TRUSTEES APPROVE SLIGHT SPENDING HIKE

Budget nears \$3 million

The Ruidoso trustees Tuesday evening approved a \$2,949,040 budget for the 1978-1979 fiscal year, July 1, 1978 through June 30, 1979.

The new budget represents an increase of \$79,054 over the \$2,870,586 budget for fiscal 1977-1978.

The facilitate comparison of the new budget with last year's expenditures, the following departmental breakdown indicates the increase or decrease, by fund, in the 1978-1979 fiscal year budget over last fiscal year.

- General — \$1,220,592, up from \$1,045,413.
- State Fire — \$30,313, down from \$34,889.
- Recreation — \$14,014, down from \$19,677.
- Lodger's Tax — \$26,000, down from \$30,300.
- Revenue Share — \$113,685, up from \$86,273.
- General Obligation Debt Service — \$613,845, up from \$600,014.
- Solid Waste — \$215,425, up from \$187,574.
- Cemetery — \$6,000, up from \$4,700.
- Airport — \$242,582, down from \$397,686.
- Water — \$361,165, up from \$361,024.
- Sewer — \$106,019, down from \$113,036.

The only foreseeable change, village manager Jim Hine advised the trustees, "will be in the event there is an adjustment in the rates for new water taps."

Anticipated revenue for general fund expenditures the next fiscal year include: Local property, franchise, occupation, lodger's and gross receipts taxes totaling \$406,000.

State gasoline, auto, cigaret and gross receipts taxes totaling \$581,200.

The balance of general fund revenues is derived from many small income sources, including interest on investments, court fines, grants and services rendered by the village.

In other business, the trustees:

- Accepted the low bids of Alamo Pipe and Supply Company, Alamogordo, for \$20,769.26, pipe and tapping; Boles and Edens, El Paso, Texas, for \$275.15, elbows and bends; Waterworks Sales Company, Albuquerque, for \$547.82 for valves and tap tee, for the new Ponderosa Pipeline.
- Accepted the low bid of AR&S Incorporated, Albuquerque, for \$17,430, on a 1,500 gallon Avgas refueler and cab

chassis, for Municipal Airport.

Accepted the sole bid of Dean Fredekind and Swepeco, Capitan, for \$2,774.75 to repair the roof of the terminal building at Municipal Airport.

Adopted Resolution 78-8 providing for changes in the 1977-1978 fiscal year budget for the village.

Were advised by Tom Mann Jr., Mann Engineering, Roswell, that approval of the engineering plans for Eagle Creek Dam is expected from the Soil Conservation Service, Portland, Oregon, by June 30 and that Mann's assessment of any indicated changes will be reported to the trustees early in July.

Were advised by village purchasing agent Frank Potter that delays in the receipt of a transformer and controls for Alto Crest Water Treatment Plant, put the target date for placing the plant in service at August 15.

Granted a 25 year operational franchise to Ruidoso Natural Gas Company.

Authorized Potter, village attorney Ron Harris and street superintendent Jack LaMay to meet with interested parties to

olve a drainage problem on Robin Road at Kings Supper Club and Carter's Park addition.

Received a request from water superintendent Jim Goodman to continue the curtailment of outside watering through July 19, at the earliest.

Adopted Resolution 78-9, pertaining to the "Per Diem and Mileage Act" passed by the 1978 state legislature, reducing the amount of payment of per diem for non-salaried public officers from \$32 to zero (\$0) per meeting attended within the municipal boundaries of the Village of Ruidoso. The adoption of the resolution is in conformance with existing village policy.

Authorized Municipal Airport Manager Tim Morris to apply for a Federal Aviation Administration grant to erect a building to store snow removal equipment, repair the airport's perimeter fence and correct a drainage problem.

Downs okays \$283,485 budget for next fiscal year

The Ruidoso Downs trustees Tuesday gave final approval of village expenditures of \$283,485 for the 1978-1979 fiscal year, at a public hearing on the budget.

Projected revenues for the coming fiscal year are expected to be \$301,485.

Topping the budget is \$151,307 to go into the village's general fund. According to village officials, the general fund furnishes operating expenses and salaries for all but the fire, sanitation and utility divisions of the village government. General fund revenues are expected to be \$155,664.

The utility department will receive \$67,337 for operating and salary expenses. Revenues from the utility department are expected to be \$75,465.

Revenue sharing funds of \$33,171 have been earmarked for village projects covered under the federal revenue sharing act. The anticipated revenue sharing income is pegged at \$38,168.

The sanitation division has been budgeted \$17,900 for sanitation employees' salaries and operating expenses for the division. The figure equals expected

revenues of \$17,900.

Ruidoso Downs' fire department will receive \$14,125 to help cover operating expenses. Revenues to the fire department from outside sources are \$15,938.

The trustees budgeted \$100 of the recreation department's expected revenues of \$350.

Ruidoso Downs officials explained that although most of the village's divisions show more incoming revenues than expenditures, the extra monies, though not presently budgeted, will probably be spent by the end of the fiscal year.

Downs raising garbage rates, gross receipts tax

During a meeting which saw passage of a village ordinance designed to raise the gross receipts tax (GRT) rate paid by village merchants, the Ruidoso Downs trustees Tuesday gave notice of their intent to raise village garbage collection bills by as much as 100 percent.

