# Airport site talk fizzles

No compromises were reached, although suggestions were made, at an on-site meeting Wednesday of involved agencies to discuss development of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport on Fort Stanton mesa.

Attending the informal meeting were Ruben Miera, state secretary of transportation; Bill Stephens, state secretary of agriculture and administrator of the college of agriculture at New Mexico State University (NMSU); and representatives of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA), Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC), the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), the agriculture department of NMSU and Herkenhoff-Parsons Engineering Consultants.

The group agreed to the need for a regional airport because of the present overcrowded, hazardous conditions at the Ruidoso Municipal Airport and the potential growth of the area.

The point of contention is selection of a site for development of the airport.

The group toured the proposed site locations, discussed pros and cons of each area from various viewpoints and, although a variety of comments and suggestions were made, no decisions or compromises were reached.

**SITE A, WHICH IS CLOSE** to the Fort Stanton Sanitary Landfill, is preferred by NMSU representatives because it covers only a small portion of their experiments.

But, there are extensive drawbacks to the site, Richard Hall, SBAC chairman, said.

Cost of earthwork on the site would be prohibitive, he said, as a large portion of the site is a gully which would have to be filled in.

Another drawback Hall listed was the close proximity of the site to Sierra Blanca peak which would influence departure safety in bad weather (with instrument flown aircraft which will use the airport) and prevailing winds.

Site A also covers state, private, school and national forest land, which presents the problem of land acquisition.

**SBAC PREFERS SITE B**, located about four miles northwest of Site A, as it offers the type topography needed, would not require extensive earthwork, and is further from the mountain.

The site and surrounding land is leased

to NMSU by the Bureau of Land Management.

But, NMSU is in strong opposition to Site B which is entirely on their experimental station.

The university's college of agriculture is conducting grazing range rotation experiments and the proposed location "cuts through the heart of the experiment."

"Range research is a tough area of study," Stephens, secretary of agriculture, said, adding Fort Stanton experiments are unique because the area wasn't used for 12 years and there is base line data available.

A REPRESENTATIVE of the university, Dean Bill Pope, said the experimental station would be impossible to duplicate because other sites lack "base line data, the vegetative cover which is typical of many western states and the facility's experimental ranch—headquarters—and laboratory."

Members of the interest groups represented listened to the opposition's comments, but no compromises or decisions were reached.

The group agreed there was a breakdown in communications, particularly in determining the number of acres needed for development of the airport.

Initially, SBAC requested approximately 3,000 acres for development of the land. After further study, they determined only 1,700 acres were needed and therefore applied for 2,000 acres of land from the BLM.

When the BLM announced they would begin study of the airport site the figure of 3,034 acres was named.

A BLM representative said the figure was in terms of 40 acre sections, whether all or part of the section was included in the site location.

Bob White, FAA representative, said the actual area of the airport would be 406 acres or 588 acres including a turf cross wind runway, explaining the additional acreage was needed for future expansion.

HALL SUGGESTED the 588 acres for the airport would be fenced at the perimeter and NMSU could continue experiments on the remaining acreage with "as little disturbance as is possible

from an engineering standpoint." The compromise was termed "unreasonable" by NMSU representatives.

New Mexico Department of Aviation representative Joe Shain, suggested the expense of developing on Site A would surpass the expense of developing on Site B for another reason.

"Site B is state land and the airport wouldn't have to reserve extra land for future growth. But, with Site A, the airport would have to reserve land because it is mainly on private land and developers would begin buying surrounding land."

The physicals will be given August 23, beginning at 4:30 p.m., in Warrior gymnasium.





## All-American Quarter Horse Yearling Sale opens Monday

About 2,500 buyers from all corners of the United States, plus such foreign countries as Australia, Mexico and Canada, will be congregating at Ruidoso Downs for Monday's kickoff of the 17th annual All-American Quarter Horse Yearling Sale.

The venue, the world's largest for quarter horses, will cover three sessions, concluding Wednesday. Site of the sale is the All-American Sale Arena on the track grounds. Each of the three sessions begins at 1 p.m.

"It looks like a really super sale," beamed sales manager Richard Thompson. "We've had more interest, and more calls and inquiries, than ever before. So it looks like the All-American Sale will be continuing the sharply upward trend being established by all major thoroughbred sales around the country."

A total of 588 yearlings have been catalogued for the All-American Sale, and that represents a new record, Thompson said. Of these, about 540 will actually pass through the auction ring, so the previous record of number of head sold, set at 510 in 1975, also figures to topple.

