The Chamber announces: — The street parade down Sudderth will begin at 11 a.m., October 7 with commercial, organizational and individual floats ... and bands ... and marching units ... and kids on bicycles ... with trophies to division winners.

— The post-parade barbecue ... an epicurean's delight ... will again be served with gusto ... not to mention sauce ... by the Odessa Chuck Wagon Gang ... those handy with the comestibles gourmards who are so much in demand they hardly know Odessa, Texas is home ... in School House Park. The tab for a plateful of the Gang's spicy delights will be \$3.75 ... that's per each plate ... with the Chamber reaping a magnificent 25 cents per serving.

With the happy thought being that 25 cents going to the Chamber will probably, just about ... well, almost ... pay the telephone tab for lining up bands, marching units and other attractions, with, perhaps, a pittance left over to cover expenses of the visiting bands.

To enter floats ... whatever ... in the huge Aspicade street parade ... contact Emma Redmann at the Chamber office on Sudderth before 5 p.m., October 2 ... or telephone her at 257-7395 ... and you'll be signed up ... and graciously.

Parade entry fees will be: \$15 for all floats, from commercial to political; \$5 for individuals and antique cars; with the kids vying for first prize on their bicycles

## Chamber pays outstanding debts

The Board of Directors of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce voted Wednesday to pay three debts totaling approximately \$4,000, after a financial report from treasurer Eddie Parker.

With a total bank balance of \$10,944.05, and all but one outstanding debt paid, the Chamber voted to pay \$943 to Sanders Advertising for the outstanding debt, \$678 for final payment on three typewriters and \$2,493 on a building addition loan.

"Apparently we owe Sanders Advertising, so let's pay them," Parker said, adding the typewriters were purchased on an installment plan "which was a mistake."

He said the building addition loan at Ruidoso State Bank for \$2,400 was at 12 percent interest.

"Paying it off is a way to save money. The Chamber is enjoying no advantage in paying such interest," he said.

Parker said if complete payment of the loan caused a cash flow problem, funds could be borrowed again but at lower interest.

However, a problem with cash flow is not expected, Parker said.

The Chamber expects additional revenue totaling approximately \$10,000 by the end of the fiscal year, an increase over the budget estimates.

With the anticipated revenue, the Chamber board felt their action to pay the three debts was "to our advantage."

"Now the Chamber doesn't owe anybody anything" except monthly operating expenses, Parker said after the meeting.

The board directed Parker to sell one of the typewriters which is unused.

During the meeting, the board discussed at length their viewpoint on the proposed Sierra Blanca Regional Airport, voting to go on record as in favor of the proposed

airport site location on Fort Stanton mesa and further endorse the viewpoint presented to the Bureau of Land Management by president Dave Wilson.

The board requested any member with further comments on the viewpoint to contact the offices at 257-7395.

In other business Wednesday, the board:

— Approved a statement to be read by Wilson at the State Highway Commission meeting in Roswell today in support of plans to improve Highway 70 as a primary access road.

The statement gives Chamber support of

the project but requests input on the project as it develops to insure the plans will not have a detrimental impact on the village.

— Referred a proposal by Bill Wilson, that the village study purchase of the Chaparral Convention Center, to the community affairs committee.

— Voted to purchase 20,000 promotional brochures at a cost of \$1,790 from Craftsmen Printers, Lubbock, Texas.

— Voted to write a letter of thanks to Ruidoso Downs Police Department for patrolling during the Arts and Crafts

Fair.

— Voted to honor Dorothy Phillips at the October board luncheon for her volunteer hours.

— Heard a report the State Highway Commission will hold their regular meeting at 9 a.m., October 19 at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Time will be allowed during the program for discussion of area highway needs and the Chamber voted to poll the general membership for comments on Ruidoso's traffic and highway needs and problems.

The board will request the Ambassadors

to organize a reception for the commission October 18.

— Heard a report from Bill Wilson, the general membership meeting will be October 24 in the Elks Lodge.

Awards in various categories of businesses will be presented after balloting from the general membership is completed. Ballots will be mailed in the next weeks.

— Approved purchase of a vacuum cleaner.

The next board meeting will be at noon October 18 in the Chamber offices.

