

Regional airport facing land use protest

A land use protest over acreage needed for the proposed regional airport near Fort Stanton, raised by New Mexico State University (NMSU), Las Cruces, officials last week may become a stumbling block to airport development, even though a vital application for conveyance of title to lands needed for the airport is now under consideration by Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) officials in Washington, D.C.

At the commission's Thursday afternoon meeting, chairman Richard Hall said the same day the airport application was

forwarded from the regional to national FAA offices, a meeting was held in Albuquerque to "resolve the question of support of the project and to identify supporters and opponents regarding development of the airport on Fort Stanton land."

The meeting was attended by members of the airport commission, and representatives of the state departments of transportation and agriculture.

A member of the College of Agriculture at NMSU, which presently is leasing the land from the Bureau of Land Management, told the group at the meeting in Albuquerque they were in

opposition to the site location of the proposed airport as it interfered with or invalidated range and grassland experimentation underway.

According to Hall, the agriculture representatives claim the proposed airport site of 170 acres in the Fort Stanton mesa area is in the heart of grazing rotation experiment which have been underway for 19 years.

"They feel they are in midstream on the experimentation and that the years of work would go down the drain," a commissioner said.

The college of agriculture has another 10

years on the mesa under provisions of a contract with the BLM.

IN CONJUNCTION with the protests of the agriculture representatives, Hall told the commission Thursday the New Mexico Stockmen's Association has issued a statement in opposition to the proposed airport.

Also during the commission's Thursday afternoon meeting, Hall said a courtesy copy of a letter from Henry L. Newman, director of the southwestern regional FAA offices, was sent to Frank Gregg, director of the BLM offices in Washington, D.C.

In the letter Newman wrote, "We have carefully considered the (request of the

Sierra Blanca Airport Commission) and have determined the use of the requested land is reasonably necessary for airport purposes and conveyance of the property to applicants also is necessary to permit its use for these purposes."

He added, "The current airport situation in the Ruidoso area is reaching the critical stage. Action is needed now. The applicants are anxious to proceed. Your early advice that the transfer can be made is needed to facilitate an early commencement of all prerequisites to development of this badly needed airport."

In other business, the commission:

—Heard a report from Wyndham Runningwater that the Mesalero Apache Tribal Council has approved a resolution granting the commission to act on its behalf.

—Heard a report from Les Olsen, county liaison, that each of the five governing bodies, with representatives on the commission, had approved budget transfers of \$500 to the commission.

—Heard a report from Hall, that airport commission letterheads had been received from Southern New Mexico Economic Development District offices.

The next meeting of the commission will be at 2 p.m., August 3, in the library.

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P & Z turns down development proposal

Plans which would allow a zone for the construction of townhouses and condominiums in the Sleepy Hollow subdivision of the Upper Canyon Area were met by residential opposition and subsequently voted down by the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) Wednesday night.

During the regular P&Z meeting engineer Tim Collins and attorney Mel O'Reilly, both representing Ruidoso Land Company, asked for a zone change from R-1 to R-2 for about 44.7 acres in the subdivision.

Additionally the pair sought commission approval of a plat for Sleepy Hollow Townhouse and Condominium tracts. Both requests were denied by the commission.

O'Reilly and Collins emphasized that their client had no plans for construction of condominiums nor had they been approached by any builders desiring to purchase tracts for condominium and townhouse development. They said however, the land in question had the potential of accommodating about 457 condominium units.

Planning commissioner Martin Rose, who stepped down for discussion of the matter, led a contingent of Upper Canyon residents who said they were opposed to the development because high density housing would destroy the scenic and environmental qualities of the Upper Canyon.

Reading from a prepared outline, Rose

listed points of opposition including increased traffic on already narrow roads, loss of water pressure, possible overuse of sewer lines, potential increased fire hazard, destruction of trees coupled with an increased likelihood of flood and possible erosion problems. At one point he suggested designating the area as a historical zone. His comments were met by cheers and applause of approval by the Upper Canyon residents.

