

Travis named director of state group

New Mexico Emergency Services Council (ESC) delegate for White Mountain Search and Rescue, Dave Travis, told the group Tuesday evening he had been elected to the 11-person executive board.

Accompanied by Jane and Alden Deyo, Travis and his daughter, Gayle, traveled to the state ESC meeting at Philmont Scout Ranch in Cimarron, New Mexico last week.

In addition to being elected as a member of the board of directors, Travis was assigned to a committee which will investigate qualifications for certification of state field coordinators.

While at the meeting, Travis and Deyo invited the 100 to 150 member organization to have their September 9 quarterly meeting in Ruidoso. During the meeting, a one day training session on search and rescue techniques will be offered.

Travis has been a delegate to the state ESC for two years.

In other business Tuesday evening, the organization:

- Voted to amend the bylaws to require dues by March 1. Those persons not paying by March will receive written notice and will be dropped by March 31 if the dues are not received within the time period.

- Voted to table adoption of an amendment to the bylaws allowing 18 to 21 year olds to join, until Travis can look into insurance possibilities.

- Discussed the training session in land navigation and tracking scheduled for Sunday.

- Discussed first aid packs for the members to take during rescue missions.

- Discussed acquisition of reflective

tape to seal off areas, mark trails and boundaries.

- Nominated a committee of Dave Wilson, Alden Deyo, Harve Foster, Rex Skellett and Joe Tullis to coordinate a program for the September 9 state ESC meeting.

- Named Skellett and Travis as summer program coordinators.

- Voted to work on a van through the summer, beginning with a session Wednesday evening.

The next official meeting of the group will be in September.

Fire prevention practices urged on area visitors

With the present hot, dry weather conditions the fire prevention steering committee warned visitors and residents to be cautious with ashes, charcoal and campfires.

"The area is drying out fast and we're back into fire danger," a committee member said Tuesday.

"We've been fortunate this year. Fire occurrence has been very low in the Ruidoso area."

The committee also encouraged visitors planning a spring clean up to consider fire hazard reduction including removing pine needles from roofs and gutters, clearing out undergrowth and small trees and checking fireplaces for soot build up and structural defects and, if necessary, install spark arrestors.

The sanitary landfill on the old Fort Stanton Road is open daily for dumping of all debris, including fire fuels.

Proposed four lane probably years away

Persons waiting for the start of construction on a proposed four-lane, limited-access highway linking Amarillo, Texas with Las Cruces, New Mexico had best not hold their breath, according to state and federal highway officials, three U. S. senators and a past chairman of the New Mexico state highway commission.

Though all agree the upgrading of U. S. 70 and U. S. 80 between the two cities would be economically beneficial to southwestern New Mexico and a logical route, no one has been able to venture even a tentative guess on when the project will make the final drawing board.

According to John Sudderth, past long time member of the highway commission and past chairman of the commission, the proposal to link the two cities with a four lane highway has been batted around since 1960.

Currently Lincoln County Commission chairman, Sudderth said every election year someone has come out with a push for the project; so far with little results.

An official with the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) said, "Really there just hasn't much happened; it's cleared a senate committee, but has a long ways to go before it becomes a reality."

The official, who declined to be identified, said the New Mexico division of the FHWA has not to his knowledge, received any word to proceed with any type of programming on the project. He was unsure if plans existed for the construction project but said he doubted it.

State highway Roswell District engineer J. J. "Buddy" Hewitt has said he was not aware of any active programming on the U. S. 70 project, which he said was a requisite preceding any proposed construction.

A Washington D. C. spokesman for New Mexico's U. S. Senator Pete Domenici said Tuesday the legislation enabling funding for the project could sit on the senate floor for quite some time following approval by the senate's Committee on Environment and Public Works.

That approval was given last Thursday by way of committee passage of a more than \$8 billion public highway bill for the construction of primary highways nationwide.

Members of the senate committee questioned provisions of the bill which reportedly would draw money from the nation's interstate highway fund for use by the states on a 90-10 matching basis.

A compromise was reportedly drawn up, establishing the Amarillo-Las Cruces route as a demonstration of the new funding concept for primary road construction.

Hewitt said past primary road funding has been on a 70-30 basis with the federal government paying for 70 percent of a project and the individual states picking up the remaining 30 percent tab.

A spokesman for Texas' U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen, sponsor of the bill, agreed last Friday that the bill could sit in the

Sheriff's budget passes muster

In approving a record high budget of \$245,273 for the Lincoln County Sheriff's department, the Lincoln Board of County Commissioners Monday issued three orders aimed at keeping the sheriff's department solvent.

During the special budget session, chairman John Sudderth said he would approve the sheriff's budget with three provisions:

- 1 - That as board chairman, Sudderth said he would not sign any "in-the-red warrants."

- 2 - That all vehicle equipment purchase orders be recalled and all future purchases be cleared by the board.

- 3 - That four surplus sheriff's vehicles, currently used periodically by sheriff's department volunteers, be parked and sold at auction.

Commissioners George L. "Lee" Straley and G. H. "Shorty" Stoneman agreed with Sudderth and voted to issue the three orders.

"I think the sheriff's doing a fine job," Sudderth said, "but, just like the rest of us, he's got to live within his budget."

While surpassing the current fiscal year mark of \$191,431, the figure falls \$23,695 short of the sheriff's requested budget of \$215,126.

Tentative approval was given to the remainder of the county budget which will probably be about \$819,398 for 26 county programs. According to county manager Les Olsen, the budget should be firm, but it is subject to state approval.

Other Monday board action included:

- Formal approval for purchase of the building from Johnson Stearns to house the proposed Lincoln County - Carrizozo Medical Center. Three payments totaling \$28,000 will be made for the building which is located north of the current Carrizozo health facility.

- The award of a bid to Armco Steel Corporation for 115 sections of culvert to be used in school bus routes. Armco

submitted the apparent low bid of \$18,099.22.

- No action on a proposed lease purchase bid from Pat Huey which would allow the county to purchase a grid rolling machine by a lease arrangement. The terms of Huey's proposed contract stipulate that he reserves the right to use of the machine. Sudderth said the terms were unacceptable.

- Acceptance of a lien against 25 lots located in the Deer Park Wood Subdivision near Alto Village. The lien will be held until utilities are constructed and installed in the subdivision.

