

Steve Cox named West Point cadet

Ruidoso High School senior Steve Cox received a rather unique birthday present Friday, by being notified that he had been nominated for acceptance into the United States Military Academy at West Point.

"He went into orbit," Ken Cox, Steve's father said. "We were pretty anxious to get that appointment."

The present came in the form of a telegram from Congressman Harold Runnels. Since it was Steve's eighteenth birthday, a celebration was in order. But the announcement made the celebration more intense.

"It was my birthday," Steve Cox said, "We just celebrated a little bit. I was happy. I thought I did good in my interviews but you can never be sure."

Cox spent some of the time calling relatives to inform them of the news. Although they all were pleased, Cox's uncle was more so than the others.

"He wanted me to go," Cox said. "He tried talking me into it a few years ago. Now that I made the decision on my own, he was real happy."

The appointment to West Point will just be another in a long line of honors for Cox. He maintains a 3.4 grade point average at Ruidoso High School. He is a member of the National Honor Society. He is a member of the American Legion New Mexico Boys State, which he attended last summer where he was elected state senator.

Cox is a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and he recently won first place in DECA competition. He is also a member of the Ruidoso High School Letterman's Club.

Cox has earned a varsity football letter in each of three years. He was captain on this year's Ruidoso team where he earned all-district honors at linebacker. He earned one varsity letter in baseball at Roswell and one in wrestling at Ruidoso. Cox's ambitions at West Point are to

earn his degree in international relations and to work in an embassy in the summers. He also wants to "get a good rank" so he can "be in charge of the freshman" when he is a senior.

Cox would like to play baseball at West Point but he will do so "only if it doesn't interfere with my studies. Studying comes first."

Right now, Cox has only to pass a physical and achieve a score of 25 on his ACT tests, which he took Wednesday. He also wants to save the moment.

His father said, "We're just real proud of him."

Water tank needs repairs

The Ruidoso trustees were advised Tuesday evening that extensive repairs are needed on the Upper Canyon Water Treatment Plant, known as "Tank Number One", by water superintendent Jim Goodman.

This plant is located just outside the Mesquero Apache Reservation line and takes water directly from the Rio Ruidoso for treatment.

Goodman said the plant presently "can't treat sufficient water to meet the needs (of the area serviced) during June and July and that turbidity causes problems in plant operation after the rainy season begins."

Recommendations made by Goodman included installing a permanent standby filter, "which would double the filtration capacity" of the plant.

Goodman estimated the cost of repairs "at about \$25,000" and said "they may be needed this fiscal year" ending June 30.

The trustees instructed Goodman to submit the repair plans, with cost estimates, for council action "as soon as possible."

In other action, the trustees:

- Accepted the bid of Big Three

Industries, Albuquerque, in the amount of \$4,929 for a 400 ampere diesel powered welder and trailer that can be used to thaw water mains.

- Authorized necessary roof and other minor repairs at the Ruidoso Public Library to eliminate water leaks.

- Directed village manager Jim Hine to submit the draft of a proposed ordinance adjusting building permit fees at the December 28 meeting.

- Appointed John Emde, longtime Ruidoso building contractor, as village building inspector pending his certification by the New Mexico Construction Industries Commission in Santa Fe.

- Were advised that the Planning and Zoning Commission approved zoning changes from Residential-1 to Residential-2 on certain lots on Blocks 3, 4, 5 and 6 in White Mountain Estates, Unit 4.

- Approved the plat of Fairway Meadows Condominiums, Lots 1 through 5, Block 15; and a replat of Tract 1, Lot 9, Block G in White Fir Subdivision.

- Were advised that water, sewer and paving projects are underway in Unit 1, Camelot Crown Estates and that five sewer lift stations will be installed.

- Advised B. H. Buchanan that 15 days

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Downs delays subdivision

Ruidoso Downs trustees, meeting Monday night, withheld approval of the final plans for the Mountain Shadows Subdivision pending reconsideration by the Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) to work out problems and misunderstandings concerning the sewer lines and paving.

Mayor Norman Wheeler recommended the action after a presentation of plans by Tony Parker, although they previously had been approved by P&Z subject to final approval of the drainage system.

Wheeler asked the subdivision representatives to submit, in writing, their intentions to provide sewer lines for the lots when hookups to the village's main sewer lines become available.

Trustees also informed the subdividers that paving plans were not acceptable, although the businessman protested that their planned paving methods had been approved and even recommended by members of P&Z.

