

County fair set to open August 23

The Lincoln County Fair will be August 23-28 at the Capitan fair grounds with competition and displays in categories ranging from abstract acrylic paintings to ducks, from embroidery to pickles and featuring a junior rodeo.

The annual fair kicks off Wednesday, August 23, with open home economics entries, open flower show entries, open horticulture entries, 4-H projects other than livestock and art show entries accepted from 4 to 7 p.m.

Thursday, August 24, from 9 a.m. to noon, entries will be accepted in all departments and from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., livestock entries will be accepted. Livestock will be weighed and classified at 4 p.m.

Starting at 2 p.m., Thursday, judging of open home economics entries, flower show, horticulture, art show and 4-H projects other than livestock will be held.

Friday, August 25, the fair building will open at 8 a.m., and judging of livestock begins at 8 a.m.

A full schedule is planned for the final

day of the fair Saturday.

A breakfast for junior exhibitors will be held at 7 a.m., in the fair building, a pet show is scheduled in the show ring at 8:30 a.m., a buyers coffee is set for 9 a.m., in the meeting room of the fair building and there will be a special lead sheep class at 9:30 a.m.

Also on Saturday, a junior livestock sale will be held at 10 a.m., special cake sale at 11 a.m., with trophies awarded at noon.

JUNIOR RODEO ACTION during the fair features four age divisions: Booster, eight years and under; Novice, 9-12;

Junior, 13-15 and Senior 16-19. Girls and boys will compete separately in these divisions.

Rodeo performances will be at 7 p.m. Friday and Saturday in the fair grounds arena.

"Proceeds from the rodeo, sponsored by the Lincoln County 4-H Council," rodeo chairman Denise Byrd said, "will be used for the county 4-H awards programs and events."

Saturday evening activities will conclude with a dance beginning at 9, with music by the Traveling Countryman.



Pocket Coin grabs Rio


The way the fans at Ruidoso Downs had it figured, all Pocket Coin had to do in the Rio Grande Futurity was show up. The competition would keel over from fright.

So Pocket Coin was made a crushing 1-5 favorite in the six furlong fixture for state-breds, scenario played out just as expected.

Pocket Coin dismissed his foes with ridiculous ease and romped under the wire with a cushy 6 1/4-length lead. He hardly raised a sweat in the soft assignment, and collected \$16,740 out of the gross purse of \$33,480.

The paycheck put Pocket Coin's career earnings up to \$98,500 and beefed his racing record to a near-perfect seven wins and a second from eight starts. The colt is owned by the father-son combine of Melvin

Tribe sets 'Summer Encampment'

Frenetic rhythms of Indian dancing drums will again echo through the Sacramento Mountains September 1-3, as the Mescalero Apache Tribe's Indian Summer Encampment unfolds in the new ceremonial grounds at Mescalero.

Action scheduled in the 3,000 seat stadium includes:

— INDIAN CONTEST dancing, for cash prizes, with John Zallerito, a Mescalero Apache, as arena director.

Dancing competition is scheduled at 7 p.m., September 1; at 1 and 7 p.m., September 2 with the finals beginning at 1 p.m., September 3.

Northern drums will feature the Porcupine Singers, Sioux, led by James Clairmont of Porcupine, South Dakota. Masters of ceremonies will be Ed Red Eagle, Osage, of Pawhuska, Oklahoma and Silas Cochise, Mescalero Apache, of Mescalero.

Southern drums will be led by Ell Warrior, Ponca, Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. The head dancers will be Patricia Anne Barnes, Osage, Hominy, Oklahoma and Johnny Hughes, Kaw Otee, Denver, Colorado.

Dance contest categories include Men's Northern Fancy, Men's Southern Fancy, Men's Straight Dance (with or without bustle), Ladies' Northern Shawl, Ladies' Southern Dress, Ladies' Buckskin, Junior Division, boys and girls, ages 9-15; Tiny Tot Division, boys and girls, ages 1-8 and Traditional Dance Groups of four or more members.

