

# Ferguson plugs industry in state

Lieutenant Governor Bob Ferguson made an announced tour of Ruidoso Tuesday during which he said New Mexico would have to find a way to stimulate manufacturing interest in the state.

Speaking before a noon meeting of the Rotary Club, Ferguson said, "We want clean, light manufacturing industries in the state."

He said that manufacturing outside of agriculture accounted for less than eight percent of New Mexico's labor force.

"We need to do something to turn this around; since the civil war there has been a mass migration to the sun belt states, especially in the electronics industry," Ferguson said. "Yet New Mexico has the highest unemployment rate in the sunbelt and ranks 45th in per capita income."

"I think we're missing the boat; perhaps in our Department of Development; perhaps they're not doing the job."

During his fifteen minute talk Ferguson briefly touched upon the problem of nuclear waste by saying he had no solutions.

"If the issue (of the proposed Carlsbad nuclear waste disposal project) was brought before the people, it would be defeated by 5-1," he said, adding that in his opinion nuclear waste was not being handled properly.

## Noon Lions quit Teen Center

The Ruidoso Noon Lions Club Wednesday voted to abandon the Teen Center project, after two years of fund raising activities.

"Our efforts to provide this facility here," Lions president Bill Morrison said, "have resulted in dissention."

"Our purpose is to support community activities and that we will continue to do."

"We're very much interested in our youth and will direct our energy and our money to perpetuate current programs and develop new ones."

"We have no intention of becoming a divisive factor in Ruidoso, or Ruidoso Downs."

"Our motto is 'We Serve'. We've served our youth, our community and our needy in the past. And it is these programs that we will be enlarging in the months and years ahead."

Monies collected in the Teen Center drive, Morrison said, "will be spent, every

cent. on our youth, be it Boy and Girl Scouts, Cubs and Brownies and, as one of our strongest programs, our annual scholarships to graduating Ruidoso High School seniors, to enable those not desiring to pursue scholastic careers to attend trade and professional schools, from mechanics to nursing."

Harley Parnell, who has worked on the building plans, advised the club that the estimated cost of the center, to meet exterior design and building code standards, would approximate \$150,000.

The motion to abandon the project included the word "reluctantly."

The immediate club project, using Teen Center funds, will be to upgrade the Babe Ruth League baseball diamond at White Mountain School.

"By getting this field in shape for play this year," Morrison said, "we'll be providing a real service to our youth."

"We'll put the grounds into first class

shape, suitable for district and regional tournament games, and it is our intent to have the field lighted."

Morrison noted that club activities during the past year have amounted to expenditures of "more than \$10,000," including these in support of youth and needy persons:

— Vision Tester for the Ruidoso schools; contributions to DECA, supporting the baseball park; Little League football; New Mexico Eye Bank; granting four scholarships to Ruidoso High School seniors; supporting the New Mexico High School Lions Band; and Lions Band donation to Debbie Coker; supporting Babe Ruth League.

— Donating eye glasses; supporting the Altrusa Club's Florcade; contributing to

the mechanical department of the high school; Wade Briley fund drive; Boy Scouts fund drive; sponsored Little League football teams; Lions International Foundation; helping send local girls to the state basketball tournament;

— Supporting the Brownies and Girl Scouts; assisting Michelle Brannon, an injured nurse; supporting athletics at White Mountain Middle School; supporting the handicapped skiers through the Ruidoso CBers drive; helping Kathy Boyer with a nursing school donation; contributing to the Shane Watts fund; donations to the students at Ft. Stanton and buying candy from the New Mexico Lions to distribute between the Ruidoso, Hondo Valley Hospital and the Ft. Stanton School.

## Spring snow brings power outages here

A spring snow storm caused power outages in scattered areas throughout Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs Wednesday.

Community Public Service officials said heavy wet snow caused trees to bend into nearby power lines, blowing fuses on transformers and knocking power out for as long as two hours in some areas.

A company spokesman said as far as he knew power had been restored to all subscribers by yesterday.

He added that a few summer homes located far up in the canyons may still be without power. He said there was no way of telling until the owners returned.