Trustee Vada Leighton cited resolution 82 which requires residential streets to be "surfaced with two inches hot mix" asphalt on a "stabilized base of not less than six inches thick." Subdivision representatives said they were told that gravel alone was preferred because "they (the village) had a grader to maintain gravel and they couldn't maintain asphalt."

After discussion of the matter, it was agreed that the subdividers' engineer, (Neil Chapman), should meet with the engineer in charge of the village sewer project, Quinton Daniel of Alamogordo, and the P&Z board to be sure their plans met specifications and were mutually compatible.

The trustee further recommended that the subdivision plans be resubmitted at

their next meeting. Wheeler said (and the other trustees concurred) that he "wanted to have everything done right in the first place," to insure that the village would not have to finance sewer construction or have the roads repaired within a short period of time.

Consideration was tabled by a unanimous vote on a motion from Ray Parnell.

The trustees also received a list of village businesses being billed for occupational licenses for the coming year. Village clerk Virginia Spall explained that the cost of the annual licenses is based on a one dollar charge per thousand dollars of the company's gross receipts, as reported to the state Bureau of Revenue.

Parnell suggested amending the rate to a flat \$50 fee, but Spall said many of the smaller businesses would not be able to

afford that amount. After some discussion, an upper limit of \$600 per year was established for businesses grossing more than \$600,000 yearly.

Also on the agenda was a review of financing plans for a new garbage truck. Spall reported that she and trustee Juanita Burke had approached both local banks and the Municipal Funding Corporation of America about the financing.

The trustees agreed that "it would be better to keep the money at home" if possible, so they delayed any decision pending a reply from Ruidoso State Bank.

In other action, the trustees:

- Unanimously approved the Uniform Traffic Ordinance 78-10, to conform with the state traffic code.

- Heard the announcement of election of the following officers of the Ruidoso Downs Volunteer Fire Department; Barry Miller, chief; Pete Wood, assistant chief;

Ray Walker, captain; Jack Pafford, lieutenant; Holly Pafford, deputy fire marshal; Cyndi Miller, secretary-treasurer. Officers present made a public plea for additional members, and mayor Wheeler said the trustees would "help in any way" they could.

- Formed a committee composed of the mayor and two council members to hear grievances of city employees, in conformance with state human rights legislation. Committee membership will rotate among the trustees, with trustees Vada Leighton and Lois Beavers serving the first team.

- Set the date of the next meeting at December 28, since the regular meeting date fell on Christmas Day.

- Gave notice of the village Christmas party to be held at 2 p.m., December 22 at the village hall.

School board election set

The Ruidoso Board of Education Tuesday evening passed a resolution calling for the election of one member to serve a six year term.

The term of incumbent W. R. "Stormy" Edwards expires in March of 1979 and he is the only board member whose term is up.

Edwards announced Wednesday that he will be a candidate for reelection.

Candidates for the February 6 election may file a declaration of candidacy with the Ruidoso Municipal Board of Education at the office of the Superintendent of Schools by 5 p.m., January 2, 1979.

The polls for the February 6 election will be in the Ruidoso High School gymnasium and boundaries for the voting district are south to Otero County, east to Hondo School District 2, north to Capitlan School District 28 and west to Capitlan School District and Otero County.

According to the election notice, "All qualified electors residing in the Ruidoso Municipal School District shall be entitled to vote. The word 'elector' means any

citizen of the United States, who, at election time, will be the state, age of 18 and a resident of the vote, county and district."

Applications for absentee voting are available from Superintendent Valliant's office in the Administration building.

The deadline for registration, for all non-registered school district patrons, to vote in the February elections is 5 p.m., December 26 at the superintendent's office. Registration is not required for all qualified school district patrons voting in the November general election.

Judges and clerks for the election are Herb Brunell, Mrs. W. O. Woodridge and Mrs. R. L. Annala, judges, with Mrs. Frank Crown and Mrs. Jim Wimberly, alternates. Mrs. John D. Quinn, Mrs. Ronnie Taylor and Mrs. John N. Sears, clerks, with Mrs. C. H. Wood and Mrs. Alton Lane, alternates.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m., February 6.

New fire truck in service

The Ruidoso Volunteer Fire Department Tuesday took delivery of a new fire truck capable of delivering in excess of 750 gallons of water per minute through its pumping system.

"In Tuesday afternoon's tests, conducted at the Municipal Swimming Pool," Fire Chief Bill Seelbach said, "with three hoses attached to the system the unit pumped just over 800 gallons of water per minute. This is exceptional performance for an altitude of 7,000 feet and, I might add, in excess of our expectations."


