Vespero wins Rainbow Futurity

Vespero, a gelding who's had difficulty staying on a straight course a few times in the past, stepped off an arrow-straight line in Sunday's 15th running of the \$446,800 Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

Vespero ended the 400 yard run with a commanding lead and earned \$154,630 for his owners, Gordon and Juanita Crone of Lakin, Kansas.

The fans were duly impressed with Vespero's credentials of five wins from six starts and made him a 9-5 favorite in the second leg of quarter horse racing's Triple Crown.

That only defeat came in the Kansas Futurity trials earlier in the season, when Vespero bumped some of his running mates before flashing to an easy 2 1/2 length win. As a result, his number was taken down.

But there was no wayward movement Sunday as jockey Keith Asmussen got the people's choice out of the gate alertly, and had him in contention right at the start. Moon Lark, at just over 4-1, appeared to get the early lead from the No. 2 slot. Miss Top Dial, carrying odds of 6 1/2-1, was also in the thick of things at the front end.

From that point on, it was plainly a three horse race. No one else in the field managed to offer any resistance.

Vespero got stronger with each stride, and at the midway point, it was apparent Moon Lark would be unable to hold him off. With about 100 yards to go Vespero had the sniff of money in his nostrils, and the incentive was enough to push him well into the clear. He was surging ahead eagerly when he flashed under the wire with a three-quarter length lead.

Vespero stopped the clock in 19.88 seconds — quite an improvement over his top qualifying time of 19.96. The gelding is trained by Marilyn Asmussen (jockey Asmussen's wife). Thus, Marilyn etched her name in quarter horse record books by becoming the first lady trainer to capture a stakes race of super size dimension.

Quotes on Vespero's Rainbow victory

The following "Rainbow Futurity quotes" were compiled by Karen Halloran of the Ruidoso Downs publicity staff:

GORDON CRONE (owner of Vespero) "I'm just a good old country boy who loves to race horses. We got into the business around 1970 and we've been racing about five or six two-year-olds every year. I got started when a friend of mine was training in Lakin, Kansas, and I bought a horse I thought could run a little bit. He won his first out and I was hooked.

"Then I thought 'This is the easiest thing I've ever done.' But as time went on, I found out it's really the hardest thing you can do. This is the biggest race I've ever won. The closest thing to it was a colt called Does It Easy, who ran fifth in the All-American Derby in 1974.

"My wife's mother bought Vespero's dam, I Think So, and gave her to my daughter when she was 15 years old. She was a filly in training and the cost was \$3,500. I Think So never won a race. So we bred her to every cheap horse we could find. My daughter, Patricia Ann Crone Vann, is listed as the breeder of Vespero, but my wife and I own him. What'll I do with Rainbow winnings? I'll just pay my bills as far as the money will go."

JOCKEY KEITH ASMUSSEN — "I couldn't have asked for a better race from Vespero. He ran better than he did in the trials. He broke well but there were several horses right there with him. I'd say we had the lead in three jumps. "That time he acted up in the Kansas trials — he was disqualified after winning

— was the first time I'd hit him with the stick. We had to spend a lot of time with his schooling to get him ready for this one."

TRAINER MARILYN ASMUSSEN — "This is the first time I've won such a big race — or anything near it. I can't even describe the way I feel right now. It's just the ultimate.

"The problem Vespero had in his Kansas trial was more of an accident than anything else. It was just something that can happen in a quarter horse race. Of course, we were terribly disappointed. When he veered out in that Kansas trial, he got cut. The cut went right through a tendon sheath and he had to have stitches. It took a while to get him ready for the Rainbow trials."

Sewer plant on schedule

Construction on the proposed regional waste water treatment plant could start as early as January 1979, according to Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) officials who say the project is proceeding on schedule.

A recent letter from the EPA to the Joint Use Board, which is charged with overseeing implementation of the project, said that nearly all of the agencies Step II requirements have been met, and formal EPA approval of the project could come as early as October.

Step II provides for conception of preliminary and final design standards and submission to the EPA of the final plans and specifications by September 30, the close of the federal fiscal year.

The agency letter said if the plans and specifications meet EPA standards, October approval would be forthcoming and construction could start as early as the first of the new year.

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The \$5.5-\$6 million project has been a concept since 1973 when the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs were informed by the New Mexico Environmental Improvement Agency and the Federal EPA they should consider a regional waste-water treatment plant for use by both communities and other areas within the county.

