Chamber hires executive director

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce board of directors voted unanimously Wednesday to hire Ed Jungbluth, Austin, Texas, as the new executive director of the Chamber.

Due to financial straits, the Chamber has been without a director since the February 20 resignation of John Hobbs.

The board voted to hire Jungbluth on the recommendation of a group of directors who met in special session to interview five candidates August 12.

The group recommended Jungbluth on the basis of his "dynamic, forceful personality" and his "breadth of experience." "A people-oriented person," Jungbluth will be "very visible for the Chamber and put the force of his personality behind the Chamber," Dave Wilson, Chamber president, said.

Jungbluth leaves a position as district manager of the Stanley-Smith Security Service in Austin for the Chamber position.

He has served on several boards including the Austin art commission and a community development organization in addition to serving as a past president of the Austin Rotary Club.

Jungbluth and his wife, Mimi, a well-known artist, will move to Ruidoso as soon as possible.

The board agreed to allow Jungbluth to select the person to fill the office personnel position to be vacated by Emma Redmann, who retires January 8, 1979.

In other business Wednesday, the board discussed holding a general membership meeting October 17 to honor longtime employee Emma Redmann, introduce the new director and to serve as an open forum for general Chamber membership input.

Tentative plans include a spaghetti/salad dinner and an award ceremony. The committee for organizing the meeting was requested to research possible locations for the event.

The board also: Voted to poll the general membership for views on proposed improvements to Highway 70 from Amarillo to Las Cruces and the proposed Sierra Blanca Regional Airport.

Heard a report the Lodgers' Tax Committee and Ruidoso village trustees voted to provide \$700 monthly to support ongoing promotion efforts by the Chamber

with the stipulation a quarterly expenditure report must be submitted by the Chamber to the two groups.

Voted to divide the Community Development Committee into Community Planning, Cultural Division and Social Services committees.

Heard a report the July Arts and Crafts Fair netted a profit of approximately \$3,500.

The fair grossed about \$10,000, but nearly half went to Anne and Bill Wilson for lease of the Chaparral Convention Center; John West, chairman of the arts and crafts committee, and as seed money for next year.

After bills, the Chamber's profit was approximately \$3,500 which was a "considerable amount over last year's show which brought \$2,200 or \$2,300," Dave Wilson, president of the Chamber said.

The board discussed the fair at great length, deciding to change to an outdoor event next year and voting to establish a permanent standing Arts and Crafts Committee.

The committee will begin planning next year's show in the near future and present a preliminary report to the board for

action. Welcomed Rod Adamson as a new director, replacing Buzz Browning, who resigned.

Discussed the October 7 Aspencade parade in the absence of chairman Wayne McGuffin.

The board agreed a budget should be drawn up in the near future to enable the Chamber to pay band expenses in advance.

Heard a report Eddie Parker was investigating the possibilities of hiring temporary part time office help to replace July Parnell, who resigned August 1.

Heard a report a ski promotion committee composed of ski shop owners and representatives of the ski areas had been organized.

The committee will work with the Lodgers' Tax Committee using the Chamber as an "umbrella," Dave Wilson said.

Discussed revisions to the list distributed to persons requesting material on area motels.

The next board meeting will be at noon September 20.

Downs settles dog fee payment

Controversy surrounding the payment of a dog bounty to Ruidoso Animal Services by the Village of Ruidoso Downs was cleared up Monday night when the Downs trustees met to pay the animal services bill for the month of July.

During the very short meeting, the trustees heard mayor Norman Wheeler say an accusation made by trustee Ray Parnell, at a previous meeting, that Animal Services may have released two dogs after they had been counted for bounty was a misunderstanding.

"The dogs he picked up, well, he picked them up," Wheeler said, "those two dogs were two other dogs."

During a July 24 meeting, Parnell told his fellow trustees he had counted two dogs for Animal Service's owner Michael Hernandez Jr., and found the same two dogs on his front porch the next day.

Under the terms of a contract the village maintains with Animal Services, collected dogs must be kept for three days before being destroyed.

During the July meeting, the trustees tabled payment of a June bill of \$1,175 to Animal Services pending settlement of the matter. Monday night they heard Wheeler say the bill had been paid.

The trustees questioned the \$635 July bill saying it was high.

Trustee Vada Leighton said she was not sure of the method used to compute the Animal Services' bill.

"When did they pass the contract?" Leighton asked.

Trustee Juanita Burke said the contract was in effect when the current board took office.

Trustee Lois Beavers said she wanted to

see the contract.

"If you can find that old contract, I think we better look that up," she said.

The current board of trustees approved a contract with the Ruidoso Animal Services and Michael Hernandez Jr., during a May 22 meeting of the trustees.

