

Search, rescue team classes here Saturday

Classes and demonstrations in search and rescue as well as survival tactics are scheduled all day Saturday, beginning at 9 a.m., at White Mountain School (WMS) cafeteria.

"All sessions," Dave Travis of the White Mountain Search and Rescue (WMSR) said, "are open to the public. We'll have a lot of room at the school and the more people we have attending, the more people will understand how search and rescue, as well as survival, situations are conducted."

The meeting is sponsored by the New Mexico Emergency Services Council, with some 50 Search and Rescue units from over the state participating. The event will be hosted by WMSR.

"We've got a great program Saturday," Rex Skellett of WMSR said, "and we want everyone who possibly can to attend all, or any part of it. There is no registration fee."

The Saturday program begins at 9 a.m., with a slide show and briefing, followed by a class on cold weather survival and demonstrations by the National Emergency Locator Team of Albuquerque. The van used in the locator demonstration has a computer aboard to help locate a downed aircraft.

Saturday afternoon's program includes a MAST film at 1; with a helicopter rescue demonstration following. In addition, weather permitting, an actual field operation in search and rescue, including ascent and descent of a vertical cliff, will be conducted. Caravans will depart from WMS and travel over well marked roads to the demonstrations sites.

Handicapped ski instructors' training plan set

Special training clinics, mandatory for instructors of handicapped skiers, have been scheduled at Sierra Blanca Ski Resort.

Students needing this special instruction include blind, mentally retarded, physically handicapped and amputees.

"What we need for this year's sessions," Diana Grover, director of the Handicapped Skiers Program said, "are more qualified instructors, so that we can give instructions to many handicapped skiers from this area that want to learn to ski."

The all day clinics for certifying handicapped ski instructors, all on the slopes of Sierra Blanca Ski Resort, are scheduled for:

- December 6 and 7,
- December 9 and 10,
- December 14 and 15, and
- December 16 and 17.

All trainee instructors are to meet, with a minimum of four days attendance required at 9 a.m., in the Broken Ski Saloon. The instructions will continue daily until 4 p.m., with a one hour lunch break. Free lift tickets will be given to all

clinic participants.

"Applicants for the clinics should contact me immediately as to what dates you will receive training," Grover said. "It is not necessary that the instructors be expert skiers. If you are a strong intermediate skier, we can use you."

Instructions for the blind begin January 10 and continue each Wednesday during the season. The mentally retarded students will have lessons beginning January 11 and every Thursday thereafter.

"The physically handicapped and amputees," Grover said, "can receive instruction every day of the week, by making advance reservations."

The number of students in this season's program for the handicapped, Grover said, "depends upon the number of qualified instructors we have. We have nine blind and five retarded students signed up now."

In other business Wednesday, the committee:

- Set noon of the first Monday of each month in the Chamber building as their permanent meeting date, time and place.

The next meeting will be at noon December 4 and a program on check writing will be presented by Ralph Romero, Ruidoso Downs Police officer.

- Discussed future programs of organizing a check and shoplifting warning system, shoplifting laws, organizing cooperative sales events, standards in retail merchant businesses, and orientation of new businesses. The committee will program the programs and then present the program again for the general membership.
- Discussed encouraging businesses to come to Ruidoso, especially a children's store and high quality shoe store.
- Discussed working together to help buyers. Brunell suggested businessmen know their competitor's line of merchandise and send buyers to a competitor if the buyer is looking for an item not carried.
- Discussed encouraging area residents to buy in town to keep the trade in Ruidoso instead of sending it to other towns.

DAVIS IGNORES ATTORNEY GENERAL

Mayor acts to open bids

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., Tuesday evening ignored a verbal opinion of the Attorney General's office, and asked for the sealed bids on a new road grader for use by the village street department.

The mayor's action stemmed from events occurring prior to the scheduled bid opening, advertised for Tuesday afternoon, including:

- Receipt of word from Border Machinery, El Paso, Texas by village purchasing agent Frank Potter that Border was protesting the specifications for the grader to the Attorney General, charging they were designed "around the Caterpillar 140 G" and further suggesting that "all bids for the road grader not be opened."

— The trustees were advised of Border's action by Potter, who added that "The AG's recommendation was that none of the bids be accepted."

Davis then said: "When the Attorney General starts paying for this equipment, he can start dictating how the bids are to be handled." He then held out his hand to Potter and demanded that he be given the bids.

Bidding on the 12-foot motor grader, an articulated machine including a dozer blade, with all bid envelopes opened by Davis, were:

- Rust Tractor Company, Albuquerque, in the amount of \$92,332 for a Caterpillar 140 G; and
- Border Machinery of Albuquerque, in the amount of \$79,995 for a Gallon Model C grader.

Returning the specifications, without bids, were Benoit of El Paso, Contractor's Equipment and N.C. Ribble, both of Albuquerque.

After the trustees questioned Rust and Border representatives about the advertised specifications and the performance history of both graders, trustee Sherman Atwood moved to accept the Rust bid, pending clearance from the Attorney

General," with second by trustee Ab Gunter. On voice vote trustees Atwood, Gunter and Frank Sayner voted "aye" to unanimously pass the motion with mayor Davis requesting that his "in favor" vote be recorded in the official minutes of the meeting.

