The suspense of being trapped in Carlsbad Caverns is a chilling experience

Richard and Judie Cothrun of Ruidoso may be talking about their first trip to Carlsbad Caverns for some time, but the beauties of natural limestone formations may

hardly enter into the recollections.

The Cothruns, their daughter Carrie and nephew Chuck Smith, both 15, were among the 105 visitors trapped in the cave for five hours Tuesday while four armed men held a park employee hostage and brought park operations to a stand-

Judie Cothrun said Wednesday that what impressed her most about the situation was the emotional reactions of those trapped.

Thing that amazed me was that with 105 people — and there were little babies and older people there was never any panic," she

The group was shepherded into one section of the cave's "Big Room," by their guide, a young black woman who was completing her first day on the job.

"We felt that all the park employees were super," Cothrun said. The new guide "kept reassuring us and telling us that everything was going to be okay," she added. She also repeated her entire speech about the caverns, to keep them occupied.

Ironically, that same guide was the only one to become ill during the incident, later suffering convulsions, Cothrun said.

Cothrun added that she had wanted to inquire later about the woman's condition, but didn't even know her name.

"It's strange," she said, "Everyone is there together and you have this common bond, but you don't think about things like names. We all had in our minds what could happen, but we didn't talk about that

Instead, the visitors talked about "what we'd do tomorrow, what we'd do when we got out," she said.

The trapped tourists were given little information about the happenings in the lunchroom during their stay. Their guide was in contact with her supervisor by emergency telephone, but the conversations were kept to a minimum for fear the gunmen would discover their presence in the Big

As far as I know, they never knew we were there," Cothrun said. That knowledge, they felt, would have given the gunmen "more bargaining power," in addition to their hostage.

The group was not told at first that the men were armed, but Cothrun said. "We knew something was wrong and it wasn't just that the elevators were out of order. They didn't want to tell us because they

didn't want us to panic."

Although the panic remained suppressed, Cothrun said that feelings of claustrophobia began to rise at the thought of being underground for so long. The room is located about 750 feet below the ground.

"We all knew that, just below the surface, we could get hysterical. Another common element was the feeling of excitement, and then we felt horrible for being excited, when we knew that someone could be killed - that we might not get out."

Many of those trapped had members of their families waiting upstairs for them, which was another cause for concern, she said. One of the 105 was a lawyer from

Illinois. Cothrun said. He offered to mediate with the gunmen, although by that time they had been told that. anyone caught on the trails would be shot.

The teenagers mainly complained

of the cold — the caverns remain a constant 56 degrees - and kept asking, "Why did you make me

come here on this day?" Cothrun The Cothruns found it hard to believe they were actually wit-

nessing a dangerous situation. "We kept saying, "This is one of those things you read about," she said. "I guess these things are a sign of the times," she added, "but there was a happy ending; that was the

best part." She admitted they "didn't even look at the caverns on the way out," and "needless to say, I'm not going back. What was foremost in our minds was just to get out and see the

sky."
Five hours in the depths of Carlsbad Caverns, she said, "was a totally unreal world. You see the beauty of the caverns, and then you see that same beauty change and become a prison for you."

County clerk Lovelace resigns

The position of county clerk was vacated and then filled at Monday's meeting of the Lincoln County Commission in Carrizozo. Commissioners accepted the resignation of Barbara Lovelace, "for personal reasons," effective July 15.

They went on to appoint Jane McSwane, the current deputy clerk, to the office, a post she had held just prior to the election of Lovelace last fall.

Two separate residential delegations from Lincoln and Ruidoso — filled most of the chairs in the commission chambers to discuss zoning ordinance amendments and

road problems in their respective communities.

Ron Servies acted as spokesman for the Ruidoso group, saying they represented some 105 residents of the Fawn Ridge subdivision. He asked the commissioners to consider improvement of the roads in the development, preferably with graveling and more frequent grading of the roads.

