

# Fire prevention problems outlined

At the fire prevention steering committee meeting Thursday, the group outlined problem areas in Ruidoso and discussed enforcement of existing regulations to eliminate the problems.

"We've uncovered the needs and problems of fire prevention," Herb Brunell, committee chairman said, "and most are covered by ordinances and regulations. So it's a problem of enforcement."

Problem areas determined by the committee, for which priorities for action will be established at the next meeting, include:

— Steep streets and narrow dirt roads, which hamper response of fire units. "The Upper Canyon has 2,700 structures and if there was a fire, there's one road in and one road out. The same situation exists in the Black Forest. If there's a fire in either area, fire units will be trying to go in and residents will be trying to go out and this causes problems."

— A lack of street signs. "Occasionally when a visitor has a fire, he will have no idea where he is and can't direct the fire units," James Hine, village manager, told the committee, "\$8,000 for the purchase of street signs was included in the upcoming village budget, and I suggest the group

attend a council meeting to emphasize the need."

— Housing and construction practices. "Contractors build in heavy fuels with no hazard reduction, owners don't live in the town year 'round and needles accumulate and homes don't have spark arrestors on chimneys." Another problem area is construction of open decks where people store firewood and inflammable items. "People are ignorant of the fire danger (in storing firewood under the deck). They think they are protecting their firewood." Another problem is slash from developments dumped into canyons "where it dries out and just waits to burn."

— Faulty installation of fireplaces and electrical wiring. "Some homeowners are do-it-yourselfers, coming up only on weekends and with little or no training in building."

A member of the committee told the group Ruidoso had unique environmental factors conducive to fires including the fuel type of thick growths of young ponderosa pine trees, weather patterns of hot, high winds coupled with low humidity and topography of narrow V-shaped canyons.

"It's also a unique area because people come here for the trees and don't want to cut them, some people only come up for two weeks of the year and because there

will be 50,000 people in town one day and substantially less the next," he added. "People come here and think all the trees are desirable, but they should clear out the undergrowth or at least the growth next to their homes. They need to be educated that removal of some trees does not ruin the aesthetic value of their homes and land."

In other business Thursday, the committee:

- Discussed selection of a name for the committee, but postponed a decision.
- Set a quorum at five of the eight members.
- Determined the scope of the com-

mittee as "providing a fire prevention plan for the area with input from other agencies."

— Heard a report from Hine, the sanitary landfill will be open on Saturdays and Sundays as long as there is a need, which will be determined by usage.

— Accepted the resignation of member Larry Montero.

Attending were Brunell, Dorothy Kimsey, Kathy Moore for Barbara Duff, Don Rash for John Hall, and Frank for Mickie Potter, representatives of the Planning and Zoning commission, Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department, Forest Service and state Division of Forestry.

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## Tim Morris named airport group director

Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager Tim Morris recently was elected to the board of directors of the newly formed New Mexico Airport Managers Association.

The association, which was formed to allow input from all state airport executives, will discuss problems with general and military aviation, including military low level, high speed craft.

At the next meeting, Morris said the 35-member group will discuss third level carriers, commuter airlines and the proposed Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

"We hope through the organization, we can help each other, and solve problems common to all of us," Morris said.

Associated with the Ruidoso airport for seven years, Morris has been the manager for four years.

He has a BS in education from Texas Tech in Lubbock and formerly taught in San Antonio and Lubbock.

Morris, who also is a member of the American Association of Airport Executives, has flown for 13 years.

## Mescalero's resolution needed for SBAC action

Four of five resolutions from area governing bodies authorizing the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) to act on their behalf were received at the commission's Thursday afternoon meeting.

Standardized resolutions allowing the commission chairman to acquire land for the proposed regional airport were

received from the Lincoln County Commissioners and the village councils of Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Capitan.

The remaining resolution, from the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council, will probably be forthcoming as "there's no reason to think we'll run into any serious difficulties," Richard Hall, commission chairman, reported for Wyndham Run-

ningwater, tribal representative to the commission, who was out of state.

Runningwater told Hall signing of the resolution will be held up, as tribal council president Wendell Chino will be out of town until May 21 and the next tribal council meeting has not been scheduled.

