Second mule race meeting here Tuesday

The fate of financially beleaguered Mule-O-Rama — and the future of mule racing here — is to be considered by local mule enthusiasts at a special meeting Tuesday at 7:30 p.m., in the Ruidoso Downs Municipal Building. Bill Ward, president of Lincoln County Mule-O-Rama, has advised interested local parties that a meeting of Mule-O-Rama directors was held recently and that he will report on the results of that meeting tomorrow night.

Commissioners eye budget

The Lincoln County Board of Commissioners Thursday finished their review of county programs, the first phase of the county's budget cycle. The commissioners, minus G. H. "Shorty" Stoneman who was called away on business from the irregularly scheduled Thursday meeting, heard eight heads of various county programs and agencies outline their plans and programs for the coming 67th fiscal year. Following review of the programs, the commissioners decided to meet again Tuesday to begin the first draft of the county's budget. In the absence of Stoneman, commission chairman John Sudderth called for five agenda items to be tabled until the Tuesday meeting. "I think Shorty should be in on these," Sudderth said. The tabled items involved fiscal matters and issues arising from the proposed transference of the Lincoln County -

Carrizozo Medical Center facilities to a neighboring building. Concurrent with the transfer, the Zia Therapy Center will probably take control of the existing hospital building to be used as a group training center for developmentally-handicapped persons. Architects were to present a program to the commissioners outlining the features of the proposed remodeling of a building neighboring the current hospital for use as a medical center. However, they did not attend the Thursday meeting. County manager Les Olsen said he would attempt to have the architects present at the Tuesday meeting. In other business the county commissioners: — Voted to approve the sale of several tracts of land and lots in order to generate revenue to reimburse the county for

property taxes owed on the land. Persons desiring information concerning the specific tracts and lots, and minimum bids, may contact the county clerk's office for more information. The action, according to Olsen, is considered routine and is periodically undertaken by the county to help with the deficit created by the non-payment of property taxes. In other business the commission: — Voted to enter the county into an agreement with the Lincoln National Forest permitting the rental of county

KRRR licensing fight underway

An application for license to use the 1360 kilohertz AM radio band in Ruidoso has been filed with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) by Triple R Broadcasting Incorporated which currently operates one radio station in Seminole, Texas. The frequency is now being used by Sierra Blanca Broadcasting Company with call letters KRRR in the Ruidoso area. Sierra Blanca Broadcasting's AM license is currently up for review and renewal by the FCC. Because of stringent FCC control of the publicly-owned airwaves, only one AM frequency has been assigned to the Ruidoso area. The license will be assigned, according to FCC standards, to one of the two companies on the basis of the findings of a hearing before an Administrative Law Judge. The license will be awarded to

which ever company can show it can best serve the problems, needs and interests of the community as defined by surveys conducted by the competing companies. While no firm date has been set, the FCC has announced that it will hold a comparative hearing on the merits of both applications. According to Ralph D. Copeland, principle in Triple R Broadcasting, an initial hearing will probably be held in September or October to decide the date of the actual hearing. He said the hearing will probably take place next spring, either in Washington D.C., or in Ruidoso. According to Ed Hyman, owner and operator of KRRR for the past 13 years, both sides will probably find need to retain attorneys in both Ruidoso and Washington. He placed the legal costs at around \$100,000. (SEE PAGE TWO)

Cox, who did not elaborate on the reasons for his resignation, did not disclose any plans for the immediate future. A successor to Cox, Isaacs said, is expected to be named within a few weeks.