Encampment chairmen Freddie Kaydahzine and Wheeler Gayton told The News today that "Some of the finest Indian dance costumes in the nation will be on exhibition during the dancing contests. The fine beadwork and carefully stitched wild game skins used in them, as well as the feathers and fiery decorations, are certain to add much spectator pleasure to the dancing."

LARRY MAHAN and his Rodeo Review

will appear during the evening rodeo performance September 2.

"Mahan is a former World's Champion Cowboy," Kaydahzine said, "and we feel very fortunate to be able to have him perform during the Sunday evening break in the rodeo action."

Gayton said: "Anyone who has seen Mahan in action in a rodeo arena, or watched national rodeo championships on television, will certainly enjoy seeing him, with his troupe, in the role of performer."

RODEO ACTION is set for 7:30 p.m., September 3, with the second show at 1 p.m., September 4. Stock will be furnished by Charley Thompson of Lubbock, Texas.

Other scheduled events include:

— The second annual Wendell Chino Classic, an all Indian golf tournament, at the Inn of the Mountain God's course, with tee time at 1 p.m., each of the three days.

— The third annual Six Mile Marathon is scheduled to kickoff at 9 a.m., September 2.

Details of the events will be released soon, Kaydahzine and Gayton said.

Upper Canyon residents set zoning meeting

A meeting to discuss August 2 action by the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z), on proposed development in the Upper Canyon, is scheduled for 9 a.m., August 19 at the Chaparral Motor Hotel, Ruidoso Downs.

The meeting, called by Upper Canyon Association organizers Hazel Haynsworth, Bill Uihlein and Al Junge, is, Haynsworth said, "for residents living in the area bounded on the east by Mechem Drive and

the Mescalero Apache Reservation on the west, to express approval or disapproval of the P&Z approved change from Residential-1 to Residential-2 zoning in the area."

P&Z, August 2, approved the zoning change requested by Forest Development Company to permit building multiple family residences in the Sleepy Hollow Subdivision of the Upper Canyon area. The developer also announced at that meeting that approval of annexing 39 acres in the same area, for multiple family dwellings, will be sought.

The request for the approved zoning changes in the area had been turned down by P&Z at the board's July 5 meeting.

Range tour and cattle auction at Mescalero

The 17th annual Mescalero Range Tour and Cattle Auction is scheduled for August 19 in Mescalero. The tour will start at the Cattlegrower's Headquarters at 7 a.m.

Bill Ljungdahl, extension livestock specialist at New Mexico State University, said the tour will show the Hereford cattle in their mountain pastures. The cattle will be representative of those to be sold later that morning.

The contract auction will be held at the Mescalero Community Center at 11 a.m. The 1,320 steer calves and 840 heifer calves

will be sold in lots of 120 head each. The 400 old cows will be in lots of 50 and there will also be one lot of 30 old bulls.

At delivery time, steers are expected to weigh about 390 pounds, heifers 370 pounds, old cows 800 pounds and the bulls 1,000 pounds. The cattle will be weighed at the reservation delivery point with a three percent shrink.

Delivery will start about October 1 and continue until December 15 as the cattle are gathered. Buyers must leave a 15 percent forfeit check at the auction.

AG investigating closed official county meeting

The Lincoln County Commission may have overstepped the boundaries of the exceptions at the state's Open Meetings Act when it conducted a June 22 meeting from which the public was barred, an assistant attorney general (AG) said Friday.

Assistant AG Sammy Lawrence Pacheco said 12th Judicial District Attorney Bob Doughty had been informed of the bounds under which the June 22 meeting could be closed when Doughty contacted the AG's office prior to the meeting.

"This office has every reason to believe the Lincoln County Commission went beyond the stated purpose of the June 22

meeting," Pacheco said.

Pacheco's statement follows Doughty's refusal to release the minutes of the controversial meeting to the office of the attorney general. Pacheco had requested the minutes from county commission chairman John Sudderth, who turned the matter over to the district attorney's office.

Sudderth had said the meeting had been closed under the insistence of the district attorney.

