

Anti-WIPP meeting set at noon November 27

A meeting of persons opposed to the proposed Waste Isolation Pilot Plant (WIPP) site at Carlsbad is scheduled for noon November 27 at Nottingham's Deli, spokesman Naomi Tatum of Ruidoso said Friday.

Those expected to attend, Tatum said, include Kathryn Mead, coordinator of a Roswell group, and spokesmen from White Oaks and San Patricio.

The proposed WIPP site is ap-

proximately 170 miles from Ruidoso, Tatum said, "and the purpose of this meeting will be to inform area residents of the wide spread opposition to the project," as voiced by the statewide "Citizens for Alternatives to Radioactive Dumping" and the localized "Roswell Citizens for Alternatives to WIPP."

C-C suggesting programs aiding tourism development

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce sponsored two meetings for business operators last week, to explain the role the Chamber will play in local tourism development.

"I was particularly pleased at the turnout," Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Chamber, said, "and we received enough input at each meeting to begin formulating programs that will result in better service to our tourists, especially once our planned promotions are launched."

A group of 27 owners of lodging facilities in Ruidoso met Wednesday in the library's multi-purpose room to discuss ways of investing the Lodger's Tax dollars more effectively.

Jungbluth chaired the informal meeting. His main consideration was promoting Ruidoso during the "off season."

One way of doing that, Jungbluth said, would be investing Lodger Tax dollars into a tour program called Sun Country, USA.

On that tour, Jungbluth explained, tourists pay a set fee to fly into El Paso where a rent-a car awaits their arrival. From there, the tourists are encouraged to take sight-seeing drives to various parts of the Southwest including Roswell, Alamogordo, Carlsbad and Ruidoso.

In Ruidoso's case, Jungbluth said, the tour would concentrate primarily on setting up tours to Ruidoso during the off season. At any other time, he said, it would be fruitless to bring in tourists.

"This package would be geared for the off season," Jungbluth said. "There is no point in trying to bring in people that we could not lodge."

FIRE's evacuation plan set

The Committee For Insuring Ruidoso Environment (FIRE) discussed the progress of several projects and then set long range program plans at their Thursday evening meeting.

The committee, meeting with representatives of the Forest Service and Department of State Forestry (agencies which assisted with organization of the group), began finalizing plans for the Red Flag Alert and evacuation map distribution.

Ray Pulaski, state forestry, told the committee the Red Flag Alert Program should be complete by February 1979, estimating the total materials cost at about \$1,600.

He itemized costs at \$270 for 10,000 printed handouts, \$1,194 for 200 magnetic signs and \$145 for material for 400 flags.

THE COMMITTEE PLANS to distribute the materials throughout town during periods of high fire danger as a warning and prevention program.

Also during Thursday's meeting, the committee discussed their project of printing and distributing maps of the city showing evacuation routes to take in case of a major forest fire.

The four color maps, to be produced by Glenn Pike, will detail the Upper Canyon/Ponderosa Heights area, lower Ruidoso from the traffic circle to Camelot Subdivision, Country Club and Cedar Creek area and Alto Village.

To be included on the map are detailed directions for use and a cross-section illustration of a home showing potential fire hazards.

Copies of the four maps will be revised and updated by the Ruidoso Police Department and Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department, in addition to being correlated by the Forest Service and Department of State Forestry.

Publication of the maps will be funded by local advertisers.

IN OTHER BUSINESS, the committee considered long range projects including:

- Distribution of arrows throughout the village showing the evacuation routes and reinforcing the map distribution plan.

The committee discussed purchase of arrows through state Civil Defense, but agreed to approach the Ruidoso Rotary Club, which is conducting a street sign project, to request space on the posts for an arrow.

They also discussed supplementary

signs at major intersections.

- Coordination of a project with the Service Club Council's spring cleanup drive.

The committee agreed to support the present drive and stress pruning and fuel reduction.

- Cooperation with the village Planning and Zoning Commission in their efforts to rewrite existing ordinances.

Committee representatives hope to meet with the commission and present a list of

fire safety ordinances.

Similar activities with the Extraterritorial Planning Committee also were discussed.

IN ROUTINE BUSINESS, the committee approved Ruidoso State Bank as their fiscal agent and approved purchase of letterheads and envelopes.

The next FIRE committee meeting will be at 4 p.m., December 7 in the Ruidoso Public Library.

Commercial Yule tree cutting regulations set

Commercial Christmas tree cutting regulations were announced Friday by New Mexico State Forester Raymond Gallegos and Lincoln National Forest Supervisor Jim Abbot, Forest Service.

"Each Christmas tree cut or removed from either private or public land in New

Mexico and offered for sale must have a state tag attached to the stem," a Department of State Forestry spokesman said.