In 1970 the Village of Ruidoso Downs saw the need for construction of a village waste

water treatment plant to take the duties of the villages many septic tanks and cesspools. The village submitted an application for federal and state funding assistance.

Soon afterward Ruidoso began to consider upgrading its existing sewage treatment plant and also submitted applications for funding.

According to James Hine, Joint Use Board clerk and signatory authority, the villages were informed they should consider a regional concept of one plant for both communities.

He said the Joint Use Board was soon established consisting of the mayors of both communities, a private citizen of both communities and a representative of county government.

Daniel Engineering, an Alamogordo firm, was then retained about the middle

of 1974 to carry out the provisions of the EPA's Step 1 guidelines. The firm conducted a preliminary investigation and showed the degree the environment would be protected by construction of such a plant would substantially offset the cost of the plant.

Hine said that the project began running into problems involved with the development of new EPA laws.

"As the laws changed new standards were established," Hine said, "We had to meet those standards."

He said the feasibility of the plant was established and a state and federal commitment for funding was secured. The project is being funded 75 percent by the federal government, 12.5 percent by the state and 12.5 percent by the local governments. Hine said the local government share is being split one-third by

Ruidoso Downs and about two-thirds by Ruidoso.

Step 1 approval was granted by the EPA and EIA November 28, 1977. The agencies paid their shares of the cost of Step I, with the total cost amounting to about \$106,269.

According to several members of the board, the project stands a bit in limbo with Ruidoso still not sure where its portion of the construction costs are to come from.

January 10, 1972 Ruidoso Downs passed a general obligation bond for \$300,000. The bond is scheduled to be paid by 1991, and will establish Ruidoso Downs' share for project funding.

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Building permits top \$11 million

Aided by a June surge in construction valued at \$769,428, the value of building permits issued by the village of Ruidoso reached an all time yearly high of more than \$11.3 million during fiscal year 1977-78. The fiscal year closed June 30.

Figures obtained from building permits issued by village building inspector Chuck Brown show the declared value of a particular project. Brown said the actual fair market value of a particular project is probably somewhat higher.

The \$11.2 million figure falls short of doubling the \$5.7 million mark registered the previous fiscal year and about doubles the \$5.7 million value of projects initiated in fiscal year 1975-76.

Brown said the previous record high for construction in one year was set during fiscal year 1973-74 when more than \$7 million worth of construction was logged in Ruidoso.

Lacking any commercial stimulation, June closed out the year well short of the more than \$2 million figure recorded for construction initiated in May.

Of the total \$769,428 worth of construction projects committed during June, \$727,828 was for the construction of 28 single-family units placing the average cost of a single-family home started in June at about \$27,993.

The remainder of the figure was pegged at \$28,300 for residential additions, alterations, housekeeping and conversion projects, and \$13,300 for other nonspecified

projects. Brown explained the other category could include the construction of such things as walkways, walls and commercial remodeling projects.

June, 1977 saw the implementation of about \$40,288 worth of construction in the Ruidoso area.

Building activity started in June has for the most part been spread throughout the Ruidoso area, with no one area seeing any

Bids opened for state 37 traffic marker project

Pavement Specialists, Incorporated, of Dallas, Texas was the apparent low bidder for an experimental project which will see installation of raised snow plowable traffic markers on State Road 37 extending from Rainbow Drive to the intersection of U.S. 70 and State Road 37.

Bids were opened for the project on July 21.

Pavement Specialists' bid of \$36,492.30 was low out of three bids submitted by contracting firms from New Mexico and Texas.

All-Mark Company of Tyler, Texas submitted the next low bid of \$37,502.74.

Both bids fell within the engineer's estimate of \$37,636.

The raised markers will be installed starting north of the First Baptist Church on Mechem and extending south for the remainder of State Road 37.

The project will receive 100 percent federal funding under a federal traffic safety program, according to an official with the state highway department.

He said the markers will be placed about 80 feet apart and are designed to separate opposing lanes of traffic. The markers will rise above the pavement surface and will be covered with reflective plastic.

Arts and crafts show attracted quality exhibits

The seventh annual Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Arts and Craft Show held this weekend was termed a success.

A poll of the artists participating showed almost all of them felt the quality of the arts and crafts on display was very high and an improvement over past years.

Because of the high quality and strict jurying this year, nearly all the artists said they planned to return to the next arts and craft show.

Opinion on the show's location was varied, some artists complaining the move indoors lost the festivity of past outdoor shows. Others were in favor of the move indoors as it protected their products from rain and dust.

