

# Undersheriff Meador fired

Dwaine "Red" Meador has been fired as Lincoln County Undersheriff, effective last Tuesday, according to a spokesman for the sheriff's department.

Lincoln County Sheriff Bill Elliot is on vacation on a Colorado camping trip during an extended Fourth of July weekend and was unavailable for comment.

In confirming Meador's dismissal, county manager Les Olson Thursday told a media representative that the firing was for "insubordination."

According to Olson, Meador's separation papers included a description of him as a "sincere and dedicated police officer."

The firing has been brought to light following Meador's announcement that he will seek the Lincoln County Sheriff's position as a write-in candidate, on the Democratic ticket, during November's general election.

June 24, Meador predicted he would be fired saying his leaving was forced by Lincoln County Commission chairman John Sudderth after the chief deputy had criticized Sudderth.

June 24, Meador told The News, "Saturday morning Sheriff Elliot asked me to resign. The Sheriff indicated to me that Sudderth mentioned to him he (Meador) should be fired and that Sudderth said the Undersheriff's position could be eliminated."

He also said he would refuse to "buckle" under Sudderth's pressure, he would not resign and would probably be fired.

Conflict within the sheriff's department has apparently centered on the unauthorized use of county credit cards for gasoline, the alleged misuse of four sheriff's department surplus cars and purchase order forms by sheriff's deputies.

Meador has said he issued a credit card to a non-salaried undercover agent working in the Ruidoso area.

"Elliot didn't know about it," Meador said. "I didn't know it was illegal to let the agent use the credit card. The agent is a certified police officer, holding a regular deputy commission from Lincoln County, but the person was not on the county payroll and was working free of charge. I did it," (issued the credit card).

Meador said, regarding the use of county vehicles by volunteer workers, that three of the cars had been parked because of mechanical difficulties.

"Only one was driven by a non-salaried person. This driver had a regular deputy commission and used the car to patrol subdivision around Ruidoso," he said.

During an unannounced closed meeting June 22, the Lincoln County Commission decided to ask the State Department of Finance and Administration (Local Government Division) to take fiscal control of the sheriff's department. According to figures released by the commission, the sheriff's department had overspent its budget by about \$48,000 during the 18 months of Elliot's tenure.

The action followed warnings by the county commission that the sheriff was going to have to live within the budget.

During a special budget session held May 15, the commission cut Elliot's record high budget request of \$288,968 for operation of his department. The commission approved a budget of \$245,273, an all-time high in Lincoln County for the sheriff's department.

However three stipulations were made on the approval of the Sudderth. He said that all surplus vehicles must be parked in preparation for sale at auction, all purchase order books must be turned in to the commission and that no in-the-red spending occur.

Sudderth said later that bills continued to come into the county manager's office for items purchased by the sheriff's department; prompting the request for Department of Finance and Administration intervention.

# Miss Thermolark Derby hopeful

Miss Thermolark, the possible favorite in today's Rainbow Quarter Horse Derby at Ruidoso Downs, drew the No. 2 post in the 440-yard classic.

The Rainbow Derby, the second leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses, offers a staggering gross purse of \$516,500. This includes \$74,025 which goes into the consolation, plus a five-grand award to the winning breeder of today's showdown.

The amount of cash riding on the grand finale is \$438,821, with \$179,025 going to the winner.

Here's the way the field looks: 1 — Magnum Load (no jockey named), 120; 2 — Miss Thermolark (Carl White), 120; 3 — Seco Mia (W. R. Hunt), 120; 4 — Little Flyin' (Richard Bickel), 120; 5 — Jun Jun Ni (Jerry Burgess), 120; 6 — Perfect View (Danny Cardoza), 120; 7 — Medley Glass (Terry Liphart), 120; 8 — Stoa Mings (no boy named), 120; 9 — Easy Saint (Jackie Martin), 120; 10 — Bify Pass (Bruce Plikenton), 120.

Here's a profile of the field, from the viewpoint of qualifying times: Seco Mia, 21.71 seconds; Miss Thermolark, 21.74; Easy Saint, 21.83; Perfect View, 21.88; Bify Pass, 21.90; Jun Jun Ni, 21.90; Little Flyin', 21.90; Medley Glass, 21.92½; Stoa Mings, 21.93; Magnum Load, 21.95½.

Miss Thermolark, owned by Ronny Schlep of Miami, Oklahoma stands a good

chance of emerging as the people's choice. The filly won nine of eleven races last year, including the Rainbow Futurity, and finished up with earnings of just under \$200,000.

So far this year, she's been to the races only twice, and came in second both times. In last week's Derby trials, she lost by a head to Seco Mia.

The latter, owned by the Cryan Ranch of Sealy, Texas, has won two out of six races this year for slim earnings of \$1,670. Earlier in the meeting, she finished ahead in the Top Deck Stakes at Ruidoso, but was subsequently disqualified from purse money.