- Acceptance of an El Paso Natural Gas Company franchise allowing the company to dig utilities lines in unincorporated areas of the county.

- Approval of the payroll and warrant register.

- A call for a special meeting of the Lincoln County Commissioners June 9 to canvass the county primary election results.

Master plan survey mailed to area township residents

Owners of property located in the eight township area between Ruidoso and Capitán are receiving a Lincoln County sponsored survey form, the results of which will be used for the development of a master plan for the area.

According to county manager Les Olsen, the survey is an attempt to glean what land owners feel are the chief problems facing development of the eight township area.

Following completion of the survey, the newly formed Extra Territorial Planning Commission (ETPC) will conduct public

hearings centered on the results of the survey, and the findings of the county, Olsen said.

Following the adoption of the master plan by ETPC the survey states, new regulations will be applied in coordination with existing subdivision regulations and will be enforced by the county.

The survey states that planners have too often not included land owners in the plan formulation stage.

"The primary intent of this planning effort is to accommodate the demand for

residential development in a manner which will not disturb the natural beauty which makes this part of New Mexico so very desirable to travelers and natives alike," the survey states.

A cover letter attached to the survey says the idea for the formulation of a master plan originated out of a concern for preservation of forest and agricultural land, pollution problems, junk yards, animal pens, transportation problems, water availability and a number of other, undefined, problems.

The letter further states: "Some of the issues which this (master) plan will deal with include: Regulations for hillside development; enforcement of covenant restrictions which are being violated in some existing developments; enforcement of appropriate design standards for subdivision roads; designation and preservation of farm, ranch and scenic lands; contact of land uses along highways, (and) much more."

Olsen said he may be contacted at 643-2313, Carrizozo, regarding any questions which might arise concerning the survey.

Chamber may revamp auxiliaries

The directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce voted at their Wednesday meeting to conduct a mem-

bership drive May 30 and hold a meeting June 8 to discuss reorganizing or replacing the Ambassadors' auxiliary group.

After compilation of an updated list of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs businesses, the board, with the assistance of auxiliary groups and committees, will canvass the town for new and renewal memberships in addition to contacting present Chamber members.

Named to the committee to organize the drive were Mac MacDougal, Bill Wilson and Wayne Whitlock.

"We need personal contact with businesses," Dave Wilson, board president, said. "Many complain the only contact they have from the Chamber is when the bills are sent out."

In order to develop personal contact, the board voted to organize an auxiliary to act as a public relations committee.

Bylaws of the Ambassadors' group set duties as "official greeters and public relations committee of the Chamber of Commerce," but the organization is "dormant, in hibernation, at best," Wilson said.

"The group is in its current state from neglect by the Chamber. We need to

reorganize and provide a goal."

He added, the Ambassadors' or another Chamber auxiliary could be "a useful working force."

The board agreed to hold a meeting at 7:30 p.m., June 8 in the multipurpose room of the library for the board members, Ambassadors' and communications and public relations committee to plan a working auxiliary group.

In other business, the board voted to have an informal, extended session or retreat the day of June 15 at the Wortley Hotel in Lincoln.

The board also:

- Studied a financial report prepared by accountant Donald Dorman and requested Eddie Parker, treasurer, to present regular reports to the board.

- Heard a request from Wilson, that regular reports from active committees be presented at the monthly board meetings.

- Voted to hold the annual Cadillac Party August 15 at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. The board also discussed having a Lincoln Party instead and possibly adding a Pinto Party. One hundred-sixty-five \$125 tickets will be available for the August 15 event.

- Heard a report from John West, chairman of the August 28-30 Professional Crafts Show, that 143 applications for the 112 spaces had been received and entry judging will begin this week.

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 71.1 of the Mescalero Apache Tribe provides that the Tribal Council shall establish hunting and fishing seasons, bag limits and license fees for persons hunting and fishing on the Mescalero Apache Reservation to ensure the protection and preservation of property, wildlife and natural resources and

WHEREAS, The Tribal Council is authorized to take this action pursuant to its Revised Constitution.

NOW, THE PEOPLE, the following provisions are hereby adopted for the period May 1, 1978 to April 30, 1979:

MESCALERO APACHE HUNTING AND FISHING PROCLAMATION
MESCALERO, NEW MEXICO
1978

Pursuant to Ordinance No. 71.1 of the Mescalero Apache Tribe, the Tribal Council hereby adopts the following rules and regulations governing hunting and fishing on the Mescalero Apache Reservation.

FISHING REGULATIONS
A. Enrolled members of the Mescalero Apache Tribe are not required to procure licenses and are not restricted to any one area, season, or catch limits. Fishing is restricted to all persons in Eagle and Silver Recreation Areas during winter months.

1. Local areas, season, catch limits and fees
A. Ruidoso Recreation Area
Opening Date: May 13, 1978
Closing Date: September 10, 1978

FEES
Fishing: \$3.00 Adult - 12 catch limit per day 24 fish possession limit after the 1st day \$1.50 Child - 6 catch limit per day (Under 14 yrs. of age) 12 fish possession limit after 1st day.

Overnight: \$2.50 first 2 persons plus 50¢ each additional person.
Picnic: \$2.00 car or 50¢ per person in bus.
Silver Springs & Eagle Creek Recreation Areas
Opening Date: May 13, 1978
Closing Date: Silver - To be posted, generally open until lake freezes. Eagle - September 10, 1978

FEES
Fishing: \$3.00 Adult - 12 catch limit per day 24 fish possession limit after the 1st day \$1.50 Child - 6 catch limit per day (Under 14 yrs. of age)
Overnight: \$5.00 first 2 persons plus 50¢ each additional person.
Picnic: \$2.00 car or 50¢ per person on bus.
(Overnight) camping includes trailer hook ups with water, sewer, and electricity at Eagle & Silver Recreation Areas.)

NO RESERVATIONS ARE NECESSARY FOR OVERNIGHT CAMPING. SERVICE IS ON A FIRST COME FIRST SERVED BASIS.

C. Licenses issued for other areas or lakes are not valid at Lake Mescalero or the Cienega Lakes. Special permits are required to fish at these two lakes. Tribal members are not required to have permits at Cienega Lakes.