## Downs billboards ... up or down?

Members of regional outdoor advertising companies will meet with the Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday night in an effort to draw up a compromise regarding the village's newly uncovered, but long standing, sign ordinance barring billboards.

According to Downs building inspector Harley Parnell a noticeable rise in the number of billboards in the village in the last year caused someone within the village government to check through the zoning ordinances.

What they found in Section 12, of the Village Zoning Ordinance Supplementary Regulations, Service Signs, paragraph 3 is, "billboards shall not be permitted in any district."

"Nobody would have said anything probably except there was a 30 percent increase, through the summer, in the number of billboards in Ruidoso Downs," Parnell said.

"Anyone that has billboards up in Ruidoso Downs should attend the meeting," he added.

The meeting, a regular trustees meeting, will begin at 7:30 p.m., in the village hall.

Sometime around the last of May, Parnell said he noticed construction of twin billboards at the entrance of the Ruidoso Downs racetrack. He said he informed construction workers there was an ordinance barring construction of billboards within the village limits.

"The next day they were gone and the signs were up," Parnell said.

He said he raised the issue at several meetings of the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) and had contacted Hans Brakob, general manager of Roswell-based Newman Outdoor Advertising, the owners of the racetrack signs.

Contacted by The News, Brakob said he had checked with the village before initiating construction of the signs, which he said were raised at considerable expense. He added that nobody, at the time, knew of any ordinance barring billboards.

"We got permission to put it up," Brakob said, "we got a state permit to put it up." Village officials admit Brakob contacted

the village and was told nobody knew of any ordinance barring the signs.

"I would really be surprised if we can't work it out to both our benefits," Brakob said, "we're not asking for everything; we'll work with them."

Parnell agreed saying he realized the outdoor advertising industry was a business like any other. He said he felt a compromise was in order.

"We're going to be looking for a fair way to get rid of the problem," Parnell said.

He added that he felt there are three

alternatives for solution to the problem including:

— Hard enforcement of the existing ordinance, i.e. removal of all billboards in the village.

— A gradual phase out of older signs becoming structurally unsound.


— A call for a compromise ordinance from the outdoor-advertising industry.

Parnell said three major companies would be affected by any possible legislation. In addition to Newman Outdoor Advertising he listed Clovis-based

New-Tex advertising company and El Paso Outdoor Advertising.


But, Parnell said many billboards located in the Downs are owned by private individuals from the area. He added that it would be to these persons' benefit to provide input at the Monday night meeting.

Last Friday Brakob came to Ruidoso Downs to attend a P&Z meeting called to address the billboard problem. The meeting was never held for lack of a quorum of P&Z members.

## BLM seeking comments on proposed new airport

Comments on the location of the proposed Sierra Blanca Regional Airport on Fort Stanton Mesa will be accepted by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) until Friday, September 29.

The BLM has received an application for 3,043 acres on the mesa from the Federal Aviation Administration on behalf of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC).

The acreage requested for construction of a jet capable airport presently is in use by New Mexico State University's (NMSU) College of Agriculture under a cooperative research agreement and memorandum of understanding with the

BLM for grazing experiments.

After the September 29 deadline for the public input, BLM district director "Smokey" O'Connor, Roswell, will prepare a land report weighing the input, John E. Gumert, BLM public affairs officer, Santa Fe, said.

O'Connor will make a recommendation to Art Zimmerman, state BLM director, Santa Fe, during the first week in October whether the application for the acreage should be granted.

Zimmerman then will review the recommendation and make a formal decision by October 28.

According to Gumert, the party (NMSU

OR SBAC) which receives an unfavorable ruling then may appeal to the Secretary of Interior Cecil Andrus.

Next, the Interior Board of Land Appeals will issue a decision.

Again, the party which receives an unfavorable ruling may appeal, this time to the federal courts and "conceivably it could end up in the Supreme Court," he said.

"The application will go through administrative then judicial routes," Gumert said.

## Town meeting concept aired at P&Z session

Ruidoso mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr.'s concept of a town meeting gathered momentum last night when the Planning and Zoning (P&Z) Commission gave its informal backing for such a venture.

Davis, once again, advanced his idea following more than one-and-a-half hours of discussion centered on the future growth of Ruidoso, and the direction Ruidoso should go in controlling growth. He made the same suggestion during a similar discussion at the trustees' meeting this week.

conducting a town meeting and to isolate some specific problems and issues.

