

COMMITTEE APPROVAL RAISED EXTERIOR BUILDING PRICE \$2,813

APRC lists Teen Center cost factors

Members of the Architectural Plans Review Committee (APRC) Friday submitted figures to The News detailing the actual increase in cost of the proposed Noon Lions Club's 60x120 foot Teen Center, occasioned by conformance to APRC requirements.

Outlining the APRC's position were chairman Alden Deyo and committee members Mike Mulholland, Jim French and Mike Waldron.

Figures produced by French, who, as an architect also worked on the building's exterior design, showed that APRC's recommended changes amounted to \$2,813 of the announced projected structure cost of \$75,000.

The APRC's breakdown of changes necessary to obtain final committee ap-

proval on the exterior design of the building included:

Concrete \$360
Anchor bolts 17
Framing 1,650
Plywood 55
Shakes 154
Stucco 8,250
Total of changes \$9,486

The APRC's recommendation resulted in the deletion of two items included in the original building plan:

Fake stone \$4,000
Metal siding 1,673
Total of deletions \$5,673

"This means," French said, "that the actual changes required by APRC, resulting in the committee's approval of the plans, amounted to \$2,813, all that we

added to the original projected cost factor of the building, if located at the original site, near the Ruidoso Public Library."

Mulholland indicated the price of the building, including other external work, if located near the swimming pool and tennis courts, "might be a little higher, but there would be other important savings, such as parking facilities and landscaping that would probably make this location cheaper in the overall picture."

Other building conditions to be met, French said, over and above APRC's stipulations, which pertain solely to the exterior of the structure, included, under the Uniform Building Code of 1976, one hour fire protection on a metal building that wasn't, he said, "included in the original building plan."

Other APRC recommendations, to meet the Code, included enlarging the restroom facilities to accommodate the projected capacity of the 7,200 square foot steel building of 673 persons and enlarging the kitchen facilities to be adequate for banquets serving more than 700.

"Another thing," French said, "the exit requirements of the Code were not met in the building plans approved by the APRC, because the committee's responsibility is strictly for exterior design."

"Of importance in this matter of the Teen Center," Deyo said, "is, as a public facility, it must conform to the code no matter who administers it, be it a village, county or the State of New Mexico and there is no way to avoid abiding by the code no matter where it is built."

Waldron said: "At the February 15 meeting of APRC, the plans were looked over and suggestions given to improve the building. At that time we were not in a position to accept the plans, as the changes suggested by French, to make it acceptable, were not included."

The Teen Center concept, at the February 21 special meeting of the Ruidoso trustees, was accepted by the trustees, subject to the stipulation by mayor Lloyd Davis that the building "be in conformity with standards set by APRC and Planning and Zoning," and that these standards could not be "relinquished" for the Teen Center.

At this special meeting French offered his services, without fee, to work on the design of the building to make it ac-

ceptable by APRC.

Also at this meeting, Davis and George Lore each pledged \$500 toward offsetting the increased costs of the exterior building design.

The trustees present Sherman Atwood, George White and Ab Gunter, with an "in favor" vote by Davis, unanimously supported the Teen Center concept and indicated approval of the building would be forthcoming from the trustees once the requirements of "APRC, Planning and Zoning, the environmentalist and other agencies," had been met.

The contract for the Teen Center building was awarded January 25 to Ace Building and Supply of Hobbs, by the Noon Lions Club, prior to submitting plans to APRC.

Airport committee needs five support resolutions

The Sierra Blanca Regional Airport Commission Thursday authorized members to obtain resolutions from the local government bodies involved, to facilitate the commission's applications on the proposed airport.

The resolutions, from the Mescalero Apache Tribe, Lincoln County and villages of Capitan, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, will enable the commission chairman to take necessary action concerning agreements on the proposed airport.

The need for the resolutions arose after the regional Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) offices in Fort Worth, Texas, reviewed the application and found "the commission not legally constituted in such a way to be eligible to accept land and because the airport commission was established as a sort of independent entity without a tax supported base. And because we don't have the base, we are ineligible to be the sponsor for development of the airport," Richard Hall, chairman of the commission, said.

"You are just putting in another step really," Bill Howard, FAA area coordinator from the Albuquerque office, said. "We need a resolution from each body authorizing the chairman of the commission to sign on behalf of each government body to obligate them."