He described the roads as being "in pretty sad shape," having been graded only twice in the last year, and that many become almost impassable in bad weather. The entrance to the subdivision, off Gavilan Canyon Road was especially bad, he said, with no ditches to provide for

County road superintendent Guy Henley told the group that his department was unable to make a committment on any particular road, even for the remainder of the year. There are over 1.750 miles of road in the county, Henley said, and the crews have been busy with flood damaged roads since December.

Commissioner Ben Hall added, "We'd like to have all the roads in the county graveled, but we just can't find the time and a lot of times the money — to do that.

Servies was told that the road crews were currently stationed in Corona, and would be moved to the Ruidoso district in September. Henley said he would do his best to include the Fawn Ridge roads but still could not make a firm commitment.

The Lincoln delegation was present for the board's consideration of two amend-

ments to Lincoln Ordinance 17, a zoning regulation. Both amendments were approved unanimously by the commission, and will take effect in 30 days.

The first amendment calls for conformance of new structures to the architectural style of the present buildings; the second requires new businesses to be approved by the Lincoln Historical Review

In other business, the commissioners: - Approved a lease agreement with the Four Seasons Mall, Ruidoso, for the new sheriff's department substation, subject to the drafting of a supplemental agreement which will remove the requirement of joining a tenants' association.

- Signed a cooperative agreement with the state Highway Department for paving

Downs sewer project meeting set Friday

Plans for financing and installation of a assessed valuation increases. new sewer system to serve Ruidoso Downs will be aired at a public meeting Friday at 7 p.m., in the village's Municipal Hall.

Two alternatives to finance the system will be presented: - Approval of the \$500,000 general obligation bond issue at the July 18 elec-

 Installing the new service with a \$500,000 Farmers Home Administration

(FmHA) loan. Downs mayor Norman Wheeler explained the financing choices to The

Ruidoso News: "Passage of the bond issue will be the cheapest route. The cost to the property owner will be less than \$13 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. And I think it will be less than that.

"Approval of the bonds by the voters will insure that the tax rate per \$1,000 of assessed valuation will drop as our total which we'll probably wind up needing."

"On the other hand, if the village has to float a FmHA loan the monthly cost to sewer users, as payments on principal and interest, will be \$16 per month. This will cost a lot more than paying for the system with general obligation bonds."

In either instance, Wheeler said, all sewer connections will pay a monthly service charge.

The village sewer system is designed to tie into the Regional Wastewater System (RWS) that will serve both Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

"Ruidoso Downs has \$389,675 from our original sewer bond election to pay for our share of RWS," Wheeler said. "Our engineer (Quinton Daniel of Daniel. Engineering, Alamogordo) has estimated that we'll have about \$170,000 from this fund to apply to the cost of our own sewer system. If so, this will give us a little slack

At Friday night's meeting, Wheeler said, Daniel will explain the sewer system. Tom Ratcliff, Stern Brothers, Albuquerque, will explain the bond issue and how the \$500.000 in bonds will be handled.

"The new lines," Wheeler said, "will service all subdivisions added to the village since 1972. Everyone will pay and everyone will benefit. We wanted everyone in, because we don't think it would be fair to have three-fourths of the town paying for sewer and not using it."

Environmentalists, Wheeler said, have advised the village that present septic tanks are polluting the river and underground water.


"This means that development has stopped," Wheeler said, "because the only septic tanks that will be approved are those that won't leak and must be pumped regularly. This is very costly.'

Services and burial were conducted in Arkansas.


Florencio S. Gonzales



Wow, have you ever stopped to think how ingenious the human race is? Just look at what the brilliant minds around the world have created.

There are razors you can buy for a few pennies and dispose of after just a few shaves. There are eigerette lighters and flashlights that will give many lights before their fuel and battery runs out, and then they too can be disposed of. Even baby diapers come in the "use-once-andthrow-away" models.

We are truly living in a world of "disposables," and "throwaways."

It has been over 15 years now that the throwaway revolution began with the occurrence of non-refillable bottles and cans on store shelves. The idea of not having to pay a deposit on the containers was well accepted by the consumers and the "no-return" bottles flooded the

Unfortunately, these disposables began to appear almost as frequently along roadsides, campsites, lakes and streams as they did on grocery shelves.