Chief among the problems discussed at last night's meeting was the availability of water, the lack of facilities to store water, and the lack of revenue to build water storage facilities.

Waldron said it seemed to be the same people opposed to an increase in water tap fees who are also opposed to the establishment of larger minimum lot sizes in the village.

He said both would theoretically slow growth in the community. "Somewhere there has to be a point that gives," Waldron said. "Somehow we've got to pay for the increased water needs. These are the types of problems we need to address."

The session was billed as a joint meeting of the village trustees and the P&Z for the purpose of the commissioners having an opportunity to seek direction from the village's chief governing body. None of the Ruidoso trustees, with the exception of Mayor Davis, attended last night's meeting.

"What type of community do we choose to live in is the question," Davis said, "do most people want a mobile home community? If so then we don't need a Planning and Zoning Commission."

"If we want a more special community then we go from there," Davis added, "we need an expression from the community. The problems are not difficult to solve—it's just a matter of what people really want."

Commission chairman Mike Waldron agreed with Davis, adding that before a problem can be addressed it must be identified.

## Engineers will check water plan

Boyle Engineering representatives Jerry Campbell of San Diego, California and Gordon Kelso of Albuquerque, will survey Ruidoso's master water plan Tuesday.

The action is being taken following the cancellation of the Eagle Creek Dam project by the village trustees September 12.

Campbell and Kelso, with village purchasing agent Frank Potter and water superintendent Jim Goodman, will assess water improvement possibilities ranging from drilling wells to alternate raw water storage locations.

"The village," Potter said Wednesday, "is now pursuing all avenues to provide us with additional water in the coming years. We will thoroughly investigate the possibility of utilizing the 600,000 gallon daily flow of the Hollywood Well, if methods to make the water useable are financially feasible."

The Don Lewis Inaugural Handicap, a six furlong sprint for three-year-olds and up, is the first highpoint of the upcoming season at Sunland Park.

Action gets rolling Saturday, October 7. The Lewis Inaugural, saluting the memory of one of the great jockeys in Sunland history, will be renewed on October 8.

Once again, the formal calls for a 1 p.m., kickoff Saturdays and Sundays, and night racing Fridays, beginning at 7:30. The first two weekends will consist of Saturday and Sunday agendas. Friday night racing debuts October 20.

Key events of the fall session include the \$75,000 (estimated) Fall Quarter Horse Futurity of 400 yards, and the \$50,000 (estimated) Fall Thoroughbred Futurity at six furlongs.

In the spring, the main focus will be on the \$200,000 (estimated) West Texas Futurity at 330 yards, the \$200,000 (estimated) Sun Country Futurity at 350 yards, and the \$325,000 (estimated) Riley Allison Thoroughbred Futurity at five furlongs. The latter is the nation's richest two-year-old thoroughbred event.

Traffic fatalities in New Mexico during August totaled 67. Dewey Bullard, bureau chief of the Traffic Safety Bureau of the New Mexico Transportation Department announced last week.

The breakdown includes 50 fatalities in motor vehicle accidents, six involving pedestrians, nine in motorcycles and two in bicycles.

The nine motorcycle fatalities for August brings the cumulative total for the year, through August, to 36. The motorcycle related fatalities for 1977 was 28. New Mexico had a mandatory helmet law in effect during 1977.



## Off the Book Shelf

TALKING TO MYSELF  
by STUDS TERKEL  
PANTHEON BOOKS, NEW YORK, 1977.

Writing memoirs seems to have become this country's latest cottage industry, particularly for journalists and former politicians. But "Talking to Myself" is not really an autobiography and Studs Terkel defies classification. He graduated from the Chicago Law School in the depths of the depression, acted in soap operas, was a disc jockey, a sports commentator, a television master of ceremonies and a world-travelling interviewer. He might be considered a rare specie of journalist but never a politician.

Terkel has written several previous books of which "Hard Times" received high acclaim. In it he interviewed people from all walks and drew from them their recollections of life during the Great Depression. In "Talking to Myself", Studs has turned the tape recorder on himself so as to share with us his observations and experiences over the past five decades. There is no chronology, rather a free-wheeling flow of recollections. He can relate an anecdote about a meeting with Billy Rose, the impresario of the thirties and forties, then cut to memories of a pearl diver (dishwasher) called Civilization, who wrote letters of advice to presidents, kings, and philosophers. In all "Talking to Myself" is a fine piece of social history as seen by a man with a good memory, a fractious tape recorder, and a delicate sense of what is right and what is wrong.