To purchase tags from the state forest office in Santa Fe or district offices in Capitan, a commercial dealer must provide the vendor with written proof of

ownership containing a legal description of the land where the trees were harvested and the signature of the landowner.

The tags, which cost five cents, can only be removed by the final consumer or user.

"The cooperating forest agencies advise the public to be aware of the Christmas tree tags and to refrain from purchasing

Christmas trees which don't have New Mexico state tags attached to the main stem," he said.









Junior racers' ski coach brings impressive credentials

The new ski coach for the Ruidoso Junior racers, Chuck Bent, isn't really a new coach at all. He coached the juniors for two years back in 1972 and 1973.

Bent, who hails from New Hampshire where he owns a building business, returned to Ruidoso a week ago and will devote his full time and energy to the junior race program.

Bent is 29 years-old, has a wife and two kids. He decided to come to Ruidoso for the ski season because he didn't want to hassle with the home building business during the cold winter months.

Bent brings with him some impressive credentials in the field of racing, both as a racer and as a coach. Besides the two years he coached the junior racers here, he spent time coaching in New Hampshire.

But his active racing career outshines his coaching credentials. When he was a youth, he was on the junior race team in New Hampshire. While doing that he became good enough to be classified as an "A" skier. An "A" skier is the best.

Bent was good enough to be on his college's ski team where he was the captain. After graduation, he became a member of the United States' National Team as a "hopeful". What that means is that he wasn't on the "A" team or the "B" team, but was on the third string.

Bent's racing career didn't end with the termination of his stint on the national team. In 1971-72, Bent skied on the then International Ski Racers Association tour where he earned enough "to pay my expenses."

He also skied in a race in Taos which was a prelude to what is now the Southwest Pro Ski Tour. Bent also plans to race on that tour some this year as long as it doesn't interfere with his job.

Of his job, Bent says he hopes to teach the kids more about skiing than just fundamentals.

"Our hopes are that the kids enjoy the sport," he said. "I hope they will become good sports. I would like for them to learn the fundamentals of a sport that they can stay with for a lifetime."

"I hope they'll learn a lot of other things than how to ski," he said. "I don't view myself as a win, win, win kind of coach."

"If the kids want to push themselves that hard, that's fine. But I don't think they should be pushed by someone else."

Bad weather good for conscientious hunters

When the weather's bad—that's best. It's best, that is, for the serious and properly equipped deer hunters who "toughed it out" and have been bagging deer in good numbers throughout the state.

For those who chose to stay in camp and play cards, the trip has been enjoyable, perhaps, but the hunting hasn't been nearly as successful, reports the Game and Fish Department. One hunt period, ending Tuesday, remains in the general big game season.

"Cold, snowy weather is the best there is for deer hunting or elk hunting, for that matter," said Game Management Division Chief Walt Snyder, "and the hunters who take advantage of it are doing well statewide, according to our field reports. The trick is to get out and hunt hard, back away from the roads and well used trails."

Reports are that turkey hunting has been good in the northeastern part of the state, especially on the eastern slopes of the Sangre de Cristos, on Mt. Taylor and in the Zuni Mountains in the Northwest Area, in the Sacramento Mountains in the Southeast, and in the San Mateo and Gila Mountains in the Southwest, which had a very good turkey crop this year.

Bear are being taken occasionally in all regions, as well, but are taken incidentally by hunters whose primary quarry is deer.

Reports from elk and deer hunters are filed with primitive weapons this fall indicated

that hunters would be finding deer, including some good bucks, this season, and that the deer harvest would probably be somewhat better this year than last.

Snyder said he still thinks that's true "but the hunters are going to have to make it happen. The deer are there. They're there in pretty good numbers statewide, and especially in the southern mountain ranges, and in reasonably good numbers in

the northern half."

Roads are most easily passable in the early morning, if they're frozen, and hunters can take advantage of that to get up into the hunt area and set up camp, or to get up and hunt with plans to return to main roads or camp before roads thaw and become impassable.

"Vehicles equipped with chains can get around well on all but the worst of the

roads," Snyder said, "and the hunter should use a pair of well-oiled boots to get him back into the deer country."

The combination of rough weather and the two first deer hunt periods have the deer pushed into deeper canyons away from the most closely hunted areas, according to field reports from officers and hunters.

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Trout waters stocked

The Game and Fish Department has begun putting rainbow trout into southern New Mexico's winter trout waters, and a trout stamp or validation is required of fishermen angling in those lakes or streams.

The stockings were delayed by an unusually dry and warm fall, according to Fisheries Division Chief R. L. Brashears, who said water temperatures only recently dropped enough to support trout life.