The new truck features, Seelbach said, single stage pumps providing "a simplified means of putting water on a fire."

The unit is equipped with an automatic transmission, both for driving the truck and for pumping water, "that simplifies both operations tremendously."


Two one-and-a-half-inch hoses are preconnected to the back of the truck, Seelbach said, "meaning that we can immediately start fighting the fire with the 600 gallons of 'wet' water the truck carries. This will enable us to put water on the fire at once, while the firemen are connecting the standard hoses to fire hydrants, or hooking up the pump lines to reservoirs or the river."

A special feature of the new truck is that the exhaust system heats the pumps, Seelbach said, "to prevent freezing up and also to make for easier operation of all equipment that normally is more difficult to operate in extreme low temperatures."

Village manager Jim Hine said that the News Tuesday that the bid for the truck, in

the amount of \$54,584, was awarded Thunderbird Equipment Company, Albuquerque, January 31, 1978.

This figure compares, Hine said, with the 600 gallon per minute pumper truck delivered in Ruidoso in 1968 at a bid price of \$28,128.10. "The new unit," Hine said, "cost the village almost double of what we paid for the old pumper."

The village acquired the new truck under a lease/purchase agreement through funds provided by the additional one-fourth cent Gross Receipts Tax levied by the trustees.

Upon receipt of the new truck, Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., said, "This is another village effort to maintain our Class 6 fire insurance rating, which is an excellent rating for a forested area."


"According to the last rating by the Insurance Service Offices (ISO) of New Mexico, Albuquerque, our Class 6 insurance rating is the same as Roswell and Alamogordo. And I might note that Albuquerque, with a Class 3 rating, is the lowest in the state."

"I also, on behalf of the village, want to compliment our volunteer firemen for the excellent job they are doing, resulting in our most favorable insurance rating. I think that Ruidoso has the finest Volunteer Fire Department in the state."

ISO's rating report notes that Ruidoso's Class 6 ranking results in a decrease in fire insurance premiums of about 16 percent for a frame dwelling or 30 percent for a masonry home. The premiums for commercial buildings are lowered by up to six percent, as a Class 6 village, depending upon construction and occupancy.



DR. Edwards and Lamar Osborn, both attended the December 1 and 2 convention in Albuquerque.


—Approved the school ski program which begins January 24 and runs for six

consecutive Wednesdays, concluding February 28.


—Heard a report from Pat Valliant, Superintendent of Schools, that auditor Terry Jones will attend the January meeting to give a report.



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

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

Afghanistan Pine

enduring gift

If you can't find a Christmas present for those people on your list who have everything, consider giving them a living Christmas present. Give them an Afghanistan pine.

According to Dr. Fred Widmoyer, head of New Mexico State University's Horticulture Department, the Afghanistan pine can double as this year's Christmas present and as a living yule tree. Then, after Christmas, it can be transplanted as an ornamental in the front yard.

Widmoyer, who conducts research on the Afghanistan pine through NMSU's Agricultural Experiment Station, says the pine's most outstanding characteristic is its rapid growth.

"In just 24 months, seeds from the Afghanistan pine grow into trees that are 36 inches high," Widmoyer says. "And a seedling 18 inches tall will grow as much as three feet during the first year."

"Of course, people wanting to use an Afghanistan pine as this year's Christmas tree will want an older tree," Widmoyer adds. "Therefore, they'll want to buy a tree which is two or more years old."

The researcher points out that once the Afghanistan pine is two years old, it averages four feet of new growth for the next three years. During the next ten years, the tree will grow at least another 30 feet.

By way of comparison, during those same 10 years, an Aleppo pine averages only eight feet of new growth, and the Southwest's familiar Japanese black pine will grow only four feet.

Given that accelerated growth rate, in just seven years, four million Afghanistan pines could cover an area the size of Dallas with 25 foot tall trees. Two years later that forest would produce a billion seed cones, and the cycle of growth will begin again. In only ten years, the original trees would be ready for the first selective harvesting, providing valuable lumber for pulp and fuel.

Widmoyer says the Afghanistan pine is especially suited for New Mexico's climate and soils.

"While the pine does well in all soil types, its best performance is in well-drained soil containing some organic matter. Once established, the pine will tolerate alkaline and salty soil," Widmoyer says. "It will also withstand considerable drought and temperatures going as high as 130 degrees Fahrenheit."

Because of their adaptability to New Mexico, Afghanistan pines can be used as windbreaks and as screens for privacy. In addition, their fragrant, rich green foliage can transform the desert into a shade-filled oasis.