Studs Terkel was born in 1912, which was the year that the Titanic lost a contest with an iceberg in the Atlantic. Although Terkel would deny any connection between these events, the fact remains that he has an open ear for the little people who challenge the large institutions, for the row boats that take on the icebergs.

Terkel has had his own confrontations with the establishment. Himself a child of the depression, he sought some economic security by applying for a position with the FBI. He describes being interviewed by Melvin Purvis, the "hero" of the Dillinger capture. Studs recalls that during the interview Purvis asked if he were of "Hebrew extraction". When Studs replied, "Yes", it ended the interview and his chances of joining the FBI. In time Studs went on to make appearances at many political gatherings and contributing "a buck or two to half the organizations listed by Harry Truman's Attorney General as subversive." He feels sure that the FBI managed to compile a rather healthy dossier on him.

Terkel grew up in Chicago, where his mother ran a small hotel. Some of his warmest memories are of the characters who lived in the neighborhood. Terkel has remained a Chicagoan and it is only right that he would have been an observer at the Democratic convention of 1968. And where else would he have been but in the streets. In a piece he titled, "The Whole World is Watching", he recorded the voices of

protest, and the sounds that came from the confrontation of police and demonstrators. He even managed to get pushed around a bit. "Chicago '68" could not have been observed more acutely, nor described with more street-wise eloquence.

Terkel has a delicate ear for picking up the voices of the little guys battling the giants. But do not forget he was born in 1912.

Dutton seems to be more thankful than anything else. He always wanted to play football.


"I played in seventh through ninth grade. I never got to play much though. I never was too good at football. I always

## Stierwalt shuffles lineup in search of first victory

When you have lost two football games by a total of five points, it's not time to hit the panic button. Ruidoso Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt isn't panicking but he has decided to make a few lineup changes in hopes of putting a number other than zero into the win column.

"Some things showed up in the film that surprised us and scared us," Stierwalt said in reference to the film of last Friday's 12-10 loss at the hands of the Animas Panthers.

As a result Stierwalt and his coaching staff concluded the best thing to do was make some changes in the offensive line and backfield.

"We're going to move some people from the backfield to the offensive line."

Stierwalt said the move was to improve the offensive line more than the backfield.

"All of our backs are close as far as talent and ability are concerned."

That means replacing sophomore tackle Yon Rue with running back Steve Cox. Cox, who led the Warriors in rushing in the opening game of the season against Carrizozo, was a lineman before he was moved into the backfield last year, Stierwalt said.

That, Stierwalt said, is likely to be the only change. However, he does plan to alter his game plan for this Friday's showdown at Dexter. The Warriors will throw more in an effort to control the ball and loosen up the big Dexter defensive line.

"We plan to throw the ball a lot against Dexter. If we don't throw it they'll shut out our running game. We've got to open up that defensive line."

That may be a tall order for the Warrior offense and quarterback Borde Williams. Williams has completed only two passes this season for 23 yards.

"We're going to concentrate on the passing game this week," Stierwalt said. "We're going to change some of our pass patterns and that should enable us to throw

Another major concern for the Warrior defense will be stopping 200 pound fullback Alex French who will be running behind a pair of 200 pound tackles.

"We're going to have to stop him. If we can stop him we won't be in bad shape. But we've got to stop him."

Yours and Ours

SANTA FE — Don't be surprised if the 1979 Legislature moves to "get the state out of the property tax business."

But don't start spending the money you would save by not paying property taxes, either.

New Mexico political figures definitely felt the impact of the California vote for Proposition 13 — the property tax-limiting measure okayed a few weeks ago and which some said heralded a national "tax revolt."

But New Mexico, according to figures from the State Department of Taxation and Revenue, is 47th among the 50 states in the level of property taxation. Although there may be an antitax sentiment here, the property tax is not the primary object of it, according to state officials.

On the other hand, various legislative figures have indicated there could be a strong move during the 1979 lawmaking session which opens in January to eliminate any state-level property tax.

