## Scott's Courtship takes Derby

Scott's Courtship, a colt who was risked in a \$6,500 claiming race late last year — and hadn't won since — earned more than twice that claiming figure with a sparkling upset in Sunday's 30th running of the Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby.

Scott's Courtship overturned a star studded field in the mile-and-sixteenth struggle over a rain-dampened track.

In the final sixteenth, it was a hard hitting battle between Scott's Courtship, Double B. Express and the people's choice, Bionic Babe. But Scott's Courtship refused to quit when put to pressure and came on with a late powerburst to win going away by three quarters of a length.

Dale Irion was up in an overweight package of 118 pounds, five more than originally scheduled. But the extra load appeared to make no difference when Scott's Courtship turned on the afterburners at the end of the backstretch run. The colt obviously liked the sticky going and was full of run during the second half of the marathon.

Double B. Express (In middle) finished second, while the favorite, Bionic Babe, turned in a fast-closing third.

The winner is trained by Victor Karns for Ralph Maynard and Warren Siegel of Phoenix, Arizona. The Derby gross purse was \$23,250, and the victory slice came out to \$13,950.

Fans who were brave enough to back Scott's Courtship in the betting, against some of the finest three-year-old competition in the southwest were well rewarded with tote returns of \$24.60, \$11.60 and \$4.80.

Double B. Express, who was in con-

tention—nearly from the first jump and fought his heart out, collected a purse of \$5,115 and returned mutual payoffs of \$11.60 and \$5. He operated as a 15-1 longshot. Salustio Burgos was in the saddle.

Bionic Babe ended up with a good

closing rally but was a nose behind Double B. Express at the finish. Joe Blackburn was aboard. The filly collected \$2,325 and paid \$2.80. The winning time of 1:49 1-5 seconds was well off the track standard.

The big disappointment had to be The Drake, who went off as a 5-2 shot looking

for his third stakes win of the meeting. The Drake stayed within striking distance until the turn for home, but appeared to be laboring. When jockey Gilbert Villescas called upon The Drake for his best, the colt had little left to give and drifted back into a fourth place finish.

## AG planning no investigation of commission

The state's Attorney General's (AG) office announced Friday it will not launch a formal investigation or bring charges, under the state's Open Meetings Act, against the Lincoln County Commission as the result of a closed June 22 meeting of the commission.

In making the announcement, Sam Lawrence Pacheco, an assistant AG, said although there is some evidence that several matters discussed at the meeting did not come under any of the exceptions to the act, an action to invalidate the meeting would result in more harm than good.

The controversial meeting was held in order to discuss the fiscal management of the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, which has been plagued with over-the-budget spending in the last year and a half.

According to the Lincoln County Commission, the sheriff's department had gone about \$46,000 over its budget during Sheriff Bill Elliott's first 18 months in office.

Pacheco said the guidelines established during the closed meeting to bring the sheriff's department within its budget were late in coming and he could see no good reason to invalidate the meeting.

He said the AG's office will possibly draft a letter of warning concerning the Open Meetings Act to the Lincoln County Commission.

### Correction

## FIRE launching evacuation plan

The Committee For Insuring Ruidoso's Environment (FIRE) Thursday discussed further steps to be taken in efforts to begin their second project — publication and distribution of evacuation routes to be taken in case of a major forest fire in Ruidoso.

The group agreed to present a formal request to Glenn Pike, publisher of the village street map, for use of his art work and to investigate publication methods and costs.

The committee plans to publish maps of various areas in Ruidoso, beginning with the Upper Canyon and Ponderosa Heights, detailing evacuation routes. On the reverse side of the maps to be distributed will be a drawing of a home in-cross-section identifying fire hazards.

During the meeting Thursday the group also discussed posting arrows along roads to help identify escape routes.

A committee of Larry Bandy, representative of the state Division of Forestry, Herb Brunell, chairman, and Dub Williams, will approach Civil Defense about the purchase of arrows.

A total of \$200 is available to the committee from the Multiple Listing Service,

an organization of Realtors, for printing and distributing of the maps but the committee foresees the need for additional funding.

Marvin Newell, Forest Service multiregional fire prevention specialist, complimented the group on the plan, especially on the aspect of project self perpetuation.

The committee, after the initial thrust of distribution, will fall back on plans to give maps to Realtors, who will give them the new homeowners.

