STREET, SEWER, WATER IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED

Assessment districts ok'd

The Ruidoso trustees Tuesday evening implemented action to create five special assessment districts to provide street, water and sewer improvements, by petition of property owners, in designated areas.

The areas, to be designated by resolutions, include:

— All units of Ponderosa Heights, Glen Grove Subdivision and so much of Virginia Road in Young Heights subdivision as is contiguous to Glen Grove subdivision.

— First, Second and Fourth Additions to Wingfield Homestead and Woodland Ridge Subdivisions.

— Paradise Canyon Subdivision west of Paradise Canyon Drive.

— All units of Pinecliff Subdivision.

— Town and Country North units 1 and 2.

Resolutions to establish these special assessment districts were submitted to the trustees by Fred Burns of Boyle

Engineering, Albuquerque.

"We will prepare plans for the projects in each area," Burns said, "prior to public hearings to be held for each project."

Notices of the hearings and resolution information will be published in The News.

Residents of the five areas will be advised as to petitioning procedures to obtain the improvements by creation of special assessment districts. The trustees will act on each of the five areas separately, as the legalities for each are worked out and the hearings set.

In other business, the trustees:

— Adopted Ordinance 78-13 annexing five acres in Section 11, Township 11 South, Range 13E; and Ordinance 78-14 annexing 10.5 acres in Brown Airport Tract, NE/4 NE/4 Section 15, Township 11 South, Range 13 E. The trustees had previously agreed to annex both tracts.

— Adopted 78-13 transferring \$29,905 to the Ruidoso/Ruidoso Downs Regional Wastewater Fund at the completion of Step 2, final planning stage for the sewer treatment plant to be built near Biscuit Hill. \$15,000 of the amount is from the General Fund, the balance from the

Utility/Sewer fund.

— Received a final billing from Mann Engineering, Roswell, of \$76,229.81 for planning services on the defunct Eagle Creek Dam project. The trustees instructed village attorney Ron Harris to check the contract with Mann and advise the trustees of action to take. Previous payments to Mann on this project total \$217,224.09.

— Were advised by assistant village manager Frank Potter that the investigation into possible water storage areas is underway and that locations for proposed reservoirs have been discussed with the Forest Service. Potter also said that exploration for new water sources is being considered.

— Accepted annexation of 81.02 acres in Mountain View Estates, Units 1 and 2, requested by B. H. Buchanan, Ruidoso and Dallas, Texas developer. The area is south of and contiguous to Fawn Ridge Subdivision. Harris was instructed to draft an ordinance pertaining to the annexation.

— Approved Resolution 78-12, continuing Ruidoso's membership in the Southeastern New Mexico Economic Development

District.

— Approved payment, from Lodger's Tax monies, of \$2,479.17 to Til Thompson for advertising the Aspencade Motorcycle Convention and of \$2,499 for 30,000 brochures promoting the Ruidoso area, requested by Ed Jungbluth, executive secretary of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

— Authorized drafting an ordinance to establish flood water elevations, covering 100 year storm conditions, as a guide for future building construction.

— Set November 14 as the date to hear an appeal from Forest Development Company requesting a zoning change in Tracts A and E. Sleepy Hollow Subdivision, comprising 40 acres, from Residential-1 to Residential-2; and deferred action on a petition to annex this acreage until the November 14 hearing.

— Were advised by Jerry Campbell of Boyle Engineering that work on transmission lines to the new Alto Treatment Plant will be completed within 40 days; and that Boyle will file the completion notice shortly.

SEC approves Jockey Club stock to buy race tracks

The Securities and Exchange Commission, Washington, D.C., Monday registered the stock offering of Ruidoso/Sunland Park Incorporated, enabling the purchase of Ruidoso Downs and Sunland Park race tracks from Fortuna Corporation by the Ruidoso Jockey Club Incorporated.

"The Jockey Club," manager Lloyd L. Davis Jr., said to The News Monday, "can now ask for money offered under letters of intent to support the purchase of the two tracks, as filed by our members."

