# Dam fund woes aired

on borrowed money.

On motion by trustee Frank Sayner, with second by trustee George White, village attorney Ron Harris was instructed to prepare the ordinance to set the tap fee at \$250, of which \$50 would be deposited in a reserve fund for water exploration. Present meter deposit fees, or estimated two months billing charges, would remain in effect. The council was polled, with trustees Sayner, White, Ab Gunter and Sherman Atwood voting "aye". Mayor Davis recorded an "aye" vote.

In other business the trustees:

- Withheld payment of a \$35.53 lighting bill for the Little League Baseball pending determining if this was a one-time charge. The village had agreed to provide free water for the Little League field, not electricity.
- Deferred action on a request by Karen Lafferty to use Two Rivers Park September 2 for a Marantha Mountain Concert, due to the question on the sale of records by performers. Lafferty was advised to check with village attorney Harris on this matter.
- Accepted replats of Lots 40, 41, 42, Block E, Singing Pines Subdivision, making two lots out of three.
- Accepted replats of Lots 1, 2 and 3, Block B, Golf Course Estates, making two

lots out of three:

- Rejected replats of Lots 1 and 2, Block 11, Cree Meadows Country Club Subdivision, as rejected by the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z); The trustees will determine the reasons for P&Z's refusal to accept the replat, as it seems to meet existing criteria.
- Expressed no opposition to a request by developer B.H. Buchanan, Ruidoso and Dallas, Texas, to install a sewer lift station in a proposed subdivision on E 1/2 NE 1/4, N 1/2 SE 1/4, Section 11, Township 11 S, Range 13 E, in the Gavilan Canyon/Hull Road area. Buchanan advised the trustees he will seek annexation of the property at the August 29 meeting.
- Were advised by Jim Wills, Boyle Engineering, Albuquerque, that a survey of village streets to aid in the formation of paving districts is underway.
- Authorized Collins Engineering, Ruidoso, to conduct a topographic survey of the Hull Road/Country Club Estates area, to aid in applying for state park fund grants, at an estimated cost of \$200-\$300.
- Approved the appointment of DeeAnn Woodridge to the Cemetery Board.
- Were advised that Ab Gunter had been elected president of Eagle Creek Inter-Community Water Supply Association, Incorporated, at a meeting

earlier in the evening; and that George White had been named secretary/treasurer with Valton Hall Capitan, elected vice president.

## School bus routes receive state approval

The Ruidoso Board of Education received approval of all bus routes in the school district from the state Department of Education at their Tuesday evening meeting.

With the approval, all children in the district will continue to be eligible for bus transportation to school and funding will be allocated to the district.

The memo from Bill Loshbough, director of school transportation division, state Department of Education, said the district had been designated as a "hazardous walking conditions area" and children would be exempt from a regulation requiring kindergarten through sixth grade students living within a mile of their school to walk, seventh through ninth grade students living within a mile and a half to walk and high school students living within two miles to walk.

Ruidoso School District was designated as hazardous to children walking to school because "all roads except Sudderth Drive, Mechem Drive and Highway 70 qualify as mountainous roads with little or no off-road walking space available and traffic volume exceeding 60 vehicles per hour."

Also, "highway 70 and Mechem Drive have less than 3.5 feet of walking space outside curbed roadway on at least one side of the roadway and Sudderth drive has no pedestrian crossings in existence and no controlled intersections."

Other factors were taken into consideration by the State Department of Education when they declared Ruidoso as "a hazardous walking condition area," including start of the racing season and subsequent increased volume of traffic while schools are in session and icy roads in the winter.

In other business Tuesday evening, the board:

- Received correspondence from Governor Jerry Apodaca on the possibility of motorcycle outlaws coming to Ruidoso this summer.
- Apodaca wrote "I can appreciate your concern" assuring the board "the Criminal Justice Council will provide the necessary support" if outlaws come to Ruidoso.
- He added law enforcement officers "have been directed to take action deemed necessary" but warned "to leave the law in their hands, not vigilante groups."
- Received a letter from assistant Attorney General Harvey Fruman, also on the possibility of motorcycle outlaws coming to Ruidoso.
- Fruman expressed his concern and that of Toney Anaya, Attorney General, assuring the board their office would "continue to coordinate efforts" with law enforcement agencies and warning vigilante groups would be "an obstruction and undermining" to their efforts.
- Approved hiring of Evelyn Dobbs as secretary to the high school counselor, and accepted with regret the resignation of Carol Hubbard, high school English teacher.
- Approved changing location of the September through December board meetings. The board will meet at 8 p.m., September 12 in the high school cafeteria, 8 p.m., October 10 in the mid school media center, 7 p.m., November 14 in the White Mountain cafeteria, and at 7 p.m., December 12 in the Nob Hill cafeteria.
- Voted to call for bids on the Jeep built by the power Mechanics II class last year.
- It's a recall for bids," Pat Valliant, Superintendent of Schools, said.
- The jeep was awarded to Dr. Jim Beall, who declined it after bidding. The ten percent submitted with the bid was returned to Dr. Beall, who then donated it to the class fund.
- Bids will be opened at the September 12 meeting. The minimum bid is \$2,600.
- An annual self-supporting project, another Jeep can only be built next year if this one is sold.
- Heard a report from Valliant that an in-service training day for all teachers will

be held at 8 a.m., August 28 in the White Mountain cafeteria. In-service training days also will be held August 29 and 30 in the teachers' respective buildings.

Two half day work sessions will be held August 31 and September 1 and classes begin September 5, the day after Labor Day.

- Heard a report from Valliant the high school cafeteria storeroom and walk-in freezer were broken into and a total of \$1,769.28 in foodstuffs taken.
- Valliant said he was looking into the cost of purchase and installation of floodlights.
- Heard a report on increases in social security rates and maximum.
- Approved checks.
- Approved bus school operators' contracts, pending signing by board secretary Stormy Edwards, who was unable to attend.
- Approved lunch and special milk applications and signed a commodity agreement for government subsidies.