"Due to the complexities of the legal issue involved here we are taking the issue under advisement," Pacheco said, "we will meet with Mr. Doughty sometime next week and will have further comment at that time."

The meeting had been called to discuss the fiscal management of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department after the county commission furnished documented over-the-budget spending by the department amounting to about \$46,000 in Sheriff Bill Elliott's first 18 months as sheriff.

Doughty has said the meeting had been closed under the personnel and/or adjudicatory provisions of the Open Meetings Act. He said the discussion of an elected official by a public policy-making body came under "an interpretation" of the personnel exception. He has said his office had no specific plans to bring civil or criminal proceedings against the sheriff, but such actions could have been an alternative.

Trainer Mike Welch had Pocket Coin looking sleek and fit as a fiddle, and the colt responded with a picture perfect performance. As usual, he came out of the gate with a heads up start and had little trouble settling on the pace. His stablemate, Ernest Scout, and the 7-2 second favorite, Happy Irishman, rounded out the first flight in the nine head field.

When Pocket Coin swung out of the first turn jockey Mueller decided it was time to apply a little pressure and allowed the people's choice to open up just a tick. Pocket Coin quickly scooted into the clear. As he coursed over the mid way point of the backstretch, the lead had fattened up to four lengths.

ERNEST SCOUT BEGAN to cook out from the snappy pace and left his companion all to himself. Happy Irishman, ridden by Willie Lovell, settled down to serious business and began running for all he was worth. The roan gelding looked like a lukewarm mence as he circled the turn turn for home.

But that modest effort was all he could deliver and Happy Irishman had no recourse but to give up the chase. He lagged badly in the stretch drive as Pocket Coin galloped along in win-as-you-please fashion.

Dandy Binge, an 8-1 outsider piloted by Larry Byers, was lodged in fifth place during most of the race, but shifted into high gear in the upper stretch. The maneuver enabled him to flash by the weakening Happy Irishman, and was good enough to bag second place money, of

\$6,696. Mysiswasadancer, badly overlooked as a 35-1 longshot, also ended up with a lot of lick and took third. The gray gelding was a length behind Dandy Binge at the wire and earned a tidy \$3,882.

Pocket Coin covered the distance in 1:14 3/5 seconds and gave his pari-mutuel backers low returns of \$2.60, \$2.40 and \$2.20. Dandy Binge, the property of V.J. Callaway of Hobbs, refunded \$3.40 and \$2.20.

Mysiswasadancer, the property of John Renner of Friona, Texas, returned \$2.20 to show.

The gelding, piloted by Gary Sumpter as a 5-1 outsider, zipped over the four furlongs in an off track clocking of 46 1-5 seconds and collected \$6,705.

Credit Reference, another 5-1 outsider, delivered a powerful salvo in the final steps and took second. Al's Vest appeared to lose some pep under his stiff burden of 124 pounds and slumped to third.

It was pretty much a two horse battle most of the way, with Al's Vest in a contending position on the rail, right from the first jump. Pierre The True stuck with him, then delivered the clincher about the mid way point of the stretch.

Pierre The True is owned by Tully Pratt of Brackville, Texas. The tote payoffs

were \$12.80, \$5.40, \$3.40. Credit Reference refunded \$6.20 and \$3.80. Backers of Al's Vest collected \$3.20.

SHINING ERA, a 3-1 shot ridden by Richard Bickel, hugged the rail all the way in Friday's sprint headliner at Ruidoso Downs.

The bay gelding broke with the first flight in the four furlong sprint, stayed near the lead while swinging into the turn for home, then edged ahead in the stretch.

Bickle Ann put up a good fight throughout the stretch drive but missed overtaking Shining Era by a neck. The winner, owned by Ofelia Castillo of El Salvador (Central America), covered the distance in an off track clocking of 48 3-5 seconds. The payoffs: \$8.20, \$3.80, \$2.80.

Bickle Ann refunded \$3.80 and \$2.80. What A Splash (\$3) took third.

