

Service Club Council begins Spring drive

The Service Club Council discussed plans for the Spring Cleanup Drive scheduled for the last two weeks in April at their Thursday luncheon-meeting.

"We've requested the Village of Ruidoso and the Village of Ruidoso Downs to proclaim the last two weeks in April for the clean up drive and we need each of the club representatives here to go back to your organizations and really push the drive," president Barbara Duff said.

For the first time, the organization will have Emma Redmann of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce take calls on especially bad areas of town.

"Callers can anonymously report bad

areas and we'll try to do something," a council representative said.

Also planned by the council are five free dump days April 21-23 and 28-29, pickup by the Salvation Army and trucks and drivers donated by individuals and the villages to pick up refuse.

Ed Hyman of KRRR radio invited the council to attend a meeting at 7:30 p.m. Thursday at the library to discuss possibilities of continuing Mule-O-Rama races.

"With the present situation, it's highly improbable we will have mule races this fall unless we take action.

"The problems are many and varied but

we could continue the project," Hyman said.

"Hopefully it could be continued as a Chamber of Commerce sponsored activity, which could conceivably support the chamber."

In other business, the council:

— Heard a report from Duff on the fire prevention committee which will meet at 4 p.m. April 21 in the offices of Smokey Bear Ranger District.

— Agreed to continue pushing for installation of traffic control lights on Suddeth Drive before racing season begins.

Airport Commissioners talk proposed budget

A tentative budget was discussed Thursday at the monthly meeting of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport commission.

The proposed budget, which will be funded by contributions of \$500 each from the Capitán, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs village councils, the Mesalero Apache tribal council and the Lincoln County Commission, was simply "a rough estimate," commissioner George Shoemaker said.

The budget called for \$1,650 to be used to send two commissioners for two days on two business trips to Las Cruces, Roswell, Santa Fe, Albuquerque and Washington D. C. \$600 for rental including a file, office space and a part-time stenographer and \$100 for stationery including stamps, phone expenses and publication of legal notices.

Commissioner Richard Hall said the "anticipated trips are probably correct, but the (total expense) remains to be seen."

The commission requested county manager Les Olsen summarize, justify

and rewrite the budget proposal before it is submitted to the five governing bodies.

In other business, Hall read a draft of a letter to be sent to two senators and two representatives stating the efforts of the commission and requesting advice and support."

The commissioners also:

— Heard a report from Hall that a letter of application for conveyance of title on the acreage for the airport was hand delivered to tribal chairman Wendell Chino on March 9 and mailed to the Federal Aviation Administration on March 16.

Hall reported Chino "didn't have much comment" and the FAA had responded with a letter of acknowledgement stating they had forwarded the application to their regional offices in Fort Worth, Texas.

— Discussed investigating sources of funding for the airport.

"Once we clear the budget we should begin thinking about financial support. It may be a long time before we can submit the proposal but we should begin to round up applicable sources of money," Hall said.

NMSU official recalls Hondo Flood of 1965

EDITORS NOTE: June 16, 1965 is a day that many residents of the Hondo Valley will not forget. On that day six inches of rain falling in a five-hour period brought a 20-foot wall of water crashing down on the area leaving 25 families homeless, and destroying many residential and commercial buildings.

Reports from that time indicate that not many structures located on the 35-mile stretch of the Ruidoso and Hondo River from Ruidoso to Riverside escaped unscathed. Damage to the area was placed at \$12.5 million.

Fifty-two bridges ranging from culverts to concrete and steel spans were washed away in the flood along with countless miles of fencing, livestock, fruit trees and prime farm land.

Some residents reported five-foot depths of water in their homes.

One resident of the Hondo Valley recalled that day in detail saying she remembered the rain began falling at about 4 p.m. She said it was the most terrifying thing she had seen and would never forget it.

Relief came from several areas including the state police, National Guard, Job Corps and many other state federal and local agencies.

Bill Williamson, Director of Campus Activities, New Mexico State University, was involved in aftermath cleanup projects. His recent trip through the Hondo Valley brought back memories of that disastrous day and he sent his recollections and reflections to The News.

cases lost. Families who lived in the area for years were at a loss as to how they would start over again, or if it was even worth it to even try.

