## Biffy Pass wins Rainbow Derby

Biffy Pass went flying down to the wire on the far outside and grabbed a neck victory in Monday's grand finale of the \$16,500 Rainbow Quarter Horse Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly, who went for a modest \$15,000 in the 1976 All-American Yearling Sale at Ruidoso, collected a hefty \$179,025 for her Rainbow win.

Biffy Pass is owned by E. Wayne and James H. Johnson of Lufkin, Texas. Bruce Pilkenton does the riding. The trainer is C. Ronnie Ferguson.

Miss Thermolark, a 9-2 shot is owned by Ronny Schlep of Miami, Oklahoma, got the lead early in the 440 yard dash and appeared to be en route to victory at the half way point. Miss Thermolark was moving with great eagerness with about 100 yards to go.

But that's when Biffy Pass really began wheeling. The filly swept down to the finish with plenty of momentum and overtook the game Miss Thermolark not far from the wire. The latter was simply trying to hang on when Biffy Pass went thundering by.

Miss Thermolark, ridden by Carl White, earned \$31,840. The filly ended up only a head in front of the onrushing Stoa Minga. The latter, packing odds of 7-1, was well out of the picture in the early steps, but came flying between horses, and narrowly missed catching Miss Thermolark.

Stoa Minga, owned by C. L. Stewart and Sons, of Lubbock, Texas, raked in a generous \$41,943.

The winning time of 21.89 seconds did not approach the top qualifying time (21.71) set by Seco Mia. The patrons evidently felt Seco Mia's performance in the trials was a one time thing, and did not lean toward her in the Derby finale. The judgment proved to be correct as Seco Mia, pretty well ignored at just over 8-1, failed to offer any arguments and never got into contention.

Here's the way the rest of the field checked in, with purse money earned: fourth — Easy Saint, \$21,994; fifth — Medley Glass, \$19,948; sixth — Magnum Load, \$19,437; seventh — Seco Mia, \$18,925; eighth — Jun Jun Ni, \$18,414; ninth — Perfect View, \$17,902; tenth — Little Flyin, \$17,391.

Biffy Pass returned mutual prices of \$9.20, \$5 and \$3.60. Miss Thermolark returned \$5.40 and \$4.20. Stoa Minga paid \$5 to show.

The Derby was run without incident, and

each of the 10 contenders got away alertly. Easy Saint appeared to have the early advantage, but was quickly displaced by Miss Thermolark. Biffy Pass, after getting away, veered toward the far outside and raced next to rail for about 100 yards. Then the filly swung back to join the rest of the field. Jockey Pilkenton took a second or two to straighten out the zig zag course, and from then on, the filly moved with strong, ground-eating strides.

A headwind was blowing during the Derby. The track was fast.

Biffy Pass went into the Derby with a 1978 record of 2-3-1 from seven starts, good for winnings of \$25,568. She came out of the Derby with a 1978 money line of \$204,593 and career earnings of \$266,564.

TRAIL DRIVER, the eight-year-old gelding who usually catches a haymaker from top handicap horses at Ruidoso Downs, enjoyed sweet revenge in Tuesday's Governor's Handicap.

Trail Driver had the distinct pleasure of putting away both Countess Blade and Bradley's Kumumera in the 6 1/4-furlong sprint.

Besides the aspect of revenge, there was good financial reward. Trail Driver picked up a paycheck of nearly \$6,500, that just about doubled his income for the year.

The 1 1/4-length victory was pretty convincing as Trail Driver, ridden by Charles Mueller, was content to bide his time while Countess Blade and Bradley's Kumumera slugged it out in a tiring dogfight at the head of the pack.

Countess Blade, the queen of Southwest thoroughbreds, was backed down to a heavy favorite once again — despite having to lug a stiff burden of 123 pounds, and despite having been beaten by Bradley's Kumumera in her last spin.

Bradley's Kumumera, ridden by Richard Bickel at 121 pounds, was full of fight down the backstretch. Trail Driver, hauling a 115-pound load and coming off an extremely impressive win, was the picture of speed and agility while moving into contention near the turn for home.

As the field turned into the homestretch, Trail Driver advanced powerfully on the

outside. Bradley's Kumumera got the message and tossed in the towel.

That left Countess Blade in the role of Trail Driver's last adversary, but the filly — perhaps a bit short from not having started in some five weeks — was unable to move through the stretch with her customary hard fighting strides. Like Bradley's Kumumera, Countess Blade didn't need much persuasion. The filly was running out of gas as she tiredly negotiated the final half furlong.

Strate Miss, a 4-1 shot ridden by Leroy Coombs, hit the homestretch with a big burst of power and passed most of his opposition with ease. He held a half length margin on Countess Blade at the wire and claimed second place.

Trail Driver, owned by Gertrude Tyson of Midland, Texas, covered the 6 1/4 furlongs in a good 1:19 flat and returned betting prices of \$10.40, \$4.60 and \$2.80.

Strate Miss earned \$2,376 for second and returned \$5.20 and \$3. Backers of Countess Blade got \$2.40.

## Questa men arrested in shooting of bikers

A New Mexico State Police spokesman Tuesday announced the arrest of two Questa men following a July 3 shooting incident at a campground near Questa in which four members of motorcycle clubs were wounded, one seriously.

Being held in Taos County jail, after being arrested at their homes July 4, were John Gallour Jr., and Bobby Ortega, both 27, of Questa.

Listed in serious condition Tuesday, in the Taos Holy Cross Hospital's intensive care unit, was biker Jeff McCrae, 30, Colorado Springs, Colorado. Also suffering from gunshot wounds were John Kelly, 29, and Kevin O'Toole, of Colorado Springs, treated and released; and Elizabeth Mitchell, 18, Colorado Springs, held overnight for observation. Another woman, Tina Smith no address, injured,

but not shot, in the campground incident was also treated. The women were released Tuesday.

State Police Lieutenant Tommy Cantu said Tuesday, "Some of the bikers came into Questa and some kind of an altercation occurred Sunday. It started from there. We don't know if it was a fist fight or what."

The State Police reported that seven carloads of area residents went to the campground Monday evening and confronted about 25 bikers, after which the shooting incident occurred.

The biker groups, the Night Flyers of Liberal, Kansas and the Sons of Silence, Colorado Springs, left New Mexico Tuesday morning after staying overnight in a Red River motel.

## Vandalism causes July 4 power outage

Vandalism caused widespread power outages in Lincoln County about noon Tuesday.

"A vandal shot down a conductor north of Hondo causing about a 50 minute power outage in Carrizozo, Capitan, Alto and parts of Ruidoso and a five hour outage in Hondo," Johnny Vaughn, spokesman for Otero County Electric Coop, said Wednesday Morning.

The same type of vandalism caused a six

hour outage in Ruidoso March 25 when a bureau line between Ruidoso and Tularosa was shot down.

"This time it was on a transmission line," Vaughn said. "This is a thing which happens regularly, it's happened in the past."

## Summer Sale set Saturday

The sixth annual Ruidoso Downs Summer Sale, now limited to thoroughbred yearlings, unfolds Saturday, July 8, in the All-American Sales Arena on the track grounds. Activity begins at 7:30 p.m.

A total of 73 head has been catalogued, and sale manager Richard Thompson describes the quality as "excellent."

"Numerous top quality sires are represented," Thompson said. "In order to have a first class sale, you must have quality. Racing is getting so big in this part of the country, you need quality stock to attract the interest of the horsemen."

A bay filly consigned by Sam Stevens of Lamesa, Texas, figures to draw the spotlight. The filly, listed as Hip No. 43, is by Somebody II out of Santa Babu, and is a half sister to the crack stakes star, Mr. Moon (a winner of nearly \$125,000 thus far).