Other action Monday night included:

Reception of a report from Burke on her efforts to establish the specifications for the purchase of a garbage collection truck for the village.

Heard a report from Leighton in

which she said the village could not afford to construct and maintain a swimming pool.

Issued an occupational license to Stanford Chiropractic Clinic.

Tabled passage of an engineering agreement with Daniel Engineering for the construction of the proposed Regional Wastewater Treatment Plant.

Heard Beavers say she would like to see metal delineation posts placed at culverts to warn persons of the existence of the culvert or other traffic hazards.

July building permits near \$1 million

July construction growth in Ruidoso was tabbed at \$966,210, as indicated by the value of building permits issued to local builders.

Of the total value of July construction listed by village building inspector Chuck Brown, \$771,640 will go toward the construction of 23 housing units including eight apartments at Innsbrook. Excluding the apartments, the average price of single family houses whose construction was initiated last month was \$37,477.50.

The total figure also reflects a \$90,000 addition planned for the Ruidoso State

Bank, one \$17,000 non residential building and nine other housekeeping projects worth a total of \$87,570.

The housekeeping projects include construction of patios, fences, storerooms and other building additions.

Last months figure surpasses the mark set in July, 1977 of \$747,217. June, 1978 logged \$727,828 worth of new construction. Both marks fell well short of the all-time high set in May of this year of \$2,090,060.

Anaya opposes sovereignty for Indian tribes

New Mexico Attorney General Toney Anaya, said yesterday he feels the controversy surrounding the validity of state laws on Indian lands should be settled on the state level between Indian and non-Indian leaders.

Anaya responding directly to a reporter's questions prior to addressing the fourth annual convention of the New Mexico Mobile Home Foundation said he felt states should exercise jurisdiction over Indians in such areas as safety, health, protection of the environment, liquor laws and gambling.

He cited the recent district court decisions placing Indian lands outside state control in the areas of liquor quotas and fishing and big game laws as "set-backs" and said his office would appeal the court decisions.

He reiterated his position that the issue could and should be settled on the state level and added the federal government should be called in only "as a last resort."

"But," Anaya said, "I think as long as some Indian groups continue to insist on total Indian sovereignty and other groups on complete state regulation, we're going to be in the courts for the next decade with no resolution."

"If the states and Indian groups can not resolve the issues, then the United States Congress should work toward seeking legislation to grant states jurisdiction over Indians, particularly in the areas of safety, health, gambling and liquor control. "I cannot accept the proposition that Indian lands are sovereign nations," Anaya said.

'Emma' retiring from Chamber

Emma Redmann, longtime Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce employee, announced plans to retire at the Tuesday evening Cadillac Party.

Mrs. Redmann plans to retire January 8, 1979 on the 22nd anniversary of her joining the Chamber staff, setting a state record for length of employment in a Chamber of Commerce.

She plans to "just play." "I'm going to do nothing for a while, just relax and take it easy."

"Then I might work part time and I plan to join the Pink Ladies (Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital auxiliary)," she said.

"I'm not going to sit and knit and crochet all the time."

The Chamber board voted Wednesday to provide a monthly stipend of \$100 for 12 months after her retirement.

Mrs. Redmann will be honored by the Chamber at a general membership meeting October 17.

Daren Ferguson pleads guilty to burglary charge

Football practice, an early indication of the approaching start of school, began Tuesday for the Ruidoso High School Warriors.



The team will continue evening workouts until August 22 and then begin morning and evening workouts.

CBers form REACT team

A group of Ruidoso area Citizens Band (CB) radio operators have formed a REACT team and, "In case of any emergency situation in town," team president Rosemary McGarvey said, "that's exactly what we will do... react."

The local REACT (Radio Emergency Associated Citizens Teams) unit formed Sunday evening and have submitted their request for a charter to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC).

"As we have conformed with all FCC regulations," McGarvey said, "acceptance of our charter request will be automatic and our REACT team will be authorized to function within a week or ten days."

REACT's local functions, operating on CB channel nine, include:

- Reporting accidents,
- Summoning medical aid,
- Traffic control,
- Reporting road conditions,
- Aiding lost drivers.

UNDER EMERGENCY situations, in the event normal telephone communication is disrupted, and when local

emergencies including fire, blizzard, flood, civil disorder and other disasters occur, the local REACT team will provide supplementary communications to aid law enforcement and emergency personnel.

One requirement for REACT chartering is that the unit monitor CB channel nine 24 hours a day. "We will be able to do this," McGarvey said, "through the cooperation of the Ruidoso Police Department, who will monitor channel nine during the 11 p.m.-7 a.m., time period."

In transmissions, REACT members must use their team number and their unit number. "This identifies the individual," McGarvey said, "and identifies the member by telephone number and location of that phone. In the event of violation of FCC regulations, prescribed penalties are immediately invoked."