Medley Glass could be a tough customer. The filly ran in the trials as a \$15,000 supplemental nominee, and won by a head as a heavy favorite. Medley Glass has banked some \$60,000 thus far.

Today's excellent co-feature at 870 yards brings back Al's Vest, the recent hero of the Flying Charm Stakes at that distance. Such tough 870 battlers as Ned Hanger, Pierre the True, Two Copies and Credit Reference will also be dueling over the four grand allowance purse.

The holiday weekend wraps up July 4 with the \$10,000-added Governor's Handicap at 6½ furlongs. Countess Blade and Bradley's Kunumera, two of the leading thoroughbreds in the southwest, are included in the list of nominees.

# Forest land use open house meeting set

The United States Department of Agriculture, Forest Service, is completing a study of all undeveloped, unroaded national forest lands to identify which of these roadless areas should be added to the wilderness system and which should be managed for multiple uses other than wilderness.

An open house will be held from 1 to 9 p.m., July 20 at the Carrizozo Community Center by representatives of Smokey Bear Ranger District of Lincoln National Forest to review a draft environmental impact statement on the inventory and listing the service's recommendations.

The statement, available at the Forest Service office on Mechem Drive, Ruidoso

Public Library on Sudderth Drive, or at the open house, outlines a range of alternative proposals for the areas of roadless national forest land. Public input is being solicited on which areas should be designated as wilderness and which should be developed for multiple use management.

"In effect, (the evaluation) is a town meeting on a grand scale to settle three questions involving national forest roadless areas," Dr. M. Rupert Cutler, assistant secretary of Agriculture for Conservation, Research and Education, wrote.

The questions are "which of the roadless areas should be added to the National

Wilderness Preservation System to provide the National Forest share of the total system?; which of the lands should be managed for multiple use other than wilderness such as developed recreation, timber production and manipulation of vegetation for wildlife?; and which of these lands require further study before decisions are made about future management?"

As a result of the open house for public evaluation of the inventory of roadless areas, the Forest Service hopes finally to determine which areas should be recommended to Congress to be designated as wilderness and which areas should be allocated to non-wilderness use.

"The intent is to include as many areas as feasible (into wilderness or non-wilderness) so that the cloud of management doubt will be lifted from them."

"We hope it will be a giant step toward settling the debate over which areas should be wilderness and which should be devoted to non-wilderness uses," Cutler wrote.

The Inventory or Roadless Area Review and Evaluation (RARE) is not without its supporters and critics.

Interest groups such as the Southwest Pine Association, and the Federal Timber Purchasers Association feel designating of the areas as wilderness freezes "timber harvesting, and significantly reduces

timber supply" in addition to "limiting recreation, wildlife, watershed, mineral and grazing opportunities."

Conversely, environmental organizations including the Sierra Club feel that virtually all the areas inventoried as roadless should be designated as wilderness or at least should be preserved.

But, regardless of the viewpoint of either group, the decision on which areas will be designated as wilderness and which are allocated for other uses will be made by the public as a result of open houses such as the one in Carrizozo.

"I sincerely believe they (Inventory and project) deserve the support of the American public. Two recent public opinion polls, one by the forest industry and another by a national magazine show

a strong desire for preservation of trees in their natural state," Cutler wrote.

"At the same time, Forest Service studies have shown that future shortages of forest products are likely unless management on all forest ownerships is intensified. (The evaluation) may be a means of striking a balance between preservation and product need."

"Full participation by the public in a completely open national forum will assure the decision reached will be fair, balanced and honest. Only then can we channel our talents and wisdom toward rational management of the now roadless and undeveloped areas of the National Forest System — so they contribute to both the nation's protected-wilderness heritage and its economic well being," he wrote.

# Ruidoso youth qualifies for world minibike race

Brother Martinez, 13, Ruidoso, placed 9th in a field of 100 in Grand National Championship motorbike competition June 25 in Los Angeles.

Trials were held and then the top 24 qualifiers raced.

Brother was the only top qualifier in his class not from California.

Racing in the junior mini category,

Brother qualified for world competition scheduled during August in Ponca City, Oklahoma.

"I think I've got a pretty good shot at the 80 cc modified," he said, adding he would also compete in 80 cc stock and 100 cc modified.


Brother said he became interested in racing when his father bought him a "go

# District acreage involved in planning area land use

Three areas in Smokey Bear Ranger District of Lincoln National Forest will be discussed at an open house from 1 to 9 p.m., July 20 at the Carrizozo Community Center to determine public opinion regarding inclusion of the areas in the national wilderness system or for allocation for other uses.

A draft environmental impact statement by the Forest Service on the areas will be available at the open house for public consideration and comment.

The statement is available now at Ruidoso Public Library or the district Forest Service offices on Mechem.