## Prisoners bolt county jail

Three prisoners escaped early Wednesday morning from the Lincoln County jail in Carrizozo. Sheriff Bill Elliott said. Gregory Woods, 28, Alamogordo,

overpowered jailer Alton Talley at about 3:15 a.m., and locked him in a cell, then escaped with prisoners Albert Simpson, 47, Ruidoso, and Fred Aragon, 68, Capitan.

The deputy was unharmed.

"We have only one person on duty at that time, so no one discovered the escape until 7 a.m.," Elliott said.

"They had about a three hour head start on us, but we have some ideas."

Simpson was imprisoned on charges of allegedly embezzling over \$2,500, Woods was serving time for armed robbery and Aragon was being held for the Department

of Corrections for alleged parole violation, Elliott said Wednesday.

Woods left a note which said, "This has nothing to do with the sheriff's department. It has to do with those that can't or won't accept a person wanting or really having a desire to change from wrong to right, having something right to live for. But these people like to play dirty games to stop it. These few hurt from trying to do right."

Descriptions of the three, who escaped in Talley's 1970 white over yellow, four-wheel drive Chevrolet Suburban, New Mexico

license BZ 4000, are Woods, 5 foot 9, medium length black hair, 155 pounds, green eyes; Simpson, 5 foot 10, short sandy hair, 145 pounds, hazel eyes; Aragon, 5 foot 4, short grey hair, 135 pounds, brown eyes.

During the escape, Steve McCorkle, Hobbs, came in "to get out of the weather and wait for a friend to pick him up" because his motorcycle had broken down, Elliott said.

"McCorkle was put in the cell with Talley, and, then when McCorkle's friend Don Claypool of Hobbs got there, he was thrown in the cell, too."

## New landfill to open

A new sanitary landfill to serve Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and other Lincoln County residents and communities, located about six miles from the crest of Alto Hill on the road to Ft. Stanton, is expected to be operational next month.

Upon opening the new site, the present landfill serving Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs will be closed, except for commercial use and cleanups. Only village trucks will be permitted to use this facility.

"All other haulers," Ruidoso village manager Jim Hine said, "will have to use the new site. This applies to individuals as well as home builders and contractors. There will be no exceptions."

The road leading to the site will be prepared by Lincoln County crews and, for a short time after the landfill is opened, county equipment will be used to cover each day's deposit.

"Tentatively, the Village of Ruidoso will operate the landfill starting sometime in July," Hine said.

To reach the new landfill, leave Highway 37 at the entrance to Alto Village, turn left at the first gravel road, then continue on that road until reaching the site. Signs will be installed prior to the site's opening.

Pending August delivery of a 30 yard capacity compactor truck, the present village trucks will be making trash runs to the new site. As soon as the new truck is operating, it will make two trips daily to the landfill.

The village will put up a building to load the compactor unit from existing trucks, in compliance with state regulations.

To facilitate the new service, the village will add 400 garbage containers, varying from 1½ to 3 cubic yards, located throughout the village. One more hydraulically operated truck will be added to the village garbage fleet in July, for a total of three units in operation.

Village officials are seeking the cooperation of Ruidoso and Ruidoso

Downs residents in two areas:

— In reporting the exact location of abandoned vehicles on public or private property. Callers may notify the Ruidoso Police Department, 257-7365, or village purchasing agent Frank Potter, 257-4014, or report them in person. Arrangements will be made, by the village, to dispose of these vehicles.

— In reporting the exact location of dilapidated buildings, sheds or outhouses. The designation by subdivision, lot and block number is preferred for locating buildings. This can be determined by checking with Potter at Ruidoso Village Hall.

"Once this new landfill is operating and our new village trucks are here and containers located throughout our residential and business areas," Hine said, "we will be well on the road to eliminating our garbage and litter problem in the two villages."

# Conservation meeting at Capitan this evening

Lincoln County residents will be given a chance to help appraise the natural resources of the county and develop a conservation program at a public meeting at 7 tonight at the Capitan Public School cafeteria.

The session will be sponsored by the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) and the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District.

According to a conservation district spokesman, what is learned at the meeting will help the USDA direct programs in the natural resources field and will help set the needs and establish goals for the department's programs.

This opportunity to help plan USDA programs is a result of the Resources Conservation Act which President Carter signed into law last November. The law requires public participation and involvement in setting the needs and goals for soil and water conservation, the spokesman said.