Somebody II is the sire of such South-

west stars as Mr. Clyde (whose victories include the Rio Grande Futurity at Ruidoso), Aunt Ruby (who ran third in Sunland Park's rich Riley Allison Futurity), and Barrister Sib (who carried his sharp winning ways into the current Ruidoso campaign).

The three head Stevens consignment also includes a bay filly (Hip No. 57) by Special Duce out of Trecenta Dias. Special Duce is the sire of stakes winners Tracy Dias (who earned \$100,000), Arran Duce (some \$90,000 to date) and Chrystal Gall (almost \$80,000 thus far).

Trecenta Dias, of course, is the dam of Tracy Dias. Thus, the buyers are expected to pay special heed to the fact Hip No. 57 is a full sister to Tracy Dias.

The third member of the Stevens consignment is a bay filly by Somebody II out of Truly A Day (No. 59).

Hip No. 10, consigned by Albert Anderson of California, is a full brother to

the Southwest stakes filly, Crazy Frills. The latter has won four stakes so far and earned almost \$72,000. She's also a track record holder at Ruidoso (1:11 3/5 seconds for six furlongs).

The seven head Anderson consignment includes another Crazy Kid offspring, a bay colt (No. 13) out of Global Hi. The latter won five races and earned over \$25,000. Crazy Kid had blazing stakes winning speed during his racing days, and, as a sire, produced some 10 stakes winners, including the brilliant Royal Owl (\$509,482). Six of the seven Anderson yearlings are by Crazy Kid.

Another quality prospect is Will Return (No. 41), a filly consigned by Jo Sneed. Will Return is by Will Hays (a winner of \$54,175), out of Return Home. The latter is the dam of Carry Pose, a winner of \$35,502.

The Joe McWilliams consignment includes a colt (No. 64) out of Jeanenes

Lark (a stakes winner of \$51,125) out of Wormwood. The latter's first foal was Wooden Marine, winner of the Ak-Sar-Ben Countess Stakes.

Rancho Jonata of California entered six head, including a filly (No. 71) by Gentlemens Game out of Bottle Baby. Gentlemens Game won over \$65,000, while Bottle Baby picked up \$22,880.

Many of the Summer Sale yearlings are nominated to such early closing events as the New Mexico Thoroughbred Futurity at the State Fair, the Land of Enchantment Futurity at La Mesa Park, the Gold Rush Futurity in Denver and the Santa Fe Downs Futurity.

Later in the season, the All-American Sales Arena will be the site of the All-American Quarter Horse Yearling Sale — the nation's largest and most prestigious sale of quarter horses. The sale will cover three afternoon sessions beginning at 1 p.m., August 28-30.

## First Edition runs Friday

The First Edition, a colt who has all the makings of a super-star, will be trying to reclaim some lost glory when he swings back into action on Friday's program at Ruidoso Downs.

The First Edition drew into the ninth race, which is one of 19 second round elimination trials leading to the upcoming

\$450,000 (est.) Rainbow Quarter Horse Futurity. Each trial covers 400 yards.

With so many races on tap, the first post is an early-starting 11:30 a.m. The top two finishers from each of Friday's 19 races will join the 38 survivors from the previous day's trials in the final round July 14. That day, the 72 finalists will take part in eight

heats, on a time basis, to determine the field for the regionally televised grand finale July 30.

The First Edition, owned by Billy Rex Hardy of China Spring, Texas, made quite a mark at Sunland Park. He became the first horse in history to win both the West Texas Futurity and the Sun Country Futurity.

He grabbed the West Texas by a head at just over 3-1 in the betting and collected \$41,898. In the Sun Country, he performed as an odds-on favorite and again scored by a head. His share of the pot came out to \$55,838.

The colt then shipped to Ruidoso Downs for the Kansas Futurity, but took a surprise second place defeat in the trials, and failed to qualify. His regular pilot, Willie Lovell, will be back at the reins Friday. Lovell will guide the colt out of the No. 9 post.

Another one to watch is Six Te, who'll break from the No. 5 slot in the 12th race. The top quarter horse pilot, Jerry Nicodemus, will be up.

Six Te made his racing debut May 19 and swept to a strong length win in the Kansas trials. His clocking of 18.11 seconds for 350 yards made him the top qualifier. As a result, he carried odds of 9-5 in the grand finale. He broke fourth, was unable to improve his status, and finished a disappointing sixth.

Mito Easy, who was good enough to make the Kansas finale but turned in an unimpressive 10th, gets a chance to redeem in Friday's fifth race.

Turf action in the cool pines continues through Sunday. Kickoff time Saturday is 7:30 p.m. Sunday's agenda begins at 1 p.m.

The main weekend high point unfolds Sunday as three-year-olds square off in the \$7,500-added Peter Hurd Handicap at six furlongs.

Funeral Services for Lieutenant Colonel (Retired) John Wallace Cooper Jr., were held at Fort Sam Houston National Cemetery June 23.


A Uvalde, Texas rancher, Mr. Cooper has been a perennial resident of Ruidoso for the last eight years.

# Energy research funded in New Mexico

Secretary Nick Franklin of the Energy and Minerals Department has announced the approval 18 proposals for \$698,971.82 in funding under New Mexico's energy research and development program.

The program, which is funded from the Severance Tax Income Fund, was created by the Legislature in 1974 to seek solutions to energy problems in New Mexico through research and development.

Franklin said the 18 approved projects will receive funding from the \$2 million appropriation that the program received this year from the Legislature.

He also said state funds are expected to serve as "seed money" in a number of projects and attract matching funds to New Mexico from non-state sources. In the past three years, state funding has been used to attract nearly a 2-1 match from federal, regional and private sources.

The 18 projects will be administered by the Energy and Minerals Department and will be coordinated through the energy institutes the department has established at the University of New Mexico (UNM), New Mexico State University (NMSU), and the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology (NMIMT).

All of the projects were reviewed and found worthy of funding by the New Mexico Energy Research and Development Review Committee, a body of technical experts created by statute to review all program proposals.

The list of approved projects includes: Traffic Engineering Improvement Priorities for Energy Conservation, Dr. J.W. Hall of UNM, \$31,750. This project will be coordinated with the City of Albuquerque. The study will develop low cost traffic improvements that will reduce fuel consumption and can be applied to other New Mexico communities as well, Franklin said.

Energy Analysis Study of Hospitals and Other Health Care Facilities, Dr. R.D. Busch of UNM, \$45,000. This project will enable the State of New Mexico to participate over the next three to five years in the massive funding programs being proposed by the National Energy Act.

A Proposal to Construct an Energy Management System for New Mexico, Dr. F.L. Brown, Dr. R. Llevano and Dr. S. Ben-David, all of UNM, \$77,693. This project will develop the first phase of a computerized energy management system to be used in policy evaluation and impact analysis by the State of New Mexico. Subsequent phases will be funded from different sources.

Study of the Feasibility of Developing Uranium Processing Facilities in New Mexico, Energy Institute at UNM, \$36,700. This project will provide detailed information about the feasibility and desirability of developing uranium processing facilities in New Mexico.

Cogeneration Project - City of Tucuman, Energy Institute at UNM, \$25,000. This project represents the first phase of the first full-scale demonstration in New Mexico of a system designed to utilize normally wasted heat of an electrical generating facility for secondary purposes. The wasted heat from a municipally owned utility will be used to operate a greenhouse.

