Heights septic tank solution possible

A possible solution to sewage/septic tank problems plaguing Ponderosa Heights/Brady Canyon residents surfaced at Tuesday's meeting of the Ruidoso trustees.

Mark Finley, Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) county supervisor for Lincoln/Otero, told the trustees: "FmHA loan money and grant funds may be available to the village, with the interest on the loan at five percent and terms extending over 40 years."

FmHA funding, Finley said, "is available on the basis of 50 percent loan, 50 percent grant, with the possibility of grant monies, from other governmental sources including Four Corners," putting the final figure at "one-third loan and two-thirds grant money" as optimum financing.

Village purchasing agent Frank Potter said 56 homes in Ponderosa Heights are in the problem area, with the sewage problem being acute in 16 of them. Of the total, six homes have been financed through FmHA.

Ed Hazel, local contractor, said, "The drain fields are causing the problem" and that, in Brady Canyon, infringement on "village property would be necessary" to

rectify the existing situation.

Finley, in noting that FmHA considers Ruidoso "a rural community" concerning the village's status for funding, said there were three solutions to the sewage/septic tank problem:

"1. Construct sewer lines to connect with the existing lines, possibly creating an overload problem;

"2. Leave the situation as is, which creates a health hazard, or

"3. Pump the septic tanks and haul the material to the presently overloaded treatment plant."

Preapplication forms were given village manager Jim Hine by Finley, who said, "It will take nine months to a year to process the application and begin construction."

Finley said that the village would "put in the lines" with the "individual property owners responsible for the hookup" with "FmHA loans possible" to aid the home owners. "Depending on usage by part time residents from 20 to 50 homes have sewage problems in Ponderosa Heights."

The trustees directed Hine to "proceed with any steps necessary" to facilitate FmHA loan/grant funding to solve the sewage problem.

As an interim measure, Potter said that Ernest Burgess "will pump the septic tanks at a charge of \$25 per pumping."

Under this plan the village would add the charge to the customer's monthly billing.

Village attorney Ron Harris said, "The village can do it, if the water users agree."

Finley said to The News Wednesday, "FmHA grant monies are exhausted until October 1, but we do have loan funds available now. I believe, once the preapplication is filed, that we can obtain grant funds from various sources, including Four Corners, and it might be possible to get the construction underway sooner than anticipated."

THE TRUSTEES APPROVED Ordinance 70-4, granting rate increases to Cablevision of Lincoln County, raising the monthly service for the first outlet from \$7.50 to \$8.50, monthly service for each additional outlet from \$1.25 to \$1.50, installation of first outlet from \$15 to \$20, each additional outlet after initial installation from \$5 to \$10 and relocation of outlet from one part of the house to another from \$5 to \$10.

TED BENNETT REQUESTED the trustees to reopen Border Street between

Bennett's Shur-Sav and the Blue Spruce Motel, charging: "The street has never been legally closed as far as we can find out." He also charged that "11 cabins are built on the 15-foot street" and asked that they "be moved and the street opened."

Village attorney Ron Harris was instructed by the trustees to investigate Bennett's charges and the situation regarding Border Street and report his findings at the April 25 trustees meeting.

In other business the trustees:

- Awarded the bid for 200 water meters to H. G. Reiter, Albuquerque, at the unit price of \$32.25 for a \$6,450 total.

- Authorized the Emergency Services Section (ambulances) to construct a file and record section from village materials now stored in the old Boy Scout Room at no cost to the village.

- Took no action on bids received for additional police vehicles, pending completion of the budget for fiscal 1978-1979.

- Postponed, until May 9, action on an ordinance concerning annexation of Welch's property adjacent to the Municipal Airport.

- Took no action on a request for an-

nexation via assessment of B. J. Watkins Subdivision, pending receipt of a petition requesting the annexation signed by a majority of the property owners in the subdivision.

Were advised by Potter that temporary roof repairs could be made at the Ruidoso Public Library, pending budgeting for permanent repairs in the new budget.

- Approved a request for valves, pressure reducing station, pipe and high pressure lines totaling \$40,000 to be installed at pumping stations in the present water system. Financing will be from the Water Bond Construction Fund.

- Approved abandonment of Kingswood Unit 2 plat, that the area may be developed.

- Authorized employing a person as Planning and Zoning secretary, to type building permits issued, file plats and serve as secretary to the Architectural Plans Review Commission.

- Approved Resolution 78-5, to comply with the state's open meeting law.

- Authorized the call for bids, by airport manager Tim Morris, for a new 100 octane pumper truck and to distributors to

provide the truck and service.

- Moved to consider ordinances on the possession of marijuana and imposing a penalty section in the village's criminal code at the May 9 meeting.

- Ordered that all future applications for water meters be in conformance with existing zoning regulations and that all village offices concerned coordinate their activities in this regard.

- Authorized enforcement of existing ordinances regarding use of the village tennis courts and on the use of skateboards.

Mayors supporting cleanup drive

Proclamations supporting the Service Club Council's Spring Cleanup Drive were issued this week by Ruidoso mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., and Ruidoso Downs mayor Norman D. Wheeler.

The mayors urged the "wholehearted cooperation" of the residents of both villages to remove all trash, debris, garbage and rubbish from the streets, alleys and lots during the height of the drive April 21-23 and 28-29, when free dumping privileges are offered at the Ruidoso Sanitary Landfill.