The next meeting will be at 8 p.m., September 12 in the high school cafeteria.





## Environment influences Wierwille's pottery, art

Landscape and especially the mountains of Ruidoso are an overpowering influence on the work of potter Tim Wierwille.

"I have no real background in art and so I'm influenced by the environment," he said.

"Most artists' work reflects the environment, to what extent it is a reflection varies, but it has had a great influence on my work."

Possibly Wierwille's best known work is the White Mountain collector series of carved mountain designs and the Desert Yucca series of applied desert designs.

"New Mexico's landscape is so overpowering, it's hard to escape its influence," he said.

He also hopes to use his environment in mixing glazes for his pottery.

"I use some local materials in glazes, like volcanic ash in my Valley of the Fires glaze, and I've found a possibility for a glaze ingredient at the old Parson's Mine."

Most of the ingredients for glazes and clay come in large quantities and he mixes them from a variety of "recipes."

"It's almost a chemistry. The mixes have to be the correct formula or a glaze will slip or pots explode," he said.

Wierwille became interested in pottery or ceramics after taking an elective course his last semester in college. He received a BA in history and a teaching certificate from Miami University in Oxford, Ohio, but decided to become a craftsman in New Mexico instead of teaching.

"It's a matter of being in the right place at the right time. I got an apprenticeship with master potter Frank Willett in Santa Fe and then decided to set up a studio of my own."

He and his wife, Nan, who is a fourth grade teacher at White Mountain Middle School, moved to Ruidoso three years ago and set up White Mountain Pottery on Highway 37.

Wierwille mainly does wheel work specializing in custom sinks for homes, dinnerware sets, lamps, canister sets and odds and ends.

He has taught classes in ceramics and attended many art shows, but has now

decided to work exclusively from his studio.

"I decided my priority is my work and through the shop I can concentrate on it best."

In the past, he has participated in craft shows in 28 to 30 states and given demonstrations for countless numbers of people, especially kids.

"One of the most interesting demonstrations was at a prison," he said. "They reacted favorably, never having realized they could make a living out of clay and derive such satisfaction with creating with

their hands."


He said security measures were strict at the prison and "I went through a couple barbed wire fences."

Although he enjoyed shows and demonstrations, he has found he is busy in his studio.

"We're fortunate to be in Ruidoso. The community is very supportive."

"Ruidoso is able to contribute to artists who in turn are able to contribute to the community."

"More and more artists are moving to Ruidoso," he said.

## Riddle of the Ridley

This summer, some 2,000 baby Kemp's Ridley turtles, the size of silver dollars, hatched out at Padre Island National Seashore and headed for the waters of the Gulf of Mexico — the beginning of a long and strange journey.

For when they slipped into the warm waters of the Texas Gulf between Corpus Christi and Brownsville, Texas, they hit a detour sign in the form of a net. They were scooped up by National Park Service biologists and taken to laboratories of the National Marine Fisheries Service in Galveston, Texas.

At Galveston the young Ridelys will be raised for six months to a year and then returned to the Gulf waters to spend all but a few hours of the rest of their lives.

Why are these hatchling turtles being raised in captivity during their first year of life?

It's part of a scientific project to try to save this species which is the most endangered of all sea turtles. At present, the Ridley nests in large numbers only on a stretch of beach in Mexico called Rancho Nuevo. And there the population of nesting females has been drastically reduced by egg poachers.

In the late 1940s as many as 40,000 female turtles were noted on the Rancho Nuevo beach in a single day. In the recent past only about 2,000 appear in an entire nesting season, according to Roland Wauer, National Park Service scientist.

So Wauer and scientists from several agencies — the National Park Service, the National Marine Fisheries Service, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, the Coast Guard, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and the Government of Mexico — put their heads together to try and figure out a way to save the Ridley from extinction.

They decided to try to renew the

Rancho Nuevo colony in Mexico and, as insurance, establish a second colony at the protected national seashore in Texas, where the turtle has nested in small numbers in the past.

At Rancho Nuevo, patrols were set up to protect the eggs from predators and humans. This summer some 90,000 hatchlings were returned to the sea.

Scientists knew the turtles had to be imprinted or programmed to return to Padre Island. Thus the eggs given to the United States by Mexico were allowed to hatch at Padre Island and the baby turtles then made the walk down to the beach and into the surf. This exercise hopefully helped the turtles decide that Padre Island is their home.

Most of the baby turtles fall victim to predators early in life and the mother hen scientists weren't about to have their newly-imprinted turtles eaten. That's the reason the turtles were taken to Galveston to grow until they are big enough to withstand marine predators.

If all goes as the scientists hope, visitors to Padre Island National Seashore may have a chance in a few years to see female Ridelys making their trek up the beach to lay eggs. The turtles never leave the water except to nest.

Meanwhile, activities such as camping, swimming, fishing, sunbathing, shell collecting and people watching will continue as usual at the barrier reef island which attracts nearly a million visitors a year.

The Ruidoso Police Department has made use of foot patrols in the midtown area this summer to supplement the motorized patrol, Chief of Police Paul

Lukens said Tuesday.

"We utilize foot patrols occasionally for specific enforcement during certain periods," he said, adding the officers had been fairly effective enforcing laws pertaining to drinking in public or in parked cars, disorderly conduct and theft from automobiles.

In the program, which began July 7, four officers travel in two pairs, patrolling the midtown area.

"The number varies, sometimes we have more patrolling," he said.

Feedback from merchants in that area "has been good" and the "presence (of the officers) has been a deterrent" to crimes.