'Tribute to Elvis' set here

Ruidoso Downs' recently proclaimed "Pop Cop", Police Chief Lynn Martin, assisted by his family group of musicians and an entourage of Las Vegas musicians, will present a "Tribute to Elvis" May 27 at 8 p.m., at the Chaparral Convention Center. Backed by the Martin Music Company, Andrea's Revue and the Crystal Concert Choir, a group composed of Ruidoso High School students, Martin will rock, roll, gyrate and sing to the strains of a full spectrum of Elvis Presley music, including gospels, blues and rock. "We have wanted for a long time to bring a family type show to Ruidoso," Martin said. "This is not a dance and no liquor will be served. This is a concert that

our local people and summer visitors can bring their families to, to enjoy an evening of family entertainment." Aside from just plain having fun and promoting the area, Martin said the concert will help generate funds for the Muscular Dystrophy Association (MDA). He said the group's goal is to be able to give the MDA \$5,000. Martin said the show will differ from the many Elvis tribute shows currently sweeping the world. "The music, back up vocalists and orchestration is as near live Elvis performances as possible," he said. Martin does not claim to be an Elvis impersonator. His goal is to portray a memory and to share that memory with all Elvis fans and people who like that type of music.

"Elvis had such a varied type of music that he had something to offer every age group," Martin said. "In this show the music ranges from the rock and roll of the fifties to the more contemporary music of the seventies, including some inspirational." The Crystal Concert Chorus is composed of Jamie Racher, Danny Racher, Eloy Almaguer and Sylvia Turner. Danny Racher also plays trombone, Sylvia is an exchange student from Australia sponsored by the Rotary Club. "All of these kids are very talented and have worked hard to help us put the show together," Martin said. "I'm proud of them, and I know the Ruidoso area will be proud of them too." Made up of the Martin Music Company, and Andrea's Revue, the Tiffany Crystal

Orchestra is composed of Wayne Pool, arranger and lead guitar; Dennis Martin, drums, trumpet and vocals; Steve Bachelder, drums and percussion; Carol Martin, piano, organ, Moog synthesizer and vocals; Reva Martin, bass guitar and vocals; Ricky Martin, rhythm guitar; Janelle Coats, trumpet and Jeff Lara, trumpet. "Many local people have helped us with professional lighting, sound and costume design. We appreciate their hard work and support for this show," Martin said. Tickets are on sale at Gibson's, Ben Franklin, EZ-TV, the Winner's Circle, Ruidoso Skateland, Ruidoso Music Company and the Skyview Motel. Martin said tickets will be on sale in Ruidoso two weeks in advance of sales in other regional communities.

County solid waste woes solved

A 200 acre tract of land located about four miles from Alto on the Ft. Stanton Road will become the Village of Ruidoso's sanitary landfill site beginning probably in June. The site, according to county manager Les Olsen, should be able to handle the garbage dumping needs of the area for about 50 years with proper management. "It's my feeling to get the maximum use for the land," Olsen said at a recent meeting of village and county officials at the site. "This site ought to last quite awhile with a six inch daily backfill." He added it will be a public facility for all residents of the county, but it is being built chiefly to handle the needs of Ruidoso as the village's present site has been gradually filled to near capacity. Village waste disposal officials estimate the present site will become filled sometime in May. The proposed site is located about 1.5 miles from the future Sierra Blanca Airport. Village manager Jim Hine said projections indicate that Ruidoso's growth will be toward the area of the proposed site. He said he felt it was an area well chosen. Currently the village is dumping about 2,200 cubic yards of material a month. This figure is expected to double within the next few years. Village officials attribute building growth and waste materials as the prime reason for the increase in refuse.

Red flag fire alert set

In addition to electing officers at their Thursday afternoon meeting, the fire prevention steering committee adopted their first project, a red flag alert system for days of extreme fire danger. The system, which involves red pennants and flags distributed through the village to notify residents and visitors of high fire danger, only will be used on days of extreme fire danger with accompanying conditions of low humidity, high winds and low fuel moisture.

"Usually these red alert days occur 10 to 14 times per year and seldom for more than two days duration," Larry Bandy, New Mexico Division of State Forestry, said. The red alert days, which are determined through a cooperative effort among the National Weather Service, United States Forest Service and the State Division of Forestry, also may be determined by consideration of risks such as population density and availability of fire suppression forces. Efforts of the steering committee will be concentrated in educating residents and visitors to extreme fire danger and encouraging caution and fire prevention. To accomplish these goals, the committee will:

In other business, the committee: — Appointed Potter, Dorothy Kinsey and Dub Williams to a committee to solicit name suggestions for the committee through a contest in the schools. — Appointed Bandy as the Red Alert coordinator. — Discussed future projects including the possibility of obtaining funds for the village to keep the sanitary landfill open Saturdays. The committee's next scheduled meeting is at 4 p.m., May 11.