In other business, the trustees:

- Accepted the bid of Pat Huey, Capitan, to sell the village a used 12 ton flat grid roller in the amount of \$8,500. N.C. Ribble's bid on a used unit was \$10,700.
- Were advised by village manager Jim Hine that, in addition to four applicants for the position of Building Inspector interviewed to date, two additional applications had been filed. Davis advised Hine to set up interviews with the new applicants for "Wednesday or Thursday," and that the position be filled at a later date.
- Directed village attorney Ron Harris to prepare an ordinance governing updating building permit fees to submit to the trustees at the December 12 meeting.
- Unanimously adopted a resolution supporting establishing a Military Historical Museum in Santa Fe, upon recommendation of the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion of

Anti-WIPP unit organized here

Lincoln County Citizens for Alternatives to WIPP (LCCAW) was organized Monday at a meeting of area residents.

The group, which met with representatives of a similar Roswell group, is in opposition to the proposed Waste Isolation Pilot Plant (WIPP) to be located near Carlsbad and in favor of an alternate solution to nuclear waste disposal.

The site, which would cover 30 square miles of surface and three square miles on each of two underground levels, is located on saltbeds, Kathryn Gabriel-Mead, Roswell spokesman, said.

LCCAW is in opposition to the proposed site because "scientists have begun to question the safety of storing radioactive wastes in salt" and because there is evidence of sinkholes on the site which could indicate a fault line.

The group also is in opposition to the transportation of the solid nuclear wastes over New Mexico's roads.

If there were an accident, which statistics show is possible, nuclear wastes might be released causing a human health danger.

According to Gabriel-Mead, a speck of plutonium, a common nuclear waste, can cause cancer and once released remains dangerous for up to 240,000 years.

If released, insidious aspects of the plutonium include radiation, which usually cannot be detected by human senses, and the effects of the radiation, which accumulate but don't become evident for a generation until it appears in the form of genetic damage or cancer.

The wastes presently are being stored in nuclear reactors on military bases, Gabriel-Mead said, adding there is a push to move the wastes because there is leakage at the reactors.

LCCAW member Naomi Tatum suggested the group support a move to improve the waste storage at the reactors and keep the waste at the reactors until further research can be conducted and alternate disposal methods found.

Suggested alternatives include recycling of the waste, storage in granite or basalt, or even a possibility of new technology.

Downs sets 'dog problem' meeting for January 10

A public meeting concerning the "dog problem" has been set for 7 p.m., Wednesday, January 10 in Municipal Hall by the Ruidoso Downs trustees.

At the regular meeting Monday night, the trustees agreed to hold that hearing to gain public input about the problem and suggestions for dealing with it.

Mayor Norman Wheeler said he hopes to hear from dog owners and nonowners in the community; county, state and federal employees and officials, ranchers and veterinarians.

"We're just spinning our wheels paying the dogcatcher, because the dog population is multiplying faster than he can pick them up," Wheeler said. "We want to get as many people concerned about this as possible."

He said the trustees would "kick it around and notify the bidders in the next three to four days."

The trustees also approved a request from the Planning and Zoning Commission which called for the drafting of a new sign ordinance by building inspector Harley Parnell and George Cregin of Texas Outdoor Advertising of El Paso.

It was agreed that a grace period of one year, or until the ordinance takes effect, would be granted to current outdoor advertisers, with no additional signs to be erected during that time.

Mayor Wheeler cited numerous problems the village encountered with a current vehicle, also an International, calling it "a lemon." He admitted, however, that other models might not be any better at "handling the hills" in the village.

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Trustees also approved repairs for an old garbage truck on a motion from trustee Juanita Burke. Wheeler said the truck's "motor came loose and went through the radiator." The board members were advised that a rough repair estimate had been received from Frank Seidel for \$300 including labor and parts.

On a motion from Ray Parnell, they also approved the repair of the motor grader, pending availability of approximately \$1,000 to pay for the work.

The board also granted permission for the sale of a Remington 25 typewriter formerly used by the police department and approved the exchange of two police car engines and subsequent sale of one of the cars.


neuter the animals was also briefly discussed.

The trustees also opened sealed bids received for a new garbage truck. Of a total of six bids, the board decided to consider two and make a decision by the end of the week.

The two firms vying for acceptance are Contractor's Equipment and Supply of Albuquerque, with a bid of \$28,605, plus \$650 for optional equipment, and Border Machinery of El Paso, Texas, with a total bid of \$28,640.90.


Bids from International Harvester of El Paso, Fruehauf, Sierra Blanca Motors and Estes International Farm and Truck Supply were rejected as "not meeting specifications."

A factor in the consideration of the bids was the availability of local repair service for the new truck. The apparent low bidder (Border Machinery) was on an International Harvester truck, which would have to be taken to Roswell for service. The other firm had based their cost amount on a Chevrolet truck, which could be serviced locally.

Days of Indian Summer And Late Autumn

This is being sent to you on November twenty-eight, just before high noon. Today is the birthday of our brother Lynn. I have just talked to him over the telephone and it was great to hear his voice, sounding just as he did back in his boyhood and youth, reaching me from down at Dripping Springs, just twenty miles this side of Austin.

I always get a great lift in my spirits when I talk to brothers Mark and Lynn over the telephone. It seems they are right in the little sun room here with me. Both of these boys have voices that seem to carry well over the telephone; and I often send up a prayer of thanks to Alexander Graham Bell for bringing us this wonderful invention.

I know that today I talk much louder than necessary over the phone because of a habit formed in childhood. In Juneau, Alaska, birthplace of brother Lynn. We had an old time telephone with a crank on the side of the box. We would talk to our father up at the mine where he worked; and you had to talk very loudly to be heard. Years later I still talked at the top of my voice into the phone; and to this day I forget myself and shout into the telephone.

