve your meals with a flare. Cover the table with a colorful tablecloth or use place mats. Change the centerpieces from a bowl of fruit to a green plant to candles.



Sunland Park Hoofbeats

I WILL TOAST chalked up a half-length in a 400-yard bout Saturday to set the fastest qualifying time of 19.66½ seconds for the upcoming \$35,862 West Texas Derby. I Will Toast's earnings last year swelled over the \$26,000 mark and her credits include a fourth in the Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso. The Don Farris-trained filly was ridden by Jerry Nicodemus. The Farris-Nicodemus team is also behind Rocket Lights, the top qualifier for the West Texas Futurity.

SHE IS MY NATIVE, who scored a triumph in the Sun Country Futurity and bankrolled over \$93,000 as a two-year-old also charged to victory in her trial to set the second-fastest time of 19.68½. The other qualifiers: Feature Man (19.73), Magnum Load (19.75), Bug Agoing (19.79½), Miss Parr Thought (19.81), Pentimento (19.81½), Pleading Miss (19.81½), Jagajet (19.82½) and Sensational Lady (19.84).

JOCKEY DARRELL BLEVINS qualified the most horses for the Derby, bringing in Pentimento, She Is My Native and Feature Man for Trainer J. B. Montgomery.

LADY TRAINER MARILYN ARMUSSEN was back in action with Miss Parr Thought who also notched a spot in the finale.

TARLO took a length-victory in the \$27,441 West Texas Futurity First Consolation Saturday under the guidance of Jockey Darrell Blevins and set the fastest seasonal time for 330 yards in the process.

The J. B. Montgomery-trained colt cleared the distance in 16.80 seconds.

JOCKEY LOUIS GOMEZ was back in action Friday night for the first time since a rough spill in December when his mount fell, throwing him under the hooves of an oncoming horse. The accident sidelined him for several months. But the rider was back in top form over the weekend and lost no time finding the winner's circle. His first spin was aboard Grins Spirit who easily distanced a maiden field by 1¼ lengths for an \$8.80 return.

TRACK BENDER, the heavy favorite in Friday's allowance feature, overcame a very slow start to finish third. The filly, who was making only her second career start, stumbled coming out of the starting gate and trailed far behind the field down the backstretch. But she came on powerfully throughout the 5½ furlongs and was just over a length behind the winner at the wire.

EWELAS APRIL BUG, trained by Bill Holmes, was overlooked to the tune of 30-1 in the West Texas Futurity Second Consolation Friday night. But that didn't bother the filly as she fought her way to the lead in the 330-yard contest for a nose margin and the winner's share of \$2,444. Backers received a \$63.40 return.

NERVINO took his first win of the season in Saturday's featured 10th race for the longest margin of victory of the weekend. The four-year-old gelding, who's been battling the claiming ranks recently, stepped up to stiff allowance company and led from wire to wire to distance competitors by over eight lengths. Favored Barbilay finished fourth.

HARRY HENSON wrapped up his assignment as Sunland Park announcer this weekend. He leaves shortly for Hollywood Park, where he'll once again serve as announcer for the famed West Coast track. The Hollywood season begins April 12.

TURF CLUB FOOL, who finished first in the sixth race on Friday, March 24, was disqualified after a urine sample taken from the horse proved positive for the drug, Dipyrone, or its derivative. Trainer Phil Sanchez has been suspended, ruled off all tracks in New Mexico, and the case has been referred to the New Mexico State Racing Commission. Payment of purses in that March 24 race "is withheld pending further order of the New Mexico State Racing Commission."

IN OTHER STEWARDS' RULINGS: Owner-trainer Jimmy R. Jones was fined \$25 for being late to the paddock and Trainer Jim T. Jones received a \$50 fine for allowing unlicensed personnel to take a horse to the gate. Jockey Ramon Apodaca got a \$50 bite for misuse of the whip after the third race Friday, March 24.

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

SANTA FE — Joe Skeen, who has two unsuccessful statewide races behind him but who came very close to edging past Jerry Apodaca, is going all out this time.

The Republican gubernatorial hopeful says he is putting much of his effort into personal campaigning — literally trying to meet as many New Mexico voters as possible.

He is a good one-to-one campaigner and he knows he will have to demonstrate personal appeal in a state where the voter registration is more than two-to-one Democratic.

"You just have to appeal to all voters," said Skeen in an interview with "Inside the Capitol."

"You have to assume, whether they're Republican or Democratic, that they're very independent. They want to meet you in person. They want to sit down with you and get to know how genuine you are," he said.

He added: "That's why I spend so much time traveling."