MEMBERSHIPS IN the Ruidoso REACT are open, McGarvey said, "to CBers willing to abide by the severe restrictions imposed on the members.

Information is available from any REACT officer."

Officers elected to head the Ruidoso REACT Sunday include: Rosemary McGarvey, president; Evonne Austin, vice president; TII Watts, secretary; Joanne Hall, treasurer and Frank Seidel, member-at-large.

REACT, an international organization, embodies more than 1,500 teams operating in the United States, Mexico and Canada, plus other countries with a membership exceeding 100,000 CB operators.

Miss Thermolark in derby trials

Miss Thermolark, already a candidate for the Champion of Champions on the West Coast, tackles tough competition in Saturday's All-American Derby trials at Ruidoso Downs.

A total of 87 head will contest in the 440 yard powerbursts slated as the third through last race on a 12 race slate. Each bout carries purse money of \$2,800.

The three-year-old contestants will compete against the clock for 10 berths in the \$866,000 (estimated) Derby finale set for August 27. Twenty others, who'll qualify by time, will battle in the two Derby consolation.

Action gets rolling Saturday with a 1:30 p.m. first post. Sunday, starting time is 1 p.m., with the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby in the spotlight. The mile-and-a-sixteenth classic for sophomore stars carries an estimated purse of \$25,000.

Miss Thermolark, who'll face off against head performers in the sixth race with Carl White at the helm, has already notched an impressive stakes victory at the meet.

The classy filly swept to a clear-cut length-victory last time out in the \$102,910 World's Championship Classic over top competition at the mountain oval and pocketed \$51,455.

That triumph pushed her career earnings to the \$333,797 mark and earned her an invitation to the prestigious Champion of Champions bout at Los Alamitos later this year.

Earlier this season, she tangled in the rich Rainbow Derby and moved strongly in the final stages, but had to settle for the

runnerup slot behind Biffy Pass, only a neck off at the wire.

Miss Thermolark's top credential as a two-year-old came with a half-length win in the Rainbow Futurity. But she'll have plenty of competition in her trial venture Saturday as she leaves the Number 2 post.

Prime contenders are Binklers Off, who chalked up a Derby win at Centennial this spring and comes off a sharp victory over an allowance crew; Call Me Gotta, third-place finisher in last year's All-American Futurity and a recent Derby-winner at Centennial; Frissy Gold Digger, winner of last year's Kansas Futurity; and Easy Saint, who finished fourth in the Rainbow Derby.

Biffy Pass, winner of the Rainbow Derby and second-place finisher in the Kansas Derby, takes to the turf in the fifth race against Easy Move, winner of the Kansas.

Other heavyweights in the bout include Rock N Fire, who's fresh in from a campaign on the West Coast where she scored five allowance wins for over \$16,000 in earnings, and Magnum Load, who's hit the winner's circle twice in allowance bouts at the current meet. The latter also took sixth in the Rainbow Derby.

Utah Jones, a new face from Florida, competes in the fourth race. He's already bankrolled over \$11,000 at Pompano Park from two allowance wins and a triumph in the Florida Quarter Horse Association Derby.

Other local stars to keep an eye on are: Hot Idea (seventh race), Medley Glass (eighth), Real Easy Jet (tenth) and Town Policy and Jun Jun Ni (eleventh).



The light is used on patients, especially babies, who have a high bilirubin count. The light has a tendency to destroy


"disintegrative red blood cells which liberate a pigment in blood to make the patient appear yellow," Dr. Edward Stalzer said Monday.

Village obtains sewer plant repair loan

The Village of Ruidoso obtained an interest free \$34,000 loan to repair the existing sewage treatment plant from the State Board of Finance (SBF), Santa Fe, Monday.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., and village manager Jim Hine represented Ruidoso at the meeting in which the need for emergency cleaning of the treatment plant and service lines was outlined to SBF members.


The loan, Davis said, is payable following the issuance of bonds for construction of the proposed Regional Wastewater Plant, to serve Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs, in the Biscuit Hill area east of Ruidoso Downs on United States

Highway 70. "Funds for the payment will be provided in this bond issue," Davis said.

The loan request stemmed from the July 25 meeting of the Ruidoso trustees in which the trustees declared an emergency in order to clean the digester tanks at the treatment plant. At that meeting Tisdale's Sanitary Service of Central City, Colorado, was given a contract to remove all accumulations of sand, debris and sewage from the digester tanks.

Other action at Monday's SBF meeting included granting the Village of Capitan an interest free \$10,000 loan to correct a water distribution problem.

In addition to the tanks, feeder lines to the plant were also cleaned.

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

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


And pears should be ready in the Glencoe Area around the Labor Day weekend.






