P&Z DECISION UPHELD ON 2-1 VOTE

Trustees veto condo unit

The Ruidoso trustees Tuesday evening, on separate two-to-one votes, denied an appeals hearing request by Forest Development Company (FDC) to:

- Change zoning in a portion of Sleepy Hollow Subdivision, in the Upper Canyon, from R-1 (single family dwellings) to R-2 (multiple family dwellings); and
- Annexation of acreage contiguous to the subdivision, to provide 44.9 acres for the proposed R-2 development.

FDC's appeal action stemmed from a September 6 denial of the zoning change by the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) on a five-to-four vote. Voting no on the change were commissioners George Shoemaker, Earlene Phillips, Stanley J. French, Martin Rose and Alden Deyo; with commissioners Betty Patton, Rex Skellett, Mike Mulholland and Denny Lovell voting yes.

Other P&Z action affecting FDC September 6 included passage of a recommendation to the (Ruidoso) trustees for the annexation of about 39 acres of land in the Sleepy Hollow Subdivision, to be zoned R-1.

Prior to the presentation of FDC's development plans by engineer Tim Collins, village attorney Ron Harris advised the trustees that their action must be directed to the question of the effect the zoning change would have on the "public health, safety, morality or general welfare (of the community) and that it not be discriminatory."

Proponents of the project addressing the trustees included Collins, attorney Lee Huckstep, Howard and Kay Caster and Benny Coulston. Those opposing the FDC plan included Bill Uhelein, Mrs. R.T. Haysworth, Morgan Nelson, Gary Myers, Stanley J. French and Al Junge.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., advised the trustees that the 39 acres FDC is seeking to have annexed to the village is designated as "O" (open area not suited for development) on the Land Use Map of the

Ruidoso Comprehensive Plan to regulate future growth.

FDC's requests were denied through the following action:

- Trustee Sherman Atwood moved: "Do not annex area outside the village limits at this time," with second by trustee Ab Gunter. Atwood and Gunter voted "aye"; trustee Frank Sayner voted "nay."
- Trustee Gunter moved to: "Deny the rezoning request," with second by Atwood. Gunter and Atwood voted "aye"; trustee Sayner, "nay."

For the record, Sayner explained his vote: "We should follow the laws set and damn it, if we're not going to follow them we should give up the whole thing. I think the regulations set forth have been observed (by FDC). Other subdivisions have met all the regulations and were accepted (for zoning changes or annexation)."

In other action the trustees:

- Tabled bids received for 4x4-inch by 8-foot street marker posts pending receiving bids for 6x6-inch by 8-foot posts for the same purpose.
- Accepted the low bid of Rick's Welding Service, Las Cruces, of \$2,163 for an 8,000 gallon underground gasoline storage tank at the Municipal Airport. Also bidding was Kohhaas Tank Supply, Albuquerque, \$2,752.

Authorized village manager Jim Hine to process an application for funding of Ruidoso's portion of costs for the Regional Wastewater System facilities and other sewer expansion.

Received a letter from P&Z confirming rezoning in Lot 1, Block 4, Hamilton Terrace from R-1 to R-2.

At the final hearing, adopted Ordinance 78-16 annexing 80.03 acres, known as Mountain View Subdivision.

Authorized ambulance service director Ross Schwarz to apply for rate increases through the state Corporation Commission, to be effective January 1,

1979.

- Approved annexation of two acres of land owned by Tut and Wanda Shaw, located in Airport Tracts.
- Hired Emory Hatcher as Zoning Enforcement Officer for the village.
- Authorized Hine to interview applicants for the position of village Building Inspector.
- Accepted, "for health reasons", the resignation of Chuck Brown as Building Inspector, effective November 14.
- Were advised by Hine that two locations, both "off channel" near Eagle Creek, for construction of a hundred million gallon water storage reservoir are being investigated. One site is on United States Forest Service land north of Eagle Creek, the other on private land south of Eagle Creek.

Authorized the expenditure of \$10,000 in equipment to bring the new ambulance, to be delivered next month, up to state standards.

Authorized Hine to contact architect Rem Alley, Roswell, to meet with the library board and village trustees to inspect the library building regarding leaks and possible roof and construction defects, at the request of library board chairman Dave Travis.

Accepted replats for Upper Terrace Drive, Innsbruck Village and Middle Cedar Subdivision, for minor changes and modifications of originally approved plans.