I was a counselor at the Mountainair Job Corps Center in Mountainair, New Mexico when we got the call that flood relief work was needed. Several other staff, myself, and a crew of about 70 young men left for the valley not really knowing what to expect, but then it was just the fact that help was asked for and we responded.

The Hondo Valley looked like something out of a war movie. Parts of trees and houses were all over the place, roads went no place at all sort of dropping off, there was a smell of death and destruction all over, pieces of tin hung in trees and phone lines and poles stood at odd angles or were broken in half.

There was an Episcopal Chapel (St. Anne) at Glencoe that was filled with mud, and I think that we spent three days just digging the mud out of the chapel to find the pews. I felt close to the chapel as I am

Robbers escape with jewelry, cash

Two white males robbed Ruidoso Fine Jewelry of a reported \$15,000 in diamonds and jewelry and \$18 in cash at about 5 p.m. Thursday, a spokesman for the Ruidoso Police Department said Friday.

The pair reportedly robbed co-owner of the store Lewis Serna at knife-point, tied his hands behind him and shut him in the store's restroom.

Serna escaped to a neighboring establishment where he was untied and the police were contacted.

Although road blocks were set up and a search of Ruidoso made by the patrol division, criminal investigations division and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, the two were not found.

Investigation by the police department is continuing.

Three arrested, pot seized

Over 800 pounds of marijuana were confiscated and three men arrested in a bust staged at 2:15 a.m. Friday in an Alto area motel, a spokesman for the New Mexico State Police said Friday.

Jerry Campbell, 32, Alto, Gary Higman, 27, and Freddie Brown, 43, both of Artesia, were arrested Friday and charged with intent to distribute a controlled substance, marijuana, over 100 pounds, and conspiracy, following a "two-month undercover investigation by federal and state narcotics agents," Jesse Franco, state police narcotics division, Roswell, said.

Officer Jerry Privetts, Artesia Police Department narcotics officer, said three officers of the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) and four state police officers arrived in Artesia Wednesday with \$35,000 to purchase 500 pounds of marijuana.

The transaction was set up to take place in Carlsbad on Thursday, but then moved to Artesia, where final instructions were given for the exchange to be made in Ruidoso, he said.

At the arrest the original 500 pounds, an additional 343 pounds of marijuana, two vehicles, two firearms and electronic equipment were confiscated.

Confined to the Ruidoso jail, the three arrested had a first appearance hearing Friday before Magistrate Jim Wheeler, who set bond for each at \$10,000 with no percent allowed.

The three will next have a preliminary hearing on a grand jury indictment and face penalties of two to 10 years and/or \$5,000 for possession with intent to distribute over 100 pounds of marijuana, and one to five years and/or \$5,000 fine for conspiracy.

One of the vehicles confiscated was

registered to Tri-Air, Incorporated, operator of the Artesia airport, and the other registered to Odell Brown.

Tri-Air, Inc., is owned by Artesia airport manager Jerry Cady who is under indictment and scheduled to face trial April 17 on a charge of conspiracy to distribute marijuana in Taos County.

According to Privetts, Higman is the shop foreman for Tri-Air, although not on the payroll. Brown was known to do odd jobs for Tri-Air.

Campbell's occupation was unknown.

The bust, which covered three cities (Carlsbad, Artesia and Ruidoso), two counties (Eddy and Lincoln) and two judicial districts, was through a joint effort of DEA, state police, the Ruidoso Police Department of Criminal Investigations Division and the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department.

Area Realtors set classes

Through the Realtors Association of New Mexico, the Ruidoso Board of Realtors will offer a four-day, 30-hour course at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, Harvey Foster, Sierra Development Corporation, said.

The real estate information course, which begins Tuesday and concludes Friday, gives credit toward salesmen or brokers' licenses.

"Primarily, it is for Realtors' renewal licenses and for those who want to get into real estate," Foster said.