When the fifth resolution is received, the airport commission will resubmit all applications pertaining to the proposed airport to the Federal Aviation Administration regional offices in Fort Worth, Texas.

In other business, Hall reported to the commission, two private citizens had contacted the state director of aviation and the secretary of transportation in Santa Fe to discuss the regional airport.

Hall said he would encourage private input, but warned contact from commission members at this point in the airport development might be "like crying wolf. I feel the commission members should wait until we have progress to report or we have a problem."

Also at the meeting, the board:

— Heard a report the quarterly reports had been completed.

— Heard a report the budget proposal submitted to the five governing bodies had been built into the upcoming budgets, which would be approved in the near future.

— Approved a logo design prepared by Ivan Hall, Southern New Mexico Economic Development District (SNMEDD) and ordered a small supply of stationery, as the address will be revised soon.

— Heard a report Congressman Manuel Lujan had replied to a letter from the commission sent to the United States representatives and senators.

— Made lengthy revisions to the minutes of the special meeting and postponed approval until the June meeting. April minutes were approved.

Attending the meeting were commissioners Hall, Terry Strickland, George Shoemaker and Norman Wheeler, county liaison Les Olsen, district office manager for Senator Harrison Schmitt, Betty King, from SNMEDD, Nick Pappas and Bill Perkins, and Ruidoso Downs village clerk Virginia Spall.

The next meeting of the commission will be at 2 p.m., June 1 at the Ruidoso Downs village hall.

## Seco Mia wins Top Deck Stakes

Seco Mia, a chestnut filly ridden by Jackie Martin, jumped into an early lead and stayed on top all the way in Sunday's renewal of the Top Deck Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.


Seco Mia ended the 350-yard dash with a 1 1/4-length lead and collected \$3,510 out of the gross purse of \$5,850. The winning time, recorded against a mild headwind, was 18.15 seconds.

Fans who backed Seco Mia collected \$11.20, \$4.60 and \$4 even to show. The filly is owned by the Cryan Ranch of Sealy, Texas.

Go Go Cookie, piloted by Bennie Melson, sailed in second as a 13-1 longshot. The tote returns were \$8.20 and \$4.40. Eyes of Excitement got in third under Larry Byers and paid \$5.20.

Seco Mia quickly established herself as the one to be reckoned with in the Top Deck by getting an extremely alert break from the gate. Before she was more than 20 yards down the track, she was a good length on top. Some weaving and bumping went on behind her, and that served to give her more elbow room.

At the halfway point, Seco Mia was clearly in command, and no pressure appeared to be looming. Go Go Cookie, sticking close to the rail, began making up ground in the final 100 yards or so, but was no match for the winner. Eyes of Excitement settled in second place early in the sprint, but drifted to third when Go Go

Cookie mustered that strong closing move. Loma Vista Man, launched as an odds-on favorite, got off to a sluggish start and was out of the picture all the way. But the gelding made up ground at the end.

Sunday's co-feature hooked up three-year-olds at 5 1/2 furlongs and served as a tuneup — and kind of preview — of the upcoming Memorial Day Handicap. But matters turned out far from expected when Prince of Darkness, a 52-1 darkhorse, swept by some classy hor-

seflesh in the homestretch to win by two lengths in a brilliant performance. The colt, ridden by Charles Mueller, came from out of ninth place.

At the top of the stretch, The Drake made a big move on the outside and had all the earmarks of a winner. Hopeful Journey, the betting favorite, was briefly in the lead and looked like a solid threat. Big Bad Blitz, a 10-1 shot, was also bickering for the lead.

But Prince of Darkness was intimidated

by none of this talent and went thundering into the lead at mid-stretch. Both The Drake and Hopeful Journey were backing up at the end.

Prince of Darkness returned a juicy \$105.40 on a \$2 win ticket. The opening weekend handle of \$781,569 was 5.5 percent above last year's \$740,789 for the two race days.

Racing resumes at Ruidoso Thursday with a 12:30 p.m. post time for the Kansas Futurity trials.