Authorized the preparation of a resolution by Harris to dispose of dilapidated buildings, to be submitted to the trustees at the November 28 council meeting.

Ruidoso Downs plans meeting on dog woes

The Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday evening were in unanimous accord that the village must take drastic measures to solve the problems caused by unlicensed dogs running loose.

"It's costing us," mayor Norman Wheeler said, "from \$15 to \$17 per dog to have it captured, kept in the pound three days and destroyed. At the rate we're going, we'll go broke just paying to have dogs caught."

None of the trustees, including mayor Wheeler, had any complaints against the Animal Control Officer. "He's doing a good job," Wheeler said, "it's just that when he catches 20 dogs, 40 come into town to take their place."

After discussing contacting federal, state and county agencies for help with the dog problem, even to hiring a "government hunter", the trustees decided to set a date, between Thanksgiving and Christmas, for a community meeting to determine a course of action to be followed to control stray dogs.

"All dogs must have tags, be vaccinated, and so on," Wheeler said, "but when you see an untagged dog on someone's porch, no one claims it. We've got to find a means to control these dogs without going broke."

Prior to the open meeting, Wheeler said, "Anyone with any ideas, legal ideas, that is, on solving our problem is invited to discuss those ideas with me, any trustee or at any council meeting."

Action on resolution 78-17, on uncollectible water accounts, resulted in the village writing off accounts four years old. "I recommend that we raise our deposit fees for home rental units and leased businesses," Wheeler said. "There's nothing we can do if anyone runs up a \$50 water bill over two months, then skips town."

The trustees authorized village attorney Dick Parsons to investigate the possibilities of increasing the cash deposit to make water connections on rental housing and leased businesses and to report his findings at the November 27 council meeting.

The next Chamber of Commerce board meeting will be noon December 20.

Park, occupying 12.01 acres just across Highway 70 from Municipal Hall.

The planned improvements include construction of a 60 by 100 foot basketball court, including lights and fencing at \$12,440; a softball field, with lights, fencing and sprinkler system, \$9,040; storage and concession stand, \$8,000; playground equipment, \$1,320 and a group picnic shelter with slab, tables and grill, \$3,500.

Approval of the grant application is pending, with the federal portion to be \$17,000, the state's share \$8,500, with the balance provided by in-kind contributions from the village.

In other action, the trustees:

- Were advised that the Planning and Zoning Commission will meet at 7 p.m., November 20 in Municipal Hall, to discuss subdivision problems.
- Set 7 p.m., as the starting time for village trustees to meet during the winter, effective November 27.
- Were advised by the state Bureau of Revenue that no petitions had been filed protesting the addition of one-half percent to the Gross Receipts Tax effective July 1, 1979 and that the new rate would be effective on that date.
- Adopted Resolution 78-15, the annual inventory on outdated equipment.
- Granted occupation licenses to Unique Creations and to J.C.'s Place, with the latter to present his Gross Receipts Tax number to village clerk Virginia Spall before the occupation license would be issued.
- Acted to enforce Resolution 78-15, removal of the residence of Mrs. Rosie Jefferson, Tuesday. (Tuesday afternoon action on this matter was deferred for one week.)
- Approved payment of \$25 in annual dues to the American Association of Small Cities.
- Were advised that a liquor license hearing for Ruidoso Downs Race Track is scheduled at Ruidoso Downs Municipal Hall January 18, 1979.
- Authorized Chief of Police Lynn Martin to obtain three bids for the overhaul of one police car engine.

Schools need classrooms

Results of the special budget hearing in Santa Fe November 9 and proposed plans for requesting federal funding for additional classrooms were discussed at the Ruidoso Board of Education meeting Tuesday evening.

Superintendent of Schools Pat Vallant said the state Public School Finance committee had granted the Ruidoso school system \$86,254 to supplement the present budget.

A portion of the funds, which were granted because the system had approximately 58 students over projected enrollment totals, will be used to hire four additional teachers.

To be hired at the December and January board meetings will be a half time kindergarten and half time first grade teacher, a full time second grade teacher, a full time combination math and science teacher for the high school for half a year and a full time special education teacher.

Also during the meeting, the board heard a report from consultant Nora Chavez on the various paths to take when

seeking federal assistance to fund classrooms and building additions.