The act requires USDA to appraise the natural resources on all private land, develop a five-year program to meet established needs, and evaluate progress every year. The first five-year program, along with the appraisal, must be submitted to Congress by December 31, 1979.

The Resources Conservation Act requires a determination of the quality and quantity of soil, water and related sources, such as wildlife habitat; the ability of these resources to meet current and future demands; changes in resources' conditions because of past uses; the cost and benefits of alternative soil and water conservation practices, and alternative irrigation techniques and their effects on conservation and the environment. These concerns will then be combined with comments from other counties in the state and sent to the Department of Agriculture.



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

### Productivity Rising, But at Slowed Rate

Productivity, or average output per hour of all workers, has been rising over the years, although not always at a steady rate, says the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

From 1901 to 1950, productivity increased by 2 per cent a year. For the next 20 years growth in productivity averaged a little under 3 per cent a year and since 1970, the annual increase has been under 2 per cent.

The result of all these improvements is that today workers produce more than four times the hourly output of workers in the early 1900's.

Advances in technology, greater capital investment, and the increasing skill and education of American workers are among the many causes of the long-term rise in productivity.

**SANTA FE** — Democratic Atty. Gen. Toney Anaya says he will run well in all three major vote-producing areas of New Mexico and that the electoral strength of his opponent, U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, R-N.M., is overrated and still eroding.

Anaya, the most controversial attorney general state government has seen, concedes that the Domenici campaign is much better financed than his but says that could turn out to be a benefit for him.

These and other comments were made in an interview with "Inside the Capitol." Anaya provided his early political assessment in a survey of southern and eastern New Mexico, the northern counties, and metropolitan Albuquerque.

— The attorney general, unopposed in the Democratic primary for the Senate, says his vote base in predominantly Hispanic northern New Mexico "will be extremely strong."

He discounted the notion that "some of the (Democratic) politicians in the North will be upset with me" because of his prosecutorial attempts against veteran army officials.

"The strength is there in the northern counties," he said.

— Anaya claims he is gaining strength in Jernallito County, home of Albuquerque and roughly one-third the state's total vote.

He says he hasn't had enough money to finance a poll of his own but has seen there, and adds, "My strength in

Albuquerque is surprising even Pete Domenici."

Anaya stopped short of claiming he would top Domenici in Albuquerque, where Domenici is from and where he once served as chairman of the city commission. But he said, "We're going to be able to hold our own in Albuquerque."

— The attorney general then turned to the predominantly conservative, predominantly Anglo area of southeastern New Mexico, saying:

"Probably the area where his strength has been the greatest has been the East-side counties. What will hurt him has been the fact he's been on the Senate Energy Committee and has been very ineffectual in representing the interests of New Mexico, whether we're talking about producers or consumers."

"Pete, being in the minority party, has not been able to stand up and fight for their interests in the (proposed Federal) energy package."

Look for a move in the 1979 State Legislature to amend the state's pioneering solar tax credit legislation.

The law was enacted in the 1975 Legislature and was the first in the nation to establish a tax rebate for up to \$1,000 in expenses incurred in installing solar equipment for private residences.

Latest reports show 180 New Mexicans filed claims for \$88,000 in solar rebates for the 1977 tax year.

Federal law doesn't include solar tax incentives yet, but the pending Federal Energy Act does have such provisions. New Mexico's rebate law doesn't allow a taxpayer to seek both state and Federal refunds, but the 1979 Legislature may be asked to amend the '75 act to allow this.

If this is done and the Federal program is enacted, up to 50 percent of costs — possibly expanded to include labor as well as equipment — could be rebated or exempted. This would make solar become "immediately cost-effective" said a state official.

You can bet that Vail or Durango or Santa Fe would not allow an unadorned metal building in their core areas. Neither should we allow it. Our control board should have solid backing in this matter for such problems will continue to surface and should be handled with firmness.

#### RIGHT-TO-WORK FACTS

Since right-to-work legislation is facing the next legislature as a major issue, a recent survey by the U.S. Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics is especially pertinent.

The study covered a 10-year period between 1966 and 1976, showing losses and gains in manufacturing jobs for right-to-work states and non-right-to-work states.

Twenty states ban compulsory unionism with right-to-work laws. They continue to create many more manufacturing jobs than the 30 states which do not have right-to-work laws. The latter include New Mexico.