The waters stocked with catchable-sized rainbows from the state hatchery system include Lake Sumner Stilling Basin, West Lake of Bosque Redondo, Green Acres, Oasis Park, Berrendo Creek and Bottomless Lakes, Lake Van, Chaparral Lake, Carlsbad Municipal Lake, Bataan, Eunice, Jal and Carrizozo lakes, the Pecos River in the vicinity of Bolling Springs and the Black River in the vicinity of High Hole.

Winter trout waters in the Albuquerque

area include Corrales, Peralta, Tome and Belen Riverside drains and Conservancy Park Lake. In southwestern New Mexico, winter trout waters include Escondida, Bill Evans, Bear Canyon and Burns lakes and the Gila River in the vicinity of Red Rock.

Brashears said the winter trout stockings give anglers an opportunity to fish for trout in waters that normally would not have that type of fish.

The trout stamp or validation requirement on winter trout waters remains in effect through March 31, 1979. Bag limit is eight trout per day and no more than eight in possession.

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Ruidoso State Bank ups first place lead

Ruidoso State Bank enlarged their lead to five games over their nearest competitor in the Ruidoso Ladies Bowling League.

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Distaff jockey works to succeed at Sunland Park

 Marie Irigaray, an attractive addition to Sunland Park's jockey ranks this year, may have gotten a late start in her craft, but she's apparently had no trouble making up for lost time.

The slight 26-year-old brunette has been riding professionally for less than two years.

"I guess I got kind of a late start age-wise," Marie said. "But I've ridden horses ever since the second grade when we moved to the country and my father bought me one of my own."

Before becoming a jockey, Marie had focused her attention on child psychology

while attending Fresno State University. But oddly enough, that interest had an effect on her riding career.

"I quit school when I lacked only 13 units on my degree," Marie relates. "There were a lot of hyperactive kids in my hometown of Lemoore, California who needed some kind of therapy program during the summer. I had missed riding, so I came up with the idea of giving horsebackriding lessons. It worked out really well."

"Then another lady, who was also giving lessons, told me a small training track near town was looking for somebody to gallop. She was the trainer there, so I

talked to the guy who owned the place and he said to come out."

Although Marie earned \$150 a week during her three months at the track, exercising match-race horses, she experienced a lot of learning the hard way.

"They had me working horses out of the gate when I hadn't even been galloping very long," she said. "The track wasn't in super condition either and if the horse hit a hole, down you'd go."

The training track closed for financial reasons, but by that time Marie, undeterred, had the racing bug for real.

She started galloping for another bush track trainer at Hanford, a track run by

Ernie Cardoza, brother of jockey Danny Cardoza. "I made only \$30 a week. And sometimes I'd gallop as many as 15 or 20 horses," Marie said. "But I was desperate to learn. Later I started riding in match races with purses of \$5,000 to \$10,000."

Trainer Chet Salyer spied Marie at the match races and asked her to gallop for him at Santa Fe and then the California fair circuit.

Then in December 1976, Marie got her jockey license at Rillito Race Track in Tucson, Arizona. Success didn't take long in coming and she found the winner's circle with her third mount.

"When you win you just feel real happy," says Marie. "But, you know, that feeling's the same every time."

"A lot of racing is luck and it's a team effort as well. Everybody does his part and then it's up to you to ride to the best of your ability."

"If you don't win, you sometimes blame yourself," she said. "You can lose a couple of strides breaking poorly or you might move the horse too soon, but sometimes the horse is overmatched and you have to realize that."

prenticeship at Albuquerque in September," she said. "I tried to gain weight. Most horses here at Sunland start in at 113 and I was tacking 107. And as long as you have to carry the lead, you might as well weigh more. But I keep losing it again."

Marie doesn't ride many quarter horses — partly because of her weight factor and partly because she's partial to thoroughbreds.

"Thoroughbred racing is what it's all about as far as I'm concerned," she said. "In a quarter horse race, you go full tilt for 350 to 440 yards and that's it. But thoroughbred racing is more of a mind game. You have to know what your horse wants to do. You can tell when he breaks if he wants to go to the front or not."

Marie has had no problem getting

mounts at Sunland this season and her charges have hit the winner's circle any number of times.

"I think if you have the ability, trainers will use you," she said. "I think the competition is pretty even. And you don't have to act like a guy. That's a mistake a lot of girls make. Trainers like you better if you know what and who you are."

Although the poised young lady seems well content and confident with her present lifestyle, she has other plans as well.

"I intend to go back to school in the afternoons and get my degree. But I'll continue riding. You have to keep improving. You can't stop learning. I don't think anybody can fully accomplish anything."