The trustees have announced that the new garbage collection fees, which will see in-village residential rates upped from \$2.75 to \$4.50 per month, will be adopted by the trustees at their July 10 meeting.

Hardest hit by the new rates will be restaurants which currently pay \$12.50 per month to have garbage hauled away by village sanitation workers. Under the new schedule restaurants will pay \$25 per month for refuse collection. Residences located outside the village limits will have monthly garbage collection bills upped to \$5.50 from \$3.75 per month.

Commercial establishments located in the village limits can expect to see rates raised from the current \$7.50 per month to \$11.50. Businesses located outside the village limits will see an increase from \$9.50 to \$12.50 per month.

THE NEW RATE SCHEDULE was unveiled by trustee Juanita Burke who, as sanitation commissioner, said the higher rates are needed to enable the village to purchase a new garbage collection truck.

According to Burke, the new rates will generate an additional \$9,879 in yearly revenue for the village.

"We're in a situation where, if we expect to provide garbage service, we're going to have to raise the rates," Burke said.

In another step designed to increase revenue to the village, the trustees enacted an ordinance which will increase the village's gross receipts tax to 4.5 percent, after July 1, 1979.

According to village clerk Virginia Spall, the increase is being enacted under the provisions of a new state law.

"(The gross receipts tax) now stands at 4.25 percent," Spall said. "On July 1 of this year it will revert back to 4 percent, by state law."

"The legislature has allowed municipalities to pick up that quarter percent," she added.

Under the new law, communities can raise the GRT by an additional one-quarter percent bringing the maximum allowable increase to one-half of one percent, she said.

Spall emphasized that .25 percent of the increase can be voted down by the village electorate. She said the issue can be brought to a referendum, if the village receives a petition within 90 days.

Barring a referendum on the matter, the village's GRT rate will be increased to 4.5 percent July 1, 1979.

Other action Tuesday night included:

- A final budget hearing.
- Amendment of the village's animal control ordinance.

Amendment of the building inspector's contract and approval of the new building inspection fee schedule, on file with the village clerk.

Approval of a 25 year franchise for Ruidoso Natural Gas Company allowing the firm to operate gas lines within the village limits.

Passage of a model resolution regarding the state's per diem and mileage act. The resolution, advanced by the Municipal League, allows the village to

not pay member of village boards and commissions for attending meetings held within the village limits.

Accepted John H. Works' resignation from the police department, retroactive to June 23.

Save water! guideline for Ruidosoans

Ruidoso residents are being asked by the village trustees to continue the ban on all outside watering.

The immediate problem, water superintendent Jim Goodman advised the trustees Tuesday, is the racing at Ruidoso Downs nine out of the next ten days.

"We'll get no chance to build a reserve of treated water during this period," Goodman said, "and, if the anticipated crowds come for the Fourth of July holidays, we may not be able to treat enough water to meet the demand."

The outside watering ban will remain in effect at least until July 10.

Downs cracks down on dog, cat owners

Ruidoso Downs' long standing battle with illegal dogs and cats took a new development Tuesday when the village trustees enacted an amendment to the animal control ordinance.

The amendment states that any person harboring three or more dogs, three or more months old, must obtain a kennel license from the village. The same goes for cats and extends to cover combinations of five or more cats and dogs, over three months old.

Under the amendment, which also establishes guidelines for the operation of kennels, a fee of \$100 per year must be paid for a kennel license.

During the trustees regular meeting this week, mayor Norman Wheeler said the village had just gotten rid of one kennel.

"I would rather not see another kennel in the village of Ruidoso Downs," Wheeler said after he suggested enacting an ordinance prohibiting kennels within the village limits.

Village attorney Richard Parsons took exception to Wheeler's proposition and

said, "I honestly don't believe you can prohibit a business operation."

"It (problems concerned with the previously existing kennel) finally was taken care of by complaint," Parsons said. "That's what we need—more citizen involvement."

Wheeler agreed and said he felt maybe a stiff licensing fee would discourage another kennel operation.

Further discussion resulted in the establishment of the \$100 per year licensing fee.

Other provisions of the amendment state that a kennel must secure a kennel license and must be maintained in a sanitary matter, minimizing vermin, disease and odor.

The amendment also states that sick and injured animals must be treated by a veterinarian, exercise facilities must be provided as well as clean, well ventilated housing.

The village also reserves the right to inspect kennels for compliance with the ordinance.

Mescalero Apache Ceremonial set

The Mescalero Apache Tribe released the schedule for four days of activities centering around the Mescalero Apache Ceremonial to be held over the long July fourth weekend.

The four day event will feature traditional dancing and ceremonials including the puberty rites for the ceremonial maidens, games and four days of rodeo. Arts and crafts will be on display for sale along with food including Indian fry bread, chili and mescal, the traditional staple of the Mescaleros.

The maidens for the ceremonial this year are Cindy Valdez, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Pete Valdez Jr.; Stephanie Enjady, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Moquino Sr.; and Shirley Sheo, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Michael Zuzzo.

Cameras will be forbidden at some of the ceremonials, according to a tribal spokesman. However he said persons desiring to photograph some of the events should check with the program committee; either Samuel Cooper or Virginia Kilnekole.

The schedule of events is as follows: Saturday — The traditional ceremonial and puberty rites will be held in the morning at the ceremonial grounds, with a noon meal to follow honoring the maidens.