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Off the Book Shelf

AIR TIME by Gary Paul Gates Harper and Row Publishers 1978

In the past few years a number of books have been published which trace the histories of particular media organizations. Those that come to mind are The New York Times, The Washington Post and the New Yorker Magazine.

Now with AIR TIME we are taken behind the scenes of Columbia Broadcasting System (CBS) News from the time of the legendary Edward R. Murrow to Walter Cronkite and tonight's television news. It may simply be that these organizations reached the ripe age for a history, but my speculation is that recent political events have increased the public awareness of the adversary relationship between government and a free press. The publication of the Pentagon Papers and the Watergate investigations did much to heighten this perception.

Paul Gates worked as a writer for CBS News for almost four years, from 1969-1972. Those years were particularly critical for the network in that it was the period when conflict between government and media were at a high point. Gates' duties at CBS included writing for Dan Rather on the CBS Sunday News. Dan Rather, of course, was probably the most visible media target of the Nixon administration. Gates then went on to collaborate with Rather in writing THE

PALACE GUARD — a book about the key men of the Nixon White House. From its very beginnings, CBS had a

strong commitment to news. Nevertheless, there were times when network executives made decisions that leaned toward corporate profits and away from controversial programming. Repeats of "I Love Lucy" were safer and more profitable than controversial documentaries. Although Gates does not totally neglect this aspect of television, one wishes he had dug more fully into this area.

Another area of broadcasting that begs for a fuller discussion centered on the policies of CBS board chairman William S. Paley and his obsession with "fair and balanced news presentation." Howard K. Smith, who left CBS after a twenty-year association, fell victim to this policy. Smith recognized what he called an excessive lack of bias on television. "We are afraid of a point of view," he complained.


"We stick to the old American belief that there is an objectivity. If a man says the world is round, we run out to find someone to say it is flat."

Instead of concentrating on how CBS reacted to such vital issues, Gates tells us more than we care to know about the intracorporate intrigues, the personal rivalries, and the continuing fight for position and advancement by executives, commentators and writers.

For those like myself who have an insatiable appetite for books about government and the press, AIR TIME is entertaining in its revelations about controversies such as the Daniel Schorr suspension, but for those book people not so inclined, there are other books on the shelf.

The Dave Travis family really enjoys

Mr. and Mrs. Dave Travis have lived in their adobe solar home for a little over nine months now. Mrs. Travis said they "felt solar homes are the coming thing and we plan to live in this house the rest of our lives." Dave Travis says "anybody building a house today that doesn't utilize lots of passive solar heating principles is missing a big bet." The Travis home has no air conditioning system. Dave says the "adobe contributes to cooling in the

summertime." The Travis home utilizes 80 per cent passive solar heat and 10 per cent active solar heat. They have a backup electric heating system which is completely automatic; it comes on if inside temperature falls below a certain point. Mrs. Travis said their house is almost always comfortable and the backup heating system has not been necessary very often. Their home is constructed of 14" thick adobe bricks and all windows are double-paned thermo-glass. They have an

indoor greenhouse to help provide humidity in their home. There is a closed hot water system utilizing the fireplace to heat the floors, which are insulated from the ground with styrofoam. Water for use in the home is heated by solar ductwork when there is spare solar heat not being used to heat the home. They say they have really enjoyed their home so far, and estimated that it cost about 10 per cent more to build than a conventional home. They expect to realize a savings in about 10 years.

OPTIMUM ASSET gave a hair-raising performance Saturday. The gelding, slated to go a mile route, had other ideas. The sophomore flipped off jockey Stuart Dolphus before entering the gate and beat a rapid path out the four furlong chute opening and up the track entrance to the highway. Then he flashed across the road, despite the traffic, and into the hills on the other side. It took some doing, but the outriders finally rounded up the truant and returned him to the track. Neither horse nor rider was injured.

A DEAD HEAT for place turned up in the heavily contested 12th race Wednesday at 870 yards. Nobody's Perfect, an 18-1 outsider, finally captured the victory. But only a neck behind were Broke Even 76 (13-1) and Southern Cause (9-5), inseparable at the wire. The place return on Broke Even 76 was \$5.20, while Southern Cause paid \$2.60. The win payoff was \$39.60.

DUE TO TRACK CONDITIONS caused by heavy rains this week, most of the thoroughbred races Wednesday through Saturday were shortened to four furlongs. And despite the briefer distance, two candidates turned in blazing performance. Flashing Shadow (5-1) scheduled to go six furlongs in Saturday's seventh race coursed the half-mile distance in a brisk 47 1/5 seconds. Royal Minds (14-1) was slated to go 5 1/2 furlongs, but equalled that 47 1/5 time in Saturday's 10th.