Today is very much like the day of Lynn's first birthday in Juneau, Alaska. The sky is pure and cloudless, and the west wind is cool. To the west, outlined against the blue are the purple mountains. In Juneau you could see a little strip of blue bay water in front of the mountain; while here you see the valley of the Ruidoso river winding down from the hills.

A Light Snow
 The day before yesterday, the twenty-sixth, a new band of snow birds and two or three robins flew in and began looking for something to eat around the house. Then the blue Jays and Pinon Birds joined them. Then the north wind blew in, and all the birds got busy with the feed, telling you plain as day that snow was on the way. On the morning of the twenty-seventh a very fine, light snow fell for half of the morning, and all day the temperature did not rise above thirty-two, and the sun was hidden all day.

Last night the temperature dropped down to twenty, the coldest snap of the year. Today the west wind has melted all the snow away except just the trace of white in the shadows of the mountain.

Solo Vino, the Storm Ranch dog, is lying stretched out in a favorite spot near the gate where the sun can reach him and he is out of the wind and he can watch the hills to the south. The flag is flying against the blue sky, just over the purple mountain tops. The oak brush is a dark pink and soft crimson amidst the pinon and cedar.

The west wind is gentle and mild on its journey down the vale, and its song is melodious in the boughs and branches of the evergreens and river trees. Moment by moment through the early afternoon, the golden sun warms the mountain world to the weather of Indian Summer, after a morning of late Autumn.

Now the song of the west wind has a dreamy tone, bringing you memories of childhood days.

The shining golden mountain meadows under the blue Indian Summer sky are like the fields of Heaven, and your loved ones are close around you on this Heavenly day.

I am thinking of my cousins, Claude and Marguerite Stevens out in Escondido, California. And know the weather must be beautiful out there, with flowers still blooming. I received a cheerful Thanksgiving remembrance from Marguerite and Claud and I know they had a wonderful Thanksgiving.

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

Cagers tip off on road

When the Ruidoso Warrior basketball team takes the floor Friday at New Mexico Military Institute in their season's opener, it will be with something old, something new, something borrowed and something blue.

The something old will be supplied by four returning lettermen, seniors Borde Williams, Sean Mound, Jeff Elliot and Stan Cape. The something new will be a new fast break offense, which breaks the tradition of past Warrior teams.

The something that is borrowed will be three transfers, Tim Riley, a senior from Dallas, Texas, Paul Kirkwood, a junior from Mainview, Texas and Gary Jones, a sophomore from Shreveport, Louisiana. The something blue will be the uniforms.

First year head coach Barry Nelson expects three of the four items to play important roles in the Warriors' success this season. Most of all, however, Nelson is

hoping the new offense, combined with a tenacious pressing defense, will lead the Warriors out of mediocrity.

"The conventional offenses Ruidoso had in the past were not successful," Nelson said. "None of the past teams were successful with it. I'm not sure this will be successful either, but I'm going to try it."

The only thing holding some of the players from starting the season is a lack of experience, although Nelson still hasn't named his starting five. Two younger players, Rodney Thomason and Greg

Jones, are getting a close watch from Nelson and Thomason is vying for a starting role.

"He's shooting for a starting position," Nelson said.

Although optimistic, Nelson's troops do open the season with some question marks hanging over their heads. One is the play of the big men. Another is defense.

"If the three big guys (Elliot, Mound and Cape) would have more desire, it would be a big plus for us," Nelson said. "They're just lazy. They are not used to working hard."

"We'll try to play a man to man most of the time," he said. "But we're lacking the fundamentals. The kids are in the wrong place sometimes. We'll stress a man to man but we'll have a zone defense. Hopefully, we'll be able to stay with the man to man."

"We need the competition to get ready for district," Nelson said. "We're going to be a Class AAA team next year so we might as well play the best 3A schools. They're tough."

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
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Girls' Basketball

Santa Fe — Good Old Boy Day: State Demos will hold a fund-raiser at the Duke City Convention Center Dec. 7th, the dough to be used to pay off any outstanding debts from the just-completed gubernatorial campaign.

The King fund-raiser should clear any outstanding obligations "Big Bruce" has from the primary and general election, since the Stanley rancher is not exactly a campaign spendthrift.

Surprisingly, little has been said about the efforts of Larry Ingram, State Democrat Chairman, and his mop-up job on past and current debts of the Demo Party Organization.

According to our figures — and they are NOT official — Ingram took over the job right after the primary with the Party some \$17,000 in the hole.

Our sources say the Tucumcari politico not only paid off the 17,000 bucks but took care of all other outstanding debts (of a fiscal nature) more than one week ago.

Crystal Ball Department: Don't make any predictions on what the Legislature will do to try and dole out some assistance to the underprivileged in the area of food and drug purchases.

Bruce King has his advisors checking now to see what the mechanics would entail to cut the gross receipts on food and drugs — but, efforts in the past have really run into blank walls.

Bumper stickers reading "Ax the Food Tax" are starting to show up on Santa Fe vehicles — the sticker an open support of the proposals to dump the so-called "sales tax" on foods and drugs.

At first glance, such a tax cut would seem to have unanimous support, but old-timers who have studied the mechanics in the past say it could cause a multitude of problems.

Those problems include less money for already financially-strapped city, and the need for sophisticated expensive cash registers to compute both taxable and non-taxable sales at large outlets such as supermarkets.

Kelly Salute: Fourth Floor sources say Gov. Jerry Apodaca is scheduled to make an appearance next month at a Capital City benefit during which Santa Fe singing star Kelly Garrett will perform.

