## NMSU REPRODUCES ERRONEOUS CHART

# Hall defends airport site

Richard C. Hall, Sierra Blanca Airport Commission chairman, has charged New Mexico State University (NMSU) agriculture officials with distorting facts on the location of the proposed regional airport on Fort Stanton Mesa.

In a letter to the district office of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), Roswell, Hall said:

"It was brought to my attention recently that a chart in the Sierra Blanca Airport Master Plan shows two different scale dimensions in depicting the Fort Stanton Experimental Ranch Land on an overlay of the proposed Sierra Blanca Airport. The result was an airport layout area more than twice as large as it should be."

In defense of the commission's position, Hall's letter continued:

"NMSU officials have reproduced the erroneous chart, distributed it widely and due to its error proclaimed that the

proposed regional airport would destroy the pasture rotation experiments.

"During a field trip to the Fort Stanton airport mesa on August 23, 1978 with three officials from NMSU and others, the question of which pastures were involved in the rotation grazing experiments was asked.

"The reply indicated that only the smaller pastures to the north of the airport

mesa are used in the rotation grazing experiments; also the large pastures to the west are used as control pastures.

"In reference to the erroneous chart, it would appear that the new airport would greatly impact the pasture grazing experiments.

"In reference to the correct chart, the rotation pastures will not be affected during Phase I development and only one

of the large mesa pastures, about 1,400 acres, will be adversely affected. The primary runway intersects it and would cut off the southern portion.

"However, an arrangement could be worked out to provide a corridor of about 1,000 feet wide to allow passage of livestock north and south of the western

## Water group seeking international meeting

In an effort to make headway concerning the desalination of water so that it may be made available for public use, the Consortium of Water Institutes and Centers and the Southern Plains Directors Wednesday decided to allow New Mexico State University to hold a workshop within a year with as many national and international experts present as possible.

The committee, meeting at the Inn of the Mountain Gods just outside Ruidoso, came to the conclusion that if any progress was to be made in the area of providing more water to the public, a workshop outlining specific ideas needed to be convened. It is hoped that from this workshop a comprehensive program can be established. If the workshop can accomplish this, there is a chance they will gain federal funds to aid their research.

"I think Senator Domenici (Pete) is willing to go to bat for us if we get a comprehensive program," said Buddy Babcock, who chaired the discussion. "I think he'll help us sell it."

Domenici indicated he would help the committee Tuesday when they were in Roswell on the first leg of their meeting. "New Mexicans, more than most

Americans, know how critical water is," Domenici said. "On the east side of our state, our major water resource is declining. Literally billions of gallons of water, much too brackish to use right now, lies under much of our state. With imagination and new technology, we can solve these problems and provide the water our state's economy needs. Without an investment now, however, we will pay a terrible price later."

Dr. Thomas Bahr, director of the New Mexico Water Resources and Research Institute at Las Cruces, said in order to become eligible for federal funding, the workshop will have to set up specific guidelines on how to make usable the brackish and saline water in New Mexico.

"We'll have to fill in gaps on how to use brackish water," he said. "We'll have to set priorities at the workshop. We need to show how to do it, how manpower, money, etcetera will have to be used."

Bahr hopes to garner as many experts as he can for the workshop, hoping to get one who is qualified for every aspect of the art of desalination. He hopes the variety of experts will lead to a program that covers all the bases.

"To my knowledge we have never had a comprehensive program," Bahr said. "It is my goal to have one."

## Airport future outlined

The full potential of the proposed regional airport on Fort Stanton Mesa, Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) chairman Richard Hall told The News Tuesday, "will not be realized for at least 20 years and it could be much longer than that."

"There are three phases in developing the airport to its maximum runway length of 12,900 feet, with each phase depending upon usage and demand for longer runways.

"Also to be considered is the possibility that a 12,900 foot runway may never be needed as large passenger capacity jet liners are being built today that do not require exceedingly long runways."