Despite minor complaints, almost all the artists and craftsmen were highly complimentary of the Chamber's arts and

crafts committee headed by John West. Marjean Cecil, Tularosa, a dollmaker, said, "I'm impressed with the effort of the sponsors. I really feel like the town is behind the fair and (lack of support) has been a problem in the past."

She complimented the booths constructed by the committee and the decorations.

DURING THE three-day show, winning booths were selected on the basis of their decorations, artist's salesmanship and the quality of the work.

First place was Juhree Bassett, El Paso, who displayed wood burn, clay and weavings. Second place was Barbara Castle, Ruidoso, drawings and batik, and her partner, Denise Moore, Ruidoso, weaving and batik.

Third place was Dan and Peg O'Leary, Alameda, New Mexico, wood.

Forest Service conducts controlled burnings

With the threat of fire season diminishing, crews from Smokey Bear Ranger District of Lincoln National Forest have begun controlled burnings, Forest Service fire management officer Steve Makowski said Friday.

Files of collected debris already have

been burned at fuel breaks in Philadelphia Canyon, Little Creek, Blue Lake, Turkey Spring Canyon and Alfred Hale Ridge, but burning in other scheduled areas has been postponed until weather conditions permit.

"The humidity is too low and fuels are drying out," Makowski said, adding the

danger of a prescribed burn becoming a threat to the surrounding forest land is increased.

The burning project will continue when there is 20 percent moisture in the dead fuels, 25 to 40 percent humidity, and wind

is between 4 and 15 miles per hour.

Piles of debris will be burned throughout the summer as conditions permit and a broadcast or running fire will be set this fall as part of the prescribed burning program developed to maintain fuel breaks.

Fort Stanton creek road sees gabion construction

A construction technique used by the ancient Pharaohs of Egypt to build dikes along the Nile is now being used to stop erosion at two sites in the Fort Stanton Reservation.

Using box-like wire "baskets" filled with rocks, the Bureau of Land Management is having erosion control structures built on two sites at the public land located between the towns of Capitan and Lincoln on Highway 380.

"These structures are being used to stop head cutting of the soil and to prevent several roads from being cut by deep erosion," said David Boehler, a civil engineer with the Roswell district office of the BLM.


Boehler said the wire baskets, or gabions, used to build the dam-like structures are improvements on fiber or wickerwork types used in ancient Egypt. He said metal wire baskets were first used in the 1800's.

"They have been used back East for the last 30 years, but are just now being used extensively in the West," Boehler said.

He added the wire gabions have been used by the U.S. Forest Service at Weed, New Mexico, to stop erosion after a forest fire in 1974 and by the New Mexico Highway Department to protect frontage roads along Highway 70 near Ruidoso.

To build the structure, workers first dig a foundation. A strong plastic filter cloth is laid in the foundation to stop fine soil from washing through the gabions. Assembled rectangular wire baskets are laid in place and filled with rocks. Wire ties help keep the baskets in shape, and a top flap is wired shut on each basket. The completed structure is made of layers of these rock-filled baskets resembling building blocks.

"One of the advantages of these is as the earth settles they give with the earth," Boehler said. "And they allow water to seep through instead of building up water pressure from behind as in solid structures."

In most cases these are much less expensive than many other structures.

He said the structures also tend to "blend into the country" because of the use of rocks, and that as the structures catch sediment, vegetation will grow in some of the sections and further stabilize the construction.

The Bureau of Land Management contracted with Bonnell Construction of Glencoe to build the structures at a cost of about \$8,350 plus about \$3,000 of materials furnished by the federal government. Five structures will be built at sites on Fort Stanton Creek Road and Bohito Creek Road.

"These structures will protect not only the roads, but about 4,200 acres of watershed from erosion," Boehler said. Fort Stanton is used jointly by the New Mexico State University agricultural experiment station, the Department of Hospitals and the Department of Corrections.

Vespero returned \$5.80 to win, \$3.40 to place and \$3 to show. The gelding now holds a career bankroll of \$173,075 and obviously looms as the one to beat in next month's trials for the \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity.

Moon Lark, owned by Paul Thomas and Sam Howard of Coppell, Texas, nailed down second in a very game try. He earned \$70,688 while taking his first defeat in four outings. The tote payoffs were \$5.20 and \$4.20. Jackie Martin was up.

Miss Top Dial, ridden by Carl White, sailed in third — three quarter lengths behind Moon Lark. Third was worth \$36,227. Miss Top Dial is owned by Dewey Bird of Stigler, Oklahoma. Leo Craghead is the trainer.