But it's not just quantity, Thompson says, which has been generating so much interest. "The overall quality is tremendous, and we also have a number of brilliant standouts," Thompson said.

The potential sale topper is the bay colt, Tynys Gay Two, who's a full brother to the great champion, Tiny's Gay. Ruidoso fans will recall the summer of 1974, when Tiny's Gay stretched his perfect record to 12 with triumphs in the Kansas Futurity and Rainbow Futurity, then missed the All-American Futurity by a nose. The dam of both Tiny's Gay and Tynys Gay Two is Gay's Delight, who made some \$20,000 in her running days.

Tynys Gay Two was consigned by the Travis Ranch of Norman, Oklahoma and will carry hip No. 466. Tynys Gay Two is among Tiny's Gay's first crop.

Another entry with big credentials is True Feature (No. 189), a full sister to the world champion, Truckle Feature. Truckle Feature earned \$164,317, won numerous stakes, and set Ruidoso's 440 yard record at a stunning 21.02 seconds — a feat which many turf authorities feel may never be equalled. True Feature was

consigned by the Meadow Creek Ranch.

Another standout is Greene Again (No. 290), consigned by Dr. Lindsey D. Burbank. Greene Again is by the flashy thoroughbred speed sire, Schecky Green (who earned \$317,654). The dam of Greene Again is Elan Again, a stakes winner of some \$200,000. Elan Again was also named the 1975 Champion Aged Mare. Greene Again is her first foal.

Hip No. 384 also figures to stimulate a lot of buyer interest since the sorrel colt, Will Winalot, is a half sister to the current three-year-old star, Miss Thermolark. (The latter, at the current meet, finished second in the Rainbow Derby, won the World's Championship Classic, and qualified in sparkling fashion for the August 27 finale of the \$886,330 All-American Derby.) Will Winalot is the property of Ronny Schlep of Miami, Oklahoma. Schlep is also the owner of Miss Thermolark.

Not to be overlooked among the star attractions is Kid Te (No. 449), a half brother to the 1977 All-American Futurity winner, Hot Idea. Kid Te, like Hot Idea, is out of Conquette, who in turn is by the

great sire, Azure Te. The sire of Kid Te is the All-American Futurity winner Mr. Kid Charge. Kid Te is owned by Valton Cox.

Each of the three sale sessions, following the pattern set last year, will be held on a non-race day and in the afternoon. (Prior to 1977, the sale was held at night.) Auctioneers will be Bill Tackett, Keith Babb and Gordon Hannagan.

A number of recent sale graduates have been making big names for themselves. Easy Treasure, a filly who went through the sale last year and brought \$87,000, recently won two stakes in California, including the \$400,000 Kindergarten Stakes at Los Alamitos. Gentlemens Feature, who won the \$384,332 Kansas Futurity, was purchased in last year's sale for \$16,500.

Hot Idea, one of the great bargains of all time, went through the 1976 sale and was taken for a remarkable \$4,000. She's earned some \$340,000 so far.

The All-American Sale debuted in 1962 when 68 head brought \$212,950 for an average of \$3,132. Last year, 440 head created total receipts of \$4,155,300 for an average price of \$9,440.

## Ruidoso men face burglary, larceny raps

Two Ruidoso men, Warren G. Pierce, 58, and Pablo T. Horcasitas, 46, were arrested Friday by Ruidoso police patrolmen on charges of burglary and larceny over \$100 but not more than \$2,500.

The men were specifically charged with burglary of the Lookout Estates club house and stealing \$39.29 in currency and coins along with a coin operating device.

A Ruidoso Police Department Criminal Investigation Division (CID) spokesman said, "We'll possibly file two additional charges of larceny over \$100 for tools and a Citizens Band radio that was stolen. Also, there was the August 17 theft of a pickup truck from Lookout Estates; with the vehicle being recovered August 21 at Ft.

Stanton, on which charges may possibly be filed."

In an August 19 first appearance hearing before Magistrate Jim Wheeler bond was set at \$5,000 on the two men, with no 10 percent allowed. The pair was being held in Ruidoso village jail Tuesday.

In a separate incident Donna Johnson, Ruidoso, was charged by CID officers with burglary of a dwelling and larceny over \$100. In an August 17 first appearance hearing before Magistrate Wheeler, Johnson was released after posting a \$500 bond.

A juvenile has also been charged, with Johnson, with burglary and larceny in the same case.