"The state of New Mexico has intensified the educational requirements of salesmen and brokers, which is a very fine idea, and most people take (this type of) course to qualify for their licenses."

"In order to renew existing licenses, brokers and salesmen must have a certain number of hours before 1980. For new salesmen, they must have 60 hours and for new brokers, 180 hours. For existing brokers, they must have 45 hours and I'm not sure of the figure for existing salesmen."

Foster added, "The major reason (for the educational requirement) is basically an attempt to upgrade the image of Realtors, and most importantly, to educate them to properly work for their clients."

If the course planned this week is successful, the Board of Realtors will give two other courses sometime within the year.

A schedule of the four-day course includes:

— Tuesday, introduction of the course, license law, professional standards, listing and sales goals and purchasing and listing techniques.

— Wednesday, purchasing and listing

techniques, market analysis appraisal and market analysis.

— Thursday, contract of sale, guaranteed sales, preparations for closing and the mechanics of closing.

Friday, mechanics of closing, residential financing, prequalifying the buyer, ownership advantages and the institute exam.

Alcohol named defect cause

Naming alcohol as the third leading cause of mental retardation, a noted genetics counselor said Thursday the use of most illicit drugs can not be tied to birth defects.

Associate professor of pediatrics at the University of New Mexico School of Medicine, Dr. Jon Aase, addressed his remarks to a group of Mesalero and Ruidoso educators and health professionals during his talk on birth defects and gene mutation at the White Mountain Elementary School.

"There are reasons enough not to use these things (drugs)," Aase said, "but birth defects is not one of them."

Among the drugs he listed were marijuana, heroin, LSD and amphetamines.

Aase said marijuana had been tested "into the ground" with no evidence found that it might cause birth defects. He said extensive research had been performed on LSD with nothing found to indicate that its use might result in birth defects.

Aase indicated that research on these and other drugs was continuing.

Fetal alcohol syndrome, or retardation caused by the excessive use of alcohol had been discovered only as late as June, 1973, Aase said.

He added that the syndrome had four features.

"It all depends on Mom," Aase said, "Dad has nothing to do with it."

"It takes quite a bit of alcohol (consumption) during pregnancy," Aase said adding that three instances of the syndrome he had investigated showed that the mothers of the "slow" children had imbibed as much as one quart of vodka a day in one case, a gallon of wine a day in another and a case of beer a day in the third case during pregnancy.

He said the third fact is that the fetal alcohol syndrome is the third leading cause of mental retardation.

"A fourth feature is that it is entirely preventable," Aase said.

Smoking, camping restrictions in effect

Smoking and camping restrictions went into effect Saturday in the Ruidoso/Lincoln County area, Larry Bandy, New Mexico Division of Forestry, announced.

"We're going into Level 2 smoking and camping restrictions, with exceptions of a) smoking permitted in vehicles equipped with ashtrays, on paved or surfaced roads

or in designated areas, and b) campfires permitted in developed campgrounds and designated areas," he said.

The restrictions were put into effect because of the present "hot dry, windy conditions where the probability of fire danger is high."

Bandy said the decision was made "through an interagency fire prevention working group (composed of) the state

Division of Forestry, United States Forest Service, National Park Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Bureau of Land Management.

"One of the agencies felt the conditions warranted restriction, contacted the other agencies and the decision made."

The area restricted is "basically the southeastern part of the state, from High-

way 54 to Carrizozo, Highway 14 to Interstate 40 to Santa Rosa and then south on Highway 84 to the state line. Restrictions are in effect within that area, which is about a fourth of the state."

Bandy added another section in the southwestern part of the state also is under fire and smoking restriction.

"This area is from Interstate 10 from the Texas state line, north to Hatch, southwest

on Highway 26 to Deming, west on Interstate 10 to Lordsburg and from Lordsburg to the Arizona state line on Highway 70.

The restriction will be in effect until further notice, Bandy said.

"The restrictions are based on prevailing conditions. We might get a little shower, but a little shower doesn't

usually do any good for whole area. If the entire area gets moisture, then they might be lifted."