Collins countered each point. He said sewer and water lines would be installed by Ruidoso Land Company and indicated the sewer lines would be tied into larger city mains outside the area. He added that water pressure in the area would be increased because of plans to loop the proposed subdivision's water system into two existing lines.

Collins said fire hazard would be decreased because the company would construct roads and fire hydrants in the area.

"Nothing we do will increase the amount or intensity of rain in the area," Collins said in response to Rose's comments regarding increased erosion.

O'Reilly said single family units could be constructed under the present zoning for the area. He added that construction of single family houses would cause more destruction of vegetation in the subdivision because the houses would have to be more spread out and would require a greater number of roads through the area.

Concerning increased traffic on existing narrow roads, O'Reilly explained the

problem was already present and had developed during a time when unchecked growth was occurring in the Ruidoso area in the absence of planning regulations.

One resident of the Upper Canyon said she thought the area was a nice place, steeped in Ruidoso history. She said she was in favor of retaining the present flavor of the area.

Commissioner L. Ray Nunley split somewhat with her assessment.

"This board is not here to preserve old houses, 20 foot streets and sentimentality; it's here to preserve Ruidoso," Nunley said. "We can not maintain a status quo; Ruidoso has to grow."

Following a poll of the land owners in attendance, which showed that of the 27 tract owners affected by the proposal, ten in attendance were opposed to the subdivision, several Upper Canyon property owners said they represented many other owners who were also opposed to seeing condominiums and townhouses allowed in the Upper Canyon.

O'Reilly reiterated his statement that Ruidoso Land Company had no plans for construction of condominiums or townhouses.

"We're not planning on putting anything in there," O'Reilly said. "We want this area set aside for development of condominiums and townhouses."

However he added that condominium projects today are designed to fit into the environment of a given area while destroying as little as possible of the natural vegetation.

Commissioner Rex Skellett agreed with O'Reilly.

"History has proved that condominiums and townhouses preserve the land better

Cree Meadows granted mobile home clubhouse

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission Wednesday gave permission for an owner of the Cree Meadows Country Club to park a mobile home next to the Cree Meadows club house to be used as a temporary club house.

The existing club house was destroyed by a July 2 fire which also gutted Janco's restaurant housed in the same building.

Owner Bob Hickson told the commission the Cree Meadows Country Club was in desperate need of a suitable temporary club house pending reconstruction of the gutted building.

He said the only quarters he could find on such short notice was a 23x70-foot (doublewide) mobile home. He added that the mobile unit came complete with wood siding and skirting.

"Once it's set up it won't look like a trailer," Hickson said.

The commission voted to accept

Hickson's proposal with the stipulation that the trailer be moved within 180 days or 15 days after a new clubhouse is built.

In moving for acceptance, commissioner Rex Skellett directed a media representative to publicize the action as a "hardships" issue.

"We don't want 5,000 people on our backs screaming about a trailer in Cree Meadows," Skellett said.

Sympathetic to Hickson's cause, the commission was at first at a loss as to how the trailer could legally be allowed in the area.

Village attorney Ron Harris instructed the commission that if the trailer was uninhabited, then it was not covered in the zoning regulations.

Harris said he was unsure as to the legal definition of "uninhabited."

Hickson said, however that his plans did not include anyone living in the unit.

Fall in pool foils man's escape

Robert Smith 23, Ruidoso, who eluded officers for about 40 minutes by hiding in a large pool of water early in the morning of July 5, was finally physically subdued, arrested and subsequently charged with residential burglary.

Lieutenant Guy Bowers, Lincoln County Sheriff's office, related details of the incident to The News Friday afternoon:

— A neighbor of T.A. Spencer, Agua Fria, phoned the Ruidoso Police Department (RPD) dispatcher at 1:55 a.m., July 5, to report a suspected break in at the Spencer home, because the caller had heard the sound of breaking glass.

Bowers, accompanied by John Cupp of the New Mexico Mounted Patrol and Sergeant Fred Sweeney, RPD, drove to the

Spencer home where they saw a man run out of the house.