Steve Perry said the airport saw about 65 planes land per day over the weekend. He said that about 150 gallons of jet-A and 100 gallons of fuel were used during the weekend.

## Carrizozo plane crash kills two Kansas men

The bodies of two Kansas men were discovered Saturday morning, at the site of an airplane crash two miles west of Carrizozo, by Major T. C. Ashby of the Civil Air Patrol, Douglas Jerrard, manager of the Carrizozo airport and Carrizozo policeman Randy Spear.

Ashby, on a routine patrol attempt to locate a 1964 single engine Bellanca enroute to Tempe, Arizona, from Tucumcari, reported missing May 5, spotted the wreckage. He landed at Carrizozo and with Jerrard and Spear, verified the crash and fatalities about 11:50 a.m.

The dead men were identified as Jack Hannah, 50, Kansas City, Kansas, and

Leonard Winkler, 28, Overland Park, Kansas.

Lt. Guy Bowers, Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and Sgt. Jack Johnson, New Mexico State Police (NMSP), questioned area residents Saturday and conducted the initial investigation at the scene. "The plane scattered on impact," Bowers said to The News, "and didn't burn or explode. The largest piece was a tail section about eight feet long."


Sunday's investigation, after the area was sealed Saturday, was conducted by James Valentine of the Federal Aviation Administration, Albuquerque; Geo. Baker, National

Transportation Safety Board, Aurora, Colorado; Dale Housely, Carrizozo, and Jim Hiltzley, Corona, NMSP and Bowers.

The investigation revealed, Bowers said, that from the initial impact to the main portion of the wreckage "was a distance of approximately 653 feet." It was suspected, Bowers said, "that the right wing hit the ground first, as blue navigational light glass was found at that point."

Results of the investigation showed that there were high winds the night of the accident and that ground visibility was low.

The bodies of the two men were taken to Albuquerque Saturday, by ambulance, for autopsy.

# Countess Blade wins inaugural

Countess Blade, the filly who was named Horse of The Meet at Ruidoso Downs last summer, ran away with Saturday's \$6,500 Inaugural Purse.


The six furlong spin helped wrap up the most successful opening day program in the track's 31-year history. An estimated crowd of 6,400 was on hand and wagered \$430,507.

The previous opening day record was set at \$400,955 last year.

In the Inaugural, Countess Blade jumped into an early lead under Gilbert Villescas and stayed on top all the way. Bradley's Kunumera took a run at the filly at the turn for home, but she shook him off easily and opened up to win by 1 1/4 lengths. She clocked the six furlongs in 1:13 2/5 seconds and refunded \$3.40, \$2.40 and \$2.20.

Bradley's Kunumera came in second as the second choice, paying \$2.60 and \$2.20. Trail Driver made up ground willingly to take third, refunding \$2.20.

Saturday's program also included ten 400-yard elimination trials for the upcoming \$139,100 Kansas Derby. Biffy Pass set the top time at 20.07 seconds. The other qualifiers: Real Easy Jet, 20.18; Easy Move, 20.23; Shesa Easy Gypsy, 20.25 1/2; Stoa Minga, 20.26; Triangle Pass, 20.28; Bunny Mackay, 20.30; Mr. Big Wheel, 20.30; Easy Klas, 20.30 1/2; I'm Gates Gal, 20.31.





More and more each day we hear more clearly the joyful music in the air sounding from the harmonies of Heaven and earth. Our step grows lighter over the green mountain meadows and we feel we are almost ready to fly in the air, now fragrant with so many spring flowers — and rejoice with the singing birds of the air.

That little messenger of late spring and summer, the wild rose, is already forming buds with a touch of pink — letting us know that soon they will be out in their full color, sending their fragrance everywhere on the mild spring-time breeze. The wild rose is more welcome each year for the happiness it brings.

### Rapid Growth Begins

This is being sent to you on May the tenth. This month has been very slow in making its growth of leaf, grass and fruit. Surely the growing things knew something about the cold snap which came during the first week or so of May. The oak brush on the hill is out green in patches and pink in other places. A few days ago there were places where the oak brush was winter gray. The green is for the leaf, and the pink is for the buds. The oak brush is one of the most cautious of all the plants in leafing out. Some of the walnut trees on the river had hardly put out their leaf buds. You would look up and down the river and see one tree still in its winter sleep and wonder what had happened. When you looked closely you saw that the tree was just barely starting its buds.