That wouldn't mean an overall tax reduction, however, since the state might turn over its share to local governments which already count on the property tax for a major part of their income. Or, depending on what the eventual legislation looks like, the lawmakers might turn over a portion of the tax to the local governments based on a requirement for a referendum by voters, or some other required action at the local level.

State government over the last decade or so has gradually lessened its reliance on the property tax — generally by providing the city and county governments and school districts an opportunity to take over that amount if they undertook some kind of reform, such as thorough property appraisals.

New Mexico's landmark "school equalization formula" also guaranteed

local school districts that the state would provide 95 per cent of their total unmet budgets if they had already obtained as much from local tax resources as they could — thus reducing school district reliance on the property tax.

Rising utility rates — and the adoption of such "automatic" rate features like the fuel adjustment clause — helped prompt the 1978 Legislature to create a Public Service Commission Review Committee.

The committee, chaired by Sen. Alex Martinez, D-Santa Fe, has been meeting this year to study the operations and staffing patterns of the PSC, which has jurisdiction over electric, gas and water utilities.

Recommendations by the committee are expected to be prepared for the 1979 lawmaking session.

Meanwhile, the PSC has asked the Department of Finance and Administration — fiscal wing of the governor's office — to recommend that the 1979 Legislature appropriate a major increase in the commission's 1979-80 budget, roughly from \$1 million this year to \$1.5 million next.

In its budget document sent to the DFA, the commission said:

"The general state of our economy, the inflation, the fuel situation (have) greatly increased the demands on the Public Service Commission. As an example many utilities have informed the commission that they will have to ask for higher rates every year.

"Unless the commission has adequate resources no one can be sure that those increases will not be more than they have to be. To a great degree, utility services have become a necessity of life, and inadequate price protection for those necessities can have a disastrous impact on every citizen of the state."

### MIDDLE CLASS AND TAXES

Every politician in Congress realizes today that the middle class American is fed up with high taxes, government overspending and bureaucratic waste. The tax cut bill is one indication of the reaction among them — obviously the nation can't afford a tax cut now, with a sixty billion dollar budget deficit looming.

But a tax cut is being voted by Congress. And in states all over the country, from New England to Texas and Illinois to Florida, constitutional amendments are in the works, to limit taxes.

Is all this reaction — largely from the middle class — justified? Figures speak for themselves. Overspending politicians in Congress have for years been voting more and more costly programs and the tax bite on those who pay most of the nation's bill, the middle class, has constantly gone up.

Inflation has added to the bill for many. The result is that today the average American middle class taxpayer is working four months of the year to buy the freebies given away to so many, and for salaries of the bureaucracy, which thrives and expands by giving away more to more.

Meanwhile, the rich often avoid taxes by utilizing tax law loopholes, which Congress refuses to close. With \$5 million invested in tax-free bonds, one can enjoy an income of \$300,000 a year without paying a penny of tax. There are other loopholes President Carter has proposed to eliminate.

Thus the situation galvanizing so many Americans into action today is one in which American middle class citizens are being "taken" for a third of their yearly earnings by the recipient classes and big government — while the rich can avoid all taxes in many cases.

As one columnist recently pointed out, even the Russian peasant under the czars worked only three months for Moscow. The Treasury is taking four hundred billions a year in taxes from the American people, while the quality of life declines and inflation robs Americans of savings and earnings. The middle class is thus revolting. As were Russian peasants, they are justified in doing so. — Santa Rosa News

### CARTER'S CHANCE

With everyone, it seems, now bemoaning President Carter's failures and inability to get his program enacted by Congress, plus his subservience to organized labor and big-spending, liberal pressure groups, Carter may be learning his lesson.

In open breaks with Senator Ted Kennedy, over an expensive national health program, and House Speaker Tip O'Neill (though followed by a partial retreat), Carter has acted more independently.

If the President reverts to his true inclination and philosophy, and can content his conscience with the thought that for two years he tried to pay off the unions, and left, which elected him, and now feels free to act as his philosophy dictates, he might retrieve his considerable support among the basically conservative middle class — and majority — of Americans.

Polls show the public is overwhelmingly opposed to forcing people to join unions, to continue toleration of 1,500,000 immigrants entering the country (mostly from Mexico), to higher taxes and continued overspending, and further deficits.