PICO MAN captured the longest victory margin of the weekend and did it with an amazing come-from-behind rally on a sloppy track in Wednesday's fourth race. The gelding, a 2-1 favorite, distanced companions by eight lengths and chalked up his maiden win in the process.

JOCKEY TOMMY RILEY took a rough tumble in Sunday's fifth race but walked away from the incident uninjured. The rider was astride Easy Glance in a 400 yard dash, but the colt looked more suited to rodeo competition. The two-year-old broke alertly but then bucked down the majority of the stretch and Riley finally bailed off at the midway point. The fans, unimpressed, had let Easy Glance go off at 48-1.

WATCH COUNTRY BOY, owned by Israel Flores of Houston, Texas, notched his first career win in Sunday's first race and did it with an incredible late rush. At the

third call, the colt still lagged four lengths off the lead. But then he turned loose in powerful strides and nipped Eddie's Ambition, who led from the outset, by a nose at the wire. The return on Watch Country Boy was \$12.20.

THE NINE CAME in back-to-back in Friday's first two races for a nine-nine daily double return. Those who latched onto Lisa Prisa (2-1) in the four furlong first race and Kaweah Sunrise (1-2) in the second took home a payoff of \$10.60.

THE BIGGEST SURPRISE to the fans turned up in Friday's 12th race when Spark's Plug (a 26-1 outsider) took the immediate lead in the 870 yard test and

held it to the wire with a half-length margin. The gelding was guided by Charles Mueller and returned \$55, \$16, and \$8.60. Bad Music, the 5-2 favorite, finished fourth.

PRISSY GOLD DIGGER, winner of last year's Kansas Futurity, looked in top condition in Wednesday's feature race when she jettied to a 400 yard victory with 1 1/4 lengths to spare. The sophomore filly boasts earnings of over \$188,000.

IN STEWARDS' RULINGS: Jockey J.C. Wiley took a \$50 bite for misuse of the whip while astride Love Of Man after the fifth race August 6. Jockey Jackie Martin took a three-day suspension (August 11-13) for careless riding which caused his mount, Hear It Thunder, to be disqualified in

Wednesday's fifth race. Trainer Billy Harper was fined \$50 for failing to bring the horse, Bring It On, to the paddock thus necessitating a late scratch.

POCKET COIN became the winningest horse at the meet Sunday, when the sensational two-year-old chalked up his fifth straight victory at the Ruidoso oval. The triumph came by over a six length margin in the \$33,480 Rio Grande Futurity with regular jockey Charles Mueller at the helm. The classy New Mexico-bred, who'll undoubtedly walk away with the top freshman honors at the meet, boasts a career record of 7-1-0 from eight starts for a \$97,500 bankroll. He's owned by Melvin and Ernest Riggs of Ft. Stockton, Texas.

Jockey/Trainer of the week

Jockey Gary Sumpter, who's held down the top spot in the overall standings for the majority of the meet, once again copped the Jockey-of-the-Week title at the Ruidoso oval.

The rider, who's received the honor four times previously, dominated the weekend race with an impressive eight victories, five seconds and three thirds. And the veteran helmman latched onto another stakes victory as well.

Sumpter gave his top performance in Saturday's \$11,175 Ruidoso Speed Handicap when he guided Pierre The True (5-1) to a surprise triumph over such classy competitors as Credit Reference, Al's Vest and Hopeful Journey for a 7/8-length margin. The win payoff was \$12.80 and the winner's slice of the purse came to \$6,705.

The leading jockey took a total of 32 trips to the gate and scored aboard Cherished Lady (\$6.60) and Easy Jets Dream (\$6.20) in quarter allowance competition. At the shortened four-furlong distances, his victors included Atrialn (\$8), Wheelers Go Man (\$6.60), Lisa Prisa (\$6), Slow Rapture (\$4.60) and I Have Heard (\$4).

Sumpter's overall tally reflects 53-42-48

from 326 starts for a 16.3 win percentage. Charles Mueller stayed right behind Sumpter with a weekend record of five wins, a second and six thirds. He maintained his runnerup position on the overall chart with a 49-31-57 tally from 289 trips to the post for an 18.2 win percentage.

Mueller also chalked up a stakes win over the weekend. His triumph came when he guided the sensational two-year-old star Pocket Coin to his fifth straight win in Sunday's Rio Grande Futurity. Michael Welch conditions the colt.

Saustio Burgos also had five wins to his credit in the five days of racing and managed a second and six thirds as well.

H.C. WERNER JR., repeated as the top contender in the trainer battle to take home the weekly honor with five wins, three seconds and a third.

His commanding position in the overall standings is 41-34-22 from 216 starts for a 19.0 win percentage.

Bob Arnett remains in the second spot, having scored three victories over the weekend. His complete tally is 30-14-23 from 176 starts for a 17.0 win percentage.