## James found guilty in Tatum jewel theft

Jerry Ray James, Ruidoso, Friday was found guilty in connection with the robbery of the Tatum home of Dessie Sawyer, former Democratic national committeewoman.

The jury of six men and six women, sitting in Roswell, brought the guilty verdict, on charges of conspiracy to commit armed robbery and accessory to armed robbery, after just over three hours of deliberation.

District Judge Paul Snead sentenced James to 10 to 50 years on the accessory charge and one to five years on the conspiracy count, with the terms to be served

concurrently. Sawyer lost \$200,000 in jewelry in the January 27, 1977 robbery.

James, 39, was arrested in Ruidoso June 17, 1977, as a suspect in the jewelry robbery at Tatum. Officers involved in the investigation leading to James' arrest included members of the Ruidoso Downs police, Ruidoso police Criminal Investigation Division, Lincoln County Sheriff's office, New Mexico State Police and Texas Department of Public Safety.

Following his arrest and arraignment he was ordered held without bond in Lea County jail.

## Commissioners conduct routine business meeting

The Lincoln County Commission, in a routine business session Wednesday, approved the expenditure of \$60,763 for a fire truck, bridge stringers and insurance.

The plane was confiscated by the county when it was found west of Carrizozo containing a quantity of marijuana.

Topping the list of three groups of items to be purchased by the county is a \$56,452 fire truck for the Hondo Fire District. The truck will be brought into the county-funded system on a lease/purchase agreement with the Artesian Fire Equipment Company.

The commission also authorized the county manager to set a date for the auction of four surplus county-owned automobiles and other obsolete equipment.

Under the terms of the agreement, the county and the Hondo fire department will make a payment of \$20,000 upon delivery of the 500 gallon per minute pumper. Seven annual installments of \$6,450 will follow with annual payments then to be lowered to \$5,000 until the balance is paid.

Acceptance of the village of Capitan's proposal to trade a county owned dump truck for a gooseneck trailer owned by Capitan.

When the rental price of the truck has been secured by the fire equipment company, the county will have the option to purchase the truck or continue the rental agreement.

Approval of a joint powers agreement with the Ruidoso and Carrizozo swimming pools for county funding purposes.

The commission also voted to purchase 49 bridge stringers at \$34.62 each as surplus material from the state highway department. The total price of the 10 by 15 inch, 26 feet long, wooden beams will be \$1,711.08.

Approval of the forest patrol agreement the sheriff's department maintains with the U.S. Forest Service. Under the agreement, the sheriff's department will provide a part time deputy to patrol the Lincoln National Forest. The forest service will pay the county \$9,000 for the service.

A single bid was opened by the commission for a contract to provide fire and all peril insurance for the county's buildings. The bid of \$2,600 from J.G. Moore Insurance Agency, Carrizozo, fell below the county's estimate of \$3,363.

## All-American Futurity trials to be run Friday

The eyes of the quarter horse world will be riveted to Ruidoso Downs Friday as 25 elimination trials are staged for the \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity.

With such a large number of trials, an early-morning first post of 9 a.m., will be in effect.

All together, 249 head will take part in the 440 yard heats, and each horse will be photo-electronically timed. At the end of the long day, each of these 249 contenders will be ranked in order of their qualifying times.

Those with the top 10 times — regardless of whether they've won or lost — will advance into the nationally televised grand finale Labor Day.

This grand finale will be capitalized to the tune of \$1,030,000, and the purse spread will extend from a fabulous \$437,500 for first-down to \$35,000 for last. The All-American Futurity, of course, is the world's richest race — by a wide margin.

Friday's trials will also set the field for the All-American first, second and third consolation. The amount to be disbursed in these three consolation heats is \$250,000.

Trying to project a pre-trial favorite for the All-American Futurity is a risky business, but one of the best prospects has to be the brilliant gelding, Vespero. Owned by Gordon and Juanita Crono of Lakini, Kansas. Vespero cast quite a shadow in the recent \$448,800 Rainbow Futurity.

The quick breaking gelding got away as a 9-5 favorite, allowed Moon Lark to capture some of the early glory, then easily ran him down in the final 100 yards to win going away by three quarter lengths. The winner's share came out to \$154,630. In the process, Vespero swelled his career record to six wins from seven starts. His only defeat came early in the season in a trial heat for the Kansas Futurity. Vespero won easily, set one of the fastest times of the day, but his number had to be taken down for interference.

Vespero drew into Friday's 17th race and will have his regular pilot, Keith Asmusen, in the saddle.