Areas of Smokey Bear Ranger District under consideration are: — Carrizo-Tucson Mountains, located approximately 11 miles east of Carrizozo. The area, consisting of 39,230 acres, is comprised of moderate to precipitous mountains dominated by the 9,656 foot Carrizo Peak. Life zones range from upper

Sonoran to Canadian and it is a good habitat for bear, deer and elk. The area is traversed by Forest Service trails.

— Capitan Mountains, approximately 25 miles northeast of Ruidoso. The mountains are very rugged, rising abruptly from the surrounding grasslands to a knife-like crest. Life zones range from the Upper Sonoran to Canadian at the crest. The 62,900 acre area is a good habitat for deer and bear in addition to numerous birds including eagles and small animals.

— White Mountain Wilderness addition, includes 21,370 acres adjacent to the present wilderness. The area has five separate units on the periphery of the White Mountain Wilderness and conditions range from desert to subalpine. The area is an important large and small animal habitat and it includes evidence of some past Indian activity.

# Bubonic plague threat exists in Lincoln County

High levels of bubonic plague antibody have been found in the blood of coyotes in Lincoln County this spring, according to officials of the Environmental Improvement Agency (EIA) of the state's health and Social Services division.

Because coyotes have the ability to quickly build up antibodies to combat plague infection, they are a good indicator of how active the disease is in a given area, the spokesman said.

Affected coyotes were captured in eight other New Mexico counties by federal trappers working on routine predator control assignments under the direction of the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

Also rodents with plague infected fleas were found in Lincoln and Roosevelt counties by members of the EIA.

Blood samples from the animals were tested by the National Center for Disease Control's Plague Branch in Fort Collins, Colorado.

In addition to Lincoln County, the tests confirmed recent plague activity in Socorro, Catron, Torrance, Otero, Dona Ana, McKinley, Guadalupe and Sandoval counties.

There has been one reported case of plague in a human in New Mexico this year.

Michael Burkhardt, EIA spokesman had these tips designed to help persons avoid contracting the plague:

— Avoid sick or dead wild animals in-

cluding rabbits, coyotes, prairie dogs and field mice. Burkhardt advised everyone to be particularly wary of dead or sick rodents.

— Pet owners should dust their animals regularly with flea powder.

"Just following these two simple precautions has done more than anything else to combat the spread of this disease," Burkhardt said.

He added, persons noting large numbers of dead animals in an area should contact their local office of the EIA. Brown Edwards is Ruidoso's EIA field representative.

State health officials said the general symptoms of bubonic plague in humans are headaches, general discomfort, fever and soreness in glands particularly under the arms and in the groin area.

# Pocket Coin snatches Futurity Prep Stakes

Pocket Coin continued his role of kingpin among Ruidoso Downs two-year-olds by easily winning Sunday's renewal of the Futurity Prep Stakes.

The classy colt, ridden by Charles Mueller in the top load of 122 pounds, broke quickly in the 5 1/4 furlong sprint and wasted no time taking control.

Light Fandango, a 5 1/2-1 outsider, tried to outrace Pocket Coin in the backstretch but was clearly no match. Pocket Coin moved into the clear, and was under no pressure when he swung into the turn.

In the upper stretch, Jockey Mueller had nothing to do but hold on. He hand-rode the people's choice down the straightaway and flashed under the wire with a growing four length lead. The winning time was a brisk 1:06 3/5 seconds. (The track record is 1:05 1/5.)

Pocket Coin collected \$5,040 out of the \$8,400 gross purse, and the Income swelled his career bankroll up near the \$80,000 level. He's won five out of six career starts. The valuable colt is owned by Melvin and Ernest Riggs of Ft. Stockton, Texas.

The mutual returns were \$2.80 to win, \$2.20 to place, \$2.20 to show. Light Fandango ended up second for payoffs of \$3.40 and \$2.60. Rich 'N Royal was more than six lengths behind Light Fandango, but managed to pick up third place in the strung out field. The show return was \$3.20.

Sunday's program also included the \$74,678 consolation of the Rainbow Quarter Horse Derby, and the trophy went to the narrow second favorite, Real Easy Jet. The colt, piloted by Gary Sumpter, burst out of the No. 5 post in the seven head field and never relinquished the lead.

Easy Move, the 6-5 favorite, stuck with Real Easy Jet in the early portions of the 440 yard sprint. But the colt began to tire badly, and was all through at the midway point.

Next, Real Easy Jet had to fend off an assault from the onrushing 2-1 outsider, Honey Moon Sport. But Real Easy Jet had his head in front when he hit the ribbon. The colt collected \$17,085 for his owner, Walter Merrick of Sayre, Oklahoma. The winning time was 22.02 seconds.

Honey Moon Sport got a paycheck of \$11,960. Madam President, a 28-1 darkhorse, sailed in third — only a neck behind Honey Moon Sport. Easy Move faded to fourth.