"In addition to a general cleanup of residential and commercial areas," Service Club Council chairman Barbara Duff said, "we're really pushing for the removal of old business signs and unsightly areas that are being used for dumping by some area residents."

"For the first time in these cleanup drives, we're asking those who know where these dumping sites are located to call Emma Redmann at the Chamber of Commerce office, 257-7395, to give her the exact location. It is not necessary for you

to give your name. "We'll have volunteer crews make every effort to remove these unsightly areas during the five days of our drive."

Duff said that there is a need for donated trucks and volunteer drivers during the pickup and that these services may be offered by calling Redmann to register.

"On behalf of the Service Club Council," Duff said, "I'm urging all residents and our student bodies to join the drive to make our two villages clean and attractive for our summer visitors."

Coach fired; students stage walkout

Some 90 students of the White Mountain Middle School yesterday walked out of classes to protest what they called the firing of their favorite coach.

It was learned at Tuesday's meeting of the Ruidoso school board that the contract for Tom Culbertson, middle school physical education instructor and coach, would not be renewed for the coming term.

The students marched around the school chanting school cheers and "we want our coach." Several members of the school

band were in attendance, instruments in hand, playing "charge" from time to time.

School principal Sid Miller confronted the group and advised them to return to class. He told them that he realized that they had something to say, but they were going about it in the wrong way.

The students shouted Miller down. He shrugged his shoulders and withdrew to his office.

Minutes later Culbertson appeared in the principal's office. He and Miller met for a few minutes and Culbertson left to talk to the students.

He was greeted by cheers and whistles from the students at the front of the school.

"I appreciate the support," Culbertson said, "but maybe you all aren't doing the right thing. I want you all to go back to class. I know you're fighting for what you believe in, but this is the wrong way to go about it."

Referring to Tuesday's school board meeting in which Culbertson met with members of the board in an executive session Culbertson said, "I went through all the proper channels last night. That's what you have to do — all you are doing is

closing their ears.

"If you really want change you have to sit down, you have to listen to what they have to say; now come on why don't you all go back to class."

One young man shouted, "If coach wants us to go back to class, let's go back to class, come on let's go back to class."

The group responded with cheers of, "All right."

Several of Culbertson's supporters approached him with hugs and tears. One girl said, "You're the best coach we have ever had." She threw her arms around the

coach. He was visibly affected by the display of affection by both the girl and other students who pounded him on the back and sought to hug him.

Several students submitted a school petition to Cheryl Elder, school secretary, asking for the contract renewal for their coach.

Following the demonstration, Miller and Superintendent of Schools Pat Valliant met with members of the local media in the teacher's lounge at the school.

"They're concerned over the release of a teacher," Miller said, "They feel very

strongly. I think that's good."

Miller fielded a question of why was Culbertson fired by saying, "Obviously there is an answer. I don't know if it's for publication. Mr. Valliant you'll have to help me with this."

"One charge of an administrator is to get together the best staff he can get for the school system within the school," Valliant said. "I think it's Sid's opinion, correct me if I'm wrong Sid, that he can find someone better in this field."

Miller agreed saying, "I do not think he

Downs' tax funds in limbo

Depending on the decision of the State's attorney general, the Village of Ruidoso Downs may not receive a portion of an occupation tax paid by racing concessionaires as provided by Senate Bill 14 passed during this year's session of the state legislature.

The bill allows for the distribution of half of a \$300 per racing day tax to a municipality located within a 10 mile radius of a race track. The money could amount to more than \$10,000 for Ruidoso Downs.

The matter was brought up at Monday night's meeting of the Downs trustees.

A letter from state Director of Department Finance and Administration Albert Romero to Attorney General Toney Anaya outlines problems of distribution created because the bill was passed without an emergency clause. In the absence of the emergency clause the bill won't become effective, under state law, until 90 days after the end of the legislative session, which would be about June 1.

"Recent telephone conversations with

members of your staff indicate that distribution of these fees to municipalities after the effective date of the Act is not possible," the letter read, "apparently the reasoning is based on the application time requirements as provided in Section 60-6-4 sub paragraph A."

The section which Romero referred to states that the fees must be paid the State Racing Commission 60 days before the first day of racing.

Ruidoso Downs Mayor Norman Wheeler said that apparently the problem arose because the money was paid to the Racing Commission before the act becomes effective.

Under previous law, the occupation tax, once paid to the commission is then redistributed half to the county in which the enclosure is located and half to the state's general fund.

Romero said that his agency was of the opinion, and the sponsor of the bill, Senator John Conway, was of the opinion, that the municipalities were entitled to their share regardless of when the fees are collected.

Romero concluded by asking for an Attorney General's opinion on the matter.

In other routine business the trustees approved accounts payable for the village with one exception, a bill for \$82.50 for the cost of a new battery for a police car.

Wheeler said he didn't think any battery was worth that much unless it was plated with gold.

Police Chief Lynn Martin said he would check into the matter. He then told the trustees that his department was in need of a new patrol car. He added that the car could be ordered under a state police contract at a substantial savings to the village.

Wheeler told Martin that he sympathized with the need but the village just couldn't tell if it could purchase the vehicle until after the new fiscal year budget was firm.