Outlaw biker control plan unveiled here Thursday

An action plan to deal with any disturbances by motorcycle outlaws during the Labor Day weekend and Aspencade festivities was devised last week by state law enforcement representatives.

At a special meeting of the Service Club Council Thursday, John Ramming, assistant director, state Criminal Justice Department, said, "The (New Mexico) State Police tactical team will be in Ruidoso at the start of Labor Day weekend to assist local law enforcement personnel in normal patrol activity."

"Additional personnel (the northern tactical team) will be on call" and "the National Guard also is tied into the plan and are available if needed."

The plan was devised last week by

representatives of Ramming's office, the State Police, the Department of Military Affairs (National Guard), 12th Judicial District Attorney's office, Ruidoso Police Department, Lincoln County Sheriff's Department and the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

Ramming stressed, "The plan is so devised that any local citizen-type help is unnecessary" and if a situation developed it would best "be left in the hands of law enforcement officers."

Dr. Charles Becknell, secretary of the Criminal Justice Department, announced, "The thrust of the plan is to provide a quick and totally effective response to any disturbance, which would make any local self help effort unnecessary."

Service Club Council (SCC) president Barbara Duff organized a committee of Rich Sealey, Herb Brunell, Ellen Miller, Walterine Hughes and Mary Ann Jennings

to investigate accommodations for the Southern tactical team and, if needed, the Northern tactical team.

Paul Lukens, chief, Ruidoso Police Department, said 14 double motel rooms in a central location would be preferable, but he added during the busy weekends such accommodations might be hard to find.

"During the weekend, (we will need accommodations) for the 11 man tactical team, a National Guard monitor and representatives of the Governor's office," Lukens said.

At the conclusion of Thursday's meeting a member of SCC apologized to Ramming, District Attorney Bob Doughty and State Police representatives for the abuse and audience heckling at the June 26 town meeting.

The approximately 30 persons attending the Thursday meeting applauded the apology.





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
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University publications win in national contest

New Mexico State University's (NMSU) Department of Agricultural Information took several top honors in this year's national communications contest sponsored by the Agricultural Communicators in Education (ACE).

During the recent ACE Convention held in Asheville, North Carolina, the NMSU department won two blue, four red and three white ribbons.

The publication entries took the most national awards. "Cooking with Pecans," written by Mae Martha Johnson, NMSU Extension food specialist, won a blue ribbon. Red ribbons went to "Crop Reactions to Sulfur Dioxide in New Mexico," by J. A. Booth and other researchers in the NMSU department of entomology and plant pathology, and "Socio-Economic Impacts of Coal Mining on Communities in Northwestern New Mexico," by a NMSU research team.

"Raising Your Home Poultry Flock," written by D. W. Francis, NMSU Extension poultry scientist, won a white ribbon. The publications were praised as being well illustrated, straightforward and useful. They were submitted by Norm Newcomer, agricultural editor and department head, Virginia Johansen, associate agricultural editor, and Mary Catherine Legate, senior editorial assistant. The publications were illustrated by Ann Zohn, graphic artist.

A communications training letter, "Informing Yours," written by Jeanne Gleason, associate agricultural editor, won one of two blue awards in the nation. The letter dealing with overhead transparencies, was called "crisp, clear and attractive."

Magazines features, written by Charlotte Foster, news writer-photographer, and Gleason won a red award — the top award in that class this year. The stories, covering meat

processing, drought resistant alfalfa and irrigation, were labeled "very newsworthy and interesting."

The department's news release packet also received a red ribbon. The entry, prepared by Foster and Gleason, featured energy stories, fillers, games and art. The judges especially liked the variety of material which could be easily adapted to full page features.

Neil Stueven, associate agricultural

editor, also won national recognition for his television spots, "The Extension People." Still in the first year of production in New Mexico, the spots are being used during prime time by almost every television station in the state.

A black and white photograph taken by Foster also won a white ribbon. The photograph depicted a young New Mexican cattle rancher.

'Secret' ingredient saves left over garden seeds

If you bought too many seeds for your garden this year, you're in luck. Until recently, the only remedy was to store the leftovers in a cool, dry place and cross your fingers.