Real Easy Jet returned \$4.80 to win, \$3.40 to place, \$2.80 to show. Honey Moon Sport was good for payoffs of \$12.60 and \$5.40. Madam President returned \$6.80.

Easy Kiss came in fifth. High Set took sixth and Luicks Chic Gay brought up the rear.

Hot Idea and Town Policy, the first and second place finishers in last summer's All-American Futurity, qualified for the Rainbow Consolation but defected. Nonetheless, each got a paycheck of \$2,301. GO GO COOKIE, a 13-1 outsider, made it look easy while upsetting her competition in Saturday's renewal of the Jet Deck Stakes at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly, ridden by Jerry Nicodemus out of the rail post, broke alertly in the 440 yard dash and was near the lead in the early going.

The 2-1 favorite, Loma Vista Man, also packed a lot of early zip and looked like a strong threat as he flashed over the first 100 yards. But at the midway point, he began to tire under his staff load of 124 pounds and slumped into the pack.

Go Go Cookie, on the other hand, took charge with determination and poured it on at the end to win going away. The victory margin was one length. The winning time was 22.25 seconds.

Go Go Cookie is owned by the Smith Brothers of Kamay, Texas, who collected \$4,320 out of the \$7,200 gross purse. The tote returns: \$29.20, \$15.20, \$8.80.

Bid A Waye, a 17-1 longshot piloted by Salustio Burgos, made a strong move on the far outside and finished second. The mutual returns were \$18 and \$10. Cotton Pac 2, going after his eighth straight win, came in third as an 11-1 darkhorse. The show price was \$5.60.

Loma Vista Man crossed the wire in fourth place.

THE DRAKE, a heavy 3-5 favorite ridden by Gilbert Villescas, toyed with his opponents before running off to a 5 1/4 length victory in Friday's feature offering at Ruidoso Downs.

The colt broke alertly in the six furlong dash, took command down the backstretch, then pulled out the stopper in the stretch.

Freeman M. tried to challenge The Drake in the upper stretch, but was plainly overmatched and slumped behind. The Drake is owned by J. C. Childers of Borger, Texas.

The winning time, on a heavy track, was 1:16 5-4 seconds. The payoffs: \$3.20, \$2.20, \$2.20. Freeman M. held on well enough to take second, refunding \$2.20 and \$2.20. Chili Pepper Pie bagged third for a \$2.20 return.

## Social Security information

Recent legislation added a new concept — the "year of retirement" — to the social security program which will be important to workers who are now retiring and who will do so in the future, according to Gordon Lunford, social security field representative.


The new test provides that, except in the "year of retirement," a person's social security benefit will be reduced \$1 for each \$2 of earnings above the annual limit. The 1978 annual limit is \$4,000 for people 65 and over, and \$3,240 for people under 65.

The "year of retirement" is the first year during which there is a month the person is both eligible for monthly benefits and neither earns more than the monthly limit in wages nor performs substantial services in self-employment. The 1978 monthly limit is \$334 for people 65, and \$270 for people under 65.

For example, a worker first retiring at the end of June, 1978, will be able to get checks for July through December, no matter how much he earned January through June. But, he will have this monthly option only in 1978, his "year of retirement," and not in any later year.

This new law will work hardships on some, such as a school teacher who drew benefits during the summer months the last year or two, and who now retires in the middle of the year. However, some affected retirees may want to pay back benefits received in past years and set a new "year of retirement." Any social security office can explain this possibility.

## Sewage as important crop

Sewage may someday be an important "crop." But don't panic, that crop will not be fed to humans. Rather, it will be processed, made into pellets and used to supplement the diets of range cattle and sheep.

According to Dr. Stan Smith, beef nutritionist with New Mexico State University, Las Cruces, N.M., the nutrients in raw sewage are as good as nutrients found in expensive feed supplements.

Smith adds that "recycling sewage solids to agriculture promises economic benefits of about \$40 per dry ton when used as a fertilizer and perhaps upwards of \$100 per ton if used as supplemental feeds for animals subsisting on poor-quality roughage feeds."

Smith, who has spent three years recycling sewage solids as animal feedstuffs, says there are two major concerns about feeding sewage supplements to animals.

First, there is the concern of health hazards from pathogens and parasites. But, Smith says, those hazards can be minimized.

"Working with researchers at Sandia Laboratories in Albuquerque, N.M., we have destroyed 99.99 percent of the pathogens and parasites by treating sewage with gamma radiation from waste radioisotopes," the researcher says. He adds that the process "cannot possibly make anything in the product radioactive."

The second concern comes from chemical toxicants such as heavy metals, which often occur as contaminants. Smith says his recently completed research shows that "sewage products were used as supplemental feeds for cattle and sheep for periods up to 60 days without appreciable accumulation of heavy metals or potentially toxic trace elements."