New quarter horse race offering \$250,000 purse

The All-American Gold Cup, another spinoff of the superprestigious All-American Futurity, will be initiated at Ruidoso Downs.

The All-American series, according to general manager Woody Erwin, will now be a three-quarter pater and will provide an "unprecedented set of stunning big money events."

Quarter horses of any quality are now targeted for the \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity during their two-year-old year, then are pointed at the All-American Derby during their sophomore season. The addition of the All-American Gold Cup will provide the industry's juiciest plum for four-year-old quarter horses.

The situation will receive considerable gloss, starting in 1979, when the All-American Derby tops at an expected \$1 million. Thus, with the 1979 meeting, Ruidoso Downs will be in the extremely enviable position of offering two million-

dollar plus races.

The All-American Gold Cup, slated to be run for the first time in 1982, carries an estimated starting purse of \$250,000. The added money is \$10,000 and the distance (like the All-American Futurity and the All-American Derby) is 440 yards.

The new format goes into effect January 15, 1979 when the original nomination deadline comes due for the 1980 All-American Futurity. That long nominating road is also the beginning steps toward the 1981 All-American Derby and the 1982 All-American Gold Cup.

Richard Thompson, Ruidoso's director of racing and the main architect of the Gold Cup format, reminds horsemen that no supplemental nominations will be accepted for either the Derby or the Gold Cup. However, two-year-olds can continue to take the late penalty payment route to the All-American Futurity.

The date of this late nomination is being

shifted, starting with the 1980 Futurity. For the 1979 Futurity, there'll continue to be alternate late penalty deadlines: \$8,250 due June 15, or \$15,000 due at time of entry to the trials.

Under the new format (starting with the 1980 Futurity), a two-year-old can get into the game via a late fee of \$8,250 paid by June 15, 1980, or \$10,750 at the time of entry into the trials.

From that point on, there'll be no late penalty possibility for either the 1981 All-American Derby or the 1982 All-American Gold Cup.

If all payments are made in the regular fashion, the total investment for the 1980 All-American Futurity remains at \$2,500. It'll still be possible to save 20 percent via a "pre-paid" payment of \$2,000 due at the original nominating date.

Here's the complete nominating schedule for the 1980 All-American Futurity: \$50 due January 15, 1979; \$100 due March 15, 1979; \$150 due June 15, 1979; \$250 due October 15, 1979; \$300 due December 15, 1979; \$400 due March 15, 1980; \$500 due June 15, 1980; \$750 to enter the trials.

Starting with the 1980 All-American Futurity, the winner's slice will be fatter than ever. It'll go from the current \$437,500 to \$440,000 — which boils down neatly to \$1,000 per yard.

The 1981 Derby will be open only to those three-year-olds on whose behalf the trial fee for the 1980 All-American Futurity was made. The remaining payments: \$200 due December 1, 1980; \$300 due February 1, 1981; and \$500 to enter the trials.

The 1982 Gold Cup, in turn, will be available only to those four-year-olds whose owners made the trial payment for the previous year's All-American Derby. The sustaining payments for the 1982 Gold Cup: \$100 due December 15, 1981; \$150 due February 15, 1982; and \$250 to enter the trials.

APPRENTICE PATRICK VALENZUELA nabbed his first win on a recognized racetrack in Friday's seventh race. A newcomer to the Sunland Jockey Ranks this season, the 16-year-old guided 5-2 favorite Parker Petite to a near two length victory. Valenzuela, a native of Albuquerque, has had his license only a few weeks and avowed his first win was "pretty exciting."

His effort in Saturday's second race as a 9-5 favorite produced a 1 1/4 length win. The oldster is owned by Gene O'Dell of Roswell.

APPRENTICE CASH ASMUSSEN, who made his highly successful riding debut at Sunland last spring, has moved on to competition at New York's Aqueduct. And his winning ways went with him. The young rider notched both ends of the Daily Double, November 6, aboard Tokyo Rose and Infernal Vernal. Both victories came by sizeable margins. Cash is the son of the well known jockey-trainer team of Keith and Marilyn Asmussen.

THE HIGH PLACE PAYOFF for the season was tied by Scootin Lite in Friday's ninth race. The filly was a 100-1 outsider as she surprised the fans by charging to the front. Easy Million later established an overpowering lead in the six furlong test, but Scootin Lite held on for second and a \$51 place return. That same place figure was returned by Sunkist Fault October 27.

PROUD ENOUGH, a product of impressive bloodlines, was put to the test in Friday's eighth race and the gelding turned in a powerful third. The sophomore,

owned by Al McClain of Boone, Colorado, is the son of Proud Clarion, the 1967 Kentucky Derby Winner. Florentino Yanguz guided Proud Enough through the 6 1/2 furlong bout which produced a \$5.20 show return.

