## Real Easy Jet Classic favorite

Real Easy Jet, owned and trained by Walter Merrick of Sayre, Oklahoma, looms as the betting favorite in Sunday's renewal of the World's Championship Classic at Ruidoso Downs.

The 440 yard powerburst for three-year-olds and up carries a gross purse of \$102,910 and hands the winner \$51,455.

Real Easy Jet — a colt who has never really fulfilled all of his early promise — looks ready this time. He'll go into Sunday's showdown with the top qualifying time of 21.78 seconds.

In last week's trials, the colt got out of the gate like a cannon shot and led all the way for an extremely impressive 1 3/4 length score. The win was his fourth straight.

July 2, Real Easy Jet, operating as a 7-5 shot, turned in one of the best performances of his career when he turned on crunching power and pulled out a head victory in the consolation of the rich Rainbow Derby. The victory slice came

out to over \$17,000 and pushed his 1978 money line up to nearly \$34,000.

Before that, Real Easy Jet won by nearly a length in the Rainbow Derby trials. June 8, he scampered in a clear-cut winner as a heavy favorite in an allowance dash.

Real Easy Jet holds a 1978 record of 4-1 from six starts. Last year, he belted out eight wins and four seconds from 14 starts and collected close to \$100,000. He was unable to score in one of the Triple Crown races at Ruidoso, but a trip to La Mesa Park produced a 2 1/2 length victory in the Oklahoma Futurity.

That Oklahoma victory, so far, is Real Easy Jet's only stakes victory, since consolation wins are not recognized as stakes victories by the American Quarter

Horse Association.

Gary Sumpter, Real Easy Jet's regular pilot, will be back in the saddle Sunday. The colt, sporting such impressive current form, will most likely get away as a slight favorite against such awesome fast guns as Miss Thermolark, Jun Jun Ni and the All-American Futurity winner of 1977, Hot Idea.

Here's a complete look at the field, in order of qualifying times: Real Easy Jet, 21.78; Miss Thermolark, 21.82 1/2; Jun Jun Ni, 21.89 1/2; Hot Idea, 21.93; Go Go Cookie, 21.94; Perfect View, 21.98; Frosty's Azurette, 21.98 1/2; High Set, 22.01; Lillie Bug, 22.01; Jet Rockette, 22.05.

Miss Thermolark, who recently bagged over \$81,000 for her second in the lucrative

Rainbow Derby, came through with flying colors in the Classic trials. The filly boomed in with 1 1/2 lengths of daylight as an odds-on favorite. Last summer, the filly made her mark with a win in the Rainbow Futurity.

Jun Jun Ni, the fourth place finisher in last year's All-American Futurity, got revenge to a certain degree in the trials. The colt took on the All-American winner, Hot Idea, and put her away by a neck with a powerful attack.

For Hot Idea, the setback was the first of her career. She's been to the races only six times so far. Nonetheless, the fans will most likely be impressed by her money line of some \$340,000, so she can be expected to be well supported in the mutuels.

## Jim Smith benefit race Saturday

Saturday's first race at Ruidoso Downs Racetrack will be a benefit for the family of jockey and exercise rider Jim Smith, who died last week in a three horse accident.

Jockeys will donate their riding fees for the race to a trust fund for Smith's child, track spokesman Dick Alwan said.

Dr. Ronald Knief, professor of nuclear engineering at the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque, will discuss energy problems at 7 p.m., August 4 at the Otero County Electric Co-Op, Alto office, off Highway 37.

At the public presentation, Knief will detail the need for alternate sources to the traditional methods of generating electricity through the use of an energy-environment simulator.

The simulator illustrates the supply and demand picture inherent in energy usage depending on known reserves of coal, oil, uranium, hydro and new technology. It also takes into account usage of energy in such fields as agriculture, manufacturing and domestic.

Although the simulator is not designed to provide answers to the energy crisis, "It does, however, make you think. It shows

there are no answers," Knief said.

During the August presentation the audience will crank information on their own proposals for solving the energy crunch into the simulator.

Examples of questions on which the

simulator can comment are Should nuclear development be encouraged? Solar? Wind? What energy sources should be developed to make up the difference

## Downs man charged in stabbing

William D. Argullo, Ruidoso, is in Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital recovering from a stab wound suffered about 12:30 a.m., July 15, inflicted, Criminal Investigation Division (CID) officers of the Ruidoso Police Department charge, by Richard Lopez, Ruidoso Downs.

A CID spokesman said Argullo "was stabbed in the stomach with a five inch

blade that narrowly missed his spleen." Lopez appeared Monday before Magistrate Jim Wheeler, Ruidoso, on CID charges of aggravated battery with a deadly weapon, a third degree felony. Lopez was freed under a \$10,000 property bond posted Tuesday, pending further action. The charge carries a possible penalty of two to ten years in the state penitentiary.

## Chamber girds for crafts show here July 28 to 30

Several directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce volunteered to assist with the July 28-30 Professional Craft Show after a progress report from committee chairman John West at the board's luncheon meeting Wednesday.

Also, in other business at the meeting, the board of directors heard a report on Ruidoso Ski and Recreation Area from developer Ralph Rush and voted to reorganize the board executive officers, electing four vice presidents with specialized duties.

During West's progress report on the craft show, he requested the board provide manpower and assistance in planning the final aspects of the show to be held in the Chaparral Convention Center.

Bill Morrison, president of the Ambassadors, an auxiliary to the Chamber, volunteered the assistance of his group with traffic control during the three day show and to coordinate the artists' unloading and setting up.

Director Sunny Hirschfeld volunteered to arrange a schedule of Chamber members

to man to Chamber information booth at the show and director Jim French volunteered to check into construction of signs.

Benny Coulston will request the Ruidoso Downs Police Department to increase patrolling of Convention Center during the show. He also will discuss hiring a police officer for security during the show and talk with the New Mexico Mounted Patrol.

Assigned to assist with coordination of construction of booths and locating a trailer, truck and helper for hauling

decorations was director Bill Fugate.

West told the board posters advertising the show had been posted throughout the town and releases on the show had been sent to 70 newspapers in four states.

He also said each of the 95 artists participating in the show had been contacted by a Ruidoso resident offering to locate lodging, camping space or anything the artist might need assistance with.

In other business Wednesday, the board revised the by laws instituting a six-man executive board, "in an effort to expedite

matters," president Dave Wilson said.

