

# SCS dam approval expected

Final approval of all aspects of construction of the 1,100 million gallon water impoundment on Eagle Creek, to be known as Tom Jones Lake, is expected tomorrow from Soil Conservation Service (SCS) offices in Portland, Oregon.

On hand, to immediately procure this approval, will be a representative of Mann Engineering, Roswell, project engineers.

Ruidoso's trustees have been advised by Mann Engineering that the United States Forest Service will immediately issue a permit for the start of road relocation around the dam site, upon receipt of SCS approval of project plans.

In this connection, all staking of the reroute and marking of all trees involved in the project has been completed.

"We'll start road construction," Dick Wright of Mann Engineering said, "as soon as we receive the Forest Service permit."

On receipt of SCS approval of the project, advertising for bids will be issued. The time limits involved in advertising, opening of and awarding of bids, if initiated tomorrow, would enable dam site construction work to be underway about October 1.

Negotiations to acquire privately owned land at the dam construction site, Hine said, "are on schedule and we anticipate no settlement problems."

## Outside watering prohibited

Effective immediately, Ruidoso residents are prohibited from using village water for all outdoor purposes from car washing to lawn watering.


"Conservation of water," village manager Jim Hine said, "is absolutely vital. Current usage of two million gallons daily is the maximum that can be treated in our two plants, so we must impose this water use restriction."

Rationing of water isn't contemplated at the present, Hine said, "and, if everyone cooperates, we hope it won't be necessary."

The problem arose, Hine said, due to strike-induced delays in receiving parts and supplies to complete the new Alto water treatment facility. "The best we can hope for now," he said, "is to have the plant operational in August. Meantime, all of us must conserve water."

## Pocket Coin wins Kindergarten

Pocket Coin, a colt with an obvious affinity for cash, whetted his hungry appetite at Ruidoso Downs Sunday by collecting another \$13,810.

That was the winner's share of the Rio Grande Kindergarten Futurity at four furlongs.

The field was limited to New Mexico-breds, but none of the competition was able to give Pocket Coin anything resembling a threat.

The fans made Pocket Coin a prohibitive odds-on favorite and he bounded into an early lead. Easy Million, a 20-1 outsider, tried to stick with Pocket Coin down the backstretch, but it was clearly a hopeless cause.

Next, it was time for Draconic's Loom, a 9-2 shot, to put his two cents in. He took a

crack at Pocket Coin around the turn for home, appeared to make a little headway, but when the field reached the straightaway, Pocket Coin opened up once again. It was simply no match the rest of the way as the people's choice cruised down the stretch, winning by an embarrassing 63/4 lengths.

The winning time of 45 4/5 seconds was the same clocking Pocket Coin carved out while winning his trial heat a week ago. Charles Mueller was in the saddle once again. Sunday's victory boosted Pocket Coin's career income to a stunning \$73,920 from only five starts. Most of the previous booty came with that impressive close second in Sunland Park's \$291,000 Riley Allison Futurity.

Pocket Coin is trained by Mike Welch for

Melvin and Ernest Riggs of Ft. Stockton, Texas.

The Kindergarten outcome was a clean sweep for the Riggs team, since their second horse in the race, Ernest Scout, moved up eagerly in the stretch to take second. Ernest Scout, ridden by Richard Bickel, beat out the tiring Draconic's Loom by a neck and earned \$5,524.

So that means the Riggs camp pulled in \$19,334 out of the Kindergarten gross purse of \$27,620. Fans who backed the Riggs twosome in the betting collected depressed returns of \$2.80 to win, a lopsided \$3.20 to place, and a rock-bottom \$2.20 to show.

Draconic's Loom, the property of V. J. Callaway of Hobbs, had to settle for a

# Chamber airs plans

The special events committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce met Wednesday evening to discuss upcoming projects and the possibility of an added special event this summer.

Chairman of the Arts and Crafts subcommittee, John West, outlined the plans for the July 28-30 Professional Crafts Show at the Chaparral Convention Center. "We plan to build booths," he said, "possibly at little or no cost."

"A lumber yard may provide us with materials at cost" and the group will use the lumber for three days and then resell it to a contractor possibly for use as flooring or decking.

West said the committee presently plans to build 88 booths and provide an additional 28 spaces along the walls.

Other plans of the committee include decorating the center with pine trees; offering box lunches to the artists; printing, in cooperation with The News, a tabloid section of the show, and providing a "welcome wagon" package.

"We're pursuing the theme of involving as much of the community as possible, involving those who never have been involved," West said.

In addition to planning a coffee for the artists, the committee hopes to distribute a "welcome wagon" type package of gift certificates from area merchants.