Davis said the Jockey Club has until November 30 to raise the money to buy the tracks, but can close the deal within 15 days of September 25.

The purchase price of the properties is pegged at \$15 million, Davis said, with \$6 million as the down payment.

"The down payment," Davis said, "includes a cash reserve for operational costs and improvements."

Downs postpones ban on billboards

The controversy of whether billboards should be allowed to be posted in Ruidoso Downs continued at Monday night's Ruidoso Downs' trustees meeting.

The issue was not decided, but both parties, the trustees and the outdoor advertising representatives present, agreed to postpone the destruction date until

December 1, 1978. The extension was granted with the hope that a compromise could be reached.

"We could tell them all to be out by October 1," building inspector Harley Parnell said.

But Parnell is taking a more moderate stand. He favored the extension in hopes that a compromise could be worked out. He also wanted the extension granted so the outdoor advertisers would have time to provide an alternate advertising method.

One of the options the village could have taken was to pass an ordinance, either allowing or disallowing billboards. Parnell cautioned that passing such an ordinance might be a lengthy process and that certainly the advertisers would not favor eliminating billboards.

"Sometimes these actions take a long time to get acted upon," he said. "We need to look at the different alternatives. If we phase it out we need to give them time to get out. We may need to work something out."

Parnell also cautioned the council from making any rash decisions, saying that such action could have a bearing on future decisions by the trustees.

Two outdoor advertising firms were represented at the meeting. Hans Brokab of Newman Outdoor Advertising in Roswell and George Cragin from El Paso, Texas Outdoor Advertising made pleas to the trustees.

Cragin said that his firm had not been advised of a village ordinance preventing the erection of billboards.

"None of us were aware of any ordinances," he said. "We've always tried to work within the state and city rules. We'd like to work with you people on this. We never objected to any regulatory basis

before because we felt we met all the requirements. Give us a chance to sit with you and work something out. We don't want to create any problems for you. We'd like to work with you any way we can."

Brokab took the floor next. His voice rose with emotion more than once. He claimed the city clerk's office had told him in March that billboards were within regulations.

"When we came in here we were told we didn't need a permit for billboards," Brokab said. "That's why we put the billboards up. We wouldn't have spent the money otherwise."

Mayor Norman Wheeler disputed Brokab's testimony. "All you asked about were signs," he said.

Virginia Spall, city clerk, backed up Wheeler's comment. "You asked for signs," she said. "Billboards and signs are two different things."

The trustees then passed a measure to extend the deadline from October 13 to December 1 and urged the advertisers to discuss the problem with the village's Planning and Zoning Commission.

"It's up to Planning and Zoning to work something out," Wheeler said.

In other action the trustees: — Discussed specifications for a new garbage truck with an engine powerful enough "to pull these hills." Specifications will be submitted to various motor companies, with bids being accepted until November 20.

— Passed a resolution raising the installment fees for water meters to a minimum of \$75, up from \$10; and raised the security deposit from \$20 to \$30 for residences and from \$30 to \$50 for commercial buildings.

— Doubled the amount of fire insurance on the Village Hall and its contents.

Fire season postponed

The fall fire season may be delayed or postponed with the steady, drenching rains Thursday through Tuesday.

"I don't think we'll have much of a fire season this year, with the rains we've been getting," Forest Service fire prevention officer Charlie Mook, Smokey Bear Ranger district, said Tuesday.

"But, hunters and visitors should be fire safe while in the woods. Don't abandon fires and be sure they are out.

"The woods could dry out during the hunting season."

Mook also requested persons with "off-road vehicles or four wheel drive vehicles to be careful when getting off the maintained roads. With the wet, muddy conditions, they could tear up" portions of the countryside.

He also requested campers "respect private property and don't litter. Take out what you take in there.

"We'll provide hunter trash bins, located in heavily used areas and encourage hunters to take trash to these locations."