Again, Smith backs up his statement with research data. He referred to one program in which he fed forty heifers about the same age, weight and background in a feedlot. Part of the heifers acted as the control group, and part of them acted as the experimental group. The latter group received 20 percent of their diet in the form of sewage solids.

Helpers in both groups ate at liberty for 60 days. At the end of that time, heifers from both the control and experimental

group were selected at random and slaughtered. The remaining sixteen heifers in each group were fed a conventional finishing diet for an additional 56-day period and then slaughtered.

Samples of blood, livers, kidneys and several other organs and tissues were collected from all individuals. Analysis of blood, livers and kidneys have been completed for a variety of heavy metals and trace elements from a representative sampling of individuals from each original dietary treatment. Samples of fat were also tested for accumulations of pesticide residues.

"Our data show that feeding sewage solids as 20 percent of a diet for 68 days resulted in the detection of only 5 of the 22 organic residues tested," Smith says. "And in all five cases, the levels detected — measured in parts per billion — fall within ranges that are not high enough to be considered out of the range frequently found in farm animals."

Similar feeding trials with rumen microorganisms — rats, cattle and sheep — have shown little, if any indication of toxicity,

Smith says. "However, longer-term research is needed to fully assess possible chronic effects from prolonged feeding of sewage production."

The most important fact to come out of Smith's research is that, for the present, the levels of heavy metals, trace elements and those pesticide residues detected do not appear to represent a hazard either to these animals or to the human food chain.

Smith cautions that "sewage products in animal feeds are not approved by the federal government and researchers do not recommend their usage by cattle feeders. Further research will be necessary before practical usage of sewage products can be recommended."

Smith predicts that even in the future sewage products will not be fed to livestock being finished for slaughter. "More likely, recycled sewage could assume a major role as supplemental feeding for breeding stock," he says.

And, obviously, feeding sewage products could provide millions of dollars to the agricultural economy, while reducing the costs of municipal sewage disposal.

## Home owner should select right sprayer

The type of sprayer you use may affect the effectiveness of your spraying programs around the home, yard and garden, says John Durkin, Extension entomologist at New Mexico State University. Sprayers are designed for applying three types of sprays — space, contact or surface, and a combination of contact and surface.

Space sprays are used to control odors and flying insects in and around the home. Very fine droplets are formed which remain in the air for a short period of time. This type of spraying may be done with a household sprayer — the least expensive type. It holds a small amount of material and is easy to use. Some have an adjustable nozzle and can be used for surface sprays on a small area.

Pressurized spray cans are self-contained units. They are popular because of their convenience, especially for small

jobs.

The garden hose sprayer has become one of the most popular types for surface sprays. It uses relatively low pressure from the water system to draw chemical mixtures from a small jar attached to the end of your garden hose. The jar is calibrated so you can determine how many gallons of material have been applied. It is inexpensive, easy to clean and convenient to use where a water line is available. You should use separate jars for applying herbicides and insecticides, Durkin says.

A trombone or slide pump type sprayer can be used with a two-gallon bucket or spray material. This type is intermediate in cost and is especially good for spraying small trees and shrubs.

The compressed air sprayer is very versatile. It may be used for either a surface spray or a space spray by merely changing or adjusting the nozzle.

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

### CAPTIVE MOUNTAIN WATERS

by Dorothy Jensen Neal

Oscar Wilde is reported to have said of Niagra Falls, that it was very impressive, but would be more impressive if it flowed the other way.

We do not know what quip he might have made had he known of the Bonito pipeline. Dorothy Jensen Neal, however, was sufficiently impressed and in 1961 published a delightful story of the Bonito and Eagle Creek pipelines.

When the gypsum and alkali in the water taken from the well near Carrizozo damaged locomotives of the railroad, the ingenious W.A. Hawkins, a lawyer for

Charles Eddy, found the solution in the waters of Bonito and Eagle Creeks.

Decades later it was a piece of old wooden pipe along Eagle Creek Canyon that aroused Mrs. Neal's curiosity and inspired her research. Numerous interviews with the early settlers of Bonito Canyon and their descendants prepared her not only to explain the technical aspects in the construction of the lines but helped her to entertain us with anecdotes that sketch the social and economic life in Bonito Canyon.

Recently a friend, preparing to put a pond on his farm, mentioned he planned to use his pigs to trample the earth in the bed of the pond. This brought to mind one such

anecdote wherein Mrs. Neal tells us that when the El Paso and Southwestern Railroad made plans to build the pipeline they thought Nogal Lake was the logical place for a reservoir. To prepare the lake and lessen the seepage, "almost 600 head of cattle were driven around and round the bed of the lake to trample the earth." A local fiddler named Monroe Howard, "furnished 100 animals on this job, receiving twenty-five cents a day, per head." It was all for little avail and more expensive preparations were required to make the lake suitable.

