

Commission okays Carrizo Road repair

The Lincoln County Commission Thursday voted to enter into a cooperative agreement with the State Highway Department for the upgrading of a 1.5 mile stretch of Carrizo Road from the Ruidoso village limits to the Mescalero Apache reservation.

The commission approved the resolution

during a hastily called special meeting, and approved a budget of \$30,563.95 or 62 percent of the cost of the project as the county's share for upgrading the road.

The meeting was called with the legal minimum notice, according to Les Olsen, county manager, in order to allow adequate time to have the matter included

on the agenda for the end of July meeting of the State Highway Commission.

He said the county commission meeting had been announced by a notice placed on the county courthouse doors 24 hours before the meeting was held.

The News was informed of the meeting one hour before the Commission convened.

County commission chairman John Sudderth said, "This project came to a head real quickly; we needed the resolution by Friday."

The resolution was passed following a perfunctory briefing by Olsen.

The matter came before the commission for passage at a regular meeting July 10

however, the commissioners present, George L. "Lee" Straley and G. H. "Shorty" Stoneman, voted to table the resolution when it was learned that a State Highway Department official was not present to brief the commissioners on the matter.

Other Thursday business included the reception of a report made by Bill Dwyre,

deputy director of state communications, in which he outlined a developing problem in New Mexico concerned with clear channel frequencies for small government uses.

The county is currently changing one of its frequencies because of problems involved with interference with Union County's communication system.

ESCAPE ROUTES PLANNED FOR ENTIRE VILLAGE

Fire evacuation plan set

The committee for insuring Ruidoso's Environment (FIRE) voted Thursday to begin their first fire prevention project, detailing various phases of the project and making tentative plans to implement them during the next few months.

The committee voted to revive a project of distributing maps showing evacuation routes, to homeowners throughout the village, formerly a project undertaken by the Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department as an effort to simplify evacuation in the case of a major forest fire.

Committee members, with the assistance of Larry Bandy, State Division of Forestry, will revise the existing material and order new maps printed.

Next the FIRE committee will organize distribution of the maps on a door-to-door personal contact basis, encouraging

homeowners to post the maps in a conspicuous place, such as on a door leading outside or on the back of a cabinet door.

In conjunction with the project, the group will also request the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department, (RVFD), Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department, Bonito-Alto Fire Department, Forest Service and Division of Forestry, to list areas they feel may be hazardous because of the method in which they were developed or because of high density population.

"The public wants to know what we're doing and this project will serve as evidence of constructive action, plus it will get their attention on the needs of the area," Barbara Duff, committee member, said.

Mickey Potter was appointed to check into methods of financing of the project. The committee also discussed

distributing arrows to be posted in an effort to easily indicate escape routes.

"With arrows posted, people will know exactly which way to go and it will serve as a curiosity" prompting people to ask why the arrows were posted and giving an opportunity for a brief education on fire danger and evacuation, guest Bill Seelbach, RVFD, chief, said.

Steve Makowski, Forest Service fire management officer, said he would look into the costs of reflective arrows.

A long range plan of building an evacuation route from the Upper Canyon, the most fire hazardous area in Ruidoso, also was discussed.

The group requested Bandy check into the possibility of the existence of a complete layout providing an evacuation route through Perk Canyon.

Although the layout probably does exist as part of the village comprehensive plan, Bandy warned the group to consider an

alternate route as "a route down Perk Canyon is still basically in the Upper Canyon and with the way winds blow and fire behaves, if there's a fire in the Upper Canyon, then it probably would be burning in Perk Canyon also."

He suggested an alternate route, passing all the small canyons and running through Cedar Creek Canyon.

In other business Thursday, the FIRE Committee:

— Requested Bandy to gather information on hazards in the town and high density areas.


— Voted to postpone a study of street signs until fall.

— Briefly discussed village ordinances, proposing enforcement of existing ordinances or revision.

They also discussed a need for an ordinance dealing with residential density.

The next meeting will be at 4 p.m., August 17 in the library.

Miss Thermolark Classic winner



RICHER BY \$51,455 — Miss Thermolark splashes to a decisive length victory in Sunday's \$102,910 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic at Ruidoso Downs. The steady rain didn't bother the filly in the least, and she led practically from start to finish in the 440 yard dash.

First was worth \$51,455. Miss Thermolark is owned by Ronny Schliep of Miami, Oklahoma. Hot Idea (No. 10), last year's All-American Futurity winner, closed well on the far outside to take second.

