

Voters name general election candidates tomorrow

Sixteen candidates for county and district offices will have free rides through tomorrow's primary election and four of the candidates can rest easy because they are running unopposed through both the primary and November's general election. Statewide, 15 candidates will breeze through the primary unopposed with three already tabbed for no opposition in the general.

Republican State Senator John Conway of Alamogordo is unopposed in the Republican primary. But, two Democrats, Charlotte G. Jarratt of Ruidoso and Bobby Dan Crenshaw of Carrizozo, are on the ballot as candidates for Conway's District 39 seat. The district extends over portions of Otero and Lincoln Counties.

State Representative John Bigbee, Republican of Lincoln-Torrance-DeBaca-Guadalupe Counties, will face the winner of a Democrat primary race between Jose O. Villanueva of Santa Rosa and Jose M. Marquez of LaLoma.

In the twelfth Judicial District Judge race Democrat George L. Zimmerman will have a free ticket this year in his bid for reelection to the Division 1 bench seat. Thomas A. Sandenaw Jr.'s bid for Division

II reelection will encounter no opposition in the Republican primary. He will face Billy Gene Payne who also has no primary opposition, in the November election.

District 7 State Board of Education candidate George O. Teel will have no problems in his bid for election since he drew no primary or general election opposition.

In the Division III District Magistrate race James R. Wheeler has drawn no primary or general election opposition.

The winner of the Division I Magistrate race, S.M. Ortiz or Lee Jacqueline Martin, both Democrats, will have no Republican opposition in the general.

The Division II Magistrate race will be between Jim Henry McEuen or Gertrude A. Huey, both Democrats, and Alfred Leroy Montes, the single Republican entry.

George L. "Lee" Straley is unopposed in his bid for reelection to the District 2 (Carrizozo area) county commission seat.

For county commission District 3, (Ruidoso) incumbent chairman John H. Sudderth is unopposed tomorrow, but will face either Patricia K. French or Ben L. Hall in the general.

Incumbent G.H. "Shorty" Stoneman and R.G. Nunez will vie for the Democrat position in the District 1 (Hondo Valley) county commission race. The winner of this primary will face either Thomas P. "Cotton" McKnight or Michael H. Hernandez, both Republicans this fall.

Both Democrat Barbara J. Ward and Republican Barbara Lovelace will breeze through the primary election for the county clerk's position.

Either incumbent assessor Marlon L. Schlarb or Charles A. Neel, both Republicans, will face George P. White who drew no Democrat opposition in the county tax assessors' race, in November.

Incumbent treasurer Mike Kimbrell will run unopposed in both the primary and the general election for the county treasurer's position.

For their sheriff's race, incumbent Bill Elliott faces Democrat primary opposition from Melvin Nelson. The winner of that race will face either Ernest Sanchez or James C. McSwane, both Republicans, in the general election for county sheriff.

Democrat Sunny Bonds Hirschfeld will face Republican Archie Witham in the fall race for probate judge.

Statewide primary election races have shaped up as follows:

— Toney Anaya has no Democrat opposition for United States Senator. He will face Republican incumbent Pete Domenici in the general election.

— Harold L. Runnels has drawn no opposition in his proposal for reelection to the United States House of Representatives.

— In the governor's race either Bruce King or Robert E. Ferguson, both Democrats, will face Joseph R. Skeen or Bob Grant, both Republicans, in the general election.

— The largest race in the state, Lieutenant Governor, will have either Thomas T. Rutherford, Roberto A. Mondragon, Odis L. Echols, Rich Simms or Lenton Malry, all Democrats, pitted against either E. Leo Dow, William R. Valentine or Anastacio "Nash" Torres, all Republicans.

— Republican Nila A. Baer has no primary opposition for Secretary of State. She will face either Shirley Hooper, Samuel J. Garcia, Emma C. Gonzales or Beatrice R. Martinez, all Democrats.