THE LARGEST VICTORY margins of the weekend were set by Shining Era and Five R. Misty. Both coasted in with over six lengths to spare. Shining Era cleared a four grand claiming contest Saturday as a 6-1 outsider. Five R. Misty downed maidens at 6 1/2 furlongs Sunday as the 2-1 favorite.

JOCKEY MIKE HIDINGER and Apprentice Sue Wethington were both suspended seven days November 6 through November 12 for careless riding in the first race November 4, aboard Itzinary and Eddies Ambition respectively.

DECKA TE and Miss True Trickle were both certified by the track veterinarian Dr. William Pitt to be capable of racing without medication and were reinstated.

SIX WINNERS came out of the No. 6 post position over the weekend, and made that one the most successful during the three-day period. 
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

State may lead nation in entire nuclear fuel cycle

In addition to leading the nation in the mining and milling of uranium, New Mexico may be able to play a leading national role in the entire nuclear fuel cycle.

Two University of New Mexico (UNM) professors have been awarded a grant to study the feasibility and desirability of developing additional uranium processing facilities in New Mexico.

Dr. Glenn A. Whan, associate dean of the UNM College of Engineering and

professor in the department of chemical and nuclear engineering, and Professor Stuart Burness of the UNM department of economics, have been awarded a \$36,215 grant from the New Mexico Minerals and Energy Department to conduct the study.

"The purpose of this study is to analyze the desirability and feasibility of promoting more uranium processing industries in New Mexico," Whan said.

He said four types of uranium processing plants, including conversion

plants, enrichment plants, fuel fabrication plants and reprocessing-waste management plants, are being studied individually and as a collective industry.

"Maybe we wouldn't want all four types of plants in the state. Maybe we would only want a conversion plant and an enrichment plant or maybe we would want only a conversion plant and a fabrication plant. These are just some of the things that we have to look at very closely," he said.

Siting of all four types of plants in the state would mean that New Mexico would have the processing capabilities to accommodate the entire nuclear fuel cycle, from mining and milling to waste management and disposal.

"The whole idea is to determine whether or not something of this magnitude could occur in New Mexico. These would be multi-billion dollar plants employing thousands of people," he said.

Whan said there are several considerations which would appear to make New Mexico a logical contender for location of the industry. Among them are:

— New Mexico ranks first among the 50 states in the production of uranium for nuclear reactor fuel, supplying more than 46 percent of the nation's total uranium production and having 53 percent of the nation's total known reserves.

— A site near Carlsbad is being considered for the disposal of nuclear radioactive wastes.

— Research and development for uranium processing is being conducted at the Los Alamos Scientific Laboratory and at Sandia Laboratories. "If all of the technology they develop is transported out of the state, then we're losing something," he said.

Also, since growth in the demand for energy is anticipated, there will be a need for additional facilities in the United States to assure an adequate supply of reactor fuel in the future.

However, Whan said, other considerations are not so favorable to New Mexico as a choice site for the industry. Among these are:

— Most of the nation's nuclear reactors are located east of the Mississippi River. A determination will have to be made to see if there are enough nuclear reactors west of the Mississippi to justify the location of the industry in New Mexico or at any other western site.

— The nation's present three uranium enrichment plants are all located on major rivers east of the Mississippi where electrical power is readily available. The supply of adequate electrical power in New Mexico must be considered, Whan said.


— Transportation of materials to and from the plants in New Mexico is likely to be a problem, he said.

— The socio-economic considerations are vast. Location of the industry in New Mexico may create a "boomtown" effect in some of the state's communities.

— Environmental considerations will also be important.

Whan said the results of the study will be turned over to state planners "so they may evaluate and decide the alternative development strategies for New Mexico's future."

The project's completion date is January 31, 1979.

Veterans Service head named

Edward F. Rose, deputy executive director of the President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped, will become director of the Veterans Administration's Voluntary Service (VAVS) in Washington, D.C., November 19.

The appointment was announced by Dr. James C. Crutcher, chief medical director of Veterans Administration (VA),

under whom the service functions in VA's 172 medical centers across the country. Rose will succeed Wilson J. Schuerholz who recently became director of the VA Medical Center at Miles City, Montana.

Rose will be in charge of one of the largest volunteer programs in the nation. Volunteers representing all of the major veterans organizations and many service and fraternal groups give more than 10 million hours annually to hospitalized veterans through the VAVS.

He was with the Civil Service Commission for eight years starting in 1965. His last assignment there was as director of public policy employment programs, 1970-1973.

Prior to the service with the federal government, Rose was with the Arlington County, Virginia, public school system as a teacher and as director of the George Mason Center for Retarded Children.