As a result of the revision, four vice presidents were elected with Eddie Parker, vice president of management and operations; Marchand "Mac" McDougal, vice president for economic development; Alden Deyo, vice president for community development, and Benny Coulston, vice president for advertising and promotion.

The board also voted to form an executive committee of the president, vice presidents and the executive secretary,

which the board hopes to hire in September.

The board voted to advertise for a new director or executive secretary through July, screen applications by August 5 and then schedule interviews.

Also during the meeting, a report from Ralph Rush, one of the developers of Ruidoso Ski and Recreation Area was presented at the request of director Dave Wilson.

## Old Lincoln Days action August 4-6

Old Lincoln Days action — from the colorful pageant, "The Last Escape of Billy the Kid," to the Pony Express Race — is set to unfold August 4, 5 and 6.

The pageant deals with events sparking the Lincoln County War — which raged for several months exactly 100 years ago — and the part Billy the Kid played in that war, as well as his dramatic escape from the Lincoln County Jail where he was being held on murder charges.

This year's pageant cast has been named by director Nancy J. Bruner and will feature William Shrecengost Jr., Lincoln, as The Kid with Dave Parks, Ruidoso, as narrator.

"The remaining cast," Bruner said, "will again feature 40 characters from Lincoln County."

Rehearsals for the production will begin the evening of July 28.

Assisting Bruner with the pageant will be Tom and Sandy Taylor, Ruidoso, production advisors; Jan Scarbrough, Las Cruces, production manager; Cathy Culppepper, Las Cruces, stage manager; with Gary and Dee Miller, Mickey Thomas, Rafaelita Pryor and Joe Williams, all of Lincoln, as the business staff.

Evening performances, on the pageant grounds adjacent to the historic Lincoln County Courthouse, will be at 8:30 August 4 and 5; with a matinee at 3 p.m., Sunday. Admission will be \$1.50 for children under 12 and \$2 for adults.

A highlight of the three days of festivities is the 41 mile White Oaks to Lincoln Pony Express Race, with \$1,000-added purse, with the riders carrying pouches of first class mail to be delivered to the postmaster at Lincoln.

Four contestants have signed up for event, race chairman Betty Shrecengost

said Tuesday, "and we'll be accepting entries through July 28."

Entry fees for the race are \$50 a team, one rider or two. Late entries, if accepted, will be \$100.

"The team must have a string of four horses — no mules allowed," Shrecengost said, "with each horse having to run from eight to 13 miles through the Capitan Mountains.

"Conditioning is advised. Riders should take the 7,400 foot altitude that shorts you on oxygen for a hard run, into consideration and begin conditioning their horses now.

"The first leg of the race is 9.7 miles, the second is 10, the third 8.3 and the last segment is a punishing 13 miles.

"This year the final leg will be run on a dirt road along the Bonito River, ending in the field north of the courthouse. The horses will not go along Highway 380 as they have in the past."

Persons desiring to have letters, bearing the official Pony Express Seal, are to take them to the postmaster at Carrizozo, or mail them to: Pony Express, Box 217, Carrizozo, New Mexico 88301. Each letter to be carried in the race must have 15 cents postage attached and there is a charge of 50 cents, additional, per letter covering the seal and special handling.

"By taking in the 6:30 a.m., old style ranch breakfast at White Oaks August 5," Shrecengost said, "race fans can catch the pistol-shot start at 8 a.m., and have plenty of time to drive to Lincoln to watch the winner cross the finish line, shortly after 10."

Other activities scheduled at Lincoln include the Artisans of Old Lincoln Town-Arts and Crafts Show 9 a.m.-6 p.m., August 5 and 6 and the annual Lincoln Days Parade at 1:30 the afternoon of the sixth.

## Flood control measures on tap for Ruidoso and Hondo rivers

An application has been made for a study to establish the financial feasibility of constructing a series of dams and debris catch basins on the Ruidoso and Hondo Rivers in order to stem the potential danger of flood.

Submitted by the Upper Hondo Soil and Water Conservation District to the Department of Agriculture, the application will be one of a huge backlog currently being considered nation wide, according to the district conservationist for the Ruidoso area.

Greg Haussler, soil and water conservationist for the Department of Agriculture, said that if a study is conducted, it will be to see if a favorable cost/benefit ratio is present.

He said he believes there is adequate benefits to be had by the initiation of such a project.

"If a flood of the magnitude of 1941 occurred today," Haussler said, "there would be a loss of life and massive destruction of homes and businesses.

However, he added the cost of the project would have to be offset by the value of the property which could potentially be saved.

He said the Ruidoso water shed was turned down for such a project in 1954. At the same time the Bonito Valley, which consists of valuable farmland was selected for a pilot project under Public Law 566 (1954).

Haussler said then the Bonito farmland was more valuable than the cost of the project. He added that if a reevaluation of the Ruidoso valley becomes a reality, the cost of the project will be weighed against the current development in the Ruidoso valley.

Many old timers in Lincoln County agree that such a water shed protection plan is needed.

A.T. "Bert" Pfingston, member of the Soil and Conservation District (SCS) board of supervisors since the organization was established in 1941, said he has seen several floods that, if they occurred today, would destroy the Upper Hondo and Ruidoso valleys.

"If you thought (the floods of 1965 and 1941) were bad," Pfingston said, "You should have seen the flood in 1937."

He added that the 1965 flood was the result of a 20 year storm which has a four percent chance of occurrence in any given year. He also said the 1941 flood was the result of a 100 year storm, which has a one percent chance of occurrence in any given year.

Long time Lincoln County rancher Ernest McDaniels, also a member of the SCS district, agreed with Pfingston, and

said the areas that would be hardest hit in the event of a flood in the upper valley would be Cherokee Bill Canyon and the Ruidoso and Hondo River water course.

Haussler recently toured the Bonito Valley and pointed out to The News what was done to protect the valley against flood and what could be done to protect the Ruidoso water shed.

He said the biggest line of defense against flood damage in the Bonito Valley consists of the Salado Dam located between Lincoln and Capitan on the Bonito

River.

He said the dam was completed in 1960. "Since that time there has been no destructive flood on the Bonito water shed," Haussler said.

"The purpose of the dam is not to hold water but to slow water down and allow it to run at a controlled rate," Haussler said.


He said the dam was built to handle a 100 year flood.