Moon Lark, the colt who raced as the second favorite in the Rainbow Futurity and took home that generous runnerup purse of \$70,688 drew into the eighth race. Jackie Martin will be up. Moon Lark is owned by Paul Thomas and Sam Howard of Coppell, Texas.

Another luminary is Miss Royal Cyn-

Ruidoso, each at low odds, and set the

seventh fastest time for the Rainbow Futurity. In the Rainbow finale, she got bumped in the stretch while trying to make up ground and finished fifth.

might not be germane in a few years and possibly could be more relevant with a minor change.

The present experimental site is isolated from development, which is not the case with some of the grazing lands in the western states, he said.

Shain suggested NMSU seize the opportunity and study grazing rotation as it is affected by the airport and the affect of subsequent urban encroachment.

Toward the conclusion of the meeting, representatives of NMSU said they would not be in opposition to Site A, but would remain in opposition to Site B.

SBAC representatives said they will consider the total cost of developing Sierra Blanca Regional Airport on site A and determine a figure to be discussed at a future meeting of the concerned groups.

A BLM representative announced public hearings had tentatively been set for September 15 and 16 in Ruidoso for discussion of the issue.



## Local rape crisis center funded

A grant for \$7,500 from the Behavioral Health Service Division of the Department of Health and Environment was given to Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital (RHVH) to start a rape crisis center, Ken Moore,

administrator of the hospital announced Tuesday evening.

With the funds, a 24 hour crisis line will be provided and a rape crisis center director hired.

Additionally the funds will support goals of increasing services and encouraging the report of crimes.

Moore said the hospital hopes to increase services to include a volunteer team to assist victims, the 24 hour hotline, an advocacy system where a volunteer will accompany a rape victim through medical and legal procedures and provide a referral service if professional help is needed.

The crisis center also will attempt to encourage reporting of crimes, through informing and educating the community, providing twice monthly programs in the community and weekly contacting agencies which would come into contact with rape victims.

The need for a rape crisis center was determined when only two incidents were reported in 1977, one to the Ruidoso Police

Department and one to the emergency room of RHVH.

A Federal Bureau of Investigation statistic states about 10 percent of all rapes are reported, which could mean as many as 20 occurred in Ruidoso in 1977.

Representatives of the Alamogordo Counseling Center, a mental health facility sponsored by the Otero County Mental Health Association, attended the meeting Tuesday evening in Capitán.

Dr. Mike Hickey of the counseling center said they hope to have an extension in Lincoln County with offices in Carrizozo and Ruidoso and a staff of four persons.

Presently, representatives of the counseling center travel to Carrizozo and Ruidoso one day per month to counsel residents.

Hickey requested the persons attending organize a mental health association for the county, form an executive board and give them direction on the subject.

Those persons interested in joining such an association are urged to contact Moore at the hospital 257-7381.

# Face lift for Sierra Blanca Ski Resort

An enlarged parking lot and easier access to the beginner slopes headline summer activities at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, according to Roy Parker, general manager, and Denny Grover, mountain manager.

The parking area will accommodate 100 more cars than last season. All other work completed at the area involves maintenance. No new lifts have been added because the forest service has not yet given any permits to allow construction at the ski area. A new chairlift will be added to the beginner slope sometime this summer which will cut down on the waiting lines. A new snowblower is on the way to clear the parking lot, also.

Work completed so far includes grooming of the slopes and stump removal along the Lincoln chair line. Painting crews have been out all summer and have used over 100 gallons of paint on the lift towers alone.

Parker said 500 to 600 pounds of grass seed is planted each year. Grass holds the snow much better than dirt and cuts down on erosion. Beginning next week, the grass will be mowed on the novice and intermediate trails.

The state-highway department is to repave the road to the ski area this year.

Last season was the second best in the resort's history, the record being held by the 1976-1977 season. Last season's average weekday attendance was 900, while average weekend attendance for one day was 2,300. Daily attendance was up from all previous seasons, with 138,000 lift tickets sold in the 109 days the 1977 season was open last winter. The 1976-1977 season lasted 20 days longer and 150,000 tickets were sold.

"The first of November is the target date for having all construction complete this year," Parker said.