The researcher does point out, however, that the Afghanistan pine will freeze in prolonged sub-zero temperatures and burn. "But apparently there is nothing else that will kill them," he says.

For example, the pine is resistant to air pollution. Tests conducted by Russian foresters in 1973 on the highly industrialized and smog ridden Aspskhron Peninsula of the Caspian Sea indicated a high degree of air pollution resistance. While in the Los Angeles basin, plantings have shown no damage from smog.

"Finally," Widmoyer says, "the Afghanistan pine is not attacked by any of the insects or diseases prevalent among most ornamental conifers."

The history of Afghanistan pine goes back 25 centuries to its origins in between the Caspian and Aral seas where it was the only planted-by-nature pine forest. There on the rocky outcropping called Eller Oukhi, the trees survived hundreds of thousands of years of high desert winds and scorching temperatures.

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



Lincoln Logs

Plastic can cause trouble when it gets around livestock and plastic baling twine causes the most problems. Small pieces in wool have caused many yards of woolen material to be rejected. Woolen fabrics are flamed in the finishing process. This gives a smooth finish with no fibers sticking out but it also melts any plastic in the fabric. This causes the yardage to be defective

and rejected. Plastic twine inadvertently mixed in the livestock feed can cause problems.

Unlike feed, plastic is not digested in the stomach of livestock. It just stays there until the particle size is reduced through re-chewing or rumination, this can be a lengthy process. It can take up large spaces in the ruminant's stomach and greatly reduce its feed consumption. In some cases, it completely plugs the gastrointestinal tract and the animal can't eat at all.

It's time to put out supplemental minerals for livestock. Use a mineral mixture of two parts calcium to one part phosphorus. Do not put in a galvanized tub or bucket. The salt and mineral when wet and under certain conditions will react with the zinc and form a poisonous substance. Put the mineral in a wooden or fiberglass container.

While firewood is a source of pleasure and comfort to the homeowner, it is also home and food to many insects. Caterpillars often pupate, or go into a nesting stage, in the cracks and crevices of trees. They can be induced to emerge if firewood is stored inside. The change in temperature activates the moths' or butterflies' instincts to emerge and the homeowner has a real problem. Many wood-boring beetles, even if not seen, can be heard on a still evening gnawing away beneath the bark of the firewood. Again, the warmth of your house encourages the beetles to become active.

Most of these insects are attracted to lights and will collect at windows and in light fixtures. To avoid unwanted worries, store firewood outside in protected places and only bring in what you will use in a short period of time.

Capitol Comment

Santa Fe—The powerful Legislative Finance Committee is wrapping-up a full week of fall budget hearings—the last before the 1979 sixty-day session begins—and don't be surprised to see some major pronouncements before the heavyweights among the lawmakers head for home this weekend.

Rep. Eddie Lopez, chairman of the LFC, was defeated in his bid for re-election in last June's primary election and the Santa Fe lawmaker could have some parting shots before he turns over the gavel.

Most of the major speculation at the Round House this week concerned Governor-elect Bruce King's announcement of new cabinet secretaries—but, that ain't what has the attention of the lobbyists and those concerned with the brutal Legislative session that gets underway in January.

Pros among the lobbyists are holding their breaths waiting to see who Speaker Walter Martinez names to critical committee chairman posts. . . and one of those spots is the House Taxation and Revenue Committee, which was chaired by Rep. Lopez over the past several years.

There's been hardly a murmur about peace-making efforts among the House Demos since the lower House caucus a couple of weeks ago.

The guys who make their livings trying to influence lawmakers aren't sure at this point whether they will be looking at a whole new lineup of committee come next January, or whether they only find one or two major changes.

Crystal ball: Over on the other side of the aisle in the State Senate, one major committee chairmanship designation has to be made. The Demo majority will have to name a successor on Public Affairs for Senator Eddie Barboa, who also lost his bid for re-election in the primary.

Our sources—and this has NOT been confirmed—say the naming of a new Public Affairs chairman could result in a major reshuffling of Upper House Demo assignments.

Times-a-Wasting: This is the week that incumbent Gov. Jerry Apodaca is expected to put the final touches to the proposal for use of the old St. Vincent Hospital facility in downtown Santa Fe.

It looks as if the Chief Executive is determined to go ahead with the multiple use proposal for the building. Officials last weekend got proposals from private business interests for possible nursing home useage for part of the facility.