Harold E. Nolen and William Leach also sent out three winners.

Racing continues through Saturday with a 1:30 p.m. starting time. Sunday action gets rolling a half-hour earlier at 1 p.m.

Weekend highlights include the 440-yard All-American Derby trials Friday, and the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby Sunday. The Derby, spanning a mile-and-a-sixteenth, is conditioned for sophomores and offers an estimated purse of \$25,000.

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

RARE II interest lags

Forest Service officials have expressed concern with the low number of written comments being received from the public on the Roadless Area Review and Evaluation Program (RARE II). The deadline for receiving comment is October 1.

Earlier this year, with help from interested citizens, the Forest Service inventoried 62 million acres nationwide of roadless portions of the National Forests. Following the inventory, during July and August, the public was called upon again to help decide the future of the inventoried lands — which should be added to the Wilderness System, which should be non-wilderness and which should be studied further.

The inventory included 82 areas totaling 1,801,185 acres in New Mexico and 84 areas comprising 1,957,790 acres in Arizona.

During the last month the Forest Service's Southwestern Region has held open house meetings throughout Arizona and New Mexico to provide information to the public on the inventory and to collect opinions.

Southwestern Regional Forester M. J. Hassell said that with only a few open houses remaining, attendance has totaled about 2,500. "We have received only 1,355 written comments," he added. Last year more than 3,000 gave comments at inventory workshops. "We expected many more by this time." He urged everyone to take advantage of the remaining comment period. The comments should deal with (1) specific areas and explain why they should or should not be considered for wilderness.

(2) alternative approaches or emphases and (3) decision criteria. Comments may be sent to the Forest Service, Regional Office, 517 Gold Avenue SW, Albuquerque, New Mexico 87102.

A draft environmental impact statement is available upon request from the same address. The statement consists of a national document plus supplements for Arizona and New Mexico which describe each inventoried area.

Wilderness Wisdom

with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — I occasionally read statements declaring it necessary to trench around a tent to prevent water from entering around the floor during rainy periods. I have camped for a few years and have never found such a trench necessary. Albert G., Minnesota

Dear Albert — Lucky you! But keep at it long enough and the value of a trench will be brought to your attention. Particularly if you should camp in a low area or on a slight incline. It is true that most of the time a trench isn't needed. But . . . Case in point. Several years ago I was camped in the mountains of Pennsylvania. The tent was pitched in an area of large pines and situated on a slight incline. (Not a good practice, but level ground was hard to find). During the night a barn bursting thunderstorm broke loose and the rain came in torrents. Admittedly, I didn't sleep too well, but I was dry. I had previously trenched along the high side of the tent and extended it a bit on the downhill side. But the real surprise came the next morning when I stepped out of the tent. The water had cut a zigzag gully down the hill directly toward the back of the tent, but was diverted around it and down the hill by the trench. The flowing water had gradually widened my meager trench to almost a foot and deepened it to

eight inches or so. In fact, it had washed out the left rear tent peg, yet, I had been completely unaware — and dry.

Dear Wayne — During a recent film, I saw large herds of caribou swimming across a river which was still partially ice covered. The air was so cold they breathed clouds of vapor from their nostrils. What enables the caribou to withstand the extreme cold of the Arctic? Is their coat similar to goose down? Jerry K., Arizona

Dear Jerry — The caribou's coat is not at all similar to goose down. It is a thick coat of hair, but there is a significant difference in their hair and that of many other animals. The hairs are hollow. This allows a dead air space within each hair,

and air is an excellent insulator. In fact, the Du Pont Company has taken a lesson from the caribou. They are now producing an insulating material for sleeping bags and outer garments which is comprised of hollow fibers.

Dear Wayne — I understand that in some areas flounder fishermen stir up the bottom mud with sticks to attract the flounder. It looks to me this would only succeed in driving them away. Have you heard of this? John G., North Carolina

Dear John — Yes, I have heard of this strange tactic. How well it works, I cannot say first hand.

In some areas, fishermen fasten a rubber bathroom plunger to a long pole.

This is offhanded over the side of the boat, then the plunger is bounced up and down off the bottom. This action stirs up a cloud of bottom mud, as well as grass shrimp and other small marine critters which the flounder eats. The suspended and aroused material drifts with the tide where it is hoped a flounder might be lurking. Lured by these drifting morsels he will swim in closer to their origination, where he will be dazzled by the fisherman's bait.

This plunger method is really a form of chumming.



Jenny — No, it is not. It is true that you have water available and the opportunity to do so, they will wash their hands. If water is not easily accessible or if instances prevent their washing, they stand steadfastly on ceremony.