Around 1 p.m., the rodeo will start at the arena. Following supper, the Mescalero counselors will host native dancing including traditional ceremonial dances. Beginning at dusk, the Dance of the Mountain Gods will be celebrated.

Sunday — Morning will be open to allow participants to attend church. The rodeo will begin at about 1 p.m.

Following supper Ralph Zotigh, Albuquerque, and his group will perform dances of the northern tribes. Following will be gourd, hoop, eagle and social dancing in turn followed by the Dance of the Mountain Gods.

Monday — Games for young and old will be presented at the old ceremonial arena. The rodeo will be held at 1 p.m., followed by Zoligh's northern dancing. Gourd and social dances will follow supper time.

Tuesday — Same as Monday. A Mescalero spokesman said all dancing will take place at the ceremonial grounds. He warned that the grounds will be closed

to visitors at 12 each night.

The ceremonials are being presented by the tribal council consisting of: Wendell Chino, president; Keith Miller, vice-president, and members Evelyn Breunninger, Virginia Kilnekole, Raymond Kargan, Berle Kanseah, Samuel Cooper, Joseph Via, Alton Peso and Christie LaPaz.

CPS joins nationwide energy watch program

Community Public Service Company (CPS) recently was accepted as a member of the National Energy Watch (NEW) program, a company spokesman said Monday.

Designed to help the American homeowner realize the conservation potential of his home, the program emphasizes improving the soundness of the structure pertaining to heat use, installing more efficient energy-consuming equipment and appliances and adopting better use habits.

The country's first nationally organized energy conservation program, NEW was developed by the Edison Electric Institute for use by local electric utilities and their customers throughout the country.

CPS's basis for application in the program was their ongoing Energy Checked Efficiency program which will be revised slightly to comply with NEW standards. Homeowners whose homes

meet the NEW suggested guidelines will be awarded a certificate of membership in the National Energy Watch and decals also will be awarded.

John Sigler of Ruidoso, district manager for CPS, said the company had become a part of the National Energy Watch to help reduce the national drain on scarce fossil fuels, to help minimize the need for costly new electric generating equipment and to help the individual homeowner keep his monthly energy bills as low as possible.

"We must do two things: develop new energy conversion technologies as rapidly as possible and conserve the energy resources we have. Conservation is not a solution to the energy problem, but it is the best lifeline available between the problem today and the promise of tomorrow," he said, adding homeowners who wish to learn more about the NEW homeowner program should contact the CPS office, 394 Sudderth Drive, 257-4011.

School board awards contracts for supplies

The Ruidoso Board of Education held a special meeting Wednesday to open bids on band equipment, maintenance of office machines and milk products.

For Band equipment, a \$1,353 bid was awarded the Music Box in Las Cruces and a \$1,090 bid was awarded to May and Duncan.

Mays of Albuquerque also submitted a bid.

The lengthy bids were considered on an itemized basis as to delivery versus price. On some items, although the other company was the low bidder, the contract was awarded on the basis of prompt delivery to another bidder.

All three bids on a concert bass drum were rejected but a new call for bids with

different specifications will be sent to the three companies.

Western Office Equipment of Ruidoso was awarded a bid for \$3,069 to maintain office equipment. Neeley James of Ruidoso submitted a bid of \$3,289.

Clardy's of Roswell was awarded a contract to provide milk products for the 1978-79 school year.

Their bid was for \$1.03 per pint, plain milk, and \$1.23 per pint, chocolate milk.

The other bidder was Prices' Dairies of El Paso.

Conducting the meeting in the absence of chairman Dave Parks, was Don Swalander. Other school board members present were Lamar Osborn, Stormy Edwards and C.L. "Bones" Wright.

Solution to bikers' woes not immediately at hand

No immediate solutions to potential problems with motorcycle outlaws in Ruidoso were offered by seven representatives of law enforcement agencies, during Monday evening's lengthy town meeting.

Representatives requested time to consider the situation after listening to angry and fearful reports of actions by motorcycle outlaws during the past years, especially reports on actions by the Bandidos during their national convention last September in Ruidoso.

"I'm going to talk turkey with you," John Ramming, assistant director, Governor's Council on Criminal Justice, told the audience of about 300 persons.

"I'll tell you what we're not going to do. We're not going to mobilize the National Guard now or bring in a tactical team.

"I don't want to mislead you, but based on information we have ... it's not justified at this time frame.

"I'd be lying to say we have the answers, there's no sense in trying to play a game. Give us a shot at it."

Ramming said he would talk with Martin Vigil, head of the State Police and Dr. Charles Becknell, director of the Governor's Council on Criminal Justice, and "return with a plan."

AFTER THE MEETING, Ramming said, "We need to determine the action needed and look at the situation as it develops. We don't know what's needed now.

"We need a coordinated effort in the state to determine resources available and then address the problem."

With talk in the audience of vigilante-type action, Ramming said, "We're asking people not to take the law into their own hands and give us the opportunity to determine what is needed and what resources are needed to solve the problem.

"We're aware you have a serious problem or we wouldn't have been here tonight. We'll do all in our power as quickly as possible."

CONCERNING VIGILANTE action, Chief W. Bullock, representing Vigil and the State Police, quoted a former Los Angeles police chief as saying "If you are going to start a war, you'd better call in the

Marines, we don't have enough manpower."