No, it's not the throwaways that cause the litter problem, but they do contribute to the problem.

A study conducted by the state two summers ago along a one mile stretch of I-40 found beverage related litter - bottles, cans, plastic containers, cartons and "pop top" tabs - to compose 69-98 per cent of all litter found.

Nevertheless, to stop the litter problem' you must get to the real source of the problem - the litterbug. Nicknamed after neck. And, don't forget that trout you the lowly pests, the litterbug has no excuse for his actions.

Yet, whether it be out of laziness, or are responsible for the 19 million places of ignorance.

garbate that can be found scattered around New Mexico at any given moment. This is the same litter that the State Highway Department is spending more than \$650,000 a year to pick up in an attempt to make our highway look decent. This is the same litter that the State Game and Fish Department and the State Parks and Recreation Division spend about \$100,000 a year to pick up in their public

use areas. All in all, on a statewide basis, a minimum of \$2,796,000 is spent annually on trash pickup. This figure comes from a study conducted by the Environmental Improvement Division in 1977 which concluded that at least twice that much money would be needed to provide a high degree of litter control.

Needless to say, the bulk of the money financing such clean-up efforts comes out of our own pockets, in one way or another.

So, how do we not only stop littering, but clean up our state too? Well, we might look at Oregon's or Vermont's mandatory deposit legislation that reduced their beverage container portion of the litter 75-

Or, we might push for stricter enforcement of litter laws and encourage judges to assess higher fines for littering

Lastly, we might consider the selfdestruction we are creating with our own litter. Think about that used disposable diaper you saw laying on main street. Think about that goose you saw wearing the plastic six pac receptacle around its

SANTA FE-How important to New Mexico history is the role of the "unconscious voter"?

Well, the evidence seems to indicate that for one thing, if there were no such animal. our present governor would be named Joe

The "unconscious voter," according to evidence given before federal district judge Santlage Campos in a case last fall, is somebody who goes into the voting booth and pushes the lever for candidates whose cames are on the top line. Witnesses said as many as 3 to 5 per cent of the voters in New Mexico do this each election-time.

That gives a long margin to the topliners, as anyone can plainly see. And who are those happy folks on the upper line? In New Mexico, from time immemorial, it has been the Democratic party.

That's gotta stop, Judge Campos said, and he gave the Secretary of State of New Mexico till Friday of this week to propose a system that is "neutral in character," as he put it, and which gives all parties an equal chance at the privileged position.

Does it make much difference? Well. last election, which took place after the judge's ruling, Bruce King beat Skeen by less than 4000 votes. If just 3 per cent of the 340,000 who voted that day were "unconscious" in the sense in which that word is used here, that's 10,200 people-more than King won by.

In other words, Skeen might have been

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the winner this time and last time he ran if Judge Campos had ruled sooner.

If the Secretary of State, Shirley Hooper, who has to provide the suggested method of matting things fair in the future, comes up with some sort of lottery (let's-just-flipa-coin-and-see-who-gets-top-billing), that isn't likely to satisfy the Republicans who brought the suit in the first place.

As Bill Lutz of Las Cruces, attorney for Nila Baer and Jack Emmons, the plaintiffs, said, "That Isn't the kind of system we want." What some Republicans would like to see is a system which makes up for the losses they feel they have suffered in the past by being automatically relegated to the lower line.

So Mrs. Hooper's plan, which she has not hurried to make public, could affect the next decade's elections in New Mexico. Whatever her proposal, you can bet she put some sleepless nights into it. If you happen to be a loyal member of and successful candidate from a particular party, it's no fun to have some judge forcing you to make a ruling which may hurt your party. That's why Ernestine Evens, Secretary of State at the time the judge handed down his decision, went quietly out of office without attempting to come up with an answer. She left that responsibility as a legacy for her successor.

There are those, of course, who say the whole theory of the "unconscious voter" is made up out of the whole cloth by theoreticians who know nothing of reality. That could be true.

Whichever way it really is, we are liable to see some difference from this point forward if the Secretary of State follows the court's injunction and comes up with a plan which "takes account of all political partles."