— Republican C. Jack Emmons will vie

for the position of State Auditor against either Alvin R. Castillo or Frank M. Olmstead, both Democrats.

— For State Treasurer, Democrat Jan Alan Hartke will face Republican Majel Bowman. Both have drawn no primary opposition.

— For Attorney General, either Democrats Jeff Bingaman or Richard C. Bosson will face Republican John D. Donnell.

— For Commissioner of Public Lands, Alex J. Armijo, Democrat, will face Joe E. Haynes, Republican, in the November election.

— For Corporation Commissioner, Columbus Ferguson, Democrat, will face

Frank C.H. Livingston, Republican.

— In the Justice of the Supreme Court race both John B. McManus Jr. and William R. Federici have encountered no primary or general election opposition.

— Three positions are open for Judge of the Court of Appeals. For the six year term, either Leila B. Andrews or Michael Alarid Jr., both Democrats, will face David R. Lee, Republican. For position 1 William R. Hendley is running unopposed in both the primary and the general election. For position 2, either Mary C. Walters, Ben R. Roybal or James Dow, all Democrats, will face Charles W. Rawson, Republican.

Ruidoso State Bank names new president

Robert L. Hays of Hutchinson, Kansas, will assume his duties as president of Ruidoso State Bank July 1, Johnny Durham, chairman of the board, announced Friday.

Hays, reared on a ranch near Corona, has been vice president in commercial loans with the Central State Bank in Hutchinson. He was also personnel officer in charge of business development with commercial, agricultural, real estate and construction lending responsibilities. He had previously served as vice president and director of the Bank of Jacomo, Blue Springs, Missouri, and the Thornton National Bank, Nevada, Missouri.

The new bank president is 36, and, with his wife, Sandra and daughter Shani, 7, will, Durham said, be moving to Ruidoso in the near future.

Lack of Tribe's resolution stymies airport commission

Stymied by the absence of a resolution from the Mescalero Apache Tribe, the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) took no action at their routine meeting Thursday.

Resolutions granting the commission the power to act for the five governing bodies involved in the development of the regional airport must be received before the commission can submit the proposed

airport package to the regional Federal Aviation Administration offices in Fort Worth.

Resolutions have been approved by the village councils of Capitan, Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs and the Lincoln County Commission. Efforts of the SBAC are at a virtual standstill until the Mescalero Apache Tribe approves the resolution.

Chairman of the commission Richard

Hall told commission members present, George Shoemaker and Terry Strickland, he would contact them "when I get word from Wyndham Runningwater (the tribe's representative to the commission)."

During the meeting, Shoemaker told the SBAC John Sudderth, chairman of the county commission, would send a letter on behalf of the SBAC to the district engineer of the state Highway Commission to

"encourage them to take serious steps to consider the development of a road to the proposed airport."

"Now is the time to look over the whole situation and consider long range aspects," Hall said.

In other business, the commission: — Received a letter from the New Mexico Congressional Delegation Projects Office in Washington, D.C., assuring the

commission of their support and assistance at the federal level.

— Received a courtesy copy from Bob White, director of aviation, Department of Transportation, of a letter from Governor Jerry Apodaca to the New Mexico State University Board of regents.

The letter summarized the needs for the regional airport, requesting the support of the board in the endeavor.

— Were notified by Hall, Republican candidate Joe Skeen had been briefed on the progress of the airport and he requested a copy of the airport master plan.

— Were requested by Ruidoso Downs village clerk Virginia Spall a deadline be set on the \$500 requested from the budgets of each governing body.

The next meeting will be July 6.

GENTLEMENS FEATURE 19-1 OUTSIDER

Long shot wins Futurity

Gentlemen's Feature, a 19-1 outsider, came on in the final strides and pulled out a brilliant nose win in Sunday's grand finale of the Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The gross purse of the first leg of the quarter horse Triple Crown was \$499,000. Gerald and Darlene Blue of Amarillo, the winning owners, collected \$164,502.