"I can't see how we can go ahead and order it if we don't know if we can pay for it," Wheeler said.

"This is a totally dedicated effort to educate every man, woman and child in the realities of the drug problem," Elliott said.


"In an effort to help curb the drug tragedy in the county, we are compiling and will distribute free to the public this summer, an informative educational publication, 24-pages, 8 1/2 by 11 inches, in full color."

The booklet will contain articles on the harms, hazards and detection of drugs, accompanied by color illustrations of various drugs and paraphernalia employed in their use.

The booklet is entitled: "The Community Drug Scene. What Every Teenager and Parent Should Know."

Financing for the free publication, Elliott said, "will be sought by seeking sponsors. The program will be expensive, but, we feel, it will be a very good investment in humanity."

Sheriff's officers plan to distribute the booklets to all churches and schools in Lincoln County as well as making them available to every citizen.

Old Mill robber sentenced

Judge Tom Sandenaw Tuesday sentenced Rudy Aldaz, 28, to a 10 to 50 year term in the State Penitentiary, Santa Fe, in connection with the April 9, 1977, armed robbery of the Old Mill on Sudderth Drive.

Aldaz, a March 21, 1977, escapee from the Los Lunas Honor Farm of the New Mexico Department of Corrections, pled guilty to the charge just moments before the selection of the jury was to begin in Carrizozo's District Court.

The investigation of the robbery was conducted by officers of the Criminal Investigation Division (CID) of the Ruidoso Police Department, who issued the arrest warrants and filed the charges.

CID officers identified two suspects on the fifth day following the robbery and the arrest warrants, issued by Magistrate Jim Wheeler, Division III, charging armed

robbery, carried \$20,000 bonds on each man.

The pair, using a sawed off .30-30 rifle, escaped following the robbery with \$500 in cash and about \$7,000 in turquoise jewelry, after binding Carmon Phillips, Old Mill owner, with a rope.

The other man charged, Cedric Aldaz Jr., 31, formerly of White Tail on the Mescalero Apache Reservation, is still at large.

Acting under a search warrant filed by the CID, officers recovered merchandise and other items taken in the Old Mill robbery from the Cedric Aldaz residence at White Tail.

Rudy Aldaz was arrested last May 9 in Albuquerque, after a quantity of the merchandise, valued at \$20,000 following a transaction in Georgia, was recovered and identified by Phillips through CID action.

School's Title I budget approved

The Ruidoso Board of Education Tuesday night approved a budget of \$45,273 for the school system's Title I educational programs.

The budget was approved as a routine matter following a brief explanation of the purpose of Title I programs and the use of the money by Superintendent of Schools Pat Valliant.

Valliant told the board that the funds would be used to subsidize the system's two reading programs for children of economically deprived families. He added the money would pay the salaries of two instructors at the White Mountain Elementary and Middle Schools. Additionally the funds will go for supplies and expenses incurred by the Title I program.

Two other budget matters faced board members at the meeting. They included a budget increase of \$2,401 for instructional equipment for the White Mountain Middle School's Title IV, part B, program, and three budget transfers.

Three-hundred-forty-four dollars will come from the instructional travel budget for the librarian's salary. Valliant said the money was to make up for additional time worked by the schools' librarian. The guidance persons' salaries budget will be increased by \$500. This money will also come out of the instructional travel fund. Fifteen dollars was transferred from the instructional aid fund for substitute sick leave.


In other business the school board:

- Voted to transfer Leon Farrar's bus contract to Rick Simpson. Farrar is retiring from the bus business after 22 years of shuttling Ruidoso's students to and from school.
- Voted to award Simpson an additional contract for a new 66 passenger bus. Earl Allison said he was interested in the contract. Following some discussion Lamar Osbourn moved to grant the contract to Simpson saying Simpson had three buses in operation and the national trend is toward granting contracts to bus operators with several buses. The motion was unanimously passed. Valliant told Allison that there were no hard feelings. Allison replied that there were no hard feelings what so ever.
- Accepted the resignations of Dawn Cobb, kindergarten teacher, and Frank Silva, high school science teacher.
- Went into an executive session and decided which non-tenured certified and non-certified teachers and personnel would be rehired for the coming term.
- Voted to approve Darrel Stierwalt as high school head football coach for the coming year.
- Called for bids for the purchase of athletic and physical education equipment.
- Heard a presentation by insurance agent Joe Caron, Alamogordo, concerning his company's offer of tax sheltered annuities for school employees.
- Approved Lela Baca as a substitute bus driver.
- Scheduled the school system's budget hearing for April 24 at 2 p.m. at the high school library.

In other action the trustees:

- Accepted the state's new motor vehicle code for use within the village.
- Entered into a Joint Powers Agreement with Lincoln County regarding the use of the county's voting machines.
- Appointed the Planning and Zoning Commission.
- Issued occupational licenses to Whitfield Truck Lines, Ruidoso Flower Shop and Mitchell Motels.
- Heard Wheeler issue a mayor's proclamation declaring the weekends of April 22 and 29 as village cleanup week.
- Appointed and swore in Max Oliver, Harley Parnell, Sandra Currens, Mrs. Art Bradley and Bob Pior to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

is the best person for the job." He added that he did not have anyone else in mind for the position.

