

Arts Festival to feature 100 artists

"We want to emphasize art to the community of Ruidoso," Dave Wilson, chairman of the 1979 Art Festival, said Monday.

Wilson has worked with the Chamber of Commerce several years organizing the festival, which will be held at the high school parking lot August 3-4. Festival hours will be 5-10 p.m., Friday, 10 a.m. - 8

p.m., Saturday and 10 a.m.-5 p.m., Sunday.

"This is the first year we have called it the Ruidoso Art Festival instead of the Arts and Crafts Fair," Wilson said. "We have lined up what we feel will be a quality exhibit this year."

Wilson said the festival will include more than 100 artists from Arizona, Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma

and Missouri and will feature nearly every type of art conceivable.

Artists will display their work in five large circus tents with 200 booths in each tent, Wilson said, to protect them from the moody weather conditions.

Wilson said artists were required to submit slides of their work and a screening committee selected the top artists. A standards committee elected by the artists

was chosen and the five members will judge all work and award ribbons to the top 25 artists at the show. "They will display their ribbons on their booths," Wilson said, and will automatically be invited to next year's show.

The artist having the best quality and presentation of work will be invited to exhibit at next year's show at no cost, a prize worth \$70.

Service organizations in Ruidoso are being invited to set up food booths at the fair, but Wilson said details are not yet available.

"We're trying to make Friday night a 'family night' and we'll encourage families to come out and enjoy the displays together," Wilson said.

The artists will receive a warm welcome from Ruidoso, with a free meal served to

them during the festival and a public coffee sponsored by Gateway businesses, which will be held from 8-9:30 a.m., at the Bear Claw Gallery August 4.

"We have the potential to become a very high quality show in coming years, mostly because we've got a good jump on it now," Wilson said. "We're trying to make this year's festival more fun and we hope local people will come out and look around."

Mule racing assured

Mule racing aficionados rejoice!

Mule racing's coming to Ruidoso Downs. Three full days of mule racing, October 5, 6 and 7.

These mule races will be at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The mule races will be run just like the horse races. Depending, of course, naturally and factually, on just how the mules cotton to the conditions and restrictions.

THE PROMOTERS — Ruidoso Downs Mule Skimmers — will employ all devices used in the horse races: photo finish cameras, videotaping, timers, starters, stewards, weighing of jockeys before and after races. They're going the whole nine yards to make certain the races are run right.

How this all came about took a bit of doing.

First, the officers and directors of the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skimmers opted to start a brand new organization to bring mule racing and associated events to Ruidoso/Ruidoso Downs. The word was spread to mule owners. Response was immediate. And favorable.

Next, Mule Skimmers' representatives approached the directors of Ruidoso Downs-Sunland Park Race Track. The representatives requested of the directors that mule racing be permitted on Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

THIS APPROACH caused a few raised eyebrows. And furrowed brows.

It just so happens that some of the directors own mules. Or like mules. Race mules, even.

Once the initial shock of the request dissipated, the directors gave it considerable thought. The representatives were advised to submit plans for the proposed mule meeting. And proof that the organization, the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skimmers, was a bonafide group, operating completely in the open. With the sanction of the Chamber of Commerce. With all financial records completely open.

The directors advised the representatives that, once they were assured this was an entirely new mule racing operation, they would duly consider the possibility that Ruidoso Downs-Sunland Park Race Track would consider letting Ruidoso Downs Mule Skimmers race mules on the Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The directors of Ruidoso Downs Mule Skimmers held their breath. Individually. Collectively.

THE ENTIRE RACING plan was developed. Presented to the directors of Ruidoso Downs-Sunland Park Race Track. More holding of breaths.

Ruidoso Downs-Sunland Park Race Track president "Sunny" Edwards, after due consideration by the organization's directors, advised Ruidoso Downs Mule Skimmers president Ed Hyman that the directors not only thought the proposed mule meeting at Ruidoso Downs was a laudable goal, but that they approved.

Then came the stumbling block: having the New Mexico Racing Commission approve the venture.

More holding of breaths by the Mule Skimmers.