Gentlemen's Feature was ridden by Ken Hart, H. C. Werner Jr. — who saddled an unprecedented four horses for the Kansas — is the trainer.

It was a desperate struggle over the final yards of the 350 yard dash, and matters looked like a tossup with just a few more steps to go. Oh Jet Van, a 40-1 outsider, and Bug Tuff Johnny, packing odds of 20-1, were slugging it out on the rail in a nip-and-tuck battle.

Gentlemen's Feature broke well, but was out of contention most of the way. When the filly hit the halfway point, she began putting more muscle in her stride, and took dead aim on the leaders. The filly kept churning up the dust in a tremendous finish and waved her nose in front on the final stride.

The stewards quickly flashed the photo sign and took a long look at the picture. Gentlemen's Feature, Oh Jet Van and Bug Tuff Johnny had their noses separated by a

They will either keep him on the medication he's presently taking or change it," she said.

Mrs. Stone added, Devara has used a portion of the account to purchase groceries and to "keep his insurance policy, which is so critical, up to date."

It seems that horse racing influences, indirectly or directly, the life of almost every Ruidosoan. In "The Gamblers Bedside Book", a treasury of fact, and fiction on the spellbinding world of gambling, Yellow Kid Well relates the system he devised for "beating the horses." Perhaps, your genius for winning at the races lies more in the realm of that of Joseph W. Frost and his coachman, Pearsall, told by Rufus Jarma in "The Great Racetrack Capers"?

"The Dictionary of the History of Ideas", Philip Wiener, editor, relates "All through history man seems to have been attracted by uncertainty. We can still observe today that as soon as an infallible system of betting is found, the game will be abandoned or changed to beat the system".

Many are probably conscious of man's fascination with uncertainty, but less conscious, perhaps, of the contributions by some of the "greats" like Galileo and Pascal that were stimulated directly by gambling. A friend, the Duke of Ferrara, consulted Galileo on the following problem: "The sums of 9 and 10 can be each produced by three dice, through six different combinations and yet the sum 10 appears more often than the sum 9, namely:

9 = 1 plus 2 plus 6 = 1 plus 3 plus 5 = 1 plus 4 plus 4 = 2 plus 2 plus 5 = 2 plus 3 plus 4 = 3 plus 3 plus 3
10 = 1 plus 3 plus 6 = 1 plus 4 plus 5 = 2 plus 2 plus 6 = 2 plus 3 plus 5 = 2 plus 4 plus 4 = 3 plus 3 plus 4

Galileo pointed out "for the sum 9, the first, second and fifth combination can each appear in 6 ways, the third and fourth in 3 ways and the last in one way; hence, there are altogether 25 ways out of 216 compared to 27 for the sum 10. It is interesting that the 'friend' was able to detect empirically a difference of 1/108 in the frequencies". Pascal was posed the same type of question by 'Chevalier de Mere', an inveterate gambler.

Actually, you don't need to be an inveterate gambler to become fascinated with this four volume, plus index, "Dictionary of the History of Ideas" for its scope ranges from the historical development of economic, legal, and political ideas and institutions ideologies, and movements to history of ideas about human nature in anthropology, psychology, religion and philosophy as well as in literature and common sense.

Prepare yourself for house fly season: Few things are more annoying than house flies. During warm, spring weather, fly populations build up rapidly. And the house fly is a constant danger to man and animals. For successful house fly control, begin an early control program before the flies become numerous. You should eliminate the breeding sites. All garbage and refuse containers should have solid

bottoms and tight fitting lids. Dispose of garbage at least once a week. Dispose of pet droppings and avoid excessive amounts of pet food left uneaten outside the house. Eliminate low, wet spots in the lawn and other places by use of clean fill dirt. Practice good, basic sanitation measures.