Culbertson recently came under some administrative disfavor by mounting a non-school board sanctioned fund drive in order to fund a track and field program for local students and others interested in AAU competition.

Asked if the fund drive had anything to do with the school system's decision not to rehire Culbertson, Miller said, "No, we'd been thinking about it before that came up."

Culbertson described the board's decision as a difference in philosophy.

According to Valliant the money raised by Culbertson and his track team will probably be returned to the donors with suggestions that they might give the money, earmarked for the track program, to the school's Booster Club.

Miller had said earlier that the walk out was staged before the resumption of morning classes.

Mershon defends 1978 legislature

State Representative John Mershon, Democrat-Otero and Lincoln, Tuesday defended the 1978 legislature against what he called claims by "amateur reporters" that it was a "do nothing legislature."

Addressing the South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development Area meeting, Mershon said "if anything the 1978 session involved a do too much legislature."

He added that media insistence upon covering the feed bill amounted to reporters "looking at the hole instead of the donut."

Citing statistics accounting for legislative consideration of 565 bills during the 1978 session Mershon told the service

organization that this year's legislature broke the previous record for introductions of bills in a legislative short session.

"The previous record for the number of introductions in a short session was held by the 1976 legislature with a total of 269 bills," Mershon said.

The primary purpose of the thirty day (short) session in the even numbered years is to consider budgets, appropriations and revenue bills," he said. "The constitution also permits the governor to submit special messages to the legislature for the introduction of bills

in this type of session."

Mershon said that only about 10 percent of the bills introduced pertained to budgets, appropriations of revenues; the remainder (506) covered about every known subject customarily found in the long odd-year session.

"The governor sent 125 special messages to the legislature covering the introduction of 236 bills," Mershon said. "This was almost as many bills as were introduced in the entire 1976 regular session, when only 45 special messages were sent by the governor."

"One-hundred-three of these bills related to the governor's program of reorganizing the state government and all but a few of these were to correct conflicts between previous reorganization bills and other substantive legislation passed in 1977."

He said that of these a total of 221 bills and two joint resolutions were passed by the legislature.

"Do you think that sounds like a do nothing legislature?" Mershon asked. "The newspapers, because they have to sell newspapers, zeroed in on that little old

feed bill."

Following Mershon's talk South Central Mountain RCD members reflected officers for the coming year, including R. E. "Bud" Bagley, chairman; Clem Weindorf, vice chairman; Delbert Nelson, secretary, and Johnson Stearns, treasurer. With the exception of Nelson, all officers are incumbents. Nelson has served as secretary in the past.

A Wednesday night meeting of mule race enthusiasts, called to attempt to solve the question: "What can we do to continue mule racing?" in Ruidoso, produced no positive action, though another meeting was scheduled for April 26, with the place to be announced.

Bill Ward, president of the Lincoln County Mule-O-Rama, a limited partnership operation, expressed no interest in preferred proposals to operate Mule-O-Rama, varying from naming a board to run the venture to incorporating Mule-O-Rama as a Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce project.

In acknowledging that some \$10,000 in 1979 futurity payments had been spent, Ward said, "I'll get the futurity money some way and put it back in the kitty."

Ward also said, "I'll have to talk it over," with his partners in Mule-O-Rama, on the suggestion that Mule-O-Rama, as presently organized, be dissolved. He indicated that Mule-O-Rama representatives would attend the April 26 meeting with, perhaps, some proposals to solve Mule-O-Rama's current financial and credibility problems.

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
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

Water Conference set

LAS CRUCES — Larry Morgan, principal administrative aide to Congressman Harold Runnels, will sit on the panel of policy makers who will hear the results of workshop deliberations at this year's New Mexico Water Conference. The conference will be held at New Mexico State University April 27-28.

Runnels, unable to attend the conference because of surgery to find the cause of a lung spot, asked Morgan to substitute for him on the panel. "The Water Conference traditionally provides important information to law makers and policy officials, but this year's change in format, with five topics being covered, makes it especially vital for us to hear what the people of New Mexico are saying about water," Runnels said.

State Representative Von Rue Crawford, Deming, will also be on the panel, along with State Senator Aubrey Dunn, Alamogordo. Dunn chairs the powerful Senate Appropriations Committee, and Crawford, with seats on key state house of representatives committees, has been a leader in beneficial water legislation for the state.

The director of the Office of Water Research and Technology, Gary D. Dobb, and State Engineer Steve Reynolds will round out the panel of policy officials, with locally prominent newsman Jack Coats serving as moderator.

The policy panel will hear reports on workshops covering water related subjects of primary interest for the entire state. Workshop topics, and the assigned leaders for the discussions, are:

- Water and Agriculture: Dan L. S. Pope, NMSU College of Agriculture.
- Saline Water Revisited: Frank DiLuzio, Los Alamos Scientific Lab.
- Energy and Water: William "Bill" Lorang, El Paso Natural Gas Company.
- National Water Policy: Jesse Gilmer, Rio Grande Compact Commission.
- Water Rights: D. E. Gray, Water Rights Division of State Engineer's Office.