The volunteers range in age from teenagers to the very elderly. The tasks they perform include personal services — reading to patients, shopping for them, writing letters — running recreational and rehabilitation programs, providing entertainment outside the hospital, dietary assistance, hospital clerical work and assisting medical personnel.

"Volunteers are not only invaluable for the assistance they give individuals, they help determine the spirit and the at-

mosphere of a hospital," Dr. Crutcher said.

"Their activities can make hospitalization more tolerable by reducing its tedium and its anxiety. Volunteers provide their own kind of therapy, in addition to sharing the load of staff members and thus making them more effective."

Rose had been in his present position with the President's Committee since 1973. In 1976-1977, he was also acting director of the committee's state relations division.

He received the Arthur S. Flemming award in 1968. The award is given annually to ten young career employees selected from among all government agencies for outstanding performance.

In 1969, he received a special commendation from the Civil Service Commission.

Rose is a graduate of Virginia Tech and has a Master's Degree from the University of Virginia. He served with the Air Force from 1948 to 1952.

He lives in Annandale, Virginia, with his wife, Helen, and son, Edward Jr.

Off the Book Shelf

OSCAR WILDE

BY LOUIS KRONENBERGER
 Little, Brown and Company 1976

Oscar Wilde enriched our language with many memorable lines. One of my favorites came about when he stopped at Niagara Falls while on his way to Chicago during an American lecture tour. Oscar was not overly impressed with the waterfall and made many quips to that regard. But on being informed that Niagara Falls was a favorite place for honeymooners, he remarked that "It must be the earliest, if not the keenest disappointment in American married life."
 To the vast amount of literature about Oscar Wilde, Louis Kronenberger in a slender volume, has managed to add a full portrait of this extraordinary man. Wilde's was a short and erratic life, but it exemplifies that attraction readers have for biography. The lives of individual men and women do indeed hold a fascination for us.

First of all Wilde was one of the wittiest men who ever lived. He has provided us with aphorisms, quips and epigrams for all occasions. And there is hardly a writer who hasn't benefited from them. His comments, while almost always amusing, were often cynical and penetrating. Take for example: "Anybody can sympathize with the sufferings of a friend, but it requires a very fine nature to sympathize with a friend's success."

Secondly, his trial and imprisonment for homosexual acts made him a significant figure in our social history. Kronenberger deals with this and other aspects of Oscar

Wilde's life and it makes for compulsive reading. In addition, Kronenberger explores Wilde the novelist and playwright and he does so with the insight only a first rate literary critic can bring to the writing of a biography.

As to the conditions surrounding Wilde's arrest and conviction for committing "indecent acts," Kronenberger describes it best with some remarkably discerning lines from Macaulay written more than eighty years before Wilde's trials. Macaulay described the British public as making a spectacle of itself "in its periodical fits of morality." He claimed that the public would take a stand against vice about every seven years, taking on a victim until he was ruined. Then the public would go back to sleep for another seven years. Well, Oscar Wilde was the perfect target. The press, which never liked him, stirred up a fury of public loathing. This anger grew to be directed ultimately against anyone who even looked different. It was Macaulay's classic case of the virtuous public taking its periodic stand against vice, and for Oscar the public disapproval continued even after his release from prison. He remained ostracized and the target of insults until his death.

I do not know if we have adopted the British timetable of every seven years, but taking note of Proposition 6 in the recent California referendum, we must start counting.

Nevertheless, this is an engrossing book about a fascinating man by an author who is as taken in by Wilde's wit as I am.

In-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

The first rumor was that all unsuccessful D-one hunters could have their hunt period validations changed to either of the two remaining hunts.

The second rumor was that those unsuccessful D-one hunters could purchase a second big game license at a discount price.

And, the last but not least rumor was that the Department will hold a special hunt in January for all unsuccessful D-one hunters.

I hate to be the bearer of bad news, but all three of the rumors are just that — mere rumors. All unsuccessful D-one hunters CAN NOT hunt deer again until the next license year, unless they hold a permit for one of the deer-entry hunts.

The deadline for applying for all of the deer entry hunts was more than a month ago and all successful applicants should have been notified by now.

Again, the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish has not and will not make

any special provisions for any unsuccessful D-One, or for that matter, D-Two, or D-Three hunters.

I can't help but be amazed to note from our officers D-One hunter checks that hunter success in our southeast quarter of the state averaged about a low 18 percent.

This surprised me for the simple reason that wet, windy weather hampers a deer's senses. Therefore, hunters should have had a better chance of encountering and bagging a deer.