The author describes the building of the line, the difficulties in its construction and maintenance, and its impact on the people. Many Bonito residents worked on the line, most sold their water rights to the railroad, and some forever damned the project. All were touched by it. When the railroad bought the Bonito water rights, no provision was made to allow settlers water for their own use. Many were forced to leave the canyon, others defied the railroad by shooting or chopping holes in the pipe.

It has often been said that water is what New Mexico never has enough of except when it has too much. For all of us concerned with this substance—so basic to our survival—Captive Mountain Waters gives us much to contemplate. A pipeline originally designed to move water to run a railroad eventually brought water to the homes of Alamogordo and Holloman.

This is a small book about a large and imaginative project. Although the author attempted to lighten the book with homey folk stories of those caught up in the changes of the time, one can not help but suspect that Dorothy Neal intuitively saw a subject of larger importance looming ahead. Water and its usage is a central theme in the story of New Mexico and Captive Mountain Waters is a valuable contribution to understanding that story.

## Mescalero students taking special education courses

Thirty Mescalero Apache students are taking on-site elementary education courses through the University of New Mexico (UNM) in a program jointly sponsored by the Mescalero Tribe and the Tularosa Public Schools.

The Teacher Aide Training Program, begun in the spring of 1977, enables students to fulfill requirements for an Associate of Arts degree in elementary education. UNM program director Patricia Kellher said credit earned in the 64 credit hour degree program can be applied to a Bachelor's degree if students wish to continue.

"Program participants are employed by the Mescalero Tribe and the Tularosa schools," Kellher said. "The cooperation between the school district and the tribe has been most helpful in making the program a success. We have had great cooperation from tribal education director Clarence Buerma and Tularosa schools assistant superintendent Perry Andrews."

Earlier this summer a special three week workshop was held for participants in the on-site program. The students, who will begin classes again in the fall, take nine credit hours per semester. All classes are taught by UNM instructors.

UNM is one of the leading on-site education universities in the nation. Programs with the Navajo Tribe and the

All Indian Pueblo Council are also conducted by the UNM College of Education.

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



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

# Fun trail riding

It's sort of a pleasant kind of tiredness. That's the way some 23 trail riders described the last day of a five-day Billy the Kid Trail Ride sponsored annually by the Roswell Campus of Eastern New Mexico University (ENMU).

A little weary, the trail riders returned to base camp after five days in the White Mountain Wilderness following some of the

trails once ridden by Billy the Kid nearly 100 years ago.

The group left the base camp, southwest of Nogal, Monday morning June 19, and returned the following Friday.

According to an ENMU spokesman, three generations of one family including Grady Pierce, 78, B.J. Pierce and John Pierce, 19, all of Clovis, were on the trail ride. They were accompanied by other Clovis residents Bill and Pam Southard.

Some of the participants such as Dr. Don Clark and his wife, and Sherri Brainerd made this their third trail ride. Sherri was joined by her sister Bonnie, who was on her second trail ride. The Flying H Ranch where the Brainerd girl's grandmother, Mrs. Pearl Hendricks, lives provided horses for those that had none.

The purpose of the trip was not all fun. Students may receive two hours of college credit, either in Physical Education or

Biology 293. Informal discussions were held around campfires at night concerning Lincoln County history, animals and birds seen on the trip, plants and flowers, etc. Horse care, including proper feeding, was a natural side course on the trip.

This year, Thorp said, the group saw an endangered species of wild flower, wild orchids, for the first time.

"They are not supposed to be there," Thorp said, "but they were."

The 23 riders including Thorp, his daughter, Bonnabeth, and wrangler Jackie Forrester rode to the far side of Nogal Peak, to Three Rivers west of Old Baldy, and up to Old Baldy — more than 60 miles all together.

"It does refresh your soul," Thorp said. Cooking chores during the excursion were taken care of by Mack Willemo who said he had received no complaints.

A second trail ride is planned for July 9. Riders will depart from the same spot, a rustic Spanish-style house built by Thorp who is also an ENMU instructor at the Roswell campus.

A few slots are still open for the trip, Thorp said. Information regarding the planned outing, including information about obtaining horses and riding equipment can be gleaned by calling the Roswell campus at 347-5441, extension 218 (Thorp).

**SANTA FE** — The Apodaca Administration has threatened to withdraw from the regional office of a Federal solar energy organization unless Washington allows state energy officials to serve on the region's governing board.

Other states have taken a similar position, thus precipitating a spirited but mainly behind-the-scenes power struggle between the Federal and state governments.

The regional entity is known as WESTSUN, one of several such groups which blanket the country and act as joint Federal-state policy groups to handle newly emerging solar activities and the first flow of research and demonstration dollars from Washington.

Protests from several of the western states surfaced a week ago at a WESTSUN board meeting in Portland, Oregon, headquarters of the new 13-member western entity.