The committee also will institute a new

program of host/sponsors for each artist.

"Duties of the host/sponsor will be to contact the artist (in the next few weeks) and offer assistance in locating motel space or camping space and generally offer New Mexico hospitality to make their stay more pleasant."

"Essentially we hope to give them a contact in the town."

West said persons interested in becoming a host/sponsor may contact the Chamber at 257-7395.

Bill Hirschfeld, chairman of the special events committee told the group the Cadillac Party would be held at 7 p.m.,

August 15 at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. Invitations to purchase the \$125 tickets have been mailed to past participants and will go on sale to the general public June 28.

"The vehicle will cost \$8,600 to \$9,000," he said. "We decided on Cadillac instead of Lincoln because of the cost and for tradition."

In addition to briefly discussing mule races and Aspencade, the committee discussed sponsoring another program this summer. Suggestions ranged from a hot dog and watermelon party to another speaker.

Donations are being accepted for medical treatment of 10-year old Michael Bustamonte who received what was described as a massive brain concussion Friday afternoon when the horse he was riding stumbled and fell, rolling over the child's head.

According to Richard Seeley, Exalted Ruler of the local Elks Club and spearheader for the fund drive, Bustamonte, the son of Frank and Dolores Bustamonte, was transported to El Paso's Sierra Medical Center by MAST helicopter Friday night following the mishap which occurred at Ruidoso Downs.

Saturday, the boy was still listed in serious condition and unconscious at the medical center.

"Presently we have a fund at the Elks Lodge," Seeley said. "There is a fund set up at the Ruidoso State Bank and we should have a fund set up at the Security Bank (today).

"Any gifts, donations or whatever are sure welcome," he said. "As far as we know the family had no insurance to cover (medical) expenses."

Seeley said that several clubs, including the CB Club, had indicated support for the fund drive. He added that donations are also being accepted at the Race Track Kitchen, St. Eleanor's Church and at the Knights of Columbus.

Ned Hanger, the 6-5 betting choice, also had plenty of early lick and tried to duel Al's Vest down the backstretch.

At the turn for home, Al's Vest had the edge on Ned Hanger. He kept piling up his advantage and flashed across the finish with a commanding 3/4-length lead. Jockey Pilkenton hand rode the winner

down the straightaway.

Al's Vest earned \$5,061 out of the \$8,435 gross purse and refunded mutuels of \$6.80, \$3. and \$2.60. The winning time was 45.72 seconds. Al's Vest is owned by Dixie Ferguson of Hampshire, Texas.

Ned Hanger held on for a weary second, returning \$3 and \$2.50. Credit Reference, a 6-1 outsider, moved well to take third for a \$3 return.

The winner covered the distance in 1:15 4/5 seconds and refunded \$12.20 to win, \$7.40 to place, \$5.20 to show. Flica Gold paid \$17.60 and \$8.20. What A Splash sagged to third for a \$5.40 payoff. Ruff Hemp, the public choice, quit badly after showing some early speed.

Racing at Ruidoso resumes Thursday at 1:30 p.m., and reaches a climax with Sunday's \$6,000-added Rio Grande Stakes at 6 1/2 furlongs.

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

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
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# Mike Collier seeking national race sponsor

### RED ANTI-SEMITISM

The Soviet government's intensified effort to crush dissent has ominous anti-Semitic overtones. Analysts find a disquieting link between the crackdown and the publication — with official sanction, naturally — of books and articles containing attacks on the Jews.

During the farcical trial that preceded the sentencing of the dissident physicist Yuri Orlov, there were frequent disturbances outside the courtrooms. Some of the shouted insults were anti-Semitic in character.

There is reason to think that this attitude has been fostered by what is being published in Russia. Just within the past three years, more than 20 books along these lines have appeared. Though such books generally purport to be anti-Israel or anti-Zionist studies, a more sinister underlying theme is evident.

The point has been underscored by Prof. John Armstrong of the University of Wisconsin. He concludes that these materials blend "the main features of traditional anti-Semitic propaganda, as developed from the Middle Ages through the Nazi press, with Soviet Cold War cliches in which Jews, Zionists and Israel replace the Western powers as arch-villains."

Dr. William Korey, director of the B'nai B'rith international council, finds a relationship between such published matter and popular expressions of anti-Semitism such as were heard at the time of the Orlov trial. He predicts that "the connection will be even sharper when they bring Anatoly Shcharansky to trial in the next weeks."