When told of the possibility Bandidos will be in Ruidoso during the July 4 weekend, Ramming said, "This is the first I know of a reasonable apprehension the Bandidos will come to Ruidoso during the Fourth of July weekend," assuring the audience he would assess the problem Tuesday morning.

He told the group they would not be left unprotected if motorcycle outlaws were in town and violence threatened.

Bullock assured the group, "We will work through the law enforcement agencies to furnish all (the manpower) we have available.

"But, far be it for me to say, we'll have 20 or 30 men here before the time comes. We'll never refuse assistance."

ONE OF THE MAIN complaints aired at the meeting was motorcycle outlaws

violated common laws and no action was taken against them.

Attorney Mona Yardumlan asked, if minor violations are "not enforced now, what will they want later?"

Another member of the audience, referring to the transportation of alcohol to the Bandido camp on a Sunday in an effort to keep them out of town, said, "Last year we took them booze on Sunday, what will they want this year and if they don't get it, what will the retaliation be?"

A former member of the Bandidos and resident of Ruidoso said, "Things get out of control to the point where they can't get back into control.

"Furnishing them alcohol on Sunday opened the door and said 'Come in, you can have it.'"

The meeting concluded with a plan to have another meeting to discuss any comments offered by Becknell or Vigil.

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

She says her songs are straightforward statements of her beliefs offered in an attempt to give comfort and joy to those around her.

"Music is a good way for us to translate the gospel into a language people can understand," she said.

She said McVay and she have joined such performers as Paul Stucky (formerly of Peter, Paul and Mary), Barry McGuire, Richey Furray and members of Mason Profit in the ranks of contemporary Christian music.

She describes her brand of contemporary Christian music as bordering on country rock but says contemporary Christian music can run the full spectrum including jazz and folk.

McVay's biography describes him as "a

surfer and a sailor, a singer and a saint, with a low-key whimsy and a high degree of adventure."

Originally from Hanford, California, he has performed with the group Mustard Seed Faith as a drummer and a composer. The group chalked up one Maranatha! Music album which continues to place high on of contemporary gospel music. He has also recorded a solo LP.

McVay and his wife Dianne live near Costa Mesa, California where they spend a lot of time on the water in a sail boat which he owns jointly with his brother.





Fishing fever cure at hand

This would be a good year to catch a case of fishing fever, because the cure is at hand, according to the Department of Game and Fish.

"We plan to stock more catchable-sized trout in New Mexico waters this season than ever before," said Dick McCleskey, assistant chief of the Fisheries Division. "Stockings will be up by close to 10 percent this year, and last year was one of our best years to date."

He said that Game and Fish Department hatchery crews plan to put approximately 1.47 million catchable-sized rainbows into trout waters throughout the state this year, 120,000 more than last year.

"We'll probably break the 500,000-pound mark this year for the first time, as well," McCleskey said. "Production is up at almost all our hatcheries."

He attributed the increased production to recent renovations and additions at the state's hatcheries and to the work of the men who run them.

State hatcheries are Glenwood, Lisboa Springs (near Pecos), Red River, Parkview, Seven Springs (near Jemez) and Rock Lake (near Santa Rosa).

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
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
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Army women pistol, rifle medal winners



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
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

Last year, after 26 race days and 320 races, the handle was \$8,763,262, daily average \$337,048 and per race \$27,385.

Jockey/Trainer of the week

Gary Sumpter turned in a powerful performance over the four-day racing weekend at Ruidoso Downs to take Jockey-of-the-Week honors for the third time this season.

The veteran rider took seven trips through the winner's circle to maintain the

top berth in the standings. His overall record stands at 28 wins, 17 seconds, and 25 thirds from 148 starts for a win percentage of 18.9.

Sumpter began his campaign Thursday with two victories, then came back for two more in Friday's Rainbow Derby trials.

The victors were Real Easy Jet and Duplicate Jet but neither set a fast enough pace to qualify for the rich finale. Real Easy Jet however scored with a time of 21.96 seconds to go in the Derby consolation.

Saturday, Sumpter took only one triumph but that was aboard an 11-1 longshot, Oh Tabasco. The four-year-old colt battled in a 400 yard powerburst and notched a neck victory in his Ruidoso debut. The jockey completed his tally with two more wins on Sunday and chalked up a second and five thirds over the weekend as well.

Jerry Burgess also had a successful weekend with a 4-2-2 tally from the four days. He moved into ninth place in the standings for an overall score of 14-10-9 from 112 starts and a 12.5 win percentage.

Gene Tefertiller captured the Trainer-of-the-Week honor with four wins to his credit. He sent out a top fleet in the Rainbow Derby trials including victors, Hot Idea, Easy Move and Medley Glass. The latter captured a spot in the finale of the Derby while Hot Idea (last year's All-American winner) and Easy Move (the Kansas Derby winner) made it into the Consolation.

Tefertiller moved up to sixth place in the standings with a 12-6-4 record from 53 starts. H. C. Werner Jr., maintained the top spot among the trainers with a 15-16-11 tally from 96 starts for an overall win percentage of 15.6.