FIRE SEASON, which is rapidly approaching in the Ruidoso area, already has hit in other parts of the country, as the Hot Shot crew of Smokey Bear Ranger District has been called to assist in fighting a fire in Texas, Ray Page, district ranger, said Friday.

The appearance was shortlived however as Frank Connella eyed a distant ridge.

"I think they'll do better over there," he said. Heads turned with his gaze and just like that the kids were off with little attention paid to the reporter's request for rest.

So up again and off again a few of us stragglers headed toward the ridge with me several score yards behind the slowest second grader.

As the remainder of the group filtered into the new area, Frank kicked the ground testing for moisture content and muttered something about they'll do fine here; the planting activities commenced. The reporter sat down, sucked on a pebble in an attempt to unpatch a Death-Valley throat and vowed not to move.

Fatigue gave way to smugness when it was learned that teacher aids Joy and Cheryl Kanesevah had opted for the cool freshness of a pine grove a quarter of the way up the slope. They apparently tired easily (maybe they knew better).

But that smugness ended quickly when Marge Connella came walking into the area. Perspiration did not break her brow. In fact she looked like she could have gone another five miles. And that is no small feat. She and Frank will be having a baby in about three months.

Scout drive sets \$500k goal

The Conquistador Council Executive Board of the Boy Scouts of America announced this week plans for a development campaign for funds to improve scouting in the Southeast New Mexico area.

In making the announcement, Scout Executive Eugene Vaughan said the council hopes to raise \$500,000 during the three year campaign. He said donations for the cause are tax deductible.

Vaughan said funds from the campaign would be used to upgrade two existing scouting facilities and for construction of an aquatic camp near Carlsbad.

He said the proposed aquatic camp would be able to handle 75 scouts a week. Facilities will include docks, bad weather housing and boat storage areas to be built on the south end of the Carlsbad reservoir on the Pecos River.

Funds from the campaign will also go for the replacement of two old buildings at Camp Wehinaphay near Sacramento, Vaughan said. He added that the shop and activities building, and the administration building are over 50 years old and are in need of repair or replacement. The new structures will include bad weather housing, a reception center and a first aid area.

Camp Wehinaphay will also see the addition of three troop shower areas, Vaughan said.

The council office in Roswell will be remodeled if the campaign is successful, Vaughan said. He added that the council office project will include construction of a self-service center for literature and training material.

Vaughan said this will be the first capital improvement fund drive the Conquistador Council has been involved in for 20 years.

The fund drive will go into high gear in the Ruidoso area next September, Vaughan said, with concentration currently centered in Roswell, Carlsbad, Clovis, Artesia and Hobbs.

Campaign leadership includes Thomas Denton, chairman, and Robert O. Anderson, honorary chairman.

The campaign cabinet includes Mavnard Shearer, Joe Rose, Bill Armstrong, Harold Deshurley, Richard Newcomb, William Tucker, Bob Brown, Robert Lydick, S. P. Yates, Vaughan, Lloyd Calhoun and Jimmie Johns.

The Conquistador Council serves Chaves, Curry, DeBaca, Eddy, Lea, Lincoln and Roosevelt counties in New Mexico.

Principal, and I worked extra hard on this project. We got the chapel as much back to normal as possible and it did look like a chapel once more.

As I drove through the area, all of this came back to me. I am sure that I was going slower than most of the traffic as I was looking for anything that would make me think of 1965. Then I saw St. Anne's Chapel and the Texaco station next to it. I had to stop. I went in and prayed and then looked at the interior for a long time. I was able to make out a faint water mark several feet off the floor. I saw the church charter and there was also a faint water mark on it as well. I could almost swear that this was in the same frame that I found it in the mud so many years ago, and worked on so hard to get clean. I left a note in the chapel at the altar rail for the priest in charge.

I went into the store next door, connected to the Texaco station, and there was a lady who waited on me. I asked her how long she had owned the store, she replied that it would be about 30 or more years. She said that she remembered me from the flood, and I guess she should as I was in and out of the store several times. She had a nice smile; one that years of work had not seemed to dim.