"He made a dash into the darkness," Bowers said, "and then we heard a splash as he fell into a large shallow pool of water, just the other side of a wall he climbed over."

— Sweeney heard him breathing, as he searched through the tall weeds, brush and reeds surrounding the pond and saw the man laying on his back with just his nose and mouth out of the water.

— Officer Robert Jarvis, RPD, was called by Sweeney to assist in the pursuit of the suspect.

"The man," Bowers said, "kept moving around in the pool until he made it to dry ground. He started running and was

tackled by Jarvis and handcuffed, after which he was taken to the Ruidoso jail by Jarvis and Cupp."

Bowers, with Holly Barron, RPD officer, searched the premises early Wednesday morning and found a carving knife that Spencer had reported missing from one of the three drawers that the suspect had opened.

A Criminal Investigation Division (CID) officer of RPD assisted with the investigation in the Spencer home.

"The officer determined that the suspect had removed a screen from a bathroom window, then broke the glass," Bowers said, "to enter the home. Spencer was sleeping and did not hear the intruder."

At a first appearance hearing Thursday, Magistrate Jim Wheeler put Smith under a \$10,000 bond, with no ten percent allowed, on charges of residential burglary filed by Bowers. Smith was ordered held in the

Ruidoso jail.

Smith appeared before Magistrate Wheeler at a preliminary hearing on the charge of burglary Friday and the bond was reduced to \$5,000 with ten percent allowed.

At this time a CID officer advised Wheeler that Smith was wanted on a fugitive warrant, charging burglary, from San Diego, California, and Wheeler set bond on this charge at \$5,000 with 10 percent allowed.

Smith was then remanded to the Lincoln County jail, bound over to District Court on the charge of burglary of the Spencer residence.

"Due to the cooperation of all the officers involved," Bowers said, "the arrest of the suspect was made fairly easily, once he decided to leave the pond and run for it."

The Drake wins Hurd Handicap

The Drake toyed with fellow three-year-olds at Ruidoso Downs before administering the coup de grace in Sunday's 12th running of the Peter Hurd Handicap.

The colt, shouldering the top load of 123 pounds in the six furlong sprint, fearlessly stayed well off the pace in the early going.

Hopeful Journey, as usual, went winging along the front end and got some early competition from the 10-1 outsider, Keeper of My Heart. One Bold Scout, the 8-5 second favorite with 122 pounds on his back, stayed within striking distances.

As the field skimmed down the

backstretch, The Drake was well out of the picture — perhaps as much as 10 lengths in arrears at one point.

Hopeful Journey was able to keep the lead to herself until the top of the stretch, then cooked out in predictable fashion. Jockey Willie Lovell aboard One Bold

Scout asked his mount for all he had, and was inching toward the front when he reached the top of the lane.

But by this time, jockey Gilbert Villegas had The Drake in overdrive. The colt delivered a mighty surge around the turn for home, then had each of his foes in tow when he straightened out for the stretch drive.

With those high octane strides, it was apparent no one would catch the people's choice in the final furlong. The Drake opened up at will and flashed across the finish with nearly a four length lead.

The competition chalked up crisp fractions of 22 2-5 seconds for the first two furlongs, and 46 1-5 for the half. But The Drake's final clocking of 1:12 3-5 seconds was most impressive of all. The mark was only a second short of the track standard. But it was the swiftest so far this season.

The Drake, trained by Doyal Roberts for J. C. Chadders of Borger, Texas, collected \$5,085 out of the \$8,475 gross purse. The win pushed his 1978 earnings to \$18,724, and gave him a current Ruidoso scorecard of three wins out of five starts. The mutual returns: \$5.20, \$3 and \$2.60.


An authority on the Lincoln County War, he also will discuss weaponry of that era.

Ruidoso hosting water seminar this Thursday

Ruidoso will host the first in a series of seminars concerning water supply systems and the enforcement of the Safe Drinking Water Act July 13 in the multipurpose room of the Ruidoso Public Library.