However, from what I saw during my patrol, the majority of hunters had convinced themselves deer could not be found in this kind of weather. So, they were quite content to ride in their heated vehicles on the few muddy roads that were passable.

Yet, most of the hunters that bundled up warm, left their vehicles behind, and set out on foot not only saw deer, but bagged their bucks as well.

Now, while those successful D-One hunters are home eating their venison steaks, those unsuccessful "road hunters" are eating crow and dreaming up rumors about special hunt accommodations.

One such dreamer had the nerve to tell me, after I had informed him we could not accommodate his whims, that he thought he would "just not hunt in this state any more."

My hat is off to all of those D-One hunters that bagged their deer, as well as those that did not, but at least made a gallant effort.

WIPP requests land to hold nuclear waste

The U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), has filed an application with the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), to continue to reserve 17,200 acres of public land proposed for use as a nuclear waste isolation pilot project (WIPP). If approved, future entry on the lands under the public land laws would be banned. DOE currently has a withdrawal on the land which expires in December. The new application in essence extends the present withdrawal. The land is in Eddy County, New Mexico, about 20 miles southeast of Carlsbad.

on the application if enough interest is generated.

According to BLM State Director Arthur W. Zimmerman the withdrawal application is a protective measure sought by the DOE to prevent further encroachments on the public land such as mineral leases or mining claims.

Zimmerman said, "The BLM will make an investigation to determine the existing and potential uses of the public land and resources. We will then report to the Secretary of the Interior who will determine whether or not the lands may be withdrawn for another two year period."

"If and when the WIPP project is authorized the land would be transferred to the DOE," Zimmerman said.

Dear Wayne — I have heard there is an elk herd in the Blue Ridge Mountains of Virginia. Can you tell me where they are located? I am planning a trip through that state soon and would like to see them. Bill K., Alabama

Dear Bill — There is a transplanted elk herd of 100 or more in the vicinity of Otter Peaks, along the Blue Ridge Parkway. This general area is about 30 miles northwest of Roanoke. If you've never made the trip along the Virginia portion of the parkway, you certainly should drive at least some of it. The views are fantastic and the pace is slow.

Dear Wayne — I vaguely remember hearing that it is possible to use an ordinary watch and the sun to indicate direction, as with a compass. How would you do this? Bernie M., California

Unfortunately, the chances of getting a glimpse of an elk are rather small. Their habitat is large and heavily wooded with only limited open areas which are visible from the parkway. But there's always the possibility.

Dear Bernie — Very simple — if you haven't yet forsaken your hand-equipped watch for a new digital version. Assuming that you haven't, first push a small stick into the ground. Now lay the watch on the ground and orient it until the shadow from the stick falls directly across and line with the hour hand. South will be indicated on the watch as one half the distance between the hour hand and 12 o'clock.

Dear Wayne — I have an old Remington 7MM carbine with a rolling block action. The barrel is badly pitted and eroded, but the action appears to be in very good condition. I have considered having the rifle rebarreled. Is the rolling block action a strong, safe design? Lloyd T., West Virginia

This method of direction finding is very reliable, but it does have drawbacks and is certainly not a substitute for a compass. For one thing you can't afford to get lost at night — or even on a heavily overcast day.

Dear Lloyd — In general, the rolling block actions are very strong, but the only way to be certain about yours is to seek the help of a gunsmith. It is possible that you could have it rechambered to a more modern caliber if the action is sufficient. Since you plan to have it rebarreled anyway, the additional cost would be reasonable.

Dear Bob — It is their sense of smell. After hatching, salmon will remain in the general area of their birth for about a year. During this time they become familiar with the smells of their home waters. Eventually, they swim out to the

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

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
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
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
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
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
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
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
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Capitol Comment

Santa Fe — Strictly Gossip from the Round House Corridors: The transition office for in-coming Governor Bruce King will be ready for occupancy Monday morning, so you can expect a flurry of rumors and gossip as the press corps keeps a wary eye on who enters and leaves the offices of the new Chief Executive.

But, even before the transition offices opened, we got some solid reports that discussion were on-going about the possibility of present Lt. Governor Bob Ferguson serving as a liaison official between Governor-elect King and the 1979 Legislature.

In recent years, the liaison post has been expanded to two and sometimes three people because of the magnitude and mass of legislation under consideration.

Our sources say the possibility of Ferguson taking the liaison post is just in the talking stage, but you can bet one of Big Bruce's first priorities will be his legislative team.

More Gossip: Jim Baca, who served as Bruce King's press secretary during the recent primary and general election campaigns probably will not serve as King's press aide after January 1st.

Baca also was a King press aide when the Stanley rancher served as Governor four years ago.

One of our good tipsters says a Duke City gal reporter — a television reporter — is among those being considered for the job.