Use fly screens. Keep the window and door screens in good repair to prevent house fly entry into the home. Use at least 14 to 16 meshes to the inch in screens to keep out troublesome house flies and other nuisance insects. Control flies in the house. For the flying insects, use an aerosol spray of dichlorvos (Vapona) or pyrethrins plus piperonyl butoxide to give excellent

Cancer screening clinics set here each Thursday

The Cancer Screening Clinics at Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital held from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m., every Thursday have had very good response, spokesman Guin Stone said.

"The nurse practitioners mainly have seen women, but would like to encourage men to come to the clinics too," she said. "People are coming in who otherwise wouldn't have (had any tests)."

Appointments have been scheduled through mid-August, but appointments can be made by calling Mrs. Geneva Walker at 257-7381, extension 44.

The clinics, offered by Southwest Health Care Corporation are staffed by a group of nurses with specialized training in cancer screening.

"For women the tests will be pap smears, breast examinations and instructions for self examination; and for men there will be prostate testing, but the clinic will not be limited to these tests. They do a fairly complete examination... looking for signs of cancer," Ken Moore, hospital administrator said.

"If cancer can be caught early enough, lives and a great deal of money can be saved. I hope people take advantage of the clinic."

Open to all age groups, the clinic "will be aimed at the over 40 years of age group initially. A lot of women in that group never have had a pap smear."

"We want to encourage preventive medicine," Moore said.

knockdown. Repeat treatments usually are needed. Follow label directions and safety precautions.

Home sewage systems need maintenance: The home sewage system isn't as complicated as it sounds, but does need periodic maintenance. Household wastes go through a piping system into a treatment device. These pipes must be water tight to prevent leakage, have proper water traps to prevent odors and be free of obstructions. Watching for any change in the rate of flow from the waste receivers is the first step in a maintenance program. Also inspect all exposed pipes annually for leakage or deterioration, and be aware all the time for unusual odors around sinks and drains. Chemical drain cleaners are usually effective only for cleaning water traps near sinks. While annoying, these minor inconveniences are often caused by more serious obstructions further along the system.

The disposal field is probably the most critical part of the system. Its function is to deliver and discharge the treated wastes into the soil. However, because it is buried and not available for frequent inspection, malfunction of other parts of the system must be monitored closely for symptoms of field problems.

Find out where the disposal field is located and observe whether there are any unusual wet areas around the field. The solid surface should be at least level or crowned, over the field to shed excess surface water. Be sure no heavy loads or vehicles pass over the field.



Nazarene auditorium nearing completion

A 12,000 square foot auditorium, under construction the past year at Angus near the Bonito Lake turnoff on Highway 37, owned by the Church of the Nazarene District Center for New Mexico and part of Texas, is scheduled for completion in July. The church owns 96.8 acres, at the auditorium site, on which are 104 cabins owned by members of the 45 churches in the district. The land is used for church activities including summer camps scheduled to begin July 10. The new building houses a dining hall which includes extensive cafeteria

facilities and a seating capacity of 300 for meals. Sliding partitions create three additional conference rooms for use by workshop groups. The dining hall features a large rock fireplace against one wall.

This year's programs include at least four weeks of youth camps for three age brackets, 9-12, 13-16, and high school and college age groups; a laymann's retreat and a minister's retreat. A week-long family camp open to members of all church denominations is also planned. The District Center can accommodate 250 persons at one camp. Facilities include a 16-unit motel, offering two queen-size beds and bath. Dormitory facilities include

housing for 100 boys; with 80 in the girls' quarters. A nearby snack shack offers hamburgers, fries, soft drinks and ice cream. A graveled parking area with electricity, water and sewage facilities is available for trailer and mobile home use.

A chapel is available for special services, including weddings, and a large tabernacle is used for camp meetings and various services. A pine tree sheltered amphitheater, seating about 100, is available for outdoor services or cookouts. An on-site fire station houses a Bonito Volunteer Fire Department truck. Recreational facilities include indoor basketball courts, indoor and outdoor volleyball courts and two softball fields.



Right away the little calf went up and stood opposite her mother. Here the stream was

a little wider but still too deep for the calf, I thought.





Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE — While the Republican contest for the gubernatorial nomination has been generally overshadowed by the Democratic Ferguson-King race, the outcome of the GOP intra-party competition has important political implications.

Joe Skeen, a rancher from Lincoln County with long involvement in Republican affairs, is considered by most political professionals to have a wide lead over Bob Grant of Albuquerque, a realtor with expertise on energy matters.

Grant, a state representative from Bernalillo County, concedes he got off to a late start in his challenge to Skeen for the June 6 nomination.

There's some question whether even an earlier start would have given Grant a good chance at edging out Skeen among the Republican faithful. Skeen was the party's floor leader in the State Senate at a time when Republicans were virtually excluded from the political decision-making process, and many GOP veterans remember his efforts during those years.

Since then, he's run in two statewide races and, although losing, did run strongly enough for most Republican leaders to concede he would be the toughest candidate they could field against the Democratic nominee in November.

The losing race in 1970 really was between Pete Domenici and Bruce King, with Skeen and Bob Mondragon serving as their respective running mates. But the King-Mondragon ticket won.

In his first statewide race on his own, Skeen and running mate Virgil Rhodes of Albuquerque came close to topping the Democratic gubernatorial state of Jerry Apodaca and Bob Ferguson. That was in 1974. Skeen pulled within 3,700 votes of Apodaca — 164,172 to 160,430 — and might have won if he had picked up the votes of the conservative, third-party ticket on the state that year.

So this year, most long-time Republicans appeared to have settled on Skeen out of a combination of affection for his often-beleaguered efforts in the

Legislature during the early years and his proven vote-getting ability.

Many GOP leaders believe they've got a good chance at winning the statehouse this year, a relatively rare prospect since there are 370,000 registered Democrats and only 160,000 registered Republicans in New Mexico.

However, 62,000 of those Republicans are registered in Bernalillo County, home of vote-rich Albuquerque and of Bob Grant, the only candidate in either major party from the state's largest city.

Plus there's the fact that Grant is the most articulate candidate on technical questions of energy production and utilization, an ability that has some voter appeal in a state involved in rapid economic and social changes because of the energy boom.

Both Skeen and King are ranchers and Ferguson is from an agricultural area, the Pecos Valley of southeastern New Mexico. Would the GOP be more likely to win by fielding a more urban-oriented candidate, a fresher face on the political scene than the three who already have run in statewide races?

No doubt some Republicans eager to reclaim the statehouse after eight years of Democratic rule will think about those prospects on June 6, but there's little reason at this point to think Skeen's aides are being premature in planning their victory party for that night.

Since Skeen was serving as GOP State Senate leader in the Sixties, his Republican colleagues Domenici, Manuel Lujan and Jack Schmitt have gone on to take majority control of the four-person congressional delegation and Republicans have made inroads at the county and legislative level.

Dave Cargo served four years as governor 1967-70, but he was an unorthodox Republican with wide appeal to Democrats and never really accepted by many GOP insiders. Now many of those party veterans are hoping this is the year to place one of their own in the governor's mansion.

THE SIZE OF JURIES

Prior to a landmark Supreme Court ruling in 1970, there was much debate about the need for the traditional 12-person jury. It was argued that this inheritance from English common law was outmoded — that a smaller jury would serve the cause of justice quite as well, and more cheaply.

The high court's decision seemed to settle the matter. Finding "no discernible differences" in the quality of justice rendered by juries of varying size, it described the number 12 as "just a historical accident" and thus cleared the way for experimentation.

Since then, juries of fewer than 12 members have become commonplace. Eighty of the 95 federal District Courts use smaller juries in some civil cases. So do 38 states. Some criminal cases also are tried before small panels in 34 of the states. Moreover, the high court has in effect reaffirmed its position in a recent decision upholding the constitutionality of six-person juries.

The wisdom of the break with a tradition extending back hundreds of years is nevertheless being questioned. A well known expert on juries, Prof. Hans Ziesel of the University of Chicago Law School, now says the Supreme Court undoubtedly "made a mistake" in its 1970 ruling.