I left there and continued to drive to Roswell. While driving, I saw names that for some reason made me think of the disaster: the Coe Ranch, the Rose Ranch, Casa Linda, Junction 395, and the steel bridge. We had to cross the bridge to get to a family that had been cut off by the flood in the town of Tinnie. I looked at mounds of dirt in the fields which at this time were well cared for, and I wondered if there were cattle buried under the mounds; we did a lot of that. Now I was able to see cattle, horses, and sheep grazing in the fields without a care in the world, but in 1965 the fields were broken with gullies and all sorts of tin, trees, poles, parts of houses, and dead cattle. It probably took many years of hard work to get it back to normal. This was my drive back into time, and as I said, I am sure that the many cars that travel that road are not even aware of what happened in 1965 in the Hondo Valley. I was aware, and if and when I drive this area again, I will always drive just a little slower than other traffic, as I feel that some of my life is in the Hondo Valley of New Mexico.

If a mother is severely alcoholic during pregnancy, her chances of having a child with growth and mental problems is probably in the range of 30 to 50 percent, Aase said. If the mother can be convinced to stop drinking during pregnancy, the condition can be averted, he added.

Aase's remarks followed an hour program in which he outlined various birth defects and their link with mutated genes.

According to the UNM School of Medicine, a variety of tests are used to try and find out what causes most infants to be born normal and others to arrive in this world with multiple defects.

"Doctors throughout New Mexico are becoming more skilled in their diagnosis of birth defects," Dr. Aase said. "We are seeing more children each year, but they have more complex problems. The doctors around the state are asking for chromosome kits to be sent out, and are handling more of the basic problems themselves."

High School drafting students build model

Three drafting students at Ruidoso High School are receiving practical training in construction, not as actual work crews, but through building a scale model of a home.

Taught by Thurman Sanchez, the three students, Debbie Jo Almager, Weldon Dennis and Eddie Rutledge first designed a house as part of Drafting I.

Now, as Drafting II students, they are making a model of their design on a scale of one foot to one inch.

"All the material they're using in the model is cut to scale just as it would be bought from a lumber store," Sanchez said.

The 77 inch by 45 inch model encloses a three bedroom home with a dining room, den and two-car garage as extras.

Miniature 2 x 8's are being used for the wall framing and for the inside walls and the class will make trusses for the roof using 2 x 6's.

"All the procedures used by construction crews are being used in the construction of the model," Sanchez said.

A sophomore, Eddie Rutledge said, the course "makes you learn a lot more than just drawing a house."


Weldon Dennis, junior, said, "It's a good class. I'm taking it because I enjoy it; I haven't decided what to study yet."

Mention turkey to most people and their first thoughts are of a dinner platter covered with a delicious smelling, golden-brown bird stuffed with their favorite dressing. However, mention turkey to a spring turkey hunter and watch his eyes become a glow and a smile cross his lips as he recalls all of his painstaking efforts to outsmart the arrogant "gobbler."

Every year about this time the spring turkey hunter's household is chaotic. Especially as the quietness of home-sweet-home is shattered by a "turk-turk-turk," or any of a variety of outrageous noises coming from the latest thing in turkey calls.

The caller beams with pride at the sounds being uttered from the little box while totally ignoring the sounds of life-taking threats from the other members of the household.

Camouflaged clothing has been washed and the shotgun has been cleaned and thoroughly inspected. It is turkey huntin' time again.

Spring turkey season in New Mexico this year is April 15-23. Turkey hunting is open statewide except for those units identified as 1, 2, 3, 4, 19, 20, 27, 30, and 35 on the hunting proclamation map.

All hunters, regardless of age, must have a hunting license. Persons under 18 years of age must have successfully completed a hunter training course as well.

Spring turkey licenses are available at license vendors and need not be applied for in advance. No license other than the special season turkey license is required, nor is valid, for the spring turkey hunt.

The spring turkey bag limit is one turkey with a beard that extends at least 2 inches beyond the feathers of the breast.

Shotguns fired from the shoulder are the only legal guns for the spring hunt. Bows with which the user can cast a hunting arrow at least 160 yards on level ground are also legal for turkey hunting. Arrows must have broadheads with sharpened, steel cutting edges.