Don't worry about Jim Baca being left out in the cold. Sources say a good job will be found for James and it most likely will be in the Big Duke City where Baca maintains a home.

And this item has NOT been confirmed, but don't be surprised to see the Governor-elect make a couple of temporary appointments just for the Legislative period so he can keep a tight rein over the State's purse strings.

One FAR OUT report that came our way

said King's nephew David might be named to head up the Department of Finance and Administration. The idea is not as far-fetched as it might sound right off the bat.

The DFA job is cabinet level and it would give David King an office right down the hall from Uncle Bruce.

Confirmed: You can look for Chris Krahling, one of Gov. Jerry Apodaca's top aides to leave State Government in a few weeks to go into the Insurance business in the Big Duke City.

The outfit Krahling will join is called Insurance Exchange and will allow Krahling time to handle consulting work as well.

Just for the record, everybody in sight is trying to get hold of a copy of the publication Krahling put together on Government Reorganization. He might find some good consulting jobs just enlightening the newcomers on how the reorganized government works.

Best Laff of the Week: House Demos are expected to get together right after Thanksgiving to organize for the 1979 session and one of the thorniest problems is coming up with a successor for Rep. Eddie Lopez as chairman of the House Taxation and Revenue Committee.

Lopez lost his bid for re-election in the June primary.

During this week's meeting of the Legislative Finance Committee, someone suggested Lopez be hired on a consulting basis to serve as Taxation and Revenue chairman.

The idea sounded so good, even Sen. Aubrey Dunn, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, said he would kick in a couple of bucks to help pay the consulting fee!

In recent years, it almost always boiled down to a Dunn-Lopez head-to-head confrontation in the closing hours of the Legislative session. But, nobody ever disputes the respect the two adversaries have for each other.

ON PROPERTY TAXES

The times are ripe for New Mexico to make some needed changes in its property tax laws. The psychological setting has been provided by the passage of the California initiative that has had nationwide impact.

Equally important — in fact, altogether essential for any prospective change — is that New Mexico is in a financial position to readjust taxes, giving needed relief where it was not possible in prior years.

Gross receipts taxes are racing ahead at about 25 percent this year, considerably above expectations. Severance and other taxes on minerals are ahead more than 20 percent, which is also above projections.

It seems inevitable that when uranium and coal begin their big upward swing within the next few years, New Mexico will enjoy its greatest public prosperity. Besides the rosy prospects for cash flow, there is that gigantic horde of securities in the vault, which now total more than \$1 billion — almost \$1,000 in savings for every man, woman and child living within the state.

We are quite sure that no other state in the union can compare with New Mexico in its present and anticipated public wealth. It's as close to living on the Persian Gulf as U.S. citizens are ever going to get.

Elimination of gross receipts taxes on food and medicine is being talked about in the present gubernatorial campaign. It is sure to be a major legislative issue in the near future. The legislature has already enacted relief at the personal income tax level, and is likely to continue to do so.

The next and most logical area for tax reduction is in the property or ad valorem field. This of course is where Proposition 13 has its roots. California has limited property taxes to 1 percent of market value.

We like that formula. We think New Mexico ought to adopt it. We think it should be a part of our state constitution alongside the hallowed "20 mill limit," which is not the ironclad protection some people seem to think (valuation is missing from the equation).

Most people acquire a home at a rate of from 2 to 4 percent of its cost per year. If that is as fast as they can pay for it during their productive years, it is unreasonable to expect them to continue to pay property taxes that approach that level after they retire. One percent should be the very top of the continuing tax obligation.

Insofar as property taxes are concerned, New Mexico needs to make two immediate, permanent changes. The state needs to relinquish its share of the property tax, now at 2.85 mills for operational purposes. The state doesn't need it, but some local government entities do.

Also, New Mexico needs to amend its constitution to limit all property taxes to a fixed level. As we say, 1 percent would appear to be a practical figure.

Our neighbors in Texas are having quite a property tax flap these days. One of the big issues is whether to tax "Intangible property." Texans have a lot of money in the bank, and this is the biggest form of "intangibles."

So far as we know, New Mexico has never collected taxes on cash, stocks, bonds, jewelry, and other forms of personal property. Erdice Beavers says that in the not too distant past homeowners paid taxes on household goods. These were put on the tax rolls at \$25 per room. That wouldn't pay for a footstool today.

Considering the problem Texas and other states have with locating and taxing so-called intangible property, we might well also consider limiting property taxation to fixed tangible assets, such as homes, commercial buildings, and improvements.

Autos would be excluded, but they are already heavily taxed with excise taxes and annual registration fees, which are de facto property taxes. — Lovington Daily Leader