Here's the remaining order of finish, with purse money earned: 4th — Dickey's Firemen, \$18,997; 5th — Miss Royal Cynthia, \$17,230; 6th — Top Deck Bunny, \$16,788; 7th — Say Lady, \$16,346; 8th — Oh Oh Lady Oh, \$15,904; 9th — Azurelena, \$15,904; 10th — Copasetti, \$15,021.

The total cash outlay in Sunday's grand finale was \$377,297, plus a five grand breeding award. Saturday's Rainbow consolation disbursed \$64,503.

HOPEFUL JOURNEY, a filly who usually goes charging to the front, reversed her tactics in Saturday's third running of the First Lady Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

Jockey Carlos Rivas kept Hopeful Journey in third place down the backstretch of the 3/4 furlong sprint, then asked her for her life at the turn for home.

Hopeful Journey took the measure of the pacesetter, Credit Reference, then easily put away a mild threat from the 6-5 favorite, Countess Blade. At the wire, Hopeful Journey was cruising with a comfortable 1 3/4 length lead.

The winning time of 1:06 flat was only four ticks off the track record. Hopeful Journey earned \$4,980 for her owner, B. Raymond Evans of Tulsa, Texas. The payoffs: \$5.80, \$3.20 \$2.20. Credit Reference finished second, paying \$3.20

and \$2.40. Countess Blade, unable to deliver a solid closing salvo, came in third, a nose behind Credit Reference. The show price was \$2.40.

SATURDAY'S PROGRAM, viewed by another hefty crowd, also included the 400 yard Rainbow Futurity Consolation. Six Te, the odds-on favorite, rushed up strongly in the final steps to pull out a half length win in a brisk tailwind clocking of 19.99 seconds. Jerry Nicodemus was up.

Six Te, a gelding, leased by Anne B. Tandy of Ft. Worth, Texas, earned \$14,127 and paid \$3.80 to win. Speck A History was second. Pass Catcher ran third.

AT THE TOP of the stretch, victory appeared well out of Beguiling Kris' reach in Friday's feature sprint at Ruidoso Downs.

But the filly turned on a big stretch run, just as the favorite, Truxton Rounder, began backing up.

As a result, Beguiling Kris managed to stick her nose in front on the last jump. The filly, ridden by Charles Mueller, is owned by Sue Zarges of El Paso, Texas.

Beguiling Kris clocked the 5/8 furlongs in 1:07 1-5 seconds and returned \$9.40, \$3.60 and \$4. Truxton Rounder, after leading almost the entire journey, had to settle for second place money and tote returns of \$3 and \$2.60.

Mister Dunes, a 4-1 shot, stayed well out of the early picture, came on gamely at the end, but ran out of gas and finished third. The show payoff was \$3.

FOGGY KING STEPPED on the gas at the turn for home and rolled to an easy 3/4 length victory in Thursday's feature race at Ruidoso Downs.

The winner, owned by Robert Littlefield of Midland, Texas, clocked the 5/8 furlongs in 1:07 4-5 seconds and returned mutual prices of \$10.80, \$4.80 and \$3.40. Jack Wallace was up.

Bin Dancing, who set the early pace, began giving up the chase at the turn for home and had to settle for a well beaten second. The payoffs were \$4.60 and \$3.60.

Mac's Angel, a 9-2 shot, showed good closing luck to take third — but was a staggering 8 1/2 lengths behind Bin Dancing. The show price was \$3.40.

SANTA FE — Patsy Madrid, a 1973 law school graduate, is now guaranteed a position as the first elected woman district court judge in New Mexico, and she says it "feels great."

Ms. Madrid accomplished the unusual and difficult task of beating an incumbent judge, Maurice Sanchez, in the June primary — and since there's no Republican nominee for the Bernalillo County district court post, she will take office in January.

Mary Walters of Albuquerque has served on the district court bench previously, but she was appointed to fill a vacancy.

Ms. Walters and another woman candidate, Lella Andrews of Santa Fe, are both seeking election to the State Court of Appeals this year.

But Patsy Madrid was already been assured of her judgeship, along with 12 colleagues in the Bernalillo County district. The county, home of Albuquerque, is getting one new position this year to handle juvenile cases, but Ms. Madrid will handle the wide range of civil and criminal cases brought before her.

"I'm ready," she smiled.

Ms. Madrid, who attended the University of New Mexico, then went through law school at UNM and the University of Arizona, said she felt her own presence and that of other women on the bench will "change it for the better."