"The workshop format gives all the people attending the conference — not only scientists, engineers and public officials — but the everyday user of water, a better chance to be heard and to learn from what others are saying. The discussion groups are smaller, and everyone has a better chance to give a real input into the conference results," Dr. Thomas G. Bahr, new director of the New Mexico Water Resources Research Institute, said.

An informal social hour will be held Thursday at 6 p.m., at the Mission Inn. This will give conferees a better opportunity to meet each other and discuss matters in a more informal setting than the general sessions.

As is customary, the 23rd Annual New Mexico Water Conference will meet at the Carbine Auditorium in Anderson Hall (Physical Science Laboratory) on the NMSU campus. The first session begins at

9 a.m. Thursday, April 27. The conference ends at noon the following day.

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
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Sunland Park honoring area fans April 22

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

Payne announces judge candidacy

Bill G. Payne, attorney and magistrate, has formally announced his candidacy for district judge, division II, 12th judicial district. The incumbent is Thomas Sandenaw, Alamogordo.

Payne, a Democrat, received both his BA in political science and his law degree from the University of Missouri. He moved to Alamogordo shortly after graduation from law school and after passing the Missouri bar.

He passed the New Mexico bar in August 1964 and was admitted to practice in all state courts in January 1965.

Payne was assistant district attorney for Lincoln and Otero counties from July 1966 to March 1968 and for Lincoln county from April 1968 to June 1970. He has served one two-year term as municipal judge in Carrizozo and is senior partner in the Payne and Mitchell law firm, with offices in Carrizozo and Ruidoso.

Currently, he is serving as city attorney for the Town of Carrizozo and the Village of Capitlan. He has served on a voluntary basis as Children's Court Referee for the past five years.

Past president of the Carrizozo Rotary Club, Payne has served as mayor of Carrizozo.

He and his wife, Mary Ellen, who is Lincoln County Extension Home Economist and an assistant professor at New Mexico State University, have three children, Mona, 16, Phillip, 15, and Stephen, 13.



Several new and innovative ideas in gardening were given at the home grounds gardening clinic recently. To help tomatoes grow faster in the area, you can fill an old intertube with water and plant the tomato plant in the center. This increases the heat available to the plant.

Mulches will help the plants grow faster and help reduce the weed problem. You can use black plastic, old newspapers or even carpet as a mulch. The mulch at the same time helps to reduce the water needs.

Planting vegetables on a ridge will help reduce the salt injury to the plants as well as reduce some diseases.

Other ideas for gardening in a small space were given at the clinics, including putting tomatoes or vines on a trellis,

keeping the garden well fertilized to produce much more and using about 3 pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. For home use in the area I like a 16-20-0 fertilizer. You would use about 18 pounds of this fertilizer to apply the 3 pounds of actual nitrogen.

The incentive price for the 1977 wool marketing year was announced today by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The average farm wool price for 1977 was 72 cents per pound. The incentive payment will be 37.5 percent of the net wool sales in 1977. This means that for every \$100 the grower received he will get \$37.50 incentive payment. Payment on unshorn lambs will be \$1.08 per hundred weight.

There will be several wool sales in the Roswell-Artesia area this week. Prices for the wool is expected to be about the same as last year with the range from 70 to 90 cents per pound. In Wyoming-Montana area wool is selling for 83 to 88 cents per pound.

I noticed some more fall contracts for cattle — indicating a strong market. Some 800 pound Hereford and Black Baldface steers sold for 51 cents per pound with an October delivery date. Some 500 pound steer calves contracted at 54½ cents per pound for fall delivery.

More apples are going into the processing market and are expected to continue this increase. This was the report given by Ray Weiner at the New Mexico Apple Council meeting in Albuquerque April 8. He estimated that if present consumption continues it will use up all the processed apples by the time harvest starts. Processing apples will sell better this fall than they sold last fall. Any processed apple has to be free of worms and insects but it can have hail damage or other defects that would hurt fresh sales.

Several growers are using helicopters to spray their orchards as they can get it done more rapidly and at less total cost.

Other speakers at the New Mexico Apple Council meeting were: Robert E. Ferguson, Governor Coordinator; Bob Bishop, New Mexico Resource Conservationist; L. C. Hageman and Bruce Hertzler.

Fruit trees throughout the state are blooming at the same time. It normally occurs over a four to six week period. Indications now are that it will occur in about two weeks. Full bloom for apples is expected to be this weekend — around April 15. Cool weather will delay the bloom and warm weather will speed it up.

The New Mexico Apple Council decided to have its next meeting June 17 at Hondo.

1978'S POLITICAL WIND

This year's political wind seems conservative. In Munich, for the first time in thirty years, the CSU has taken over from the SPD. In England the Conservatives have won six straight by elections. In France in mid-March the Communist-Socialist coalition was surprised with a lesser vote than the ruling conservative received. Etc.

In this country Governor Jerry Brown seems well along in an effort to bid for the Democratic Party nomination (over President Carter) in 1980. Though this is a long-shot effort (incumbent presidents enjoy an enormous built-in advantage), it's significant the effort is being made. Meanwhile, former President Jerry

Ford is talking more like a candidate; and there's considerable developing support for a 1980 GOP ticket composed of George Bush and Edward Brooke, of Texas and Massachusetts — the strategy being that it would utilize Bush's Texas appeal to southerners and Brooke's appeal to all blacks, as the first black nominee of a national ticket, to negate Carter's appeal.