Apodaca will proclaim December 17th as Kelly Garrett day in New Mexico and will salute her contributions to her hometown and State.

It could be one of Apodaca's final public

appearances as Chief Executive.

Measles Confab: Our sources say the Federal Health, Education and Welfare people in Washington, D.C. soon will announce a conference dealing with measles in the United States.

The Land of Enchantment presently has the longest string of months without a reported case of measles — more than twelve consecutive months.

Our information says the Feds will salute New Mexico's record by asking the State Health and Environment Department to make a presentation at the measles confab.

It's expected that State Public Health Officer Dr. Jonathan Mann will deliver the State's story on or about December 12th in the nation's Capital.

Health officials in this state feel there is a direct correlation between this state's anti-measles success and the State's compulsory school immunization law for students.

Transition Chatter: Hardly anybody noticed, but Bill Stephens, the Apodaca Cabinet Secretary for Agriculture is one of the guys locked in to his post.

It's true. Popular Stephens serves as Cabinet Secretary for Agriculture, not as a gubernatorial appointee, but as the head of the agriculture department at New Mexico State University at Las Cruces.

More Transition Chatter: While most of the headlines concern Bruce King's choices for top Cabinet posts, insiders say the King people are talking reorganization "turkey" with their legal beagles.

Our sources report the King staffers want a determination of just what is mandatory and what is discretionary under the State Government reorganization, which took effect last Spring and was approved by the last Legislature.

Right now, it appears as if the Cabinet structure with twelve secretaries really is the only "heavy must" under the law.

It also looks as if the Governor-elect could order "lower echelon employees" who serve under the Cabinet Secretaries to report directly to him.

Just as a sidelight: There has been much talk about waiting to see how the reorganized State Government will operate — in fact, that's just about all either gubernatorial candidate would say during the general election campaign.

However, there appears to be just as much ignorance about how the

'NO' ON PRESS CURBS

High UNESCO officials have been at pains to disavow any wish to censor the press. More specifically, they maintain that no such intent is stated or implied in the proposed UNESCO declaration on the mass media.

Their hearts may be pure, but the fact is that certain passages of the draft originally put forward sound warning bells in the minds of all who cherish press freedom. The document could be used to justify manipulation of the media to an extent intolerable in the free world.

Several Western nations, including the United States, have submitted a new draft which does not authorize any government control of news. This draft is now before a committee which is trying to formulate a compromise.

We are not adverse to compromise, so long as basic principles are not violated. News of UNESCO undertakings often does get short shrift in the press, so that a statement urging more and better coverage would not be amiss. But if no compromise ruling out government control can be agreed upon, then the United States and all other countries which value a free press should vote no. — Alamogordo Daily News

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
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
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


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
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Adobe building comfort study to be conducted

Adobe structures have been alternately freezing and baking under the New Mexico sky for about 400 years, but the verdict on their ability to withstand outside temperatures and maintain a pleasant interior living environment is not yet in.

Some New Mexicans declare their adobe abodes to be almost miraculously comfortable all year round; others say theirs are sweatboxes on summer evenings and glacially cold in the pre-dawn hours of winter. Many persons, and especially newcomers to the state, would like to know just how well adobe buildings perform during the various times of day and seasons of the year, and exactly how the most energy-efficient types of adobe brick are made.

A study to be conducted by the Eight Northern Indian Pueblos Council and the New Mexico Energy Institute at the University of New Mexico will attempt to provide this information.

The study will be funded by the Council, the U.S. Departments of Energy and Housing and Urban Development, the Federal Community Services Administration and the New Mexico Energy and Minerals Department.

Go-ahead for the project has just been given by Nick Franklin, Energy and Minerals Department Secretary, whose approval of a \$15,500 grant to the Energy Institute freed \$223,000 in contingent allocations from the federal agencies and Council.

In authorizing the state expenditure, Franklin described the study as "possibly one of the most significant research and development projects in which the State of New Mexico has ever participated."

Some of the goals of the two-year project are:

- to define ways of reducing the cost of constructing with adobe;
- to establish a valid computation methodology for use by the building industry and government regulatory agencies nationwide;
- to publish a manual on optimal adobe building construction techniques; and
- to obtain field-verified knowledge on the effect of wall mass and color on seasonal energy consumption.

Useful "field-verified knowledge" is of course a hard thing to get when one wants to compare, say, a single aspect of two or more inhabited adobe structures, because of the many uncontrollable variables. Therefore project workers will construct eight windowless test modules. Several types of wall will be designed, according to different specifications for color, thickness and composition, and one or more of each type of wall will be used in the construction of each test module. A ninth building, to house equipment for monitoring and recording data from the test modules, will also be constructed.

Interpretation of this data will result in further elaboration of a rather complicated engineering concept known as effective U value.

U value is a term for a measurement indicating the speed with which heat passes through a wall of given characteristics from a region of warmer temperature to one that is cooler. The more heat transferred over a given period, the higher the U value.

U value measurements assume an unchanging difference between temperatures on both sides of the wall. Effective U value, on the other hand, is based on real conditions, in which the difference in temperatures on the two sides of the wall is changing. Effective U value thus takes into account the effects of wall heat storage and of radiation of stored heat to the inside and outside of the building.

It is well known that adobe has a high capacity to store heat, but, Secretary Franklin says, this does not necessarily

mean it is an energy-efficient building material.

"It's very possible," he observes, "that some of the construction modifications currently recommended under existing effective U value research will no longer be valid when summer cooling requirements are taken into consideration."