During the meeting, a committee member reported the project plan for the red flag alert program (distribution of red flags throughout town during times of extreme fire danger) was under consideration for funding by the state forestry offices in Santa Fe.

The committee discussed their (the committee's) lack of visibility, expressing the hope installation of flags, posting of arrows and distribution of evacuation maps would draw attention to FIRE's aim of increasing the fire prevention consciousness of area residents and visitors.

## Jockey Club meeting on buying tracks

A special meeting of the stockholders of the Ruidoso Jockey Club, to decide the method of financing a down payment to purchase Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park race tracks, is scheduled for 9 a.m., Saturday, in the All American Sales Arena, Ruidoso Downs.

Fortuna Properties and the Jockey Club have negotiated a contract for purchase of the two race tracks. The sale price was not disclosed.

Jockey Club representatives C.E. Woodcock, Certified Public Accountant and David Lington, a financial consultant, will present the stockholders with details of the purchase of the tracks, involving:

- (a) The formation of a wholly owned subsidiary of the Jockey Club, which corporation will manage and operate the tracks; and
- (b) The issuance of debentures and

preferred stock by the subsidiary corporation which, after approval by the Securities and Exchange Commission, will be offered to the stockholders of the Jockey Club in \$15,000 units. The proceeds of the offering will be used for the down payment called for by the agreement with Fortuna, and for operating expenses.

The \$15,000 packages includes ten \$750 shares of preferred stock and ten \$750 debentures, with stockholders having the option to purchase, or not purchase, the stock offering.

A Jockey Club spokesman said that Fortuna's ownership of one share of stock in the club should have no bearing on the sale as Fortuna "never agreed to sell its membership in the club."

Fortuna, a spokesman said, will not participate in the purchase of the assets of the two tracks and "has no intention of having any say at all in the operation."

# RUCA protests Upper Canyon development

About 75 residents of the Upper Canyon area joined nearly 170 of their neighbors to become charter members of the newly formed Ruidoso Upper Canyon Association (RUCA) at the Chaparral Motor Hotel Saturday.

The group was formed to preserve the unique environmental and scenic qualities of Ruidoso's oldest residential area, association president Bill Uihlein said.

The Upper Canyon residents are specifically opposed to the plans of the

Forest Development Corporation to bring about 39 acres of the Sleepy Hollow Subdivision of the Upper Canyon into the village-limits-zoned Residential-2, permitting condominiums and other multi-family housing. Additionally, the corporation is seeking a zone change for a six-acre tract located in the village from Residential-1 (single family housing) to Residential-2.

Under Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) established guidelines,

newly annexed tracts are admitted into the village-zoned Residential-1.

Uihlein said that if the land is annexed and left Residential-1, it could accommodate at most 80 new homes.

A Forest Development spokesman said at a July 5 meeting of the P&Z the land could accommodate as many as 417 condominium or town house units. He added, however, the corporation has no plans for construction of the multi-family housing, it wishes to be in a position to offer the land

already zoned to a building developer.

The zoning change and annexation requests made by the corporation, then Ruidoso Land Company, were first turned down by the P&Z during the July 5 meeting. The company has requested

another public hearing on the matter. The hearing has been scheduled for September 6 in the Ruidoso Library at 7:30 p.m.

The Upper Canyon residents said they are opposed to the development because the plans would increase the population

density and fire hazard in the canyon. Association members also cited increased erosion and increased traffic as points of opposition.

## Chamber sets new role in community

In the wake of reorganization efforts which include election of four vice presidents last month and selection of an executive director last week, the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce board launched into a philosophical discussion of its role in the community Wednesday.

Discussion was prompted by requests for a Chamber viewpoint on proposed grading of Highway 70 and proposed development of the Sierra Blanca regional airport.

Directors concurred with Mac McDougall's comment "I don't feel knowledgeable enough on either subject to respond." Discussion followed, questioning

whether the directors should decide on a viewpoint or poll the general membership.

"The Chamber should have an educational role, explain the pros and cons of issues. We should have a role of collecting the opinion of the general membership" and serve as a "mouthpiece," Chamber president Dave Wilson said.

"We should challenge the community to think and once we have the opinion of our membership, then the Chamber can take a leadership role in promoting that opinion; hence, a poll of our members on the highway improvements and the proposed regional airport."

The directors discussed hosting an educational program to present pros and cons on both issues, but felt they could not adequately prepare a program as

deadlines had been set on the requests for viewpoints.