Rush told the board there was a need for an additional ski-area in Ruidoso because in past years "skiers have been turned away at Sierra Blanca Ski Area and because Ruidoso has lost business because people won't go up the road in bad weather.

"Another ski area will bring more business to Ruidoso, not take away business (from Sierra Blanca Ski Area)," Rush said.

Already available at the area are a restaurant, bob sled track and day care center, and the lifts and snow making equipment should be working by Sep-

tember 30. "We are hoping for a good happy atmosphere for family enjoyment," he said in outlining future plans. Ruidoso Ski and Recreation Area will be feasible at its low altitude location because of past studies of snow conditions and temperature. "The area had 80 inches of snow last year which is more than adequate for a ski area... and studies of temperatures the last three years show temperatures are low enough to make snow by November 1. We also have (extensive) water rights." Rush told the group man made snow is like natural snow, except it weighs 20 pounds per square foot and natural snow weighs five pounds per square foot, which forms a better base for skiing. He solicited suggestions and comments

from the board and general membership of the Chamber. In other business Wednesday, the board: — Heard a financial report from Eddie Parker. Last month the Chamber had \$824.19 excess disbursements over receipts and a cash balance at the end of the month of \$1,009.35. During the month the Chamber paid a \$1,800 debt to Ray Heid. — Selected Rod Adamson to fill a vacancy on the board. — Heard a report 27 tickets to the August Cadillac Party were available. — Accepted the resignation of office employee Judy Parnell who will be moving to Roswell. — Were told the list of motels will be revised in answer to complaints received.

## Hopeful Journey's speed Friday's feature to test

Hopeful Journey, the fast-breaking filly who holds her own against the toughest sophomore competition in the Southwest, figures to be dealing a strong hand in Friday's headliner at Ruidoso Downs. The affair, restricted to distaff three-year-olds, will cover 5 1/2 furlongs. The purse is \$3,700. Weekend turf action in the cool pines continues on Saturday with the Zia Stakes taking center stage. The 400 yard duel for home bred three-year-olds packs an added purse of \$6,500. Sunday, it's the World's Championship Classic at 440 yards. Such glittering stars as Hot Idea, Real Easy Jet, Miss Thermolark and Jun Jun Ni will battle over a winner's purse of \$51,455. The gross purse is \$102,910. First post through Saturday is 1:30 p.m. A 1 p.m. starting time is in effect Sunday. In Friday's feature, they'll line up this way: 1 — Hopeful Journey, 117; 2 — Constant, 117; 3 — Ice Lass, 115; 4 — Asian Lady, 117; 5 — Beguiling Kris, 115; 6 — Me Francis, 114; 7 — Make It Me, 120; 8 — Proud Clarionette, 117. Hopeful Journey will have Carlos Rivas calling the signals, and will break from the

rail slot. Equipped as she is with burning speed, the inside post figures to work to her advantage. Hopeful Journey made her last start in the Peter Hurd Handicap at six furlongs, got away at almost 9-1, and wasted no time taking control. The filly was able to sustain her speed until mid-stretch, but then got swallowed up in the pack, and faded to fourth behind such standouts as The Drake and One Bold Scout. Before that, Hopeful Journey tried the Rio Grande Stakes at 6 1/2 furlongs, and it was the same story. She carved a rapid early pace, but was unable to hang on in the stretch and slumped to fourth. June 11, she was more tenacious in the stretch, and came in second in the Aspen Stakes at six furlongs. She was only a half length off the pace. In early June, the filly soundly trounced an allowance field at 5 1/2 furlongs. She led all the way and won by 3 1/2 lengths. Make It Me, who'll have Gilbert Villescas aboard, could be a prime darkhorse. The filly operated as a 27-1 longshot in the Peter Hurd Handicap, and was well out of the picture in the early

going. But she closed with a big rush to take third. The nominees for the Zia Stakes include Junes Feature, Guero, Val Nero, Madam President, El Angel, Mr. Diamond Straw, Island Princess, Flying Rocket Jet, Dr. Zarges and Chilla Dial. **Energy problems** [FROM PAGE ONE] when known reserves of oil which should last 25 years are gone? 

The large earthen structure has one tower spill way which allows water to run beneath the structure and on through its natural course at a controlled rate. Haussler pointed out about 25 feet of debris that accumulated around the spillway since it was built in the latter '50s. He said that debris otherwise would have washed into the Hondo Valley where State Road 380 joins U.S. 70. Haussler said the dam works in conjunction with a series of small debris catch basins which effectively performs the same function on a smaller scale. Also he said the 1957 project included the construction of a series of stream revetments which consist of pile driven posts and cyclone fencing installed where a stream bends. He explained the fencing is designed to catch debris running in the stream forming a small debris check. He says the accumulated debris is supposed to save a stream bank from becoming undermined by the current. Haussler indicated that the Ruidoso water shed currently has several revetments installed. He said one of the biggest problems facing construction of a flood control project is the acquisition of land rights. "Often a farmer or rancher is reluctant to allow the construction of a dam on his property," he said. The problem is greater where a dam must be constructed near developed land or where a water well may be endangered because of the possibility of the formation of a pond behind the dam during a storm. He said, however, that the Bonito water shed project encountered few such difficulties.

## Civilian pilot fly-in planned at Holloman

Tactical Training Holloman (TTH) is planning a fly-in August 19 for general aviation pilots. The purpose of the fly-in is to acquaint civilian pilots with flying operations at Holloman AFB and thereby enhance flying safety for all concerned. The base will be open for arrivals at 9 a.m., and will be closed to all military aircraft during the fly-in. To land at Holloman AFB, pilots must fill out Air Force Form 180, Hold Harmless Agreement, in duplicate. One copy is sent to 49TFW/DOO, Holloman AFB, N M 88330 and the duplicate should be carried aboard

the aircraft. Pilots should indicate the number of persons that will attend on the back of Form 180. Also required if you fly is proof of third party liability insurance. This can be done by filling out AF Form 203, or by sending a copy of your policy to the 49TFW/DOO. Both form 180 and 203 can be obtained by calling Capt. Darrell Smith at 506-479-6511 ext 4115. Aviation gas and oil will be available at Holloman from a local contractor. It is not necessary to fly in to participate. If you plan to drive to Holloman, just return one copy of the Form 180 indicating the number of persons that will attend.