Now, seed experts have developed a "recipe" for storage that significantly extends the life of seeds. The "secret" ingredient — powdered milk. Basically, the method involves refrigerating seed packets in canning jars. Powdered milk in the bottom of the jars acts as a dehumidifier and keeps the seeds bone-dry, says an extension specialist at New Mexico State University.

The method is especially helpful for storing such short-lived seeds as lima beans, okra, onion, parsley, parsnip and pepper. Normally, these seeds are hardly worth planting after a year or two.

The "recipe" is really pretty simple. First, unfold four facial tissues and stack

them on top of each other. Place two heaping tablespoons of powdered milk on one corner and roll up the tissues to make a small bundle. Secure the bundle with a rubber band.

Be sure to use powdered milk from a freshly-opened box; otherwise, the milk won't absorb moisture as well. The facial tissue is important, too. It keeps the seed packets from touching the moist milk powder.

Put the bundled-up powder in a wide-mouthed canning jar and drop in the seed packets. Seal the jar tightly, using a rubber ring. Put the container on the lowest shelf of the refrigerator, as far as possible from the freezer.

Replace the powdered milk once or twice a year to keep the seeds at their best. When you remove the seed packets, be quick about it. Powdered milk soaks up moisture quickly, so recap the jar without delay.

Finally, use the seeds as soon as possible. Even when they're well preserved, seeds — like people — lose their vigor as the years go by.

Dust bags could return \$10 for each \$1 cost

By forcing cattle on pasture to walk between dust bags containing an insecticide on their way to and from water or salt and mineral, you can control costly flies this summer, says Larry Foster, extension beef cattle specialist at New Mexico State University.

This easy, self treatment method is effective against horn flies and face flies — the two major pests of cattle on pasture. Both pests reduce weight gains and studies have shown that the incidence of pinkeye increases with an increase in the number of face flies on cattle.

For cow-calf operators, Foster says that increased weaning weights potentially can return \$10 for every \$1 invested in dust bags and insecticide. He bases this on tests run in Nebraska where controlling horn flies with dust bags increased weaning weights an average of 13 pounds per calf. At 40 cents a pound for feeder calves, the extra sale weight would be worth \$5.20 per calf, Foster said. He estimates the cost of fly control at 51 cents per head.

An even larger return is likely, considering the link between face flies and the incidence of pinkeye. In University of Kentucky experiments, calves that had pinkeye at least once average 36 to 40 pounds lighter at weaning than calves not infected by the disease.

Cattle used about one-tenth ounce of insecticide dust per animal per day. The normal fly season extends from May through September, or 153 days.

To set up for fly control in a 100 head herd, a cattleman will need to buy two dust bag kits costing about \$18 apiece. Each kit comes with 25 pounds of insecticide dust. That plus two 25 pound refills, which cost about \$7.50 apiece, should last the entire fly season, Foster said. Total cost per head comes to 51 cents.

To be effective, dust bags must be installed where cattle are forced to come in contact with them every day. Fencing off the water supply works best, Foster said. But if this isn't practical, he recommends setting up the dust bags so that cattle have to go through them to get salt and mineral. Barbed wire, woven wire or an electric fence will do a good job around a pond.

"Watch the cattle as they walk through the treatment area to make sure that dust bags are hung at the proper height," Foster said. "The bags must cover the entire opening so that the cattle have to pick them up with their heads."

Wine judging, tasting State Fair attraction

One of the most unique and offbeat competitions at the annual New Mexico State Fair is the one for home-made wines, which this year is marking its third anniversary.

Judging will start at 10 a.m., Sunday, September 17, in the patio of the Agricultural Building. This year's event is a cooperative effort of three grape-growing and wine societies: the Vine and Wine Society, Die Weinstube and the New Mexico Wine Fellowship.

In addition to the judging, demonstrations and exhibits will explain the science to the general public.

There will be five categories of wine judged: reds, whites, roses, sparkling and specialty wines, brewed from fruits, vegetables or berries.