The term obligation doesn't mean

"you'll have bill collectors at the door," Les Olsen, county manager, said. "Each body has the potential for developing the airport; no one is actually held responsible for the full financial obligation."

The commission discussed other ways of incorporating the necessary resolution including revision of the joint powers agreement, but decided for expediency to have each government body sign a uniform resolution.

"There's no reason to wait for further developments," Hall said. "The application is stymied at the regional office."

"We've lost time, but with a fair amount of optimism I hope it's the last delay."

During the meeting Howard suggested two or more of the bodies cosponsor the application for the title for the necessary acreage.

The commission concluded all of the government bodies should be cosponsors.

Hall said possible reasons why the application was so closely scrutinized by the FAA was because of a clause giving any body the option to withdraw and because the resolution from each of the bodies approving the joint powers agreement were not in standardized form.

Howard told the commission with the proposed resolutions any body still may withdraw, but any committed funds still would be available.


Local Elks sponsoring youth government day

Jockey Club seeks tracks

Several groups, Bud Alessio, chairman of the board for Fortuna Properties, Inc., San Diego, California, said Friday have expressed interest in buying Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs race tracks.

The sale of the tracks is necessitated by a New Mexico Racing Commission decision, in September 1977, following a lengthy investigation and hearings by commission members, in which opposition to track ownership by Fortuna was voiced due to alleged activities by Alessio family members contrary to state racing laws.

Alessio said Friday, "We have some very interested groups, and there possibly could be an offer placed on my desk tomorrow. I can't say how fast we'll be able to sell the tracks."

The Ruidoso Jockey Club, Alessio acknowledged, has made an offer by telephone, but no proposal has reached him. Action taken at the April 22 meeting of the local club indicated the interest of members in raising \$6 million as a down payment to purchase both tracks.

Donations for the rummage sale will be accepted at the building during the day May 4.


Sale items donated to the Pink Ladies to date include furniture, clothing, an electric stove, a lawn mower and a quantity of "white elephants," Berger said.



NATIONWIDE GUN REGISTRATION GOES INTO EFFECT MAY 21, 1978, SAYS BATF!

Dear Lincoln County Citizens:

A massive system of centralized national firearms registration will be created in Washington, D. C. through regulations written and enacted by the U. S. Treasury's Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms — unless you act, and unless your elected Members of Congress act to stop it.

This is not a fund appeal. This is a legislative alert from NRA-ILA! With no specific Congressional authority, the Federal gun control police — the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (BATF) — have published their plans for a computerized firearms registration system in the Federal Register and have asked for public comment on these "new firearms regulations."

You, your family members and your friends have only until May 22 to officially protest this registration scheme for the agency record. After that date, the comment record will be closed, and further letters of protest will neither be officially recorded nor counted.

Under most Federal law — including the 1968 Gun Control Act — the agency designated to carry out the general intent of the Congress is given authority to write the details, the nuts and bolts of law, by regulation. Congress does not, however, give authority for an agency to go beyond its intent. And clearly, very clearly, this is exactly what the BATF has done.

Congress never intended that the bureaucracy create national gun registration. When the 1968 Gun Control Act was debated, amendments to create national registration — computerized central records — were voted down. In every Congress since that time, scheme after scheme to create one form or another of gun registration has been raised and defeated. The intent of our elected Members of Congress is very clear — they have steadfastly refused to give the Federal gun control bureaucracy the authority to institute firearms registration.

It appears quite likely that the Carter Administration, facing the reality that Congress will not enact a prohibitive firearms law in this election year, is attempting to make an end run around you and your elected Congressmen and Senators.

Our enemies, such as the National Coalition to Ban Handguns who are in close communication with this administration, are publicly referring to these regulations as "the Carter gun bill."

The BATF chooses to call their scheme "centralized reports," but no matter what name they give it, the regulation plan amounts to the same thing — a central Federal computer record of firearms. The "centralized reports" would cover all firearms — shotguns, rifles and handguns which are transacted in or through Federally licensed commerce. Although in explaining their "regulations" to the press, BATF implied that the computerized records would only be on firearms transactions made before a dealer-sale to an individual citizen, that implication was a lie!

The truth is buried in the fine print of the proposed regulations. The quarterly reports from 172,000 Federal Firearms License holders would include information on any gun that you might buy from a dealer.