## Safety records highlight of LPGB meeting

Presentations on the safety codes and the safety record of the Liquefied Petroleum Gas Bureau of New Mexico (LPGB), highlighted the bureau's annual convention August 21-23 at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.  
"New Mexico has one of the most stringent safety codes in the nation for the transportation, storage and handling of liquefied petroleum," LPGB chief Jess Taylor said. "More importantly, New Mexico actually enforces its code," through the use of five full time inspectors.  
LPGB records show there have been 12 accidents involving gas trucks over the past three fiscal years. During the 1977-1978 fiscal year the bureau investigated five deaths, associated with accidents.  
"The majority of accidents in the state," Taylor said, "connected to liquefied gas are caused by consumers ignoring basic safety rules."

# Inside the Capitol

SANTA FE — Bits and pieces of information about people and events in the capitol:

State computer chief Steve Malnar, forced out of his job during high-level intrigues involved with multi-million dollar equipment purchases, may have lost one battle but he's now won another.

IBM announced that its Santa Fe representative, Bob Krause, would no longer be with the firm in the state capital.

In an unusual move, Gov. Jerry Apodaca had publicly criticized Krause and went on to contend that IBM had "done a number" on Malnar. Malnar also criticized Krause, in a letter he wrote to State Finance Secretary Maxine Gerhart, for what Malnar called misrepresenting cost figures for new equipment purchases.

Note: Malnar moved across the street from the John Sims Building where the Department of Automated Data Processing is located to a top staff job with the Department of Taxation and Revenue.

Although Bruce King appointed Fabian Chavez as his state tourism director, there are some reports that Chavez allies will be backing Republican gubernatorial candidate Joe Skeen this year.

Chavez is now assistant secretary of commerce in the Carter Administration.

Well-placed sources say some Chavez friends aren't happy with King's refusal to give the former state senate majority leader a higher-level post and with his handling of the entire jobs issue with Chavez in 1977.

A new study by the State Planning Division gives some important figures on water reserves for New Mexico, which is

seeing increasingly tough in-fighting among urban, agricultural, and energy-industry users for scarce water supplies.

The study, called a "Critical Areas Study," says some 2.3 million acre-feet of surface water are depleted in New Mexico annually.

"With ever-expanding demands for more water of high quality," the report says, "water will continue to affect growth and development."

It adds: "The two most striking features of New Mexico's water resources are the uneven distribution of supply and the variability of the chemical quality."

In addition to "surface" waters (streams and lakes), "about 4.4 billion acre-feet of recoverable and slightly saline ground water are estimated to be present in underground storage aquifers," the study says.

U.S. Sen. Harrison Schmitt, R-N.M., surprised some of his colleagues the other day by making a report on a visit to a "flea market" in Albuquerque during one of his trips home from Washington.

"The vendors at their booths and the people browsing around were pretty emphatic about a few facts of economic life," Schmitt said. "Luxury items aren't selling very well. Tools and used furniture and other secondhand or handmade necessities are selling much faster than items such as turquoise jewelry or pottery. This is a major change from even a year ago (when) the really popular sale items were jewelry and other non-essentials."

Schmitt added: "People don't have the extra money to spend on luxury items. When the money is spent, it goes for necessities..."

### INSURANCE RIPOFF?

The Federal Trade Commission is doing a job in the insurance industry. Life insurance is a ripoff, they say in effect. It's true that life insurance isn't the buy it once was — but what is?

The problem with the life insurance that the FTC is criticizing is that most of the policies sold involve a savings (actually an investment) plan. Since the roaring inflation rates of today eat up most or all of that savings, which are at modest interest rates, naturally, the payoff, when it comes, is not too impressive.

Don't think the life insurance companies haven't been aware of this problem. Inflation has made the job of the insurance salesman doubly difficult. The companies are doing what they can by trying to innovate new approaches to writing insurance, and have come up with such things as variable annuities.

However, there's just really no way to protect the investor from being hurt by the ravages of inflation. It gets to us all, eventually.

The insurance companies can hardly be blamed for inflation. In fact, since they encourage thrift and saving, they are actually out selling anti-inflation medicine. The government should appreciate this fact, but obviously doesn't.

We think that it is a bum rap that those most responsible for the inflation we are suffering from — the U.S. government — officially take it out on a part of private industry which is in no way responsible for the problem, and in fact is working to lessen it, not worsen it.

Furthermore, it should be no great surprise that some companies sell the same coverage for less than others. That is a perfectly normal thing in a free market economy. Let the buyer shop around for his insurance, just like he does for his cars

and shoes.

Finally, if life insurance, as supplied by private companies, is so bad, have you considered the alternative? It's Social Security.