Geological and Geophysical Investigation of Santa Rosa Tar Sands, A.J. Budding of NMIMT, \$27,850. This study will evaluate the Santa Rosa tar sands eight miles north of Santa Rosa. These tar sands are the only known occurrences of surface exposures of oil-impregnated rocks in New Mexico. Increased interest in deposits of this type and the fact that waters from the Pecos River backed up behind Los Esteros Dam may cover a large part of the deposit

means that this resource should be evaluated as quickly as possible.

Pilot Plant for Oil-Water Emulsion Cleaning of Pulverized Coal, Dr. G. Purcell of NMIMT, \$14,458. This project is designed to determine if new emulsion technology can be used to clean fine coal to produce a product with low ash and high recoveries.

Bacterial Leaching Technology Applied to Deep Solution Mining Conditions, A. Torra, C. Brerly and J. Brerly, all of NMIMT, \$33,972. This project will investigate the application of microbiological leaching to the deep solution mining of uranium.

Passive Solar House Designs for New Mexico Climates, M. Lumsdaine of NMSU, \$25,380. This project will develop a design guide for passive solar houses for use in New Mexico's three main climates. The demand for passive solar design information is rapidly growing and its availability will greatly assist in accelerating the implementation of this technology.

The Feasibility of Solar Utilization in the Potash Industry at Carlsbad, Dr. T. Mancini, Dr. G. Mulholland and Dr. D. Wilson, all of NMSU, \$36,969. The Carlsbad area accounts for 85 percent of the nation's potash production and is a major factor in New Mexico's economy. However, rising natural gas prices and dwindling gas supplies are hurting the New Mexico potash industry. This study is the first phase of determining the feasibility of utilizing solar energy in New Mexico potash production.

Solar Energy Resource Assessment in Eastern New Mexico, Dr. O. Sittler and Dr. M. Agogino, both of Eastern New Mexico University, \$8,470. This is a second year continuation of an existing study which is providing very useful data on the solar energy resource in east central New Mexico.

Preparation of Monthly Maps of Solar Availability for New Mexico Based on Satellite Photography, R. Bahm of UNM, \$7,656. This project has the potential of

giving very high paybacks and could become an excellent technique for collecting broad-scale solar availability information.

Electrical Exploration for Geothermal Resources Near San Diego Mountain, Dr. C. Young of NMSU, \$25,420. This study will use a deep geophysical exploration tool to better identify the potential geothermal resource around the San Diego Mountain area. It is unofficially reported that this may be the hottest undeveloped potential geothermal area within New Mexico.

Heating the New Mexico Tech Campus with Geothermal Energy, Dr. A. Miller and Dr. V. Lefebvre, both of NMIMT, \$13,944. This study is needed before any geothermal exploration drilling can proceed in the area. The study will be coordinated with environmental protection agencies and other organizations to identify specific criteria for the selection of well drilling sites.

Utilization of Geothermal Energy for Agribusiness Development in Southwestern New Mexico, Dr. R. Lanford of NMSU, \$76,214. This study would develop a plan for utilizing the geothermal resources of southwestern New Mexico. The main objective of the plan will be to develop an agribusiness complex.

Evaluation of the Geothermal Resource in the Area of Albuquerque, Dr. G. Jiracek of UNM, \$76,874. This project will evaluate the geothermal resources around Albuquerque, which is the largest potential user of geothermal energy in New Mexico.

Southwest Geothermal Regional Operations Research Study, Joe Martin of NMSU, \$100,000. This is a second year continuation of an existing study in progress. The state funds are expected to attract \$500,000 in federal matching funds.

Energy Registry, Richard Cole of UNM, \$33,372. This project will meet the statutory requirement of the Energy and Minerals Department to identify all energy research facilities, projects and researchers in New Mexico. The project also prepares and distributes the monthly Energy Source newsletter.

## Add boiling water when canning chile

New Mexico chile is a low-acid vegetable which can be safely canned only in a pressure canner. "New Mexico State University Cooperative Extension Service research showed that boiling water must be added when canning chile to insure a safe product," said Mae Martha Johnson, NMSU Extension food specialist.

Chile for canning should be carefully selected. Use freshly picked, firm, unbruised pods. Wash the chile thoroughly and remove the tough outer skin. To remove the skin, pierce the chile with a sharp knife to allow steam to escape. Roast the chile in a hot oven (400-450 degrees or 204-232 degrees C) or boil it until the skin is evenly blistered. Turn the chile frequently to prevent scorching. Remove the skin, stem and seeds.

Chile should be processed for 30 minutes and pints for 35 minutes. Never can chile in jars larger than one pint.

You need an internal temperature of 240 F (116 C) to destroy botulism organisms. At sea level, this temperature is reached at 10 pounds pressure in a pressure canner.

At higher elevations, such as in New Mexico, more pressure is needed. For every 2000 feet above sea level, add one pound of pressure. For altitudes of 2000 to 4000 feet, use 12 pounds — 4000 to 6000 feet, 13 pounds — 6000 to 8000 feet, 14 pounds — 8000 to 10,000 feet, 15 pounds of pressure. If you are not sure of the altitude in your area, contact your local county Extension office or Chamber of Commerce for this information.

Finally, make sure your processing equipment is in good condition, your pressure gauge is accurate and the food is processed for the recommended time.

"As an added precaution, boil chile and all other home-canned low acid food for 15 minutes before even tasting it," Mrs. Johnson said.

Pack peeled chile loosely into hot jars, leaving a one-inch head space. Add salt if desired — one-fourth teaspoon for half-pints, one-half teaspoon for pints.

Add boiling water to cover the chile, leaving one-inch head space. Adjust lids and process in pressure canner. Half-pints



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



In addition to making unique panels, Michael also designs western art panels and racehorses in stained glass.


He and Annette also will make custom panels for homes and cabinets.

During July and August, they will teach a class on stained glass including copper foil and leading techniques.


Five consecutive evening classes will be offered starting July 12.

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

## Woodcarving fascinating craft

American history, especially Western history, has drawn artist Kevin Wolff and his family to Ruidoso, where they have a studio in Las Tienditas Shopping Center. "I've always been impressed with New Mexico and its western history," Wolff said. "And this area is rich in western history."

"The more I get into it, the more fascinating it gets and I feel it will be conducive to my craft."

A woodcarver, Wolff carves historic figures in the round and on bas-relief plaques.

He and his family selected Ruidoso partially because "the people seem more interested in the arts and particularly in the crafts. I was impressed with the number of serious artisans and craftsmen in the area."

"Ruidoso grows on you. We wondered if we'd like it . . . and the longer we're here the more we enjoy it."

"When we lived in (Silverton) Colorado I missed the wide open spaces . . . and felt

the mountains were overpowering. It's intriguing here and we have the best of both worlds with the desert just down the road."

A former commercial artist in the San Diego, California area, Wolff had a shop in Colorado until 1972, when he decided "to take a year off one summer and swing into a different direction."

"We were concentrating on commissions and gallery work and missed contact with people and we decided to open up a shop again."

In addition to the figures and plaques, Wolff carves chess sets.

"With my study of American history, an idea came to me to do chess sets on our history instead of the European motif of kings and queens," he said.

Wolff specializes in chess sets of the Civil War, Indian Wars represented by Custer and the 7th Cavalry and the Sioux Indians and the Alamo.

"I researched extensively to determine which person would be most appropriate in which position."

"I've ended up with quite an education and the study has given me an avid in-

terest in history," he said.

Wolff also carves humorous diorama clocks.

"As far as I know, I'm the only one who makes them," he said.

"I began the project in 1969 and I make 18 different ones."

Most of the clocks are made by special order and he has had many surgeons and lawyers as customers.

Former vice president Nelson Rockefeller purchased one of the clocks and "it was quite a feeling when he became vice president," he said.

