# Plan to deal with bikers forthcoming

A plan to deal with outlaw motorcyclists in the Ruidoso area will be unveiled to law enforcement officers within the next 10 days, Barbara Duff, president of the Service Club Council, said to The News Friday.

"The beauty of this plan," Duff said, "is that it will be completely within the law."


Duff said that John Ramming, assistant director, Governor's Council on Criminal Justice, Santa Fe, "will be meeting with Military Affairs Personnel, National Guard officials, Emergency Medical Operations officers, all intelligence departments of law enforcement and local law officers within the next ten days, to announce state plans for dealing with outlaw biker violators."

Advising Duff of this development Friday was Jerry Foster, special investigator with the office of Robert Doughty, District Attorney of Lincoln and Otero counties.

"As I understand it from Foster," Duff said, "organizations of all facets (of law enforcement agencies) will be able to move on a minute's notice anywhere in the state."

"We don't want another Questa here and it is comforting to know that our state officials have developed a plan to control the outlaw biker groups, should they decide to come to the Ruidoso area and flagrantly disobey the laws as the Bandidos, and members of other biker gangs, did here last year over the Labor Day holiday."

# Strate Miss wins The Kid Handicap

They gave Strate Miss some elbow room in the stretch and the gelding took advantage of the opening and squeezed through for a tingling head win in Sunday's 12th running of the Billy The Kid Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

Strate Miss got a daring but well judged ride from Leroy Coombs and collected \$6,535 out of the gross purse of \$10,875. The six-year-old gelding is owned and trained by Jimmy McClanahan of Berino.

The winning time for the seven furlongs was a crisp 1:26 2/5 seconds. Fans who made the winner a 2-1 shot in the five head field got back mutual returns of \$6.40, \$3.60 and \$3.

Bradley's Kunumera, ridden by Richard Bickel, was in the center of contention all the way but had to settle for a fist swinging second. The gelding earned \$2,396 and returned \$5 and \$3.20. Hesaru, the property of Ruth Sanders of El Paso, Texas, turned in a plucky performance as a 14-1 outsider.

Hesaru had his hat in the ring all the way, but finally cooked out in the stretch, finishing third. He reached the wire two lengths behind Hesaru. The show payoff was \$4 even.

The big surprise of the race — and the big disappointment — was Trail Driver, the even-money favorite. Fans who supported the gelding obviously counted on his

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# Indian Divide area major soil/water experiment site

A major soils experiment designed to correlate types of soils and supported vegetation to the moisture content of the soil is being conducted by members of New Mexico State University (NMSU) near the Indian Divide area west of Capitan.

Using a neutron probe which bombards varying strata of soil with neutrons, NMSU soil scientist Ted Zobeck said the findings of his experiment will aid soil conservationists by furnishing techniques for determining accurate soils surveys of a given area.

He says it is the only study of its kind funded by the United States Soil Conservation Service, (SCS) a division of the Department of Agriculture, and is being performed under a cooperative agreement with NMSU and the SCS.

With the help of Arcelious Stephens, NMSU Laboratory research assistant, Zobeck recently explained the theory behind his study.

"We're taking readings at various depths to find out the amount of water in

the soil within four feet of the surface," he said.

He explained that a radioactive probe is lowered into four foot core holes located within a controlled area. The probe bombards the soil at specific depths (up to four feet) with neutrons. He said the number of reflected neutrons, as registered on a sensing device, gives an accurate reading of the amount of water locked in the soil.

"Comparative readings of the atmosphere are taken later," Zobeck said, "this establishes the percentage of water in the soil."

Near the core hole area is another controlled area consisting of twin pits formed in the shape of a cross. From these pits Zobeck said he is able to arrive at the types of soils he is testing by studying the various strata, thus establishing a correlation between his moisture readings and soil types.

After the soil/moisture regime is established, Zobeck said he turns his attention to the types, concentration, size and health of vegetation located in the area. In the case of the Indian Divide

experiment, he said a timber count is conducted. From this information he hopes to be able to establish the potential timber yield of the area.

"At (that) particular site we will figure the expected cords per acre," he said, adding that a similar experiment is being conducted in the Carrizozo area establishing the yield of specific grasses per acre.

"I'll know the amount of moisture to expect for a type of vegetation for a similar soil," Zobeck said.

Zobeck indicated that the results of his experiment could have far reaching effects in the areas of range management, timber cultivation and other agricultural and ranching matters.

Zobeck said he finds the studies particularly interesting because they tie several disciplines together.

"I guess you could say soil ecology, botany, soil physics and geology all play roles in this study," he said.

As to the radioactive source used for determining the amount of water in soil, Zobeck said the probe does not have any environmental impact.

