

## Elks' 'drive for hides' aids disabled veterans

The Ruidoso Elks are making an appeal to all deer and elk hunters to deposit the hides of their game in containers for that purpose located in Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs and Capitán.

"We can use the hides of deer, elk and antelope," Elks Exalted Ruler Rich Seeley said, "which will be tanned for exclusive benefit of our disabled veterans in New Mexico. I want to stress that all proceeds from the hides are turned over to the

veterans in the Veterans Hospital, Albuquerque."

Seeley added that the hides of cows, horses, sheep — any animal skin that can be tanned — will be collected in this drive.

"The theme of this annual appeal is," Seeley said, "We want your hide."

In Ruidoso hide containers are placed at Gibson's, Hughes Body Shop and the Elks Lodge; and at the Ruidoso Downs Fire Department and Cummins Grocery in Capitán.

Lincoln County political figures Friday, after having time to digest the results of the general election Tuesday, ranged from exuberant to non-committal in their comments about the success of Republican candidates seeking county office.

In the races for county office, each opposed Democratic candidate, whether incumbent or challenging an incumbent Republican, was defeated. The vote spread ranged from the 1,021 margin compiled by Barbara Lovelace over Barbara Ward for county clerk, to Marion Schlarb's 212 vote defeat of challenger George White.

The sole Democrat to be elected Tuesday by Lincoln County voters was Mike Kimbrell, running unopposed for a second term as county treasurer.

The News Friday attempted to contact the winners, losers and county chairmen for their remarks on the outcome of the general election at the county level. Many called were "out of town" and wouldn't be available until today, or later in the week.

The following comments were elicited in telephone conversations:

Republican county chairman Sherman Atwood: "There is little to say. I was very pleased with the response given our candidates by the Lincoln County voters."

"We're going to be working very closely with the candidates selected, as most of them have never been in a position of politics before, so they will need all the help and assistance they can get."

Concerning the somewhat surprising gains the Republicans made, Atwood said, "I'm of the opinion that the American public is going to go back to a more conservative type of government. I think the people want to get away from the liberal

type of government and try and curtail some of the government."

Democrat George White, who lost his bid to become the county tax assessor to incumbent Republican Marian Schlarb, said: "My comment is that I did appreciate everything Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs did for me. There was a wonderful turnout. I want to express my appreciation that Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs stood by their man."

"I just lost the outlying areas. I was leading up until the Carrizozo results came in. They got me five to one. They were out to get me and they got me."

Incumbent Marian Schlarb: "As far as I'm concerned, I'm happy. It looked like the people picked their choices. I don't know what else to say."

On her battle with White, she said, "I thought it would be close all the way." But she did express some surprise at other races that Republicans won: "Some of the races weren't as close as I thought they would be."

Democratic Bill Payne made an attempt to unseat an incumbent, District Judge Bill Sandenaw. He said: "I was running against an incumbent judge and they're the hardest to beat. I am not unhappy with the race I ran. I just misgauged what I thought I could do. It was a clean campaign on both sides. I've congratulated the winner. I just got waxed in Otero County."

Payne was surprised a bit at the overwhelming success the Republican party enjoyed this election. "I simply can't understand it. It was a reaction against Carter I suppose."

Incumbent Sheriff Bill Elliott, who lost his bid for reelection to Ernest Sanchez, said: "I really don't have any comment. The people spoke and made their choice

## Villages' trustees' agendas full

The Ruidoso Downs trustees will meet tonight at 7:30 in Municipal Hall and the Ruidoso trustees will meet at 7:30 p.m., Tuesday in the multipurpose room of the Ruidoso Public Library.

Forest Development Company (FDC) will present an appeals hearing to the Ruidoso trustees relative to a Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) refusal to grant a zoning change on land owned by FDC.

FDC has been seeking rezoning on about

five acres in the Sleepy Hollow Subdivision in the Upper Canyon, from Residential-1 to Residential-2. The zoning change would permit construction of condominiums, townhouses, row dwellings and apartments, as outlined in FDC's request application to P&Z September 6.