After practicing law in both Albuquerque and Santa Fe, she said she concluded that she would like to become more actively involved in political matters in order to contribute somehow to improving societal conditions.

"I decided the judiciary was the most important place, and that there should be a woman in this male bastion," she said.

Noting that there are only six women in the entire Federal judicial establishment, she said that "less than 1 percent" figure was clearly inadequate and that more women should be in judges' positions at both the Federal and state levels.

One thing that prompted her to go for the judge's race, she said, was "the fact that judicial races are so invisible to the public" even though judicial decisions powerfully affect people.

"I seek (the effect of decisions) every day," she said. "A judge can be more powerful than a governor and the entire Legislature. They can introduce a law and pass it, and have it thrown out by one judge."

Because judges do have such an effect on the public, and because the selection process is virtually "invisible" to the voters, she suggested that judicial elections should be separated from the general elections process.

"I think they should have election of judges at different times so there'd be more attention paid to it," Ms. Madrid said in an interview.

"Although they say judges don't make law, they have a definite effect on it," she said. "Look at Judge (Edwin) Felner (of Santa Fe). He just decided the price of uranium worldwide, or at least had an effect on it (by his decision on a pricing case between two major uranium producers). You think any governor has that power?"

Ms. Madrid had an uphill battle for the judge's post, and noted that she received no support — and in fact was virtually dismissed as a serious candidate — by much of the Albuquerque news media.

But, she said she expects to be an active judge, working with others who carry the bulk of the caseload in the busy district. "I think those (active judges) are the ones that'll like me," she said.

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


GALE BLOWING

This being an election year, Congress is preoccupied — but not with energy, not with reorganization of the bureaucracy and not even with tax reform. The big issue on Capitol Hill right now is Social Security. The reason, as one House committee staff member put it, is that "a gale is blowing across the country;" the voters are raising Cain over new Social Security taxes, which took a surprisingly big bite out of payroll checks on Jan. 1 under a law approved by Congress back in 1972.

But that was a relatively mild increase compared with what Congress enacted last year to rescue the Social Security system from financial difficulty — a \$27 billion payroll tax hike during the next decade, causing the maximum tax paid by each employer and employee to rise from \$965 to a stunning \$3,045 in 1987. This latest increase is scheduled to go into effect Jan. 1, 1979.

It is a surprising fact that the Social Security tax, which was only \$60 a year in 1940, now exceeds the income tax paid by half the nation's wage earners. At the present rate of increase, the Social Security tax bite is expected to reach an incredible \$6,772 by the year 2000.

Never mind that the newest Social Security tax increase won't hit the taxpayers until next January, well past the November elections; senators and congressmen are scurrying to roll back the payroll taxes because of bitter taxpayer backlash. Most relief proposals under consideration would merely shift the burden from one tax or group to another. For example, House Budget Committee Chairman Robert Gialmo, D-Connecticut, has proposed that a \$7.5 billion reduction in payroll taxes be made up from general revenue, that is to say, higher income taxes.

A more appealing approach has been suggested by Sen. Gaylor Nelson, D-Wisconsin, Rep. Abner Mikva, D-Illinois,

and Gialmo: Strip the Social Security program of its excess baggage, namely Medicare, and assign all Social Security taxes — now more than \$110 billion annually — to Social Security alone. This would return the program to its original New Deal purpose, retirement pension — a cushion for the elderly. By linking payroll taxes solely with pensions, Congress would also provide itself to some degree against voting too-generous pension benefits; the voters will resist pension largesse when they know such increases come from their paychecks.

Meanwhile, there is a growing disposition in the House and Senate for an interim approach to Social Security financing in order to permit four different committees and commissions now studying the problem to recommend long-range solutions.


We think this is the most sensible policy at the moment. Even though the Social Security tax increase enacted in 1977 represented courageous action by Congress, it was, nonetheless, and flawed. A mindless retreat from that action could only compound our Social Security woes.

Congress could make a temporary freeze in Social Security taxes at the present level palatable by insuring that the proposed income tax reduction equal or even exceed the Social Security tax increase of last January. Taxpayers have been particularly infuriated because the wanted tax relief promised them by President Carter proved to be considerably less than the new Social Security taxes that he and Congress have added.

Anyway, Congress should have the benefit of studies now under way before plunging ahead with any substantive changes in the Social Security program. We can hope that these proposals will offer alternatives to taking 14.3 percent of the nation's income for Social Security by 1978. The message that voters are getting across very effectively is that they have already reached the limits of Social Security taxation. —Deming Headlight