Wayne — With all the crosshairs, dots and other devices available in scopes it's enough to drive a person nuts. Is there one of these aiming devices that you like best? Joe R. ...

Joe — The choice of scope reticules is largely on what you will use the most of your hunting will be in heavily wooded and brush areas, you might choose

a version of the single post. These are usually wide and form a good image against heavy brush. A single center dot may also be a good choice for these areas.

For shooting in more open areas the simple crosshair or more complex rangefinder crosshairs would be appropriate. The rangefinder is a single vertical crosshair and two or more horizontal ones. Manufacturers literature will explain how to use these horizontal crosshairs to estimate target distance.

The target shooter will most often choose a very fine crosshair. These block out less of the target area than most others.

For a general purpose reticule, you may pick a tapered crosshair. These are reasonably thick at the outside, but gradually taper to a smaller diameter toward the middle. Of all the types, this is perhaps my favorite.

Dear Wayne — Some time ago you listed first aid measures for poisonous snake bite. One of the things you advocated was making an incision across the fang punctures, but I recently read an article by a doctor who condemned this practice. He declared that it could prove more harmful than the snake bite. Do you still uphold the procedure you described as correct? Wilbur T., Florida

Dear Wilbur — Frankly, I'm not sure. That method was based on what seemed to be the most common belief among doctors who treated snakebites. But there are still a lot of unanswered questions, even among medical people. If you should talk to half dozen doctors at random it is likely that both views will be represented, but those who favor using the incision are in the majority. Again it should be pointed out that the incision should not be unnecessarily deep and should always be made parallel to tendons to avoid severing them.

Dear Wayne — How is the ownership of National Parks and National Forests defined? Who really owns the land? Thelma V., Arizona

Dear Thelma — You and every other American. But don't try to get a deed for your share. The land is set aside for all present and future Americans. These lands are, of course, perpetuated through tax dollars and are available to, and provided for, the benefit of all, regardless of how many or how few tax dollars one contributes. They also provide valuable habitat, and frequently refuge, for a great variety of wildlife. National Parks, as well as other federal lands, are immeasurable contributions to our heritage.

New Mexico-bred race horses, like Pocket Coin, are winners

It wasn't too long ago when New Mexico-bred racing in the Southwest might have been charitable to say the homebreds were puny things, hardly equipped with sufficient muscle, fire-power and regal blood to hold their own in open competition.

To be a New Mexico-bred may have been a badge of dishonor. Certainly nothing to take seriously.

Within recent seasons — say a half-dozen years or so — the picture has changed sharply. Not only are we finding more homebreds who dare to step out of their protected territories, with fists swinging, but we've reached the point where state-breds are taking on all comers, and doing a first-rate job.

The first state-bred superstar was Sturdy Indian, whose two-year-old career was cut off by a crippling leg injury on his 13th start. But he won 12 of those 13 races and knocked senseless anything in his way.

Now comes another giant, the sleek colt called Pocket Coin, and he gives every indication of being the best New Mexico-bred in history, and clearly one of the finest two-year-olds ever to perform in this part of the country. August 13 Pocket Coin slipped back into his Superman cloak at Ruidoso Downs, to convert the \$34,480 Rio Grande Futurity into a tasty hors d'oeuvre.

As Pocket Coin continues on his jaunty way, blasting foes off the battlefield with paralyzing speed, enhancing his bank account and future worth as a stallion, his bedazzled owners are enjoying the greatest roller coaster ride of their lives. "Getting a horse like this is a once-in-a-lifetime thing," says Melvin Riggs, visibly awed by his remarkable fortune.

When Riggs sits down to talk about Pocket Coin, his voice and manner take on the reverence one associates with truly

awesome things — such as Chartres Cathedral, the Grand Canyon, Pete Rose.

Riggs goes on: "You need a good horse, a good trainer, and lots of luck. We've had all three. But you never know when your luck is going to leave you."

Melvin and his pop, Ernest Riggs, are in the ranching and oil business in Ft. Stockton, Texas, an area described as "being a long way from everyone." The family enterprise includes the leasing and owning of 16,000 acres, and these activities were enough to underwrite a couple of racehorses. But when Melvin began dabbling as a horse owner some eight years ago, he had no inkling Lady Luck had singled him out for such affection. "It's mostly blind luck," he reiterates.

It all began around 1970 when his habit of attending the races at Ruidoso Downs got a bit out of control, and he plunked down \$1,500 for the quarter horse claimer, Mr. Swinger. It wasn't a bad move, since Mr. Swinger won a pair of races, then was claimed away for three grand. So far, so good.