Area men face kidnapping rap, felony charges

Two nineteen-year-old men are being held in the Lincoln County Jail in Carrizozo on felony charges of kidnapping, armed robbery, criminal sexual penetration and assault with intent to commit a violent felony. The charges stem from an early Saturday morning abduction of a 25-year-old Ruidoso Downs woman.

Held under a \$10,000 bond each with no ten percent allowed are John M. Sutherland, Roswell, and Elias Medina, Dexter. The name of the victim is being withheld because of the nature of the crime, Lincoln County Sheriff Bill Elliott said.

She was taken from a Ruidoso Downs

motel about 5:30 a.m., Saturday, to an area between Lincoln and Hondo where she was allegedly raped, Elliott said. He added that the victim had also allegedly been robbed of about \$47.

Sutherland and Medina were arrested Saturday afternoon at the Hondo Bar in Hondo.

"The investigation and resulting arrests were the cooperative effort of the Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs Police Departments, the State Police and Lincoln County Sheriff's department," Elliott said, "I want to compliment the agencies involved for responding so quickly to this investigation."

The fall cleanup campaign in Ruidoso/Ruidoso Downs, sponsored by the Service Club Council, continues through Saturday.


Persons with trucks to volunteer, as well as volunteer drivers, are asked to register with Mark Mulholland for assignment.

The Salvation Army of Roswell will be picking up serviceable clothing. Donors may contact the Chamber for information.


Abandoned cars should be reported to Frank Potter at village hall or be telephoning him at 257-4014.

Mineral withdrawal clarified


Joseph M. Spehar, recreation and land staff, Smokey Bear District, clarified an announcement recently made by the Bureau of Land Management that the area surrounding the proposed site for the now defunct Eagle Creek dam project had been withdrawn from possible mining development.

The announcement in The News read that the action would make the land available to explore for additional water sources and possibly to locate raw water storage reservoirs not requiring road relocation or purchase of property.

"The withdrawal has but one action," Spehar said, "to withdraw the land from mineral entry. The land can still be utilized for other resource management activities, but if other projects come up, further studies will have to be made.

"The withdrawal doesn't automatically mean the land will be open for development of deep wells or another reservoir," he continued, "the justification for the withdrawal was the protection of the reservoir. Now that it seems there's not going to be a reservoir, we've posed the question of whether the withdrawal should be carried through or reversed."

Spehar, a member of the United States Forest Service, was involved in the preparation of the environmental statements and preparation of the applications for special use and easement permits for the dam project.

Telephone cable now being placed underground

In keeping with its goal of burying all cable possible, Continental Telephone Company is wrapping up the installation of more than 25 miles of cable in the Ruidoso area and according to state manager Dee Monson, nearly 95 percent of it has been placed underground.

"Our goal is to have nearly all our cable underground in six years," Monson said.

However, he added, there are some areas in which rocky terrain prohibits underground placement of cables.

He explained that rocky terrain would necessitate the need for dynamiting to open a trench for cable placement.

"Of course we can't do that in a residential area," Monson said, adding the problem was particularly apparent in the Ponderosa Heights area.

To date, the cost of burying cable in the most recently completed project has been nearly \$1 million, Monson said. Additional cable facilities are currently being placed in Ponderosa Heights, the northeast portion of Ruidoso and White Mountain III. Monson said the cost of the current project will be about \$200,000.

"These new facilities will accommodate our forecast growth requirements for about five years," Monson said, "with additional electronic apparatus, we should be able to handle projected growth for about 10-15 years."

He said the additional electronic switching equipment would increase the company's office capacity by a potential number of 600 customers.

"This will relieve the busy signals encountered when dialing direct," Monson said, "it will also allow for additional growth."

He added that customers in the three affected areas can expect to experience

service outages when the new equipment is switched into operation. He added the average outage should amount to no more than two hours.

A \$130,000 project aimed at construction of a service supply warehouse behind Sierra Blanca Motors should aid in the telephone company's continuing effort to improve service to its 6,024 customers served in the Ruidoso area, Monson said.