Lake Mescalero is a facility of the Inn of the Mountain Gods and permits for fishing are available at the Inn. No picnicking is permitted at Lake Mescalero and no camping is permitted at Lake Mescalero or Cienega Lakes.

Lake Mescalero is open year round
FISHING Lake Mescalero
Fishing is open year round - Guest, Non-Guest, Adults, Children, Tribal Members and Inn of the Mountain Gods employees.

D. The Inn of the Mountain Gods employee in charge of fishing shall be accountable to the Tribal Conservation Officer.

2. Season permits and affiliates
a. Affiliates may receive a free license at Mescalero Tribal Offices. However, affiliates must have the license in their possession at all times when fishing. (Not valid at Lake Mescalero.)

b. A season permit for fishing only, valid for entry and use at Eagle, Ruidoso Recreation and Silver Springs Recreation Areas, is available to the general public for a fee of \$35.00 at the Mescalero Tribal Office. Additional fee shall be charged for picnic area usage and camping.

3. It shall be unlawful for any person including Mescalero Apache Tribal members to:
a. Have more than one line in the water per licensed fisherman.
b. Use any boats, rafts, canoes or other flotation equipment at any time (Except Lake Mescalero).

c. Fish on any other waters of the Mescalero Indian Reservation EXCEPT as specifically set forth herein and EXCEPT for areas in which concessionaires are authorized to issue permits.
d. Fish with more than one pole while angling in all trout waters.

e. Deposit litter in or pollute any waters or the bank of any waters.
f. Leave a campfire burning and unattended.
g. Leave any fishing pole or hand line unattended.
h. Snag, net seine, trap, grapple or otherwise catch fish.

B. Jurisdiction, Fines and Penalties:
1. Any person violating any provision of this proclamation relating to fishing shall be fined a minimum of \$50.00 or referred to a court of proper jurisdiction.

2. Any person violating any provision of this jurisdiction relating to fishing shall be subject to the proper jurisdiction of the Tribal or Federal Court.
3. Any person who has in his possession more fish than (legally permitted shall forfeit all of his catch in his possession and shall pay a fine of \$5.00 per fish in excess of the limit.

c. Any complimentary permits will be issued without the approval of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council. The approval must be in writing.

D. Conservation Officers shall provide to the fisherman a copy of this proclamation.

NOTE: THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO AND THE MESCALERO APACHE TRIBE ARE INVOLVED IN CONTROVERSY REGARDING THE ISSUE OF WHETHER OR NOT A NEW MEXICO HUNTING OR FISHING LICENSE IS REQUIRED OF A NON-INDIAN IN ORDER TO HUNT OR FISH ON THE MESCALERO RESERVATION. THE TRIBE MAINTAINS THAT NO STATE LICENSE IS NECESSARY, BUT ACCEPTS NO RESPONSIBILITY FOR ANY CONSEQUENCES WHICH MAY BE SUFFERED BY REASON OF FAILURE TO OBTAIN A STATE LICENSE. CURRENT INFORMATION REGARDING THIS CONTROVERSY IS AVAILABLE AT TRIBAL OFFICES, MESCALERO, NEW MEXICO 88340.

The Schmitt spokesman said she could not make an official statement regarding a tentative timetable, but she agreed project initiation was probably "several years down the road," assuming the enabling bill was promptly passed.

Even after funding is approved and basic design features are revealed the Ruidoso area itself may hold up the project.

Hewitt said the state is looking at alignment and right-of-way problems through the Hondo Valley and particularly through the canyon leading to Apache Summit. He indicated there have been problems securing right-of-way from the Mescalero Apache nation in the past.

Tribal President Wendell Chino has been unavailable for comment.

According to a 1973 survey, about 4,000 vehicles use the route daily.

The demonstration project, approved by the senate committee, also includes construction of 370 miles of highway generally following U.S. 87 between Lubbock and San Angelo, Texas.

About 150 miles of the Amarillo-Las Cruces road already has been converted to four-lane divided highway on the Las Cruces side from Interstate 10 and on the Amarillo side from I-40.

Employment found for area workers

Employment was found for 54 persons by the Ruidoso Job Service during the first half of fiscal year 1978, exceeding expectations of the employment services division, New Mexico Department of Human Resources.

Twenty seven youth, 14 unemployment insurance claimants and 15 veterans were found jobs between October and March.

"The Ruidoso office staff placed 10 percent more people than originally expected," a department spokesman said.

Jobs were provided to members of groups which traditionally have had difficulty finding work, including 21 women, 34 minority group members and 29 economically disadvantaged.

Elephant Butte receiving bass

New Mexico Game and Fish Department crews were in Uvalde, Texas, this week, picking up the final load of a scheduled planting of about one million baby bass for Elephant Butte Lake.

Approximately 600,000 of the large-mouthed bass fingerlings, averaging one to two inches in length, were put in the lake last week to supplement existing populations and natural reproduction, according to Dick McCleskey, assistant chief of the Fisheries Division.

The large-mouthed bass are part of New Mexico's requests for its share of warm-water fish from federal fish hatcheries, operated by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, McCleskey said.

Requests are made two years in advance and may be honored in part or in all, depending on the variables of hatchery production, he added.

Requests this year include the one million largemouths planted in Elephant Butte, as well as more than a million more bass fingerlings for stocking in other waters.

The state has also requested approximately 350,000 channel catfish, 600,000 smallmouth bass, 40,000 striped bass and 135,000 bluegills for planting in various New Mexico waters.

Bass and other warm-water species, because diseases and other problems are greater at the higher water temperatures, are more difficult to raise to catchable size than trout are, McCleskey noted.

The large-mouthed bass will take from two to three years to grow to a size suitable to anglers, he said.

Ruidoso Postmaster E. E. Gradine has announced guidelines "to virtually eliminate damage to parcels," and a "proper return address" to include the street numbers "to insure proper distribution of mail to boxes, due to the large number of box rentals in use."

Gradine's suggestions:
— A proper address for receiving mail: Mr. John Doe, 999 Sudderth Drive, P. O. Box 777, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345.

— For mailing packages: Select a fiberboard box with the "burst test" number printed on it. A 125 pound test is suitable for most merchandise weighing up to 20 pounds. 10 pounds of books require a box test of 175.