In 1973, Melvin's racing fever worsened a degree or two, and he found himself at the Ruidoso Summer Sale, buying three head at an average of \$2,200. In the fall of 1973, he stopped by the State Fair at Albuquerque with his pop. And, needing to stimulate a little more cash flow, he sweet-talked old dad into going partners, and the two coughed up \$5,000 for Serno Evil. A few weeks later, Serno Evil was dispatched to Louisiana, where he promptly contracted pneumonia and departed this mortal coil. Obviously a poor omen, but the Riggs twosome saw no handwriting on the wall. "We decided not to back out," Mevin recalls.

So in 1974 it was back to the Summer Sale at Ruidoso, and this time the ante was \$8,700 for the gelding Pecos County. The following year, Pecos County held up his end of the bargain by winning the Eyes of Texas Futurity at Sunland Park and earning \$15,000. "It was a great thrill," Melvin said.

Pecos County, in fact, is still bringing home the bacon. He recently collected two wins in the eight grand claiming range, and has made a tidy \$23,000 so far. Other Riggs acquisitions didn't fare so well. Like Texas Man, who cost \$2,100 in the Summer

Sale, won his first out, then got twisted up in a spill.

But the Riggs had their fists on a rabbit's foot when they stopped by the breeding operation of Cotton Beddo and Dr. Joe Miller at Anthony. This was a few seasons back. The jewel that caught their attention was Me Francis. They paid \$10,000 and in the summer of 1977, Me Francis knocked over the Kindergarten Futurity at Ruidoso, collected \$16,295 and lofted Riggs and Riggs into seventh heaven.

All of which was a mere shadow of things to be. So when it came time to squander more loot, early last year, Melvin and Ernest again happened by the Beddo-Miller layout, looked over about five or six head, and were taken by two properties. One was later named Pocket Coin, and the other would be called Ernest Scout. As of this writing, the two have banked nearly \$90,000.

"There was an alert way about Pocket Coin," Melvin recalls. "He was just a yearling, but he looked like he'd make a runner."

So Riggs and the Beddo-Miller people began swapping figures, an agreement was reached pronto, and the two yearlings were bagged for \$25,000. "At that time, it seemed like a lot of money," Melvin now recalls, understandably amused by the irony.

Pocket Coin was broken at the Lazy S Ranch (near Sunland Park), then turned over to trainer Mike Welch, and in January, the colt went through his first workout on the Sunland strip. "He was so smooth, with such an easy stride — and he had such speed," Melvin said. "We knew we had a stakes horse."

After Pocket Coin won his first out by five lengths, trainer Welch put in: "Well, we've got something on our hands — but I don't know what."

What Pocket Coin turned out to be is now pretty clear. He's a license to mint money — and maybe the best thing that ever happened to the New Mexico breeding industry.

Sunland meeting October 7

The 1978-79 racing season at Sunland Park will get underway Saturday, October 7.

Stakes and conditions for the meeting were approved last week by the New Mexico State Racing Commission.

According to general manager Al Rosa, the first two weekends, as usual, will consist of Saturday and Sunday racing. All Friday programs will be staged under the lights. The first Friday card is slated for October 20.

As usual, a 1 p.m. liftoff is planned for Saturdays and Sundays, while the first post on Fridays is 7:30 p.m.

The Riley Allison Futurity — the nation's richest thoroughbred futurity — again serves as the centerpiece of Sunland Park's outstanding stakes schedule," Rosa said.

The Allison traditionally closes out the two-part fall-spring season in early May. The upcoming edition, according to Rosa, carries an estimated purse of \$325,000. That puts the projected winner's purse at \$157,500.

Two other big-money events, both for quarter horses, precede the Allison Futurity on the spring stakes schedule. That's the 350 yard West Texas Futurity and the 350 yard Sun Country Futurity. The estimated purse of each is \$200,000.

The fall session again puts the spotlight on two other major events — the \$75,000 estimated Fall Quarter Horse Futurity and the \$50,000 estimated Fall Thoroughbred Futurity.

The fall stakes schedule includes two popular added-money events, the Texas Derby for three-year-olds at 1-1/16th miles, and the Herald-Post Handicap, for three-year-olds and up, at the same distance. The added purse for both is \$5,000.

Key events of the spring session are the \$5,000-added El Paso Times Handicap for three-year-olds at 6 1/2 furlongs; the \$7,500-added Sunland Park Derby, also for three-year-olds, at one mile; and the \$7,500-added Sunland Park Handicap, for three-year-olds and up, at 1 1/16th miles.

If recent trends hold up, Sunland Park is in for another big season. The fall season a year ago produced a daily average of \$223,566, which was the second best, at that time, in the track's history. Then came the 1978 spring season, which produced an all-time high daily average of \$248,282.

About \$2 1/2 million is expected to be disbursed in purses during the '78-'79 meeting.

Racing Secretary Tom Dawson has already begun distributing stall applications and the 1978-1979 stakes and conditions book.