Chavez said the system should begin laying the ground work for applying for funds, but as board chairman Dave Parks said, "At best, if it all fell in place in optimum circumstances, it would take a minimum of three years for approval of the funds plus 18 more months until occupancy of the building."

Although the 20-room middle school was completed less than a year and a half ago, the system has begun investigating construction of additional classrooms because of their continuing growth rate of eight percent annually.

Presently the enrollment is 1,435 students while the capacity of the four schools in the Ruidoso district is 1,233.

Also, projected enrollment figures for 1979 are over 1,400 with at least 100 more students expected from a Mesalero Apache Tribe housing development five miles from Ruidoso.

"This year you can accommodate the students with the conversions (and temporary classrooms)" Chavez said, adding

it would be a "period of austerity."

She cautioned the board, "The chance of getting (federal funding) in the near future is not good at all. Even with a high priority, it would take three years."

"Then why are you (conducting) this exercise in futility? Because you've got to house the pupils."

Chavez urged the board to complete the funding applications now, but to remember "you don't know the situation until it develops," adding the students from Mesalero might go to Tularosa schools.

In other business Tuesday evening the board:

— Received a letter from the legal division of the state Department of Education on the gymnastics program being conducted by noncertified volunteers at the high school.

— Approved finances including checks and a minor budget transfer.

— Approved substitute bus drivers Al Dotson and Leona Rontoya, as recommended by contractor Rick Simpson.

— Heard a report from Donny Weems,

Nob-Hill Elementary principal, 323 of 346 parents or 93 percent attended the parent/teacher conferences.

Mike Gadden, principal of White Mountain Elementary reported 94 percent attendance.

— Approved proposed meeting hours for 1979 as 7 p.m., January through April, 8 p.m., May through October and 7:30 p.m., November and December.

All meetings are the Tuesday closest to the 10th of the month.

— Approved a call for bids for new band uniforms.

— Were reminded of the state school boards' convention December 1 and 2 in Albuquerque and the national convention April 21-24 in Miami, Florida.

— Postponed board policy handbook revisions until next regular meeting.

— Agreed to write a letter of recognition to Mr. and Mrs. Tom Loudon for their efforts to construct a shelter for school bus riders.

The next board of education meeting will be at 7 p.m., December 12 at Nob Hill Cafeteria.

— Approved a budget report from Eddie Parker, treasurer, showing \$8,288.61 in the general fund.

— Appointed director Rod Adamson to chair a committee to investigate a Chamber-sponsored group insurance plan.

— Discussed requesting Lodgers' Tax funds to finalize plans for national television advertising on "The Dating Game," Holiday Inn and Sierra Blanca Ski Area have agreed to donate to the project, leaving air travel as the only hold up.

Chamber representatives will approach the committee for \$462 airfare "in exchange for \$40,000 worth of advertising" on

national television.

— Rejected a city map proposal by Barron Publications made at the last meeting.

Thanksgiving Day Draws Near

This is being sent to you on November thirteen, and by the time these words reach you, we will be one week away from Thanksgiving Day, one of our very favorite American celebrations.

During the last few days we have had many different kinds of November weather. Of course this was the west wind making a roaring sound high on the hill tops. Still not a trace of its breath was felt down in the vale. The world was still as a picture. Then from somewhere up in the sky to the south came a certain call of the crow — almost human in its sound. Many times in hearing this, call I have thought it was some person calling out in the mountains.

This crow call is a signal that the sky is ready to clear up, after a long spell of rain and clouds and mist or snow. Right with the call the west wind moved down into the vale, sending all the drops from the trees flying in a driving shower. Immediately the mist and clouds began flying out to the east. The crows made their call again and a bit of blue sky shone in the sky. Somehow, the patch of blue was ever so welcome, and seemed like something new after two days of clouds and rain.

Then yesterday all day, the west wind blew beneath a pure blue sky. And today the thirteenth, in late afternoon, we are in Indian Summer again.

Referrals are made by the patient's physician for patients leaving the hospital still needing nursing or other services or, for some patients, home health care can be provided in lieu of a hospital stay. Referrals are also made by family members or other community agencies, however, the patient's physician is consulted prior to beginning home care services.