Wolff uses bass wood from a northern Minnesota sawmill for most of his carvings.

Close grained, the wood is related to linden wood used by European woodcarvers.

"I also use some aspen," he said. "We found one fallen and plan to carve an eagle dancer. I'm really excited about the project."

Wolff is assisted by his wife Rosemary and their children Stephen, 20, Jon, 14, Miriam, 16, Shadha, 22, and Brendan, 12.

**NATURAL GAS - NEW MEXICO CORPORATION, OF RUIDOSO, COUNTY OF LINCOLN, STATE OF NEW MEXICO, HEREIN REFERRED TO AS GRANTEE, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, A FRANCHISE TO CONSTRUCT, OPERATE AND MAINTAIN IN THE VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, COUNTY OF LINCOLN, AS NOW OR HEREAFTER CONSTITUTED, WORKS, SYSTEMS AND PLANTS TO STORE, SELL, DISTRIBUTE, SUPPLY AND FURNISH THE SAID VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, COUNTY OF LINCOLN, AS NOW OR HEREAFTER CONSTITUTED, WITH NATURAL GAS, AND ALLIED PRODUCTS, AND TO USE THE STREETS AND WAYS AND PUBLIC GROUNDS OF SAID VILLAGE, FOR SUCH PURPOSES AND UTILITIES BELONGING TO SUCH PURPOSES, AND TO MAINTAIN AND OPERATE THE SAID VILLAGE OF RUIDOSO, COUNTY OF LINCOLN, AS NOW OR HEREAFTER CONSTITUTED, IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS HEREIN CONTAINED.**

**SECTION 1.** That the Village of Ruidoso, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, hereby grants unto Ruidoso Natural Gas Co., Inc., a New Mexico corporation, its successors and assigns, the authority, license, power and privilege to construct, operate, and maintain in the Village of Ruidoso, County of Lincoln, State of New Mexico, as now or hereafter constituted, works, systems and plants to store, sell, distribute, supply and furnish the said Village, its inhabitants and the public with natural gas and allied products, and to use the streets and ways and public grounds of said Village.

**SECTION 2.** This franchise is granted for a term of twenty-five (25) years commencing with the date on which it is accepted, thereafter, the franchise may be renewed for additional terms upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually acceptable to the Village, hereinafter referred to as "Grantor", and the Grantee. Grantee shall file a written acceptance of the franchise within 180 days of the date of this Ordinance.

**SECTION 3.** That the said Grantee is hereby authorized, licensed and empowered to do any and all things necessary and proper to be done and performed in exercising the powers and utilizing the privileges herein mentioned and granted by this franchise, provided the same do not conflict with other Grantor owned utilities now existing, and that all works done in said streets, alleys, highways, sidewalks, bridges and public grounds, shall be done with the utmost diligence and the least inconvenience to the public or individuals, and Grantee shall, within a reasonable time, repair such streets, alleys, highways, sidewalks, bridges and public grounds, as nearly as possible, and said works shall be done subject to the approval of Grantor, or such employees as it may designate provided in laying pipes or other construction and in the repair of the same, the Grantor shall be held harmless from all damage on account of all excavations for pipes or other construction, and Grantee shall assume and pay all liability or risk of damage to persons or property which may arise from the construction of any of said structures or other works, and shall save Grantor, its officers and agents, harmless from any and all liability that may arise or be incurred from the erection, construction or operation of the same.

**SECTION 4.** That this franchise may be transferred only with the written consent of Grantor, however, consent will not be unreasonably withheld.

**SECTION 5.** That upon the request of any person, firm or corporation owning or occupying property along the route of any main of Grantee, Grantee shall forthwith construct a pipe of proper size and capacity from such main to the property line, or for a distance not to exceed one hundred and fifty feet in length, at such a point as applicant may designate, and thereby furnish such person, firm or corporation with the main.

**SECTION 6.** That Grantee, for and in consideration of the granting of this franchise and as a rental for the occupation and use of easement over, upon and beneath streets, highways, sidewalks, bridges and public grounds in the said Village, shall pay unto Grantor each month during the time this franchise shall remain in force and effect, a total aggregate sum of two (2%) percent of the gross receipts of Grantee during each month for natural gas, sold within the Village limits of Grantor. (This is to mean the gas sold from the main through a meter within the Village limits of Grantor). Such gross receipts shall consist of the total amount collected (except sales tax) from the consumers on account of gas sold within the corporate limits of Grantor, but exempting any gross receipts for gas sold for use in generating electricity for resale to the general public. Grantee shall make such payments on or before the 15th day of each month while the franchise shall remain in force and effect. For the purpose of determining said revenue, the books of Grantee shall at all times be subject to inspection by duly authorized officials of Grantor.

**SECTION 7.** That Grantee may make and enforce reasonable rules and regulations in the conduct of its business and may require, before furnishing service, the execution of a contract therefor.

**SECTION 8.** That Grantee shall at all times make available to the inhabitants of the Village of Ruidoso, an adequate supply of natural gas for domestic and other useful purposes throughout the duration of this franchise, and a failure to do so shall, after thirty days notice to Grantee, terminate this franchise.

**SECTION 9.** Any lines installed by Grantee shall be so placed as not to interfere with water or sewer lines, and in conformity with present water and sewer ordinances as to distance from pipes.

**SECTION 10.** The rates to be charged by Grantee shall be those from time to time applicable to such service. It is understood that rates may be established which are different for different classifications of service, but there shall be no unreasonable discrimination in rates as between consumers using gas in like quantities under like conditions in the Village.

**SECTION 11.** Grantee shall be entitled to require any consumer of gas, before gas service is connected, a deposit of one and one half times the amount of an estimated average monthly bill but in no event to be less than one (\$100) dollars, which said deposit may be retained by Grantee until service is discontinued and all bills therefor have been paid. Grantee shall then return said deposit to the consumer, together with interest thereon at the rate of six percent (6%) per annum from date of said deposit. Grantee shall be entitled to apply said deposit with incurred interest to any indebtedness owed Grantee by the consumer making the deposit.

**SECTION 12.** That Grantee shall forthwith deposit (\$50.00) worth of gas each month to the one building known as the City Hall or Municipal Building as long as this franchise is in effect.

**SECTION 13.** Grantee shall furnish good service to the public and a good quality of merchantable gas for the lighting, heating and fuel requirements of the Village and its inhabitants. Said gas shall be commercially free from dust and other solids or liquid matter which might interfere with its use or cause injury to or interference with proper operation of consumers appliances. Natural gas supplied in the Village shall conform to industry standards in general effect throughout the State of New Mexico and as established by the New Mexico Public Service Commission.

**SECTION 14.** Should Grantee receive a bona fide offer, during the term of this franchise, acceptable to Grantee, for the sale and disposition of the terms and conditions of the properties subject of this ordinance, the said offer shall be conveyed to Grantor, which shall have, subject to the then statutes in force and effect, an option to acquire the said properties upon the terms and conditions contained therein. Should the Grantor decline to exercise this option of first refusal, within one month following notice thereof, the Grantee shall be at liberty to sell the properties subject to the terms and conditions of this ordinance.

**SECTION 15.** Should any Section of this ordinance be adjudged invalid or unconstitutional, such invalidity or unconstitutionality shall not effect the remainder of this ordinance.

**SECTION 16.** All ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.







# Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE** — Officials from two agencies of state government are working on a "formula" for school bus transportation which could result in changes in funding for the transportation system.

The 1978 Legislature mandated the work to be done, partly as a result of earlier controversies about the service that affects the lives of many New Mexicans.

Attorney General Toney Anaya stirred the controversy last year with an AG's opinion that said school bus contractors who have franchises with the local school districts would have to go to bid in order to receive their contracts.