Hall noted that as soon as the federal agencies involved make the mesa land available for the airport, and financing is arranged, "it's possible the Phase I operation of the facility could begin in 1981 or 1982."


The time element involved in

development of the airport, Hall said, "puts Phase I usage at eight to 10 years after completion; Phase II, to be built when needed, might be implemented in an additional seven to 10 years with Phase III, if it's ever needed, being added when the Phase II facility is obsolete."

Hall's breakdown of the development stages of the three phases, stressing the safety factor, includes:

## Highway project bills to be drafted

The New Mexico State Highway Commission agreed Wednesday to have two bills drawn up for presentation to the state legislature, one requesting \$15 million appropriation and the other proposing the motor vehicle excise tax be earmarked for funding an overlay project.

During the briefing session held at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, the commission requested Fred O'Cheskey, chief highway administrator, to draw up a request for \$10 million from the state to continue the \$50 million, five year energy use, roads project begun last year and \$5 million for improvement of bridges and other critical projects not included in the energy project.

The commission also requested O'Cheskey draw up a bill proposing the motor vehicle excise tax be earmarked for funding an overlay project designed to keep pace with the need for improvements for deficient highways.

A member of the highway staff said there were 3,295 miles of deficient or deteriorating highway in 1968 and over 4,200 miles in 1978, adding \$19 million would be needed to halt the downward trend and slightly improve the highways.

"We are losing ground; the system is wearing out," he said. "We haven't kept pace."

In the past, \$4.5 million has been appropriated for such a project, leading the commissioners to feel \$14.5 million would be needed.

To fund the \$14.5 million project, the commissioners agreed to request the motor vehicle excise tax be earmarked for specific use instead of being placed in the

general fund.

Estimated revenue from the tax for 1978-79 is \$17.6 million, exceeding the amount needed the first year.

But, a highway staff member said the project is designed as a 10 year replacement cycle and, in that time period, the rate at which the excise tax revenue increased would not be as high as the rate at which construction costs would rise.

The said total revenue generated by the excise tax in the first year would exceed the amount needed, but in the next few years the surplus funds would be used when the excise tax would not cover the construction costs.

Also during the briefing session, the commission tabled action on a proposal regarding the present gasoline tax.

The commission will meet again today in the Mescalero Room at the Inn.

## Stirling Spencer enters county commission race

Stirling T. Spencer, Carrizozo, announced Monday to launch a write-in campaign for the office of Lincoln County Commissioner.

Spencer, a longtime county resident, has been involved with business and land management including city and county land and water planning.

A graduate of New Mexico State University, where he received a BS in chemical engineering, he was involved with the engineering aspects of water treatment and management for five years, and presently is an engineering consultant.

Spencer has been a member of the Carrizozo School Board, Carrizozo Soil and Water Conservation Board, Lincoln County Livestock Advisory Board and the Lincoln County Farm and Livestock Bureau.

Formerly an officer with the United States Army, he and his family operate the Bar W Ranch near Carrizozo.

Spencer also attended Carrizozo schools and New Mexico Military Institute.

"I am a political conservative in action, with a great belief in fiscal responsibility," Spencer said.

"I am asking everyone to perform the write in operation (when voting) in order for Lincoln County to choose its commissioners and not have the governor do it for us."

Spencer is seeking the position from which Lee Straley has resigned. Straley's name will appear on the ballot and unless a write-in candidate is elected, he will be re-elected and a replacement selected by the newly elected governor.

Spencer and his wife, Mary, have two children Stirling Jr., and Christopher.

## DAV to hold benefits meeting for veterans

Detailed explanations of the full range of benefits available to disabled veterans and their families will be presented at open meetings Friday and Saturday beginning at 8 a.m., at Ingalls Memorial Home, 1009 North Richardson, Roswell.

The sessions, sponsored by Sunshine State Chapter 4 of the Disabled American Veterans (DAV), Roswell, are open to all veterans and their dependents.