Note: The Legislature could have acted to solve this problem and, like gentlemen, have spared Mrs. Hooper. They didn't want to touch it with a ten-foot pole.

Frequently a huge crane will pass in front of my office heading a short distance up the street to the Hart Senate Office Building, better known unaffectionately as the Great White Donkey.

This huge building, under construction, may some day stand as a monument to the unabashed grandeur that some Senators like to revel in, or perhaps more appropriately to the memory of the great American taxpayer.

When it was first authorized it was estimated the total cost of the Hart Building would be \$47 million, and that it would be ready for occupancy by 1960 at the latest. Today we have already sunk that much money into the building and the super-structure isn't even finished, and estimates are it probably won't be until 1983 at the earliest when we will have poured more than \$160 million (conservatively) of your money into it.

This new edifice will stand as a memorial to some men's propensity for lavish living. Two story-high offices for senators and their administrative assistants, a curved marble staircase, a huge 9-story atrium with a dangling million-dollar mobile, and a roof-top

restaurant for Senators only. Already spiraling costs have forced the builders to cancel plans for basketball back-boards in the elaborate gym. Costs also have forced the builders to forego plans for panelled Senatorial offices.

These of you who have visited me here in Washington have discovered that we don't exactly work in posh surroundings, but that our office space is more than adequate. Lots of marble may be nice, but it is certainly not a necessity and now it is absolutely not required.

If the building is ever finished, and there are those of us in the Senate including myself who doubt that it should be, we will have the problem of filling it. No selfrespecting senator with an eye on reelection would dare move in. And then there is the question of staff: it is estimated that three thousand new Senate staffers would be required to fill the Hart building at an additional cost to the taxypayer of between \$75 and \$100 million

Of course there is another question. All the Senators who can't move into the Hart building would want equally spacious accommodations, and so it is estimated we will spend another \$100 million just to remodel the existing two Senate Office Buildings.

Last week, when a national television reporter asked me, what can we do about this great taxpayer drain, I thought and decided that just maybe we should put a shell around the building and erect a plaque: "A memorial to the American taxpayer and a reminder to the American legislator." Washington already has a lot of monuments, why not one more? It's already the most expensive one we have.



News from the Home Economist

What more colorful way to cool down summer meals than with soft summer fruits! The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) predicts bountiful supplies of fresh peaches, plums, nectarines and limes to sparkle your menu. In fact, lime supplies are so large, you should find retail prices more favorable. It is important that consumers know what to expect so they can look for good buys.

Expect adequate supplies of these fruits: fresh apricots and sweet cherries, oranges and dried prunes. By the end of July shipments of fresh Bartlett pears promise light-less than adequatesupplies. Also, fresh lemons and grapefruit will be in light supply.

Pork and poultry continue to compete. Pork prices fell in April and poultry prices remained unchanged. However, with an increase in output of both items, you may see lower retail prices in coming months. Pork production will average 18-18 percent above last year. Broiler-fryer marketings will show a 8-9 percent increase, and lurkey supplies will be up 25-30 percent. Beef supplies are adequate—enough to meet normal needs—but down from record

levels of recent years. Supplies of milk and dairy products will be in good balance with demand. Plenty of staple food items-potatoes, onions, rice, wheat, corn, dry beans and dry split peas-will be found. Stocks of most processed vegetables are adequate, with frozen lima beans, snap beans, and cornon-the-cob plentiful. Until harvest of new

will remain in light supply.

With pork supplies good and prices reasonable you might want to try this pork casserole that cooks in your slow cooker. CHINESE PORK STEW - (If you like sweet-and-sour pork, you'll rave about this stew) Cook on 190° to 200° for 8 hours or on

290° to 300° for 4 hours. Makes 8 servings. 2 pounds boneless pork shoulder, cubed 1/4 teaspoon pepper 1/4 cup firmly packed brown sugar

1/4 cup light molasses 2 tablespoons cornstarch 1 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon ground ginger 1 can (13 1/4 ounces) pineapple chunks cube or teaspoon instant chicken broth

1/4 cup vinegar 1 can (1 pound) sweet potatoes 2 firm tomatoes, cut in eights

1 green pepper, halved, seeded and cut in 1-inch squares Trim excess fat from pork; place in an

electric slow cooker; season with sait, ginger and pepper.