The tradition had been for local school boards to award contracts to bus companies without letting them to competitive bidding.

The State Legislature then got involved because New Mexico is one of the few states that funds school bus operations 100 percent from the state level.

The way it has been working is that the lawmakers appropriate funds for bus operations. Then the State Department of Education, working with the dollars available, creates a formula for their distribution to the districts.

This summer two state agencies are involved in creating a more enduring formula.

"Eventually there'll be a formula but I wouldn't anticipate that until November," says Harry Wugalter, cabinet secretary of the Department of Educational Finance and Cultural Affairs. "It's never been in statute but this time it will be if the (1979) Legislature approves it."

Wugalter's department is one of two cooperating on the development of a funding formula.

His assistant, Dr. Al Clemmons, is

working with Bill Loshbaugh, school bus chief of the State Department of Education, on the project.

The 1978 legislation requiring the effort to be undertaken is a result of a couple of factors.

One is that the state has some 4,500 school bus contractors, some running entire fleets and some a single bus or two. Some operate mostly in mild climates and on good roads and others mostly on undeveloped roads and in snowy weather.

Periodically, some contractors would complain to legislators that they needed a higher reimbursement level but little data was available in Santa Fe to determine what expenditures were reasonable.

The second factor was Anaya's opinion that bus contracts should be let to bid. The first section of the '78 legislation specifically exempts school bus contractors from the bid requirement.

The legislation also, however, sets up an auditing function which will allow Santa Fe to receive more detailed information on actual costs of providing the services.

Joe Skeen, the Republican candidate for governor, says he is going to be paying a lot of attention to and spending a lot of time campaigning in northern New Mexico, an area where Democrat Bruce King has run strongly in the past.

Skeen, a southeastern New Mexico rancher, probably will have his main base of vote strength in his home region, generally more conservative and predominantly Anglo.

But he figures he can make inroads into King's appeal in the Hispanic counties of the north, he said in an interview with "Inside the Capitol."

"We hope to identify with them," Skeen said. "A lot of folks want to see things change a little."

### VICTIMS BLAMED

The average American householder was not exactly surprised by announcement that the Consumer Price Index rose at an annual rate of 10.8 percent in April — the worst surge in 14 months. Beef prices, which have jumped 41 percent in 90 days, and other soaring food costs have helped to generate the grim return to double digit inflation.

Washington soothsayers, who usually try to put the best light on the worst news, are low on optimism about inflation these days. Treasury Secretary Michael Blumenthal predicts that the big increases in living costs this year are not over.

Although administration spokesmen seem to have taken off their rose-colored glasses about the inflation, they remain as blind — and as mute — as ever about its chief cause, which is simply excessive government spending. The federal deficit will rise 20 percent in the current fiscal year to nearly \$85 billion; federal spending will be up about 13 percent from last year and a similar increase is projected for fiscal 1979. No one in Washington talks about that.

Instead, the administration speaks of voluntary restraints on wages and prices. Robert S. Strauss, the President's chief jawboner against inflation, seeks to make a scapegoat of the business community. He is warning that business now knows it must accept smaller price increases before labor cooperates with smaller wage boosts. This nonsense was a faithful echo of AFL-CIO President George Meany's instruction to the government last month that "pressure should be put on the prices rather than wages."

Of course, the elementary fact, as any freshman economics textbook makes clear, is that price increases are deter-

mined by wage increases and both are carried almost out of sight by \$85 billion annual deficits, which debase the currency. In covering this incredible overdraft, the government must sop up a large portion of the nation's capital supply by heavy borrowings from banks. This drives up interest rates and dries up credit needed for capital investment by industry to improve productivity.

The inflationary cycle feeds upon itself. The Department of Labor calculated a 3.6 percent reduction in the annual rate of United States productivity in the first quarter of 1978, the largest quarterly drop in four years. Reduced production of goods, coupled with a currency grossly expanded to meet the Treasury's deficit, cannot but fuel the inflationary pressures.

Unfortunately, on the infrequent occasions when President Carter decides to get tough about inflation, he chooses the wrong target. Instead of cutting back on spending, he almost invariably aims at the United States taxpayer. He slashed his promised tax-relief package from \$25 billion to \$20 billion, and this may be cut even further. And he has threatened to veto the tuition-tax relief bill for middle-income parents now making its way through Congress.

Inflation has become perhaps the heaviest federal taxation of all on the American people, confiscating their savings, their insurance, their pay increases, and even their homes. This monster will not be controlled by jawboning and scapegoating — by government perpetrators of inflation blaming its victims, the people in the marketplace. Economic salvation, though difficult, is very simple: The balanced budget that Mr. Carter promised so blithely during his presidential campaign. —Deming Headlight



## Town Policy comes back; eyeing Derby

The up-and-down saga of Town Policy is such a good one, I'm surprised no big city eastern magazine has jumped all over it. Sure enough, the story has moved on the national wire a time or two, and has been heavily reported in industry publications. But if someone were to trace the story through its various South-of-the-border meanderings, it might make good reading. In fact, Ivan Ashment, the potato king from Idaho, says he plans to write a book about his remarkable quarter horse. The

story has all the right elements: a race horse of super star potential and tremendous earning power; a kidnapping in the dead of night; laborious sniffing of lukewarm trails in Mexico; at last, recovery of the animal; finally, the winning (once again) of big money stakes. The main question now is how great is this three-year-old gelding? Will he continue to win big? Is he good enough to shuck off the dismal effects of his mysterious six month odyssey in Mexico and still handle that buzz-saw sophomore

competition at Ruidoso Downs? As the old theory goes, "If you think you've got a quarter horse that can run, send him to Ruidoso — and they'll test him for you."

Briefly, here's the background on Town Policy: as a two-year-old, he ripped up everything in sight in California, usually with dazzling speed. He'd already picked off a couple of stakes before shipping to Ruidoso for the All-American Futurity. In the trials, he smashed his foes by 2½ lengths, and rightly became a 5-2 favorite in the million dollar race Labor Day. At that point, his record was a perfect five wins from five starts. But in the All-American, he was unable to hold off Hot Idea and lost by 1¼ lengths.

Next, it was back to his home turf in California, where he smashed out four more wins, including solid money stakes at Pomona and Fresno. Then came a bleak turn of events. It was the morning of October 11 when Ashment got a call from his trainer, Blane Schvaneveldt. "I've got some real bad news," Blane said glumly. Ashment, not knowing what to expect, waited with foreboding. Blane went on: "Somebody's stolen Town Policy." Ashment's response: "You've got to be kidding."

Later, Ashment sized up his reactions this way: "It was such a shock, I wouldn't know how to describe it. It was a while before I realized it had happened. Blane said he'd get the police and start checking it out. We had a lot of leads. At first, I felt sure we'd get our horse back. I thought it was a prank. But then we found out the horse had been taken into Mexico, right after being stolen from Blane's ranch in Stanton, California. We understood he'd been put in an old furniture van to get him across the border."

So why would anyone steal the horse? Obviously, there would be no opportunity for organized racing, since, with his lip tattoo, he'd be easily identified.

"It just didn't make sense," Ashment says. "But there was this theory that the people who took him might have thought

he was a stallion, and wanted to breed him. But I kind of doubt it. One thing is for certain — the people who took him knew what they were doing. There's always security at Town Policy's barn, but the thieves came in the middle of the night and went right to his stall. They knew where to find him."

So Ashment and Schvaneveldt left for Mexico, and the first swing took about six days, but they were always one step behind. The Mexican government, Ashment says, pitched right in. The high ranking Federal official spearheading the case told Ashment: "If your horse is in our state (Durango), we'll sure try and recover him for you."