# Bonito firemen test new truck

An acceptance test was conducted and official county approval given Monday to the new Alto-Angus Bonito Volunteer Fire Department truck, Fire Chief John Hall said.

The truck is a Class A pumper with a range of 750 gallons per minute, capacity for carrying 1,000 feet of two and a half inch hose and 1,000 feet of one and a half inch hose and standard accessories.

The truck was delivered Sunday and a celebration with over 100 persons attending was held at High Country Lodge in Alto. Food was furnished by those attending.





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# Inside the Capitol

**SANTA FE** — As another academic year nears for New Mexico's public school system, long-time school finance chief Harry Wugalter recalls that the financial operations of the schools used to be a lot different.

Once, the state sales tax — then at 2 percent and now changed to a "gross receipts tax" and hiked to 4 percent — was called the "school tax."

Money that came into the treasury in Santa Fe from the tax was earmarked for the public schools. And it was sent back only during the nine-month school year, not year-round.

"I remember when we couldn't send the payroll out until we found out if enough of the 2 percent sales tax had come in," Wugalter said in an interview with "Inside the Capitol."

The Legislature changed that system in 1962.

Now, during the summer months, Wugalter's agency goes through the laborious process of calculating property tax levies for each of the 88 school districts in the state. The sales tax is no longer earmarked for the schools. So each district gets an allocation based on the overall funding appropriation from the Legislature and on its specific property tax share from the local level.

The school share of the state property tax assessment is uniform statewide — 8.925 mills. But some school districts have outstanding bond issues for which there are property tax levies. And each district has its allocation based on local assessed property valuations and local requirements.

So the levies are different for each district.

Once those computations are made, the figures are consolidated with property tax computations made by the Local Govern-

ment Division of the Department of Finance and Administration and those for state government itself, and a single rate is arrived at.

These rates, Wugalter said, are essential for each mortgage company in the state to determine escrow requirements and for property tax payments.

"This task is very demanding, little publicized and most essential," Wugalter said.

He added that some states still distribute their state-level funds to school districts on a nine-month basis so that the local schools must borrow money "in anticipation of the tax receipts coming back."

The New Mexico system, he said, "is intended to free the boards of education from the burden of money-gathering."

For years, Wugalter was a division chief within the Department of Finance and Administration in charge of public school finance.

But since April 1, he has been one of 12 cabinet secretaries under the government reorganization plan accomplished by Governor Jerry Apodaca. Under the new system, Wugalter heads a department which handles not only public school finance but an array of museums and historical and cultural institutions.

The new department is called the Department of Educational Finance and Cultural Affairs.

Asked what it's like to face a new school year with the new system in operation, Wugalter replied that there are "no negative differences" but that there is a "positive difference."

He said he's able to coordinate educational policies better with other governmental operations.

"I'm really pleased with the cabinet form of government," he said, "because it gives you access to the proper people. It broadens our ability to coordinate."

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## Clipped Comment

"EACH ONE OF US was cautious not to promise things we could not subsequently deliver."

These were the words of president Jimmy Carter as he summarized the vaporous accomplishments of the two-day international economic summit conference in Bonn.

Yet the president had just finished assuring the western industrialized nations that the United States would lessen its dependence on foreign oil imports by reducing consumption — which was to be accomplished by raising the price of oil in this country to the "world market" level as determined by the OPEC oil cartel.

President Carter raised the faint hope, however brief, that he might have been changing his view on domestic energy matters. In reality, all he and Congress have to do is exactly nothing for the next year, and oil controls will expire. The market could then adjust accordingly.

But he has made clear since his return that he still wants to raise the "price" of domestically produced crude to that of imported crude by imposing horrendous taxes to make up the difference.

Which was a promise he never should have made in Germany, because he can't deliver on it. Apparently the power and prestige of the presidency have interfered with Mr. Carter's perception-of-reality. Once regarded as an astute politician with almost supernatural insights, he since has fallen to the level of garden variety politics, whose thoughts and utterances are not inspired but demagogic.

Ironically, the U.S. oil and gas industry, which Mr. Carter seems almost to hate, is willing to accept taxation that would preclude its distributing windfall profits to the stockholders if prices should be set free.

Spokesmen have said time and again

that they would agree to allow excess profits to be taxed away UNLESS these profits were plowed back into investments to develop more energy for the nation.

That is EXACTLY what the president and the congress should be seeking: If we stop subsidizing consumption and increase investment in expanding supply, we can maximize our own resources and effectively achieve minimal outside dependence.

If these are not the objectives of the administrative and legislative branches of our federal government, then some changes need to be made. —"Hop" Graham, Lovington Daily Leader



## Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

**PEDRO BENITEZ** guided What A Tale to a breezing two length victory against five grand claimers Thursday and became a journeyman rider in the process. Benitez chalked up his 40th career win (and his ninth at the meet) in the effort and thereby lost his "bug" or five pound apprentice allowance. What A Tale, who went off at near 4-1 returned \$9.20.

**DAVE MORRIS**, a leading rider at the Ruidoso oval for many years in the early sixties died last Wednesday apparently from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. The 33-year-old ex-jockey, who continued to ride at the mountain track until this year, was a native of Billings, Montana. He had worked at the Ruidoso track this summer galloping horses. Funeral services were held at Ruidoso last weekend.

**AN UNFORTUNATE TURN** of events took place for Robert Hillin when he claimed Father's Bid from Saturday's eighth race for \$4,000. Father's Bid ran third most of the way in the 5 1/2 furlong sprint, but faded to fifth, and after crossing the finish line he collapsed and died. Racing rules specify that the person claiming a horse becomes the new owner as soon as the horse leaves the starting gate. The previous owner, in this case, was Janice Pool of Brownwood, Texas.