He added that Continental has 10,359 telephones in operation in operation in the Ruidoso area which includes Alto, Ruidoso Downs, Mescalero, Capitan and Fort Stanton.

A five year projection made by telephone company personnel indicated the company will experience a 38 percent growth by 1983. What this means, Monson said, is the company can expect to have 8,329 customers with 14,839 telephones by the end of the next five year period.

He said the projections have proved in the past to be very accurate.

Aside from improving the aesthetic value of the area served by the telephone company, the buried cable should itself aid in improving telephone service.

"The underground cables are filled with a silicone gel," Monson said, "if damage occurs, it will be confined to the immediate area of the sheath fracture."

Monson explained that a fractured sheath allows water into the cable strands which in turn disrupts subscriber's service. Aerial cables allow moisture to collect and gravity flow to a lower area with all cable touched by the internal moisture having to be repaired.

He said the silicone tends to repel moisture.

"We're very pleased with these projects," Monson said, "burying our lines improves the beauty of our community. We hope our customers appreciate it too."



Warrior coaches expect recovery in loop play

The Ruidoso Warriors don't look like a professional football team on the field, but their attitude off the field rivals that of any National Football League team. And it is that attitude that is keeping Warrior grid hopes optimistic.

The Warriors are 0-3 on the year and 0-1 in district but two of those losses were of the type that could have gone either way. In the other contest Ruidoso fought valiantly before giving way to a better team.

Head coach Darrel Stierwalt's crew faces another team that he conceded is simply better this week when the Warriors travel to Silver City for a Friday night contest with the Fighting Colts. But Stierwalt hopes that his team will improve enough by playing these tougher opponents and give the Warriors a shot at the district title.

"We feel like playing tough teams will help us in district," Stierwalt said. "Hopefully we'll rise to the occasion. We'll do the best we can."

Of course, Stierwalt is aware that

playing these tougher opponents could have a negative effect on his troops. But he and his entire coaching staff believe in the program they are sponsoring. Included in that program is a junior varsity team, Assistant coach Bob Elder explained the value of such a system.

"This year we had guys who hadn't played since ninth grade. They weren't good enough to play in tenth or eleventh grade but as seniors, they had to be good. With the junior varsity program, the kids get a chance to gain the experience they need to play on the varsity level."

Stierwalt is also in favor of junior varsity football.

"We are sold on our program. We don't have any doubts about it. We're high on our kids. They have a lot to learn and they try to learn everything they can. They try real hard to win."

By employing the present junior varsity season system, Stierwalt hopes that future Warrior teams will be more aware of the system he uses when they reach the varsity level. The Warriors are going to have to be a better football team next year

when they move into a tougher class. "The district next year is a tougher brand of football," Stierwalt said. "It's a different brand of football."

And the Warriors have been getting branded by them. But the team is still willing to work hard, and as long as they do that, Stierwalt said, good things will begin to happen.

"The kids know it's going to be a tough game. And they work hard. They don't give up. We never quit hitting. We may get beat, but we come right back."

Stierwalt thinks this week would be a good week to make a comeback. He's hoping that Silver City will be overconfident.

"I hope they take us too lightly. They didn't scout us at all this week. They may not prepare for us thoroughly."

They may not need to. Silver City returns their entire offensive and defensive lines from last year's squad. And they are big.

"They are a veteran ball club," Stierwalt said. "Their quarterback is a good runner and passer. And they are bigger than Dexter."

Wildcats stifle Ruidoso

The Ruidoso Warriors played their best match before the home folks Tuesday but came up on the short end of the 15-12 and 15-9 scores in a hard fought volleyball game with the Tularosa Wildcats.

Ruidoso led most of the first game until Tularosa knotted the score at 10. From there the lead seasawed until Tularosa was able to put the game away.