Miss Thermolark sliced through a driving rain and easily handcuffed her super star competition in Sunday's tenth running of the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic at Ruidoso Downs.

The brilliant filly took to the sloppy track like a duck to water and left the competition well behind in the prestigious scramble over a gross pot of \$102,910.

Miss Thermolark is the property of Ronny Schliep of Miami, Oklahoma. W. Leo Craghead does the training. Carl White is the jockey. Despite the filly's big-money credentials, she was relegated to third place in the betting and got away at 3-1.

At the wire, Miss Thermolark was a comfortable length in front in a clocking of 22.03 seconds. Her share of the purse came out to \$31,455, and this boosted her 1978 earnings up to \$135,295 and put her career bankroll at \$333,797. The mutual payoffs were \$8.40, \$3.40 and \$3.60.

Hot Idea, the All-American Futurity winner, got the role of 2-1 favorite and had to really move at the end in order to take second. She ended up a neck in front of the 45-1 outsider, High Set.

Hot Idea, ridden by Terry Lipham, collected \$17,494 and returned \$3.60 and \$3.20. The filly is owned by Ted Bruce and Floyd Jackson of Estelline, Texas. High Set, piloted by Walter Hodges, got a

Ruidoso skiing promotion set in five Mexican cities

Ruidoso's skiing and tourist attractions will be promoted in several of Mexico's largest cities during October and November by Ray and Fran Heid, representing this area in a Ski New Mexico effort to attract Mexican tourists.

"Frontier Airlines," Heid said, "will begin maiden flights to five major cities in Mexico in October and plan regularly scheduled service from these cities, to fly skiers into New Mexico, beginning in November."

Heid is now soliciting ski packages from Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs establishments.

"What I need, by August 1," Heid said, "are package offers including:

"Room and meals; or

"Room and ski equipment.

"Give your normal seasonal rates for week days."

Heid said that weekday air fares would be discounted by Frontier.

"Ruidoso's facilities are the finest," he said, "and by getting our packages together, due to the fact we're the closest ski area to Mexico, we should be able to attract a lot of skiers from there, because our prices are the lowest in New Mexico."

The Heids will spend one week in Guadalupe during November, exclusively promoting Ruidoso.

"Our booth will feature a plastic ski ramp, with Fran actually instructing Mexicans in skiing," Heid said. "I will be promoting the skiing, as well as all of our tourist attractions, with brochures and other materials."

This skiing/tourism campaign in Mexico will be launched, Heid said, "by mailing letters, and brochures, to hundreds of travel agencies in the largest cities.

"The letters will fully describe all of our facilities in Ruidoso, from skiing to vacationing. Several Ruidoso boosters will help compose this letter as we don't want to overlook anything that will bring more skiers from Mexico to Ruidoso next winter, especially through weekday package deals."

paycheck of \$10,291. The show return was \$9. The colt is owned by D'Leese Williamson of Terry, Mississippi.

The big disappointment was Real Easy Jet, the flashy colt who's been plagued by an inability to win when the big chips were on the table. He got rolling as a 5-2 shot in quest of his fifth straight win, but didn't break particularly well, appeared to get bogged down and discouraged by the wet going, then straggled home in ninth place.

Here's how the also-rans checked in: 4th—Jun Jun Ni (earning \$7,203); 5th—Lille Bug (\$5,145); 6th—Frosty's Azurette (\$4,118); 7th—Go Go Cookie (\$3,087); 8th—Jet Rockette (\$2,958); 9th—Real Easy Jet (\$1,029); 10th—Perfect View (\$1,029).

Miss Thermolark got away quickly, encountered some early arguments from Lille Bug, got that one's number in a hurry, then began pouring it on at the half way point. With about 100 yards to go, there was no question as to the winner. The filly ran straight as an arrow and made no mistakes.

MADAM PRESIDENT BROKE a tick slowly in Saturday's Zia Stakes at Ruidoso Downs, but the filly delivered a tremendous closing wallop and coasted to an easy victory.

The winning time of 19.95 seconds set a seasonal record for 440 yards.

Madam President raced as a 6-5 favorite under Richard Bickel and earned \$4,461 out of the gross purse of \$7,435. The

chestnut filly is the property of R. C. and Suzanne Jones of Tatum.

The margin of victory was two lengths. Patrons who supported Madam President in the mutuels collected \$4.20, \$2.60 and \$2.20. The winner hauled 121 pounds.