— The use of wrapping paper on packages is discouraged, as the paper can tear in transit and the address label be lost.

— Packages should be sealed with pressure sensitive reinforced tape, which is virtually unbreakable. The use of masking and cellophane tape is prohibited by Postal Regulations. Twine or string, because it may catch on processing machinery, is not recommended.

The Wild Rose

This is being sent to you on May the fifteenth. Yesterday was one of the warmest days I ever saw here at the place, after so much cool weather. It seemed that all of a sudden a summer day moved into the spring time, and it seemed we were in the month of June instead of May. The thermometer rose up to eighty, even though the wind was out of the east and north. The warm weather was very welcome, and the east wind was mellow with moisture, as clouds began to sail overhead from all directions in the sky.

Then on the breeze from the east you could catch the perfume of many different flowers — and one especially that brought a glad note of joy to your heart. Could this be the perfume of the wild rose this early in May? Last year the pink wild rose did not bloom till the twenty-fourth.

Out in the wild rose patch a few steps southeast of the house, there they were, a few of the little five-petal pink roses, with the golden centers, smiling and sending their fragrance — wishing us all a happy Mother's Day.

Every year the wild rose strikes a chord of happiness in our soul; bringing back memories, and filling us with hope for our days ahead. Soon the little wild roses planted near the house in the yard by our Mother will be blooming. The wild rose is a little messenger from Heaven, like the blue bird; and my Mother's spirit is close to me today, rejoicing in this beautiful day and bringing the happiness of Heaven to my soul.

The Algerita Bloom

Late yesterday some very heavy clouds gathered in the east, and just at evening there was a great gold and silver flash of lightning all across the cloudy eastern sky, and a long rumble of thunder. You could smell the rain as it fell on foothills, mesas, prairies and valleys down toward the Pecos Valley. And here in the vale, all the world seemed to be waiting for the rain.

Now, today, the fifteenth, the wind has changed and is blowing from the West, down the valley. The weather is not hot — only warm and the air is filled with one of the favorite blossom aromas of New Mexico.

This blossom incense is like golden honey on the light air. There is no flower fragrance quite like it. The Algerita bushes, out in solid golden yellow blossoms, are sending their honey-incense to us over hill and dale, across the mountain meadows, and along the hillides.

The Algerita is a hardy plant of great strength and vitality, which grows all through the southwest, and is especially plentiful in our state. It is a bush six to ten feet high with leaves like the Christmas Holly to which plant it is some kin.

Later on the gold of the Algerita will turn to a light bright crimson as you view it along the way. This will be the color of the berries which give the bush its name,



"Algeritas" which is Spanish for "Little sour ones."

The early English-speaking people changed the name slightly into "Algerita."

The berries have a strong flavor, and make wonderful jelly when they are ripe. They are a little bit sour before they are full ripe, although they start turning red quite early.

The Algerita has deep roots which store moisture and nourishment for the plant. It grows from the edge of the desert all the way up the mountain country, through the mesas, foothills, and all the way to the base of the high mountains.

All through the winter you hardly notice the Algerita bushes in their pale green out on a wind-swept mesa in the foot hills. (I am thinking now of a great grove of Algerita just the other side of Nogal on the way to Carrizozo). Then in the dry time of late spring or early summer you journey through their country and the solid golden

bushes burst suddenly upon your view like something in a dream; the aroma reaches you in waves upon the air and you can taste the honey as you inhale the fragrance.

You stop to marvel at this glowing sight of golden bushes, breathing this honey-laden air: Such vitality and strength! Your body and spirit respond, and you feel new life in the presence of the wonderful Algerita bushes in full bloom.

Let us thank God for all our blessings.

He's Edward "Ted" Murphy, finishing up a four-year term as state treasurer. Murphy, who maintained his family home in Albuquerque during his tenure in Santa Fe, is one of several candidates for Bernalillo county treasurer in the June 6 primary.

Not only did Murphy draw the "number one" ballot spot, but he's well-known politically in Bernalillo County. He served four terms as county assessor there, 1963-66 and 1971-74.

In recent years there's been a moratorium on the issuance of new Federal coal leases.

Now, the U.S. Department of the Interior is writing new proposed regulations for coal leasing operations. And, in a rare move, New Mexico and other states are being invited to help draft the regulations.

State officials in various agencies have long complained that when regulations are issued from Washington, they are presented with an accomplished fact-and little input into the final version.

Meanwhile, the 1978 Legislature authorized creation of a Coal Surface Mining Bureau, which will receive funds from Washington for safety, reclamation and land use planning purposes.

There'll be narrowed jurisdiction under the new act, however. Indian reservations will have autonomy over mines on their lands, which will probably necessitate "joint powers agreements" between the state and tribes.

COPE, the Committee on Political Education of the AFL-CIO, didn't endorse State Rep. Frank Horan of Albuquerque, even though it supported most legislative Democrats this year.

COPE leaders became miffed at Horan over a disagreement during the 1978 Legislature, when industrial leaders were pushing for inclusion of an amendment to a State Labor Department bill strongly opposed by labor.

Horan, former city attorney of Albuquerque, generally is a pro-labor legislator. And COPE is possibly going to have to count votes carefully in January, when the "right-to-work" issue is expected to surface again.

Right-to-work passed the Senate two years ago and lost by a couple of votes in the House.

Although the odds at this point seem against Bob Ferguson occupying the governor's chair then, if he is there'll be a strong push from the executive branch for right-to-work.

Joe Skeen, the likely Republican nominee for governor, hasn't stressed right-to-work as strongly as Democrat Ferguson has, but he has said he'd sign such a bill if it cleared both houses of the Legislature.

Officials at the El Rito campus of the Northern New Mexico Community College are now seeking to build new classroom buildings for plumbing and maintenance classes.

They came to the Legislative Finance Committee to explain that existing buildings were in such poor repair that remodeling would not be as economical as building new ones.

WISE DECISION

The U. S. Supreme Court ruled recently that the White House tapes played at the 1974 Watergate cover-up trial may not be released for public broadcast or commercial reproduction. This was a wise decision and it merits attention.