# PROJECT BIDS COULD BE LET IN SEPTEMBER SCS report delays dam

Further delays in the call for bids for construction of Eagle Creek Dam surfaced in Albuquerque Thursday afternoon, with the release of a thirteen page report on the plans and specifications compiled by the Soil Conservation Service (SCS), Portland, Oregon, and presented by officials of the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

"Meeting with Tom Mann Jr., Mann Engineering, Roswell, and myself," Ruidoso village manager Jim Hine said to The News Sunday, "were representatives of the SCS, FmHA, State Engineer, Corps of Engineers and United States Forest Service.

"All of the agency people pledged to do their best to get everything complete as to design, to meet the requirements of all agencies participating and/or involved, as soon as possible.

"Assuming no further delays develop, we are hopeful that we can go to the bid letting in September."

The SCS report, Hine said, "covered the whole project, line item by line item, requiring 13 pages."

Two major questions posed by the SCS was the use of borrow pits and the material from them for dam construction and the grouting method to be employed to seal the

dam. A Mann representative is to meet with SCS personnel in Portland within two weeks, Hine said. "Before then, Mann will forward soil reports, including core sample information, to SCS.

The revised cost estimate of the project, Hine said, "should be available within a week and Mann advises us that the figure will be within ten percent of the actual cost of construction."

Most of the SCS report concerned the specifications. "If 14 gauge steel is going to be used, the specifications are to state that," Hine said. "Though the dam plans

were not approved by SCS, it was mostly due to the lack of specifics in the field of specifications.

"FmHA officials, however, reiterated their position to assist in every way possible to get the dam completed.

"It is possible that SCS demands can all be satisfied by as early as August 3.

"Though this is a further setback in our plans, there was nothing coming out of the meeting in Albuquerque to indicate that once the details of construction satisfy SCS that we can't go to bid and even see some preliminary work at the site this fall."

# Rape crisis center funds sought

A report on efforts to fund a rape crisis center was given by Ken Moore, Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital administrator, during the Thursday afternoon Service Club Council meeting.

Over \$9,000 in funds will be requested from the State Planning Office to provide a Rape Crisis Intervention Center "as part of the Sexual Crimes Assistance Service funding in an effort to increase the conviction rate on rapists," he said.

The request for \$9,124 provides for a part time social worker, salary, supplies and travel.

In conjunction with the proposed center, Moore said patient advocacy would be provided and hospital staff and law enforcement officers would receive education, possibly through a seminar.

Also during the meeting, the council appointed John Cupp as chairman of an interest group composed of local residents concerned about potential traffic problems in Ruidoso.

The council initiated a campaign for installation of traffic control devices earlier this year, contacting the State Highway Commission requesting stoplights be installed at strategic intersections.

With the announcement traffic control devices will be installed at the intersections of Suddeith Drive and Cedar Creek Road and Mesalero Trail, the council commended the highway commission, but agreed additional lights may be needed.

Other traffic concerns were discussed, prompting appointment of Cupp, who requested all interested persons contact him at Cupp Clock Shop, 257-2966.

Other organizations and events the council discussed include:

— Mule-O-Rama Association, which will hold races October 6-8 and 13-15.

— Altusa Club's annual money making project, the Floricade, which will be held August 26.

— The proposed Careage Nursing Home, Aspenade and the CB'er's Club.

— \$5 was received from the Garden Club. The council hoped other civic groups also would donate.

— The professional Crafts Show, sponsored by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, July 28-30.

The next meeting of the council will be at 1 p.m., August 3 at Nob Hill Restaurant.



## Ruidoso School System faces \$750,000 lawsuit

A \$750,000 suit alleging negligence, and asking for punitive and exemplary damages, was filed July 10 in district court in Carrizozo against the Ruidoso School System in connection with an accident which saw a local young man sustain leg fractures of the tibia and fibula.

The suit filed by Imogene Jones, as friend and mother of Dayne (John) Hall, 17, alleges that on or about March 18, 1977 Hall broke his leg in connection with

school-related activities. The suit asks for \$500,000 for alleged negligence contending that physical education instructor Barry Nelson was negligent in providing proper supervision. The suit also asks for \$250,000 for alleged punitive and exemplary damages in connection with the accident and alleged negligence.

The suit says Hall jumped to shoot a basketball through a hoop and fell breaking his leg.

## Fort Stanton employees threaten to picket school

Employees at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School threaten to picket in the next few days in protest of a breakdown in negotiations on employee rights between the New Mexico Health Environmental Department (HED) and the Southwestern Council of Industrial Workers of the AFL-CIO.

"The vote (taken at a union meeting Wednesday evening) was to picket, but we'll give them four or five days to see if they want to get back to the negotiating table before we set up picket lines," Tommy Nevarez, spokesman for Local 2293, said.

"We don't really want to (picket)... We don't have the problems (under negotiation) at this hospital but what assurance do we have we won't have the problems if (administrator Mark) Delgado leaves."