Chilla Dial, the second favorite at 5-2, scooted into an early lead and was in the thick of things until the midway point. But the filly was unable to hold off Madam President when that one came wheeling down to the wire.

Chilla Dial, ridden by J. C. Wiley, earned \$1,635 and refunded \$2.80 and \$2.40. Junes Feature—who delayed the start a bit by rearing up in the gate—broke well but was unable to threaten the leaders. She finished third, a neck behind Chilla Dial, and returned \$2.60.

Saturday's program was quite a tub-thumper, mutual-wise, as another hefty crowd turned out to pour a remarkable \$609,093 through the betting windows.

HOPEFUL JOURNEY TOYED with her competition while gliding to an impressive victory in Friday's 5 1/2 furlong feature at Ruidoso Downs.

The filly, ridden by Carlos Rivas as a heavy favorite, led all the way and clocked the distance in a stunning 1:05 3/5 seconds. The time, a seasonal record, was only two ticks shy of the track record.

Hopeful Journey, after getting only a mild threat from the 9-1 outsider, Asian Lady, opened up at will in the final furlong. The payoffs were \$3.60, \$3.20 and \$2.60. Proud Clarionette (\$12.30, \$5) came on

belatedly to take second. Third went to Me Francis (\$3).

Hopeful Journey is owned by B. Raymond Evans of Tullia, Texas. The margin of victory was three lengths.

A glum note was added to the race when Make It Me, a filly who had won three times at the meeting and also finished third in the Peter Hurd Hamdicap, tossed her jockey, Gilbert Villegas, at the break. Make It Me continued on her own, then tried to scale the outside rail in the backstretch.

The filly was so severely injured she had to be put away. Fans had Make It Me down as a 9-2 shot in the final race of her brief career.

Jockey Villegas escaped serious injury.

SKIPPER ROAD DUELED The front running Shining Era throughout the stretch of Thursday's feature at Ruidoso Downs, then pulled away in the final strides.

The margin of victory in the hard fought battle was three-fourths of a length. Skipper Road was piloted by Richard Bickel for J. W. Gardenhire of O'Donnell, Texas. The winning time for the 5 1/2 furlongs was a crisp 1:07 flat.

Fans who backed Skipper Road in the wagering collected \$10.40, \$5 and \$3.20. Shining Era, directed by Gilbert Villegas, refunded \$4.20 and \$3.20. Victory Prize, a 5-1 shot handled by John Cushing, made up considerable ground in the stretch in order to take third. The show price was \$3.40.

Fort Stanton picket lines postponed

Negotiations between New Mexico Health Environmental Department (HED) and the Southwestern Council of Industrial Workers of the AFL-CIO have resumed, postponing picket lines scheduled to go into effect Saturday at Stanton Hospital and Training School. Employee rights in question involve a point system for transfers and promotions, grievance procedures and a schedule from Monday through Saturday which the group contends eliminates overtime for working on weekends. The local union had scheduled picket lines to be drawn Saturday, but canceled plans when the negotiations resumed.

Community advertising plan outlined

The Economic Development Division (EDD) of the Department of Commerce and Industry has released about \$55,000 in an effort to allow individual New Mexico communities to advertise in national trade and tourist magazines. Steve Boyd of the EDD told the Board of Economic Development here Thursday afternoon.

Boyd, aided by advertising executive Lewis Thompson, said the department has had a policy of advertising the entire state in such publications, but this year communities may ask the EDD to produce a single ad for their community alone.

Thompson explained the department would have the same advertising budget but would produce more ads.

"We're having to make smaller ads," he said. "Each community will be sent a questionnaire on which they will list their assets. We'll write the copy and paste up an ad and then submit it back to them for their approval."

Thompson indicated that there "are no strings attached" and if a community wished to run an ad longer than the budget would allow they could do so by paying the added expense.


There will be a benefit dance/concert for the family of Jim Smith tonight beginning at 9 in the Chapparral Motor Hotel.







Avoid shortcuts in canning food

Don't experiment or take shortcuts with home canning, says Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food specialist at New Mexico State University. Start with high quality produce for high quality canned foods. Use only approved methods from recent food preservation books. To make sure your home canned food is both safe and nutritious, Mrs. Johnson says to follow a few basic guidelines.

Use a pressure canner for all low acid foods. Low acid foods include vegetables, meat, poultry, fish and combination foods, such as soups and stews.

Have the gauge on your pressure canner checked regularly to assure adequate processing temperatures. Follow a recent guide to time and pressure.