But six months went by. Disheartened, Ashment had just about given up hopes of getting his champion back. The gelding, at the time of his theft, had won some \$340,000. He was the kind of horse a man dreams of owning. "I thought how sad it would be if we couldn't run him as a three-

year-old, to see how really great he might have been," Ashment said. Matters took a sudden turn in April when Ashment got a call from the Mexican police in Durango. "We've got your horse," the gentlemen said. Ashment needed time to catch his breath, and to touch base with Blane. So he asked the officer to call back in a half hour. Then, with a clear mind, Ashment gobbled what few details there were and he and Blane were off to Mexico.

"When we first saw Town Policy again, his head was kind of down, and four or five policemen were holding him" Ashment says. "He was so thin and raggedy. He looked down in the dumps. He looked like he needed a square meal. But we were so happy to see him, we didn't bother to take any pictures." Blane walked around him, studying the horse from end to end. "He looks like he might be alright — but it's hard to say," Blane observed.

Had the horse been match raced in

Mexico? "We heard lots of stories," Ashment goes on. "But I just don't know. I kind of doubt it. I'm just going by my feelings."

According to thin details, a rancher had gotten the horse, having bought him from another party. But Ashment says Mexican police could offer few particulars. Gratefully, though, Ashment handed \$25,000 in reward money to several people who helped engineer the recovery.


The Town Policy saga reached a shimmering highpoint recently when the gelding, after getting back into shape, won the \$100,000 Los Alamitos Derby and swelled his earnings to nearly \$400,000. "When he won that Derby, I just couldn't help shedding a tear or two," Ashment says. If Town Policy, later this summer, wins the \$860,000 All-American Derby at Ruidoso, that'd be enough to put another tear or two in Ashment's eye. It'd also be another fairytale chapter in Town Policy's biography.

The filly, now owned by Sam Rankin, Rodney Verret and Roger Fagan of Lafayette, Louisiana, cleared a maiden field by 3/4 lengths in her first career start. But she'll tackle a much tougher crew this week in a division of the Rainbow Futurity trials.

**BAR ROULA**, winner of last year's World's Championship Classic and Three Bars Handicap at Ruidoso, made his seasonal debut in Friday's 10th race and displayed his usual flare. The four-year-old went off as an odds-on favorite in the allowance bout, broke tardily, but then made up plenty of ground to win by a head. He earned over \$79,000 last year and finished his sophomore year with a third place finish in the Champion of Champions at Los Alamitos.

**GUILDED JEWEL** (\$2,20-1), a product of impressive breeding, made her first career start in Friday's fourth race and lost no time in taking control of the four furlong test to win by 3/4 lengths. Owned and bred by Sam Henderson of Odessa, Texas, the youngster is sired by Riva Ridge, the 1972 Kentucky Derby winner. Her dam is Thirty One Jewels, who captured the rich Riley Allison Futurity in 1973 and went on to campaign successfully on the West Coast.

**ROGER THE DODGER** took second behind Guided Jewel in his first start and he also claims notable kinship. His daddy is 1968 Kentucky Derby winner, Forward Pass. The 1967 Derby winner, Proud Clarion, was represented by offspring Proud Clarionette in Saturday's sixth race. The filly finished second in allowance company.

**THE HIGHEST SEASONAL** payoff for the Dally Double turned up Friday when successful players redeemed tickets worth \$484.60. They had to match Fly Jull (No. 7), a 16-1 shot in a maiden quarter horse field, with Pantera Roja (No. 1) at 6-1 odds who battled maiden thoroughbreds.

**JOCKEY GILBERT VILLESAS** was close to battling a thousand for his in-the-money percentage over the weekend. The rider took only one trip on Friday aboard stakes winner The Drake and breezed home nearly six lengths ahead of allowance competition. Saturday all four of his mounts finished in the money. The two winners were longshots — Bold Bunny (\$19.40) and Jules Blade (\$52.60) — while Sailing Scouter and Flashing Shadow each took third. Sunday, from two trips, he notched a third aboard Slow Rapture. All

of his mounts were trained by J. Doyal Roberts.

**EXCLUSIVE TALENT**, a promising three-year-old trained by William Leach, died in his stall last week from a severe case of colic. The colt finished third in last year's Futurity Prep Stakes and recently displayed tough allowance competitors by nearly five lengths at 5 1/2 furlongs. He was sired by Exclusive Native, who also sired Affirmed.

**SOME HIGH PRICE** claiming activity turned up during the weekend. Who's Leader went to John G. and John R. Graham Friday for a sum of \$6,250, while Rushing Silver was purchased by W.L. and Florence Gilliam Monday for a huge \$8,000 price.

**GUERO TURNED OUT** to be the biggest surprise to the fans in the four days. The sophomore gelding had 36-1 odds as he left the outside post in Sunday's third race at 550 yards. But he had plenty of reserve for the final yards and edged competition by a head for resounding payoffs of \$75.40, \$23.60 and \$9.60. He's owned by the Paisano Racing Association of Alamogordo.

**HURRY PERRY** (\$20.40) didn't get much mutual support in Monday's first race, and got off at 10-1 odds. But the colt soon fought off other \$3,500 claimers in the 400 yard test and came through for a length victory. It could be the expertise of trainer Barbara Maas that brought about the triumph. She's the lady who trained The First Edition for his notable victories in the West Texas and Sun Country Futurities at Sunland Park.

**HILLTOP'S NATIVE** has to be the most frustrated 870 yard competitor around. The gelding, who campaigns in the upper claiming brackets, went to the early lead in his last three spins (including the seventh race Friday) and only missed victory in the final stages by painfully narrow margins. Twice he missed by a head and once by a half-length.

**CHALK PLAYERS** had a rough time making it to the cashier windows over the weekend. Saturday and Sunday, only two favorites came in each day. But they fared better Friday, when seven favorites lit the board and the other five each finished in the runnerup slot.

**AZURE THREE**, brother to Rainbow Derby finalist Stoa Minga, scored a major victory over the weekend at Los Alamitos Race Track in California. The colt, owned by Chuck Stewart of Lubbock, Texas, raced to a three length win in the \$106,990 Vessels Maturity at 440 yards. Azure Three was timed in 21.45 seconds, which was the fastest 440 yard clocking in the history of night racing at the California

plant. Azure Three has now earned over \$200,000. His upcoming engagements include the \$100,000 Los Alamitos Championship and the \$125,000-added Champion of Champions. Stewart is really sitting pretty since his barn also includes the two-year-old sister to Azure Three, Lady Sweet Thing; yearling brother Country Count; and the weanling sister, Sondra's Song.

**IN STEWARDS' RULINGS:** Trainer Gordon R. Howell took a \$25 bite for being late to the paddock for the 11th race June 25. Jockey Eddie Vallejos was fined \$50 for being involved in an altercation in the grandstand June 17.

**JOCKEY CARLOS RIVAS** was suspended from June 26 through July 9 for rough riding during the running of the 1st race June 25, causing interference to the inside horse while aboard Alzeenero.

**OTHER RULINGS:** Trainer Charles W. Harper and trainer J. Doyal Roberts were fined \$25 each for entering an ineligible horse. Trainer William A. Thompson and trainer Jesse Valdez each took a \$50 bite for failing to conduct their business properly, necessitating a late scratch.

Jockey Willie Lovell was fined \$50 for failure to control his mount, Elders Luck, during the 12th race June 30. Jockey Salustio Burgos was suspended July 6 through July 8 for careless riding causing interference while astride Double B Express during the ninth race July 2.