"We're holding this meeting because we're concerned that so many veterans and their dependents aren't aware of the federal benefits they're entitled to," Stan G. Gerber, Chapter Commander, said.

"The DAV is particularly concerned that Vietnam era veterans aren't taking full advantage of the benefits and services they've earned."

"Also, many veterans aren't aware of the professional assistance that's available to them free of charge through the DAV to insure that they receive maximum entitlement."

During the meetings, DAV National Service Officers and other trained veterans' benefits experts will be available to individually counsel veterans and members of their families concerning veterans' rights and benefits, Gerber said.



end of the runway. "This arrangement would result from a compromise between Phase I and II developments where the west end of the runway would be shortened by 1,100 feet and this distance added to the east end. The 1,100 feet would then be added to the west end during Phase II development." In referring to a statement by NMSU on the effect the airport would have on their experiments at the mesa, Hall's letter said: "Even the ultimate regional airport does not 'cut the heart out of the agriculture experiments', as NMSU recently charged. Hall also said: "Future compromises can be worked out to limit the effects on NMSU experimental work." On the attitude of NMSU officials toward locating the regional airport on Fort Stanton mesa, Hall's letter concluded: "Again I will state that the Phase I development can be made compatible with the on-going pasture grazing experiments. There has been a notable lack of any indication of compromise by NMSU officials regarding development of the regional airport on Fort Stanton federal land." "Also, I have noted a great reluctance by NMSU officials to recognize the fact that an established airport exists there. "Whenever NMSU officials are willing and ready to discuss joint use of this federal land by fellow New Mexicans, we will be glad to do so. "I feel confident that the phased development of the regional airport can be accomplished with little effect on the long range experiments by NMSU." Hall submitted a revised chart of the area to be occupied by the new airport, indicating accurately the areas to be affected by the airport, in his letter to the BLM. "Once officials concerned with approving the airport site have all of the facts at hand," Hall said to The News Tuesday, "I am certain they will rule in favor of the selected site. The information I've provided the BLM proves NMSU can share the mesa land with the airport and that their grazing rotation experiments will not be hindered to any great extent."

modern airport on the Fort Stanton Mesa. It will serve the general aviation needs for aircraft operations including executive jets and turbine-propeller aircraft. It will also provide safe night air operations. PHASE II — Essentially expansion of the initial phase plus the installation of a precision instrument approach system for all-weather air operations. This capability will enhance safety of operations of the same types of aircraft as in Phase I. Phase II development will commence only when economics and number of air operations justify the costs. PHASE III — Essentially an expansion of Phase II with the added capability of operations including air transport type of aircraft. "I want to stress," Hall said, "that the commission's primary goal is the completion of Phase I, as that will make our airport operational. After Phase I we'll be able to assess future needs on the basis of use and demand." As soon as the commission gains title to site, financial arrangements to fund Phase I will be discussed with the Federal Aviation Administration who, under present regulations, can fund the airport for between 87.5 and 94 percent. Hall, to clear up any confusion regarding the cost of the proposed airport, submitted the following general breakdown, by phases, to The News. PHASE I CONSISTS OF: 1. Primary runway 8,600 feet by 100 feet (paved with taxiway). 2. Secondary crosswind runway 6,500 by 150 feet (unpaved and no taxiway). 3. Aircraft parking ramp and apron area. 4. Security fence (includes livestock perimeter fence). 5. Navigational aids. 6. Lighting system. 7. Access roads (all-weather road from Highway 37 and gravelled road from Fort Stanton). 8. Terminal building (includes vehicle parking, lighting and landscaping). 9. Crash, Fire and Rescue building. 10. T-hangers for 24 aircraft. 11. Potable water and wastewater systems. 12. Engineering design and construction management. 13. Energy supply systems.