THEN CAME JULY 16. And a letter from Edwards. Hyman said that the Racing Commission had approved the request for a three day mule meet at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

Jubilant, an under statement of the fact, was rampant among the directors and officers of Ruidoso Downs Mule Skimmers.

At last they were going to have mule races at Ruidoso Downs Race Track!

At a special meeting of the Mule Skimmers directors Tuesday evening, details of the October 5-7 meet were hashed out. Rehashed, even.

Everything concerning the upcoming mule races, from getting fans into the park and parking to running the races was discussed. Plans were finalized to present to the race track directors.

Then came the nitty-gritty. Preparation of the conditions book. This step requires the establishing of purses for each race. 35 races are planned. That takes 35 purses. Adds up to 35 sponsors.

WHAT'S NEEDED, by July 25, are 35 sponsors.

There'll be \$500 and \$750 and \$1,000 purses and a couple of the Open to the World races can have bigger purses. All depends on how much enthusiasm a sponsor has for mule racing.

Potential sponsors can contact Hyman, or "Slick" McMath at the Ruidoso Post Office or Briscoe West in Ruidoso Downs. Any of the three will accept sponsor's checks.

Then, among others, there's Jim Germany, Albert Richardson and Ed Jungbluth who'll be actively seeking sponsors. They, too, will accept all sponsor's checks.

There are, of course, races with lesser purses.

Concerning the sponsors, for their money they get: their name on the blanket the winning mule receives; their names go into the condition book and their names will be printed in the programs.

In addition, the sponsors will be recognized in radio announcements throughout Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico and in portions of California. Locally, The Ruidoso News will acknowledge all sponsors.

THE ONLY DIFFERENCE between the horse races and the

mule races is that it'll be mules, not horses, running the races. It'll be a tight operation.

In addition to the three day mule meeting, one of the highlights of the two weeks of Aspenade festivities, there'll be action at Beaver's Arena in Ruidoso Downs. Action including such mule events as roping, cutting, reining, pole and barrel racing and show events. All action events will be jackpot. No admission charge to spectators.

The presentation of trophies and checks to the winners of the arena events will be made in front of the grandstand at the race track.

The mule race spectators will be seated in the first two tiers of the grandstand. Grandstand seating and parking will be included in the general admission price of \$2 per individual, 12 years and older. Everyone under age 12 will be admitted free.

"THIS IS THE FIRST STEP to making Ruidoso Downs the biggest mule racing center in the nation, if not the world," Hyman said.

"We're going at it slowly. We're going to do it right. We're going to build mule racing into a major attraction for Ruidoso.

"We want the sponsors of races to know that all purse monies put up will be deposited in a special bank account and that the money will be spent solely to pay the purses.

"We're developing an accounting system and budget so that every cent can be fully accounted for.

"In addition to the purses, mule owners will be putting up entry fees of up to \$200 for the races. Add \$2,000 in entry fees to a \$1,000, or larger added purse, and you can see where the owners of good racing mules, regardless of where they are, will be interested.

"From the inquiries we've received, and the interest being shown by mule owners, mule racing will become a great attraction in Ruidoso in the years ahead."

ONE FINAL ADDITION to the October mule races. There'll be a mule auction.

"We're going to develop our mule auction," Hyman said, "and as mule racing interest develops, we know that this auction will become a major attraction."

Thus it is, mule racing's coming to Ruidoso.

Don't laugh. It's serious business. Big money'll be paid.

AND THERE'S ALWAYS the bonus for fans of never knowing for certain what any mule will do on a given day in a given situation, regardless of whether it's a \$20,000 mule who has made much money for the owner, or a mule that's racing for the first time.

Why Ruidoso/Ruidoso Downs might become known world-wide as the mule racing capital of the world. That'd be a secret that'd be hard to keep.

Airport study slated

The state Aviation Division has offered \$30,000 in state funds to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) to finance an engineering study of proposed Site A on Fort Stanton mesa, but the SBAC is proceeding with plans to submit another application this time for a reduced amount of acreage—for Site B. Secretary of the Interior Cecil Andrus recently upheld a Bureau of Land Management decision to turn down the application for about 2,000 acres at Site B.