### Social Security information

"People nearing 65 who are not already receiving social security benefits should contact the nearest social security office or representative 2 or 3 months before their birthday," Gordon Lunstford, social security field representative, said today. "These people should do so in order to be sure that they have full Medicare protection the month they reach 65. This is true even though they have no retirement plans. "People not already getting monthly benefits have a limited time to act to be sure their full Medicare protection begins at 65. If they don't act within the 3 month period before the month they reach 65, their Medicare medical insurance protection can be delayed from 1 to 3 months. Medical insurance may be delayed for a year or more if a person fails to act within the 3 months after their 65th birthday month, and the monthly premium may be increased. "People should have certain evidence available when they contact the office. This includes their social security card or a record of the number; proof of age, preferably a birth or baptism record made shortly after birth; and a W-2 (Wage and Tax Statement) or self-employment tax return for the previous year."





## Ruidosoan owns McSween piano





THIS FRAGILE DRESS of imported lace and organdy is over 100 years old.




THE McSWEENS OF LINCOLN County War days imported this piano from Germany and had it transported by wagon to Lincoln. (News photos by Mary Wormley)

# Capitan 4-H Club earns community pride grant

Historical research, landscaping and community building projects were some of the 4-H projects dividing \$1,940 in grants recently awarded in nine counties. The grants, supplied by Chevron, USA, were awarded by the state 4-H Community Pride Committee based on proposals developed by the 4-H'ers.

Probably one of the most unusual projects this year is a comprehensive historical effort in Lincoln County. The Capitan 4-H club will use its \$300 grant on a \$845 project to construct new grave markers for the cemeteries in the town of Lincoln. The 4-H'ers will also search through historical documents and tape interviews with area citizens to learn about the people buried in presently unmarked graves. The project leaders are Martha Proctor, Lincoln, and Harvey Martin, Capitan.

A comprehensive citizenship education program in Otero County received a \$300 grant. The money will cover part of the travel expenses of 15 4-H'ers who visited the state capital. The leaders for the project are Bonnie Frazier, Betty Bialock

and Teresa Boles, all of Alamogordo. Building projects were supported with grants in Los Alamos, Rio Arriba, Roosevelt, Catron and Taos counties.

In Los Alamos County, the Senior 4-H Club will join other community groups in an extensive remodeling of the county fair building. The \$125 grant will pay part of the \$924 project. Dan Polzer, White Rock, is the youth leader.

The fairgrounds in Rio Arriba County are also due for a face lifting, thanks to the \$150 grant awarded to the Espanola Valley 4-H clubs. The main focus of the work will be repairing bleachers which have been donated to the fairgrounds. The project leaders are Joan Brock and Marie Millsap, both of Espanola, and Karen Hutchinson and Bryan Hutchinson, both of Hernandez.

In Roosevelt County, the Valley 4-H Club is planning to convert old barracks into additional fair buildings for Extension and other community groups. The project will involve extensive landscaping. Mrs. Wayne Baker and Mrs. Walter Chambliss are adult leaders, while the youth leaders

are Laura Baker, Gary Smith and Stanley Jones, all of Portales.

An old church in Apache Creek will soon become a community center for art classes, senior citizens and 4-H'ers in Catron County. The \$150 grant will help buy caulking and doors for the \$500 project. The project leaders are Coby Bartram and Mrs. Alan Robinson, both of Apache Creek.

A \$2,093 multi-purpose recreation court will receive an extra boost from a \$225 grant awarded to the Greenleaf Clover 4-H Club in Santa Fe County. The gravel court will be built behind the Vadito school. The leaders of the project, Mrs. Corina Duran and Wilfred Gallegos, are both of Vadito.

Landscaping projects were also quite popular this year. The Jo-Gi-Ro 4-H Club of Rio Arriba County plans to develop a Memorial Rose Garden at the Espanola Hospital. The geriatrics patients who are physically able will also help on the \$1,000 project. Supervision of the \$175 grant will come from Joan Brock and Carlos Valdez, both of Espanola.

A similar project is under way in Los Lunas. The Tome Adelino 4-H club will set plants around the entrance and lobby of the Eastern Valencia Hospital.

In addition, the 4-H'ers will form a volunteer group to wheel patients to X-ray, deliver mail and help in the kitchen. Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Larson, John Romo and John Larson, all of Los Lunas, are the project leaders.

Finally, the historical Bandelier Garden of El Zagan is due for a rejuvenation by the Lucky Clover 4-H Club of Santa Fe. The club feels that El Zagan is an important historical building noted for its beautiful garden. The leaders for the project are Ana Maria Ortiz, Bryon Platt and Mrs. Betty Platt, all of Santa Fe.

## News from the County Agent

An estimated crop of 65,000 boxes of apples is expected to be harvested in Lincoln County. The production varies from tree to tree and especially from orchard to orchard. Some trees have very few apples and others are loaded. A few areas in the county have had hail. The hail damage on the apple does not affect the eating quality but does affect the storage life. Do not plan on storing apples with hail damage for the winter but eat them fresh.

Apple harvest will start about the first of August and continue into October. The first apples to appear on the market will be transparent, Lodi and other summer varieties. The fall apples will start coming off the trees in late August. Some of these varieties include Jonathan, Red Delicious and Golden Delicious. The winter apples start in late September and continue until frost. Some of these varieties are Stamen Winesap and Rome Beauty.

The Lincoln County Fair Books are available at the Lincoln County Extension Office. The fair book is smaller so that it can be carried in a pocket and features the most popular picture of the 1977 Lincoln County Fair Art Show. It was done by Phil Keller of Fort Stanton.

The fair starts August 23 with entries in all departments (except livestock) from 4:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. Entries in these departments will close at noon August 24. Livestock entries will be accepted from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m., August 24. Weighing and classifying of livestock will start at 4:00 p.m., August 24.

The judging will start at 2:00 p.m., the 24th for the Open Home Economics, Flower Show, Art How, Horticulture and 4-H projects except livestock. Livestock judging will start at 9:00 a.m., August 25.

August 28 fair events will be highlighted by the Junior Livestock Sale which starts at 10:00 a.m. Other events include a Pet Show, Special Sheep Lead Class and Cake Sale.

There are many changes in the Lincoln County Fair this year so be sure to read the fair book for these changes.

**Blossom End Rot:** If tomatoes are not irrigated frequently during hot weather they can get a disorder called blossom end rot. A dark, leathery spot is characteristic of the disease. Watermelons and squash are also affected. Blossom end rot can be avoided by giving your plants an even and adequate water supply.