— Distribute red flags to be flown on days of extreme danger to strategic businesses with flag poles and flag holders. — Distribute pennants which clip on antennas to agencies such as village governments, utility companies and law enforcement agencies which employ large fleets of vehicles. — Distribute posters explaining the project to businesses throughout town. The committee hopes the red pennants on vehicle antennas and red flags flown throughout the village will catch residents' and visitors' attention, prompting them to ask questions and therefore providing an opportunity to inform them of the extremely dangerous fire conditions. Officers also elected at the Wednesday afternoon meeting. They are Herb Brunell, chairman, Barbara Duff, vice president and Mickey Potter, secretary. Bandy will handle financial matters until a treasurer is needed.

Firemen install new 'hot line'

The Ruidoso Fire Department, chief Bill Seelbach has announced, now has the advantage of new direct "hot line" telephone services between the Ruidoso Police Department dispatcher and the Ruidoso Lookout Station. "This supplements our other 'hot line' between the police dispatcher and the Forest Service," Seelbach said, "and will enable all fire fighting crews to move faster and better coordinate efforts to fight forest fire than at any time in the past."

Villages' trustees to meet



Coexistent with the twin bids to secure Ruidoso's single assigned clear frequency are two applications from the companies to secure an FM license for broadcasting in the Ruidoso area, and a series of suits and counter suits filed by both companies in District Court.

The suits contend that in September of 1976 Copeland offered to purchase KRRR. He backed his offer with \$5,000 earnest money to be held in escrow. According to Hyman and Copeland the two entered into a six month contract.

According to FCC regulations, transference of a radio station must be sanctioned by the FCC.

Hyman contends that after the six month period had expired he had not received FCC authorization to transfer the station and took it off the market.

Much of the remaining facts of the dispute are clouded in litigation. However, both sides are charging breach of contract and both sides are suing for damages.

In addition, Sierra Blanca Broadcasting Company is seeking to enjoin Triple R Broadcasting from filing for an FCC license.

Copeland is seeking damages he says he has sustained as the result of alleged misstatements "(impugning) the personal and business character of the counter claimant, Ralph D. Copeland." The suit contends that the misstatements appeared in a New Mexico broadcasting publication, "Mikeside" as the result of an interview with Hyman.

The FCC welcomes written public comment on the matter.

Statements on how Sierra Blanca Broadcasting Company feels it has served the public interest are on file at KRRR as a matter of public record.

Statements on how Triple R Broadcasting feels it can serve the public interest are on file at attorney Mona Yardumian's office, Ruidoso. Yardumian has been retained as legal counsel for Copeland.

The Time of New Leaves

By the time this message reaches you, we will be one third of the way through spring — the Queen of Seasons having begun on March twenty.

The good moisture of the past winter is beginning to show up in many ways. Although the weather is dry right now, (this is being written on April nineteen) everything is growing rapidly. Now there is a something in the river harmonies that brings you a still deeper contentment; and as you listen nothing but quiet happiness and peace is in your heart, and you know all is well, and God is taking care of you always.

Later as you are in that sacred time before you go to sleep, the river's lullaby comes to you through the window, up from the river banks across the little moonlit field.

Young rappellers tackle steep slopes

On field trips Thursday and Friday, two classes from White Mountain Middle School practiced rappelling, a mountaineering technique allowing descent by ropes.

Sixth, seventh and eighth graders enrolled in the outdoor living skills class taught by Bob Palko learned use of the ropes, rappelling "diapers" and carabiners or giant safety pins, in addition to studying safety aspects, before their descent of a sheer cliff in the Alto area.


Each rappeller wore a diaper which was fastened with a network of carabiners and a safety rope held by a belayer, who sat at the top of the cliff and could create tension on the rope to stop a free fall.

The descent rope, which was tested to hold 3,400 pounds, was woven through the rappellers' carabiners in a manner allowing the rappeller to slip down the rope and to control the speed of his descent through loosening and tightening his grip on the rope woven through the carabiners.