Nick Franklin, secretary of the State Department of Energy and Minerals and one of those directly involved in the policy fight, didn't attend the meeting of the board—to which he was appointed by Governor Jerry Apodaca.

But his representative did deliver a letter from Franklin which said New Mexico believes every governor should be able to appoint whomever he pleases. The letter added: "Any compromise... will not be acceptable to New Mexico, and such compromise could make it necessary for the regretful withdrawal of New Mexico from the WESTSUN organization."

Franklin was one of nine state government officials named to the board from the 13 western states. He says his position has the backing of Apodaca. "I had a personal conversation with the governor and my instruction is to hold firm on it," Franklin said.

Federal Department of Energy officials came up with a proposed compromise in Portland which would have allowed six of the 13 to be state officials, but no agreement was reached. Franklin says Federal officials have "basically decided to accept the status quo while we continue to negotiate."

Washington has based its stance on the concept that for state officials to serve on a board that will determine the flow of Federal funds to solar research projects places them in a position of a continuing conflict of interest since states will be eligible to receive the funds and set state-level policies governing them.

Franklin's response is that "if the states are in conflict on receiving dollars, then certainly the universities, industries and environmental groups are in conflict. What you'd end up with would be people who didn't know anything about solar energy."

At Portland, the WESTSUN board also clashed with Washington energy officials over the method of selection of a staff director for the regional entity. Washington sought for the board to submit the names of two candidates to the Federal department, but the board wants to name its director without any clearance from Washington.

Some \$13 million should be available to WESTSUN this year for distribution to the states, so New Mexico could stand to lose about \$1 million if it does withdraw or if it fails to meet unchanged Federal requirements.

"We'd rather give up access to those dollars," Franklin says, "than accede to the demands of the Federal government."

A similar stance has been voiced by the Western Interstate Energy Board. The board's chairman, Steve Freudenthal, wrote in a June 8 letter to Energy Secretary James Schlesinger: "Inappropriate resolution of this matter could result in a lack of state participation in the regional solar centers."

After taking note of the publicity attending several recent meetings of concerned citizens, I feel that I must climb upon my typewriter and express a point of view that seems to have lacked voice in either the meetings themselves or in the publicity.

The concept of protecting our community from the real and imagined ill effects of "invasion" by outlaw motorcycle gangs has been warped by irresponsible and thoughtless action until now the noble idea has become our own worst enemy.

people can render in the selfrighteous name of good.

This misguided community effort has attracted to it all of the worst things that can happen within a group of people that is motivated to act out of fear. I look at my community and I see the beginnings of mass hysteria; I see demagoguery; I see loss of individual reason in the face of group pressure; I see the incredible willingness of men to deny to others civil rights that they themselves would never agree to part with and justifying that action by selfrighteously holding themselves as beings superior to those they do not understand and thereby fear, I see a community dissipating energies it might have put to good and positive use.

And what effect does all this have on the original problem? All the clamor won't accomplish one thing more than could have been done by a quiet group of leaders working outside of the public spotlight to prepare a united community front and to plan with law enforcement agencies to meet the various contingencies of a Bandito visit.

Publicity is wanted to do exactly the two things we serving to avoid: 1) we are scaring away potential visitors and 2) we are assuring that the motorcycle gangs will return and that they will do so in even greater numbers.

Groups like the Banditos need a force to organize against — if they don't have them they create them — we are handing them such a target on a silver platter. In addition, the macho egos of these individuals cannot do anything but lead them to confront the force being brought against them; therefore even more of them will turn up to prove themselves against that force.

We have already succeeded in creating the conditions for what behavioral scientists call a "self-fulfilling prophecy" — we have elevated a potential enemy to a position of importance and then told that enemy the kinds of things we fear the most, thereby instructing him in how to behave. We are creating the very monster we fear.

I doubt seriously that much can be done to reverse the damage already in evidence, but I would certainly hope that the people who started this community suicide effort will have the good sense to back off and let state and local law enforcement authorities do their planning and perform their duties. The threat of an armed citizenry does not make their job any easier. If the citizens want to help they can stay out of the way; they can stand ready to perform their duties as witnesses if required; they can offer sensible assistance such as shelter and meals to any extra law enforcement personnel that may be brought into the community; they can give any outlaw visitors a cool put civil reception in businesses or elsewhere instead of slamming doors on fingers or answering questions with Mace. In short, they can act like rational adults who realize that the problem is as complex as human and social psychology can make it and as incapable of simple solutions as any other human or social problem.

I personally was concerned about, but not afraid of, another visit by large numbers of Banditos. Now I am becoming afraid — not because of anything the Banditos have done to change my opinion of them, but because of what my neighbors have done to provoke the beast. Neighbors, please stop! You aren't doing me, your community, or yourselves any favors.

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

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
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

## Fort Larned offers glimpse of the past

The Santa Fe Trail was no Interstate Highway, but from 1822 to 1880 it was the next best thing.