More information on blossom end rot and other plant disorders is available from the County Extension Office in the Courthouse in Carrizozo or phone 648-2471.

Don't let your pet get ticked off. Although most ticks cause more distress to pet owners than to the pets, they can sometimes cause your pet to get sick,

depending on the tick. Pet owners living in or near mountains and wooded areas should be especially careful. Ticks in these areas can release a nerve toxin which could cause paralysis.

Ear ticks usually go deep inside your pet's ear and can cause quite a bit of pain. On the other hand, the brown dog tick and the fowl tick may stay on your pet's ear flaps or skin. They often go almost unnoticed by the pet.

If your pet is hosting a crop of ticks, the easiest solution is to simply pull the ticks off with tweezers. While you may not be able to see the tick's head, it will probably come out of the animal's skin when you remove the insect. If your pet has a large number of ticks, hand removal can be time consuming and may result in skin irritation or infection.



# Yours and Ours

**SANTA FE**—An interim committee of the State Legislature which deals with health and aging issues plans to concentrate much of its attention this year on the problems of providing adequate health care in New Mexico's rural areas.

Rural health care needs were the subject of the first full-scale meeting this summer of the Health and Aging Committee, headed by Rep. Nick Salazar, a Democrat from San Juan Pueblo.

Health experts from various institutions outlined their ideas on problems faced by rural areas and potential solutions.

There's a need, said one state official in an interview, "to get and keep proper medical services in rural areas."

But few physicians have been willing to settle in more remote regions when they can make substantially more income, and perhaps engage in specialization of interest to them, in larger cities.

Much of the relief for health care-short rural areas, therefore, apparently must come from "para-professionals" like physician's assistants and family nurse practitioners, "if they're willing to go out there (to remote areas) and stay out there," said one official.

State officials also will be considering new Federal regulations being proposed by Washington under terms of the Rural Health Clinic Services Act passed by Congress and signed by President Carter in 1977.

The new rules, having application to rural health services, are being offered for state comment by the Health Care Financing Administration of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The proposed rules would emphasize the role of rural clinics by requiring states to reimburse clinics themselves, which in turn would compensate doctors for services rendered to Medicaid patients.

The rules, said one Washington-based association, are designed "to minimize abuse of the system and to make association with a clinic more attractive to physicians."

A measure of the Health and Aging Committee's determination to concentrate on rural health issues is demonstrated by its proposed work plan for the 1978 interim. Among the top priorities were these:

— An examination of "the maldistribution of medical doctors in the state and possible recommendations for redistribution."

— The "need for increased support of rural clinics."

— "Review the difference in Medicaid reimbursement levels between urban and rural physicians."

— "An examination of the need for more 'physician extenders' (family nurse practitioners and physician assistants)."

Meanwhile, a New Mexico man has moved into a key position in the Carter Administration.

He is Richard Heim, selected by HEW Secretary Joseph Califano to head the important and complex national Medicaid program. Heim, formerly director of the State Health and Social Services Department, will oversee some \$18 billion a year in Federal expenditures for the medical services program for the poor.

It's the second time around in the nation's capital for Heim, who began his political career in Bernalillo County government and later served as an executive for the City of Albuquerque.

Heim was administrative assistant to the late United States Senator Clinton P. Anderson, D-N.M., and dealt with health care issues handled by Anderson on the Senate Finance Committee. From Anderson's staff he returned to New Mexico to head HSSD.

### RECALL 'FIXUPS'

The concept of requiring that cars with potential safety defects be recalled and fixed is sound. In practice, the system has a serious flaw. Months may pass before all the recalled vehicles have been repaired, and during that period the hazard continues to exist for many of them.

This was dramatically, and perhaps only by good luck not fatally, illustrated the other day in Phoenix, Arizona. The car involved was one of the Ford Pintos recalled to have their fuel tanks protected against bursting into flame in a rear-end collision.

The young couple that owned the car reportedly had been told by the dealer that it could not be fixed until September, and advised to drive it "as little as possible." The very next day, according to a news story, the Pinto was rammed from the rear and caught fire; the woman driving it said later, "When I climbed out I could feel the heat from the flames rushing under my feet."

The burned out hulk of the car is in the couple's yard, now, bearing a sign that reads: "Death Trap. Doubtless the manufacturer would consider that unfair. Yet the near tragedy did happen, just as critics of the fuel system of these Pinto models have predicted.

Meanwhile, other such cars are still on the road. It appears that a couple of months will pass before they all have been refitted to safeguard them against fire. It is possible that in the interim others will be rear-ended and burned. The Department of Transportation should work with industry to devise a faster system for correcting faults on recalled cars. — Alamogordo Daily News.

### NO HELP, PLEASE

We believe in giving the elected officials every opportunity to make their programs work. With Mr. Carter we have trouble being patient. His messing with the cattle market has not helped one bit.

Either Mr. Carter was just playing politics in 1976 or he is playing politics now. Whichever way it is, he is definitely interfering in the free market place and in the end the public will be the loser.

We like good beef and wish that it could be produced at low cost. We do know that if it can't be produced for a profit it will not be produced. — The Chandler Arizona.

## Rag merchant brothers hit winner in Biffy Pass

Take the following diverse components: a chain of used clothing stores, the conversion of old cloth into wiping rags, the exporting of used clothes into Mexico, a staff of about 250 employees, the thoroughbred stallion Insubordination, the brilliant quarter horse Biffy Pass, and a 1,000 acre breeding farm near Lufkin, Texas.

Put all these unlikely parts into a single mosaic and you have one of the great emerging success stories in racing.

A punster without conscience could refer to this as a "rags to riches" story, but that would not be the case. The only rags in the business empire constructed by the brothers E. Wayne Johnson and James H. Johnson are the rags processed in their plants (J-Tex Wipers of El Paso and Johnson International in Brownsville).

Admittedly, the recycling of old cloth and various textiles is fascinating — and it's easy for any impressionable writer (such as this one) to go off on a tangent and begin detailing how the Johnson operation buys old clothes from the Salvation Army, and Goodwill, and how these clothes are exported to Mexico, and Africa; how the wool, for example, goes to Italy, and various kinds of cloth are recycled into wiping cloths for industry uses.

This sounds so ingenious — like turning cattle manure into methane gas. But the

point is not how the Brothers Johnson have cornered the rag market, but how the innocent purchasing of a \$1,500 quarter horse in 1973 triggered a racing operation which now includes that thousand acre breeding operation (Running J Ranches), a complement of about 100 head, a handful of top stallions, and Biffy Pass, the filly who just a week ago stuck her neck in front in the Rainbow Derby at Ruidoso Downs and pulled in \$179,025.