## Jockey/Trainer of the week

Charles Mueller copped the Jockey-of-the-Week title for the first time this season at Ruidoso Downs with an impressive eight trips through the winner's circle. And two of his victories came in top stakes events as well.

Mueller moved into the second position in the overall standings with a tally of 26 wins, 19 seconds and 16 thirds from 133 starts for a win percentage of 19.5.

The veteran rider guided two-year-old thoroughbred star Pocket Coin to a four length triumph in the Futurity Prep Stakes Sunday which offered a winner's share of

\$5,040. Then he came back Tuesday for an upset victory aboard Trail Driver in the Governor's Handicap which offered a top paycheck of \$8,480.

His other top performance came aboard North Wing in Saturday's eighth race. The gelding got off as a 21-1 longshot in the 5 1/2 furlong test and seemed to be well out of contention in the early going. But he finally put on a tremendous stretch rush to win by a slim nose for a return of \$45.20.

Mueller also chalked up two seconds and two thirds from 24 trips to the post over the five day racing period.

Jockey Salustio Burgos also turned in successful score with a 6-5-4 record from the weekend. He moved into the third spot in the standings with an overall record of 23-25-17 from 172 starts for a 13.4 win percentage. Willie Lovell was close behind with a 6-4-3 tally for the weekend.

Trainers Bob Arnett and H. C. Werner Jr., each sent out five winners over the weekend to tie for Trainer-of-the-Week honors. Werner continues to hold the top spot in the standings with an overall tally of 20-16-12 from 108 starts for an 18.5 win percentage.


Bob Arnett holds the runnerup position with a tally of 18-6-9 from 89 starts for a sharp win percentage of 20.2.

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
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**HIGHWAY 70 - RUIDOSO - JUST EAST OF THE Y**

## Monday cloudburst floods St. Annes Episcopal Chapel

Though Monday's rain proved a blessing to many people of the sun-scorched Hondo Valley it meant about five hours of work for several residents of Glencoe, Ruidoso and Roswell.

The brief though furious deluge left St. Annes Episcopal Chapel located at the Ft. Stanton turnoff in Glencoe, filled with almost two feet of silt, mud and boulders. About 2:30 p. m. a wall of mud descended on the tiny church, depositing silt and debris along a two and one half foot high wall until there was no sign of the wall. The muck then overflowed the wall engulfing the chapel.

Those first on the scene said the church showed a water mark as much as four and a half feet off the floor; an old organ had been toppled by the flood and sustained permanent damage. The water flowed on into a normally dry arroyo, leaving almost two feet of mud covering the church grounds.

Volunteers arrived on the scene Tuesday morning and began mopping up, literally. They removed countless buckets of fine

attempted as buckets of mud passed from hand to hand out of the chapel. From time to time a volunteer would stumble across a boulder and would ponder the force of the flood before throwing the rock out the window.

By 1 p. m., most of the mud had been placed elsewhere and the church was back to a sort of chaotic order with evidence of the flood still very noticeable.

Father Achuff remarked that the church would be unharmed in the long run. He recalled a similar incident about 13 years ago when the Hondo River left its banks destroying much of the valley. A water mark remains in the church bearing witness to that mid-sixties incident.

Following completion of the cleaning up exercises, Irene and Kenneth Nosker treated the detail to lunch at their Glencoe store.

silt, boulders as large as 18 inches long and lots of red New Mexico clay from the chapel.

Many old style pews were also removed to dryer climes where they will be restored to useful condition. Carpeting in the church was ruined.

Father Delbert Achuff said all the drainage from a section of United States Highway 70 flowed through the church. He blames a nonfunctioning drainage system for at least compounding the problem.

"Culverts (at the intersection) are plugged up tight," he said. "Grass is growing out of them."

He said he intends to notify the State Highway Department of the situation, adding that the department is responsible for maintenance on the highway.

Yesterday he told The News, "Things are just getting back in gear. I'll be talking to the State Highway Department soon."

Spirits were high among the volunteers as they worked through Tuesday morning and into the early afternoon. One woman said her efforts entitled her to become an honorary Episcopalian. Other jokes were

# Wilderness Wisdom

with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — From time to time I hear of using thermometers to check water temperatures when bass fishing. Is there any possible value to this practice? John A., Louisiana

Dear John — Yes. Bass, as well as all other fish, have a desired temperature range at which they are most comfortable.

Whenever possible they will remain at a water depth that provides this optimum range.

In winter they prefer deep water and holes where the warmest water is found. In spring, when the surface layer warms faster than the deep water, they move up closer to the top. In full summer, when the

surface layer becomes uncomfortably warm, they move down to a cooler depth.

If you know the optimum temperature range for the fish you seek, a thermometer can help you locate the depth that should be most productive. The preferred temperature for most freshwater bass is in the 65-75 degree range.

Dear Wayne — I am considering a new wall tent for family vacations. Are most tents considered fire proof? Alex J., Michigan

Dear Alex — No. Most are treated to be fire retardant, but they are not fire proof. Since the majority are made of canvas or nylon it is extremely difficult, or impossible, to render them fire proof.

Most tent fabrics, particularly nylon, will not normally burn in an explosive manner, however, old or untreated canvas can burn very rapidly. And a burning nylon tent will drop pieces of melting material. These can ignite clothing and if dropped on bare skin will result in very

serious burns. The melting fragments adhere tightly to the skin and continue to burn.

Never consider any tent as fire proof. For this reason, stoves and open flames should be used inside a tent only when absolutely necessary, and only then with extreme caution.

Dear Wayne — I have heard that of the red fox and gray fox, only one lives in a den. Which one would that be? Alan M., Alabama

Dear Alan — Both species use dens, but

they will normally differ substantially in character.

The red fox is a bit more sociable than the gray and will often dig a den along a woods edge, in a field, stream bank, or some other open, exposed site. Their primary den entrance is often easily identifiable by a mound of dirt surrounding the hole.

The gray fox is primarily a forest dweller and dislikes digging if he has an alternative. His den site will likely be a brush pile, rock pile, hollow tree or log.

Operation Game Thief, New Mexico's stop-poaching program, is now a year old and going strong, but it still needs your continued support.

The public involvement campaign, patterned after the Crimestoppers programs, offers rewards — minimums of \$50.00 for small game and fish cases and of \$250.00 for big game cases — for information leading to the apprehension of game and fish law violators.

The reward fund is maintained entirely from donations from individuals, sportsmen's clubs, service organizations, conservation groups, private industries, and various other groups and organizations.

Starting this year, New Mexico hunters — key contributors and supporters of Operation Game Thief, have access to a new method of donating monies to the program's reward fund. This method is by way of the green application forms used in applying for special hunts such as antelope, barbary sheep, gemsbok, etc.

Hunters utilizing this system of donating to Operation Game Thief can give the highly successful program a real boost. In its first year, Operation Game Thief provided information which led to the solving of 55 cases. In these cases 104 citations were issued to 73 defendants with a 100% conviction rate in all cases heard.

and the application is drawn for the special hunt being applied for, the money is used to pay for the license.

Operation Game Thief has now paid out more than \$10,000 in reward monies to anonymous callers that have utilized the

program's toll free number, 1-800-432-4263, or that have contacted local game and fish officers with information pertaining to violations.

Therefore, one of the keys to the success of the stop-poaching program is to maintain enough money in the reward fund to offer the substantial rewards.

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish would like to thank all contributors and supporters of the program, as well as to encourage continued public assistance.

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

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

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# Job Corps opportunities await disadvantaged youth

Economically disadvantaged youth between 16 and 21 who qualify for Job Corps training can receive up to two years of college level education, with all expenses paid by the government, under an expanded Job Corps training program. Employment Services Division Director W. A. Anderson of the Human Services Department said the national Job Corps quota, including the number referred for regular residential center training, has been increased for Fiscal year '79, creating additional opportunities for New Mexican youth.