The 20 states with right-to-work laws show a net gain of 828,200 manufacturing jobs, while the 30 states with non-right-to-work laws suffered a net loss of 1,237,500 such jobs.

Texas, a right-to-work state since 1947, led the entire nation with a gain of 234,200 manufacturing jobs.

Among the 10 states showing the largest increases were nine with right-to-work laws: Texas, North Carolina, Florida, Tennessee, South Carolina, Mississippi, Virginia, Arkansas, Georgia and Alabama.

The only non-right-to-work state in the top 10 was California, which showed a gain of 115,400 or seven percent. New York showed a loss of 454,400 manufacturing jobs, for a minus 23 percent. — News-Bulletin, Belem



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



## Social Security information

According to Gordon Lunsford, social security field representative, starting this year employers are required to pay social security employer taxes on any cash tips earned by their employees which are "deemed to be wages under the Fair Labor Standards Act." Under that Act an employer can pay an employee less than the Federal minimum wage by an amount equal to tips received by the employee, but not less than half the minimum wage.

"This sounds confusing, doesn't it? Let's take an example. Suppose a waitress is paid a salary of \$1.50 per hour plus tips. Since the minimum wage is now \$2.65, the employer will have to pay social security tax on all tips received up to \$1.15 per hour (the difference in the \$1.50 salary and the \$2.65 minimum wage)," Lunsford said.

"Using the example above, if a waitress works 40 hours in a week, she would receive a salary of \$60. Suppose she receives tips of \$50 that week, making her total remuneration \$110. Forty hours at the minimum wage rate would be \$106. The employer would have to pay social security tax on her salary of \$60 plus tips of \$46 (\$106-\$60). The employee pays social security tax on all her tips in this example.

"If the employer pays a salary of \$2.65 or more, then he would have no social security tax liability on tips received by his employee."

A Forest Range Tour is planned for May 9 starting at 9:00 a.m., at the firehall in Cloudercroft. This is a follow up of the Range Management Short Course held last year in Cloudercroft and Carrizozo. All permittees from the Lincoln Forest are urged to attend.

The tour includes a visit to an allotment where a range transect will be explained. How the range transect is used to get range use trends and management implications will be reviewed. Other stops on the tour include prescribed burning and wood cutting problems. There will also be a panel discussion on Forest Range Management problems.

**METRIC SYSTEM GOOD** for agriculture: A lot of Americans are getting shipped up to a froth over the change to metric measurements. Just hearing a radio announcer give the temperature in Celsius can turn them purple.

True, we did throw off the yoke of England back in 1776. But we can never declare our independence from the world. We're on the same planet with everyone else, and everyone else uses the metric system (except for people in Burma, Liberia, Brunei and Yemen). Few if any countries can thrive without world trade, and the United States is certainly not one of them. We need to do everything we can to encourage rather than discourage international buyers for American products, in order to counteract the enormous outward flow of American dollars for foreign goods. Pure and simple, switching to metric makes economic sense. Foreign buyers trade in kilograms, not pounds — in millimeters, not inches — in liters, not quarts.

On the domestic scene there are advantages too. The metric system is not only more precise, it's also easier after you get used to it. The federal government didn't initiate the move to metric. Industry did. It wants to be "in total harmony with the rest of the industrial and commercial world," says the National Association of

Manufacturers. The United States can't always be ahead of the rest of the world, but at least we can keep up. So I'm going to get out my handy metric converter and start practicing. Why don't you?

## State agency offering hotline phone number

Anyone wanting to know about programs for handicapped persons in New Mexico should call 1-800-432-4265. This is a toll-free number sponsored by the State Division of Vocational Rehabilitation (DVR).

The person answering the phone refers callers to the organization which offers the assistance or information they need.

Director Robert A. Swanson said DVR initiated the toll-free number this month to make it easier for handicapped citizens to contact his agency and other programs which may be able to help them.

Vocational Rehabilitation is a division of the State Department of Education. It provides counseling, medical assistance, and job placement services to qualified handicapped persons. DVR clients must have physical or mental disabilities which interfere with their ability to pursue a gainful occupation or to function as a homemaker, or which threaten their continued employment. Also, there must

be a reasonable chance the client will be able to engage in a suitable occupation after receiving DVR services.