Drain syrup from pineapple, adding water to syrup to make 1 1/2 cups; reserve pineapple chanks. Add syrup mixture to pork; stir in sugar, instant broth, molasses and vinegar: cover.

3. Cook on low (190° to 200°) for 8 hours, or on high (290° to 300°) for 4 hours.

4. Turn heat control to high (290° to 300°) Combine cornstarch and 1/4 cup cold water in a cup; stir into pork mixture until well-blended.

5. Add sweet potatoes, tomatoes, pack green peas and spinach, these items pineapple chunks and green pepper; cover; simmer 20 minutes longer.





Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — Two years ago I dug a pond on my farm. The primary intent was to provide an available water source in the event of fire around the barn or other outbuildings. Needless to say, I hope it's never used in this capacity.

never used in this capacity.

I would like now to stock it with fish. The pond is fairly large and probably has an average depth of six feet. What would be a good variety of fish to stock and how many would it support. Randall R., South Carolina

Dear Randall — The most likely occupants for your pond would be largemouth bass and bream (bluegills, sunfish). A ratio of about one pound of bass to three or four pounds of bream sound about right. Since you didn't really say how large the pond is, a stocking rate can't be determined. If you contact your local county extension and soil conservation offices they will provide you with lots of information. Chances are they will physically help you measure and stock it properly. Possibly even help with the stocking costs. And they can provide suggestions for management to help it yield its full potential. Their job is to assist you — use them.

Fig from reader — The one gallon plastic milk jugs must have hundreds of usefull applications besides storing milk.

Before your next camping trip or outing, fill one about three quarters full with lemonade or other ade drink, capit loosely and freeze solid. You'll have an effective coolant for your ice chest and as it melts it will provide an ice cold refresher. Jane R., Arkansas

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Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

ONLY ONE OF THE Kansas Futurity finalists has made it to the next jewel in the two-year-old quarter horse Triple Crown, the Rainbow Futurity. Pa Pa Wheelie, a colt purchased for \$1,200, was one of 10 head that made it through two sets of trials in the past two weeks. June 28-29 a field of 411 was narrowed down to 84 in 42 elimination trials. Time trials were held July 6 with the top 10 fastest times advancing to the July 22 grand finale and the second fastest 10 moving to the July 21 consolation. The Rainbow Futurity packs a gross purse of just over one-half million dollars.

DENIM N DIAMONDS was the fastest qualifier of the day, covering the 400 yards in 20.11 seconds, which ties Oh Shiney for the fastest time of the season at that distance. Denim N Diamonds was purchased, for \$32,000 in last year's All-American Select Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs. The brown filly was one of three H. Don Farris — trained entries to qualify for the rich finale, where over \$173,000 will go the winner.

ALSO QUALIFYING for the Rainbow Futurity are Streaking Six, 20.18; Sages Belle Star, 20.18; Nine Ohs, 20.25; Chicks Charger Bar, 20.26; Pa Pa Wheelle, 20.27; Easy Maneuver, 20.27; Call Me Smooth, 20.29; The Wheel Horse, 20.33; Thats Raney, 20.35. Qualifying for the consolation are Tonkawah, 20.40; Rocket Jet Bug, 20.41; Lets Do It Again, 20.41; Chickarun, 20.44; Jalmie Jay, 20.44; Take Five Too, 20.44; Call Me Reveille, 20.45; Cinco Pistol, 20.46; Gallants Miss Bar, 20.46; and Oh Bar Oh, 20.48.

THE FIRST AND SECOND division trials produced five horses each to either the finale or the consolation. Nine Ohs won the first division followed by Chicks Charger Bar, Call Me Smooth, Tonkawah and Cinco Pistol. Pa Pa Wheelie captured the second division followed by Easy Maneuver, Rocket Jet Bug, Chickarun and Call Me Reveille.