Hunters bagging a turkey must not remove its head, feet, beard, and a small patch of feathers surrounding the beard. These parts must remain on the bird until it is delivered to the place where it will be

eaten or placed in cold storage.
Records of wild turkey sightings in New Mexico date all the way back to 1540 when Coronado and his explorers reported seeing these birds near what is now Taos. Early colonists to America have recorded their surprise at finding great numbers of wild turkeys, which were of greater size and browner coloration than their own European domestic varieties.

Without a doubt, the wild turkey was held in high esteem in colonial times, and its importance as a food has made it the symbol of our national holiday, Thanksgiving.

Benjamin Franklin thought the turkey so noble a bird, he proposed it as our national bird instead of the bald eagle.

The mid-1800's found the turkeys victims of relentless exploitation, habitat elimination, and diseases introduced by domestic poultry. Turkey populations decreased drastically across the United States, and as little as forty years ago, the turkey was considered an endangered species.

In New Mexico, the last of the original stock of turkeys disappeared from the extreme southeastern New Mexico range about 1907. General elimination in New Mexico occurred between 1905 and 1915.

A great deal of concern for the turkey led to combined efforts of concerned agencies and individuals in the 1940's to restore turkey populations.

Where possible, range improvements were made, and trapping and transporting of wild turkeys to unoccupied areas were underway. Turkeys responded favorably to the management practices and were soon on the increase.

By 1952, the United States turkey population reached 95,000 and today number more than 1 1/4 million birds in 43 states. Some of which had never been occupied by turkey.

Presently in New Mexico, the Merriam's turkey, our most abundant species, occupies all of its ancestral range that is still suitable for this bird.

New Mexico also has Rio Grande and Mexican species of turkeys, of which the latter occurs only in sparse numbers in the extreme southwestern corner of the state.

New Mexico's turkey population has somewhat stabilized since 1950 between 25,000 and 30,000 birds.

The First Swallow Arrives From Mexico

Spring was a bit slow in starting, but once it arrived it lost no time in putting on its wondrous display.

Although the apricot came out late, the rest of the fruit blossom clan are following closely.

This is being sent to you on April Four and already the peach with its pink and the early pear with its great cascades of foamy white blooms make a spring picture all up and down the vales of San Patricio and Glencoe. The early plum with its pure white came out just following the apricot. These pink and white fruit trees in full bloom can be seen across plainly from a distance because they are standing in small groups or all by themselves spaced out up and down and across the winding valleys, among the new green of the willow trees, and the golden green of the cottonwood buds, and the emerald of the alfalfa fields.

The crystal white of the cherry bloom with a shining brilliance all its own is just beginning to show. The sweet cherry, that is. The little pie cherry has been out for a few days.

These earlier blooms, as we say, are all up and down the valleys standing in small groups and by themselves, because some of them, like the giant pear trees, are landmarks from many years ago. And some, like the early-blooming peach plum and apricot have come up by themselves along the way. And some represent old-time varieties, still very good when they are lucky enough to escape the early frosts.

As a general rule, there is a little interval of time between the blooming of

these early ones. Yet this time they are blooming pretty much all together. This makes for a striking Spring time picture, that changes very quickly from day to day.

The main blossom display is in the apple orchards and the bartlett pear. The bartlett pear blooms late along with the apple and is recognized by its tall stately form, pointed at the top.

The apple is rounded, spreading tree; and in the orchards that are in their prime, one tree touches another — so that when the trees burst into bloom, there is a pink and white blossom glory covering several acres.

When you round a bend in the valley and this apple orchard in bloom burst forth upon your sight, it seems the whole world is in bloom. And the fragrance is something that awakens joyful memories, striking a chord of happiness in all of us. The apple blossom has greeted us with its

message of the new life of Spring since ages past. And every spring the apple blossom is something straight from Heaven.

I am getting a little ahead of the blossom parade. I do not mean that the apple blossoms have come out yet in the main sections of the valley, although they are probably out in Tularosa.