**POCKET COIN**, the outstanding two-year-old thoroughbred, remains undefeated at the current meeting after chalking up his fourth straight win in Friday's trials for the Rio Grande Futurity. The Michael Welch charge turned in a powerful performance (winning by 4 1/4 lengths) to easily qualify for the \$33,480 finale August 13, and looks a prime prospect for the winner's share of \$16,740. The colt already

has two stakes victories to his credit at the meet. He's owned by Melvin and Ernest Riggs of Ft. Stockton, Texas.

**OTHER QUALIFIERS** for the Rio Grande finale include Happy Irishman, (who challenged Pocket Coin in his trial stronger than any previous foe), Peep A Jeep, Trippy Dip, Bin Scoutin, Dandy Binge, Ailegiance, Mysiaswadancer, Dave's Turn and Ernest Scout.

**CASEY'S SHADOW**, a real racehorse named after the fictional movie hero by one of his owners, narrowly missed his first taste of victory Wednesday. The two-year-old gelding, the property of the G. M. C. Estable, Limited, apparently had to prove his movie star kinship to the fans since he went off at 41-1. But the youngster came on strongly in the four-furlong test and took second for a \$29.40 place return. The film, Casey's Shadow, was made on location at Ruidoso Downs in 1976 and 1977.

**AN OFF TRACK** may be a deterrent to some flashy racehorses but a demonstration by Cash In Hand in Wednesday's eighth race proved not all horses dislike the stuff. Due to heavy rains, the track was labeled sloppy when the horses broke from the gate in the seven furlong bout, but Cash In Hand romped happily around the oval with no trouble, apparently enjoying the mess. She distanced competitors completely by close to 15 lengths and returned \$27.40 from 12-1 odds. Pedro Benitez was aboard the filly.

**BEING THE ONLY ONE** to win the Big Q must make a better feel pretty superior to his fellow patrons. And that's just what happened to one lucky ticketholder Wednesday when he combined 8/7 (Cash In Hand/Miss Fairway) in the eighth race with 10/3 (Kernie's Million/K.J. Bar) in the ninth and walked away with the whole pot of \$12,324.

**THE FAMILIAR FACE** of Ed Beard,

former publicity assistant at Sunland Park and Ruidoso Downs, turned up at the mountain oval over the weekend. Ed, looking prosperous and well tanned, wasn't just your average visitor either. Rather, he was in town on a vacation from his current job as an engineer in distant Saudi Arabia. But he says he's yet to make money on the camel races.

**MEGAHERTZ**, well known at the Ruidoso oval for his two-year-old performances when he took fourth in the Kansas Futurity, second in the Rainbow and eighth in the All-American, died at Horse Shoe Hills Ranch where he was standing in the Ft. Worth area. The valuable stallion, who accrued earnings of \$160,772 in his racing career, was named National Two-Year-Old Champion Colt in 1976. He apparently died of a ruptured intestine.

**THE DRAW FOR** the big races at Ruidoso Downs always has the trainers involved waiting anxiously to hear what post position their charge receive. And it's interesting to note that No. 9 could be the lucky number. The winner of this year's Kansas Futurity (Gentlemen's Feature), Rainbow Derby (Biffy Pass) and Rainbow Futurity (Vespero) all left the No. 9 post on their way to victory. Besides that, Hot Idea (last year's All-American Futurity-winner) also wore the No. 9 colors.

**MEDLEY GLASS** charted her fourth win and her first stakes victory at the meeting in Saturday's Three Bars Handicap. The filly by Raise Your Glass out of Sprint Medley took home a paycheck of \$6,660. The only other four time winners at the meet are Au Vin, Brass Road, Real Easy Jet and Pocket Coin.

**A DEAD HEAT FOR WIN** resulted from the eighth race, the first half of the Big Q, Saturday when the stewards discerned no margin between Three Taps (No. 5) and Pappa Top (No. 2) at the end of a 5 1/2 furlong duel. Salustio Burgos was aboard Pappa Top and Don Howard guided Three Taps as they met at the wire and returned \$9.20 and \$6.20 respectively. The 2/5 combination matched with 8/10 (Frosty's Azurett/Bo Halo) in the ninth produced a Big Q return of \$2,316.40.

**IN CLAIMING CIRCLES**, R.F. Wilkinson and Raymond Rose of Ruidoso, had one of their horses, Greclan Jeannie, purchased from them in Friday's fourth race for a \$2,000 price. But they didn't take long to recover since they claimed another horse in the same race, Mongo's Mile, for the same price.

**IN STEWARD'S RULINGS:** Jockey Carlos Rivas took a \$50 bite for making a frivolous claim of foul after the fifth race August 3. Jockey Floyd Cambell was fined \$25 for failing to appear before the Board of Stewards to view the video replay of the previous day's races. Jockey Willie Lovell was levied \$50 for failing to control Jet Comanche leaving the gate in the ninth race July 30.

**TRAINER ORLANDO MARTINEZ** was fined \$25 and groom Frank Baker was fined \$100 both for participating in an altercation in the paddock. Groom Robert Bahr has been ruled off the grounds for objectionable conduct.

## Jockey/Trainer of the week

Don Howard became the first apprentice at the meet to cop the Jockey-of-the-Week honor at Ruidoso Downs.

The young rider turned in a fine performance of five wins, two seconds and four-thirds from 26 starts in the five day racing week.

But he faced a neck-and-neck battle the entire time with Carlos Rivas who had the title a few weeks ago. Rivas also had a weekend tally of 5-2-4 but Howard edged him with a 19.2 win percentage compared to Rivas' 17.2.

Howard began the onslaught with two wins Thursday, both longshots. He toured the winner's circle first with I'm Capricious (\$21.40) in the ninth and repeated on Corn Chip (\$25.40) in the 11th.