Today the whole picture has changed. It is cloudy overhead all through the vale, and the west wind is blowing gently, and at the same time the air is very warm and balmy, and you can feel the moisture on the wind.

This is a perfect combination for rapid growth. On a little pear tree the young pears are taking shape and you can almost see them grow. There is a smell of oak brush and walnut leaves blending in the air — an incense of the new growth.

### The Yucca Sprouts

On the plants of our state flower, the Yucca, suddenly there have appeared the new green shoots growing up among last year's gray stalks with the open seed pods up at the top.

You never saw these new stalks spring up so suddenly and grow so rapidly. They are making up for lost time, now that the cold wave is over, calling upon their great vitality stored in their roots deep in the ground.

The Yucca is the pride and joy of our state, and is admired the world over. The large clusters of pearly white blooms on the stalks from six to ten feet tall stretching across the plains, foothills and mesas and hillsides of the southwest — this is a sight to behold and treasure always.

On moonlight nights the clusters of flowers catch the rays of the moon and

glow with a bright radiance matching the glory of the moon itself.

For this reason the Early Spaniards called the Yucca, "Las Velas De Dios," (The Candles of God).

We may look forward to a wonderful display of the beauty of our state flower, later on in the Spring.

### The Swallow Band Pays a Visit


The swallows have been up from Mexico for several days, circling in the sky, and flying around the river gathering mud for their nests.

### CONGRESSMEN

Congress is displaying signs of nervousness about its recent decision to shore up the Social Security system by means of a tax increase.

The increase in payroll taxes would not take effect until next January. But now there is doubt that Congress will stand hitched.

The congressional action last December was courageous and responsible. It was necessary to keep the system solvent. It is always easy and popular for the Congress to vote to increase benefits to the people from government programs. It is never easy and popular for the Congress to increase taxes to pay for those benefits.

The impact of the Social Security tax increase needs to be analyzed. It would not fall equally upon all wage-earners. The increase would be modest for those earning less than \$17,700 a year. Most of the new money would come from the more affluent salaried workers. The payroll tax system would be made more progressive so that the wealthier workers would pay more nearly the same proportion of their salaries as the workers at the lower end of the income scale.

And, presumably, it is from these upper and middle income workers that the protests are coming to the Capitol. Democratic congressmen are listening. The Republican congressmen, who voted as a bloc against the Social Security tax increase, are threatening to make it a campaign issue in this election year.

The Social Security tax increase legislation was not perfect. Few acts of Congress are. But it does the job. Before the Congress and the President toss it away, they better have an alternative program ready to stave off bankruptcy, a program they can sell to the people as fair and prudent. —Deming Headlight

### BETTY FORD CANDOR

When Gerald Ford was president and Nelson Rockefeller was vice president, both Betty Ford and "Happy" Rockefeller underwent breast surgery within a short time. At considerable sacrifice of privacy, the two spoke frankly about their ordeal and stressed the importance of periodic examination to catch breast cancer at an early stage.

They, particularly Mrs. Ford, thus performed a conspicuous service to the nation's women, encouraging them to take precautions that have saved many lives. Now Mrs. Ford is making a similar contribution by openly confronting her problem of dependence on drugs and alcohol.

The easier way would have been to quietly drop out of sight for a time and take a course of treatment, and say nothing about it. Even the wife of a former president can do that, though the word may eventually get out. After a couple of understandable false starts (Ford initially said she was hospitalized for an "acute attack of arthritis," and she first referred to her problem as "overmedication") Mrs. Ford is following the harder road of candor.

We commend her for her courage and public spirit. The disclosures about her condition will focus attention on the widespread practice of mixing alcohol and pain pills or other medication. That practice may have dangerous, sometimes even fatal, consequences. By "going public," and emphasizing that there is help for this problem, Betty Ford is performing a valuable service. —Alamogordo Daily News