SECO MIA took the top qualifying berth for the upcoming \$516,500 Rainbow Derby in Friday's trials at Ruidoso Downs. The filly, owned by the Cryan Ranch, Incorporated, of Sealy, Texas, coursed to a head victory with jockey Jackie Martin aboard to set a brisk time of 21.71 seconds for the 440 yard distance. And remarkably enough, she did it in the first trial division and it held up as the fastest trip all day. The winner's share in the Derby will be \$179,025.

Here are the other finalists with their qualifying times: Miss Thermolark, 21.74; Easy Saint, 21.83; Perfect View, 21.86; Biffy Pass, 21.90; Jun Jun Ni, 21.90; Little Flyin, 21.90; Medley Glass, 21.92½; Stoa Minga, 21.93; Magnum Load, 21.95½.

TOP MONEY EARNER of the field is Miss Thermolark, the filly owned by Ronny Schlep of Miami, Oklahoma. Miss Thermolark notched last year's Rainbow Futurity. She boasts a career record of 9-2-0 from 13 starts for a huge money line of \$198,522. The sophomore finished second by a head to Seco Mia in the first division with jockey Carl White in the saddle. On the other end of the scale is Little Flyin. She's had 10 career starts for skimpy earnings of \$3,401.

ALL OF THE FINALISTS finished in the money in their trials. Four made it to the winner's circle by narrow victory margins ranging from a head to a half length. Besides Seco Mia, they were Easy Saint, Perfect View and Medley Glass. Miss Thermolark, Biffy Pass, Little Flyin and Magnum Load took runnerup slots, while Jun Jun Ni and Stoa Minga each finished third.

EASY MOVE, winner of the Kansas Derby earlier this season, missed his chance at nabbing the second leg of the Triple Crown when she turned in a time of 21.58½ seconds, just 3/100ths too slow to qualify for the finale. The colt won his trial division by a length as the heavy favorite, but had to settle for a spot in the \$74,679 Consolation.

THE FILLIES took their toll in the

trials as seven of them moved into the finale field. The only colts to qualify were Easy Saint and Jun Jun Ni, while the only gelding was Magnum Load.

FOUR VETERANS of last year's All-American Futurity will be in action in the Rainbow Derby, including Jun Jun Ni, who finished fourth. Stoa Minga (sixth), Medley Glass (seventh) and Biffy Pass (ninth). Notably absent is the pair who took the top spots in the All-American — Hot Idea, who remains undefeated in five starts, qualified with a time of 22.04½ seconds. Town Policy, recent winner of the Los Alamitos Derby, chalked up a time of 22.05.

TOP CALIFORNIA RIDERS Danny Cardoza and Terry Lipham both flew in for the trials and turned in successful performances. Lipham took four mounts to the gate, won with three of them and qualified Medley Glass for the finale. Cardoza notched a win and a second from five starts and assured a finale berth for Perfect View.

THE FASTEST SEASONAL time for 5½ furlongs was set by Nervino in Saturday's fourth race. The four-year-old gelding, who took on \$8,000 claimers, came through with blazing speed as the 3-2 favorite for a time of 1:06 2/5 seconds.

THE HIGH SHOW PAYOFF of the season turned up in Friday's ninth race, a Rainbow Derby trial at 440 yards. Kitaward went off as an 85-1 outsider and hung on grimly to capture third, only a neck behind the leaders for a show return of \$33.

SATURDAY'S 11TH RACE feature baffled the fans in spite of a limited field. Originally eight horses were slated for the 5½ furlong allowance sprint. But Arcoba was scratched early in the day, and just before post time Arran Dunc and Center Latch were scratched by order of the veterinarian. That left Jimmylin as the obvious choice, and the gelding got off as a 3-5 pick in the five horse field. But to the fans' chagrin, it was Hesaru (a 5-2 shot) who came on for the 2¼-length victory.

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

LBJ's one-room school tourist attraction

In 1912, a school teacher, "Miss Kate" Deadrich accepted an underaged, four-year-old in her one-room school in the Texas Hill Country because he spent recesses there anyway, playing with his cousins.

There will never be a better argument for "head start" programs, because the

little boy went on to become president of the United States.

Fifty-three years later, on April 11, 1965, "Miss Kate" had occasion to return to the Junction School to participate in a special ceremony, the formal signing of the Elementary and Secondary Education

Act. And the man putting his signature on that important document was that "head start" pupil of 1912, the 36th President, Lyndon B. Johnson.

Today, the one-room school in the country is preserved by the National Park Service at Lyndon B. Johnson National Historic Site. It is one of several attractions at the LBJ Ranch portion of the historic site, located 15 miles west of Johnson City, Texas on Highway 290.

The historic site is operated in conjunction with the LBJ State Park, the departure point for tour buses that go into the LBJ Ranch area.

The State Park is located on the south bank of the Pedernales, a springfed river. Visitors to the State Park can see exhibits, a film in the auditorium, a slide show in the visitor center, nature trails and a living history program in the Sauer-Beckmann House.

There are also tennis courts and a swimming pool, which operates in the summer, at the State Park. The only fee at either park is at the pool.

From the state park, tour buses depart regularly across the Pedernales to the LBJ Ranch on an hour and a half trip.

As the bus rolls across the ranch, the bus driver and a tape system team up to explain the sights to visitors.