The court rejected the contentions of several broadcasting networks and one recording company that they have a constitutional right to exploit the tapes. The plaintiffs based their claim to a constitutional right on the First and Sixth amendments.

The court dismissed the almost laughable Sixth Amendment appeal; the right to a public trial is the right of the accused, in this case the Watergate defendants, not that of broadcasters and recorders.

The First Amendment appeal had a superficial validity, because of the

guarantee of press freedom to circulate information. But here the court sensibly noted that "the contents of the tapes were given wide publicity by all elements of the media," and so "there is no question of a truncated flow of information to the public."

The tapes at issue contained 22 hours of conversations between former President Nixon and several of his top aides. Mr. Nixon had appealed the decision of a lower court that would have permitted the tapes to be broadcast and reproduced commercially, but it is important to note that executive privilege was not an argument advanced by Mr. Nixon's attorneys, nor did it figure in the court's decision. The court considered the arguments of the networks and recording company and found them insufficient.

It would seem, then, that the decision would have future application for Americans similarly situated as Mr. Nixon. That is to say, so long as there is no question that the flow of information is unblocked to the public, tape recordings used as evidence at public trial may not be disseminated through the networks or reproduced and sold by recording businesses.

Mr. Nixon did not obtain this legal victory because he once was president. His position was irrelevant, in the court's view, to the need for some restraint against the commercial exploitation of evidence in a court action. — Deming Headlight



Trainers do pick unusual mascots

Once we saw this gag in the newspaper. Two fans are leaning forlornly against the inside rail as a field of horses sloshes down the homestretch. The water is a foot deep, and fish are swimming about, and jumping up and down, and one fan is saying to the other: "Boy, that's really a wet track today."

Well, that tickled our readily excited funny bone — and makes it easier than normal to go from the sublime to the ridiculous to the absurd. Which brings us around to the subject of animals who've wound up at racetracks now and then — animals which don't have any business being there.

Take this case: a few years ago we got wind of a trainer who was keeping a boa constrictor in the backstretch of Centennial Racetrack in Denver. That really sounded like a tall can of corn, even for this imaginative writer. So I strolled down to this fellow's barn, and sure enough, there was the boa constrictor. It was kept in a heavy wooden box, with a grated side, presumably for air circulation.

So why would a fellow keep a boa constrictor? "For a pet," one of the lady assistants told me. But she grimaced a bit. It turned out a pet boa constrictor's main staple is live mice, and this lady had to keep going to pet stores to get the boa's lunch, and it wasn't too pleasant watching him squish up his prey for a tasty little snack.

Anyway, the steward finally settled the boa's hash by barring him from the track grounds.

Dean McKinney, a Sunland steward, jogged our memory about that incident a few years ago at a big time Florida track. A field of horses was swinging into the homestretch, going lickety split, and what should appear in their path but an alligator? The horses did the smart thing. They jumped over the alligator and kept right on going.

And speaking of alligators, we once read about the flamingos at Hialeah (I think) being decimated by the alligators. Which is hitting below the belt. (Next, the alligators will like a tasty little thoroughbred for lunch.)

Bob Dudich, announcer at Ruidoso Downs, recalls that time about seven years ago when a young deer surprised the fans by emerging from the barn area — not the mountains. "He was just a small thing. The gate crew was astonished, and tried to flag him down, but he took off and ran down the straightaway."

Naturally, such a sight got the fans pretty well aroused. The baby deer ap-

parently didn't like the pickle he was getting into and tried to scale the outside rail. He missed on the first try, backed up, and sailed over the barrier on the second jump. Then he stumbled into the parking lot, and wearily climbed the mountains, and disappeared into the Ruidoso scenery — grateful for having survived his only day at the races.

Bob also recalls that time at Ruidoso when a little pooch sneaked onto the track between races. The little fellow took off and raced around the oval, and was really dragging his heels when he staggered into the winner's circle. One of the jockey valets went over to get him, and as soon as he reached down, the little pup bit him — to the delighted howls of the fans.

Speaking of dogs, it's incidents of this sort which have made the darling little things unwelcome at all tracks. The fear is they'll get underfoot during a race, cause the horses to shy, and trigger a spill. Before dogs were given the boot, they were used frequently by trainers in guard duty around the barn. About 10 years ago, steward John Phillips recalls, a young girl was bitten by a dog while going about her duties in the barn area at the New Mexico State fair, and that incident gave more reason for barring the canines.

A few years back, a skunk sauntered onto the race track at Ruidoso, and also made a big hit with the fans — but didn't contribute much, to a smooth running program. He finally took refuge in a drain ditch, and stayed there for the rest of the afternoon.

Harry Henson, who announces at Sunland Park, and at Hollywood Park and Del Mar on the west coast, tells us about

the time he used to call a variety of "exotic" races. The affair would be staged on a Sunday before the start of the regular Hollywood meeting, and was supposed to be a kind of family day at the track. So the animals running down the straightaway would include a donkey, a zebu, agnu, some ostriches, camels, midget Shetland ponies. Even a baby elephant. The whole menagerie, as we get the picture, would fight it out in a heat or two. "The whole works in one race," Harry says. He admits the spectacle was "kind of silly," but allows that the fans seemed to go for it.

Over the years, Harry has had to call several ostrich races. The gawky animals would be asked to negotiate a furlong, hauling jockeys, but some of the ostriches wouldn't get into the spirit of things, and would buck their riders to the ground. "But they could run pretty well," Harry says.


In earlier years, at the western Washington Fair (not far from Seattle) the nine day race meeting would include a variety of special shows. Among the most popular were riding contests with draft horses. The hefty beasts would go a half mile, with jockeys riding bareback. "When they'd come down the stretch, the ground would shake so much, it'd feel like an earthquake," Harry recalls. "But it got to be quite a show. The people would come from all around."

We'll wrap up this little animal adventure by mentioning the best photo finish picture we ever saw. It was a deadheat, alright. Two noses right on the wire. One nose belonged to a thoroughbred. The other belonged to a pigeon.

Social Security information

What some people called "back-pay" may no longer be paid by Social Security, according to Gordon Lunsford, field representative. This is due to one of many changes in the law enacted by Congress in December.