The President is probably normally inclined in this direction also. If he can free himself from payoffs of the 1976 campaign, he has a chance to build a constituency larger than that of 1976. — Santa Rosa News

A young motorcyclist, not wearing a safety helmet, lost his life here September 14 in a car/motorcycle collision. With this "in our own backyard" situation clearly in mind, perhaps motorcyclists of all ages should weigh the disadvantages of wearing safety helmets against the odds that the device could save their lives. The chances could be good that protecting your head might be using your head. At the very least, the matter demands passing thought. — CD

## Space Hall of Fame to premier art exhibit

A futuristic art exhibit termed "inspiring yet frightening" will hold its world premiere October 6, at the International Space Hall of Fame in Alamogordo, Space Hall sources revealed today.

The exhibit, entitled "Beyond Tomorrow: The 21st Century" and based on the book of the same name by Dr. Dandridge M. Cole and Roy G. Scarfo, consists of 35 color paintings depicting the revolutionary changes of lifestyle anticipated within the next 50 years.

"Some of the concepts presented in this exhibit will shock its viewers, possibly even depress them," noted Scarfo, the artist and creator of the exhibit, "but most will excite the imagination and give new hope for the future."

Scarfo, a prominent space science illustrator, was the Creative Art Director for General Electric's Space Division for 15 years and has been a Science and Space Arts Consultant-Illustrator for the New York Times for over 10 years. A partial list of his TV credits have included "The Sky Beyond," NBC, Frank McGee; "20th Century," CBS, Walter Cronkite; "The 21st Century," CBS, Walter Cronkite; and the TV one-hour special based on Alvin Toffler's best seller "Future Shock" narrated by Orson Welles.

Scarfo collaborated with leading scientists and space pioneers to produce the exhibit. Dr. Werner Von Braun, Isaac Asimov, Dr. I. M. Levitt all made contributions to, what Scarfo calls, "the product of many years of careful factual scientific study and evaluation concerning the future of mankind."

Some of the subjects covered in the display include fusion power, Macro life (the next step in evolution), indefinite extension of the human life span, synthetic

intelligence and world government. Much of the exhibit is dedicated to the realistic possibility of future life on "artificial" worlds. "Such life," said Scarfo, "can be literally anything the inhabitants choose it to be since they will have complete control over their environment and

social organization. The true Utopia may not be on Earth."

The exhibit will be a highlight of the Third Annual Induction Day ceremonies at the International Space Hall of Fame and will continue on exhibit through November 6.

## Range caterpillar kill pegged at 98 percent

Data from permanent sample plots indicate more than 98 percent of the range caterpillars were killed in a 1.2 million acre control program in four northeastern New Mexico counties. Dr. William P. Stephens, Director of the New Mexico Department of Agriculture (NMDA) and coordinator of the state's range caterpillar control program, released the kill figures after final tabulation of data collected by department personnel. He said the control of range caterpillar should last several seasons in the treated area. He also said this summer's range caterpillar spray program was one of the largest control programs NMDA has handled in terms of acres. He said it also marked the use of additional state disaster aid funding for range caterpillar control due to the refusal of United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) to join the control program except on a limited basis.

This year's caterpillar control program cost \$1.68 per acre. The Animal Plant Health Inspection Agency, (APHIS)

USDA, provided only 350 thousand dollars as their portion. Because of the heavy rancher sign up, Governor Apodaca decided to release additional state disaster aid funds to make up for the federal deficit and to provide funds for a range caterpillar control program for all private and state acreage signed up by cooperating ranchers.

Stephens said, "We hope this summer's range caterpillar control program will retard the worms on the sprayed acreage and relieve some of the costly devastation this pest causes." However, he said, he is continuing to work for better understanding by APHIS, USDA, of the seriousness of range caterpillars to rangeland and the need for additional funding to help ranchers and the state fight this spreading pest. "A high kill rate in this control program is what we worked for and why we have carefully monitored the rangeland infestation, documenting the worms' development so that we would use chemicals at the right stage, but ultimately," he said, "the federal government needs to join us with adequate funding and recognition that range caterpillar is an interstate problem rather than a local problem to a few New Mexico ranchers."

Total cost of the caterpillar control program was 2.1 million dollars. This cost is usually allocated on a cost-share basis with ranchers, state and federal governments each paying one-third of the cost.

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
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
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