To get information on the performance of adobe under all normal conditions of temperature and weather, researchers will run checks on the test modules continually for 24 months.

"This will also give us a better idea than we now have of the actual heating and cooling demands of adobe buildings," Franklin says. "Effective U value has previously been used mainly as a measure of average energy consumption over entire seasons, and data on periods of high and low demand tends to be lost in the averaging."

"Builders and homeowners need this data because heating and cooling units have to be able to handle peak periods, not just averages. If you underestimate the peak demands you buy equipment that's too light and get too hot or too cold; if you overestimate, you go in the other direction and spend more money than is necessary."

The new project will not only measure the insulating and heat retaining properties of several types of adobe, but will also monitor the actual comfort levels achieved inside the modules and deter-

mine the amount of Btu's required to maintain optimal levels under a variety of conditions. It will extend effective U value and other concepts to include a consideration of the interaction between Btu consumption and the temperature of inside air and inside walls — a complex relationship about which little is presently known.

Project workers joke that the most positive result of their research may be to end the quarrel between those who are fond of adobe and those who aren't.

"That might save a lot of energy," Franklin concedes. "But what I like most about the study is that it has the potential to take much of the guesswork out of building the most efficient adobe structures possible."

"It could be a milestone in conservation research."



Sunland Park Hoofbeats

WILLIE LOVELL was notably absent from the jockey roster at Sunland last weekend. And for a good reason. The well-liked veteran rider has officially retired. Lovell experienced health problems during morning workouts last week. And, after undergoing tests, he has decided to quit riding on the advice of his physician to avoid a heart condition. He anticipates focusing his attention on training in the future. The move marks the end of a highly successful riding career for the 40-year-old jockey and Sunland fans will miss him.

MOON LARK, the outstanding colt who pocketed \$437,500 with his near-length win in this year's All-American Futurity, has arrived on the grounds at Sunland. The freshman is targeted for the \$75,000 (est.) Fall Quarter Horse Futurity coming up December 10. He'll enter as a \$2,500 supplement. Moon Lark, the property of Sam, Paul and James Howard of Coppell, Texas went into the All-American with a bankroll over \$75,000 and a 4-1 record from five starts.

KNOCKA HOMER MISSED, the track for 440 yards by only 3/100's of a second as he charted a half-length victory in Sunday's \$17,081 Fall Quarter Horse Derby. The colt got off at 16-1 odds and hit the wire in 21.41 seconds with Richard Blekel at the helm. The track record of 21.38 seconds was set by Truckle Feature in November of 1973. Knocka Homer returned mutuels of \$38, \$10.40 and \$5.60.

THE HIGH WIN AND PLACE payoffs of the season resulted from a dynamic

performance by Skip Clip in Friday's second race. The colt, making his career start in the 400 yard maiden venture, had 65-1 odds as he snatched a neck victory. Backers received \$131 to win, \$52.60 to place and \$11.60 to show on the surprising New Mexico bred. He's owned by W. G. Richards of Anthony.

SON OF MARK TRIMMED almost two seconds off the seasonal record for 6 1/2 furlongs in Saturday's seventh race. The Ike Danley charge moved up sharply over high priced claimers to clear the distance in 1:17 3/5 seconds as the second favorite. The previous high was set by I Can Hackett at 1:19 1/5 seconds October 21.

THE CLOSEST 870-YARD competition of the season turned up in Saturday's fourth race and resulted in a blanket finish. The three top-finishers (Our Star Sam, Native Issue and Ira's Girl) all powered their way to the front in the final yards of a brisk bout. Pacesetter Father Knows When was pushed down to fourth. The four were separated by less than a length at the wire. Our Star Sam, who returned \$21.20 to win, had notched a similar longshot triumph previously at the meet.

THE FASTEST TIME for 400 yards was set by Payment Deferred in Sunday's fifth race. The bay four-year-old got off at odds of 4-1 and charged to a length victory over allowance competitors for a brisk clocking of 19.75 seconds. Victor Jaramillo was at the helm.

THE SHOW RETURN on Bartonville in Saturday's fifth race equalled the seasonal

record of \$18.40. Bartonville had slim backing of 27-1 as he snared the second spot behind Pass 'Em Boy in the 400 yard bout. The same return was recorded by Mad Matie October 21. Bartonville returned \$24.40 to place.

A DISQUALIFICATION moved second favorite Banks Dividend out of contention in Saturday's second race. The gelding, who finished third, took an erratic course coming out of the gate in the 400 yard claiming test. He veered in sharply, bothering several inside horses, and was disqualified to last by the stewards.

JUAN SPARKLE established the fastest seasonal time for 870 yards with his rapid tour of Friday's sixth race. The four-year-old son of Sparkling Native grabbed a 1 1/4 length victory score as the 9-5 favorite. The clocking was 45.66 seconds.

SUNLAND PARK OFFICIALS are beaming about the strong mutual surge over the weekend. Saturday's handle of \$284,709 set a seasonal record (the previous high was \$283,860 November 5) and the three-day handle topped out at \$700,971. Thirty-three races were run, and the average betting per race was \$21,241. Thanksgiving weekend last year, the per-race average (from 34 races) was \$21,024. Friday's wagering of \$193,279 was the highest Friday afternoon handle in Sunland history.

THE MOST PRODUCTIVE post over the week was No. 8, with seven winners. Here are the seasonal totals: No. 1 - 30 winners; No. 2 - 23; No. 3 - 22; No. 4 - 25; No. 5 - 30; No. 6 - 26; No. 7 - 28; No. 8 - 35; No. 9 - 18; No. 10 - 14; No. 11 - 0; No. 12 - 1.