A year ago, Apodaca said the St. Vincent site in downtown Santa Fe would be wrapped-up before he left office.

Modern Math: The incoming King Administration has pledged to keep

government spending next fiscal year to within President Carter's anti-inflation guidelines. And that means overall government spending would not increase more than seven per cent.

In recent years, State Government budgets have increased in the ten and twelve per cent range and sometimes higher.

Our "birdies" say that Governor-elect Bruce King and powerful fiscal conservative Senator Aubrey Dunn of Alamogordo were rapping about the Carter guidelines recently.

Reportedly, King announced in proud fashion that he would adhere to the seven per cent increase limit. Dunn glanced at the new Governor and commented, "That's great—it's an easy figure to divide by two!"

And, if there was more than just in Dunn's comments, the State finally might be nearing its first "almost" no growth budget.

Foresight: The popular Kaleidoscope Players had a publicity notice on the Round House bulletin board announcing a performance of "King David!"

And on the Third Floor of the Capitol David King was holding forte.

Legislative Briefs: In case you are keeping count, the interim Health and Aging Committee plans to introduce a package of about twelve bills in the upcoming session.

As predicted here weeks ago, one of those measures will be a slightly-modified version of Senate Bill 63 from the last session, which bans smoking or the carrying of lighted tobacco in certain types of public buildings.

Four of the bills are aimed at funding senior citizen programs, including one appropriating a million bucks for the purchase and renovation of senior citizen centers.

Two other measures are aimed at helping the low-income elderly. One would provide a \$45-per-month supplement to recipients of supplemental security income to aid in paying high utility bills. A second would raise the current \$45-per month supplemental security income to \$50-per-month for those individuals living in shelter care homes.

More Briefs: The Legislative School Study Committee, which wrapped up two days of hearings late last week, plans to introduce a package of about twenty bills when January rolls around.

Some of those proposals are bound to raise "old Harry" with the State's school administrators.

Still Asking: Our sources at the Capitol say recent physical relocations within the State Human Services Department have translated into some hefty telephone bills.

Weeks and weeks ago, this column suggested that some enterprising lawmaker ask for a dollar-for-dollar breakdown on what it is costing the state to make some major office relocations.

The information is not readily available to the media. . . in fact. . . it's almost impossible to acquire.

But. . . neighbor. . . it's a bundle, we guarantee.

U.S. ARMS SALES RISE

Jimmy Carter arrived in Washington determined to "reduce the (international) commerce in weapons" and seemingly embarrassed by "our nation's role as the world's leading arms salesman." What he discovered on entering the White House is that the real world is not much swayed by simple pieties.

For the fiscal year that ended September 30, American arms exports totalled \$13.7 billion, up from \$11.4 billion in fiscal 1977. These figures exclude unregistered private sales by American entrepreneurs to foreigners. The administration's disingenuous claim that arms exports were actually reduced was based on bookkeeping fakery. The White House conveniently ordered sales to Japan, Australia, New Zealand and all NATO nations deleted from the total.

However reluctant he may be to admit the fact, President Carter has recognized what his two immediate predecessors understood: A prudent regard for the preservation of American security requires continuing sales to allied nations and those other countries whose security interests coincide with our own.

The President also learned something else his predecessors might have told him: Governments whose arms purchase requests are denied by the United States simply turn to other suppliers including France, Great Britain, West Germany, Belgium, Holland, Italy and even the Soviet Union. Our friends, and our adversaries, gladly jump into vacuums

created when Washington turns down potential customers.

Thus the chief effect of this country's unilateral restraint is to export jobs and the political influence arms sales frequently generate.

None of this means that Washington should give up altogether on the laudable objectives the President had in mind when he urged a reduction in the flow of American arms overseas. Africa, Asia and Latin America in particular need to spend more for economic development and less for sophisticated weaponry.

Experience, however, demonstrates that a decline in the international arms trade is unlikely unless the major exporting nations mutually agree to mandatory restraints. The Carter Administration has discussed the subject with the Soviet Union and several Western European countries, but without results so far. It should keep trying.

In the meantime, the administration might consider dropping the arbitrary dollar-volume yardstick as a measure of an acceptable export level. More relevant would be exports based on American security interests, desirable regional balances of power, and assessments of the legitimate defensive security needs of potential arms customers. Judging proposed sales on these criteria while working for effective multilateral restraints would yield a constructive export program that could pass any reasonable moral test. — News-Bulletin, Helen

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
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
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

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BLM now operates toll free telephone

A toll free telephone directly to the public information office of the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) in Santa Fe, went into operation today to provide better service to the public. The number is: 1-800-545-8943. Anyone calling this number can reach a public information specialist who can answer most questions about the agency.