H. DON FARRIS was the top trainer of the trials. He pulled three starters into the finale; Denim N Diamonds, Streakin Six and Easy Maneuver. Farris originally had 12 starters in the elimination trials and advanced seven to the time trials. Danny Cardoza, the nation's leading quarter horse jockey last year and now riding at

As of June 28 in the Los Alamitos jockey standings, the four have 152 wins among themselves.

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Cars consume most household energy

"Private automobiles consume 28 percent of the nation's petroleum, making them the largest single energy-consuming device in the typical household," Charles Hohn, Extension agricultural engineer at New Mexico State University (NMSU) said. "With today's ever-rising prices for gasoline, it makes good sense to investigate every possibility that would extend gasoline economy."

Selection of an Automobile.

The most significant variable affecting fuel consumption in an automobile is its weight. A 5,000 pound car uses more than twice as much fuel as one weighing 2,000

An air conditioner typically increases average fuel consumption by nine percent and by as much as 20 percent when operated in stop-and-go traffic on a hot

Convenience accessories, such as an automatic transmission and power steering, add to gaseline consumption. Power steering can cost nearly one mile per gallon (mpg) in fuel economy. A

manual transmission will save only about .2 mpg in a full-size model, but it can save 1.2 mpg in a small car.

Cars powered by diesel engines achieve 40 to 70 percent improvement in fuel economy over conventional gasoline

Emission control devices have an often unwarranted reputation for being fuel wasters. Although they may decrease fuel economy in full-size cars by as much as 15 percent, according to the Environmental Protection Agency, these devices actually improve slightly the fuel economy of cars weighing less than 3,500 pounds.

- Driving Habits.

A speed is a primary consumer of gasoline. A steady speed of 50 miles per hour instead of 70 mph can save four mpg In the average car. Remember also that wind or an incline can have the same adverse effect on gas mileage as increased

For example, driving 50 mph into a 20

mph headwind results in about the same fuel consumption as driving 70 with no wind. Similarly, driving 50 up a four percent grade is comparable to going 70 mph on a level surface.

Jackrabbit starts require twice as much fuel as smooth starts. There is a saving in energy and repair parts when both starts and stops are smooth and gradual. Fast stops and needless stops can waste two miles per gallon in fuel economy, Hobn

Common sense planning to accomplish as many tasks as possible in one trip, combining trips with neighbors and car pooling are obvious fuel savers.

Remember that automobiles use 76 percent more gasoline per mile on short trips than on long trips.

Car pooling is probably the most important action consumers can take to save gas. "Our nation could save 33 million gallons of gasoline daily if the commuter passenger load were increased from 1.3 people per car to 2.3," Hohn said.

Excessive "warming up" of an engine on a cold day is a waste of fuel. Only a minute is sufficient for your engine oil to do its job with today's lubricants.

NMSU Cooperative Extension Service is working with the New Mexico Energy Extension Service to provide this in-

Excessive "trunk" weight is a gas waster. Remove excessive gear from your trunk and you can improve your gasoline mileage one percent for every 50 pounds

Anything which adds to friction or air resistance increases fuel consumption. Snow tires with studs reduce mileage. Driving over gravel roads requires about 35 percent more fuel than driving over smooth paved surfaces.

Maintenance.

A well tuned engine is essential to gas economy. A malfunctioning carburetor can waste three mpg. A misfiring sparkplug can waste two mpg. A clogged air filter can waste one mpg. These are little

things, none of which cause immediate concern to the driver, but they add up to

Tire inflation is important to gasoline economy. Under inflation is another one mpg waster. Before you get carried away with more air for more saving, remember that there is a federal law which prohibits inflating passenger tires over 36 pounds for safety reasons. However, cars used in the famous "economy runs" use special tires and they maintain tire pressures up to 70 pounds, Holm said.

Radial ply tries allow up to six percent better gas mileage because they produce less rolling friction thin conventional blas ply tires.

Consult your owner's manual for the proper octane rating of gasoline for your car. Use gasoline in this range for best performance.

Purchase slightly less than a full tank of gas and allow room for fuel expansion. This prevents overflow and spilling of ma



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
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