How all this could come to pass in less than five years — well, it surely bespeaks the mercantile genius of the Brothers Johnson. It also took a fast hand with a checkbook to get the well primed. As Wayne points out with routine Texas understatement, "We've got a pretty decent income."

But Wayne, who takes things pretty much in stride, had to admit it was heady stuff when Biffy Pass — purchased two years ago in the All-American Sale for \$15,000 — won the Rainbow Derby. He amplifies: "We always knew this filly could run — but she's been a bad gate horse. She cost herself a lot of earnings by messing up in the gate. She'd rear up and disqualify herself. So when she won the Rainbow Derby, it was a great accomplishment. We felt the filly deserved it. I probably had 150 people congratulate me from the time I left the track until I reached my car in the parking lot. It's great to win, and it's fun to have the support of the fans. It was also gratifying to see so many other horsemen out there who are glad you've won."

The Johnsons reckon they've got \$750,000 tied up in their racing operation. Generally, it's been a case of money flowing out, and little flowing in. But Biffy Pass turned that around. "Every once in a while you get discouraged," Wayne goes on. "There were some pretty tough

moments. But after you win a race like this, it's all worth it."

The Johnson racing operation began in 1973 when, after being only casual turf fans, they decided it might be fun to buy a quarter horse. So they bought the filly, Leta Bar's Bug, "just to fool around with." They paid \$1,500 and raced her in Texas bush tracks. "But she didn't do anything extra," Johnson says. (Other than whet their appetites.)

So in 1975, they bought three yearlings at the Houston Speed Sale, another at the Haymaker Sale, another one or two out of the All-American Sale — spending around \$30,000 for the lot. Only one of the bunch, Angelic Facade, understood the profit motive and earned about \$15,000. So far, no big potatoes.

The following year, the Johnsons went a little steeper, tossing in \$100,000 for seven or eight head in the All-American Sale. "Up until that time, we'd had very little racing income," Wayne recalls. "But we still wanted to do something, we still wanted to make a showing..."

Included in those '76 purchases was Biffy Pass, a filly spotted by Johnny Goodman, the Johnson trainer at the time. Goodman liked the way the filly looked — he liked her balance and conformation — and urged the Johnsons to buy her. Luckily, they took his advice. Some of the others they bought — Gallant Patriot, for example — ran into knee chips and various injuries.

Last year, the Johnsons forked over another \$130,000 or so for about seven yearlings (the All-American Sale, the Haymaker Sale). "But there were leg

problems, and we have nothing to brag about so far," Wayne says.

As these horses were being accumulated, the Johnsons founded the Flying J Ranches and initiated a breeding operation. Their five star stallion is Insubordination, an 11-year-old thoroughbred who earned some \$384,000 in his running days. "He's probably the most outstanding thoroughbred now standing in Texas," Wayne asserts. "His foals have earned over \$1 million."


With speed his strong suit, the Johnsons figured Insubordination would fit in perfectly with speed-oriented breeders in the Southwest. He'd also be able to work both sides of the block. So the fee for thoroughbred mares is two grand. But it's a bargain \$1,200 for quarter horse dams, the idea being to build a reputation with the quarter horse folks. In the last breeding season, Insubordination was bred to about 80 mares.

The Johnsons also stand Cedar Court, a half-brother to another speedy thoroughbred sire, Hempen. They had Scam, of similar credentials, but he slipped out of his stall, got loose in the Johnson compound, fell and broke a shoulder, and had to be destroyed.

Since Scam had earned some \$126,000, it sort of ruins your day to put him to sleep. That was one of the discouraging moments Wayne occasionally refers to. "But we're in the business to stay," he says.

Finally, a word of caution to anyone with a yen for similar rags-to-riches in quarter horse racing: "If you don't go to Ruidoso with a tough horse, you're wasting your time."

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## Entry office open for State Fair

Hillman reported that the deadline for entries for the horse shows and other livestock have been split up this year. All horse entries must be in by closing time Monday, August 14. All other livestock —

beef cattle, dairy cattle, sheep, goats, poultry, rabbits and junior swine — must be entered by closing time Thursday, August 17. The August 17 deadline also applies to the wool show.

Hillman also said that persons planning to enter this year's fair may obtain information on various classes, entry forms and premium lists from her office. They may stop in fair offices and obtain such information in person, or they may write for it. Requests should be addressed to: Entry Department, New Mexico State Fair, P.O. Box 8546, Albuquerque, New Mexico 87198. Persons writing for material are urged to print or type name, address, city, state and zip code, and be sure and mention which department they are interested in entering.

The 41st annual New Mexico State Fair — The Biggest Show in New Mexico — will be held in Albuquerque September 13 through 24. Pari-mutuel horse racing and quality horse shows will be staged daily September 8 through 24.

## Jockey/Trainer of the week

Gary Sumpter copped the Jockey-of-the-Week honor for the fourth time this season at the Ruidoso oval with a total of five wins and maintained his lead in the overall standings in the process.

The rider set himself up for some weighty financial pursuits with two of his victories as well. Thursday he scored two triumphs, then went into the Rainbow Futurity elimination trials Friday. The result was a length win aboard Copasetti in a time of 20.03 1/2 seconds for the 400 yards. That time earned the filly a berth in the \$377,287 finale July 30.

He took a spin aboard stakes winner Real Easy Jet Saturday in trials for the upcoming \$102,910 World's Championship Classic and wasn't found wanting. The pair rolled in with a 1 3/4 length lead to set the fastest qualifying time of 21.78 seconds for 440 yards.

Sumpter chalked up his final win Sunday

when he guided Pierre The True in a hard fought 870 yard battle and came through for a half length margin and a \$12,800 return. His weekend tally also included two seconds and four thirds from 22 trips to the gate.

His overall record at the top of the standings reflects 215 starts with a score of 39-28-35 and a win percentage of 18.1.

Charles Mueller, who holds down the second slot in the standings with a 31-19-19 record from 162 mounts, turned in a creditable performance over the weekend with four wins and two thirds.

Jack W. Brooks edged competition with three wins to capture the Trainer-of-the-Week title and move into the standings for the first time.