Although they are not yet out here in the mountain apple country, the apple blooms are showing their bright red buds amidst the apple-green leaves. When the flowers bloom out the under-side of the petals retain some of the red, so that the blooms and the whole tree is touched with pink.

By the time this reaches you the first of the apples will be blooming in the main sections of the valleys.

Although they will be a little late this year, still you are never sure about a late heavy frost.

However, there is an encouraging sign, and this brings us back to what I started to say.

The Swallow Scout

Early this morning, April four, I heard a familiar little bird song. Out on the telephone wire was the first swallow of the year, the little scout from Mexico, arrived here to see if the weather is right for the rest of the band to make the trip.

He was around most of the day, and now it is evening, and he is gone — surely to bring the news to the rest of the swallow colony.

Now, in a day or so you can look for the first pair, and then the whole band that will

spend the summer here, around the place. The arrival of the swallows is generally a sign that the hard freezes are over. And all over the world the arrival of the swallows is a welcome message of Spring. I was certainly glad to see, the little swallow scout and he was happy to be back. You could tell by the joyful note in his song.

Have The Snow Birds Flown North

The robins are singing in the large apricot tree with the blue birds; and the finch and the song sparrow are sending their melodies of Spring. And new bird notes are joining in joyful harmonies.

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Cancer screening clinic

The first of weekly cancer screening clinics will be offered by Southwest Health Care Corporation from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m. April 20 at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

"A group of nurses with specialized training in cancer screening will do tests for a small fee," administrator of the hospital Ken Moore said Friday.

"For women the tests will be pap smears, breast examinations and instructions for self examination; and for men there will be prostate testing, but the clinic will not be limited to these tests. They do a fairly complete exam ... looking for signs of cancer."

Moore said the group also will refer individuals to local doctors if needed.

"If cancer can be caught early enough, lives, and a great deal of money can be saved. I hope people take advantage of it."

The clinic is open to all age groups, but "will be aimed at the over 40 years of age group initially. A lot of women in that group never have had a pap smear."

"We want to encourage preventive medicine."

The Southwest Health Care Corporation, which is a subcontractor with the New Mexico Community Based Cancer Control Program of Presbyterian and Saint Joseph's hospitals in Albuquerque, also will provide public education programs and psychosocial rehabilitation services to the community.



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News from the County Agent

"When do I spray my apple trees?" This is the question I get asked often these days. For codling moth or worm control, you need to spray about a week after petal fall. Some of the chemicals you can use are diazinon, guthion or zolone. If you want to thin the apples on the tree use carbaryl (Sevin) in the first cover spray. I have found this desirable in Golden Delicious and Jonathan but that it over thins several other varieties.

For powdery mildew use benlate, karathane or wettable sulfur. Spraying fruit trees requires that you

know the pest you are going to control and are using the proper insecticide. For more information inquire at the Lincoln County Extension Office in the Courthouse in Carrizozo.

Livestock on irrigated pastures can be poisoned by the grass they eat on a cold morning at this time of year. The cattle and sheep relish the new green growth on the grass. When the grass grows rapidly in the warm days and then it becomes cold that night, it traps some nitrite in the ends of the grass leaves. The nitrite is poisonous to livestock. Once the grass warms up in the morning the excess nitrite is taken into the rest of the plant and it is no longer poisonous. Some people say that it is the dew on the grass. Under cold conditions the dew does indicate the grass may be temporarily poisonous. Keeping the livestock out while the dew is on the grass will allow the nitrite to go out of the leaves and accomplish the same results. The best thing to do is to take the livestock off the pasture when a cold night is predicted especially after a warm day at this time of year.

Yours and Ours

SANTA FE — Not even his closest staff members knew U. S. Rep. Harold Runnels was planning to check into a New York hospital for expert analysis of a spot on one of his lungs.

They didn't know, his top aide told us, because Runnels has made it a practice to get away from the press of congressional business for a few days each year to relax.

And the only way that can be done, Runnels has found, is to get away privately and check into his office by telephone.

This report came from Larry Morgan, a veteran congressional staffer who heads Runnels' Washington office as his administrative assistant.