In those regulations, BATF is careful to say that now — for the time being — it seeks only the date, place of transaction and "unique serial number" of the firearm you buy. But, they say, they can get your name and address just with a phone call to the licensed dealer!

Further, the seeds they are sowing for our future were spelled out in a public briefing by Richard Davis, the Assistant Secretary of the Treasury for Enforcement. He said BATF could call in and computerize all existing dealer records any time the agency felt like it, but that right now, such an action "would not be politically realistic."

Those dealer records Richard Davis is talking about are the Form 4473's which you and I have been required to fill out since 1968 on every gun we buy from a dealer.

This system the bureaucrats are trying to create is just the beginning. If they are allowed to build their computer record system — their national firearms registration system — by these regulations alone, without Congressional authority, they will assume they have the power to create additional forms of gun control by regulation.

Another of the elements in these "regulations" is designed with that end in mind. The BATF wants every firearm manufactured or imported to carry a "unique" 14-digit serial code — a code which would include make, model, serial number, caliber, barrel length. BATF says it will cost industry — ultimately consumers — \$5-million. That 14-digit code — computerized — could be used to easily locate any firearm which might be declared as "prohibited for possession" in the future.

There is not one whit of evidence that any of this "gun registration by regulation" will have anything to do with crime. Gun control is not crime control. But this scheme will fatten the Federal gun bureaucracy and it will create the beginnings of a system of electronic dossiers which would be second only in size to the Social Security System. And at what cost in terms of loss of privacy and tax dollars totally wasted?

The BATF — and Richard Davis — blithely told the press that they can begin this computer operation with no need for additional funding authorized or appropriated by Congress — with just \$5-million in our tax dollars which they have now. That cost figure, too, is a lie.

They are saying their "recordkeeping system" would include 688,000 reports from manufacturers, importers, exporters, jobbers, gunsmiths and dealers. By BATF's own figures for 1977 alone, they claim there are over 5 million firearms in licensed commerce. And those are only new guns. And by their own estimates, Davis and his BATF claim there are, on average, five transactions between manufacturer and individual citizen who eventually buys a gun. That's 25-million separate transactions to be computerized every year on new guns alone.

With used guns sold to you through dealers, we are talking about computer records in Washington being processed and kept on at least 15 to 20-million additional gun transactions per year.

That's 40 to 45-million computer records from 688,000 quarterly reports submitted yearly. For \$5-million? Or \$8-million? Don't believe it.

BATF has testified in the past that handgun registration alone would cost from \$35-million to \$100-million in the first year. But now they claim they can "borrow" a Treasury Department computer and register all firearms in licensed commerce for \$5-million to \$8-million!

But none of this has to become reality. Not if each and every NRA member and our nonmember friends write individual letters of protest.

None of this has to become reality, if Congress puts a stop to it, and only Congress clearly has that power.

Without your protest to BATF, in writing, and your protests to your elected officials, this gun-law by bureaucratic regulation could take effect this summer. And if it does, other "regulations" won't be far behind.

And equally important, write your congressman and Senators. Tell them very simply that they must call a halt to this registration scheme — this central recordkeeping. And ask your members of Congress to send you copies of their comments to BATF.

We can stop this business before it starts. The NRS Institute with its lobbying, legal, research and communication staffs, is pulling out all the stops in Washington to make sure BATF does not get away with this. But you must do your part. Congress will respond if you tell your elected representatives to stop BATF.

The last time NRA-ILA sent all NRA members a Legislative Alert was in late 1975 when the national media was telling the public that a new national gun law was an absolute certainty. Through your letters, telegrams, phone calls and personal contact with legislators, you put a stop to it. You can do it again. This is the first time since then that a national crisis has called for such a massive mailing to the entire NRA memberships. Because of that May 22 deadline for comment, this time the threat is even more urgent.

THE ALCOHOL OPTION

Two years have passed since a study financed by the Foundation for Ocean Research offered a tantalizing picture of how America could vastly increase its energy supplies by using alcohol compounds — methanol in particular — as a fuel. This study and others like it are not getting the attention they deserve in the formation of a national energy policy.

So much is known about the potential for alcohol fuels, and the opportunity to produce them is so obvious, we're tempted to say the Department of Energy can't see the forest for the trees.

Our farmers produce more grain than the market can absorb. Why can't the surplus be channeled into production of ethanol (grain alcohol)? Disposal of industrial wastes and garbage is becoming a major environmental problem. Much of this waste could be used to produce

methanol (wood alcohol). We worry about degrading air quality by burning coal; yet coal, too, can be converted to methanol to tap its energy without polluting the air.