In the 1976 session of the New Mexico legislature, a law was passed requiring all New Mexico health insurance carriers to offer a full home health care benefit to their subscribers. In addition, Medicare and Medicaid pay for home health services through a certified agency for those eligible. Some agencies have grants or United Way funding to help pay for services to patients with no insurance or special services not covered by Medicare, Medicaid or private insurance. The local agency is dependent on contributions to help defray costs not covered by Medicare or other insurances.

Home Health Services expands

A renewed interest in home care, one of the oldest forms of health care delivery, is evidenced by an increase from five agencies in 1973 to 17 licensed agencies today according to the New Mexico Department of Health and Environment; the State agency responsible for licensing home health agencies in New Mexico.

These agencies, all providing a range of health care services to people in their own homes, are located in Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Espanola, Los Alamos, Farmington, Taos, Las Vegas, Alamogordo, Ruidoso, Roswell, Las Cruces, Deming, Hobbs, Carlsbad and Artesia. In addition, plans are underway for home care in Raton, Clovis and Truth or Consequences.

Home health care agencies provide such services as nursing care, home health aide, speech therapy and physical therapy to patients in their own homes under the direction of the patient's own physician. These services are carefully planned and coordinated with the goal of minimizing the effects of illness or disability or to restore health.

Home Health Services of Lincoln County started in October, 1976 with a federal seed money grant. The telephone number is 257-5189.

Home health care agencies provide appropriate services needed by the individual patient and family through the use of employed staff and contractual arrangements.

"The home environment has been found to be beneficial in the recovery and rehabilitation of individuals who have acute or chronic health problems," Verna Stoltzfus Adams, Ruidoso's Home Health Services director, said.

Attracting beginning skiers key to new ski area's success

The resort isn't nearly the size of Sierra Blanca. And it doesn't captivate the viewer the way Sierra Blanca does.

Nor are its hills as steep or as long. It doesn't stretch into the sky the way Sierra Blanca does. In fact, compared to the 45 minute drive through the sky to Sierra Blanca, the drive to the new Ruidoso Ski Area barely gets the engine warm.

But don't sell the new Ruidoso Ski Area short. Its manager, Ralph Rush doesn't expect to attract many advanced skiers. "We'll get a small percentage of expert skiers," he said. "They might take some race classes."

Whereas Sierra Blanca appeals to all skiers, and mainly those of better than average ability, Rush thinks the new area will catch the eye of the beginner. And for more than one reason.

"It takes less money and time to learn than at Sierra Blanca," Rush said. "Beginners don't want to drive an extra one hour and a half to learn to ski."

Rush thinks another benefit of the new area is the day care center for all kids under six years of age.

"That's going to be a real big plus," he said.

Another big plus indirectly will be Sierra Blanca, Rush believes. Since Sierra Blanca attracts such a large crowd, they aren't able to handle all of them. Therefore, Rush said, the new area will get the runoff.

"Sierra Blanca is so overcrowded," he said. "They turn away hundreds a week, thousands a month. We will be able to fill our capacity with the overflow."

Especially if from that overflow, the majority are beginners. Rush doesn't expect to attract many advanced skiers. "We'll get a small percentage of expert skiers," he said. "They might take some race classes."

But for the most part, the new area will be catering to the beginning skiers if Rush's hunch is right. But won't the new area run out of beginners to teach? Rush thinks that is an impossibility.

"We have the whole state of Texas," he said. "There is a never ending supply of beginners. There will be more as they progress."

"There is a non-exhaustible supply of

beginners from Texas. If we were in Wyoming or some remote place like that we might have a problem. But there is a never ending supply of Texans wanting to learn how to ski."

About the only shortcoming the new resort may have, according to Rush, is the lack of lodging.

"That really bothers us," he said.

Other than that, he said, he believes the first year of operation will go smoothly. He isn't even concerned with the low altitude and the possibility of a lack of snow. "The Ruidoso area can make its own."

To make its own, however, the temperature must drop below 30 degrees. If that doesn't happen, the resort could be in financial trouble. But Rush claimed he wasn't expecting to open until Christmas and close in February.

"There will never be a time that we can't open from that time to that time," he said. "Any more time than that just means bonus skiing."

Santa Fe — Keeping the record straight: Check back in our recent columns and you'll see where this newsman predicted the gubernatorial contest between Democrat Bruce King and Republican Joe Skeen "could end up with as few as four thousand votes separating the victor from the loser — in fact the final margin could be under two thousand votes."