Brooks started his campaign with Azure Kitty in a 350 yard allowance bout Thursday which the filly won by a neck in the

brisk time of 17.99 seconds. Friday, he came through with two qualifiers for the Rainbow Futurity finale with Moon Lark (second-fastest time of 19.99) and Say Lady.

Although he holds the tenth position in the overall standings with a tally of 11-3-3, he also owns the highest win percentage of 21.2 from 52 starts.

H. C. Werner Jr., still leads the trainer competition with a 29-24-17 record for a 17.5 win percentage.

Racing action resumes today though Saturday with a 1:30 p.m. starting time. Sophomore New Mexico breeds highlight Saturday's card in the \$6,500-added Zia Stakes at 400 yards.

Sunday, things get underway at 1 p.m., with the focus on the finale of the \$102,910 World's Championship Classic at 440 yards.

## Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

**VESPERO**, owned by Gordon and Juanita Cronc of Lakin, Kansas, finished in front in his Kansas Futurity trial but took such an erratic course he was disqualified. The story was totally different Friday, as the gelding got out straight as an arrow and set the fastest qualifying time of 19.96 seconds (400 yards) for the \$448,000 Rainbow Futurity finale.

Others who'll try for a winner's slice of \$154,639 are: Moon Lark (19.99) Top Deck Bunny (19.99 1/2); Miss Top Dial (20.00); Dickey's Fireman (20.02); Copasetti (20.03); Miss Royal Cynthia (20.05); Azurelana (20.10 1/2); Say Lady (20.11 1/2); Oh Oh Lady Oh (20.11 1/2).

**A RACE WILL BE NAMED** this weekend for Jim Smith, the exercise rider who died following a spill during a morning workout. All jockeys riding in the race, according to an idea spearheaded by jockey Jerry Nicodemus, will donate their jock mounts to a trust fund to be set up for the late rider's son.

**REAL EASY JET**, the colt who was often frustrated in stakes competition as a two-year-old, has really come into his own this year. The sophomore, owned and trained by Walter Merrick, of Sayre, Oklahoma, burst from the gate with powerful speed Saturday to cover 440 yards in 21.78 seconds. That time gave him the top qualifying berth for the \$102,910 World's Championship Classic July 23. The colt won by 1 3/4 lengths, the largest victory margin in the trials. Besides that, the victory, his fourth straight, established him as the "winningest" horse of the meet so far.

**CLASSIC SEEMS TO BE** an appropriate word for the World's Championship Classic lineup since the earnings of the field over the last two years is an outstanding \$1,125,915. Here's how they qualified: Miss Thermolark (21.82 1/2); Jun Jun Ni (21.89 1/2); Hot Idea (21.93); Go Go Cookie (21.94); High Set (22.01); Lillie Bug (22.01); Jet Rockette (22.05).

**ONLY TWO VETERANS** made it into the Classic field with eight three-year-olds. The two four-year-olds are Frosty's Azurette and Jet Rockette. The latter was the biggest surprise, going off at odds of over 17-1.

**THE HIGHEST DAILY Double Payoff** of the season turned up Sunday with a huge return of \$1,790.20. Successful bettors in the double selected Dyalnite (No. 8), an unraced two-year-old filly in the 5 1/2-furlong first race, who went off at 39-1, and matched her with Boca Chica (No. 4), a gelding with near 13-1 backing in the second race for \$1,500 claimers. Dyalnite's win return was \$30.


**TRAINER MARGIE RENNRO**, who's sent out only a few charges at the meeting, had plenty of success in Saturday's first race with Blin Scoutin. The maiden two-year-old filly, completely overlooked by the fans at 30-1, made a strong come-from-behind move in the stretch to win by a neck. Those stalwart enough to back the filly got a \$63.80 return.

**TORRENT DUCK**, a gelding who was claimed early this spring at Sunland Park for \$10,000 by Ofelia C. Castillo of El Salvador, Central America, has worked his way up to allowance competition and took home a winner's share of \$1,800 Friday. The sophomore battled at 5 1/2 furlongs and won by a half-length for a sizeable return of \$51.40.

**THE HIGH QUINIELA** payoff of the season was picked up on the (7-4) combination in Saturday's seventh race. Two-year-old allowance sprinters took to the turf at four furlongs when Connie Rose (37-1) coursed to a length victory and was followed in by Peep A Jeep (10-1). The quinela return was \$445.20.

**BOTH JOCKEY Harley Crosby** and jockey Salustio Burgos were suspended for three days from July 20 through July 22 for careless riding. Burgos was aboard Double B Express in the 10th race July 15 when his mount was disqualified from first and placed second. Crosby was astride Primer Lee in the seventh race July 13 when his mount caused interference.

**OTHER STEWARDS' RULINGS:** Jockey John Lewis took a \$50 bite for failing to control his mount Real Stinger in the third race July 9. Jockey Henry Urlegas was fined \$50 similarly for failing to control Shy Charge in the first race July 13; Jockey Pete Herrera took a \$50 levy for failing to control Say Lady in the seventh race July 14 and jockey Jackie Martin was fined \$50 for not fulfilling his riding engagements July 13.

Here I first saw the Gilia growing on spires twice as tall as myself. They were like small flowering trees. I asked Mother why the humming birds were feeding on the flowers, and she said they were eating the honey. I then picked one of the blooms and sure enough there was a drop of sweet honey inside. I was three years old, and yet the memory is as vivid as if this happened yesterday.

Soon the Gilia will be a bright and cheerful sight along the way. Other favorite wild flowers of the world and the Western America will be blooming.

### Pappy Johnson's Vegetable Garden

Pappy Johnson lost no time planting his garden after he returned from the hospital in Houston for his hip operation. The next day he was down in his garden with a cane, getting the vegetables started. Now he has thrown the cane away and he has every kind of vegetable in his garden that will do well in the country. He already has radishes, onions, and summer squash. He has tried tomatoes and cantelopes. His apples also are doing well and growing rapidly. We are grateful to God that Pappy is recovering so well, and that his garden and orchard show such promise.






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# Consumer Price Index continues fast increase

That nasty Consumer Price Index has done it again — it's gone up. The news from the Labor Department did little to spark consumers' spirits over the 4th of July holiday.

"The pesky index is somewhat like a referee in a baseball game," said Dr. James Kirby, Extension economist at New Mexico State University.

"There's no cheering section for the work it does, but everyone agrees that it is necessary. The index serves as a referee of sorts to tell us how well we are playing the economic game of life," Dr. Kirby said.