The seminar is sponsored by the Health and Environment Department's Environmental Improvement Division (EID) in cooperation with the New Mexico Municipal League, the New Mexico Water Supply and Pollution Control Association and the American Water Works Association, and will be held from 1-4 p.m., at no charge.

According to an EID news release, the purpose of the seminar will be to explain municipal manager's roles in implementing the Safe Drinking Water Act which became law June 24, 1977. The main thrust, the release states, is to familiarize managers with key provisions and requirements including costs and to present a suggested plan of action.

An EID spokesman said the seminars are aimed primarily at utility engineers, city managers, municipal clerks, public works directors, city engineers, water superintendents, consulting engineers and state and federal personnel.

The EID took responsibility for primary enforcement of the Safe Drinking Water Act April 1 of this year.

The act allows for periodic testing of water systems to insure the purity of drinking water within the state.







Etching demonstration in progress

Artists Steve Edwards and Lois Carson, El Paso, Texas, will be demonstrating etching technique at the Artisan's Shop and Gallery from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., today through Saturday.

"Visitors are invited and we will explain the press, various papers we use and techniques," Carson said, adding etchings are different from lithographs or offset reproductions.

The husband-wife team, which also uses media of watercolor, acrylics and oils, specialize in etchings of cowboys, Indians, wildlife and southwestern landscapes.

Their technique begins with a rough sketch of an idea which is then transferred to a metal plate.

The sketch is refined and scratched on the plate with an etching needle, "until I have a proof I can live with."

Edwards then inks the plate by dabbing it with his fingers and wiping the excess off with cheesecloth. "By controlling the ink on the plate, I can achieve areas of intense black down to pure white."

The next step is to place high quality, wet rag paper on top of the inked plate

and then place the two between blotter paper.

Edwards then runs them through an antique Massey press, which exerts a great deal of pressure and transfers the ink from the plate to the paper.

The paper is dried, colored with acrylics and then signed and numbered.



Social Security information

"People need to be aware of the basic principles of social security in order to follow the current debate over the program and understand some of the proposals for change," Gordon Lunsford, social security field representative, said today.

"The principles that have characterized the social security program over the years are: (1) coverage would be compulsory; (2) universal; (3) contributory; (4) that benefits are related to earnings; and (5) that benefits are paid as an earned right with no 'means test'."

"Because social security is compulsory it can be assured of future participants and, therefore, of continued income. This enables it to operate on a pay-as-you-go basis without the necessity of maintaining huge cash reserves."

"About 90 percent of the jobs are covered by social security, and recent social security law changes authorized development of plans for bringing in the remaining 10 percent of the jobs that are not now covered."

"The contributory aspect is important in that a worker's social security taxes represent his basic share of the cost of the program, and supports the concept of benefits relating to earnings, and the principle that benefits can be paid without a means test or test of need."

"The latest social security Advisory Council, an independent group of experts from various fields, has emphatically affirmed that the principles mentioned above are sound and can be relied on to help assure the continuing effectiveness of the program."

Floor Fashions

LIGHT IS RIGHT in many home decorating situations, including the choice of a carpet. It used to be that careful homeowners steered clear of light carpets for fear of showing soil and staining too soon. Not so today.

For one thing, today's miracle fibers resist soiling and staining. The fibers do not absorb moisture or alien chemicals, so they can be sponged up easily. Some carpet fibers are now treated with a stain-shedding process like that used on furniture fabrics. Spills bead up on the surface instead of penetrating. Result: easy care in any color.

In fact, light colors show less dirt of many kinds than darker colors. Dust and lint stand out more on deep colors than on light.



The team of Gerry and Gerald have won several prizes this year already in this type of contest.

The "over one hundred" is featured in Denver, Marfa, Texas; Phoenix and Magdalena, New Mexico. Gerald entered the Marfa roping and came home with the trophy. He was teamed up this time with a young fellow named Tom Jones.

The ages of Gerry and Gerald add up to just a little over one hundred.