Skeen says he started his present campaign over a year ago, and in some ways, in 1970, when he was Pete Domenici's lieutenant governor running mate against the Bruce King-Bob Mondragon ticket.

In 1974 Skeen headed the GOP ticket himself, almost topping Apodaca, who had 164,172 votes to his own 160,430. The American Independent Party picked up 4,062 votes, too, and if it hadn't been on the ballot Skeen might be governor today.

Regardless, he believes he has a good chance this year.

The big, jovial rancher from Lincoln County concedes there likely won't be big

differences on issues between him and either Bob Ferguson or Bruce King, the Democratic hopefuls.

But he says he sees some things "in executive management (of state government) that bother me."

State government, Skeen says, "has been far too remote from the business and industrial community." He believes "many business people avoid politics," and he would like to help bridge the gap.

He says the Department of Development (under reorganization, the Department of Commerce and Industry) needs to provide "much closer association (with businessmen) on a community basis."

Skeen says he also plans to stress the need for state government to get involved in New Mexico's energy and mineral development in a way that will lead to more materials being processed here, rather than being mined here and shipped elsewhere for processing.

"We're already extracting the minerals," he said, so New Mexico should also obtain the job and tax benefits from processing them.

The Republican believes the Democratic party is "split" between factions supporting King and Ferguson and that, in addition, within the bigger party "they have so many factions it's hard to keep them together."

He thinks the race between GOP Sen. Domenici and Atty. Gen. Toney Anaya will help Republicans in general.

"I think we'll be helped," he said. "We'll have the top-of-the-ticket strength that the Democrats have enjoyed for years."

Skeen added: "There are very few straight-line party voters any more. And the Republicans do a better job (than in the past) of putting up candidates."

LOSING OUR GRIP

It seems as though the first thing any governing body must consider before reaching a decision is, "How will this effect our federal funds?"

This would be comical if it weren't so tragic.

The local school boards are left with very few real decisions by the time they meet all of the requirements of federal and state laws. Our towns and cities are in nearly as sad shape. If it isn't the EPA it is the HEW or some other alphabetical foolishness, County and state governing bodies are practically in the same position. A few school districts have recently told the government that they will pay their own bills and make their own rules. They

have our respect and best wishes. Eventually we must all do this or we will lose all of our freedoms to the federal government.

Worse than that, congress is losing its ability to control the bureaucrats and, therefore, we are near to a form of dictatorship. We are not there yet, but if we do not wake up and act for ourselves it is only a matter of time.

The most recent sample we have seen came from a private business. This invasion of our privacy came in the form of a statement that we or anyone else who supplied them with goods or services must abide by the federal guidelines in our hiring policies or they could no longer do business with us. The government would use them to dictate to us, and they don't do a thousand dollars a year of business with us.

Hogwash, that is just a bureaucrat trying to bully the rest of us into taking their orders. There must be a stop put to this foolishness. — The Chandler Arizonan

SHELL GAME

The favorite game of Washington pols, hiding tax increases from the people who pay them, is once again in full swing on Capitol Hill. It seems that Congress didn't quite expect the outrage that occurred when Social Security taxes were raised so precipitously. The Carter "tax cut" which was supposed to ease this burden is fooling no one: polls show that people overwhelmingly doubt their taxes will decrease. Out senators and representatives are worried that the taxpayer's wrath may fall on their heads in the upcoming elections — in which case they would have to start worrying about their own retirements.

Our legislators have a serious problem. Without the additional funding, the Social Security system would quite simply go broke. Yet cutting benefits is considered political suicide. The problem, then, is familiar: Congress wants to spend money but doesn't want to raise taxes. The solution some liberals in Congress have come up with is the old standby: deficit spending.

They don't call it that, of course. They call it "general revenue financing." This means that money from the income tax and from the business taxes would go to Social Security, which would enable them to roll back payroll tax increases.

The problem is that there just aren't any unused general revenues lying around. As it is, these taxes don't begin to pay for existing programs, which is why we're running \$60 billion budget deficits.

So the general revenue proposal would increase the deficit and thus give us a hidden tax through inflation. The big advantage is political, not economic; someone must pay the additional amount. When payroll taxes increase, everyone knows that Congress is the culprit. But when inflation increases, people don't know whom to blame. So the great American shell game continues. — Deming Headlight

Bark has many uses

Last year, New Mexico sawmills produced over 90,000 tons of tree bark. Because it is now against the law to dump or burn bark, and because so few New Mexicans purchase it, disposing of the sawmill product was a major problem.

However, a researcher at New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station has some solutions. Those solutions are related in Research Bulletin 608, "Uses of Sawdust and Bark in New Mexico."