The Chamber directors voted instead to research the two subjects, both dealing with potential growth in the area, provide the information on a cover letter and poll the general membership.

Once the poll is complete, the Chamber board will devise a viewpoint representative of the membership opinion.


Proposed improvements to Highway 70 include widening the present highway to four lanes between Amarillo, Texas, and Las Cruces on a high priority, connector primary route with 90 percent funding by the federal government.

The proposed Sierra Blanca Regional Airport calls for construction on approximately 2,000 acres of land on Fort Stanton Mesa, currently administered by the Bureau of Land Management.





## The Ripening Rays

It seems that this is an unusual year in several ways. For one thing, the creek usually gets very low some time in June. And there are some rises in the river in July.

This year the river flowed strong and clear all through June here at the place. And there was not much rise in the river during July. We were fortunate to have had good snow on the mountain during the winter. Mother Earth's springs and streamlets are still flowing on high, replenished by the waters of the winter snows. And the recent rains have added strength to the mountain waters.

Beside the early arrival of the ripening rays and the cool nights, the West Wind has arrived early this year. Usually the early ripening time is very quiet and still, so that the sun may use its full power on orchard, field and meadow.

The cool nights have a special work to do in bringing flavor, color, and health qualities to our apples, raised here in the valleys running down from the White Mountain. The growing apple breathes in the cool air of the night and then through the day inhales the warm air and absorbs the magic elements of the sun. This cool-and-warm action, together with the special mountain soil and many other special processes of Mother Nature, bring certain flavor and health qualities to the apples of this region which have made them more famous year by year.

The early West Wind will increase the tempo of the ripening process by blowing the warm air off the meadows and hillsides all through the orchard trees. The apples wave lightly on the limbs and branches shining and flashing their reddening color in the sun. The wind makes the sap run quickly through the tree and the apples hasten on toward ripeness.

## A Long Season Of Ripening

So you see, with the ripening season beginning early, and with Mother Earth waiting for more rain to bring certain of her plants into vigorous and rapid growth, it looks as though we are going to have a long harvest season.

Also, it looks like a very interesting late summer and fall with several ripening seasons one after the other. Abundant rains usually fall during August and early September; and many of the growing things are waiting for these rains so they can make a big gain in the growth of their fruit and seeds before they begin to ripen.

Next time or so we will go into the different kinds of apples and pears and their outstanding features. Meanwhile, the west wind keeps blowing and sending a message to the East wind to blow in with some rain.

Thank you for so many kind thoughts, words and deeds. Let us pray for the happiness of each other and for everyone; and let us be ever more grateful to God for all his many blessings.

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

# Yours and Ours

SANTA FE — So far, the "Democrats for Skeen" organization has not produced any blockbuster endorsements from top-ranking party figures or even shown that it can drain votes away from Democrat Bruce King at a rate great enough to damage him.

But these partisans who are flirting with — in fact have openly endorsed — Republican gubernatorial candidate Joe Skeen's campaign hint that they are only the tip of the political iceberg.

They contend these upper-echelon Democrats can't afford to publicly endorse a Republican candidate but will either work privately for Skeen, in terms of raising money or contacting close political friends on his behalf, or at least will "sit on their hands" when it comes to working for King.

They say King is losing some well-connected Democrats for two main reasons:

— He served four years as governor before, in addition to a long stint as speaker of the State House of Representatives, and thus inevitably built up opponents because of his past decisions on key issues.

— Some top Democrats simply think Skeen will be a more forceful, decisive executive whereas King, who cut his political teeth in the backstages, consensus-building atmosphere of the State Legislature, simply measures the political winds on any particular issue and uses that as an index to forge his own public position.

Taking the lead in the "Democrats for Skeen" organization are such figures as Ralph "Sabu" Gallegos, a former Democratic legislator who pulled off the rare feat of getting elected three times from three different counties; Jack Flynn, state planning director in the administration of Democratic Gov. Jack M. Campbell (1963-66), and Alonzo Gonzales, who ran the Albuquerque office of the late U.S. Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, D-N.M.

"For every one of us who goes public, though," said one Democrat who bolted, "there's 20 in the bush."

In fact, although they're publicly remaining firm Democratic supporters, the names of the current governor and the only living former Democratic governor besides King — Jerry Apodaca and Jack Campbell — keep cropping up in political circles as potential Skeen allies.