The announcement that the \$30,000 had been allotted for the study came from Governor Bruce King, speaking Monday in Las Cruces, and was confirmed Tuesday by White in a telephone conversation with The News.

White said he had talked with members of the SBAC to discuss alternative action following Andrus' decision. He told them he felt Site A had the best chance of receiving prompt attention.

"I told them that if they wanted to do it (make the study of Site A) that we could make a grant," White said. He said he spoke "not only for the state Aviation

Division, but also for the rest of the executive agencies," in making the offer.

HALL MONDAY RECEIVED a courtesy copy of an official communication from Secretary Andrus turning down the appeal for Site B. The letter was addressed to Hall, but was mailed to the regional office of the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA). Hall said he has yet to receive the original of the letter, which was dated July 6.

The letter echoed a previous one sent to King which explained the reasons for upholding the BLM's negative decision. Andrus said he felt the "national interest" would best be served by allowing the present use of the lands—range research—to continue.

In the second letter, Andrus added, "The ongoing research efforts at Fort Stanton are not totally domestic livestock oriented and include experiments to benefit wildlife and improvement of the watershed. The time and effort already expended on such research is significant and would be lost if the application for Site B were approved."

However, because specific numbers concerning the amount of acreage did not appear in the letter, "We feel the door hasn't been slammed shut," Hall said.

HALL SAID HE WAS TOLD the state funds probably would be granted if the commission decided to reapply for the Site B acreage. The commission would prefer to move ahead on both alternatives simultaneously, because of the time factor involved in both.

The BLM will have another six months to review the new application, which will be geared to "the minimum approximate acreage needed for Phase I development (about 300 acres) along with all easements to provide for safety of flight operations and potential growth when the economic conditions justify expansion into Phase II and possible Phase III," Hall said.

The paperwork process for the first SBAC-FAA application took about one year, Hall said, and he expects the second application might be tied up for the same length of time.

Law requires that the new application be processed on its merits as thoroughly as the first, he said. "They can't just look at it, say 'We've seen this before,' and reject it out of hand." The new application will have "supporting documentation to emphasize what we're asking for and why we

Ruidoso Downs' new sewer system will be financed by the sale of \$500,000 in municipal bonds, following passage of the issue in an election Wednesday.

A total of 89 voters cast their ballots, with the breakdown of 76 in favor of the bond sale, 13 against.

The system will include about 50,000 feet of sewer lines which will serve the village and all but one subdivision. The system will tie into the Regional Wastewater system which will also serve Ruidoso.

Woman suffers gunshot wound

Bonnie Sheppard of Ruidoso Downs was treated and released from Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital July 14, after she suffered a superficial gunshot wound in the right leg.

Police chief Ray Garner said a gun which Sheppard kept in her purse apparently discharged accidentally. The incident occurred at the Ruidoso Downs racetrack.

Paul Gordon cited for 25-year service record

Paul Gordon, district ranger for Smokey Bear Ranger District on Lincoln National Forest, Monday received recognition for working as a federal employee 25 years.

Gordon was presented a certificate and tie tack at a meeting in Alamogordo by Jim Abbott, forest supervisor, which was attended by Lincoln National Forest staff members.

"I'll never apologize for working for the government. I'm proud of the job the forest service is doing. I think we are one of the few organizations in the government that gives the public a good return on their dollar," Gordon said.

Gordon began his tenure with the government as a forest service employee on the Tahoe National Forest and later the Sequoia National Forest, both located in California. He has worked on the Kaibab and Apache National Forests in Arizona and prior to settling in Ruidoso, Gordon worked on the Cibola National Forest in New Mexico.

He served four years in the United States Marine Corps, and has been a forest ranger "off and on" since 1963. Gordon said he was involved in staff work, as a consultant to the rangers, when he was not employed as a ranger.

Gordon has been the forest ranger at Smokey Bear since August, 1978.

C-C forms political committee

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors Wednesday decided to create a political affairs committee which will increase the lobbying efforts of the Chamber at local, county, state and national levels.