The BLM manages about 13 million surface acres and 25 million subsurface acres of public land and minerals in New Mexico and Oklahoma. The BLM also handles federal mineral leasing and wild horse management in Texas.

After office hours (7:45 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday thru Friday), the telephone will record incoming messages and

questions will be answered the next working day, or by return telephone call or by letter.

According to Arthur W. Zimmerman, BLM State Director, his information office receives more than 50 long distance calls each day from persons wanting to know about such things as wild horses, oil and gas leasing, recreation opportunities and other programs of the BLM. "We will now be able to offer the public a free telephone service that will operate 24 hours a day," Zimmerman said.

Another feature of the toll free number is that persons who wish to talk to a specific person at the BLM office but do not know the proper telephone number can call toll free and get the correct number, and in most cases determine if the individual is in the office at that particular time.

"Since we do not have a central switchboard in Santa Fe to transfer incoming telephone calls, persons can call the new number without cost and get the correct extension for an individual and then re-dial with the assurance that their call will get to the right office," Zimmerman said.

Prevent carbon monoxide deaths

Every winter people die, usually in their sleep, from inhaling the fumes of an improperly vented or malfunctioning stove or furnace.

"Combustion fumes leaking into the house or backing up into a heating unit kill people and cause fires every heating season," Charles Hohn, Extension agricultural engineer at New Mexico State University, said.

Carbon monoxide fumes from any fuel-burning range, space heater or furnace are poisonous. That's why you shouldn't use a gas range to take the chill off your kitchen and why you must always safely vent any type of fuel-burning heater or

furnace to the outdoors, Hohn said.

Fireplaces also need a good vent, so keep your chimney clean, Hohn said. Remove soot, broken bricks, bird nests and anything else that might hinder the escape of gas.

Test the chimney to see if it draws well. Hold a lighted match or piece of burning newspaper near the clean-out. If smoke goes right up the chimney, it's drawing properly.

If the chimney isn't drawing properly, check the outdoor height of your chimney or stovepipe. If chimney is not at the roof peak, it should extend at least 2 1/2 feet above the highest point.

The chimney top at the roof's peak should come at least 2 feet above the peak. On a flat roof, the chimney top or stovepipe should extend at least 3 feet above the rooftop.

Ideally, each stove or furnace should vent into a separate flue. Every time you add another pipe to a flue, it reduces the sucking action on the other pipes. If you have a part-time stove sharing a flue with the furnace, be sure to plug the chimney hole or close the damper tightly when the stove is not in use, Hohn said.

If you must vent two stoves into the same flue, run them in at different levels, at least 2 feet apart. If you remove the

stove, plug the chimney hole so the regular heating system can do its job more efficiently.

Check vent pipes routinely to make sure there are no holes or loose connections that would let gas fumes escape back into the house, Hohn said.

Symptoms of carbon monoxide poisoning are drowsiness, headaches, dizziness, confusion, nausea, muscular weakness and unconsciousness. If someone is overcome by carbon monoxide gas, get him to fresh air, start mouth-to-mouth rescue breathing right away and call a doctor, Hohn said.

Urethane insulation can be a fire hazard

During these chilly winter months, many New Mexicans consider installing more insulation in their farm buildings or homes. Urethane foam is an exceptionally effective insulation, but can also be a fire hazard if used improperly, Charles Hohn, Extension agricultural engineer at New Mexico State University, said.

Urethane has many advantages and is a popular insulation material. Rigid urethane foam is light weight, versatile, easy to work with and structurally strong. Its high thermal resistance makes it an efficient energy conserver.

On the other hand, the combustibility

characteristics of urethane foams vary widely, depending on the formulation. Exposed plastic foam insulation can "flash-over" when ignited from an external heat source, such as an open flame, a cutting torch, a heater, or a hot drop of metal from an electric arc welder.

Because of these fire hazards, a thermal flame barrier should cover all surfaces of the foam insulation, Hohn said.

Urethane foam used in interior or ceiling construction should not be left exposed. Cover it with at least one-half inch of cement plaster, fire-rated gypsum wallboard or an equivalent barrier

providing a fire rating of 15 minutes or more.

Exposed foam installed above a suspended ceiling requires a thermal barrier on both sides of the foam.