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

Elk slayers fined

Almost \$1,800 in fines and civil damages have been assessed against four Santa Feans convicted of the unusual killing of a bull elk near Los Alamos, and the person whose information led to their being cited has \$250 from the Operation Game Thief reward fund.

Operation Game Thief coordinator Dan Pursley, Department of Game and Fish, said the four men were convicted last week by Los Alamos magistrate Otis Farmer on charges of illegally killing an elk May 13.

Gilbert Baca, 25, admitted being the one who actually shot the elk, according to Game and Fish reports. He was fined \$700 and given a five-day suspended jail sentence. Carlos Quintana, 24, and Joe Lujan, 22, were fined \$350 each. Tony Mendonca, 33, was fined \$50. The judge also assessed \$10 court costs against each defendant, and the Game and Fish Department has assessed civil damages of \$300 for the state's loss of the elk—a total \$1,790.

Los Alamos District Conservation Officer Lee Duff issued the citations and

was aided in the investigation by Santa Fe District Supervisor Ed Kinsey and Reserve Conservation Officer Charlie Warner, Los Alamos.

Duff said the men shot the elk with a .22 caliber rifle early in the morning of May 13, killing it instantly with one shot. The case is unusual in that a rifle of that caliber normally would only wound the animal, which might die later, Duff said. Apparently, the bullet struck the animal in the head or upper spinal cord.

Dear editor

I attended the town meeting June 26 at the Chaparral regarding outlaw groups and after listening to various people, have a few comments.

It was somewhat disheartening to see only one of our local elected officials take enough interest in the welfare of our community to attend. I personally feel all should have been at the meeting to better understand the community's feeling and acquire first-hand knowledge in order to better cope with the problem in the future.

As for some of the comments I heard, I can well understand everyone's concern, however, I feel that the proper way to deal with the situation is for everyone to pull together and not in opposite directions.

Because of our "Civil Rights Act of 1968", we can't do what we would like. But, there are ways to legally "Run Them Out" - by them, I mean ANY trouble-makers.

1. Be prepared to stand up for yourself. If any problem occurs, call the police. Once you call them, be prepared to sign a complaint. If you fear retaliation, work with other citizens to provide standby moral and physical help while you once again call the police. Be prepared to sign a complaint again and again. The police will respond to your calls and after a time, any potential troublemakers will get the message.

If they find that you will stand for your rights, all the fun of harrassment is gone and the troublemakers will go on. If all of us work together on this score, our problems will leave town. They cannot stand a concerted effort of townspeople.

2. Be prepared to help in an organized way.

I feel a meeting should be called with law enforcement people, and volunteers scheduled to help, by manning telephones, radios, etc.

There are some ex-law enforcement people here who could be of help in running radios, telephones, etc. This would provide much needed backup, and even free experienced officers in some cases for street duty.

I feel that an organized group can be of immense help with coordination of effort with the police. Things such as an organized CB patrol would provide added eyes and ears for law enforcement. It would also provide extra patrol for protection of businesses and homes.

This sort of effort could be set up on short notice and be very effective. In short, coordinated effort - not hysteria, is the answer. Our law enforcement agencies can and will help, but remember their hands are tied beyond a point. It requires all of our help and cooperation and willingness to stand up and be counted instead of throwing "hysterical" stones.

At that Monday night meeting, the people from the state offices were trying to explain what they could and would do, but unfortunately, not everyone understood what the state officials were saying.

It was stated that, at the time of the meeting, the state was not intending to call up the national guard or put the State Police Tactical Team on alert. However, and this is the point, John Ramming was trying to make sure the option was left open and conceivably, the state could and would change that plan in five minutes. The two weeks mentioned in the meeting was to set down a long range plan—not an immediate response plan.

One last comment—For those inclined to physically help the law enforcement people, join the Mounted Patrol. This is an arm of our State Police and can be of immense help in situations such as this. Anyone interested in joining can contact me or any other Mounted Patrol officer. But if you do want to join - be prepared to work at it and spend the time necessary to provide a viable arm to law enforcement.