Governor Ronald Reagan, Illinois Governor Jim Thompson (who is also proposed as head of a ticket with Brooke) and others are apparently available for the GOP nomination — which looks increasingly more attractive. At this date, of course, President Carter enjoys good odds. He heads the largest party, and chief executives in office enjoy enormous advantages at conventions (for his party to nominate someone else is an admission of failure). They also enjoy a major advantage in a national election campaign because of greater media exposure.

But, at the least, prospects now indicate a lively political year in 1980. — Santa Rosa News

THE SYSTEM WORKS!

Yesterday Chem-Nuclear withdrew its application to operate a low-level nuclear waste disposal site in Colfax County, and the people of the county scored a victory. A victory in two senses. We succeeded in protecting our cherished environment, and our faith in the viability of the "American System" was reaffirmed.

We think the second accomplishment was particularly significant. In a time when the public hears so much about how government is working against the people, the citizens of Colfax County have just experienced a refreshing contradiction to that claim. By banding together and working step by step, citizens succeeded in organizing opposition, vocalizing it, and foremostly, influencing political leaders to come down to the grassroots level and pick up the pulse of the people. How can this process be described, except by democracy in action?

After such a battle has been won, special recognition is usually issued, and we will not deviate from that practice. Of course, appreciation goes out to the county chambers of commerce and public entities who were adamant in their opposition to the location of nuclear waste in the county. But we feel hearty thanks should be offered to John Davidson and Moratorium, Inc. who attacked the problem in the only way we felt appropriate—intelligently and methodically. The person who deserves the credit for keeping the issue in front of the public and maintaining the tide of opposition is Jack Briggs. He fought hard for a cause that was not always popular.

At this time Ken Flaig, Chem-Nuclear's Cimarron representative, should also be recognized. Often confronted with difficult situations, Mr. Flaig behaved in a gentlemanlike and professional manner. His belief in the virtues and the future of nuclear energy is sincere, as demonstrated by his constant encouragement of county residents to visit him to learn the details of his business. Colfax County was indeed fortunate to have Ken Flaig as its connection with the nuclear industry.

Jack Briggs, himself, once said that he liked Flaig very much and only wished Flaig was in another business — a sentiment echoed by just about everybody in the county. The smell of our success is sweet, indeed, but we must add that there is a whiff of sorrow at the loss of a good friend. — Raton Daily Range

SANTA FE — Both the June primary election and the November general election are yet to come, but early indications are that there won't be major power shifts in the New Mexico Legislature come January.

This assessment is based on a survey of candidate lists resulting from last week's filing deadline.

Up for election this year, as in every even-numbered year for the two-year terms, are all 70 members of the State House of Representatives. Eight of the 42 state senators also are up for re-election.

One reason to make a tentative conclusion that the elections won't cause big shakeups in either chamber is that a significant number of incumbents are unopposed in either the primary or general elections — thus assuring their return to Santa Fe for the 1979 lawmaking session.

Of the eight senators, two drew no opponents. They are Democrat Harry McAdams of Hobbs and Republican Jack Morgan of Farmington. Both are conservatives and members of the important Senate Finance Committee.

The most noteworthy Senate race is the primary contest between Sen. I. M. "Ike" Smalley of Deming and fellow Democrat A. D. "Sonny" Brownfield Jr.

The portly, white-haired, cigar-smoking Smalley has more Senate service than any of his colleagues, having first been elected in 1956 — and the political influence corresponding to that seniority.

But Brownfield, a well-known and popular rancher, may give the veteran lawyer and chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee a strong challenge on June 6.

Also of note in the Senate races is that Sen. Eddie Barbo, an Albuquerque Democrat first elected in 1970, has five

party opponents in the primary. It's the most crowded race in either house and either party.

Of the 70 House districts, 22 will see no contest in either the primary or general elections. This includes 15 Democrats and seven Republicans. Twenty-one are presently serving in the House.

The exception is a Republican, George Ralph Bannister, who will now be going to Santa Fe because his opponent, three-term Rep. John Hays, D-Curry, says he let the filing deadline slip by — forgetting to file until it was too late.

The Senate bases its operation primarily on seniority. And powerful leaders like Aubrey Dunn, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee from Alamogordo, and Democratic Floor Leader C. B. Trujillo of Taos are not up for re-election this year. So the major shifts of power possible in the House are virtually impossible in the Senate this year, regardless of whether Smalley, the President Pro Tem, is back.

But in the House, the majority party gets together in a pre-session caucus to decide whom to elect as its top leader, the speaker of the House. So a shift of a few votes can mean a wholesale realignment of power in the 70-member House.

Now, Speaker Walter Martinez of Grants presides over a loose-knit coalition of Democratic backers coming mainly from Albuquerque and northern New Mexico.

Several of his backers, Democrats like Fred Luna of Los Lunas, Bobby Garcia of Albuquerque and Tom Foy of Silver City, will be back for sure. On the other hand, Martinez foes in his own party like Otero Countians John Mershon and George Fettinger, also drew free rides.

Be looking for the relative handful of closely contested races for a tipoff as to the seriousness of a January challenge to the Martinez leadership.