14. Operational and maintenance (O&M) equipment. Estimated costs of Phase I based on 1975 dollars are: Airfield \$5,908,000 Ground Facilities 4,509,000 Fees and Contingencies 2,084,000 O and M Equipment 87,000 Total \$12,588,000 PHASE II CONSISTS OF: 1. Modify and lengthen primary runway (extend to 9,700 feet and widen to 150 feet). 2. Secondary crosswind runway (pave 6,500 feet by 75 feet). 3. Aircraft parking apron (expand area and tie-downs). 4. Terminal building (expand building and vehicle parking). 5. Navigational aids (install instrument landing system). 6. Lighting system (expand and improve for night and instrument operations). 7. 
May these October days awaken in us our gratitude to God for all our blessings.



(Editor's note: This is the first in a series of communications from Melanie McGuire, exchange student to Sweden sponsored by the Ruidoso Rotary Club.)

Hi! and greetings from Sweden: I have been in Sweden for seven weeks and like it very much. The country is very much like it is around Ruidoso.

There are many lakes around this area and the Swedes take advantage of it. There is not an outdoor pool where I live, so everybody swims in the lakes.

I started school August 21, so I've been in school for quite some time. I attend school half days and take Swedish lessons the other half. I will take these lessons for three months. There are 30 United States exchange students in this course. The lessons will go very fast because we all speak English.

My classes include mathematics, civics, natural science, psychology, German, Swedish and English (Yea!), history, physical education, music and drama. I will not attend the first three for three months.

The Mattsons, my family, are very nice. Yvonne (mother) works at a health center; Arne (father) is a civil engineer; Arne Charlotte, 20, (sister) works in a bank; Thomas, 17, (brother) is in Canada as an exchange student and Fredrik, 12, (brother) attends school in the seventh year.

Lerum, the town in which I live, has a population of 30,000 but it is not big. We live in a villa that has four bedrooms, three of them quite small, a sitting room, dining room, kitchen, two and a half baths, three toilets and a utility and game room. A bathroom is where you bathe and shower. A toilet is where, well...

I attend Hvitfeldska Gymnasium. It is four stories high and has a cellar. It is just like Ruidoso High School (Ha!) There are 1,700 students.

I think this will be one of the most wonderful years of my life. It is a great opportunity and I think it should be considered by every young person.

Tomorrow's kickoff is at 7:30 p.m., at Warrior Stadium.



### BUY AMERICAN

Recent statistics show that the number of Japanese-made automobiles, TV sets and other steel products imported into this country has decreased. But the number of dollars earned is up, as the dollar's buying power continues to drop (because of the Carter Administration's continued overspending and high oil imports).

In April, Japanese cars accounted for an estimated fourteen percent of the U.S. market! Because so many U.S.-made products are barred from competing in Japan, the trade deficit between this country and Japan continues billions in the red. Last year it was more than eight billion.

Obviously some Americans are beginning to wake up and demand American-made cars, TV sets and other steel products. More must do so, if the dollar is to be stabilized and inflation checked.

To protect American jobs, the dollar's value, help check inflation and avoid a serious worldwide economic crisis, Americans should, when possible, buy American-made products. When the trade balance between Japan and America is again relatively in balance, more Americans will feel justified in sending their dollars (and jobs) abroad. — Santa Rosa News

### FOCUS ON IRAN

The United States can play no direct role in the resolution of Iran's mounting internal problems. But it shares with Western Europe and Japan a vital stake in

the consequences of Iran's social and political turmoil.

By hurrying his 30 million countrymen along the road to a modern industrial society, Iran's monarch, Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi, has incurred the wrath of a conservative Moslem hierarchy. That, and the Shah's frequently authoritarian rule, have led to growing internal protest marked by violent demonstrations, riots and acts of terrorism. For Iran's friends and allies, there are matters of profound concern.

Through the Persian Gulf and the Straits of Hormuz, both controlled by Iran, flows the bulk of Western Europe's petroleum, more than 80 percent of Japan's oil supplies and a substantial portion of the nearly eight million barrels of oil imported every day by the United States.