Wilderness Wisdom with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — Recently I purchased a 90MM-230MM zoom lens for my 35MM camera, and I'm having some problems. The pictures turn out well at the lower powers, but at the higher range of the lens they come out blurred. Could I be doing something wrong? Tim W., Georgia

Dear Tim — It's likely your problem is camera unsteadiness, unless the lens has a defect, and that's unlikely, otherwise it would be apt to show up at lower powers also.

If you are using a slow or intermediate speed film with a high power lens it will frequently be necessary to use a slow shutter speed to maintain correct exposure. The high magnification lens and slow shutter speed makes a sharp picture very difficult with a hand-held camera.

The cure is a tripod, brace, or some firm support for the camera. This will eliminate, or at least minimize movement. In the absence of a tripod, a vehicle, rock outcropping, stick, or even a tree, will serve as a brace. Switching to a higher speed film will also help.

Dear Wayne — Do you have any indication of how much money hunters and fishermen spend for state and federal licenses and permits? I would also like to know if this figure is increasing or decreasing annually? Woody L., Iowa

Dear Woody — According to a United States Fish and Wildlife Service report, hunters and fishermen spent \$329 million in 1977 for licenses, stamps and other required permits. \$156 million of this was derived from fishing fees and \$173 million from hunting. This total is \$10 million more than for 1976.

These fees represented 27 million fishermen and 16 million hunters. This, however, cannot be interpreted to be the total who fish and hunt, because many junior and senior citizens, as well as landowners, aren't required to purchase licenses. Likewise, in many areas a saltwater fishing license is not required.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

WILLIE LOVELL was notably absent from the jockey roster at Sunland last weekend. And for a good reason. The well-liked veteran rider has officially retired. Lovell experienced health problems during morning workouts last week. And, after undergoing tests, he has decided to quit riding on the advice of his physician to avoid a heart condition. He anticipates focusing his attention on training in the future. The move marks the end of a highly successful riding career for the 40-year-old jockey and Sunland fans will miss him.

MOON LARK, the outstanding colt who pocketed \$437,500 with his near-length win in this year's All-American Futurity, has arrived on the grounds at Sunland. The freshman is targeted for the \$75,000 (est.) Fall Quarter Horse Futurity coming up December 10. He'll enter as a \$2,500 supplement. Moon Lark, the property of Sam, Paul and James Howard of Coppell, Texas went into the All-American with a bankroll over \$75,000 and a 4-1-0 record from five starts.

KNOCKA HOMER MISSED the track for 440 yards by only 3/100's of a second as he charted a half-length victory in Sunday's \$17,081 Fall Quarter Horse Derby. The colt got off at 16-1 odds and hit the wire in 21.41 seconds with Richard Bickel at the helm. The track record of 21.38 seconds was set by Truckle Feature in November of 1973. Knocka Homer returned mutuels of \$38, \$10.40 and \$5.60.

THE HIGH WIN AND PLACE payoffs of the season resulted from a dynamic performance by Skip Clip in Friday's second race. The colt, making his career start in the 400 yard maiden venture, had 65-1 odds as he snatched a neck victory. Backers received \$131 to win, \$52.60 to place and \$11.60 to show on the surprising New Mexico bred. He's owned by W. G. Richards of Anthony.

SON OF MARK TRIMMED almost two seconds off the seasonal record for 6 1/2 furlongs in Saturday's seventh race. The Ike Danley charge moved up sharply over high priced claimers to clear the distance in 1:17 3/5 seconds as the second favorite. The previous high was set by I Can Hackett at 1:19 1/5 seconds October 21.

THE CLOSEST 870-YARD competition of the season turned up in Saturday's fourth race and resulted in a blanket finish. The three top-finishers (Our Star Sam, Native Issue and Ira's Girl) all powered their way to the front in the final yards of a brisk bout. Pacesetter Father Knows When was pushed down to fourth. The four were separated by less than a length at the wire. Our Star Sam, who returned \$21.20 to win, had notched a similar longshot triumph previously at the meet.

THE FASTEST TIME for 400 yards was set by Payment Deferred in Sunday's fifth race. The bay four-year-old got off at odds of 4-1 and charged to a length victory over allowance competitors for a brisk clocking of 19.75 seconds. Victor Jaramillo was at the helm.

THE SHOW RETURN on Bartonville in Saturday's fifth race equalled the seasonal record of \$18.40. Bartonville had slim backing of 27-1 as he snared the second spot behind Pass 'Em Boy in the 400 yard bout. The same return was recorded by Mad Matie October 21. Bartonville returned \$24.40 to place.

A DISQUALIFICATION moved second favorite Banks Dividend out of contention in Saturday's second race. The gelding, who finished third, took an erratic course coming out of the gate in the 400 yard claiming test. He veared in sharply, bothering several inside horses, and was disqualified to last by the stewards.

JUAN SPARKLE established the fastest seasonal time for 870 yards with his rapid tour of Friday's sixth race. The four-year-old son of Sparkling Native grabbed a 1 1/4 length victory score as the 9-5 favorite. The clocking was 45.66 seconds.

SUNLAND PARK OFFICIALS are beaming about the strong mutual surge over the weekend. Saturday's handle of \$284,709 set a seasonal record (the previous high was \$263,860 November 5) and the three-day handle topped out at \$700,000.