The bus passes the Junction School and stops for a tour of the little farmhouse built in 1888, where Johnson was born. It passes over ranch land where Hereford cattle, part of the President's herd, graze. Often in summer the buses stop at the Show Barn for a close-up look at the ranch animals.

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

SANTA FE — Dr. Bill Stephens is the only one of 12 members of the Apodaca cabinet whose offices aren't located in Santa Fe but the Secretary of Agriculture for state government says "it has not proved to be a handicap."

Referring to the cabinet meetings held in the state capitol, Stephens says "I don't think I've missed a one."

Stephens is associated with New Mexico State University, appointed by the president and confirmed by the regents. NMSU is actively involved with agricultural matters and operates various experimental farms.

Under state government reorganization which took effect April 1, 12 cabinet departments took the place of what had been a disparate assortment of boards, agencies, departments and commissions.

Two previously independent entities, the New Mexico Livestock Board with a staff of more than 100, and the Peanut Commission, which has no staff but which collects a tax on peanut growers to use for research and promotion, were brought into the new State Department of Agriculture.

"They are under the department for coordinating purposes, but still maintain their own identity," Stephens said. "But I do represent them at the cabinet level."

Reliable sources say Victor Ortega, the Republican Nixon appointee who has been U.S. Attorney for New Mexico, will join a private law firm in Santa Fe.

Ortega had applied to keep the job under the Carter Administration and had quiet support from the state's two Republican U.S. senators. But the White House instead named R. E. Thompson of Roswell, a Democratic state senator who has now been cleared for the \$48,500-a-year Federal post by the Senate judiciary committee.

Later it was reported that Ortega might end up on the ballot as the Republican nominee to oppose Democrat Jeff Bingaman for state attorney general. It was said that John Donnell, the only GOP candidate for the post in the primary, would resign so the Republican state central committee could name Ortega.

"That was what we had hoped," said one well-placed source. "He had good name identification and a good track record." But Ortega, it was reported, decided instead to move from Albuquerque to Santa Fe to join a prominent law firm.

Although Gov. Jerry Apodaca has suggested the prospect of combining the two commissions which regulate utilities — the State Corporation Commission and the Public Service Commission — one PSC member says "I have real problems with combining the two simply because of energy matters."

The official said the PSC must deal with the entire energy supply picture because of the commission's involvement in setting rates for electricity and gas utilities, whereas the SCC deals with telephone utilities.

Meanwhile, the Legislature has responded to public concern about climbing utility rates by creating an interim committee to look into operations and staff capabilities of the Public Service Commission.

The U.S. Supreme Court has ruled that New Mexico's practice of charging higher rates to non-residents for game licenses is permissible and doesn't violate the U.S. Constitution.

A Texas resident, David Terk, filed suit against the procedure in 1975. A three-judge Federal court ruled in favor of the State Game and Fish Department but Terk appealed to the high court.


Dear Editor:

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Specific laws cover drinking/driving juveniles

The handling of juveniles charged with possession, or consumption, of alcoholic beverages; of operating a motor vehicle while in possession of alcoholic beverages, or under the influence of same, is Jane Parnell, Children's Probation Officer for the Ruidoso area said, "causing concern among parents of offenders because they do not fully understand the laws governing juveniles charged with these offenses."

State statutes provide, Parnell said, that a delinquent act is "an act committed by a child which would be designated as a crime under the law if committed by an adult." A child, in New Mexico, is any person under age 18.

Parnell outlined the methods of charging juveniles with violations of the liquor laws and of the Motor Vehicles Code and how the cases are handled once the juvenile is charged:

— The charge of "allowing himself to be served" an alcoholic beverage is included under the delinquent classification. This charge covers possession as well as consumption.

— For possession of alcoholic beverages, or driving offenses while in possession, officers have the option of either citing offenders into the Probation Office under the Alcoholic Beverages Act; or citing

them into Magistrate Court under the Motor Vehicles Code, as it is against the law for a minor to operate a motor vehicle while in possession, or under the influence, of liquor.

— Juveniles are sometimes cited into Magistrate Court for driving offenses, as penalties under the Motor Vehicles Code are more severe than those provided by the Children's Probation Office.

— On driving offenses, when liquor is involved, only the juvenile operating the vehicle can be cited under the law. A child riding in a vehicle, if liquor is present, is referred to the Probation Office for allowing himself to be served.

Parnell said the New Mexico Statutes 1953, Annotated, "spell out exactly" how juveniles are handled on liquor charges and driving charges where liquor is involved:

ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES:
45-10-12. Selling or giving liquor to minors — "Minor" defined. — (a) It shall be a violation of the act for any club, retailer, dispenser, bartender, waiter or servant or employee of any club, retailer or dispenser, or for any taxi driver, hotel employee or any other person, except the parent or guardian or spouse of any minor, or adult person into whose custody any

court has committed such minor for the time, outside of the actual, visible personal presence of such minor's parent, guardian, spouse or the adult person into whose custody any court has committed such minor for the time, to do any of the following acts:

(1) To sell, serve or give any alcoholic liquor to a minor.

(2) To buy alcoholic liquor for, or to procure the sale or service of alcoholic liquor.

(3) To deliver alcoholic liquor to a minor.

(4) To aid or assist a minor to buy, procure or be served with alcoholic liquor.