He brought in Truckin Tootie (\$34.60) in Friday's seventh race for seven grand claimers and Saturday battled in a dead heat for win aboard Three Taps.

His final triumph came astride All's Clear in Sunday's 5 1/2 furlong ninth race for allowance sprinters. Howard has yet to make the top ten on the overall standings but the young helmsman is only four places off.

His complete tally stands at 23-22-22 from 180 trips to the post for an overall win percentage of 12.8.

Rivas holds down the 10th slot in the overall picture with a 29-23-26 rating from 194 starts for a 14.9 win percentage.

Gary Sumpter still ranks as the leading rider with an overall record of 45-37-45 from 294 mounts for a 15.3 percentage. But Charles Mueller, who scored four victories this weekend, is breathing down his neck with 44 wins to his credit.

H.C. WERNER JR. walked away with

the Trainer-of-the-Week title for the fourth time at the meet. The leading conditioner sent out 20 charges and ended up with four wins and two seconds.

He maintained his control of the overall chart with a tally of 36-31-21 from 205 starts for a 17.6 win percentage.

Bob Arnett, J.B. Montgomery, Whitey Nolen and Thomas Riley nabbed three wins each.

Racing action continues through Saturday with first post set at 1:30 p.m. Twelve-race cards are on tap each day.

Saturday's agenda highlights three-year-olds and older in the four furlong Ruidoso Speed Handicap for a \$10,000-added purse.

Sunday, with the starting time moved back to 1 p.m., freshman thoroughbreds take to the turf in the six furlong Rio Grande Futurity. The gross purse is \$33,480 and the winner takes home a \$16,740 share.

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## Entomologist warns film on bees very misleading

In the great disaster-flick tradition of *Jaws*, *The Swarm* portrays honey bees not as "angels of agriculture," but as demons of doom — the so-called "killer bees." "The film is pure fiction, but is being promoted as fact," said John Durkin, Extension entomologist at New Mexico State University.

"Even the title, bears little relation to the reality of beekeeping. Swarming honey bees are usually so gentle that they can be captured without wearing protective clothing or using smoke," Durkin said.

The stars of *The Swarm* are Africanized honey bees, a hybrid cross between African bees and European bees like those found in the United States.

African bees were brought to South America in hopes they would improve honey production under those tropical conditions. The European bees just weren't producing in equatorial Brazil.

"The African bees surpassed expectations, Durkin said. They crossed with the European bees, producing an especially adapted hybrid which unfortunately retained the objectional aggressive behavior of the African bee."

It's this hybrid — the Africanized honey bee — which has invaded territory in the Amazon basin where no honey bees existed before. At first they stung the people who had little knowledge of honey bee behavior.

"In succeeding years, however, beekeepers have learned to manage these bees effectively and honey production per colony has increased," Durkin said.

The Africanized honey bees have been reported as far north as Caracas, Venezuela, still over 2,300 miles from the Texas border. "Their movement of 200 miles per year is probably exaggerated," Durkin said.

It will be ten years at least before the bees will make their way up the Central American isthmus. Meanwhile, the United

States Department of Agriculture has tightened its surveillance to prevent the unauthorized entry of any honey bee into this country.

"The Africanized honey bee will be more of a threat to the economic health of the beekeeping industry than to public health. The public might be adversely affected by scare tactics like *The Swarm*," Durkin said.

"Because of the movie, people might demand stricter regulations on

beekeeping which could be a potential disaster for agriculture and our food supply. Over ninety crops benefit from honey bee pollination and one-third of the American diet is affected by insect pollination," the entomologist said.

"The honey bee will become increasingly important since it is the only insect man can rear, transport and selectively use in this

vital pollination activity to help increase farm yields."

Durkin said, "The *Swarm* is another brick in the wall preventing communication between the general public, farmers and beekeepers. Hopefully it won't take a severe food crisis to show how valuable bees and the beekeeping industry really are to this country."

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## News from the County Agent

Fort Stanton will have a field day August 30. Among the subjects to be discussed are range management, cow calf operations and mule deer ecology.

The field day will begin with registration and coffee at the Bonita Corral at 8:30 a.m., and last until noon. The entrance to the ranch is four and one-half miles east of Captain on Highway 380. Turn south on Highway 214 and travel one mile to the Bonita Corral turnout. During the field tour, participants can inspect range research, including the effect of drought on blue grama, rangeland fertilization, and snakeweed, pinon and juniper control.

Research reports on cow calf operations will include range supplementation of yearlings on grass and mature cows on range. Other range research will include reports on comparing early and late calving dates as well as estrus synchronization and artificial insemination of two year old heifers. Other topics to be discussed during the tour will be mule deer ecology, cancer eye treatment and NMSU's range assessment team.

The 26,000 acre ranch has been operated since 1963 by New Mexico State University's (NMSU) Agricultural Experiment Station. After the morning tour, lunch will be provided by Worley Mills at the ranch's headquarters located near the Fort Stanton Hospital.

The dedication of the new laboratory will take place at 1:15 p.m., at the ranch headquarters. L.S. Pope, dean and director of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, will give the opening remarks and then chair the dedication ceremonies. The speakers include Gerald W. Thomas, president of NMSU; Arthur

Zimmerman, state director of the Bureau of Land Management; and keynote speaker, W.T. (Dub) Berry Jr., vice president of Western Farm Management, Denver, Colorado.

Ranchers are invited to visit the new laboratory both before and after the dedication ceremonies and see the research displays.

Screw worms are being reported in many areas of New Mexico. Livestock owners should take precautions to keep the screw worm from infesting his animals. If possible the working of livestock should be postponed until fall. Livestock should be sprayed if the flies become too numerous and any wounds should be treated with a fly repellent. With everyone helping, the worst screw worm infestation in several years can be slowed down and excess losses prevented. If you find any worms in wounds be sure to send a sample in for identification.