Wilderness Wisdom with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — Recently I purchased a 90MM-230MM zoom lens for my 35MM camera, and I'm having some problems. The pictures turn out well at the lower powers, but at the higher range of the lens they come out blurred. Could I be doing something wrong? Tim W., Georgia

Dear Tim — It's likely your problem is camera unsteadiness, unless the lens has a defect, and that's unlikely, otherwise it would be apt to show up at lower powers also.

If you are using a slow or intermediate speed film with a high power lens it will frequently be necessary to use a slow shutter speed to maintain correct exposure. The high magnification lens and slow shutter speed makes a sharp picture very difficult with a hand-held camera.

The cure is a tripod, brace, or some firm support for the camera. This will eliminate, or at least minimize movement. In the absence of a tripod, a vehicle, rock outcropping, stick, or even a tree, will serve as a brace. Switching to a higher speed film will also help.

Sunland Park Hoofbeats

WILLIE LOVELL was notably absent from the jockey roster at Sunland last weekend. And for a good reason. The well-liked veteran rider has officially retired. Lovell experienced health problems during morning workouts last week. And, after undergoing tests, he has decided to quit riding on the advice of his physician to avoid a heart condition. He anticipates focusing his attention on training in the future. The move marks the end of a highly successful riding career for the 40-year-old jockey and Sunland fans will miss him.

MOON LARK, the outstanding colt who pocketed \$437,500 with his near-length win in this year's All-American Futurity, has arrived on the grounds at Sunland. The freshman is targeted for the \$75,000 (est.) Fall Quarter Horse Futurity coming up December 10. He'll enter as a \$2,500 supplement. Moon Lark, the property of Sam, Paul and James Howard of Coppell, Texas went into the All-American with a bankroll over \$75,000 and a 4-1-0 record from five starts.

KNOCKA HOMER MISSED the track for 440 yards by only 3/100's of a second as he charted a half-length victory in Sunday's \$17,081 Fall Quarter Horse Derby. The colt got off at 16-1 odds and hit the wire in 21.41 seconds with Richard Bickel at the helm. The track record of 21.38 seconds was set by Truckle Feature in November of 1973. Knocka Homer returned mutuels of \$38, \$10.40 and \$5.60.

THE HIGH WIN AND PLACE payoffs of the season resulted from a dynamic

performance by Skip Clip in Friday's second race. The colt, making his career start in the 400 yard maiden venture, had 65-1 odds as he snatched a neck victory. Backers received \$131 to win, \$52.60 to place and \$11.60 to show on the surprising New Mexico bred. He's owned by W. G. Richards of Anthony.

SON OF MARK TRIMMED almost two seconds off the seasonal record for 6 1/2 furlongs in Saturday's seventh race. The Ike Danley charge moved up sharply over high priced claimers to clear the distance in 1:17 3/5 seconds as the second favorite. The previous high was set by I Can Hackett at 1:19 1/5 seconds October 21.

THE CLOSEST 870-YARD competition of the season turned up in Saturday's fourth race and resulted in a blanket finish. The three top-finishers (Our Star Sam, Native Issue and Ira's Girl) all powered their way to the front in the final yards of a brisk bout. Pacesetter Father Knows When was pushed down to fourth. The four were separated by less than a length at the wire. Our Star Sam, who returned \$21.20 to win, had notched a similar longshot triumph previously at the meet.

THE FASTEST TIME for 400 yards was set by Payment Deferred in Sunday's fifth race. The bay four-year-old got off at odds of 4-1 and charged to a length victory over allowance competitors for a brisk clocking of 19.75 seconds. Victor Jaramillo was at the helm.

THE SHOW RETURN on Bartonville in Saturday's fifth race equalled the seasonal

record of \$18.40. Bartonville had slim backing of 27-1 as he snared the second spot behind Pass 'Em Boy in the 400 yard bout. The same return was recorded by Mad Matie October 21. Bartonville returned \$24.40 to place.

A DISQUALIFICATION moved second favorite Banks Dividend out of contention in Saturday's second race. The gelding, who finished third, took an erratic course coming out of the gate in the 400 yard claiming test. He veared in sharply, bothering several inside horses, and was disqualified to last by the stewards.

JUAN SPARKLE established the fastest seasonal time for 870 yards with his rapid tour of Friday's sixth race. The four-year-old son of Sparkling Native grabbed a 1/4 length victory score as the 9-5 favorite. The clocking was 45.66 seconds.

SUNLAND PARK OFFICIALS are beaming about the strong mutual surge over the weekend. Saturday's handle of \$264,709 set a seasonal record (the previous high was \$263,860 November 5) and the three-day handle topped out at \$700,971. Thirty-three races were run, and the average betting per race was \$21,241. Thanksgiving weekend last year, the per race average (from 34 races) was \$21,024. Friday's wagering of \$193,279 was the highest Friday afternoon handle in Sunland history.

THE MOST PRODUCTIVE post over the week was No. 8, with seven winners. Here are the seasonal totals: No. 1 — 30 winners; No. 2 — 23; No. 3 — 22; No. 4 — 25; No. 5 — 30; No. 6 — 26; No. 7 — 28; No. 8 — 35; No. 9 — 19; No. 10 — 14; No. 11 — 0; No. 12 — 1.

Wilderness Wisdom with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — Recently I purchased a 90MM—230MM zoom lens for my 35MM camera, and I'm having some problems. The pictures turn out well at the lower powers, but at the higher range of the lens they come out blurred. Could I be doing something wrong? Tim W., Georgia

Dear Tim — It's likely your problem is camera unsteadiness, unless the lens has a defect, and that's unlikely, otherwise it would be apt to show up at lower powers also.