In the bulletin, James Gray, an agricultural economist, said "most New Mexicans don't use bark because they simply aren't aware of all its uses."

"Bark is so versatile it can be used for everything from mulches in gardens and orchards to covering tailings at mining operations," he said.

Because bark is biodegradable, it is one of the better composts for use in gardens, nurseries and orchards. "Bark used on soil surfaces helps control soil temperature, reduce soil moisture evaporation and reduce weed growth," Gray said.

Those are some of the bark's more obvious uses. Gray found that other states have come up with a wide variety of creative uses for bark.

For example, Gray found that other states use bark to cover school playgrounds.

"A layer of six to eight inches of bark makes a resilient floor covering," he said. "In wet weather, bark covers muddy areas, while in colder weather it covers slippery areas. As a side benefit, bark keeps school children cleaner and drier." Gray also found that other states use bark as a ground cover in national parks and recreation areas. "Bark is particularly good on walkways, hiking trails and bridal paths," he said.

Researchers in other states have found that bark may be used in particleboard. "Promising developments at the Oregon State University Forest Research Laboratory show that waxes and natural adhesives in bark cause it to bond together, making a strong particleboard," Gray said.

Because of its natural adhesiveness, bark can also be used to make molded flower pots, floorlites, coarse wrapping paper, fireplace logs and even spinnable fibers for use as textiles.

Proper ventilation necessity

"The majority of fires and explosions investigated by our inspectors occur in mobile housing," says Jess Taylor, chief of the Liquefied Petroleum Gas Bureau of the Commerce and Industry Department. "One of the main reasons for these accidents is a combination of gas leaks and poor ventilation. All mobile homes that have skirting around four sides must have cross-ventilation," he continues.

If a leak develops underneath a mobile home in the gas piping system, the liquefied petroleum gas, being heavier than air, will collect at the bottom of the trailer. If air movement is not available to dissipate the gas, a spark will often ignite it, causing a fire or explosion.

In addition, the new sealed combustion furnaces and water heaters cannot operate properly with unventilated skirting. Without combustion air, these appliances will burn too rich, and therefore, will burn longer. They will not have the proper B.T.U.

If the mobile unit is skirted, a 4 inch by 6 inch louver should be placed on each of the four sides for a single width home. If your home is already skirted, and you are not sure if it is properly ventilated, see your gas supplier or call the Liquefied Petroleum Gas Commission in Santa Fe at 827-2318. A free inspection will be scheduled at your request, and no fines will be levied.

If, however, inspectors make an official investigation during routine visits and discover improper ventilation, the mobile home owner will be fined and legally required to correct the situation. "Don't take a chance with gas leaks and poor ventilation. The combustion would cost you your home," says Taylor.

She added some students from past art classes still are coming into the classroom to complete projects of their own without credit.


One student, Stacey Pearson, is nearing completion of a large tile mosaic of the Braves' mascot, which she began in September.

"The student council is doing everything for our class," Mrs. Day said. "They will set up the displays and are working on publicity and organization."




ART STUDENT Angel Testerman checks to see if her clay is centered on the potter's wheel before attempting to throw a pot.

NM agency now enforces safe drinking water act

The New Mexico Environmental Improvement Agency has announced it took over primary enforcement of the federal Safe Drinking Water Act on April 1 with a federal grant of \$190,000. The money will be used for statewide water monitoring activities through the end of the federal fiscal year, October 31.

EIA has requested an additional \$400,000 federal grant for the following fiscal year's activities.

Prior to April 1, enforcement of the federal act in New Mexico was carried out by the federal Environmental Protection Agency.

"The act will be enforced locally by EIA regional and field environmentalists throughout the state," Francisco Garcia, manager of the EIA's water supply program, said.

"Although we're just now taking over responsibility for primary enforcement of the 1974 Safe Drinking Water Act, we've had a water supply program in New Mexico dating back to the 1930's," he added, "but the federal act gives us a lot more leverage for enforcement of drinking water standards."

According to the act, every water supply of 15 connections or more or serving at least 25 persons must submit at least one bacteriological sample a month to a certified laboratory.

Large systems, such as Albuquerque's, submit as many as 200 a month.

Water supply testing laboratories are certified by the state Scientific Laboratory, a sister agency of the EIA. The Scientific Laboratory, located in Albuquerque, also does the testing for publicly-owned systems, such as mutual domestic water consumer associations, an EIA spokesman said.

Under the act, if violations of federal or state water regulations are found in a sample, the utility must notify its water consumers through the news media and through the monthly billing, or direct mail. Steps must be taken to bring the utility into compliance with the regulations.

Under the reorganization, it will be the job of EIA's environmentalists to insure that utilities submit the samples, notify the public when there is a violation and correct inefficiencies in their system.