New Mexico's politics, due to the tendency of voters to cross party lines in general elections, tend to keep career politicians straining to stay attuned to the public pulse. For example, Democrats for state office are off and running, with some of them mostly running down the 1978 Democratic convention platform, which shouldn't be conducive to building party solidarity. —CD

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

ACK BOLD continued an impressive winning streak in Saturday's eighth race by scoring his fourth straight victory in a hair-splitting photo finish. After leading throughout the mile route, the colt saved enough octane to fight off a final strong challenge by Clank for a nose margin. Earlier in the season, he nabbed two allowance triumphs and took home the winner's share of \$2,655 from the Las Cruces Handicap.

FELIX TURNER, former rider, official and jockey agent at Sunland Park, notched his first win as a trainer in Saturday's fifth race with Sacked. The favored (8-5) three-year-old gelding, sired by Kentucky Derby-winner Forward Pass, was making the first start of his career. He easily took command of the 5 1/2-furlong sprint to win by over four lengths.

ERNEST SCOUT, guided by Richard Rickel, stretched out to 4 1/2 furlongs for the second start of his career in Friday's seventh race and defeated fellow two-year-olds by a three-length margin. The son of Scout Leader also won the first two-furlong contest of the spring season.

APPRENTICE CHRIS O'DELL took a rough tumble in Saturday's fifth race when his mount, Blazing Penny, stumbled and fell after clipping heels with another horse in the final yards of the 5 1/2-furlong bout. The young jockey was taken to Providence Memorial Hospital for overnight observation, but suffered no serious injuries.

BOB DUDICH'S familiar voice was in evidence over the weekend as he assumed the announcer's chores. Bob regularly calls the races at Sunland during the spring in addition to his usual duties as New Mexico field representative for the Daily Racing Form. He also announces throughout the Ruidoso Downs meeting and calls the All-American Futurity on the national telecast.

MAJESTIC BLADE, a product of strong bloodlines, breezed to a four-length advantage in her first four-furlong contest Saturday. The filly's sire, Blade, already has two Riley Allison Futurity winners among his offspring; Bloody Blade, last year's victor, and Admiral's Blade who took the title in 1975.

THE SUMMIT looked like an up-and-coming star in Saturday's second race as he took his first 330-yard dash and won brilliantly by over four lengths. But the colt didn't take the fans by surprise. He's owned by his breeder, Walter Merrick of Savre, Oklahoma, and trained by J. B. Montgomery. Both are top names in southwest quarter horse racing. The Summit's sire is Easy Jet, winner of the All-American Futurity in 1969.

THE FIRST BIG Q combination baffled the majority of patrons Friday night and one lucky ticketholder walked away with the whole pot of \$8,467.20. Miss Wendy Dee (No. 8), the favorite, coursed to an easy victory in the first race, followed by Amber Quillo (No. 9), another likely candidate. But Dixie Cause (No. 10), a 27-1 longshot, and Hilltop's Native (No. 3) at 11-1, nabbed the top spots in the second half. The win payoff on Dixie Cause was \$55.80.

CHRISSEY SISSY took control of a mile route on Saturday's last race and maintained a five-length lead throughout. The filly, directed by apprentice Don Howard, got off at near 5-1 odds for an \$11.60 return.

SPECIAL VISITORS over the weekend included Bruce King, governor of New Mexico from 1971 through '75. King is once again funning for governor. He was accompanied at the races by Drew Cloud, a former chairman of the State Racing Commission.

STEWARDS' RULINGS: Owner-trainer Ronald Burton took a \$100 bite for entering a horse not on the grounds at time of entry. Apprentice jockey Phil Urioste has been suspended pending an appearance before the Board of Stewards.

Window decals legal in autos

Ruben Miera, secretary of the New Mexico Transportation Department reminds motorists that use of the controversial decorative decals, sunscreens or window classics became legal April 1, as long as the vehicle is equipped with outside rear-view mirrors.

"Recently there have been a lot of questions about the legality of the rear-window sunscreens," Miera said. "The 1978 legislature approved legislation which does allow the sunscreens on rear windshields or the rear side windows as long as the vehicle has outside side mirrors on both sides."

Miera said the provision for the outside mirrors was added at the request of law enforcement officials around the state, so they would be able to see the interior of a vehicle as they approach it, and to give the driver a clearer vision of the area behind him.

Decorative decals, sunscreens or window classics are still prohibited on the front windshield or the front side windows. Screens around the state had to be removed from vehicles late last year when an advisory letter from the Attorney General's office indicated that the sunscreens were in violation of a law which

required a clear view from the exterior of a vehicle to the interior of the vehicle.

Back-to-basics trend causing pride in cooking from scratch

The back-to-basics trend is causing more and more women and men to take creative pride in cooking from scratch," said Suzi Holder, Extension housing specialist at New Mexico State University. She covered her ideas on the types of pans do-it-yourselfers should use. When buying a new pan, look for easy-to-wash features like seamless construction, rounded corners and no-stick finishes. Also remember that shiny metals reflect heat and produce lighter colored cakes, cookies and biscuits. Pans that are colored, dull or

made of glass absorb more heat and generally produce darker crusts. Some bakeware require special care through the years. For example, aluminum may develop stains and discolorations. These can be removed by boiling a solution of three tablespoons of lemon juice, vinegar or cream of tartar and one quart of water in the pan for 10 minutes. A commercial stainless steel cleaner will help remove stubborn burns on the interior of stainless steel bakeware, Ms.