Obviously it would take a major industrial effort to bring such possibilities to reality, and there are doubtless some production and distribution problems to be solved before alcohol could become commonplace in our inventory of fuels. But the alcohol option has been getting the short end of the stick in DOE's exploration of energy alternatives. Congress has been more aggressive than the administration in trying to advance alcohol technologies from the research and development phase into practical tests and applications.

DOE has given oil companies some of its major grants to explore the use of methanol and ethanol as a fuel or as an additive to gasoline. An argument can be made that expertise on fuel compounds is concentrated in the oil industry — that oil companies know better than anyone the problem of producing and distributing the huge quantities of motor fuel that this country demands. But surely DOE is not so naive as to miss the implication of relying for these studies and evaluations on an industry whose primary concern is — or should be — in exploring and developing what remains of our oil and gas resources.

Indeed, DOE has the opportunity to give substance to the familiar rhetoric against the supposed domination of our energy supplies by major oil companies. It should divorce the development of such alternative fuels as alcohol from the oil industry, at least in this early phase. The government should be encouraging development of competitive energy industries.

Germany, during World War II, often is cited as an example of how synthetic fuels can be used when petroleum is in short supply. Methanol and synthetic gasoline made from coal and lignite are said to have supplied half of Germany's fuel after its access to petroleum was cut off. That's instructive from an historical standpoint, but the United States should not be waiting until our petroleum runs out — or we ruin our economy with oil imports — before we prove or disprove that the alcohol option is a viable one for our peacetime future. — News-Bulletin, Belen

SANTA FE — Gov. Jerry Apodaca has given his approval to the establishment of a state government mechanism to handle the nuclear waste disposal issue.

Part of the proposed procedure involves the receipt of at least \$1.4 million from the U.S. Department of Energy to fund a nationally-based "environmental evaluation group."

That Federal agency has proposed that an area near Carlsbad be used for underground storage of radioactive nuclear waste from the nation's nuclear reactors and its weapons program.

It's called the Waste Isolation Pilot Project, and it has the support of some of Carlsbad's business and governmental leaders.

But WIPP also has stirred up a political controversy in New Mexico, with opponents charging the project could be dangerous to humans and the environment — over the long run if not immediately. Opponents also claim that although it's called a "pilot" project, any initial approval could represent a bureaucratic foot in the door leading to a full-scale national installation.

The review mechanism approved by Apodaca originated within the State Department of Energy and Minerals.

In part at least, it's a response to U.S. Secretary of Energy James Schlesinger's assurances to New Mexico's congressional delegation that the state could exercise a "veto power" on whether the project would ever become operational.

The details of how the state would give its "yes" or "no" on the issue never have been worked out. Should it be the governor? The Legislature? The public through a referendum vote? A combination of all?

The answers to these questions could have a lot to do with the basic answer on the issue itself.

The proposed mechanism involves these components:

— A committee of 13 officials from all 12 cabinet departments under the governor's office plus a representative of the elected State Land Office. This group will be headed by Ernest Coriz, administrative assistant to State Energy Secretary Nick Franklin.

It will study the potential effects of WIPP across the governmental spectrum — water resources, wildlife and game, social services, transportation of the radioactive materials to the site, and so on.

— The "environmental evaluation group." This will be made up of scientists from throughout the nation, who will examine technical aspects of nuclear waste disposal in general and "site-specific" issues relating directly to the Carlsbad site.

It will report directly to one of the 12 cabinet departments, the Health and Environment Department and specifically its Environmental Improvement Division (formerly the Environmental Improvement Agency).


Unofficial approval of \$1.4 million in money from the U.S. Department of Energy has been received. The money will be used to staff and operate the evaluation group.

— A governor's advisory committee on WIPP. This will be made up of New Mexico scientists. Originally, this group was a subcommittee of the "Governor's Technical Excellence Committee."

— A four-person group which will oversee all this and report to the governor and the Legislature. Called the "advisory secretaries," they are the secretaries of energy (Franklin), health and environment, natural resources and commerce and industry.

Meanwhile, Federal legislation has been introduced in Congress dealing with the nuclear waste disposal issue. Among the bills are ones introduced by Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., and by Sen. Gary Hart, D-Colorado.