Use the boiling water bath only for fruits, fruit juices, fruit purees, tomatoes and foods pickled in acid, such as vinegar. Follow recommended times precisely.

Use open-kettle (hot-pack) only for jellies and jams which contain a high proportion of sugar, Mrs. Johnson says.

When canning combination foods, such as soups or stews, use processing times and temperatures for the ingredient in the mixture which calls for the longest processing time.

Allitudes in New Mexico make it necessary to increase the time when

processing fruits and tomatoes in a water bath. When canning low acid vegetables in a pressure canner, pressures must be increased, Mrs. Johnson said.

For a boiling water bath lasting less than 20 minutes, increase the time one minute per thousand feet. For processing times over 20 minutes increase the processing two minutes per thousand feet above sea level.

When canning low acid foods in a pressure canner, pressure should be increased one pound for every 2000 feet above sea level. At 2000 to 4000 feet use 12 pounds pressure, the NMSU specialist says.

Some pressure saucepans and new pressure canners use a weighted gauge with only 5, 10 and 15 pounds of pressure indicated rather than a dial type gauge. In a cooker with a weighted gauge, use 15 pounds pressure when canning at any altitude over 2000 feet.

Select your food carefully. Do not use overripe fruits and vegetables (especially tomatoes) for canning. Thoroughly wash or peel any fruits or vegetables which may have been sprayed with pesticides.

Be careful not to overpack jars. Use up-to-date instructions to determine head space.

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I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

Hunters interested in applying for New Mexico's "special permit" big game hunts should be eying upcoming application deadlines now.

Licenses for antelope, bighorn sheep, elk, barbary sheep, oryx, ibex, javelina and deer entry hunts must be applied for in advance, and therefore, should be in early to avoid missing deadlines.

Persons wanting to apply for these hunts must fill out an application "Form" and submit it, along with the required license and application fees, to an office of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish by the deadline.

Application forms are available at any Game and Fish office and at all license vendors.

Completed applications for antelope and bighorn sheep must be in a Game and Fish office by 5 p.m., July 26.

Applications for the special antelope bow hunts must be in by August 11. Antelope applications must include the \$16.50 fee for residents or \$102.00 for non-residents for each applicant.

The fees for bighorn sheep applicants are \$27.00 for residents and \$302.00 for non-residents.

Application deadline for those wanting to hunt elk with a bow is 5 p.m., September 8, while the deadline for the regular elk hunt is September 20.

Elk application forms must include the \$22.00 fee for residents or the \$137.00 fee for non-residents.

The special hunts for barbary sheep, oryx, and ibex are \$27.00 for residents and \$302.00 for non-residents.

A javelina license costs \$16.50 for residents and \$52.00 for non-residents.

Applicants for deer entry permits need only to submit a Form K and a \$1.00 application fee per applicant, but must already have a valid New Mexico big game license with deer tag attached.

Two persons may apply on one application form when applying for the antelope, javelina and deer entry hunts.

However, only one applicant per form may apply for elk, bighorn sheep, oryx and ibex.

Anyone who did not hold an antelope, elk, or javelina license last year, the 1977-1978 season, may apply for this license year. That is, hunters may hold a license for these species only every other year.

General bull elk permits are unlimited in number and all applicants that apply for

these public elk licenses will receive one, provided they did not hold one the previous year.

Anyone who has never held a license to hunt desert bighorn, Rocky Mountain bighorn, oryx and ibex is eligible to apply for these hunts.

Applicants cannot apply for both Rocky Mountain and Mexican desert bighorn sheep in the same year.

Antelope, barbary sheep, bighorn sheep, javelina, oryx, ibex and deer entry license holders are randomly selected by a computer at public drawings in the Santa Fe office.

It will be to the advantage of all applicants to get their applications into game and fish offices well before the deadline should any corrections be necessary.

Again, all applications must be in a game and fish office by 5 p.m., on the deadline date.

If you like to play the numbers game, chances for drawing permits in the 1976-1977 hunting seasons went like this:

- Antelope 1 in 5
- Barbary sheep 1 in 3
- Bighorn sheep (Rocky Mountain) 1 in 10
- Bighorn sheep (desert) 1 in 80
- Javelina 1 in 1.1
- Oryx 1 in 20
- Ibex 1 in 14

One of 100 New Mexicans suffer animal bites yearly

One out of every 100 New Mexicans is bitten by an animal each year, according to state Health and Environment Department (HED) statistics. And 11 human deaths occurred as the result of dog bites in the United States last year.