At the September P&Z meeting FDC's request for the change in zoning was turned down on a 5-4 vote of the commission.

In other business, Ruidoso's trustees

will:

- Act on processing an application to fund Ruidoso's portion of the costs for the Regional Wastewater System facilities.
- Conduct the final hearing on Ordinance 78-16, on annexing about 80.63 acres contiguous to the corporate limits, as Mountain View Estates, for B.H. Buchanan, Ruidoso and Dallas, Texas developer. Annexation of this property was approved at the September 26 meeting of the trustees, pending the drafting of the

ordinance pertaining to this property located south of, and contiguous to, Fawn Ridge Subdivision.

- Receive recommendations on roof repairs at the Ruidoso Public Library, financing of a new ambulance and equipment and combining position of Zoning Enforcement Officer with the present office of Building Inspector.

Items on the Ruidoso Downs agenda include:

- Action on Resolution 78-17, pertaining to uncollectible accounts.
- Planning and Zoning Commission report.
- Bureau of Revenue notification of no petition regarding the Gross Receipts Tax.
- Pre-application review of planned improvements at the All American Municipal Park.

## Chamber of Commerce sets business meetings

Two business meetings — one for operators of lodging facilities, the other for retail merchants — have been scheduled this week by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

The meeting on lodging will be at 7:30 p.m., Wednesday; the session for retail merchants at 7:30 p.m., Thursday, with both being held in the multipurpose room of the Ruidoso Public Library.

Each meeting will be conducted informally, Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Chamber said, "with the idea in mind that representatives of each group will air proposals they have in mind to improve the services offered to visitors to our area."

The Chamber's efforts to promote tourism are being built around community desires, Jungbluth said, "and we're seeking input to help us develop programs that will benefit our area."

and myself. "We're inviting everyone to drop in for coffee and talk with your Chamber representatives. We'll talk about anything from the election to Chamber projects; anything at all you want to talk about."

"These Coffee Cart sessions are strictly informal and held so that everyone can get to meet, and know, Chamber personnel."

"If you have any ideas that might help the Chamber help our community, we'll only be too happy to listen to you and give your suggestions active consideration at our board meetings."

## School budget raised to hire four teachers

The Ruidoso Municipal School System was granted an additional \$86,000 for the budget by the State Public School Finance committee after a meeting Friday in Santa Fe.

"We had 58.25 more students than estimated," superintendent Pat Valliant said.

"In order to get the funds for those students in this year's budget, we had to meet with (the finance) committee."

Valliant said the funds would be used to hire four more teachers, allowing the system to comply with pupil/teacher ratio regulations.

To be hired are a combination kindergarten/first grade teacher, second grade teacher, math/science instructor for the high school and a special education instructor.

Valliant said complete details of Friday's meeting will be discussed at the board of education meeting at 7 p.m., Tuesday at the White Mountain cafeteria.

## Commissioners have certified election results

After the regular business meeting Thursday, the Lincoln County Commission certified the November 7 election results.

Commissioners Lee Straley and "Shorty" Stoneman, meeting in the absence of chairman John Sudderth, reviewed the results compiled by the canvassing board, then signed the certificates of election.

During the regular business meeting, the commission approved a request made by the Bonito Volunteer Fire Department to sell their 1950 vintage fire truck.

"It still operates, but we do not use it as it is obsolete and under-powered," fire chief John Hall said. "Possibly another fire department would be interested."

"We just received a new truck and the only time this one would be good would be in a forest fire situation when all trucks were needed, but we don't have the manpower."

Hall added, sale of the truck would give the department space for the ambulance promised the district by the county.

In other business Tuesday, the commission:

- Referred a request by Bob Finley, Bonito Volunteer Fire Department, for supplies to Bud Payne, county ambulance coordinator.

The department emergency medical vehicle supplies are being depleted from the rash of accidents in the district.