"People who retire between age 62 and 65 get a permanently reduced amount each month. For years, applications could be retroactive for 12 months — the retiree had an option — and most people took it," Lunsford said. "For example, a man retiring at age 64 could start his checks at age 64 at \$300 per month, or if earnings were low enough, he could make his ap-

plication effective back 12 months and start his benefits back to age 63 at \$280 per month.

"No more! Now virtually no application can be retroactive if a reduced payment is involved. Payments will start the month an application is filed. This has caused problems. Our staff properly told some people in 1977 that they could wait until 1978 to file, after figuring the exact amount of 1977 earnings. This way, the retiree could best decide how far back to make his application retroactive. Now, that same person is told the application can't be retroactive because of the change in the law made in December and effective in January. Monthly payments will be higher but that 'back-pay' is a thing of the past to most people."

"In cases where monthly payments are not reduced, such as payments to children and disabled workers, an application can still be retroactive up to 12 months."

Three Bars faced tough fight to fame

Once upon a time there was a thoroughbred nobody wanted. This weebegone creature fell into such hard times he was shuttled from owner to owner and had all the appeal of an unemployed brother-in-law.

Back then, if you'd owned this animal,

Casey's Shadow action based on real horse

It was toward the end of summer 1975 when a whiz kid quarter horse called Rocket's Magic came booming out of Louisiana and landed at Ruidoso Downs with both fists swinging.

Rocket's Magic had picked off a hundred-grand or two in his homestate, and had shipped to Ruidoso licking his chops over the \$1 million All-American Futurity.

It all made a good story. The trainer, L. J. Romero, was a likeable fellow who submitted willingly to press interviews, spotted his conversation with homespun Louisiana lingo, and talked through an accent as thick as a mangrove and as pleasantly tangled as a coastal swampland.

Romero's son, Randy, was the rider of Rocket's Magic, and the colt was owned by a neophyte horseman who ran a fish market in New Iberia. So Rocket's Magic went out and set the top qualifying time for the All-American, and was picked as the favorite in the Labor Day epic.

Mix all these ingredients into a pungent gumbo, stir frequently, let it sit overnight, and what you have is the germinal tissue of a Hollywood movie. Of course, the ending might need to be re-written, since Rocket's Magic took his first defeat in the All-American (he ran third) and has since dissolved into the pages of quarter horse history.

But in March of this year the saga of Rocket's Magic was revived to some degree. And before it's over and done with, American movie goers might be as enamored with quarter horse racing and Ruidoso Downs and the All-American Futurity as they are with sharks, and mafia mobsters, space shootouts, and galaxies far, far away.

It's a big time Hollywood movie, alright, or to parrot our west coast pals, it's a "major motion picture." That means, we expect, reviews in Time and Newsweek, an advertising budget (we presume) of several million, a lot of TV hype. Even Rona Barrett will be called upon to do her share. Maybe Johnny Carson, too, and Mike Douglas, and the whole panoply of media machinery.

No, this isn't hot air. It's not even the over stressed workings of some under achieving publicity hack. It just sounds that way. What we're talking about is "Casey's Shadow," an engrossing PG blend of message and story, racing realism, and top drawer acting. We can hammer this home by noting that the director is the distinguished Martin Ritt ("The Spy Who Came In From The Cold," "The Great White Hope," and a list of other box office bell ringers as long as your arm), and the photographer is John Alonzo, and when you see his credit on the screen, he gets the whole Cinemascope frame to himself.

The star is everyman's favorite, Walter Matthau. And when you see Mr. Matthau on the screen, he'll be talking in that Louisiana accent.

Nobody out there in Hollywood has told me any secrets, and this is my own guess — and I'm as good as the next man when it comes to putting two and two together and coming up with five. But when I read the shooting script the summer before last, the character played by Matthau suggested trainer Romero. Next, I was led to assume Casey's Shadow (that's a horse) might have found his counterpart in Rocket's Magic.

Anyway, I might point out that Rocket's Magic and Romero were only the starting points in the creative process which leads to a movie. You read over the script and many real life racing figures come to mind — such as Harriett Peckham, B. F. Phillips and Walter Merrick (each being big named, big time quarter horse owners of enormous standing). One also gets the essence of trainers Bubba Cascio and Bubba Werner.

Werner, in fact, is mentioned in some of the lines, and much of the stable side sequences were shot around his barn at Ruidoso Downs. There are references to such blue chip riders as Jerry Nicodemus, Bobby Adair, Danny Cardoza (as I recall).

A number of Ruidoso staffers — such as racing secretary Tom Dawson, track veterinarian William Pitt, director of racing Richard Thompson, starter Dean Turpitt — have brief speaking lines. Announcer Bob Dudich calls the fictionalized All-American Futurity as Casey's Shadow, hobbled by an injured foreleg, runs the biggest race of his make believe career — in tantalizing slow motion.

Such well worshipped quarter horse

you'd have to do some fast talking just to give him away. At one point, he changed hands for \$300 — on the stipulation that the money wasn't to be forked over until the horse won a race (which he didn't, for that owner).

But in every glorious turf story, there's a moth eaten beginning and a glossy ending — an ending rich in success. Such is the

case of this tale — with one twist. The horse we have in mind didn't metamorphasize into a brilliant stakes winner. But, equipped as he was with alacrity at the starting gate, he emerged into one of the great sires of quarter horses. The mention of his name is enough to make hair stand up on the neck of anyone who's bred a quarter horse, or thumbed through a sale catalogue, or daydreamed of success in the All-American Futurity.

This stallion is Three Bars, and a tracing of his bloodlines provides a shimmering road map through quarter horse history. Whenever you see a quarter horse with "bar" in his name and a tendency to run like well lubricated lightning, chances are the rich blood of Three Bars is doing its magic.

And if so many sons and daughters and their respective offspring aren't enough to keep Three Bars on the great marquee in the sky, the grandeur of this fine stallion is celebrated each year at Ruidoso with the staging of the Three Bars Handicap at 400 yards. The average turf goer may recognize Three Bars as a foundation sire of some sort, but probably doesn't know much more about him.

Our curiosity was aroused by a recent issue of Horse And Pony, the Florida equine tabloid. Leaning heavily on this short piece, and magazine articles and massive computer printouts supplied by Don Essary of the American Quarter Horse Association, we'll sketch out the hard times and legendary success of Three Bars.