(b) It shall be a violation of this act for any minor to buy, receive or permit himself to be served with any alcoholic liquor except when accompanied by his parent, guardian, spouse or an adult person into whose custody he has been committed for the time by some court who is actually, visibly and personally present at the time such alcoholic liquor is bought or received by him or served or delivered to him.

(c) In the event any person except a minor shall procure any other person to sell, serve or deliver any alcoholic liquor to a minor by actual or constructive

misrepresentation of any facts calculated to cause, or by the concealment of any facts the concealment of which is calculated to cause, the person, selling, serving or delivering such alcoholic liquors to such minor, that such minor is legally entitled to be sold, served or delivered alcoholic liquors, and actually deceiving him by such misrepresentation or concealment, than that person, and not the person so deceived by such misrepresentation or concealment, shall have violated this act.

(d) In any proceedings under subsection (a) of this section, it shall not be necessary for the prosecution, or any person, official

or party urging or contending that such subsection has been violated, to allege or prove that the parent, guardian, spouse or any adult person into whose custody any such minor has been committed by any court, was not actually, visibly and personally present at the time of the alleged violation, but such matters are matters of defense to be established and proved by the person against whom the prosecution or proceedings is brought.

(e) The term "minor" as used in this act shall mean any person under twenty-one (21) years of age.

MOTOR VEHICLES:
64-22-17. Operation of a motor vehicle by

a person under twenty-one years while possessing alcoholic liquor prohibited. — No person under the age of twenty-one (21) shall operate a motor vehicle upon a public highway of this state while knowingly and unlawfully having in his possession any alcoholic liquor.

64-22-19. Minor driving motor vehicle while possessing alcoholic liquor — Suspension of driver's license. — Upon determination that a minor has violated the provisions of this act (64-22-17 to 64-22-10), the judge trying the case shall suspend the minor's driver's license for a period of not less than one (1) day but for not more than any period of time which runs past the twenty-first birthday of such minor.

Thinkin in Lincoln

Lincoln County Extension Club members recently took ribbons in the State Cultural Arts Contest. The contest is held in Las Cruces at the annual meeting of the group. All of the exhibits entered had been winners in county and district contests statewide.

They cut down on trips to the store and each trip that doesn't have to be made saves money. Cheeses keep well when tightly wrapped and refrigerated; so do onions and celery.

MACARONI SKILLET SUPPER
4 to 6 servings

- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 pound lean ground beef
- 3/4 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped celery
- 1/4 cup chopped green pepper
- 1 can (1 lb. 12 ounce) tomatoes
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1 cup uncooked elbow macaroni
- 1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese
- 3/4 cup (3 ounces) shredded cheddar cheese
- Chopped parsley

Melt butter in a large skillet with cover. Add beef, onion, celery and green pepper; saute until meat is browned. Add tomatoes, salt and pepper; bring to boil. Add macaroni, cover and cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, for 10 minutes or until macaroni is tender. Stir in parmesan cheese. Sprinkle with cheddar cheese; cover and allow to stand for 5 minutes. Sprinkle with parsley and serve.

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
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

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State's bobcats fare well; pelt sale next season

New Mexico's bobcat population is apparently stable or increasing slightly, according to preliminary population modeling done by the Game and Fish Department.

The Department will ask that up to 6,000 New Mexico bobcat pelts be okayed for export outside the United States again next season.

Wain Evans, assistant director of the department, said a projected bobcat population decline of about seven percent in the northern half of the state is being more than offset by increases in the southern half. He said the department's most conservative estimates indicate a statewide population increase of about 1.5 percent. Trapping accounts for less than 15 percent of the total bobcat mortality. Data indicates an adult breeding population of about 20,300 animals.

The department tagged 4,416 bobcats for export last season. Under an agreement with the Endangered Species Scientific Authority (ESSA), up to 6,000 pelts could have been sent outside the United States to the more lucrative foreign markets.

The bobcat became the center of controversy last year. Animal protectionist groups alleged the species should be placed on federal endangered species lists and export of bobcat pelts prohibited because high fur prices were causing overtrapping, Evans said.

Under an agreement with ESSA that allowed the export of up to 6,000 pelts from New Mexico, the department set up a tagging program that would prevent more than that being shipped from the state and set up an intensive research project on bobcat populations.

Evans said the trappers who submitted pelts for tagging were required also to furnish the department with the animal's skull and information on its sex and when and where it was taken.

Biologists measured the skulls to identify various subspecies and cross-sectioned teeth to determine the animals' ages. That and other information allowed them to make the population projections.

Air traffic control plan in mill here

Military high speed, low level air traffic and instrument flight rule (IFR) aircraft were discussed at the New Mexico Airport Managers meeting Friday at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

"The air traffic control people in Albuquerque are in the process of putting an intersection over Ruidoso," Tim Morris Ruidoso Municipal Airport manager said. "This will ease the strain over Ruidoso and get IFR traffic in safely."

The association also discussed coordinating with the military on their high speed, low level routes surrounding the Ruidoso area.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Morris said, "The cooperation among the state airport managers is great."



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
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

I-N-S-I-D-E the Outdoors

In the midst of the fishing season, few sportsmen are thinking ahead to the New Mexico bird hunting seasons. However, such is not the case with the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, and they need your help.

This is the time of year the department's Game Management Division combines data gathered from last year's bird seasons, recommendations from department field personnel, and input from biologists of other wildlife-related agencies in preparation for scheduling the upcoming fall bird seasons.