Holder said it will also remove "heat tint," the rainbow-like discoloration caused by high heat. Cast iron should be pre-seasoned before use. After the first wash, dry it thoroughly to prevent rusting. Coat the inside surface with cooking oil or shortening. Bake the pan in a moderate oven for about two hours. Then wipe away the excess grease. Hot sudsy water is all that's needed for subsequent care. To re-season cast iron, scrub the utensil and repeat the seasoning procedure. Cast

iron utensils with porcelain enamel interiors do not need seasoning. Tin darkens with use and age and the process is irreversible. This makes the baking qualities of a tin pan change through time. A dark pan will yield a much browner product than a shiny pan. Tin also has the tendency to warp if subjected to sudden temperature changes. A warped pan will not bake evenly. Many bakeware interiors are coated with a non-stick finish. After the initial

wash, condition the pan by rubbing it with cooking oil. Do not oil angel food cake pans because the batter must cling to the sides of the pan during baking. Most manufacturers recommend nylon, hard rubber, plastic or wooden kitchen tools on non-stick finishes, glass and aluminum to prevent scratches. Use a nylon or plastic scrubber to remove burned on foods. Then store the pans in vertical slots or place paper towels between them.

The Snow Birds Still Here

(This is the part of the blossom that is left after the petals fall.) However, some are bravely venturing out forming themselves into little round green apricots. This is a sight that you see here in the vale only once in a long time — an apricot tree full of young apricots.

It is mid-afternoon now, on the tenth, and the clouds are all grey in the west. Just a minute ago I heard a distant boom of thunder. What a wonderful sound! It awakens a joyful note echoing in your soul. There is an old saying that the first thunder means the end of heavy frost, for this year.

Other signs of the end of the frost are the first singing of the little frog down on edge of his little pond by the river or on the bank of the river itself. A day or so ago I heard the first little notes of the frog song late in the quiet evening.

Then there is a little bird that is called the Phoebe, from the notes of its song. It is a very tame bird who nests close to the house. He is grey with a yellow breast. This little cheerful summer resident has flown in.

So it looks as if the time of hard frost is over here in the vale, although the wind is cold out of the north, and there is still snow on the mountain.

Jack Frost himself has not left. He usually stays around until most of the snow is gone from the mountain. I will have a talk with him, and maybe we will have a message from him about the weather next time.

Be sure and get out to see the blossoms. Value for this time.

Some of the nearly 300 areas in the National Park System were set aside by Congress to preserve certain kinds of trees.

There's Redwood National Park and Sequoia National Park. There's Big Thicket National Preserve. And there's Joshua Tree National Monument, which actually protects a giant species of yucca.

But none is more interesting than Petrified Forest National Park in Arizona. Congress also set aside the Petrified Forest to protect the trees.

These trees are a little different, however. They don't require water and the superintendent doesn't have to worry about an insect infestation. All he has to worry about is people carrying them away a pocketful at a time.

The Petrified Forest is dead and has been for 180 million years. Give or take a few. But visitors along Interstate 40 in eastern Arizona still marvel at it. You will too if you like autumn colors. This forest is laden with golds and reds and even blues 365 days a year.

At Petrified Forest, even the bark is pretty. That's because, through the process of petrification, the wood has been replaced over the millennia by the silica-based materials carnelian, agate, jasper, onyx and opal.

It all started in the Upper Triassic period of geologic time, scientists believe, when the trees settled into a flood plain and were buried under oxygenless deposits of sand, mud and volcanic ash which prevented rotting.

After burial, underground water flowed through the trees, depositing silica crystals. The collection of these crystals in the cell structure of the wood was the basis for the trees turning to stone.

When the area began to erode millions of years later, the drab tree trunks reap-

peared as brightly colored stone, which retained in detail their original tree shapes.

And the beauty in the national park isn't limited to trees. Here also is the famous Painted Desert, a strange landscape of badlands cloaked in curious shapes and vivid colors.

Visitors headed west on Interstate 40 will find the park's Painted Desert Visitor Center 69 miles west of Gallup, New Mexico. From the visitor center you can take the 27 mile drive through the Painted Desert and the forest. In all there are 12 designated stops including the visitor center and the Rainbow Forest Museum on the south end of the park.

Some of the other stops include: Sweeping views of the Painted Desert from several overlooks along the rim and from the observation site on Kachina Point.

The Puerco Indian Ruins, featuring remains of walls at a site occupied about 900 years ago.

Newspaper Rock where petroglyphs (prehistoric Indian art) have been pecked into the surface of a massive sandstone block.

Agate Bridge, more than 100 feet of a

famous exposed log, with both ends encased in sandstone.

The Rainbow Forest Museum is at the south end of the park. Behind the exhibit hall are Old Faithful Log and other large logs. There is a picnic area nearby. There is also a lunch room, souvenir shop and service station.

If your stop at the Petrified Forest is part of a journey further west on I-40, you can exit at the Rainbow Forest Entrance Station which is only 19 miles from Holbrook, Arizona and the interstate. So the journey through the park only costs the westbound Interstate traveler 20 miles.