In case of a fire, the high insulating value of urethane foam on a ceiling can cause rapid heat build-up under the high points of the building. When temperatures reach 600 to 800 degrees, the foam may ignite, releasing dense smoke, carbon monoxide and flammable gases which can create a flash fire. Automatic heat vents at high points of the ceiling help release heat

and vapors before the dangerous build-up occurs.

Provide fire stops in large warehouse ceiling areas, between floors in multi-story buildings and at openings into pipe chases and ventilation shafts, Hohn said.

Urethane foam should not come in contact with chimneys, heater vents, steam pipes or other areas which could get hotter than the recommended tolerances. When urethane foam is used to fill cavities within masonry walls or in floors under concrete, no additional protection is needed, Hohn said.

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National Science Foundation interested in NMSU research

Representatives of the National Science Foundation visiting New Mexico State University (NMSU) this weekend expressed a keen interest in research into alternative biological materials which could substitute for petroleum and other products of critical national concern.

The Foundation invited NMSU's Agricultural Experiment Station and the Water Resources Research Institute to submit a preliminary research proposal to examine native and exotic plants which could be genetically engineered to produce in the Southwest. Ideally the plants could also be engineered to grow on the state's 15 billion acre/feet of underground brackish water.

Plant species under immediate consideration for the project include Crambe

— a source of specialized oil and quality protein meal, Guayule — a natural rubber source, and Kochia and Russian Thistle — potential cattle feeds. Limited research with these crops is already underway by the NMSU Agricultural Experiment Station.

"After 15 years of research experience with Crambe, I believe it has promise as a renewable resource for New Mexico and the Southwest," said Koert Lessman, associate director of the Experiment Station. "However, to strengthen its potential for this region, it will be necessary to redesign the plant's genetic structure to thrive on brackish water."

Jojoba, salt grass, buffalo gourd, sunflowers and devil's claws were other native plants mentioned as possible candidates for long term research.

"The nation's semi-arid and arid lands have never had their natural resources fully explored. But we are now ready to look into these areas," said Dr. Marvin Stephenson, acting director of the Foundation's division for research into alternative biological materials. "Eventually we would be interested in a systematic consideration of all native plants in this area as possible new sources of oil, food or fiber."

NMSU researchers also mentioned the possibility of developing varieties and production methods which would allow for the production of traditional crops, such as alfalfa, on brackish water or limited supplies of "good" water.

"The proposed research would examine the reaction of the soil to long term applications of brackish water," Dr.

Lessman said. "It would also include a consideration of economic aspects of potential full scale production as well as pest management practices."

NMSU officials plan to submit a formal research proposal to the Foundation in the future. While the project probably will not change the face of agriculture in New Mexico during the next five years, it could drastically change the state's long-range ability to utilize latent resources while providing the nation and the world with new alternative sources of vegetable oils, food and fiber.

"We are interested in more risky types of research — the kind traditional funding agencies just can't touch," Stephenson said. "Instead of funding research that can be put into full production in five years, we prefer research that will pay off 20 years down the road."

The National Science Foundation is an independent federal agency designed to support basic and applied research in scientific and technical areas, general science education and areas of scientific policy issues.

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Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — I would like to begin handloading ammunition for my .30-06 rifle. I have no equipment, very little know how, and my budget is rather limited. What would be the bare minimum equipment I need to get started? Ernie B., Iowa

Dear Ernie — An excellent beginning is a Lee Loader kit. These kits are complete reloading outfits furnished with one set of dies for the caliber of your choice. The least expensive kit is about twelve dollars. Of course you have to provide the powder, primers and bullets.

These hand-held kits are precise and reliable. But they are designed for the occasional reloader. Those wishing to load a large number of cartridges at a sitting, in the least amount of time, would likely make a better choice with a larger, bench mounted model.

Considering that the Lee kits are much less expensive than the cheapest bench outfits, they provide an excellent opportunity to learn the basics of handloading at a bargain price. Most catalogs offering reloading equipment will include them.

Dear Wayne — A few months ago you ran a column concerning the controversial issues of gun control. In it you mentioned the "Saturday Night Special." There is much uncertainty in my mind about which handguns fit into this category. Could you clarify this? Bill C., North Carolina

Dear Bill — In its original context, it was thought to indicate handguns which were cheaply made and easily concealable. But if you think about it, criminals don't have a preference for cheaply made handguns. They can buy or steal what they need, and it's just as apt to be an expensive, well made model. Then too, what handgun isn't easily concealable?