Of course, the results won't be final until the State Canvassing Board gets together to certify the accuracy of the county-by-county returns ... and, it may be questionable for awhile what will be the outcome of the GOP contention their party lost several thousand votes because of voting machine problems in the Bernalillo heights.

As this column was being written, the figures from the Secretary of State's Office showed King with 174,180 votes compared to 169,093 for his opponent Skeen.

That makes a difference of 5,087 and if that holds up, we'll be 1,087 votes off our prediction.

Our predictions also showed Demo Attorney General Toney Anaya much closer to his Republican Pete Domenici in the contest for the U.S. Senate — and as far back as the convention of the New Mexico Press Association, Albuquerque Pete confided he thought our prediction was much more accurate than some of the highly-publicized polls.

The polls were giving Domenici something like sixty percent of those polled to thirty percent for Anaya with ten percent undecided.

Our crystal ball showed Domenici with fifty-five percent and Anaya forty-five percent, with chances good Tough Toney would close the gap.

Late figures from the Secretary of State showed Anaya with forty-six percent of the vote compared to forty-four percent for Domenici, which has to be considered something of a victory for Anaya considering the size of Domenici's war chest and the shoe-string campaign Anaya had to operate.

Chuckles: A long ways back, this column noted the number of automobiles parked in the lot at the PERA building with Joe Skeen for Governor stickers on the bumpers.

It was obvious, there were many more Skeen stickers in that lot than King stickers ... but not so the day after the election. In fact, we didn't see one Skeen bumper sticker on a parked car in that lot.

The chuckle is that not only do the newsmen check the bumper stickers, but the candidates campaign forces as well. But the campaign people wrote down the license plate numbers and they know who the owners are!!!

New Mexico politics — it's wonderful. Booze Boss-Chatter: Round Housers are wondering about the future of longtime state liquor director Carlos Jaramillo. Carlos has been booze boss since 1971 when he was appointed by then Governor Bruce King.

Some speculators say Jaramillo's differences with the Organized Crime Prevention Commission make him a controversial figure that must be evaluated twice in his present job.

They expect Jaramillo to transfer out of his liquor post — into another government area — possibly law enforcement.

Some birdies say New Mexico Retail Association Director Bob Gold would make a strong liquor director.

Gold chaired a blue ribbon citizen panel which studied New Mexico's liquor laws in-depth and held statewide public hearings on possible changes in those laws.

The birdies also say that Gold, a former broadcaster, has the personality and public image needed to make the red hot agency go from the public relations viewpoint.

But Gold has been with the Retailers for a number of years and the insiders figure it would take a lot to pull Robert from his present Santa Fe duties.

Coalitions Forming: Birdies say coalitions of support are forming within at least one agency of the state government — hoping to convince Governor-elect King that he should appoint a certain person as cabinet secretary.

But while support is gaining for retention or replacement of certain key people in the government, those involved should make no mistake — Big Bruce will make his own decisions!

Insiders said before King and his family left on a post election vacation, one key staffer asked the chief executive-elect what should be done with the numerous verbal and written requests for employment within the new administration.

Veteran King said those seeking employment should be asked to submit a resume and reminded the King administration will not take over the reigns of government until January 1.

HIGH PRICED HEAT

As fall approaches, more and more folks are giving thought to alternate or supplemental sources of heat for the coming cold months. The fireplace builders have been covered up with work for the past two years, right on through the summer months.

In many cases the high cost of space heating has given us an excuse to indulge in some enjoyable diversions. The \$3,000 fireplace which formerly was thought of as a wild extravagance is suddenly being thought of as a "long-term investment."

Fireplaces, however, with very few exceptions, won't stand up to a test when you put the pencil to them. Most are very inefficient heat converters and dispersing systems. Usually at least half of the heat goes right up the chimney. In many cases three-fourths of it does.

The designers are coming out with some new "firebox" style fireplaces where the combustion area is enclosed and the heat loss reduced; also manufacturers offer blower systems that draw air around the fireplace and exhaust it into the house for better dispersal of the heat being generated.

However, the open fireplace that crackles, pops, gives off dancing light and smells good is still the preferred design. It has a warm, romantic tone that enclosed systems are not going to be able to match, and in the final analysis, that's what makes the conventional fireplace so appealing.