Any private underwriter worth their salt can come up with a plan that, taking the "premiums" you are now paying for Social Security, will give you a written contract (not a political promise) that will exceed anything you could possibly hope to get from your Social Security program.

Ripoff indeed. Look at who is talking. — Hop Graham, The Lovington Daily Leader



## Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

**TOWN POLICY**, the noted stakes winner, grabbed the top berth for the upcoming \$674,004 All-American Derby finale last Friday and set the fastest seasonal time for 440 yards in the process. Owned by Ivan Ashmont of Apple Valley, California, the sophomore dashed to the wire in 21.70 seconds with a breezing 4 1/4 length margin. Last year, he set the fastest qualifying time for the million dollar All-American Futurity (at the same distance) in 22.06 1/2 seconds and took second in the finale as a 5-2 favorite.

**TWO OTHER VETERANS** of the All-American Futurity grabbed spots in the All-American Derby finale as well—Stoa Minga and Medley Glass. Both are fillies and they finished sixth and ninth in the All-American Futurity respectively. Medley Glass is sired by Raise Your Glass who also sired another Derby qualifier, Ima Gates Gal. She went off at 4-1 and won her trial by nearly two lengths.

**THE LARGEST VICTORY** margin of 4 1/4 lengths, established by Town Policy in the trials, was matched by both Medley Glass and Seco Mia. All three were heavy favorites, but Town Policy had such incredibly strong backing, his final figure in the win pool was a huge \$10,060.

**THE TOP MONEY EARNER** of the Derby field is Town Policy who boasts career earnings of \$396,710. Part of that sum resulted from his victory in the Los Alamitos Derby early this spring. Miss Thermolark is next with \$335,477. But at the other end of the spectrum is Top Pass with only seven career starts and slim earnings of \$12,552.

**TRAINER H. C. WERNER JR.**, teamed with jockey J. C. Wiley to qualify two charges, Top Pass and Lucks Image Girl, while Hugh L. Tucker teamed with rider Jackie Martin to qualify both Seco Mia and Easy Saint.

**THE FASTEST SEASONAL** time for seven furlongs was set by Steady Mist in Saturday's seventh race. The gray gelding charted a wire-to-wire victory and held off an extremely strong charge by Pecos County in the final jumps for a head margin. The four-year-old, bet down to 4-1, coursed the distance in a brisk 1:25 3/5 seconds.

**JOCKEY PEDRO BENITEZ** may have lost his bug (five-pound apprentice allowance) a few weeks ago, but it hasn't seemed to deter him. The lightweight rider came back the next weekend, had 13 starts and tabbed three wins and two seconds. Last weekend, he took 14 trips to the starting gate and maneuvered three wins and a second.

**HEY CHARGETTE**, the sale topper in last year's All-American Yearling Sale, made her first career start Thursday. The filly, purchased for \$78,000 by Eddie Beasley of Fairacres, is by Tiny Charger out of Chiquita Karen. But the youngster had some problems in her first 400 yard venture, got closed off coming out of the gate and made up ground but finished fifth. This year's All-American Sale will be held in three afternoon meetings beginning at 1 p.m., each day August 28 through 30.

**BILLY MAXWELL**, the professional golfer, was at the track over the racing weekend and was saluted in Saturday's 11th race. Maxwell toured for close to 18 years and won such tournaments as the Bob Hope Desert Classic, the Dallas Open and the Memphis Open. He's now a resident of Jacksonville, Florida.

**BRADLEY'S KUNUMERA** and Barrister Sib met in a hard fought battle in Saturday's feature race. Bradley's finally prevailed in the 5 1/2 furlong sprint by a very slim margin and matched the seasonal record of 1:05 3/5 seconds set by Hopeful Journey as well. That time lags only 2/5 off the track record established by Barlaris in 1971. The return on Bradley's Kunumera was \$3.60. Barrister Sib paid \$3.40 to place.

**TRAINER PENNY CORRADINE**, well known in the area for her drawings of race horses, has her first painting hanging in a local art gallery in Ruidoso. And the lady conditioner is having plenty of luck with her charges as well. In Wednesday's third race, she sent Re Feature, a two-year-old quarter horse filly, to her first career start and ended up in the winner's circle.

**THOSE WHO CLAIM FIVE** as their lucky number must have had a heyday Saturday. The five post came in on top seven times and all but one victor was a longshot. The biggest scores came with Running Cool (\$51) in the sixth race and Fol's Wish (\$22.20) in the 10th. Even when it didn't win, the five post produced two seconds and a third. Initially Sunday, the streak continued when the five hole had three winners from the first four races.