Since its origin the term has been modified by anti-gun lobbyists and proposed legislation to a point where it is so indefinite its meaning is practically obscure. More than 75 percent of all


handguns, including expensive, well made models, would be defined as "Saturday Night Specials" under some of the legislative proposals. And that's ridiculous. The phrase is now so distorted and inflated it can be considered useless.

Dear Wayne — For some crazy reason, I have gotten the notion that I would like to take a hunting trip for caribou. While I am not wealthy, I can afford to travel anywhere in the country in search of them. Where would I go to find the largest caribou which might provide the best trophy? Walt S., Florida

Another big money event at Downs

Another richly endowed event for four-year-old quarter horses is slated for Ruidoso Downs.

The newest addition is the Rainbow Silver Cup, a spinoff of the Rainbow Futurity and the Rainbow Derby. The Silver Cup will be staged for the first time in 1981. The distance is 440 yards. The estimated gross purse for the inaugural running is \$100,000.

Richard Thompson, Ruidoso's director of racing, notes that the Silver Cup and Gold Cup will complete a package of three hundred grand plus events for four-year-olds. The third jewel in the planned Triple Crown for older horses is the 440 yard World's Championship Classic (three-year-olds and up), which topped out at \$102,910 in its 1978 running. "With the addition of the Silver Cup and Gold Cup, horsemen will be able to keep their top horses in training longer, and they'll have three big-money purses to aim for," Thompson said.

An interesting sidelight is the fact the Rainbow series (Futurity, Derby and Silver Cup) will offer a combined estimated purse of \$1 million. That's broken down this way: \$450,000 for the 1979 Futurity, \$450,000 for the 1980 Derby and \$100,000 for the 1981 Silver Cup.

There'll be no late supplemental nominations for the Silver Cup. So this means a horse, in order to remain eligible, must have been entered for the Derby

avenues toward the Derby: \$9,000 by February 1, 1980; \$12,000 by May 1, 1980; or \$15,000 at time of entry into the trials.

In order to keep a horse eligible for the 1981 Silver Cup, the following payments must be made: \$100 by November 15, 1980; \$200 by February 15, 1981 and \$300 to enter the trials.

A "pre-paid" alternative is also possible, and this simplifies the paperwork and also saves an owner 20 percent. In this case, an owner can pay \$2,200 by February 1979 and this will cover all fees for all three races.

The trial format for the 1979 Rainbow Futurity will again be a blend of two survival systems: order-of-finish and time. In the first round all eligibles will

complete in two days of 400 yard trial heats. The first and second place finishers from each trial will advance into the final elimination round. The qualifiers from this final round will be determined by time, with the top 10 making the grand finale, and the second 10 advancing into the consolation.

The 1979 Ruidoso Downs meeting will kick off in mid May, as usual, and extend through Labor Day.

In order to be eligible for the 1980 Derby, a horse must have been paid up for the trials in the 1979 Futurity. The Derby payments are: \$200 by November 1, 1979; \$200 by February 1, 1980; \$250 by May 1, 1980 and \$350 to enter the trials.

There are, however, three supplemental

EASY MILLION PICKED up her third straight victory at the meet with her performance in Saturday's trials. The filly accomplished two allowance spins by 5¼ lengths and 2¼ lengths earlier this season. She grabbed Saturday's victory as the 6-5 choice with regular jockey Jack Brown aboard.

OTHER FUTURITY QUALIFIERS are: Double Dixie, Scottin' Lite, Tennis Bug, Ernest Scout, Murmuring Miss, Draconic's Loom, Miss Millie and J. J. Lark.

THE HIGH SHOW PAYOFF of the season turned up in Friday's second race as Run A Dab, let off at 7-1 odds, powered, powered his way to third place in the quick 350 yard claiming test. Jesus Terrazas piloted the nine-year-old gelding for a mutual return of \$20.20.

SATURDAY'S THIRD RACE quinella paid off in boxcar prices as Flashy Star Penny grabbed the runnerup spot and upset the fans' calculations of near 100-1 odds. Canela Rojo, a 5-1 choice, found the winner's circle in the 350 yard maiden event with Flashy Star Penny only 1½ lengths behind. Flashy Star Penny returned a huge \$71.60 to place and the quinella return was \$451. That turned out to be only a dollar less than Saturday's Big Q payoff.

JOCKEY DON HOWARD had profitable weekend, turning in three victories Friday and three more Sunday. The young rider finished in the money in 11 of his 21 trips to the gate.

THE NO. 3 AND NO. 7 POSTS were the most effective over the weekend. Six winners were launched from each. The top post, seasonal-wise, is No. 8 with 46.