Anyone owning a fireplace has observed that different kinds of wood have different energy values. The harder woods such as ash and oak burn slower and seem to give off more heat. Pine, pinon and other softer woods burn much more quickly, but they are preferred because of their aromatic smoke. Again, aesthetics over economics.

On costs, however, we are confident that wood is going to be running way behind in energy efficiency. Unless you can walk out the back door and cut and gather your own — which we flatlanders can't do — wood is still a luxury heating item.

Depending on how hard you can bargain, a cord of good, seasoned pinon will cost you from \$80 to \$100. Again, we need to know the BTU value, but we will hazard a guess that it's very low when you figure it out.

For about the same price you can buy a ton of coal. We do know what the BTU value of coal is. It's usually a little more than 10,000 BTU's. We burn coal in our ski truck, the Moose, because it's so much more efficient than wood. We are quite sure a ton of coal will put out more heat than a cord of wood — and of course it doesn't take near the space.

But even if you were burning 10,000-BTU coal at \$100 a ton, gas would be cheaper, believe it or not, even at today's high gas prices. If you as a homeowner, figure your gas cost at \$4 a thousand cubic feet, you are buying about 1,000 BTU's. At this rate that would mean you would buy 25,000 BTU's for \$100. Thus the gas would still cost less than half what the coal would cost on an energy efficiency basis, not to mention the cleanliness, flexibility and convenience that is inherent with burning gas.

So, throw another log on the fire, Ma, and sit back and enjoy the rosy glow of a roaring fireplace, but don't think thoughts of the family budget when you do it. — Hop Graham, The Lovington Daily Leader

NM-NEA ASKED?

In preparing his anti-inflation program for the nation, President Carter may not have consulted with the New Mexico Division of the National Education Association.

Less than two days after the President explained his anti-inflation goals to the nation over television, the NEA-New Mexico announced it will lobby for a 15 percent increase in the state's funding for each pupil during the next session of the state legislature.

Current funding of \$1,020 would be increased to \$1,180. This level, it was explained, will allow public schools to maintain present programs and to place a high priority on teacher salary increases.

Other legislative goals would provide cost-of-living increases in retirement benefits, retirement at any age after 30 years of service, full service credit for unused sick leave and no reduction in present retirement benefits.

The President had recommended an inflation peak of 7-8 percent, not 15 percent. — News-Bulletin, Belen

VETERANS PREFERENCE

A court action has been begun, challenging the constitutionality of veterans' preference in the dispensing of federal jobs.

The contention of some women is that this is, in effect, discrimination against women, since more veterans are men. And, of course, if the law had applied only to male veterans, it would constitute per se discrimination.

One can understand the chagrin of a jobseeker at seeing veterans' preference deny her a job. But the fact that men have been called on to fight the nation's wars in the past, many of them giving their lives for their country, and families, in the process, was also a sacrifice — by veterans.

Women of late have insisted that females be enrolled at the service academies and taken into the armed services in practically all capacities. This is now being done. Therefore, the national job preference advantage of males is in steady decline, numerically.

Males and females serving in the armed forces both earn job preference in the process. Females currently objecting to job preference object to it for both sexes. But there is no sex discrimination in the law. A better argument can perhaps be made for the proposition that only veterans who see combat duty or who serve in combat areas get federal job preference. But this would, in effect, discriminate far more heavily against females. — Santa Rosa News

THE WRONG GUY

Several weeks ago, during one of our periodic "Public Relations Drug Raids", State Police mistakenly arrested the wrong man. Instead of a user or seller, they swooped down in the pre-dawn hours with newsmen in tow and arrested a Santa Fe county juvenile probation officer who was not only stunned and surprised, but completely innocent.

The goofup was well-publicized so the innocent victim certainly should suffer no damage to his reputation, but it probably was a bit traumatic being hauled out of bed and arrested as a dope peddler.

What should concern the general public in this situation is the ease with which an innocent man was indicted by a grand jury on false information, arrested and taken to jail. If such arrests are made simply on the basis of a statement from an informer, without checking them out more completely, perhaps it's time we examined the fairness of our grand jury system.

Also, perhaps law enforcement people, who obviously enjoy and seek out the publicity attending a raid such as this, should be required to offer proof other than the statement of an informer before an indictment is handed down.

It is small wonder there is a big splash when the arrests are made, but few if any of those arrested are convicted. — The Rio Grande Sun, Espanola