Finley requested reimbursement or replacement of "nearly \$100 in medical supplies."

- Approved lease agreements with Zia Therapy Center and Saint Joseph's Hospital.

Terms of the leases, both reviewed by the district attorney, include multiyear and termination by mutual agreement clauses.

**Lake Lucero caravan scheduled next Sunday** **Temporary job applications at Forest Service**

An auto caravan to Lake Lucero, a part of the area that is the source of the White Sands, is scheduled for Sunday, November 19. The caravan is limited to 30 cars and reservations are required. Interested persons should call monument headquarters at 437-1058.  
The trip will begin at 10 a.m. at the Small Missile Range road intersection with United States Highway 70-82, 25 miles west of monument headquarters, located between the green and white mileposts 174 and 175. Park Rangers and military police will brief the group on regulations that

apply during the trip. The caravan will proceed over paved roads through the White Sands Missile Range to the trailhead to Lake Lucero. About two hours will be spent at the lake area to allow time for a one mile conducted walk, for photography, sightseeing and lunch. The caravan will return to the highway by 2 p.m.

Participants will need to be at the Small Missile Range gate promptly by 10 because they cannot enter through the gate after the caravan leaves for the lake. All persons should come prepared with enough gasoline, a spare tire, drinking water, stout walking shoes, suitable dress for the weather, sun glasses and a lunch. Persons are reminded that Lake Lucero is a primitive area without sanitary facilities of any kind. Cameras are encouraged for use at the lake area, but may not be used while passing through the missile range.

The Forest Service, Southwestern Region, announced today that it will accept applications between December 1 and January 15 for 1,500 temporary jobs in 1979 on the National Forests in Arizona and New Mexico.

The jobs will last from two to ten months and most will involve wildfire prevention and suppression duties, the announcement said. Pay ranges from \$3.57 to \$5.05 per hour depending on skill and experience levels.

Most of the jobs will involve work in the areas of forestry, fire, timber and recreation. Others require skills in biology, range, hydrology, civil engineering, surveying and the physical sciences.

The announcement said applicants may apply for work on only one National Forest. Application forms and additional information are available at all Forest Service offices.

Candidates will be considered without regard for race, color, religion, sex, national origin, politics, marital status, physical handicap, age, membership or non-membership in an employee organization, or any other nonmerit factor.





"Legion and Unit members," Post Commander Pat Huffsmitth said, "are asked to bring a covered dish for this event."

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

All interested persons are invited to attend.

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

## Colts, Hornets snare Super Bowl titles

Mike Douglas snared a Kenny Espinosa pass with less than two minutes to play to lead the undefeated Colts to a 6-0 win over the Broncos in the Little League Super Bowl.

In the eight to ten year-old league, Hornet running back Jeffrey Willingham broke loose for three long touchdown runs to lead the Hornets to an 18-0 shutout of the Lions to capture that age group's Super Bowl title.

In the Colt-Bronco game, neither team was able to mount a sustained drive in the muddy field. The cold was no help, either.

Both teams tried to move the ball mainly through the passing game because of the sloppy field condition. In the second half both teams mounted drives, only to see them stall within the twenties.

Finally, the Colts got their hands on the ball with under two minutes remaining. On first down, Espinosa went back to pass. Under a heavy rush, Espinosa heaved a long bomb (the ball went fifteen yards in the air) and Douglas ran under it, broke a couple of tackles and galloped the remaining 65 yards for the touchdown.

The Broncos got the ball with 1:36 remaining in fairly good field position at their own 43 yard line. Bronco quarterback Patric Pearson's first down pass was incomplete. On second down, he hit Bart Bowen for a five yard pickup.

Pearson's third down toss fell incomplete, bringing up a crucial fourth and

five. Pearson went back to pass, tried to scramble away from a heavy pass rush but couldn't. The Colts took over and ran the clock out.

It marked the second consecutive year the Colts won the title. They are coached by Ronnie Taylor.