The disabilities of people helped through vocational rehabilitation have included blindness, heart disease, speech and hearing impairments, mental illness, mental retardation, paralysis, loss of limbs, alcoholism, epilepsy, diabetes, and cerebral palsy.

DVR has offices and/or rehabilitation facilities located in Alamogordo, Albuquerque, Carlsbad, Clovis, Espanola, Farmington, Gallup, Hobbs, Las Cruces, Las Vegas, Roswell and Silver City. It plans to open an office in Raton before July.



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

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

# Sunland Park Hoofbeats

**POCKET COIN**, sired by Master Hand, scored the largest win margin in Saturday's trials for the upcoming \$201,950 Riley Allison Futurity. He won by 7 1/2 lengths in a wire-to-wire blaze of speed. But the fastest time of the day was set by Trippy Dip who covered the five-furlong distance in 57 4/5 seconds with a 6 1/4-length victory margin.

Here's the list of 12 trial-winners as they qualified for the May 7 finale: Draconic's Miss, Tim's Markive, Hondo Leader, Looms Pistol, Light Fandango, Bye Bye Mito, Johnny Mito, Dandy Binge, Trippy Dip, Pocket Coin, Mity Mito and Majestic Blade.

**THE BIGGEST SUPRISE** to the fans was Tim's Markive who qualified in the second division after leaving the gate with almost 17-1 odds. The colt, trained by Whitey Nolen, came from well off the pace to take control in the stretch and finished 2 1/4 lengths in front for a \$3,200 return.

**JOCKEY CHARLES MUELLER** qualified the most mounts, crossing the finish line with Draconic's Miss (\$26), Dandy Binge (\$15.80) and Pocket Coin (\$3.20). J. J. Fletcher led the trainers as two of his charges took places in the finale lineup. They are Hondo Leader and Bye Bye Mito. Top rider Carlos Rivas guided both of Fletcher's charges.

**DARLENE ADAMS** was the only lady trainer to qualify a finalist. Her filly, Draconic's Miss, made her racing debut in the first division and cleared the field by 1 1/2 lengths after leading the entire five furlongs. Draconic's Miss is owned by the Johnson Stables of Hobbs, N. M.

**MITO AND DRACONIC** sired the most offspring in the finale of the Riley Allison. Mito sired Bye Bye Mito and Mity Mito and is the grandsire of Johnny Mito, while Draconic's blood is apparent in Dandy Binge and Draconic's Miss.

**THE SECOND-PLACE FINISHERS** in the trials qualified for the \$10,000 Consolation to be run Saturday, May 6. They are: Saurkraut, Lanyons Road, Easy Million, Pesky Ruler, Regal Scout, Mighty Restless, Duquessa, Ernest Scout, Festos, Allegiance, Scout Kiss, and Cheryl's Home.

**WELL-KNOWN RACE DRIVER A. J. Foyt**, who's won the Indianapolis 500 four times, was on hand over the racing weekend. But not as your average spectator. He watched his two-year-old thoroughbred, Rotten Peaches, make her racing debut in the trials for the Riley Allison Futurity. Though the filly failed to qualify, she displayed good early speed and held on for a third-place finish.

**APPRENTICE CASH ASMUSSEN**, who notched his first victory on a recognized racetrack at Sunland a few weeks ago aboard Pirate Island, hasn't been wasting his time since. Friday night, he was aboard Hattab Voladora in the feature and coasted to an easy 10-length win at 5 1/2 furlongs for a \$5 return. Then he was back on Saturday aboard Allegiance who took

the runnerup slot and qualified for the Riley Allison Futurity Consolation. The young rider plans to spend the summer riding at Ruidoso Downs.

**THE SUMMIT**, a promising Easy Jet colt, put on a burst of speed and thrust his head across the wire to grab the winner's share of \$4,955 in the Sun Country Futurity Consolation Friday night. The colt now holds a record of two wins and one second from three starts. Rosie Tario finished second in the 350-yard bout, followed by Loom Son.

**THE HOOPER HONKER**, a top breadwinner in the Appaloosa world, made an appearance in the Texas Appaloosa Allowance trials Friday (eighth race) and came through with flying colors. The gelding jetted to the front in the 440-yard spin and stayed there to notch his third win from four starts this year and set the top qualifying time for the Allowance in 21.95 seconds. Jockey W. R. Hunt handled the reins.