Employee rights in question involve a point system for transfers and promotions, grievance procedures and a schedule from which the group contends eliminates overtime for

working on weekends. According to a spokesman at Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School, which is administered by the HED, formerly the state Department of Hospital and Institutes, said, "As far as I know, this is the first time public employees have picketed."

If the Fort Stanton employees draw up picket lines, they will be joining the Fort Bayard Medical Center and three units in Las Vegas already protesting.

The committee For Insuring Ruidoso's Environment (FIRE) will have a regular meeting at 4 p.m., Thursday in the multipurpose room of Ruidoso Public Library.

Tentative plans are to discuss evacuation routes from Ruidoso in the case of a forest fire.

# Pony Express to carry letters in August 5 race

The United States Postal Service (USPS) is reviving Pony Express mail delivery in Lincoln County — between White Oaks and Lincoln — August 5.

That's the date of the tenth annual Pony Express Race, with the 41 mile cross country and over the Capitan Mountains course designated by USPS as an official mail route — for the approximately two hours it takes for the winner to cross the finish line.

The riders will be carrying pouches of first class mail from White Oaks, to be delivered to the Lincoln postmaster. Last

year more than 2,000 Pony Express letters were delivered to the 50 states as well as 18 foreign countries, according to official postal records.

To have letters carried by Pony Express, postal patrons are to mail letters to: Pony Express, P.O. Box 217, Carrizozo, New Mexico 88301, or deliver them to the Carrizozo postmaster, by August 2.

For each letter there is a 50 cent handling fee, in addition to the 15 cents first class postage. The race committee will affix a two and one-half inch gold seal, designating the letter as official Pony Express mail, in the lower left hand corner

of each envelope. This annual race will be a highlight of Old Lincoln Days, August 4-6, featuring the local talent pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid."

The riders, following the annual outdoor old style ranch breakfast, leave White Oaks at 8 a.m., and reach Lincoln shortly after 10.

"Persons wanting to watch the end of this exciting race," committee member Betty Shrecengost said, "should arrive in Lincoln shortly after 9 that morning, because things get somewhat hectic around the finish line just before the winner gallops across it."

customary stretch wallop. But the field was well bunched up most of the way, and Trail Driver probably found himself closer to the lead than he would like to be. When jockey Charles Mueller called on Trail Driver to overpower the competition in the stretch, the sturdy gelding had nothing left to give — especially with tight traffic ahead of him. Trail Driver produced only a mild stretch threat and finished a dull fourth. Bradley's Kunumera, who likes to do his best running close to the front end, jumped into the early lead. Hesaru was right by his side, and Barrister Sib, a 4-1 shot taking a sharp hike in class, wasn't far behind. Bradley's Kunumera and Hesaru slugged it out in a punishing duel, and as the field straightened out for the stretch drive, it appeared one or the other would get the win. But Strate Miss sneaked up on the rail, and made up much ground on the final turn. The next question seemed to be whether Strate Miss could squeeze through such tight air space on the rail. Bradley's Kunumera, running his heart out so gamely, drifted out ever so slightly at the midway point of the stretch. That was all the signal Strate Miss needed. He picked up momentum, caught Bradley's Kunumera about a half dozen strides from the wire, and inched forward for that head victory.

**THE CO-FEATURE** spanned six furlongs and went to Ute, a 4-1 shot ridden by Saustio Burgos. Ute came on relentlessly in the second half of the race and hit the wire with nearly a three length lead. The chestnut gelding is owned by B. Raymond Evans of Tulsa, Texas. It was Ute's second straight allowance win. The win payoff was \$10 even. Another highpoint unfolded in the ninth race as the thoroughbred, Pierre True, reestablished himself among the top 870 yard performers on the grounds. He came through with a ringing half length win at that distance under the guidance of jockey Gary Sumpter. The win payoff was \$12.80.

**REAL EASY JET** smashed out a 1 3/4 length win Saturday at Ruidoso Downs and set the top qualifying time for the upcoming World's Championship Classic. The three-year-old, owned by Walter Merrick of Sayre, Oklahoma, quickly took charge in the third race and was well in command when he reached the final portions of the 440 yard dash. Real Easy Jet stopped the clock in a torrid 21.78 seconds. Gary Sumpter was up. The win payoff was a low \$3.40. The grand finale of the Classic comes up July 23, offering a gross purse of \$102,910. The winner will rake in \$51,455.

## CID seizes wanted man

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


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

**SANTA FE** — The prospects of a heated battle over higher taxes for some energy industries has spurred some early jockeying for the chairmanship of a powerful committee of the State Legislature.

Maneuvering for the chairmanship of the House Taxation and Revenue Committee is well under way even though the election of legislators still is four months away and the 1979 lawmaking session won't convene for six months.