Ribbons are to be awarded for the first three places.

Home-made wines must be entered Saturday, September 16, between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m.

Rules state that wines must be made by the entrant, each entrant must have a valid United States Treasury Department permit, and each entrant must have a Treasury Department permit to transport wine.

During the judging, Albuquerque television personality Gordon Sanders will discuss the various aspects of judging fine wines.

Also during the judging, Gene Schneider of the Grape Arbor, a wine and beer-making specialty store, will demonstrate

the essentials of home wine-making. Several demonstrations will take place at half-hour intervals during the judging program.

A display of various wine grapes will be available for inspection. Albuquerque grape grower Clarence Gallard will be on hand to answer questions on all aspects of viticulture. Also in the patio area will be a grape arbor, a grape crushing and pressing demonstration and poster exhibits.

A display booth inside the Agricultural Building will contain an exhibit of grape culture in New Mexico with paintings of the history of grape growing and wine making. Present day grape growing areas and experimental vineyards will be depicted on a state map.

The entire judging competition will require 2½ to 3 hours. The wine judges will be selected by Tony Claiborne of Albuquerque, at a "taste-off" Saturday, August 19. This will insure that only well qualified judges sit on the judging panel. Persons desiring to participate in the "taste-off" should contact Baron Brumley at 877-2667 for details.



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

Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE — Remember the two-inch-long snail darter, the tiny fish on the endangered-species list which halted work on a \$116-million dam in Tennessee a few months ago as a result of a U.S. Supreme Court decision?

The creature ended up having an effect on the newly reorganized state government in New Mexico, too.

The resulting actions within the bureaucracy illustrate that State Engineer Steve Reynolds, the veteran and powerful head of state water policies, has not lost his ability to carry the day when it comes to inter-office differences.

Here's some background:

State government's new cabinet system formally went into effect March 31. Twelve cabinet secretaries appointed by the governor report directly to him and oversee various agencies and commissions which once reported directly to the governor — or in some cases operated in obscurity with little oversight from higher officials.

The state engineer's office which Reynolds had headed for many years became the Water Resources Division, a segment of the newly created Natural Resources Department whose cabinet-level secretary is former fish and game director Bill Huey.

Meanwhile, in the nation's capitol the Congress was considering legislation which would extend the Federal Endangered Species Act for three more years.

The legislation proved to be more controversial than it otherwise might have been because of the recent Supreme Court ruling involving the snail darter.

Some congressmen who were more development-oriented than environmentally inclined sought to weaken the legislation, and in the Senate got one of their major amendments adopted. The amendment would allow a seven-person U.S. Cabinet committee to exempt specific projects from the act's provisions.

The committee, under terms of the amendment, would be able to order a project to go ahead if it determined that the project's benefits clearly outweighed the benefits of preserving a species or natural habitat.

The Senate approved the amendment, now before the U.S. House along with the bill as a whole, and stated that five of the seven committee members would have to vote for an exemption for it to be approved.

In Santa Fe, Reynolds — concerned that the Federal law might have an adverse impact on state dams to be built such as the Animas-LaPlata in San Juan County and the Brantley on the Pecos River — thought only a simple majority of four should be required on the committee to approve an exemption.

That ended up being the formal position of state government, forwarded to the State of New Mexico's Washington office for presentation to the pertinent people in Congress.

There were some reports that Reynolds had flexed his bureaucratic muscles in getting the state position adopted within the Natural Resources Department which now houses his once-independent agency.

Reynolds himself says this wasn't the case.

"Harold Olson (who took over Huey's job as director of the Game and Fish Department, also an agency of the Natural Resources Department) and I agreed on it," said Reynolds. "There was no big hassle."

He did say he was concerned about the Federal law, since "any water project you might think of is potentially affected."

Olson was not immediately available for comment. Bill Huey agreed that "there wasn't a battle." He said Reynolds and Olson agreed, adding: "I didn't want in a position of referee but I didn't have to overrule anybody. The only thing we did was to identify a position that we thought was appropriate. (Other) amendments could have been a lot more damaging."