**WEDNESDAY'S BIG Q** had no winning tickets and the payoff was divided when Honor Scout (8-5) matched up with Weldy Jack (16-1) in the first-half for a 1-7 combination, followed by Smooth Venture (5-1) and Oneandonly (30-1) in the second half for a 10/8 combo. Three ticketholders had eight with any number and received \$2,185.40 from the pot. The more popular choice of 10 with any number returned \$253.80.



**BEST OF THE WEEK** — Carlos Rivas climbed from 10th to 5th in seasonal jockey standings at Ruidoso Downs by steering in seven winners during the five-day racing week. The work again made Rivas the Jockey-of-The Week.

## Jockey/Trainer of the week

Jockey Carlos Rivas captured the Jockey-of-the-Week title over the racing weekend after touring the winner's circle seven times.

Rivas also moved up the ladder in the overall picture with incredible ease, jumping from the tenth slot to fifth. His overall tally stands at 38-30-40 from 242 trips to the post for a 15.7 win percentage. The experienced helmsman has nabbed the honor once before at the current meet. Last weekend, he took 24 trips to the gate and fashioned them into seven wins, five seconds, and five thirds.

He began the onslaught Wednesday, bringing in maiden winner Took A Native (\$3.40). Volant Rullah proved to be his most impressive win Thursday as he guided in the gelding in a well placed mile route for a \$42.50 win return.

Two of his other mounts, Mysiswasadancer and Tropia Wine, both downed non-winners easily. But the closest call came aboard Steady Mist in Saturday's seventh race, when the gelding squeezed out a head win after leading throughout a seven furlong chase.

Gary Sumpter rolled in with two victories, four seconds and three thirds from the five days of racing to maintain his spot as the leading rider with an overall tally of

55-46-51 from 357 starts for a 15.4 win percentage.

But Charles Mueller is only one victory behind with a 54-36-45 record for a 18.1 win percentage. His weekend score topped out a 5-5-8.

Dale Irion had only two wins to his credit, but he pulled down the top stakes event of the weekend aboard 11-1 longshot Scott's Courtship in Sunday's Ruidoso Thoroughbred Derby at a mile-and-a-sixteenth. The winner's share came to \$13,950.

Trainer Gene Tefertiller dominated the trainer race, notching four victories and a second for the Trainer-of-the-Week title.

All four of his triumphs came Friday in trials for the All-American Derby and his final winner, Medley Glass, earned a berth in the \$674,005 finale with the second fastest time of 21.74 for the 440 yard distance.

H. C. Werner Jr., continues to hold a wide margin in the overall standings with a 43-37-24 record from 228 starts for an 18.8 win percentage. His nearest competitor is Bob Arnett with 33 wins.

Then trials for the prestigious \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity come into focus as the leading rider with post time moved back to

around 9 a.m. Close to 30 trials are anticipated.

Action reverts to 1:30 p.m. Saturday with the Ruidoso Sprint Championship as the topper and the \$866,330 All-American Derby brings action to a climax with a 1 p.m. first post slated.

## Chainsaw rule changed by Forest Service

A new fire safety policy which removes the need for annual chainsaw inspections has been adopted by the Forest Service. However, the requirement that chainsaws used in National Forests be equipped with approved spark arresters has not changed, said Southwestern Regional Forester M. J. Hassell. "The difference between the old and new regulation is that the owner now is responsible for having and maintaining a spark arrester in his machine," Hassell said. The spark arrester is a stainless steel screen with a maximum .023 inch mesh. It fits inside the muffler and prevents sparks from being expelled with the exhaust. Fire prevention technicians will be making spot checks of saws in National Forest wood-cutting areas to insure compliance with the safety rules, Hassell said. Firewood cutting has become very popular, especially during the fall when the danger of wildfire is great. Free courtesy inspections of saws are available at all Forest Service ranger stations, Hassell said.

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

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
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
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AERIAL SHOT of Jim French home shows numerous solar panels used for heating. (Photos courtesy of Bruce McElva)

## The Jim French solar home....

Jim French and family have been living in their solar home since late July of 1977. Jim says they have really enjoyed their home for the past year and are looking forward to the years to come. There have been no real problems and the backup electrical heating system was turned on only two or three times last winter. The only problem experienced so far were a couple of blown fuses in the control panel, which was easily corrected.