During the field trip, each student took a turn rappelling and as the belayer and the relayer, who gave directions to the rappeller and belayer who could not see each other.




THE OUTDOOR LIVING skills class watches instructor Palko demonstrate.

Not Proud by Gunther; (Johnny's parents were divorced before his illness, but the entire book reveals their love for him throughout his tragic and fatal illness). 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Painting Tips

TIPS ON PAINTING CEILING

[4] If your ceiling has not been painted in several years and has a dingy look, it is best to figure on applying two light coats of paint rather than trying to get by with one coat. The reason is that ceilings are subject to constantly rising heat, carrying with it smoke and dirt. This results in a dry, porous surface which should have two coats to look its best.

[5] Work across the narrow dimension at one end, in strips 3-4 ft. wide. Cut in edges, bordering only the strip you are working on rather than cutting in the entire ceiling at once.

[6] Work in 3-4 ft. squares, and for best coverage, roll first in one direction, then criss-cross to finish off the square. Continue in this way to finish the strip.

[7] When painting each new strip, start your full roller 6 inches or so away from the previous strip until you have spread the paint around in the square. Then feather the paint into the previous strip. This will prevent excessive buildup at the laps.

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
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

SANTA FE — Although it may be months away, the telephone rates of New Mexicans could be somewhat reduced as a result of a series of actions by the utility commission which oversees phone company operations.

The three-member State Corporation Commission is the governmental entity involved.

The commission is involved in a three-phase examination of the rate structure of Mountain States Telephone Company of New Mexico.

Phase I involved a close look at the phone company's ownership structure to determine what rate of return on equity should be allowed. With the aid of a relatively new program which allowed the commission to hire outside "expert witnesses," the agency studied Mountain Bell-New Mexico's direct cash flow and also set up a capital assets pricing model.

The result was a commission decision to reduce the allowable rate of return on equity from 11.7 percent to 10.5 percent.

Phase II of the commission's process will begin in June.

This phase is designed to establish, as a result of the allowable rate of return on equity, what should be the company's actual revenue requirements.

In effect, this phase means that although the rate of return on equity has been decided, what "equity" is has not been. The commission will have to specifically determine what equity is as it applies to stockholders' investment — but only for intrastate operations of Mountain Bell-New Mexico.

Finally, probably beginning in July, the commission plans to work from that revenue requirement to develop a rate base. That will be Phase III.

In the process, the commission again plans to use outside "expert witnesses."

The program was started when the 1977 Legislature approved \$50,000 for the commission to contract with outside experts on technical rate-making matters.

"We never had the expertise before to determine the equity requirements," said a commission official. "We always had to accept what the company told us. We have the expertise now to go into court and win the case."

The commission lost one round against the phone company in the State Supreme Court. Later, it called a rate case on its own order rather than upon a rate increase request filed by the company.

Fred O'Cheskey, appointed by Gov. Jerry Apodaca with the general agreement of legislative leaders to head the State Highway Department, says he anticipated few problems in dealing with the appointive highway commission that battled for months with the governor.


O'Cheskey says the proper role of the commission, besides having a voice in choosing the top administrator, should be in setting broad policy rather than getting involved in details of specific road projects.

He says previously commissioners would get involved in specific policy but that was primarily "habit" rather than a result of state law.

O'Cheskey cited a 1978 law, enacted after negotiations between the administration and legislative leaders, which spells out that except for broad policy-making authority by the commission, "the state highway engineer shall have all powers granted by law to the commission."

Note: O'Cheskey says he also plans to become "actively and personally" involved in negotiations with Indian pueblos on right-of-way for I-25 between Santa Fe and Albuquerque.

Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — Some time ago, I read an article in your column concerning rigging a sail on a canoe. You seemed to think it wouldn't work but I can assure you it will. I have done so several times and it works fairly well. Danny V., Florida

Dear Danny — I didn't say it wouldn't work, only that canoes don't make efficient sailboats, and I still uphold that belief. I, too, have rigged sails on canoes and they can be lots of fun, but they can be very tricky to handle and sooner or later you'll be in for a dunking, no matter how careful. This may not be a major cause for concern in your state, but an offshore spill in cold northern waters can be very dangerous. There is no reason not to sail a canoe if you wish, but be aware of possible consequences and prepared to handle them.