In the second game, Tularosa jumped out to an early big lead and then fought off repeated Warrior challenges. Ruidoso was without the services of Kristi Perryman and to say she wasn't missed would be untrue. But coach Sergio Castenon was pleased with his team's efforts.

"I thought we played great. If we could have won this one it would have been

great. We missed Kristi but I won't hesitate to use this lineup Thursday."

Ruidoso travels to Capitlan for a tournament today and Saturday.

One of the areas that may have cost the Warriors the game was serving. Despite the overall good play, Tularosa was a superior serving team. They predominantly served overhand while many of the Ruidoso girls served underhand. The overhand serve keeps the receiving team on the defensive. The underhand serve allows the receiving team to take the offensive.

"Some of our girls just don't think they are strong enough. They get it in their heads that they can't do it and that's it," Castenon said.

Every girl's mother wishes he lived next door. Every coach wishes they had just a few more like him. He's the All-American boy. He's the one who'll play wherever the coach thinks he might help the team the most. He is a leader. He is Steve Cox.

Cox began the season for the Ruidoso Warriors at fullback. In the first game against Carrizozo he rushed for 54 yards on just nine carries. By the third game of the season, however, Warrior head coach Darrel Stierwalt decided Steve could help the team more if he was moved to the offensive line. Cox didn't like the switch but he made it without complaint.

"I want to play fullback. My goal as a lineman is to make it back to the backfield. But I'll play anywhere he (Stierwalt) needs me," Cox said.

Playing in the offensive line isn't a new

experience to Cox. He played center at Roswell High School before moving here two years ago. Once here, he was moved to the backfield and he fell in love with the position.

"I want to move back there as soon as I can."

Coach Stierwalt knew what he was doing when he moved Cox to the line. Cox does not complain about the shift and he is probably the most looked up to player on the team. The others follow his example.

"I'm conscious the other players look up to me. I give them support. I try to set an example of good sportsmanship and aggressiveness. It's one thing for the coach to tell them they did good and another for a senior to tell them. The freshmen need that," Cox said.

So far this season, Cox is setting an example of frustration. The Warriors are

0-3 on the year and Cox admits that it has been a frustrating season so far.

Like all athletes, Cox thinks it would be more fun if the team would win. No matter what the odds are when the Warriors take the field, Cox and the rest of his mates carry a positive attitude with them.

"You never know what might happen. We could get all the breaks and win. Maybe we could blow somebody out. That is the way we practiced today. We have nothing to lose. We're going to give them everything we've got."

Cox is giving it everything he's got to get into West Point. Once there, he wants to study diplomatic relations.

Despite the losses suffered so far this season, Cox is hoping that Ruidoso can make a comeback in district play. He thinks there is good reason to believe this team can come back, although he is surprised at the character this team has taken on.

"We've been losing but we never quit. Nobody lays down and dies. We still want to play. We are going to keep fighting." Sounds like Cox's leadership is rubbing off on the squad.

Dumping violators will be prosecuted

Violators of the state's refuse dumping statute will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law, according to Lincoln County District Attorney Robert M. Doughty II.

Those convicted under section 40A-8-4, New Mexico Statutes annotated, may be punished by up to six months in jail and/or up to a \$100 fine, Doughty wrote in a release to area newspapers.

He said it has come to the attention of the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County and the district attorney that widespread illegal dumping is occurring throughout the county.

Doughty urged interested citizens to cooperate with law enforcement officials by reporting the license number of vehicles and descriptions of individuals engaged in illegal dumping.

"The Lincoln County Commission operates three landfill sites throughout the county for disposal of waste," Doughty said; "these landfill sites are open to the public free of charge, twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week."

He listed five waste-disposal sites including, Hondo, one-half mile north of Hondo school; Lincoln, one-half mile west of Lincoln; Port Stanton Mesa, 5.2 miles East of Alto Village; the Carrizozo and Corona municipal sites.