The story begins in 1939 when Jack Goode (later a steward at Churchill Downs and numerous midwest tracks) teamed up with two associates to purchase the mare Myrtle Dee. In foal to a stallion called Percentage, Myrtle Dee traced her ancestry back to the fabled Man O' War. In 1940, Myrtle Dee delivered a handsome chestnut colt, later called Three Bars.

But Three Bars was a flop in his early racing days. As the story goes, he was afflicted with bloodworms that badly affected his hindquarters. One day, he might run a bit. The next day, nothing. The condition wasn't treated properly until he was about five years old.

But going back to those early tries at

racing, Goode once described the colt this way: "He obviously had some speed, but whenever he turned it on he would come back to the barn with the muscle of a hind leg restricted and the flesh feeling cold as if the circulation were cut off. I tried everything but couldn't overcome the difficulty. We finally sold him to Beckham Stivers for \$300 to be paid if Three Bars ever won."

But Stivers had no better luck with Three Bars and finally gave him to Vernon Cloud. Goode goes on: "Somehow, trainer Cloud cured the malady or else it wore itself out. Anyway, the colt raced in 1944 for the first time and at four years old. He won three out of his four starts. He didn't start in 1945, but the next year garnered eight victories and three seconds in seventeen starts, earning \$16,940. At seven, he placed once and earned \$550 in six starts, and was retired the next year to stud."

So in his racing days, he earned \$20,140. Goode goes on: "My partners and I each got \$100 out of him after putting in considerable money in training. But we used to laugh about it with Beckham Stivers, because he put in \$300 and training expenses on the horse and got absolutely nothing, because when the horse won it was for somebody else."

During his racing days, Three Bars had a knack of going from bad to worse. As a four-year-old, he stumbled coming out of the gate at Hot Springs, "burst open a knee and lost two teeth." That was the year in which he was sold for \$300, then later given away. After that, he changed hands once more in a claiming race.

The people who claimed him took him to the dry climate in Arizona, where he began to mend. At this point, Sidney Vail — a former cowpoke who'd done some rodeoing and guide duty in Yellowstone Park — offered \$10,000 for Three Bars, and went into debt to sew up the deal.

At the beginning of his stallion career, the asking price was \$100, and not many mares sought his affections. By 1955, when his sons and daughters were making beautiful music, the fee went up to five grand, then later, \$10,000. In the 1950's, a bizarre kidnapping entered into the story. A couple of bumblers swiped the stallion

with the idea of getting free matings to their mares. But the job was thoroughly muddled, and the two clubbed Three Bars and turned him loose, and the stallion, his nose broken, was found "wandering among old cars and appliances in a junk yard."

Recovering from that ordeal, Three Bars went on to lasting fame as a sire of quarter horses. If we understand the computer print out sheets, Three Bars sired 547 quarter horses who earned \$3,196,521. Daughters of Three Bars produced 1,466 foals who went on to amass \$4,639,856.

The potency of Three Bars blood is easily illustrated. One of his daughters was Lena's Bar, and when Lena's Bar (a thoroughbred) was mated to the flashy quarter horse, Jet Deck, the result was Easy Jet. The latter, a winner of \$445,721, is now turning into a sire of storied proportions (and commands a tidy \$10,000 stud fee, which is tantamount to a license to mint money).

In the mid-1950's, the Three Bars daughter, Bardella, set track records, earned \$35,981, and stirred up plenty of attention. Ditto for Barred, Miss Myrna Bar and War Chant. Another son, Mr. Bar None, ended his racing days in '58 with a big reputation and a money line of \$72,125.

There was Triple Lady, who ran out \$61,931.

Not to be overlooked were two All-American Futurity winners: Galobar, who took the maiden All-American in 1959, and Pokey Bar, who won it in 1961. The latter earned \$162,631 — awfully big potatoes in his day. Others of great standing: Alamitos Bar, \$58,037; Mr. Three Bars, \$34,746; Bar Depth, \$52,185; Little Chloe, \$56,240; Bunny's Bar Maid, \$72,289; Pistol Bar, \$53,242; Rapid Volley, \$146,918; Nippy Bars, \$90,406; Sompin Special, \$82,632; Miss Gold Angel, \$107,556; Velox Bar, \$63,891; Carlota II, \$67,685; Three Dreams, \$47,255.

Tracing the foals produced by the daughters of Three Bars is like following the Yellow Brick Road, but we must mention Azure Fair, \$87,641; Anna Dial, \$75,143; Duplicate Copy, \$81,056; Go Josie Go, \$152,511; Dial Three Bar, \$48,812; Bar Request, \$118,116; Nuther Brother, \$86,831; Anecdote, \$161,999; Miss Flicka Reb, \$61,127; Sompin Like Jet, \$93,266; Final Kiss, \$44,059; and, of course, Sold Short who made \$182,371. To those we've negligently omitted, our apologies.

Three Bars, the great progenitor and the single most influential sire in quarter horse history, died at Paris, Kentucky, in 1970.

sires as Easy Jet and Go Man Go haunt the pages of the script — although not being mentioned by name. So there is imprinted on this Hollywood tale a sense of reality, and honesty of detail, a flavor which is likely to ring true. Ruidoso Downs, as it does in real life, looms as the great quarter horse palace in the sky, and the storyline is riveted to the towering presence of the All-American Futurity.

Ray Stark, a man who likes to produce blockbuster hits, was the moving force behind Casey's Shadow (through his company, Rastar Productions). The project was put together for Columbia Pictures, and from what we gather, a high octane promotional lift off preceded the film going on the marketplace March 17, showing at some 700 theaters across the country.

By way of indicating the commitment the producers have for the film, the following is adequate: early last year, as the final scene was being analyzed, the director and the producer were not completely satisfied with the way it worked out. They looked at it on the screen, and finally decided it didn't capture the exact motivation by the Matthau character and one of his movie sons. Another nuance was needed. So the final scene was re-written to give more force and conviction and purpose, and the whole crew was dispatched to Ruidoso last May to re-film this final sequence.

When you put a 50 man crew back on the road, you're talking about \$100,000 or so. But the final dialogue is now perfect, the bigwigs feel. Well worth the extra hundred-thousand bucks.