"Job Corps is an excellent federal program," Anderson said. "Through the Corps, young people who are economically disadvantaged can gain educational skills and career training. Many New Mexicans have benefitted from Job Corps, and are earning high salaries in various careers."

To be eligible for Job Corps, applicants must be the right age, be on welfare or meet low income requirements, and have adequate mental and physical ability to complete training. Applicants must usually be high school dropouts, be permanent United States residents, and must be eager to complete Job Corps training.

New Mexican youth accepted for Job Corps are assigned to one of seven training centers in New Mexico and surrounding states by Job Service screeners. After three month evaluation in the assigned center, individuals can be transferred to Northern New Mexico Community College or Eastern New Mexico University at Roswell. Students live on campus while

pursuing either vocational training or two year programs leading to associate of arts degrees.

"Under the experimental college program, Corps members who have the potential and interest will be able to gain higher education," Anderson said. "Students who attend college will have more career choices and should be able to obtain high paying jobs. And since Job Corps serves low income youth, college level training is being made available to people who could not otherwise afford it."

Regular training centers accepting New Mexican youth include three men's conservation camps, located in Quachita and near Ozark, Arkansas, and near Lawton, Oklahoma, which teach skills like auto mechanics, heavy equipment operation and construction trades. Coeducational centers in Albuquerque, near San Marcos and in McKinney, Texas, and in Guthrie, Oklahoma, offer a wide variety of career training. Depending on the center to which they are assigned, by interest, students can learn cosmetology, office skills, medical technology, printing, drafting, welding, automobile repair, union connected construction trades and other skills.

While they're being trained, Job Corps students receive monthly living and clothing allowances, lodging, food, health care, and social/recreational experiences. Students who stay at least 180 days receive as much as \$1,000, as a training stipend, when they leave the program. Job Service helps each graduate find a job following graduation.

"Young people interested in Job Corps should visit any of the Job Service area offices located around New Mexico," Anderson said. Applicants are interviewed after applying, and will be told within 30 days whether or not they have been accepted for training. "Job Corps provides an excellent way to gain valuable work skills for disadvantaged youth," Anderson noted. "Graduates often pull down high salaries soon after graduation, especially when they have acquired skills in heavy demand and short supply. Students who may qualify should seriously consider Job Corps as a means of getting ahead and launching successful careers."

I attended the Con Vergence 1978 at Colorado State University last week. This was a four day workshop on spinning and weaving. There were 2,100 people attending from all over the world. They had makers of looms, spinning wheels and accessories on display. Exhibitors of wool from New Zealand and Australia as well as locally grown wools were available for purchase by spinners and weavers. There were rooms of yarns of all kinds available.

Throughout the workshop there was a wide variety of sessions to help the participant learn more about his area of

emphasis. I attended several that pertained to fibers and their use along with sessions on weaving techniques and increasing spinning skills.

It was an enjoyable week as well as vacation. The people from New Zealand and Australia run about four sheep per acre and have more problems with disease than we do. They use kilos and hectares rather than pounds and acres. I talked with the Australian about the electric fence - they use it and feel that it helps them a great deal in reducing predator losses.

Times do change there now is a National Colored Sheep Grower Association being formed to promote sheep with at least 35% of the fleece colored. The spinners and weavers prefer this wool as it does not need to be dyed and can be used as is.

Grasshoppers, flea beetles, blister beetles: I have had requests from home gardeners on how to control these and other pests in the garden and around the home.

These insects build up quite rapidly and damage the garden quickly. You can use Diazinon, Malathion or Sevin to control them. Leave a few weeds around the edge of the garden and spray these extra heavy. This will help control the bugs that move into the garden from other areas. No matter the insecticide used, be sure to read the label as to the amount to use and waiting period before you can eat the garden vegetables.

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# Researcher finds new method to purify chemicals

A University of New Mexico (UNM) researcher has developed a cheaper, more efficient and energy saving process for purifying the chemicals used to manufacture plastics.

The new process, developed by Dr. Chen-yen Cheng, professor of chemical and nuclear engineering at UNM, can also be used for other types of purification problems.

"The traditional method has been distillation, but this requires considerable energy and sometimes fails to adequately separate similar acting chemical compounds," Cheng said.

Cheng has been working under a National Science Foundation (NSF) grant on a process which uses freezing rather than distillation to separate the chemicals used to make plastics from contaminants. These chemical building blocks are called monomers, he said.

"Plastics are produced in a series of exacting chemical steps in which molecules of a monomer are strung together like beads on a string," he said. "These strings, called polymers, are used to form products ranging from home insulation to clothing."

The polymer-forming reactions are carried out in stainless steel or glass reactors which have been thoroughly cleaned. Any contamination present in the reactor or in the monomer itself tends to hinder the growth of the polymer chain. Thus, a high-purity monomer is essential. "Freezing as a purification process is not new," Cheng said. "It has long been known that as a solution freezes, it forms crystals of very high purity, leaving the impurities concentrated in the unfrozen solution."

The UNM professor said the polar ice caps are examples of this process. Although they were formed from seawater, the ice in the caps is relatively pure and produces fresh water when melted.

Cheng's method differs however, in the way in which the purified monomer crystals are separated from the surrounding contaminated liquid.

"Previous attempts at purification through freezing have relied on complex and expensive scraping mechanisms to separate the crystallized product from the chilled surface on which the crystals were grown," Cheng said. "The systems work much like an ice cream maker, which uses paddles to scrape ice crystals off the walls of the drum where they form."

In Cheng's system, the monomer crystals remain attached to the walls of the cooling tubes where they are grown. When enough of the crystals have formed, the remaining liquid, along with its contaminants, is driven from the tubes. The crystals are then allowed to melt

without being removed from the tubes and the purified monomer is recovered as a liquid product.

"The key to this process," Cheng said, "is very precise control of the freezing process. We are able to use a combination of temperature and pressure to initiate crystallization and control the rate at which the crystals are grown."


"The system can be constructed at a low cost and operations are simple because the crystals have not been removed from the tubes in which they were grown during the displacement and melting steps."

The energy saved by this process is due to the fact that it takes less energy to freeze a pound of material than it does to

vaporize it as required in the distillation process. In addition, the combined temperature-pressure control allows the energy required to melt the product crystals to be obtained from freezing the material.

The process has been demonstrated using xylene mixtures, but should be useful in producing other polymerization-grade monomers and high-grade semiconductor materials for the electronics industry.

Cheng's research grant was recently extended by NSF for an additional year to enable further development of this process. The funding for this extension amounted to \$46,157.

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## Social Security information

"Attention brides! When you return from the honeymoon, take your marriage certificate in to the social security office and have the name on your social security card changed to your new married name," Gordon Lunsford, social security field representative said today.

"Under new regulations effective last month a person applying for a duplicate card must submit evidence of their identity, and if a change of name is involved the evidence should show the new name. For this reason, the bride should take her marriage certificate with her when contacting the social security office."

"Everyone who applies for a social security number, regardless of their age or place of birth, must now submit documentary evidence of their age, identity, and citizenship or alien status. In addition, people 18 or over who are applying for a number for the first time must apply in person."

"The best evidence of age and citizenship is a birth certificate recorded shortly after birth, and this is preferred. Evidence of identity should include material showing the person's picture, signature, date of birth or age, or other identifying information."

"All documents submitted as evidence may be verified with the agency which issued them to assure they are valid."

"Apply for your card early, as three to four weeks are needed before the card will be delivered, after all required documents have been submitted."