Chile beans economical

Dry beans should be a real bargain in the stores this fall, says Mae Martha Johnson, Extension food specialist at New Mexico State University. This year's crop will be 19 percent larger than last year's and there's still a larger-than-usual carry over from 1977. Therefore, prices are expected to drop below actual production costs.

If you are not used to cooking dry beans, try these recipes and cooking suggestions. Mrs. Johnson suggests you combine the beans with green chile, which is also in good supply this year.

Green chile beans are very nutritious, Mrs. Johnson says. The pinto beans are rich in protein, the B vitamins and energy. Green chile is rich in vitamins A and C.

Cooking dry beans for any meal is easy, Mrs. Johnson says. Instead of using the traditional overnight soak in cold water, try this newer method, she says.

After sorting, wash the beans under running water. In a large pot, combine one cup of dry beans with three cups of water.

Boil the beans for two minutes. Then remove the beans from the heat and let them stand, covered, for one hour.

Now, simply bring the beans to a boil again and simmer them for two to three

hours.

You can add more water as needed. Salt to taste during the last one-half hour of cooking.

Green Chile Beans

1-1/2 lbs. ground meat
1/2 cup chopped onions
2 cups or more chopped green chile
1-1/2 cups tomatoes (chopped fine)
1 clove garlic (mashed)
salt to taste
4 cups pinto beans with liquid

Brown ground meat and onions, then remove excess fat. Add chile, tomatoes, garlic and salt. Cook for 5 minutes. Add beans and liquid to meat mixture. Simmer 30 minutes. Serve hot with corn bread or crackers.

Bean Relish

2 cups cooked pinto beans
1/4 cup cider vinegar
2 tablespoons sugar
1/2 cup minced raw onion
2 teaspoons celery seed
1/2 cup green chile, chopped
salt to taste

Empty beans into mixing bowl, including liquid. Add other ingredients. Mix well. Refrigerate to blend flavors. Serve as a relish with cold meat.







I love the rain for its blessing to the earth; because on these cloudy days the rapturous joy of my childhood returns; and the spirit of my Mother is close to reminding me that the Silver Lining is ready to shine forth — and cheering me with her blue-eyed angel smile.

The Rain Helps The Apples

These days of slow rain are great for the Apples now ripening on the trees in the orchards far and wide.

At this stage of their life, the apples are calling forth for all the help they can get from their tree to make a final effort to bring us the best in flavor, size, juice and health qualities.

The rain carries not only pure water but also many other life-giving elements down to the roots of the tree. From here the strength of the rain goes all through the branches, limbs, and twigs out to the apples. And this is not all. The leaves drink in the magic life of the rain. And the apples themselves "breathe" in the nourishment carried in the fog, the mist, and the rain drops of these rainy days.

And right here we are reminded of something to remember when we store our apples for the fall and winter: Apples stay fresh by breathing. They need air just the same as you and I. So do not close them up where they will smother.

The best container in which to store apples is something that allows the air to core in from all directions — like the old-time apples box of the bushel basket, both made of wood. In something like a steel barrel, the apples do not get enough air, and when one begins to decay, this same decay will be breathed in by the rest of the apples.

The apple inhales whatever is in the air around it. Therefore, store apples where they will not inhale the flavor of something like gasoline or coal oil or paint. Keep the air where the apples are stored as fresh as you can, and cool; but do not put apples where they will freeze. A light-woven basket or bushel basket or wooden box is good for storing apples, or a carton is fine if you do not put too many in the container. About a bushel is enough.

Good Keepers

Of course all fruits and vegetables are at their best when in season. And there is nothing any better for you than a fresh apple. So eat as many of them as you can during the apple season of October and November. You can not eat too many apples.

Back through the ages, our forefathers sought and developed food that would store, that is last through the winter and through dry times and other hard times.

Take that wonderful grain, corn. I guess it would last a thousand years under the right conditions.

The apple has been such a faithful friend to us for so long because it will last through the winter if you give it a chance. Our forefathers had numberless ways of storing the apples, in straw, in sand, in cellars, and dugouts. Also through the

years, varieties of apples were picked out and developed for their keeping qualities.