Paving the patio ground surrounding shade trees may endanger them. Such paving will prevent water, nutrients and air from reaching a tree's feeding root zone unless loose joints or holes are left through the flagstones or cement. The large roots close to the tree trunk do not need water, so don't be fooled by them. Many people think that watering these visible roots will feed the tree, but these roots just hold the tree, it's the smaller feeder roots at the drip area edge that are important. This zone covers the same area underground as the foliage above ground.

The basin of large ornamentals or fruit trees extends to about eight to ten feet in diameter. Be sure to get the whole tree's root zone watered. To help hold and conserve water, spread an organic mulch over the soil.

# Public land legislation, predator control discussed by sheep men

"More regulation is just a fact of life for ranchers," Charlie Lee, an Alamogordo rancher, told sheep men at the Sheep and Wool School, July 26-28 at New Mexico State University. Lee encouraged all ranchers to get involved in forming the regulations they would be living with in the future.

Lee focused on the Grazing Fee Bill which will be considered by the United States Senate Resources Committee August 9. The bill, which already passed the House, clarifies details of the Organic Act.

In brief, the bill would tie grazing fees to cost of production and current livestock

prices. It would also provide more flexibility in range management, a ten year lease, funds for range improvements, and changes in the wild horse disposal regulations.

"This bill is really of prime importance to the ranchers," Lee said. He continued by explaining that the general public would also benefit from better range and wildlife conditions.

Lack of flexibility in range management was one of the biggest problems Lee said New Mexico ranchers now have on federally leased lands.

He pointed out that under the Organic Act, the Secretary of the Interior and his

field representatives can make no allowances for variations in vegetation, weather or grazing practices. One blanket plan has to fit everyone, Lee said.

The blanket plan is usually a four pasture system which Lee said is impractical in New Mexico. "That system can ruin you since we graze year around in this state," Lee said.

Under the proposed Grazing Fee Bill guidelines, a variety of range management systems would be allowed, provided that the range remains healthy. In fact, ranchers with a history of good management may even be rewarded with a lower grazing fee.

The ten year lease provision of the Grazing Fee Bill would provide stability and encourage even more range improvements, according to Lee. He explained that ten year leases would be granted to everyone and revoked only if the land was being taken out of grazing, needed for military purposes, or required a shorter lease for good range management purposes.

Lee stated that the Carter administration opposes the adjustable grazing fee. "But this is not a case of a willing buyer and a willing seller," Lee said. "We don't have any choice. We have to pay the price or go out of business — there are no alternatives."

Finally the program speaker touched on the current controversy over the definition of a wilderness area. He said that ranchers could live with the original definition of "not less than 5,000 acres of land untrammeled by man, with no permanent structures or human inhabitants."

However he said that there is now a movement to change the definition so that improvements like a fence, windmills, water tanks and even some roads would be overlooked. While a wilderness designation would not necessarily stop grazing on a piece of land, it would mean that a rancher would have to haul all equipment and feeds on horseback and could not use a tractor to build a tank or well.

However, Lee encouraged ranchers to remain calm and try to work with the agencies and groups involved.

"After all, the final decision lies with the Congress and there is plenty of time. So let's sit down and talk with these people. I've always found that our goals aren't so far apart," Lee said.

Sheep men at the school spent most of their time learning about new ways to control coyotes.

"We certainly have to come up with something," Madlyn Cauhape, 1978 president of the New Mexico Wool Association, said. "I've had more problems with predators this year than ever before. They have taken our most effective control tools away from us."

Samuel Linhart, a wildlife biologist with the Fish and Wildlife Service, presented an overview of current predator control research.

He showed large tranquilizing tablets which can be attached to steel traps. As the trapped animal instinctively snaps at the trap, it eats enough of the tranquilizer to knock it out for at least 24 hours. Therefore, it is not hurt by fighting the trap.

Researchers are also working on scent or sonic attractants for the traps. These attractants would specifically attract coyotes.

Lethal neck collars are being tested on sheep. Since the coyote always goes for the neck, this could prove very effective if a fast, safe poison can be found.

In the meantime, other researchers are trying adverse conditioning. Chemically treated meat which makes the coyote very sick is wrapped in sheep skin. It is hoped that after recovering from the bait, the very thought of lamb chops will make the coyote ill, Linhart said.

Trained guard dogs have also been used with some success. While they cut lamb losses by 30 to 70 percent, there was some problem with dogs harassing the sheep and even developing a taste for lamb.

However, it was the electric fence that attracted most of the attention at the school. Several styles, ranging in cost from \$100 to \$800 per mile were demonstrated.

The most effective fence is a six foot tall, 13 strand wire fence. In fact, in United States Department of Agriculture research in Dubois, Idaho, the fence was 100 percent effective.

The fence consists of twelve live and ground wires, alternately spaced up the pole. When a coyote tries to climb or jump over the fence, he receives a shock, even though he is not touching the ground.

On the outside of the fence, the 13th live wire is set six inches high and eight inches away from the fence. This prevents the coyote from digging under the fence.

While totally effective, Mrs. Cauhape said that such a fence was too expensive for most New Mexico wool growers who already had fences established. However modifications using some electric fencing is quite likely, she said.

These modifications would cost about \$100 a mile. The simplest design calls for a "hot" wire one foot in front of the fence. This discourages digging and even some jumping coyotes. Ranchers may spend a little more to add a hot wire across the top of the fence to also stop the jumpers.

To power the fences, sheep men saw new water, wind and solar powered generators. All three units could power about 10 miles of wire and ranged in price from \$100 to \$325.

## Rabies warning issued by state veterinarian

New Mexico residents need to be aware of the potential threat of contracting rabies, according to a state health official.