French's home utilizes three solar heating principles, "passive", "active",

and the "greenhouse effect." With the passive system, the sun heats a rock bed over which the home is built and the heat is released into the home during the night. The active system is mechanical, including collectors and storage apparatus. The greenhouse effect describes one wall of the house which is built with a small overhang providing shade for the wall in the summer but lets the sun heat the wall in the winter due to the sun's lower angle in the winter months.

French says mountainous areas such as Ruidoso are well suited to solar homes because of the temperature changes from

day to night. "The sun would kill you in say, Alamogordo," says French.

"New Mexico and Colorado are leading the parade in solar installations," says French. Jim plans to begin research projects on solar ovens and solar cooking soon.

He said solar homes cost an average of 10 per cent more to construct than conventional homes. French "estimates a payback in about 10 years for the extra cost in constructing the home."

French designed and built his solar home.

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

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

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
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COMFORTABLE LIVING ROOM in Lee Ware home does not indicate that it is solar heated.

# Ware home has 28 solar collectors

Lee Ware and family have been living in their solar home for about 4 months. Ware's son, Steve, an architect, did much of the planning for the Ware house. Steve checked around and convinced the family that an Albuquerque firm could provide the best installation for their purposes.

They are convinced the solar home will pay for itself in the long run and save energy, too.

Once inside Lee Ware's home, it is no different from many non-solar homes. There is nothing inside the house to indicate to the casual observer that the home is solar heated.

There are 28 solar collectors on the roof collecting heat from the sun which is

carried by ductwork to a rock storage area under the house. When not used to heat the home, solar heating heats their hot water for their home and for their Jacuzzi.

They have a backup electrical heating system if it becomes necessary in the winter. The home has no air conditioning system and Ware said it really wasn't necessary.

Ware estimated his house to cost around 10 per cent more than a like non-solar home and that it will take 7-10 years to realize a savings over a conventional house. He said the engineers predict solar heating in his home will cut energy bills by 75 per cent each year. Ware also said "the more expensive the house, the smaller the percentage of its cost will go to a solar heating system."



# All-American Quarter Horse Sale opens Monday

Seventeen two-year-old quarter horses have been made late supplemental nominees to the upcoming \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs. The cost for each of these 17 was a stiff \$14,250 — which means the August 15 supplemental deadline generated a cash flow of \$242,250.

In addition, the owners of 11 of these 17 also paid the \$750 trial fee. Thus, another \$8,250 was tossed into the bulging All-American treasure chest.

The \$750 entry fee actually came due August 22, when entries were taken for Friday's All-American trials. About 270 head are expected to pass the entry box.

## Ruidoso Job Service places workers

Ruidoso's Job Service office placed 226 applicants in jobs during the first three quarters of Fiscal Year 1978, Employment Services Division Director W. A. Anderson of the Human Services Department has announced. Two hundred and fifty six job openings were filled, with some applicants working at two or more jobs during the nine-month period.

Employers listed 471 jobs with the area office during the same period, all but three in nonagricultural occupations.

"Many groups of job seekers enjoyed high placement rates, reflecting fine work by our Ruidoso office staff," Anderson said. "One hundred and nine minority applicants found work, along with 117 youth under 22. Rural workers accounted for 187 placements, reflecting Job Service commitment to provide high quality assistance for all population groups."

Job seekers using the Ruidoso office also received counseling, skills and aptitude testing and referral to other programs offered by the Human Services Department and other state and federal agencies. The office enrolled five applicants in special training programs and referred seven people to programs funded under the Comprehensive Employment and Training Act.

State Job Service offices registered or renewed applications from 121,681 job seekers during the nine-month period, providing counseling for 10,070 of those registered, testing for just over 4,200, and referral to training programs for 1,022. Because some of the 30,858 individuals who found work were placed more than once, 44,046 of the 55,133 job openings listed by employers were filled.

"I'm encouraged by the number of applicants Job Service counseled, tested and/or placed in training," Anderson said. "As a full service employment agency, we try to help individual job seekers and employers in every way we can. Another positive sign is the number of applicants placed in jobs paying \$4 an hour or more. Three thousand, six hundred and ninety six job seekers found work in this category, indicating a large number of skilled, technical and professional placements."

Among those successfully referred were 5,261 veterans and 2,690 workers 45 and older. Nineteen thousand, four hundred and thirty nine minority applicants found work through Job Service, along with just over 13,000 disadvantaged job seekers and 4,351 handicapped persons. Eleven thousand, nine hundred and sixty eight of those placed were women, over one third of those finding work.