If you are using a slow or intermediate speed film with a high power lens it will frequently be necessary to use a slow shutter speed to maintain correct exposure. The high magnification lens and slow shutter speed makes a sharp picture very difficult with a hand-held camera.

The cure is a tripod, brace, or some firm support for the camera. This will eliminate, or at least minimize movement. In the absence of a tripod, a vehicle, rock outcropping, stick, or even a tree, will serve as a brace. Switching to a higher speed film will also help.

Dear Wayne — Do you have any indication of how much money hunters and fishermen spend for state and federal licenses and permits? I would also like to know if this figure is increasing or decreasing annually? Woody L., Iowa

Dear Woody — According to a United States Fish and Wildlife Service report, hunters and fishermen spent \$329 million in 1977 for licenses, stamps and other required permits. \$156 million of this was derived from fishing fees and \$173 million from hunting. This total is \$10 million more than for 1976.

These fees represented 27 million fishermen and 16 million hunters. This, however, cannot be interpreted to be the total who fish and hunt, because many junior and senior citizens, as well as landowners, aren't required to purchase licenses. Likewise, in many areas a saltwater fishing license is not required.

VA changing pension program

A new Veterans Administration (VA) pension program takes effect January 1, 1979, offering substantial increases to neediest veterans and a choice of remaining under the old program for those who are better off financially.

VA Regional Office chief Joseph S. Cordova in Albuquerque said that "while the new program basically provides the greatest benefits for those most in need, all VA pensioners should take a careful look at all facets of the program before making up their minds."

In setting up the revised pension plan, Congress provided that veterans have until October 1, 1979, to choose whether they want it or prefer to remain under the current program.

"If they choose the new program, payments will be retroactive to January 1, 1979, but the choice is irrevocable," Cordova said.

VA pensions are based on income and go to eligible wartime veterans with other than dishonorable discharges who are permanently and totally disabled from causes not traceable to their service.

VA considers veterans 65 years of age and older to be disabled for pension purposes.

VA pensions are also paid to certain needy survivors of wartime veterans. Currently, about 2.7 million Americans are receiving pensions.

"Under the new pension program next year, the maximum annual pension rate for a single veteran will be \$3,550, up from the current \$2,364.

"A veteran with one dependent and no other income now receives a maximum pension of \$2,544. That will increase to \$4,651 under the new program," Cordova said.

Other annual pension rates under the new program will be:

- Veteran with no dependents, but in need of regular aid and attendance — \$5,680;
- Veteran with one dependent who is in need of regular aid and attendance — \$6,781;
- Veteran permanently housebound, with one dependent — \$5,441;
- Surviving spouse without dependent children — \$2,379;
- Surviving spouse with one dependent child — \$3,116;
- Surviving spouse in need of regular aid and attendance, without dependent child — \$3,806;
- Surviving spouse permanently housebound, without dependent children — \$2,908;
- Surviving spouse in need of regular aid and attendance, with one dependent child — \$4,543;
- Surviving spouse permanently housebound, with one dependent child — \$3,645.

The new pension program also includes an \$800 increase in the annual rate paid to elderly veterans of wartime periods for whom education and loan guaranty benefits had not been made available. The language of the bill limits this increase to veterans of World War I and earlier wartime periods.

"What this means is that no VA pension recipient will have his pension reduced because of a Social Security cost-of-living increase, as he has been the case in the past," Cordova said.

"We want to make sure everyone understands that under some circumstances, such as a veteran with a working wife and certain amounts of outside income, the new plan could result in a lesser pension.

"This is because the current plan excludes 10 percent of a veteran's Social Security or other retirement-type income, and all of a wife's income. None of this income is excluded under the new pension program. All of it will count when calculating a veteran's total income for pension purposes," Cordova said.

He said VA will send all pensioners a detailed explanation of the new pension program in January.

"Remember, you have until October 1, 1979, to make up your mind as to whether you want to enroll under the new program.

"If anyone receiving a VA pension has any questions about the new program, a counselor at the nearest VA office will be more than glad to explain the various options and benefits," Cordova said.

Additionally, Congress approved an automatic increase for pensioners each time there is a cost-of-living increase in Social Security benefits.

Veterans mobile home loan program changed

Veterans Administration (VA) Regional Office Director, Joseph S. Cordova, today reminded veterans contemplating the purchase of a mobile home that VA's loan guaranty program has recently been streamlined with their benefit in mind.

"Statutory loan maximums have been eliminated for mobile homes and mobile home lots," Cordova said. "Now, a loan of up to the reasonable value of a mobile home and/or lot can be guaranteed. The maximum guaranty is \$17,500 or 50 percent of the loan, whichever is less."

Cordova also pointed out that the recent Congressional action streamlining the guaranty program also increased the maximum length of some VA mobile home loans to 15 years, 32 days from 12 years, 32 days. Other mobile home loans continue to have a maximum term of 20 years, 32 days.

"The Congress has also approved legislation reducing the active duty time required for Vietnam Era veterans to be

eligible for VA home loan benefits," Cordova said.

Eligibility formerly required at least 181 days of active duty time. This has been cut to 90 days, with at least one day having been served between August 5, 1964 and May 7, 1975.

"This brings eligibility requirements for Vietnam Era veterans in line with those for World War II and Korean conflict veterans," Cordova said. About 168,000 veterans are affected nationwide.

The loan guaranty eligibility the loan guaranty program may obtain requirement for peacetime veterans complete information at the nearest VA office or from any service officer or one of remains 181 days. Cordova said any veteran interested in the national veterans organizations.



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


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