Dr. O.J. Rollag, veterinarian with the state Health and Environment Department's Health Services Division, says that skunks are the primary carriers of rabies in New Mexico. He said public staffers report nine rabid skunks found in the state this year.

foxes are the second and third most frequent carriers of rabies.

These three animals have accounted for 24 rabies-related deaths in the United States since 1951.

"People should be aware, however, that rabies is not limited to wild animals," Rollag said. "For example, in a single day last summer two pet skunks were diagnosed as being rabid in Oklahoma."

Fifty percent of all rabies cases occur in wild skunks, Rollag reports. Bats and

Dogs and cats also can contract rabies. Rollag warns that a person bitten by an animal suspected of having the disease should wash the wound thoroughly with soap and water and contact a physician.

The animal should be contained, if possible, so that conclusive tests for rabies can be made.

One way to help avoid rabies, Rollag says, is to vaccinate pets against the disease. State law requires that all dogs and cats over three months of age be vaccinated yearly.

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
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# One jockey's fight to the top

When a young man meets a young girl, the world becomes an enchanted place. Each tells the other sweet, magical, enchanted things.

In the case of Bruce Pilkenton, now 18, the dreamy magical words he heard were: "You know, you're so small, you ought to be a jockey."

On the surface, this line is bereft of romance. But it certainly had magic — when you consider that just a few weeks ago Bruce Pilkenton, this bright-eyed lad from Houston, Texas, did what every red-blooded 18-year-old dreams of doing. He rode Biffy Pass to a neck win in the \$16,500 Rainbow Quarter Horse Derby at Ruidoso Downs.

All emotional and psychological benefits aside, this Derby win is quite a score. Not only does Bruce now have a fast-spreading reputation as a rider of quarter horses (pretty good for a fellow practically no one had heard of in these parts until a month or so ago) — but he also got \$17,902 with which to feather his nest.

And it all goes back to that time several years ago when this sweet young thing told Bruce he might do well riding horses. The very idea was no shock to his nervous system, since, being light of frame (85

pounds or so), he'd done much pleasure riding. "I'd been doing it ever since I was five years old," he says. "But I never thought I'd want to do it for a living."

So it turns out this young lady's father, John Tilley, trains horses around the Texas bush track circuit, and one thing led to another, and Bruce found himself standing before Tilley, petitioning for work. "Want to try it?" Tilley asked. Bruce responded, "I'm game."

Tilley led out a pony horse, put on an exercise saddle, lifted the youngster aboard, and the class work began. "I started off right at the bottom," Bruce recalls.

He got a lot of after school work, riding at Texas tracks. Later, he hooked up with trainer Danny O'Quinn, and last year expanded his horizon into Louisiana. "I was starting to make a pretty good living," Bruce goes on.

One of O'Quinn's horses was Good Ole Joe, and when that one was dispatched to Ruidoso last summer, Bruce went along. The youngster stayed in Ruidoso about a month, but only got to ride about six or seven horses. "I was getting pretty sick of the place. I wanted to get back home where I could ride, where people knew me."

But one really bright spot was the fact he

qualified Good Ole Joe for the finals of the \$780,000 All-American Derby. "We had the ninth fastest time. In the finals, I couldn't help get some butterflies, especially when we were behind the gate, getting ready to load. We didn't figure to have much chance, and we ran ninth."

Relieved that the ordeal was over, Bruce headed back home, set up shop at Delta Downs in Louisiana, and wound up among the leaders in quarter horse competition. "I would have been the top quarter horse jockey, but before the meet ended, a horse flipped in the gate, and I broke my right wrist. So I couldn't ride for a spell, and another jockey caught me in the standings. I wound up the second leading rider."

About that time, trainer Ronnie Ferguson asked Bruce to come up to Ruidoso with him, and ride first call. "I'd ridden a gelding called Come On Bruce for Ronnie, and he saw I could ride a little," Bruce says.

For a while, Bruce pondered whether to leave the warm security of his home turf, in favor of again beating his head against a stone wall at Ruidoso Downs. "People thought I was crazy to go back to Ruidoso. But I wanted to see if I could make it at Ruidoso. I figured if I could make it at Ruidoso, I could make it anywhere. I'm not married, so I said to myself, 'If you're ever going to go to Ruidoso, now's the time.'"

Included in the Ferguson stable is Biffy Pass, and Bruce wasted no time making sweet music with the filly. Early in the current meeting, Bruce directed Biffy Pass to the "top qualifying time" in the \$139,100 Kansas Derby, then came back to take second place (she earned \$22,797). A few weeks ago, Bruce engineered that marvelous win in the super rich Rainbow Derby.

"I still can't believe it," he says. "It's something a rider always dreams about. I still feel a little shell shocked."

Recalling the episode, Bruce says he knew the win was his when "they kicked the gates open and we were in front right away."

He says his filly was the last one to load in the gate, and she had no time to work herself into a nervous state. "We didn't stay in there very long," he explains. "All I had to do was kind of gather her up a bit — she likes to run on her own."

So with all that cash lining his pockets, what's to be done with it? "My future father-in-law, W.O. Bergeron, owns some land in Louisiana. I'm going partners with him, and we're going to build some barns, a feed store and a tack shop. But I need to win a few more stakes to help pay my share."

## Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — Last year my husband and I went to the upper portion of Maine on a tent-camping trip. Upon returning to our campsite late one afternoon, a black bear scurried away from our site when we drove in.

My husband said there was little chance of the bear returning while we were in camp, but I couldn't sleep for fear that it might.

Are black bears a reason for concern when camping in the wild? Darlene B., Kansas

Dear Darlene — Being in the proximity of large, wild animals is always reason for concern, but not necessarily fear or over concern.

Your husband is right in saying that the odds of a black bear raiding your camp when you are there are slight. To further insure that he will not return, you should be certain to seal all food in tight containers. If blackie can't smell it, he won't have a reason to suspect it's there.