Iran not only sits astride the West's oil lifeline, but it also directly bars its northern neighbor, the Soviet Union, from access to those oil routes. And Iran is a key to the stability of a region that includes Pakistan, Afghanistan, Iraq, Saudi Arabia and the Persian Gulf oil states.

The Soviet Union's strategy of encircling the Red Sea-Persian Gulf oil routes and its recently enhanced influence over the Marxist junta now ruling Afghanistan render the maintenance of a stable, strong Iran more vital than ever to the West.

Oil, geography and the Shah's aggressive leadership have thrust Iran into the role of a pivotal regional power. Maintenance of this status, with all that it entails for the West, hinges on the Shah's ability to defuse the crisis now building within his country. — News-Bulletin, Belen

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## Researcher dubbed 'Chile Man'

8-Methyl-N-vanillyl-6-nonenamide and Roy Nakayama go together like seeds in a fire-red chile pod. They are, as many a native New Mexican will tell you, the combination excelente.  
For those of you needing further explanation, the first part of that combination, the 8-Methyl-N-vanillyl-6-nonenamide, is the chemical composition for an acidic, oily orange substance which burns even the toughest asbestos-lined stomach. Also called Capsaicin, this

highly insoluble substance is what makes chile muy rico.  
As for the second part of the combination, Roy Nakayama is the man who gave chile lovers their first foot-long, five ounce chile.  
A horticultural researcher with New Mexico State University's Agricultural Experiment Station, Nakayama was dubbed the "Chile Man" in 1974. That was the year he released Numex Big Jim, a hot, hardy chile variety dear to the palates of chile lovers everywhere.  
It took Nakayama, whose square face is well-tanned and lined from spending long

hours in the sweltering summer sun, a decade to produce Numex Big Jim. During that time, he estimates that he used 50,000 to 100,000 different plant selections. Finally, he borrowed pollen from a Peruvian variety and crossed it with a native New Mexico Chimayo variety that races its roots back 400 years, and with a California variety named Anaheim, and with other New Mexico varieties. Nakayama had developed the fruta superior, the all-around chile.  
Consider Big Jim's attributes: earlier maturity, larger fruit, higher yield, and, above all, that distinctive flavor.

Now, let's compare Big Jim with another popular variety, New Mexico No. 6. To begin with, Big Jim is larger than the New Mexico No. 6. Big Jim chiles average 7 3/4 inches in length. New Mexico No. 6 averages 6 1/2 inches.  
In the weight department, an average of five Big Jim pods equal a pound, while it takes seven to nine No. 6 chiles to make a pound.  
Those differences mean growers can harvest 12 to 14 tons of Big Jim chile per acre as compared to eight to 10 tons per acre of No. 6. Big Jim's high yields also mean producers get 30 percent more

volume per acre.  
Ironically, Big Jim's large size is also one of its drawbacks. You see, Big Jim Chile is so long it won't fit in a standard four ounce can labeled whole chile. Therefore, processors have to cut off either the top or the bottom of a Big Jim chile. And chile eaters are the kind of people who like to say, as sweat drips off their foreheads, "I ate the whole thing."

Nakayama has been around chile and farming for as long as he can remember. His parents settled on a small farm near Dona Ana around 1918. There the family grew to include four boys and girls.  
"We all had to work and work hard," Nakayama recalls. "We raised everything — melons, chile, pecans, squash, even sheep, pigs and a milk cow — and all on 40 to 80 acres of land. We did have a team of horses to help out with the planting, but for the most part we kids did all the work."  
"We worked all summer," Nakayama says. "And in the fall when all the other kids complained because summer vacation was over, we were shouting for joy. Going back to school was our vacation."

Although Nakayama's farm life was hard, it made him appreciate the farmer's problems.  
"I remember when we'd have a problem growing something on the farm," he says. "We'd ask for help, but usually there was none available. The answer just weren't there. That's why I try to do research to meet the needs of the growers and the processors and the customers. After all, if growers can't produce chile that processors can efficiently process and that consumers can buy, there's no use growing chile in the first place."