There was no 55 mile speed limit, but there were some high speed chases. Indians, soldiers, settlers, traders and bandits took turns as the chasers and chases at one time or another.

There wasn't a highway patrolman behind every exit ramp, but mile for mile there were probably more law enforcement officers (U.S. Army troops) than you'll find along today's super highway.

Millions of dollars worth of merchandise was carried across the trail from Independence, Missouri to Santa Fe with intermediate stops at Fort Union in New Mexico, Bent's Old Fort in Colorado and Fort Larned in Kansas.

These three stops are now preserved by the National Park Service so that you and future generations of Americans can enjoy some of the flavor of this historic trail that opened the trans-Mississippi west.

The easternmost of the three NPS-managed forts, Fort Larned—now Fort Larned National Historic Site—in southwestern Kansas on the Arkansas River near its confluence with the Pawnee. It was established by the U.S. Army in 1859 and was first charged with protecting mail and travelers on the eastern segment of the trail.

Later the fort served as a base for military operations against Indians of the central plains and was a center for the peaceful administration of those tribes through the Indian Bureau.

Today the fort consists of nine historic buildings, including two sets of barracks, a quartermaster building, a shop, two commissaries and three officer quarters. The first barracks serves as a visitor center and museum—a good place to start your visit.

A tour of the buildings will take an hour or more, depending on individual curiosity. Open year around, activity heightens in summer when "living history" programs are offered.

The historic site also consists of a detached section four miles to the southwest. This 40-acre plot contains a segment of the Santa Fe Trail—well-preserved examples of the original wagon ruts.

You can also see old buffalo wallows, oval-shaped depressions six to eight feet in diameter where the animals would roll for relief from biting flies. Here the native sod is untouched by man and you can compare it to the nearby tilled and terraced fields.

Three miles east of the fort is the Fort Larned Historical Society museum, the Santa Fe Trail Center, which interprets civilian life of the era.

Near the entrance of the historic site is a state roadside rest area where you can picnic or camp overnight without benefit of hookups.

There are commercial campgrounds and overnight accommodations at Larned, six miles away on US 166.

The field of Wildlife Law Enforcement is not really new to the residents of New Mexico. Before the cession of New Mexico to the United States in 1848 there were no wildlife laws in effect, but in 1851, New Mexico was organized as a territory and February 9, 1860, the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of New Mexico, in its 24th session, enacted certain laws pertaining to the protection of fish and game in New Mexico.

After 1860, other conservation laws were passed, but it was not until 1903 however, that the territorial Legislature established the first game and fish department in New Mexico. The entire staff of this new department consisted of one warden and one secretary. Funds for the newly organized department were limited since no license fee was required until 1909 when the Territorial Legislature saw fit to pass a law requiring hunters to pay a fee for licenses of non-residents over the age of 12 to fish for warm water species. Wildlife protection by enforcement of laws presented about the same financial problems in the early 1900's as it does today: the vast and sparsely settled areas of the West took days to patrol by any mode of travel available.

In 1909, the New Mexico Legislature closed the season for six years on antelope, pheasants, pigeon and bobwhite quail. Up to now, very few restrictive game laws had been enacted. As more people moved West, the populace became aware that the game herds were being exterminated by market hunters and that restrictive laws were needed to prevent a complete loss of a valuable resource.

The extermination or the near-extermination of certain species of wild animals in the early 1900's was not entirely due to habitat depletion. The failure of early lawmakers to provide adequate protection for wildlife was also a contributing factor. Some species of wildlife could not survive the slaughter by people who were unrestricted as to the firearms they could use or the numbers of birds or animals they could take.

As the human population expanded, the depletion of habitat did become a primary threat to wildlife. Today, wild game has been pushed out of the best natural ranges in some areas, and the pollution of streams and waterways threatens successful fish management. Enforcement alone cannot provide an adequate solution to these

problems but it can however, minimize the damage and provide an incentive for the solution of the problems. The most modern scientific approach to game management must be backed up by a modern enforcement program to control the take during periods of harvest and to insure protection during breeding and nesting seasons.

Why should the average citizen be concerned about the enforcement of laws for the protection of game animals, particularly if that citizen neither hunts nor fishes? Because the wildlife belongs to him, and regardless of whether he personally uses or enjoys wildlife, as a co-owner it becomes his or her responsibility to protect it for this and for future

generations.

The role of legislation to control reduction of publicly owned game to an individual's possession is a recognized fact and legal tradition the early colonists carried with them to America. Ultimately, most of the policies and techniques developed by all professions concerned with the management of publicly owned resources find their way into law. Law is the basis of conservation, for without it, there is complete anarchy, or at most mere moral force. And a law that is not enforced is of no use whatever. Wildlife Law Enforcement depends on public sentiment. With public sentiment nothing can fail; without it, nothing can succeed.