**APPRENTICE DON HOWARD** nabbed both ends of Friday night's daily double and neither of his mounts was heavily regarded by the fans. First he guided Bad Music, a thoroughbred who got off at 18-1, in a short 870-yard bout, and scored an impressive 2 1/4-length victory. Then he struck again aboard Chrissy Sissy (7-1) with a come-from-behind stretch move that put him four lengths to the good at the end of a mile route. Patrons with the 5-1 Daily Double combination received \$134.20.

**THE HIGHEST WIN PAYOFF** of the weekend and the second highest of the spring season turned up in Sunday's fifth race when Coming Good, a 57-1 longshot, managed to muster a final attack in the stretch of a mile route and chalked up a half-length victory against maidens for a \$117.20 payoff. The even-odds favorite, Mr. Whalen (No. 3) took second.

**VETERAN RIDER JACK WALLACE**, who won the All-American Futurity in 1966 aboard Savannah, Jr., was back in action in Sunday's eighth race. He rode Proven Boy to a fourth-place finish in a mile route. Wallace retired from riding four years ago after a rough spill at the New Mexico State Fair which resulted in a severe neck injury. But Wallace reports the injury is well-healed and he'll be riding at Santa Fe Downs this summer. He's spent the last few years as the lead singer in a country-western band, The Rounders.

**THE HIGHEST EXACTA PAYOFF** (\$669.60) of the 77-78 season was returned

on the 10-7 combination in Sunday's ninth race when Folly Scout (9-1) crossed the finish line first followed by Dainty Blue Beam (94-1) a length behind. The place payoff on Dainty Blue Beam was \$65.

**JOCKEY STEPHEN RODRIGUEZ** hit the turf when his mount, Sweet Nightynite, hit the inside rail during the running of Sunday's rich Sun Country Futurity. Rodriguez was badly shaken but uninjured in the incident.

**CLAIMING ACTIVITY:** Colorado Run was taken by W. C. Makin for \$2,500; Touch A Toab (Warren N. Moore) \$4,000.

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# GOING Strong

## This Grandfather is a Great Big Brother

Some people might find it unusual for a man with eight grandchildren to be active in the Big Brother program—the average age is about 30—but don't tell that to 66 year old Larry Jones of suburban Austin, Texas.

"After my wife died I was looking for something to do that would be a benefit to society as well as to myself," Jones told a writer from The National Council on the Aging.

In his search for something to do ("There are plenty of charities where you can do good deeds," he said), he discovered there are around 8,000 single-parent children in the Austin area between the ages of 7 and 17, many of whom would benefit from the Big Brother or Big Sister programs.

Something about the program struck a responsive chord and Jones was soon totally involved. He tries to save every Saturday for his teenaged little brother and drives into Austin to get him, then returning to his

rambling spread outside the city.

"I should say I reserve Saturday for us," Jones said. "I think the adults get as much out of the program as the kids they work with. It's great to help a youngster develop but it's also pretty nice to realize that's you're still capable of growth as well. That's a wonderful thing for a person in their 60's to know."

Larry and his little brother spend their Saturdays in various ways. Sometimes that includes a driving lesson in a decrepit old pickup. In the summer months they might go waterskiing or fishing in Jones's boat. And just so he won't get spoiled, Jones tries to include some chores in their schedule.

"We'll fix my old windmill or patch an old watering trough," Jones said. "It's hard to keep from spoiling these kids and it's something you really don't want to do."

Jones has become so committed to Big Brother that he is now a member of the Board of Directors. He

occasionally visits college fraternity houses trying to convince the young college men of the benefits to be derived from volunteering their time to the program.

A man with a catch-all mind and an interest in everything, which is an accurate description of Larry Jones, might be the ideal Big Brother, adding countless ideas to his young companion's scope and perceptions of life.

Jones will tell you that the same thing happens to the Big Brother, too. "I got interested in worms," he said. "Can you imagine that? I even built a worm farm, but it got so involved that I had to stop. I might have done something like that before I got in the program, but I doubt it. I find that I'm interested in things the way I was 40 years ago."

Maybe that's the reason Larry Jones doesn't think it strange that a man his age should be a Big Brother. His little brother doesn't think it's strange, either. He thinks it's great.