Dear Wayne — I have heard pros and cons about whether the reel of a fly rod should have a drag. Do you think the drag is important in fly fishing? Alton T., Indiana

Dear Alton — The vast majority of good fly reels do have drags, but there are two basic differences. Some are adjustable,

some aren't. The non-adjustable ones have a click drag which is preset. These are generally lower in cost, but not necessarily inadequate. They are used by amateur and expert alike. The non-adjustable is well suited to panfish and smaller varieties of gamefish where the rod itself buffers the shock to the line to prevent breakage.

For steelhead, salmon, large bass, and other hefty and spirited fighters, an adjustable drag is often desirable, and frequently necessary. The drag tension may be set to match the heavier lines often required. If you care to spend a little more money, a reel with an adjustable drag will repay you through its versatility.

Dear Wayne — I have often read that whitetail deer are much easier to hunt during their mating season. When is this period and how long does it last? Randy V. South Carolina

Dear Randy — It is true that the whitetail is more easily approached during rut (mating season) than at other times of the year. During this period the usually wary buck becomes more careless in his movement. All of his keen senses are understandably concentrated more on

locating a mate than upon self-preservation.

The intensity of rut builds to a peak then gradually diminishes, all within about a four to eight week period. The season usually runs from early or mid-November through mid to late December. These periods vary slightly throughout the country. The northern areas tend to have an earlier rut, due to an earlier decrease in the length and intensity of daylight.

Dear Wayne — This summer on my two week vacation I would like to take a canoe trip. Could you suggest a good area? William B., Pennsylvania

Dear William — While some areas excel in enchantment, every state provides at least some interesting canoeing possibilities. Without knowing if you prefer a primitive northwoods trip or southern setting it would be difficult to suggest an area.

The best known northwoods canoeing area closest to you is the Allagash Waterway in upper Maine. Because this area is enjoying increasing popularity it is by no means the secluded, remote hideaway it once was.

Dear Wayne — I am planning a camping trip to Maine this summer. I would like to climb Mt. Kathadin; the beginning of the Appalachian Trail. Can this be accomplished by an amateur without great risk or difficulty? Joe G., Louisiana

Dear Joe — Yes. The vast majority of the trail is quite safe and easy to follow. The total distance is just over five miles, one way. The first mile or more is within the tree line and the angle is gradual. Beyond the timber line the trail is painted on rocks and boulders with splashes of white. Once above the timber line the view is fantastic.

As with any kind of climbing, you should be in good physical condition and exercise an extra amount of caution in difficult areas. You should allow about 10 hours for the round trip. Take along an extra jacket. You'll need it at the top.

Dear Wayne — Are there any special rules that should be observed when storing a hunting bow between seasons? Jeffery H., Pennsylvania

Dear Jeffery — The bow should, of course, be stored unstrung. This applies to compound bows as well as recurves. It can be laid on its side upon a flat surface or in a rack which supports both limbs. It should not be stood in a corner on one limb. Keep it dry and clean. If you utilize a snap on or clamp on bow quiver it is best removed until next season.

Dear Wayne — For years I have been doing business with a small, independent sporting goods store in my town. His selection is good and prices are hard to beat. The problem is that the owner is an authority on everything. After carefully considering the facts and making a decision, I stop in, to invariably end up in an argument. He will frequently condemn my choice, insisting that it is junk and that I should only consider his pick. Suggesting is one thing, but a loudmouth know-it-all is a poor excuse for a businessman.

Why can't this man just tell me what I want and keep quiet? Al K., Tennessee

Dear Al — I know the feeling. These men are not content with mere suggestions. It seems necessary that they flaunt their expertise, be it real or imagined. However, when the man owns the store, he's boss.

CONFIDENTIAL REPORT: Farrah Fawcett-Majors declared. 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
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