What we have here is the spectacle of a major power, only a few decades after the

Nazi horrors, again conjuring up the grisly spectre of unreasoning hatred for the Jews. The Kremlin is engaged in a cynical, calculated effort to quash dissent by directing that hatred at the dissenters. This is an intolerable affront to civilized society — one that ought to be outspokenly condemned by civilized governments, organizations and individuals everywhere. —Alamogordo Daily News

### MINIMUM WAGE

Congress last year bowed to organized labor's demand that the minimum wage be increased. After all, organized labor had contributed heavily to the campaigns of many who voted to raise the minimum from \$2.30 to \$2.65. The increase took effect in January.

Recent figures show what some had feared, including the liberal New York Times and several liberals in Congress, such as Paul Simon (D-Illinois), that the higher minimum wage has reduced teenage employment. It was 17.3 per cent in March, up from 15.8 in December!

Thus the loss of jobs among teen-agers has just about canceled out the number of new jobs created by the expensive Carter Administration make-jobs program — at the taxpayer's expense. Among black teen-agers, the result of the higher minimum wage is especially painful. Their unemployment rate in March is 39 per cent!

While part of this is due to a lack of initiative or skills, even reading skill, some is also due to the higher minimum wage — which is scheduled for two more automatic hikes.

What is needed in this country is what most European countries already utilize — a lower minimum wage for teen-age workers. —Santa Rosa News

**SANTA FE** — Early indications, based on an analysis of primary election returns, are that the 1978 race for governor will involve strong competition for votes in vote-rich Albuquerque and in the mostly conservative Second Congressional District.

Albuquerque and its surrounding metropolitan area contributes about one-third of the total state vote, so its populace will be avidly courted by both the Joe Skeen-Leo Dow Republican slate and the Democrat ticket of Bruce King and Roberto Mondragon.

The King-Mondragon ticket is the same offered by Democrats in 1970. The two were successful statewide, but lost Bernalillo County, where Albuquerque is located, by 49,882 to 40,973 to Republicans Pete Domenici and Joe Skeen.

Domenici is from Albuquerque and was chairman of its city commission.

This year, both parties' lieutenant governor nominees are from Albuquerque, both having represented South Valley districts in the Legislature. Democrats outnumber Republicans in Bernalillo County registrations, 110,217 to 62,615, but the city has been a stronghold for the GOP in recent years, regardless. It also has 15,232 independents, many of whom tend to favor Republicans in the general elections.

Democrats in recent elections have tended to pick up their strength in New Mexico's other 31 counties — winning only if they gained enough margin to overcome GOP strength in Albuquerque.

Judging from primary election returns, it appears King and Mondragon will have good strength in the First Congressional District outside Albuquerque — with Albuquerque itself as a tossup for the moment.

King carried counties like Santa Fe, Rio Arriba, Guadalupe, San Miguel and Taos with wide margins over Bob Ferguson.

Similarly, Mondragon put together his victory over four lieutenant governor opponents with big wins in the same

northern counties. Mondragon carried Rio Arriba with 2,463 votes, with Tom Rutherford second, 1,462 votes. His margin over Rutherford in Taos County was 2,320 to 475, and in his boyhood county of Guadalupe it was 1,074 to 100.

Rutherford ran strongly in his home Bernalillo County and picked up victories in southern counties like Chaves (1,564 to second-place Odis Echols, 1,141), Otero (1,586, with Mondragon second, 1,347) and McKinley (1,238, with Mondragon second, 1,194).

But Rutherford and Odis Echols split much of the Second Congressional District vote, however, leaving Mondragon his winning margin in the relatively undivided northern counties.

Echols carried his home county of Curry, 2,043 to 1,241 for second-running Rutherford. He pulled past Rutherford in Eddy County, 2,427 to 2,138, and in Lea County, 1,614 to 1,024.

Fourth-running Rich Sims, who stressed conservative themes in his campaign, didn't carry any counties but pulled in significant votes in southeastern counties like Eddy, Chaves and DeBaca. State Rep. Lenton Malry of Albuquerque, the only black in any of the statewide campaigns, never got his campaign into a contending position.

Republican Skeen apparently will attempt to portray himself as more conservative than King. Ferguson did so in his intra-party challenge to King and introduced his best showings in the conservative counties of the Second Congressional District.

"Right-to-work" was one of the few — and perhaps the only — issues in the King-Ferguson contest and it seems likely to surface in the general, with Skeen favoring it and perhaps picking up votes from his stance in counties where the concept of a "union shop" is unpopular.

But the Democrats could be helped by the issue in places like Grant and Eddy counties, union areas where King got strong labor backing against Ferguson in the primary.



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# Glencoe Airman Gomez' unit cited

Airman First Class William F. Gomez Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. William F. Gomez Sr. of Glencoe, is a member of a Grissom AFB, Indiana, unit which has received the Strategic Air Command's General Bruce K. Holloway Humanitarian Award for rescuing stranded motorists during two crippling blizzards.