Both the Hornets and Lions came into Saturday's Super Bowl match sporting 3-3 records. But Hornet running back Jeffrey Willingham settled the matter early, scoring on a 50 yard run in the first period.

Willingham put the Hornets even further in front in the second period with another long blast, this time scoring from the Lion 40 yard line. The extra point failed, but the Hornets had a comfortable 12-0 lead at half.

The Hornets iced the game away in the third period, this time again scoring on a long run by Willingham. This run was another 40 yarder giving the Hornets an insurmountable 18-0 lead. That score stood

as the final. The Hornets are coached by Lynn Willard and Corky Conly.

The battle for third place in the 10-12 year-old league also went down to the wire. The Cowboys earned the third place spot by defeating the Steelers 6-0 with a fourth period score. The Cowboys are coached by Jack Kannady.

## Deer hunters prosper

This past week's wet weather seemed to have helped some deer hunters and hindered others, but it should be almost all to the benefit of those afield during the last two hunt periods of the annual big game season, the Game and Fish Department believes.

Statewide, harvest seems to have generally been good during the opening two-day hunt period, reports Walt Snyder, chief of the department's Game Management Division, and many hunters reported seeing deer even if they didn't bag one.

"It's difficult for us to tell from field checks alone, but it appears that the hunters who were able to get past the problems of muddy roads and get out to do some serious hunting were doing pretty well," Snyder said. Season dates for the remaining hunt period is November 15-21.

"I'd anticipate that this moisture will really be beneficial" for the remaining hunt period, he said. "Hunters will have more time to get around during these longer seasons, and the cool weather should keep the deer active on into the day. Finding fresh tracks and moving quietly will both be easier to do, too. If there's snow, the deer are easier to spot, as well."

As expected, harvest appears to be higher in the southern part of the state, but it appears generally as good as or in many cases better than last year's in the northern part of the state as well.

"Reports from the four area supervisors are that there was a moderate number of hunters afield statewide, and that they were finding deer," Snyder said. "Some spots were reportedly down a bit, but that

likely was due to bad roads as much as anything."

He noted that there was quite a rush on Friday (November 3) by hunters wanting to change from the first to the second or third hunt periods, primarily because of the weather.

"I don't think hunters expect the Game and Fish Department to do anything about the weather," Snyder said, "but they will do better if they hunt in wet or snowy weather, even though it's not real pleasant."

He advised that hunters be sure their vehicles are equipped with mud and snow tires, tire and tow chains, jack, shovel, axe, and a tool and spare parts kit, and that the hunters be equipped with plenty of food and warm clothing for cold weather.

Each hunter should also leave word with a responsible adult as to where he's going, with whom, and when he should be expected back. A description and license number of the hunting vehicle are also important if the hunter needs to be contacted due to an emergency at home.

"Preparation, and a willingness to get out and hunt hard, are probably the most important keys to getting deer," Snyder said. "The license can't come with any guarantees, but those two things will certainly increase the quality and pleasure of the hunt, as well as adding to chances for success."

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# Capitol Comment

Sanita Fe — Don't Say We Didn't Tell You: Back around October 19th, this column predicted the Governor's race between Republican Joe Skeen and Democrat Bruce King "could end up on election day with possibly 4,000 votes separating the two candidates — and maybe less than 2,000."

With 98 percent of the precincts reporting as of Wednesday afternoon, the vote count showed 172,384 ballots cast for the successful candidate King and 168,765 for loser Skeen.

If our pocket calculator reads correctly (our pocket calculator is a pencil), that makes a difference of 3,629 votes between the winner and the loser.

Our crystal ball showed King with 49.5 percent of the total vote and Skeen with 44 percent and that left 6.5 percent of the State-wide voters undecided.

The final figures show King with 51 percent of the vote cast and Skeen with 49 percent.

And, just for the record, despite the constant reports of a heavy turnout throughout the State, we tabbed the total voters going to the polls at somewhere between 355,000 and 350,000.