If we learn from the past and apply these lessons instead of living in the past, all of us in concert can remedy our problems in a way that we can be proud of - not ashamed-after "the dust settles." John D. Cupp

NON-FREE ENTERPRISE

The veils inherent in operating an absolute monopoly ... involving such matters as price fixing because the buyer has but one source of a product ... has been substantiated in legal proceedings. Ergo, competition tends to make life simpler ... sometimes cheaper ... for the buyer ... and if one manufacturer markets a superior product ... the competition, not the public, suffers.

The antitrust judgment against Eastman Kodak Company, to the tune of \$87.1 million, including \$5.6 million in legal fees, in favor of Berkey Photo Incorporated ... signed by federal Judge Marvin E. Frankel in New York recently ... could have the poker players in the cartel game looking at their hole card.

It must be that Kodak's staff of product developers are vastly superior to those of its competitors ... 'cause the judge ruled that Berkey, and other competitors of Kodak, can buy Kodak's color photographic paper sans Kodak's identifying marks ... thus enabling suppliers of this type of paper to sell Kodak's product under their own label. Presumably, this would result in buyers getting a bargain ... 'cause Kodak's competition ... again, presumably ... wouldn't have manufacturing costs of their own product to contend with.

On the thumb hand side ... Kodak could discontinue marketing color photographic paper under their own label ... supply all of such paper to all competitors ... and enjoy greater profits under a monopolistic operation whereby they could sell all the paper they could produce without retail marketing costs.

Then there was the stipulation that Kodak ... beginning September 1 ... must disclose new product information disclosed to its own color print and processing division to Berkey and all other competitors. 'Tis possible, then, Kodak could become the sole source of new products ... which could make Kodak richer than their fondest dreams ... 'cause there'd be no competition.

Yup ... In the midst of such economic confusion in the United States ... it's small wonder that our peanut farmer fr...

Georgia is having his problems trying to bolster the value of the dollar abroad ... where peanut consumption might, in Our Jimmy's opinion, increase considerably ... and well he might be confused ... 'cause Kodak's operation ain't peanuts.

But ... cheer up you shutterbuggers ... under any name, if the brand's Kodak ... according to the judge's ruling ... you'll be getting the best ... not necessarily for less ... but the best nevertheless ... so let's hear it for the judge ... for Berkey ... and for non-free enterprise.

Merle Haggard will continue to hold onto his top of the ladder in country music. MCA has released his LP *I'm Always on a Mountain When I Fall*, which is of course the title of his current hit single.

The album also contains several cuts which could well become single hits, the best of which is probably *It's Been a Great Afternoon*. This track features the usual commercial style of Haggard but is also complimented by some fine lead guitar work and even greater dobro licks.

Haggard wrote the *'Afternoon'* track, plus such other tunes in the LP as *'Love Me When You Can,' 'The Dream'* and *'The Immigrant.'* The LP also contains the Haggard version of the Hank Cochran country standard *'Don't You Ever Get Tired of Hurtin' Me.'* plus the flip of the *'Mountain When I Fall'* single, which is the Jeannie Seely and Hank Cochran tune *'Life of a Rodeo Cowboy.'*

Haggard also shuffles

through his version of the current Johnny Cash/Waylon Jennings hit *'There Ain't No Good Chain Gang.'* Haggard's version is pleasing but doesn't come close to the Cash/Jennings rendition. Some fine piano backing and close harmony adds the right touch to another Haggard song on the album, *'The Dream.'*

Merle dips into one of our nation's current problems in *'The Immigrant,'* which tells the story and the problems of some of our illegal citizens.

Haggard finishes up this set of songs with *'Mama I've Got to Go to Memphis.'* This song was written by Leona Williams, the newest addition to the Haggard road show, and a country vocalist of merit on her own. This group of Haggard efforts was produced by Cochran and Fuzzy Owens and was recorded at Nashville's Fireside Studios.