But don't ask us if Casey's Shadow wins the All-American Futurity. That would be telling.



Barbecue Tips

Want to be daring and different? Try this. You'll like it! Slather plain mustard all over a 5 or 6 lb. Chuck Roast, with or without bone. Sprinkle heavily with plain table salt until the mustard disappears from sight. Flop the Chuck Roast directly onto the hot coals, salt and mustard side down. Jockey/Trainer of the week

Jockey Jerry Nicodemus scored three victories and honors over the initial two day racing weekend at Ruidoso Downs. Cliff Lambert headed the slate of trainers with four wins to grab Trainer-of-the-Week honors.

Nicodemus gave a sharp performance Saturday, scoring all three of his victories — and four seconds — during the trials for the upcoming Kansas Derby.

In the process, he also became the jockey who qualified the most finalists for the Derby. Stoa Minga will go into the final test as well as two of Nicodemus' mounts who took the runnerup slot — Easy Kiss and Shesa Easy Gypsy. Nicodemus' record now stands at 3-4-0 from nine starts for a 33.3 win percentage.

Next in line is Jackie Martin with three wins, a second and a third. Martin also captured the top quarter horse event of the weekend when he guided Seco Mia to a 1 1/4-length win in the \$5,850 Top Deck Stakes.

Salustio Burgos notched the third spot in the standings by scoring three victories and a third, all on Sunday. He took his final

bow in the last race aboard Hilltop's Native (\$9.20) in an 870-yard battle.

Trainer Lambert sent nine horses to the starting gate and four stopped at the winner's circle on their way back. The most impressive was Bea Lightning who led from wire to wire in a 5 1/4-furlong maiden bout to win by a nose and returned \$30.80. Lambert's tally stands at 4-0-2 for a 44.4 win percentage.

H. Don Farris notched a 3-4-1 record from nine starts to grab second-place with a 33.3 percentage. J. Doyal Roberts, whose star Countess Blade won the Inaugural Purse Saturday, finished third with a 2-0-1 slate.

Turf action resumes Thursday and Friday with elimination trials for the \$25,000 (est.) Kansas Futurity getting underway. The five top qualifiers by time each day will make up the field for the rich finale, June 4, while the next 10 each day will fill the consolation fields.

Saturday first post is 1:30 p.m., while Sunday's program begins at 1 p.m., with the highlight being the \$139,100 Kansas Derby. The winner's share is \$67,050.



Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

Ruidoso Downs Publicity Department **BUFFY PASS**, a filly owned by Wayne and James Johnson of Lufkin, Texas, came on with a tremendous rush and cleared the finish line with 3/4 lengths to spare in the third division of Saturday's 400-yard Kansas Derby trials. She set the fastest qualifying time of 20.07 seconds. Jockey Bruce Pilkinton was aboard the Romie Ferguson-trained three-year-old who made a name for herself last year when she qualified for the finale of the All-American Futurity and finished the year with over \$61,000 in earnings. The \$139,100 finale of the Kansas, to be run May 21, offers \$87,050 to the winner.

Here are the other qualifiers: Real Easy Jet, 20.18; Easy Move, 20.23; Shesa Easy Gypsy, 20.25 1/2; Stoa Minga, 20.28; Triangle Pass, 20.28; Bunny Mackay, 20.30; Mr. Big Wheel, 20.30; Easy Kiss, 20.30 1/2; and Ina Gate Gal, 20.31.

TRAINER DON FARRIS and jockey Jerry Nicodemus proved to be an unbeatable combination Saturday. Farris bent a total of nine charges to the starting gate in the trials and all but one lit the board. Three, all fillies, turned in a fast enough time to qualify for the finale. They are Stoa Minga, who ran sixth in last year's All-American Futurity; Easy Kiss, who won both the Kansas and Rainbow Futurity Consolations last year, and Shesa Easy Gypsy.

TRIANGLE PASS was the qualifier most surprising to the fans. Patrons let the grey filly go off at odds of over 20-1. But jockey W. R. Hunt had her first out of the gate and, with a terrific powerburst, she won by a head to take the sixth qualifying berth. Backers received a \$43 return.

EASY JET aired five of the ten Kansas Derby Finalists. Easy Jet, who stands at the Buena Suerte Ranch in Roswell, is acclaimed as the leading quarter horse progenitor in the nation. So far, his offspring have earned over \$6 million. His finalists are Real Easy Jet, Mr. Big Wheel,

Easy Kiss, Easy Move and Shesa Easy Gypsy.

WALTER MERRICK, the famous Southwest quarter horse owner and trainer, sent out another sharp protege in Sunday's third race, but this time in the thoroughbred category. That's Class roared to an easy victory in her first career start as she coursed a four-furlong boy in 47 1/5 seconds for an eight-length margin and a \$7.20 payoff. The filly is trained by Walter's son, Joe Merrick.

TRUCKLIN TOOTIE (No. 4) made her racing debut in Sunday's fifth race and had quinnella players in a whirl as she got off at 44-1 and took the runnerup position to favored Make It Me (No. 10). But the exhilaration was short-lived as the stewards took her number down for causing interference in the upper stretch to both Wamara (No. 5) and Sudden Dunce (No. 8) who finished fourth and fifth respectively. Trucklin Tootie was moved down to sixth.

COUNTRESS BLADE, last year's Horse-of-the-Meet at Ruidoso, continued her outstanding winning ways as she romped through the six-furlong \$8,500 Inaugural Purse Saturday and led all the way for a 1 1/4-length victory over top competitor Bradley's Kunumera. Backers, who bet the filly down to a heavy favorite, received a \$3.40 return.

THE DAILY DOUBLE returned a handsome \$301.60 on the 2-1 combination Sunday. Bea Lightning (No. 2) in the first race had 14-1 odds as she left the gate for a 5 1/2-furlong spin and won easily. Then That's Talent (No. 1) in the second race jetted to the front in a 400-yard bout and took a victory at 7-1 odds.

THE TOP WIN PAYOFF of the weekend turned up in Sunday's co-featured 10th race when 52-1 outsider Prince Of Darkness (No. 10), directed by Charles Mueller, saved all the ground in the turns of a 5 1/2-furlong battle and scored a two-length victory. Those who backed the colt received \$105.40.