In addition, bird hunters and others concerned with the structure of this fall's game bird seasons are asked to put their thoughts in writing and forward them to the department's Game Management Division in Santa Fe by June 30.

Harold Olson, department director, commented on the importance of public input. "New Mexico is fortunate in having a wide variety of upland and waterfowl birds with huntable populations, and quite a number of New Mexicans hunt for some or all of them during the course of the seasons," he said. "They and other people are interested in such things as season lengths, open and closed areas, bag limits, etc., and we're interested in knowing what they think."

These recommendations from the public will be reviewed by department biologists and members of the State Game Commission.

Finally, the department will present their proposal for the seasons on dove, teal, pigeon, grouse, and squirrels to the State Game Commission in July.

The remainder of the bird seasons, including primarily the upland game birds and waterfowl, will be set at a later commission meeting in late August or early September, after federal migratory bird hunting guidelines have been published.

As in all public-interest commission meetings, both of these will be open to the public and interested persons are encouraged to attend and participate.

The final word on the bird seasons, as it is on all department activities, is up to the State Game Commission.

The fall bird hunts include seasons on quail, prairie chicken, dove, band-tailed pigeons, ducks, geese, teal, mergansers, gallinules, coots, lesser sandhill cranes, snipe, and turkey. Turkey are classified as a big game species in New Mexico.

Dear Wayne — a handloading friend told me that bullet accuracy is affected by the heat of the rifle barrel. Is this a real problem? What can be done about it?
 Jerry T., Arizona

Dear Jerry — The friction generated by a bullet as it moves through the barrel will cause the barrel to heat. From a single bullet this heat is barely noticeable, but when several shots are fired at close intervals it becomes quite apparent when the barrel is felt. As the barrel heats the impact of the bullet tends to rise slightly. This rise is greater in the light sporter barrels than in the heavy varmint and target barrels.

The effects of barrel heat are generally insignificant and, in most cases, should be ignored by the hunter. He usually does not fire several shots at close intervals and if he did the bullet rise would only be slight.

Serious target shooters are aware of this problem and compensate by using heavier barrels and allowing the rifle to cool between groups.

Coping with stress helps in avoiding heart attacks

Daily stress could be killing you if you don't know how to cope with it. Dr. S. Jeffrey Besser, staff psychologist for Southwest Mental Health Center in Las Cruces, told participants at Homemakers College what type of person is most likely to have stress related diseases and how to soften the damage from stress. The College was held June 13-16 at New Mexico State University.

Contrary to popular belief, "the rate of stress related diseases is lower in married people than in single people," Dr. Besser said. He said research showed that a reassuring touch from another human tends to stabilize even critical heart rates.

"The incidents of heart attack are high for those who are socially isolated, socially frustrated or depressed," the speaker said. "Therefore, one way to prevent stress related diseases is to stay in physical and social contact with others."

Dr. Besser also outlined the "Type A" personality most likely to develop coronary heart disease. He said that these people are excessively competitive, work under time pressure, and are often hostile.

This personality type feels a real need to accumulate wealth and accomplishments — stressing doing rather than experiencing. They are impatient with the rate things move and try to do several things at the same time. They are often over scheduled.

Finally these "Type A" people seem to do everything in a hurry. They walk fast

and eat fast. They not only talk fast, but often finish sentences when others are talking.

Learning to relax is almost a matter of life or death for these people according to

Dr. Besser. He said that relaxation exercises can lower tension. One technique involves concentrating on breathing in through the nose and out through the mouth for two 20 minute sessions each day. Dr. Besser said such exercises can lower a person's heart rate and may lower oxygen consumption.

Dr. Besser also recommended leisurely walks or runs. He said that spending time looking at something far away or even a scenic picture can also help relieve tension.

"A reprogramming of your thoughts can also help," Dr. Besser said. He pointed out that the body reacts to thoughts about an event, and not just the event itself. "Many events which might provoke anger could be reinterpreted so you would react less intensely," he said.

Dr. Besser emphasized Hans Selye's notion that it's important to find your own stress level. "Some people are beachcombers and some are executives. Either is fine. But a beachcomber who tries to become an executive will probably have a heart attack," Dr. Besser said.

On the other hand, he pointed out that an executive who tries to relax by beachcombing will also experience stress.

"The Roswell social security office is offering a new service to all persons in the Lincoln County area," J. Hassler Strickland, District Manager, said today. "It is now possible to telephone the Roswell office to file an application for your benefits. In fact, it will probably be easier to telephone rather than come to the office in person. It is rare that anyone has to wait for any length of time. However, there are times when it is extremely difficult to come into Roswell or our contact stations to complete an application or to inquire about potential benefits. It is this inconvenience that we want to prevent. "Under this new system all a person has to do is call 622-7780 or 622-1103 collect and

ask for Dan Mathis, our Field Representative who is responsible for this service. He will take your application by phone and mail it to you for your signature. A return envelope will be furnished for the application and the documentary evidence he requests. When you receive the application you need only sign and complete the proper portions, drop it and your proof into the envelope, and mail it to the office. It's as easy as that.

"We do wish more persons would use this service and call first." "Remember," he stated, "call first - that trip to the social security office may not be necessary!"