Again, with ninety-eight percent of the precincts reporting, the unofficial returns showed 341,139 voters heading for the ballot boxes.

Jumping over to the Senate race, the showing of Attorney General Toney Anaya against incumbent Republican Pete Domenici has to be considered something of a victory for Anaya.

This column tabbed the percentages in that contest as 55 percent for Domenici against forty-five percent of the total vote for Tough Toney.

We also noted that anything closer would have to be considered a big bonus for Anaya.

With ninety-eight percent of the precincts reporting, the count showed Domenici with 181,409 votes to 157,478 for Anaya. That gave Anaya 46 percent of the vote compared to 54 percent for Domenici.

And ... don't kid yourself that Pete Domenici didn't realize his contest with Anaya was a great deal closer than some of the "commercial polls" were indicating.

While chatting in the Big Duke City, Senator Domenici confided to us that he believed our 55-45 percentage was closer to the mark than most of the forecasts.

What we can't understand is just where some of the professional pulse-takers get their projections.

On Thursday, November 2, we wrote that our "latest pulse figures" showed King with fifty-two percent of those polled after the two highly-publicized television debates.

That same column predicted Skeen had "about forty-eight percent of the pulse-rate with about five days to go."

The "head-in-the-sand" approach of most professional poll-takers reminds us of a story we covered a little more than twenty years ago while covering waterfront news for the New York Herald Tribune.

Two mammoth ocean liners collided in the waters in the North Atlantic, both vessels equipped with the most modern radar equipment.

Later testimony from members of both crews indicated one ship was sailing in perfectly clear waters with absolutely unlimited vision, while the other liner appeared to be sailing in a sea blanketed by fog.

The feeling of many reporters covering the trial was that no one stuck his head out the window to see what it was really like outside since the vessels had radar.

Apparently, that's the attitude of most poll-takers toward testing public opinion since they have their fancy computers!

### POPEYE WOULD AGREE

The cancer sleuths keep making it rain on our picnics. First we had to worry about the saccharin in the diet soda. Now it's the nitrite in the hot dogs.

New laboratory findings show a significant statistical link between cancer in test animals and the sodium nitrite widely used for many years as a preservative for bacon, ham, hot dogs and lunch meat. With that bad news comes the good news that the Agricultural Department and the Food and Drug Administration are keeping their bureaucratic cool. They are avoiding the kind of reaction that confuses and frightens the public and deals a low blow to the food industry.

The FDA's proposed ban on saccharin last year caused such a public outcry that Congress ordered its implementation delayed for 18 months. With nitrite coming under the same suspicion as a cancer-causing agent, the government is admitting from the start that it may take several years to deal with the problem.

With that we see federal agencies coming to grips in a more rational manner with data from cancer studies and the resulting issue of risk to the public. The list of substances which have a potential link with cancer is becoming so long that anyone trying to avoid all of them would hesitate to get out of bed in the morning, much less eat breakfast.

Until the so-called carcinogens is better understood, it is unrealistic for the government to make zero-risk the goal of regulations controlling their presence in the environment or food supply.

More than a few doctors have said they would rather see a person with a weight problem run the risk of using saccharin as a sugar substitute than run the clearer risk of being overweight. Where nitrite is concerned, an FDA official admits that if it were banned outright there would be "bodies in the street" — victims of botulism, the poison that can develop in foods not properly stored.

Clearly, if nitrite has to go as a food additive, there must be ample time to find a safer alternative or to overhaul the meat processing and marketing system so that cured meats can reach the family

refrigerator without adding preservatives to assure their safety. Not the least of the considerations is that only 20 percent of the nitrite in the American diet comes from meat products. The rest comes from natural sources, such as spinach.

No one has suggested banning spinach — so far. There are many chemicals found in nature which are exactly the same as those produced in a laboratory and used to enhance the flavor or color of food or to make it possible to market certain food items inexpensively and in abundance. An officer of the Monsanto Chemical Co. argued recently that cancer research is creating the "distorted" view that food additives are invariably dangerous.