It's one of the most important posts in the Legislature, since the chairman has substantial influence on all state-level taxation issues.

The Taxation and Revenue Committee chairmanship will be open next year because of the primary election defeat of Edward Lopez of Santa Fe County, a veteran and powerful House member closely aligned with House Speaker Walter Martinez of Grants.

If Martinez is re-elected in November and chosen as speaker once more by the House Democratic caucus, the taxation chairman will be the most important post he'll have to fill.

It's always a key position during any lawmaking session, dealing as it does with all taxation measures, but in 1979 it could assume even greater importance since there's persistent off-the-record talk in the capitol about a move next year toward higher severance taxes.

Severance taxes are levied by the state against various resources "severed" from the earth — oil and gas, coal, uranium, timber and the like.

Since New Mexico is a leading energy-producing state still in the midst of rapid development, higher taxes for

minerals and resources are likely to be the subject of various bills introduced in January.

In particular, coal and uranium are mentioned as prospective tax targets since they are fast-growing industries, but any efforts along that line are sure to provoke intensive opposition from industry — especially since taxes on the two were raised during the 1977 session.

According to the Department of Finance and administration, direct state taxes on coal are 9.91 percent and on uranium are 4.51 percent. Coal companies pay 3.9 percent for the severance tax, the 4 percent gross receipts tax and the rest in smaller taxes. Uranium companies pay 3 percent severance tax, a number of fractional taxes, but no gross receipts tax.

In 1977, according to state figures, the oil and gas industry paid \$53.9 million in state severance taxes. Uranium paid \$80,363 and coal paid \$366,565. Estimates are that the 1978 fiscal year, just ended, will see increases to \$72.1 million for oil and gas, \$9.5 million for uranium and \$4.1 million for coal.

With the same tax rates in effect, state estimates are that the 1982 fiscal year would see \$82 million from oil and gas, \$20.4 million from uranium and \$8.8 million from coal.

Lopez, the outgoing tax chairman in the House, was asked about prospects of new tax bills being introduced and replied: "Anything's possible. Nothing specific has been brought to my attention. But if somebody thinks it's popular, they might throw in a bill. I wouldn't put it past anybody to throw something in. (But) I don't think they've had enough experience with the present bill. I think it'll generate more than expected."

### SALE BALANCES TRADE

Despite Jimmy Carter's inveighing against this country's role as arms merchant abroad during his presidential campaign, the sales of weaponry to United States allies is increasing and has become a major factor in our exports and trade balances.

The administration is beating a hot path to the Senate these days with proposals for fighter plane sales. May 18, the very next day after the Senate upheld the President's proposal to sell warplanes to Egypt and Saudi Arabia as well as to Israel, the Pentagon formally notified Congress of plans to sell Japan 100 F-15 fighters and 45 P-3C submarine-hunting planes for \$2.2 billion—the biggest arms sale to Japan in history.

Congress has 30 days in which to disapprove the sales by majority vote in both chambers. Disapproval is hardly likely. Indeed, in contrast to the boiling controversy that attended the Mideast plane package sale, no hint of opposition has been reported on the questions of delivering far larger numbers of planes to Japan.

This is not surprising. The Pentagon's justification statement argues the case effectively: The new planes would give Japan "improved defensive capability... and would contribute toward continued stability in the Western Pacific." Moreover, the sale would represent a hefty reduction in the chronic United States trade imbalance with Japan that is running about \$8 billion annually. California Congressman Bob Wilson has pointed out the Japanese would rather buy their defense needs from us than build them at home or cut sales of their products to this country. Both of these considerations

would appear to coincide with American interests.

United States withdrawal from Southeast Asia, and most especially, the phased withdrawal of 30,000 ground troops from South Korea, have alarmed the Japanese about their almost total reliance on American military protection. This, in turn, has led to some renewed soul searching about security, a prolonged national debate, and the decision to modernize defense forces that are restricted to about 200,000 air, naval and ground troops under the 1961 security treaty with the United States. Accordingly Japan decided earlier this year to increase its defense budget by 12.4 percent to \$87.5 billion. A considerable body of opinion in Japan, the United States and among the NATO nations believes the time has come for Japan to share more of the burden of its own self-defense.

Aside from the economic considerations and Japan's concern to modernize its weaponry, very respectable reservations can be held against going too far, too fast. Memories of Japanese aggression in the Western Pacific areas are still too fresh to permit the United States or Japan to remove restraints on acquiring military power — especially the nuclear option. The reassuring fact is that the Japanese also remember the catastrophic consequences of their wars and have shown real reluctance to rearm.

We could all wish that we inhabited a planet where the sale of arms to strengthen allies would not be necessary. But we know that such is not the case. A nation with a gross national product second only to the United States among the industrial democracies is too tempting a prize to be without modern defenses in a lawless world. —News-Bulletin, Beles-