That is a question for constitutional law specialists to chew on. There are indications, though, that as a practical matter Ziesel may be right. Researchers have found that on smaller panel jurors

are not as likely to be talked out of their initial biases. Studies also suggest that the facts of a case are not as well remembered on a small panel, presumably because there are fewer people to share their recollections.

The Supreme Court has sometimes reversed itself in the past. It may do so again if cumulative data brought before it in some future case weighs heavily against reducing the size of juries. — The Valley Courier, Alamosa, Colorado

FEDERAL JOB FRAUD

A recent investigation of the federal public job program revealed widespread fraud. Of course, that's inevitable when the federal government turns over substantial sums of money to various states and municipalities — where political machines in power often feather their own nests.

Money — free, government money especially, turned over to politicians — invariably produces a varying degree of corruption, fraud and outright stealing. That's why real jobs, created by an expanding free enterprise system is better response to unemployment than vast public spending for federal make-believe jobs. — Santa Rosa News

A REAL CAN OF WORMS

As I choose to understand it... a May 31 decision by the United States Supreme Court makes a mockery of the Fourth Amendment to the Constitution:

"Persons and houses to be secure from unreasonable searches and seizures." The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized."

The court's action stems from a search of the Stanford Daily, a college newspaper, in Palo Alto, California, seven years ago... and makes that search legal... though the police didn't find anything to aid their investigation into who had attacked police during a demonstration on the Stanford campus.

The portion of the court's ruling pertaining to the free press... be it print or electronic media... could cause considerable inconvenience to reporters... especially investigative reporters... 'cause if'n the police think they can glom onto information divulging confidential sources... all they gotta do is get a warrant... and start looking... maybe without putting stuff back.

'Course... in my fr' instance... if'n a policeman wants to search into my files, he'll have his work cut out... 'cause searching my files would be an exercise in futility and frustration... however they might find that picture of one of our perennial political candidates that I lost without any undue effort.

So much for any effect this ruling has on First Amendment provisions... for the first time, this will enable police with a search warrant to enter your office... or your home... to search for some evidence of crime... and no longer does this officer

have to prove "reasonable cause" to a judge issuing a search warrant... all he has to do is convince the judge that he is of the opinion that a search of your home... or office... would produce evidence of a crime... and there's the sticker... no specific crime... no suspicion of a specific crime... just evidence of a crime.

This means that the long-standing expression: "A man's home is his castle," now has to be modified to include the words... except for such time as a policeman armed with a warrant wants to nose around to find evidence of a crime... why it opens up all kinds of possibilities... such as ripping open your oriental rugs... 'cause some Chinaman might have wrapped some opium in it... and it might be a crime for you to own an opium tainted rug.

On the bright side... it's unlikely that the average tax-paying, law-abiding, God-fearing, non-drinking, non-smoking, non-swearing, non-cop baiting citizen will be subjected to a search of his home by warrant... though it doesn't preclude that possibility.

On the thumb hand side... it offers the police a legal means of harassment... 'cause a hint of suspicion... coupled with the whims of a judge who is publicly opposed to crime... sorta gives the police carte blanche to violate the sanctity of any person's home... to search for evidence of a crime.

Gadzooks... there's that move underway in Washington, D. C., now that'd open the door for seizure of all privately owned firearms... that's legally owned firearms... under the pretense that if it was possible to seize all firearms, it'd eliminate robbery with firearm enhancement... which'd hardly prevent a criminal from obtaining a gun... even if he had to make it.

At the very least, this should give all of our Human Rights enthusiasts food for thought... fodder for their attacks... and, at last, a truly worthy cause to pursue... to protect the rights of our citizens under the Fourth Amendment. 'Course, that might be day dreaming in the extreme, considering some of the causes these purported supporters of people's rights pursue.

However, if'n you don't aggravate the police, you still might sleep nights.