Dr. O. J. Rollag, veterinarian for HED's Health Services Division, said that dogs, as well as cats, bats, foxes, skunks and coyotes, are the primary carriers of rabies, which can be transmitted to man through bites.

More animal bites occur in late spring, summer and early autumn when people participate more in outdoor activities.

According to Rollag, the majority of dog bites in New Mexico are inflicted by privately owned dogs whose owners allow them to run free. "Communities can greatly diminish such problems by enacting and adequately enforcing leash laws," he said.

Inadequate warning of the presence of guard dogs also contributes to the number of canine attacks, Rollag said.

"When a person is bitten, try to identify and confine the animal," Rollag advised. "Wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water for several minutes and contact a physician."

We are all happy that Tommy Taylor has returned to his native Lincoln county after a ten-year absence down in Texas. Tommy was born in Lincoln and has been in the pageant since he was a small child. He is the great grandson of George W. Coe, Lincoln county pioneer who lived through the colorful days of one hundred years ago. George Coe's autobiography, "Frontier Fighter," is a classic of early day Lincoln county history. Those who have copies value them very highly.



Keep the first weekend in August in mind. We will all gather at Lincoln for a grand celebration honoring our pioneers of Lincoln county and the southwest.

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
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



SANTA FE — Although the State Highway Department hasn't publicly announced it, the agency plans to have all but one unfinished link on the interstate highway system let to construction bids within 18 months.

More than \$60 million of Federal and state funds will be poured into interstate construction for those final projects, according to a departmental work plan.

The only link that wouldn't be under construction or let to bid by that time — the end of 1979 — would be a 22-mile stretch on Interstate 25 between Albuquerque and Santa Fe, one of the most heavily traveled routes in New Mexico.

The 18-month work plan, still being put in final shape, must still be accepted by the State Highway Commission. Commission members are to receive it next month at a meeting in Grants.

The plan was prepared by agency staff under the prodding of new chief administrator Fred O'Cheskey, who took over several weeks ago and who has criticized what he calls a lack of systematized long-range planning for road construction.

The 18-month planning document includes these proposed interstate highway construction projects:

— Interstate 25 near Las Vegas in San Miguel County, three projects totaling \$6.9 million, \$5.0 million and \$5.2 million.

— Interstate 40 in Quay County, involving San Jon and Tucuman and points in between, two projects totaling \$5.2 million, \$5.7 million, \$12.5 million and 9.0 million.

— Interstate 25 in Socorro County, near San Antonio, building two additional lanes for a cost of \$6.8 million.

— Interstate 40 in McKinley County, \$5.4 million for a city interchange.

O'Cheskey says he decided to place a high priority on getting interstate con-

struction in New Mexico completed because "the Feds are winding down" and he does not want remaining links to miss out on the lucrative Federal matching program whereby Washington supplies more than 90 percent of funds for interstate construction.

The one interstate project not on the departmental work list has been tied up in lengthy right-of-way negotiations with Santo Domingo and San Felipe Indian pueblos. The department may not get the most direct route it wishes, but O'Cheskey says he plans to decide on one route or another by December 31 of this year.

The department, in a little-noticed meeting of the commission in Las Cruces, also has set plans for utilizing \$18 million authorized by the 1978 Legislature for energy-area roads and for bridges and other structures on a statewide basis.

The "energy quadrant" projects: 3.31 miles east of the Rio Arriba-San Juan county line on New Mexico 44, \$2.85 million, November 1978 estimated completion date.

— 3.2 miles south of Bloomfield on New Mexico 44, \$4.7 million, August 1979.

— One mile northwest of the junction of New Mexico 537 and 44, \$4 million, September 1979.

Old U. S. 85 at Foster Canyon, \$301,000; U.S. 180 at Big Dry Creek, \$202,000; U.S. 60 east of junction with New Mexico 107, \$670,000; New Mexico 88 south of junction with U.S. 66, \$475,000; New Mexico 370 north of junction with U.S. 64, \$320,000;

U.S. 285 north of Texas line, \$251,000; New Mexico 72 east of junction with U.S. 285, \$450,000; U.S. 84 at Chama River, \$570,000; New Mexico 344 north of junction with Interstate 40, \$225,000; New Mexico 4 north of junction with New Mexico 44, \$1 million; U.S. 84 at Chama River, \$531,000;

U.S. 70 at Holloman Air Force Base, \$1.5 million for interchange; Santa Clara Bridge, \$1.8 million.