Even if those two top figures and their allies don't go for Skeen, it's been mentioned repeatedly that they will tacitly help another prominent Republican, U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici, in his race for a second six-year term in Washington — not out of love for Domenici but because of strong dislike for his Democratic challenger, Tony Anaya.

There's little question that Anaya, although a genius at gaining media coverage and regarded as a courageous challenger of the status quo by many rank-and-file voters, has very thin support in the leadership ranks of his party.

Since there's already some desertions from the Democratic slate because of Anaya, it perhaps makes it easier for some of the same figures to extend their temporary GOP allegiance to Joe Skeen as well.

Both aspects make Bernalillo County even more important to King than would normally be the case.

If Domenici, who has a strong base in both the GOP Heights and the Democratic Valley of Albuquerque, carries Bernalillo County heavily, he could not only assure his own re-election but provide some "coattail strength" for his GOP colleague Joe Skeen.

### PROPOSITION 13

At a time when Howard Jarvis was scorned as but a nuisance in the legislative halls of Sacramento, two of California's most noted economists — Milton Friedman and Arthur Laffer — were preaching their theories that economic expansion goes up as tax rates go down — that tax cuts build new jobs as well as worker incentives.

California now becomes a vast economic laboratory to prove or disprove the Friedman-Laffer hypothesis. Already, there are signs that California's prosperous but static economy is about to take off. The state Chamber of Commerce has just announced the result of a survey that indicates a whopping \$2.9 billion expansion of business and industry within the next 12 months, which will create an estimated 24,000 new jobs. And while the business community seems shy about openly attributing this growth to passage of Proposition 13, it appears the state's improved economic climate has been buoyed by the prospect of reduced taxes stemming from passage of Proposition 13.

An encouraging fact for Californians is that another state, New Hampshire, has already proved how high economic levels accompany low taxes. Fortune magazine recently pointed out that, whereas New Hampshire's conservative leadership was criticized half a dozen years ago as reactionary for keeping its government and its taxes small, "the new conventional wisdom is that these reactionaries could be on to something big."

In contrast to the entire Northeastern section of the United States, which has had a declining economy and a declining population growth, New Hampshire is the

fastest growing state east of the Mississippi except Florida; its unemployment rate is only 3.4 percent and its private-sector jobs have increased 21.5 percent. Fortune attributes this unusual prosperity to one simple fact — low taxes. New Hampshire has no income tax and no sales tax; its residents paid only \$235.84 per capita in state taxes in 1977 — the lowest figure in the United States.

The chief danger looming for Californians that Sacramento will yield to increasing pressures from local jurisdictions and restore property taxes on business instead of cutting back on government spending. Already, business has become the obvious tax target for those who seek quick, and easier solutions to the current revenue crunch. The predictable, political impulse will be to choke the golden goose all the harder to make up for taxes lost from homeowners.

If this happens, California will be placed in the worst of economic worlds because it will deprive itself of the chance to make up lost home owner taxes as promised now by expanded business, expanded jobs and expanded tax revenues. To express this another way: Proposition 13 would be converted into a total disaster if its affirmative side, namely an improved business climate is cut out; a stagnant economy coupled with the loss of revenue from home owner tax relief would lead to stultifying increases in sales and income taxes. Everyone in California would then be worse off than before.

Now that Proposition 13 has been passed, with all of the disorderly disruptions that were predicted, the best hope for making it work to maximum advantage is to retain its economic stimulants. — *Belen News-Bulletin*



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

The Ruidoso Board of Education today announced its policy for Free and Reduced-price Meals and Free Milk for children unable to pay the full price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch, and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size and income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for Free and Reduced-price Meals and Free Milk.

In addition, families not meeting these criteria but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

If there is a change in family income due to reasons such as unemployment, or there is a change in family size, parents and guardians are urged to contact school officials. Such changes may qualify students for free or reduced price meals and free milk.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available to the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

To discourage the possibility of misrepresentation, the application forms contain a statement above the space for signature certifying that all information furnished in the application is true and correct. An additional statement is added to warn that the application is being made in connection with the receipt of federal funds, that school officials may, for cause, verify the information in the application, and that deliberate misrepresentation of information may subject the applicant to prosecution under applicable state and federal criminal statutes.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them, it should contact the school.

In the operation of child-feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy The Principals of each school will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official he may make a request either orally or in writing to P. T. Valliant-Superintendent, Box 439, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345, Phone 257-2211 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Parental conferences may be called to verify information on applications or to formal hearings.

Each school and the office of the Superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.