But why should the consumer listen to or care about the Consumer Price Index?

Well, for one reason, Dr. Kirby explained that the index tells you what you are paying for that you buy — including the beer and peanuts you consumed while you watched the news about the index on TV.

In fact, the index measures just about everything from the cost of cooling your house and repairing your TV, to the cost of groceries, clothes, transportation and even recreation.

In short, the index is a measure of how many goods and services the consumer gets for his dollar today as compared to yesterday.

For example, the new index released for May was 133.3. That means that it takes \$133.30 to buy the same products you could get for only \$100 in 1967. "If your economic memory goes back to 1949, there has been a loss of 62 percent in purchasing power and a 78 percent loss since 1939," Dr. Kirby said.

During the past three months, consumer prices have gone up so fast that if it continued, it would cause a 11.3 percent increase during the next year. However, the Carter administration predicts that the June index will improve.

Some economists are now predicting that we will have a six percent inflation rate for the next several years, Dr. Kirby said. This means that average prices will double by 1990 and your dollar will buy only one-half as much as it does today.

Of course, the United States is not alone in its struggle with inflation. Almost every other industrial country has had a faster rate of inflation during the past few years than the United States.

However, the eroding exchange rate between the dollar and other major currencies has weakened our dollar. And as the dollar's value goes down, you need more dollars to buy the same products. This inflation is measured by the Consumer Price Index.

The index began during World War I when shipyard workers were drawn to East Coast shipyards by wages they thought bountiful at the time. However,

they soon found their wages eroded by sharply rising prices.

To help mediate demands for a 'fair wage scale,' Dr. Kirby said the Bureau of Labor Statistics began in 1917 to survey buying patterns in 32 cities. They gathered data on price trends for 145 commodities bought by the typical wage earner. The findings were used to adjust wages.

Periodic revisions of the index have improved the coverage and calculations. As Americans moved from the horse and buggy era into automobiles and new food habits, the index reflected new products and a different importance on certain products.

After 60 years, the Bureau of Labor Statistics will make major changes in the index so it will more accurately show what the modern consumer pays for goods and services.

As of July 1, the new All Urban Consumer Index will go into effect. It will reflect the spending patterns of about 80 percent of the consumers — the wage

earners, self-employed professionals, retired, unemployed and the poor. It will not include rural workers, members of the armed services, or people in institutions.

While there may be little change between the levels of the old and new indexes, a comparison between the two would not be entirely valid, since the new index reflects more urban taste in purchases, Dr. Kirby said.

The government will also issue a revised index which, like the old index, will cover urban wage earners and clerical workers. However, the revised index will reflect different products and weight the price of the products differently.

"While the significance of the index is not confined to a measurement of inflation alone, the data have become part of the inflationary process itself," Dr. Kirby said. "That is, increases in the index trigger proportional boosts in wages and other payments received by large segments of the public."

## Solar water pumping unit set

A water well pump powered by the sun is among proposed range improvements approved Thursday by the Roswell District Grazing Advisory Board.

The five member board meeting in Roswell with Bureau of Land Management officials gave the go ahead to eight projects which will cost an estimated \$198,400.

Presentation of the proposals followed election of Bud Eppers, Roswell, as chairman of the board and George Teel, Hope, as co-chairman.

Roy Stovall, operations chief for the Roswell district of BLM, presented a recommendation that a newly drilled water well on the Ruth Corn allotment north of Roswell be equipped with a windmill or solar power pump for a cost of about \$14,000. The solar pump would use special panels to catch the sun's rays and convert them to electrical energy.

Other projects include installing 6 miles of water pipeline on the Armstrong allotment in the Texas Hills region west of Carlsbad. The project would include six drinking troughs and two storage tanks. Estimated cost would be \$51,000.

Mesquite grubbing on allotments southeast of Carlsbad will continue under another project. This year 2,400 acres are being grubbed on the Charlie James allotment. Under the new project, about 6,400 additional acres would be grubbed for about \$97,200.

The board also approved a project to drill and case a well on the Charlie James

allotment for about \$21,000. Fencing and replacement of gates on other allotments were also approved.

Stovall said the projects would be contracted out by sealed bids. Materials will be provided by the government.

The Grazing Advisory Board was chartered in 1976 to advise the Roswell district manager of BLM on range improvements. Board members are Eppers, Teel, Bill Ball, Truman Pierce and Lloyd Treat.

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# Drowning leading death cause in parks

Since 1972, drownings have been the leading cause of death in the National Park System, surpassing auto-related accidents.

Seventy-seven persons drowned in areas of the National Park System in 1977, turning happy vacation days into tragedy. And the 77 park deaths were only a tiny percentage of those who perished in mishaps at water recreation areas of all sorts last year.

What can be done about this needless loss of life?

Plenty, say the people who compile and analyze the grim statistics.

Plenty, says John E. Cook, Southwest Regional Director of the National Park Service, whose area includes several water recreation sites including three large lakes in Texas and Oklahoma, a national seashore in Texas and a national river in Arkansas.

"Most drownings are preventable in that they are a result of carelessness," said Cook. "The non-use of safety equipment and the use of alcohol are two factors that, if reversed, could radically diminish water-related deaths."

It has been estimated that at least half of all boating accidents that occur are related to the consumption of alcohol. "Most people who die in boating accidents

fall out of the craft," Cook said. "And balance is one of the first things impaired by alcohol consumption."

"As the alcohol level increases, the ability to coordinate leg and arm movement diminishes and an inebriated boater will have difficulty in trying to swim or reach a lifesaving device, despite his ability when sober."

In addition, alcohol affects vision and reduces the glare recovery time, setting the stage for a collision, Cook pointed out. It also accelerates body heat loss to the air or water and makes the person who accidentally falls overboard more susceptible to hypothermia — when a person's body loses more heat than it produces.

Cook also urged the use of approved personal flotation devices — lifejackets — at all times when boating or water skiing.

While alcohol abuse, the danger of hypothermia, and other factors could spell trouble even for someone who is wearing a life jacket, survival chances for those who fall in the water increase dramatically if they are wearing one.

"The water is a great place to enjoy yourself, whether you are in a National Park Service area or a swimming pool," Cook said. "And for the water user who shows good judgment a tragic accident becomes most unlikely. It is that small percentage that do not follow the rules that is likely to wind up as statistics."

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
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
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
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
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