Airman Gomez is a jet engine mechanic with Grissom's 306th Air Refueling Wing.

According to the nominating letter, Grissom airmen manned wreckers and four wheel drive vehicles to pull trucks and cars from United States Highway 31 after 50 mile per hour winds brought wind chill temperatures down to minus 70 degrees and stacked snow drifts five feet tall. The winds kept visibility near zero and buried many of the 200 stranded vehicles within minutes.

During the first 1977 winter storm January 26-30, the base housed more than 80 stranded motorists a day. Airmen voluntarily worked in the Non-commissioned Officers' and Officers' Clubs cooking and serving more than 300 meals. Cots were loaned to community shelters.

Grissom also supplied water cans and plastic bags to the city of Kokomo,

Indiana, to relieve a water shortage caused by broken mains. Base people traveled to the highway to start and refuel trucks so the roadway could be plowed. They also helped locate and rescue stranded motorists.

The base citizens band radio club opened and manned the commissary and service station so critical food and fuel supplies could be replenished. Many people were

treated at the base hospital. In addition to clearing the base, Grissom civil engineers cleared more than 150 miles of off-base roads and a local airport. Severe weather hit the local area again December 9-11. Grissom repeated the emergency tactics. This time, more than 900 vehicle assists were added to the

record along with 100 grocery deliveries and five hospital runs, the nominating letter stated.

The airman is a 1976 graduate of Hondo Valley Public High School, Hondo. His wife, Beatrice, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E.O. Sanchez of San Patricio.




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### The Dreamer

In the lower reaches of the valleys there should be cherries ready in a couple of weeks, and a few apricots. Most of the cherry country is over up from La Luz in the neighborhood of Mountain Park and High Rolls, on the way to Cloudcroft.

The main fruit crop of the Ruidoso-Hondo valley is apples and pears. However there are quite a few peaches, cherries,



and plums. This year there should be a good supply of these, along with a few Apricots. The main apricot country is down at Tularosa.

Very soon now, there should be some pie cherries ripening down toward Riverside and Pecos, and through the days these same little early ripeners will be ripening all the way up the valley. Following these will be the sweet cherries, plums, peaches, pears and apples.

In most of our country, generally speaking, August is the peach month, September the pear month, and October the month of apples.

Here on the slopes of the White Mountain the fruit begins ripening earlier in the lower regions and goes in a sort of parade, extending over several weeks, on up to the higher country. Apples begin ripening as early as late August in the lower Hondo Valley, and then reach full ripeness in October on the upper Bonito.

The early fruit is showing its colors, and very soon now the picture will become clearer. It is a good time to make a little journey around the valleys to see the wild flowers, and to have a look at the summer countryside, and learn something about the ripening of the fruit.

For eight weeks the participants will work in campgrounds, the wilderness and other areas of Lincoln National Forest.

"They will work in the area of campground rehabilitation, building fireplaces at South Fork Campground. And will close a portion of the old ski area at Cedar Creek," Joe Spehar, recreation and land use forester, said.

"They also will do some trail maintenance in White Mountain Wilderness, build a fuel break in Philadelphia Canyon and do some fence removal and construction along the Bonito Road."

In addition to the work, the group will spend "about two hours a day in environmental education. They won't have sessions on a regularly scheduled basis,

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## Coyotes blamed for high lamb kill

Coyotes kill more lambs than any other predators, according to wildlife researchers with New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station.

The researchers also found that ranchers having at least one boundary fence facing land not used for sheep production reported a significantly higher percentage of lamb mortalities from coyote predation in both years of the study than did ranchers surrounded by other wool growers. These same ranchers also reported a significantly higher percentage of lamb mortalities attributed to predation from eagles during one year of the two year study.

Researchers V. W. Howard and Richard Shaw reported their results in Research Report 356, "Preliminary Assessment of Predator Damage to the Sheep Industry in Southeastern New Mexico."

During 1972, the first study year, the

researchers found that ranchers lost 9,847 lambs to all causes. Of those lost, 8,070 lambs were lost to predation. Among the lambs lost to predation, 4,461 or 55.3 percent were attributed to coyotes; 1,432 or 17.7 percent to bobcats; 1,821 or 22.5 percent to eagles; and 356 or 4.4 percent to other predator species.

In 1973, the researchers found that 11,955 lambs were lost to all causes with 5.8 percent or 8,285 lambs lost to predation. Among those lambs lost to predation, 4,555 or 55.0 percent were lost to coyotes; 1,590 or 19.2 percent to bobcats; 1,724 or 20.8 percent to eagles; and 416 or 5 percent to other predators.