According to Nakayama, the total chile production in the United States has doubled since 1970. In 1978 alone, United States producers harvested 15,000 acres of chile. New Mexico and California produced about 90 percent of those areas, or about 20,000 tons of dry chile, and reaped a harvest valued at more than \$19 million.  
To understand what those figures mean to a chile producer, Nakayama says that a farmer harvesting 3,000 pounds of dry chile per acre would net around \$1,000 per acre.

Nakayama points out that chile is not a primary crop for most farmers. It does, however, fit neatly into a crop rotation program, and it does turn a nice profit for growers.  
Nakayama's current research is aimed at producing chile which is suitable for machine harvesting. To do that Nakayama is trying to breed a chile variety which produces six to eight chile pods near the top of the plant.

In addition, Nakayama is working to breed a paprika that is non-hot, high-yielding and that has a high red color content.  
According to Nakayama, paprika is used to color soup, catsup, meat and sausage. With the ban on certain artificial red dyes, he sees a potential market for using paprika as a food coloring.  
"Right now we import about 20 million pounds of paprika from countries such as Spain, Hungary, and Pakistan," he says.

If Nakayama could develop a paprika variety to compete with the foreign varieties, he thinks farmers could grow another 10,000 acres of chile a year.  
Acknowledged as an international expert on chile, and self-acknowledged as a chile lover, Nakayama does suffer from a cruel quirk of fate — he has an ulcer, the legacy of nine months spent in a German prisoner-of-war camp.  
But with his usual smile, he waves the ulcer aside, downs five or six antacids and eats all the chile he wants. What else can he do. He certainly can't and won't give up his chile.

## Knapps restore turn-of-the-century site



KNAPPS furnished their restored home in antiques.

In 1970, Tom and Dorothy Knapp crawled through a broken window at the old Buckhorn Bar, across overturned barstools, through the rubble and realized "this is the place for us."

Today the structure has been restored and is their home, studios and a bronze foundry.

"The place was abandoned to bats, birds and various creepy crawlies," Knapp said. "Vandals broke out the few windows and kicked holes in the walls; water ran under the old dance floor and rotted it away."

The Buckhorn, which "has absolutely no claim to fame," is located 10 miles east of Ruidoso off Highway 70, below Canyon Trading Post.

The 75-year-old building had been used as a local bar, dance hall and one owner even "partitioned the dance hall into a series of small rooms and attempted to revive the economy by operating a 'house of ill repute.'"

"The old Buckhorn died a natural death in 1965 when a new highway replaced the narrow maze of curves which for years had plagued the tourists traveling from Ruidoso to Roswell."

The building gradually deteriorated until the Knapps found it and began restoration.

The couple rewired and replumbed, tore up old boards, replaced walls and "gradually the place grew . . . and it became a comfortable, homey place which suited our lifestyle and felt good."

Knapps said some people were curious about valuable or interesting items they found during remodeling.

"When we tore up the old dance floor we found one silver dime dated 1909 — which is probably indicative of the affluence (or

lack of) — of the former Buckhorn patrons.

"We also found a skull on a shelf in the old service station building — which probably is evidence of some of the night life here."

But perhaps the most valuable things Knapps found were visitors' memories of the past in the old Buckhorn.


"We're always delighted when our friends and neighbors up and down the Ruidoso — Hondo Valley drop in and reminisce 'this is the very spot where I drank my first beer' or 'this is the place where I asked my wife for our first date.'"

Knapp's said despite all the time and trouble, they enjoyed restoring the Buckhorn and living in it.

"Now we feel sure that it was all worth it, but there were times those first three or four years that we almost agreed with a host of friends who were perfectly sure that we had lost our grip on sanity."

The pair are both artists, Tom specializing in bronze sculpture and Dorothy in watercolors and pastels.

Their home is also their studios and they welcome visitors, with a little notice.