Fifty or seventy-five years ago there were perhaps two hundred varieties of apples popular in the United States. Among these were apples with wonderful keeping qualities like Black Twigg, Winter Pearmain, Arkansas-Black, Virginia Winesap, and York Imperial.

Generally speaking, the later an apple ripens the better it keeps. Therefore it is good to get the earlier apples to use; first, and then some of the later ones for the late fall and winter.

Although the main crop of apples ripen in October, there are summer apples, and what they used to call "Winter Apples" that are still ripening on the trees in November and even December.

Now is the time to begin visiting around through the orchard country to pick up your fresh apples.

Next time or so we can go into the different kinds of apples — which ones are outstanding for eating raw, pies, preserves, baked, applesauce, apple butter and cobbler and cider.

These rains will awaken the early Fall to days of joy in our mountain wonderland. Let us remember always to be grateful to Our Lord for the blessed friendship of each other, and for other blessings without number.

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Capitol Comment

Santa Fe — Don't Panic: There has been a rumor floating around the State that more than one hundred people getting funds from the Department of Human Services "Weatherization Program" will be dumped from the payroll on September 30th — but don't you believe it!

First, some background and then the scoop from our "birdies" at the Human Services Department.

The Community Affairs Bureau of the HSD Social Services Division basically is made up of the Weatherization Program and the old Office of Economic Opportunity.

Those programs handle Title Six monies and are included in the more politically sensitive area of Comprehensive Employment and Training Act (CETA) funding.

Certain programs are set up to provide for the purchase of weatherization materials, while other funds are available for hiring some 102 people to help implement the program.

Here's where the hysteria set in. Federal specifications call for a one-year deadline for special projects to be completed and that deadline is up the end of this month.

However... our sources at HSD say Cabinet Secretary Fernando E. C. De Baca is circumventing the Federal deadline — and probably a lot of hardship — by starting "new projects" October 1st.

In simple terms, the weatherization proposals can be carried on by instituting energy conservation plans.

So... if our "birdies" are correct, most of those on the payroll now will go off the feedbag September 30th — and go right back on October 1st.

There are more ways than one to get around the Federal bureaucracy, and it looks as if "Ferdie" has found one!

Let's Hear It for Gray Power: Since Government Reorganization, the Aging Service Bureau — that's the old Commission on Aging — has been part of the Social Services Division of the State Department of Human Services.

Our "birdies" say HSD Cabinet Secretary Ferdie C. De Baca would like to see the bureau moved to full division status.

Considering the mighty problems facing the "Gray Power" set in the present spiraling economy, some top members of the DHS brain trust feel the elderly are getting short shrift as a division bureau.

The status change could come by executive order or it could be handled by the Legislature.

So... just to cover all bases, those in favor of the proposal should check right now with Republicans and Democrats running for Legislative Office.

Should Be a Beauty: The September 29th budget hearing of the Alcoholic Beverage Control unit should be a gem.

The booze control people will appear informally before the State Finance Department's budget division to present and justify their 1979 fiscal year budget.

The hearing is scheduled for twenty-four hours after the mandated appearance of 15 of the agency's 18 employees at a proceeding of the Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Commission.

Non-partisan?: Capitol wall-leaners wonder how much of the Apodaca administration's proposed energy plan will hold up after election day.

Energy secretary Nick Franklin says he has found energy to be a non-partisan issue and feels that the next Governor and Legislature will give the Apodaca energy package a reasonable consideration.

The plan was released during the past week and contains comments on most pressing energy issues, including the need for policies governing the location of new mines, power plants and energy waste sites in the Land of Enchantment.

Top Guests: The 50th annual meeting of the New Mexico Oil and Gas Association is set for next week in the Capitol City.

Jack Allen, president of the Independent Petroleum Association of America will join Alex Massad, the vice-president of Mobil Oil Corporation, on a panel involving the marketing, refining and transportation of petroleum products.