"The act really gives the consumer a strong arm," Garcia said. "If a utility is inadequate, anyone can bring it to court. They can sue us if we don't do something about it."

Before New Mexico could assume primacy, the state Environmental Improvement Board had to adopt regulations and standards for drinking water in line with those of the federal EPA, Garcia said.

Both the federal and state regulations set standards public water supplies must meet for biological contaminants, turbidity, radiation and inorganic and

organic chemicals. Some inorganics are arsenic, lead, mercury, nitrates and selenium. Organics include many pesticides.

Garcia said the state regulations set up a schedule for testing for these contaminants.

"The whole purpose of the federal act and federal and state regulations is to provide the people here with safe drinking water with little or no odor and a pleasing appearance," Garcia said.

"Under the law, the citizens have recourse if their water supplies don't comply with these regulations," he continued, "but there are also considerations for the utilities if for some good reason they can't comply with the regulations."

Taxpayers can extend their filing deadline

Taxpayers can receive an automatic 2-month extension of their tax return filing deadline by filing a Form 4868, the Internal Revenue Service said.

Form 4868, "Application for Automatic Extension of Time to File U. S. Individual Income Tax Return," is available at local IRS offices or can be obtained by filling out the handy order blank for free forms and publications found in the tax package.

When requesting an extension, the taxpayer must make two copies of the Form 4868, filing the original with the IRS on or before the due date of the tax return. On this original, the taxpayer must estimate his or her tax bill for the year and enclose full payment for the tax liability.

When the taxpayer later files the actual tax return, the duplicate of Form 4868 must be attached and the amount of tax previously paid entered on the appropriate line of Form 1040. Taxpayers receiving an extension cannot use the short Form 1040A or have the IRS compute their tax bill.

If a taxpayer underestimated the tax bill on Form 4868, he or she must pay interest on the unpaid amount. In addition, if the unpaid amount is over 10 percent of the total tax bill, the IRS will levy additional penalties on the taxpayer.

He explained that the Safe Drinking Water Act provides for variances or exemptions from provisions of the act if no unreasonable risk to health will result. These variances or exemptions would be granted for economic or technological reasons, he said.

While variances can last forever, they must be reviewed every three years. Exemptions carry a specific time limit and prescribe a formal schedule for alleviating problems at the water supply.

"Usually, economic problems can eventually be worked out," Garcia said. "Funds for water supplies are provided through federal loan guarantees and through grants under the state Water Supply Construction Act," Garcia said.

U. S. citizens outside the U. S. or Puerto Rico on the date of their tax deadline can receive an automatic 2-month extension of the filing deadline without filing Form 4868, the IRS said. This provision applies to both taxpayers whose deadline is April 15 and taxpayers who file returns on a fiscal year basis. Taxpayers who qualify for this extension must attach a statement to their tax return when they file stating that they were outside the U. S. or Puerto Rico on the date of their filing deadline.

Deadline extensions past the 2-month extension date are granted only under unusual circumstances, according to the IRS. Taxpayers can apply for a further extension by letter or by filling out Form 2688, "Application for Extension of Time to File U. S. Individual Income Tax Return." The applicant must include the reasons why the additional extension is necessary.

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Game and Fish keeps fish records

SANTA FE, N. M. — Catch a big fish? Want to be sure your friends believe you several years from now, even though the fish itself may be long gone?

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, to keep records of exceptional catches and to recognize the anglers who caught them, is continuing its Big Fish Award program this season, passing out certificates to those whose fish meet the minimum requirements.

According to R. L. Brashears, chief of the department's Fisheries Division, any fish legally taken from New Mexico waters may qualify. The fish do not have to exceed established records, but must meet minimum length requirements.

Minimum lengths for eligibility are, for largemouth bass, 20 inches; smallmouth bass, 14; crappie, 14; bluegill, 9; walleye, 26; channel catfish, 24; flathead catfish, 36; white bass, 15; northern pike, 38; yellow (or ring) perch, 12; rainbow trout, 20; brown trout, 20; cutthroat trout, 15; and brook trout, 14 inches.

To register a fish, Brashears said, have it weighed (preferably on a grocery of similarly accurate scale), measured by length and girth, and have a witness attest to the figures. Forward the figures, along with information on the name and address of the angler, bait or lure used, and the date and place the fish was caught, to the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish in Santa Fe. Send a photograph as well, if one is available.

Forms for recording the information and applying for the certificate are available from most marina operators, license

vendors near most fishing waters, and from all Game and Fish Department offices.

The certificates make a nice addition to a mounted trophy, a picture of the angler and fish — and a big fish story.