Bears dislike being in the presence of man, and the overpowering smell of food is the primary reason that they will venture forth so boldly.

Dear Wayne — I am about to buy my first shotgun. I'm having difficulty deciding what type of action to get. Could you give me a few ideas on which might be best? Joe P., North Dakota

Whether you fish with flies, grocery store delicacies, garden hackles (worms), or your own favorite concoctions, you are, or at least should be, interested in the management of New Mexico's fisheries resources.

Each year the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish holds scheduled public meetings throughout the state to obtain input from you, the angler — concerning fishing in this state.

This year, these meeting dates and places are as follows:

Alamogordo: August 14, 7 p.m., Commissioner's Room, City Hall.

Hobbs: August 15, 7 p.m., Commissioner's Room, City Hall.

Clovis: August 16, 7 p.m., First Federal Savings and Loan Building, 801 Pile Street.

Carlsbad: August 17, 7 p.m., Library Annex, 100 South Halagueno.

Roswell: August 18, 7 p.m., Pioneer Savings and Loan, 4th and Kentucky.

Now, look at these dates and places and decide which meeting you can attend. The purpose of these meetings is to hear from the public what you would like to see, or on the contrary — not see, in the 1979-80 fishing season.

Personnel from the department's Fishery Division will be on hand at each of these meetings to meet with you and listen to and discuss your recommendations.

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## Field day tours and laboratory dedication set at Fort Stanton

Range management, cow calf operations and mule deer ecology will be discussed at the Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch field day and dedication, August 30.

The 26,000-acre ranch, operated since 1963 by New Mexico State University's (NMSU) Agricultural Experiment Station is located east of Capitan.

The field day will begin with registration and coffee at the Bonita Corral turnout.

During the field tour, participants can inspect range research, including the effect of drought on blue grama, rangeland fertilization, and snakeweed, pinon and juniper control.

Research reports on cow calf operations

will include range supplementation of yearlings on grass and mature cows on range. Other range research will include reports on comparing early and late calving dates as well as estrus synchronization and artificial insemination of two year old heifers.

Other topics to be discussed during the tour will be mule deer ecology, cancer eye treatment and NMSU's range assessment team.

After the morning tour, lunch will be provided by Worley Mills at the ranch's headquarters located near the Fort Stanton Hospital.

The dedication will take place at 1:15 p.m. at the ranch headquarters. L.S.

Pope, dean and director of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, will give the opening remarks and then chair the dedication ceremonies. Among the speakers will be Gerald W. Thomas, president of NMSU, Arthur Zimmerman, state director of the Bureau of Land Management; and keynote speaker, W.T. (Dub) Berry Jr., vice-president of Western Farm Management, located in Denver, Colorado.

According to Arnold Nelson, head of NMSU's Animal and Range Science Department, "The new laboratory will be quite an asset to our research program. It provides a location for weighing, drying and grinding research samples collected in the many range, beef cattle and wildlife experiments at the ranch." Nelson pointed out that more detailed analyses, requiring sophisticated equipment, will still be completed at the laboratories on the main campus in Las Cruces.

## State firemen's training school set August 20-24

Four hundred returning firemen and 300 new students are expected to attend the 23rd annual New Mexico Fire Marshal's Fire Fighters' Training School at New Mexico State University, (NMSU), Las Cruces, August 20-24.

The school is sponsored by the State Fire Marshal's (SFM) office and is available to all of the state's recognized fire departments. Both volunteer and professional firemen from across the state are expected to attend.

The courses offered will be taught by instructors from the ranks of New Mexico firemen; some are from out of state; and others are provided by the SFM.

Instruction is divided into three levels: Firemanship I, Firemanship II and Advanced Courses. The first level is designed for students who are new to the school. Subjects include basic safety, fire fighting and rescue techniques.

The other levels are designed for returning students and more experienced firemen.

NMSU Fire Chief David James said an old shed has been remodeled for use in the course in structural fire fighting, and this will be the only fire set to provide practical experience. James believes the actual experience is important, but the school is limited in the use of fires due to restrictions regarding noise and smoke pollution. "We're curtailed on what we want to do," James said, "but they do get the basics."

A SFM coordinator, Bob Baca, is expected to attend. Baca defined a new program, which will run concurrently with the school. He said personnel from ENMU will conduct a five-day course for certification of fire instructors, involving teaching methodology, and Baca said that ideally, one person from each department in the state will attend the certification course. Baca said instructors have been certified through this course earlier in the year.

The fire school will be immediately preceded by a seminar provided by the NMSU College of Continuing Education and the Ballut Atyad Shrine Temple of Albuquerque. Personnel from the

Galveston burn treatment center will conduct the burn program.

Baca said announcements regarding the August 19 burn program were sent to all the state's fire departments, and many have indicated they will arrive in Las Cruces early to attend the seminar.

While 1978 marks the 23rd annual training school, it is not a "permanent" program. In the past, the state fire marshal's office attempted to obtain legislative authorization for a permanent fire training academy at NMSU. According to Baca, this effort is at a standstill, though efforts will continue.

As host of the school, the NMSU fire department assists in correlating the program and the university provides many facilities and equipment. Baca said the school has been located in Las Cruces because of the "facilities and hospitality of the university administration, the NMSU fire department and the Las Cruces fire department. They go all out to assist us."

Registration for the school will begin at 10 a.m., August 20, and those attending will stay in local motels. For further information regarding the fire school, contact James at 648-2519.

## Country singer Milsap featured at State Fair

to the Nashville scene. Over the past four years, he has won virtually all of the top awards for country music, including a coveted Grammy in 1976.


Ronnie, who records on the RCA label, has a gold hit in his latest one, "It was Almost Like a Song."