"He checked in like normal," said Morgan, "and he didn't say a word about it (the lung problem)."

Morgan said he knew the congressman "was going in for a physical," but that Runnels had not mentioned the need for possible exploratory surgery on the lung.

"His private life is very personal," Morgan said.

Morgan added that an earlier announcement did not come because Runnels, the only Democrat in the four-man New Mexico congressional delegation, had definite plans to be out of the hospital to return to Albuquerque for a speech before the state Democratic convention.

"He was still convinced he was going to make it," Morgan said. He said Runnels remained "absolutely convinced" until two days before the convention, when the New York doctors ruled out an airplane flight because any problems with a pressurized plane cabin might damage his lungs.

Meanwhile, it appears the exploratory lung surgery won't have any effect on the enviable re-election status of Runnels. In a New Mexico "first," the eight-year

veteran Democrat drew no opponents in either the party primary or from the Republicans for the general election. Barring a write-in effort of unlikely proportions, Runnels appears a sure thing for a fifth two-year term in Washington.

Runnels' initial years in politics were spent as a state senator from Lovington in Lea County.

He became a power in the Legislature as chairman of the Senate Finance Committee and the Legislative Finance Committee.

New Mexico was one of the last states in the union to be districted for its two U. S. House seats.

And in 1968, Republicans made their first inroads into the previously all-Democratic Washington delegation. Tom Morris, a Democrat who had served 10 years, was defeated by Manuel Lujan in the northern district.

Runnels took on the southern district Democrat, E. S. Johnny Walker, in the primary that year. He didn't make it, but Walker was then defeated by Republican Ed Forman in the general election. Two years later, Runnels was back again, running successfully against Forman.

Now the only Democratic congressman from a Democratic state, serving in a Democratic Congress during Democratic administrations in Santa Fe and Washington, Runnels occupies an important political position.

So far, his seniority has resulted in one subcommittee chairmanship — that of a special investigating subcommittee of the House Interior Committee. But his panel's duties are limited to jobs assigned by the full committee, such as oversight of the Alaskan pipeline's troubles.

If re-elected, Runnels stands to become chairman of a standing subcommittee — either Public Lands, Water and Power, or Mines and Mining.

KEEP DOOR CLOSED

The three years of scheduled federal loans to New York City will end June 30. By then the government will have lent \$2.3 billion in all. Seasonal financing is what this was originally called — based on the idea that the city had only a temporary cash flow problem.

This winter, New York City officials have been banging on the U. S. Treasury door once more, asking for federal guarantees of long-term bonds it would like to sell. This exposes the seasonal financing scheme as pure pretense; New York has had much more than a cash flow problem all along.

The immediate problem is the need for credit, which gross mismanagement has

feared. The city is simply not credit-worthy. The budget deficit is at least \$1 billion, and even larger budget deficits are in the offing. New York's budget remains in this perpetually red condition because city politicians simply refuse to make hard political decisions, like being tough about unreasonable wage demands, and paring down the number of municipal hospitals, which exceeds that in any other city.

These root causes are plain to see, yet the Carter administration proposes that American taxpayers guarantee some \$2 billion in New York bonds. And who does Washington suggest as the lucky purchasers of these bonds? The city's employees, that's who, through their pension funds. But the employees aren't fools; already, they've announced they're not buying.

The very idea of the federal government's guaranteeing city bonds is a silly subterfuge to have Washington bail out a bankrupt municipality. Treasury Secretary Michael Blumenthal, the architect of the administration's proposal, might as well propose an outright grant of \$2 billion to the city.

Meanwhile, New York City officials have been engaging in a little sly blackmail — warning the nation that, if the city is permitted to go under, it will drag down some important U. S. financial institutions in a national chain reaction of disastrous proportions.

In reality, it is the other way around. The way to hard times for the nation is through a federal bail-out of New York City. This will open a door that cannot be closed. Other cities will get the message. They will cease to worry about the consequences of mismanagement. They can assume they, too, can go begging in Washington.

The Carter administration should close the Treasury door to New York; too much has been done already and this has made that city more dependent instead of less so. —Deming Headlight