"Just because a substance has a tongue-twisting chemical name doesn't automatically make it bad," he said. Popeye would agree with that. — News-Bulletin, Belen


## Ruidoso Ski Area prepares for approaching season

My heart overflows with endless gratitude to God, to you and everyone. This time of year, and on days like this, your soul is uplifted with reverent joy, and this world is close to Heaven.

As Thanksgiving Day draws near we will feel the spirit of this season more deeply and strongly in our hearts; and during this time of special remembrance of God's blessings we will all be drawn closer together in fond gratefulness for one another. And God will bless our lives more each day.

**CONFIDENTIAL REPORT** Battlestar Galactica was still in rehearsals when stories of feuds between its stars Richard Hatch and other cast members surfaced. Producers tried to hush it up since they knew they have a winner in the space show and in Hatch, although whatever show he's worked on has always been a scene of feuding. Even Karl Malden on 'Streets of San Francisco' accused Hatch of being 'too soft and casual' in his work. Though the deadly off-camera silence of some Galactica co-stars—especially Dirk Benedict—seems to roll easily off Hatch's strong back, friends confess the snub bothers him terribly. Richard is a genuinely nice, considerate person. And he's so disturbed by their pressures that his stomach is upset all the time. I hope he doesn't have an ulcer—but he never complains! He's always cheerful! Not complaining is the opposite of how most stars behave and, ironically, wins enemies. But the main lury at the handsome, good-humored star may just be old-fashioned jealousy. Don't be surprised if Telly Savalas seems intrigued by the thought of making that internationally known lollipop-lickin' cop the subject of a special dramatic show as part of his new deal with CBS, which calls for him to star in a special a year for several years. After all, Telly says, 'I feel I owe 'Kojak' a lot. I can't help thinking he should—and that he will—come back to the tube.

**INSIDE THE TUBE** It isn't easy to be a giant. When Lou Ferrigno, the 6'5", 275-pounder who plays 'The Incredible Hulk' on TV, runs into a typical male fan, what he gets is "Hey, Hulk, wanna fight!" followed by gleeful giggling. This upsets his wife Susan, but Lou, in fact, laughs it off. "When people laugh at me," he says, "I'm green all the way to the bank." The 26-year-old former Mr. Universe makes \$20,000 an episode for playing the pea-green colossus. He says, "Phyllis is dynamite. Beautiful, of course, that's obvious. What I like so much is that she's bright and lively." She says, "He's a doll!" If you think that sounds like two people in love, you're right. The two are Phyllis George, former Mrs. Bob Evans, now chief question-asker for the interview show 'People' and Mark Nathanson, vice-president of Spelling Goldberg Productions. As such he's in charge of production on six hit television series including 'Charlie's Angels' and 'Fantasy Island.' They didn't go looking to fall in love. Phyllis told me: "We met at a party, he asked me for dinner, and—voila! Neither of us expected it." Cheryl Ladd of 'Charlie's Angels' is no average working mother, but she does face many of the problems of any woman with a full-time job away from home. And she has some advice for other gals with careers and children: "First off, don't feel guilty." Cheryl counsels, "Your children can enjoy you as much in an hour as they could in a whole day—if you learn to make the time count. Being with a child 24 hours a day isn't necessarily being a better parent. To me, the definition of a good parent is one who gives the love and attention a child needs. I've learned how to make one hour as rich as a day."

**TV BACKSTAGE** Don't invite me of the week has got to be Ted Knight, formerly of 'Mary Tyler Moore' and 'Jim Nabors.' They were getting along so well, too, until Ted went to work opening Jim's show at the MGM Grand in Las Vegas. Exactly what went wrong isn't clear but after only two nights, Ted quit and stalked out. One member of the audience reported, "Ted's bit was a disaster, it was so awful." John Denver is celebrating another 'Rocky Mountain High' these days, since he was tapped for the International Skier of the Year Award at the fifth annual Samsonite International Ski Film Festival.