Up In the Air: The Commerce and Industry Department of state government cancelled a scheduled meeting on a foreign trade zone designation for the Big Duke City.

Birdies say it was up in the air as to whether the Attorney General's office would give legal sanction to that proposed designation — designed to spur some international trade in the Albuquerque area.

Woof! Woof!: The City of Santa Fe has added a dog patrol — with three pooches trained in "controlled aggression" now on the Capitol City force.

Police observers figure the third dog has got to be mean. Dog number one is Oriole... not bad.

Dog number two is a bit tuffer by name Socorro. But dog number three has to be of concern — being named "Brutus".

En Espanol: Recently President Carter recorded a message in Spanish — proclaiming National Hispanic Heritage week.

Deputy White House press secretary Walter Wurfel says that during the next several months Carter will intensify his use of the Spanish language by dispatching Spanish recordings to radio stations around the nation.

Maybe Carter is hearing some Round House wall-leaners talk — that the Hispanic community will become the nation's largest minority during the 1980 census.

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
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New Mexico's pre-schoolers' immunization survey finished

The most complete immunization survey of preschool-aged New Mexicans has been completed by the state Health and Environment Department (HED), George S. Goldstein, Ph.D., secretary for health and environment, announced today. Goldstein said the survey is encouraging in some respects, "but the survey also documents the significant immunization gap still remaining among preschool children in New Mexico."

Dr. Jonathan Mann, chief public health physician for HED's Health Services Division, said the state's goal is to reach or exceed a 90 percent fully immunized preschool population. "This goal is part of the National Immunization Initiative," he said.

Thanks to New Mexico's school immunization law, which requires all

schoolaged children to be fully immunized before school enrollment, 97 percent of New Mexico's school children are already immunized. Thus, the major thrust toward meeting the overall 90 percent goal will be in the preschool group, Mann said.

The immunization survey recently completed documents current immunization levels among New Mexico's young children one to four years of age. "Our immunization levels are substantially higher than the national average, except for mumps," Mann said. "But the survey shows that thousands of young New Mexicans are still unprotected against diseases like polio, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus, measles and rubella.

Mann explained that the survey used a random sample technique to study

representative cross-sections of the state's population.

The study covered five vaccinations: DTP (diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis, commonly called whooping cough), polio, measles, rubella (German measles) and mumps. At least three-DTP injections and three polio doses are required for full protection, as well as one measles, one rubella and one mumps, Mann said.

According to the survey, approximately 11,000 preschool-aged New Mexicans are unprotected against polio, diphtheria, whooping cough and tetanus. Also, 17,000 preschoolers are unprotected against measles, and 18,000 are unprotected against rubella.

Although many of these diseases can be mild, Mann said they also can result in serious, long lasting complications. "Check your young children's records carefully to make sure he or she is fully

protected," Mann suggested.

Childhood vaccinations are available through private doctors and local health clinics or from the local field offices of the Health Services Division.

Mann said that New Mexico's response to the "immunization gap" will be forthcoming in the next few months.

According to U.S. government statistics and the study recently completed by HED, U.S.-New Mexico immunization level comparisons for preschoolers are as follows:

DTP	71%	87%
Measles	69%	77%
Rubella	62%	76%
Mumps	48%	40%

Albuquerque hospital now VA Medical Center

The name of the Veterans Administration medical facility in New Mexico has been changed to more clearly reflect the scope of health-care available.

Effective immediately, the VA Hospital in Albuquerque has been designated the VA Medical Center.

The name change affects most of the agency's medical facilities nationally, including all in Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, and New Mexico.

A recent agency directive noted that the

term VA "hospital" implies that hospitalization is the only service provided and that "the subclassifications of general medical and surgical and psychiatric serve no useful management purpose and have recently been a source of issues, prestige and image".

To keep changeover costs to a minimum, existing stocks of letterhead stationery and signs with the former names for the centers will continue to be used by those facilities until further funding is available.