Chairing the new committee is Sheila Harris, board member, who said she met with Chamber of Commerce executive director Ed Jungbluth and director Sunny Hirschfeld this week to organize the committee.

A maximum of eight members will sit on the council, and will be responsible for feeding ideas to a local person who will attend regular legislative sessions of the state government.

Plans are to allocate enough money to rent an apartment during the 1980 30 day session of the legislature, beginning January 15, and also money for special lobbying expenses which will hopefully give the Ruidoso Valley more representation in state government.

Harris said Hirschfeld is currently trying to locate an apartment which can be used for the 30 day session and is spending some time in Santa Fe collecting information on proposals which may be presented.

Concerns aired at the meeting included:

— Possible funding to repair or re-do the highway to Sierra Blanca Ski Area;

— Upgrading of Gavilan Canyon Road as an alternative route through Ruidoso;

— Lobbying against bills which may actually take money away from resort areas and small communities;

— Cost of placing more signs on highways in the state giving distance calculations to reach Ruidoso;

— "We anticipate having a meeting with the legislators in September to let them know what we would like to have them do for us," Harris said, adding that by having a lobbyist in Santa Fe, "we'll have a watchdog effect; we can check up on them."

"We want them to be aware that we will be a viable 'pressure group' in the state from now on," Benny Coulston, Chamber president, said.

The board also considered a membership drive which could take place one day in August. Jungbluth said the last membership drive lasted about two hours one morning and resulted in more than 40 new memberships, with current members visiting prospective members on a one-to-one basis.

Jungbluth said he would try to arrange a convenient day to have the drive.

In other business the board:

— Received an update on the Art Festival, which will be August 3-5. Tents will be in place by August 1, and a bank booth may be arranged to ease the handling of money at the fair, according to festival chairman Dave Wilson;

— Heard a report on the plans of the Aspenade committee with tentative plans for the restaurant committee to serve the barbecue following the parade;

— Learned that five crosswalks will be painted in midtown as a result of the work of the Retail Merchants Committee, who

requested a traffic study to be done by the state highway department. Jungbluth said the state recommended five crosswalks instead of three requested by the committee;

— Met with Glenn Pike, Community Publications, Incorporated, who is printing the Chamber-endorsed maps of the village. Pike said the maps will not be returned from the printer until August 7 because the earliest possible printing date was August 1;

— Met with Hal Barron, Barron Publishing Company, who discussed the possibility of publishing the city map next year. The discussion ended when a motion was approved to investigate the costs of the chamber publishing its own advertising-free map;

— Decided to seek a picnic license to sell beer at the Mulekimmers Mule Races, scheduled October 5-7 as a money making project for the chamber.

Correction on P&Z 'mobile home extension'

Planning and Zoning Commission chairman Mike Waldron Monday issued a statement of clarification on an extension of time to Cesar Parra for "construction of a mobile home," reported in The News Monday.

"What the commission did," Waldron said, "was issue an extension to Parra on a home he is building. The mobile home, on the site, is to be used solely for the storage of materials and tools, not as a habitation."

"Also, the commission has set a public hearing for August 1, at the regular P&Z meeting, on the zoning change requests for Camelot Subdivision. Lots three through eight in Block eight actually abut Highway 70, thus the request to change the lots from Residential 1 to Commercial zoning."

want it," he added.

THE PROCEDURE FOR acquiring Site A, if that is possible, would also be lengthy, Hall said. White explained that, "We'd go back to the place in the (original) study where the site selection was made. All efforts were put into site B as far as final figures on construction, costs and environmental impact. We'd do the same thing for site A."

Following completion of the engineering studies, the commission would have to acquire the land, and would possibly ask the state for a special appropriation for that purpose.

Hall said a "conservative estimate" of the cost of the land would be \$4,500,000. A request for appropriations would have to come before the state legislature, which will not reconvene until January 1980.

An environmental impact statement would be the "last big hurdle" for the commission on Site A, Hall said. A statement would not even be considered by the Federal agencies unless the SBAC or FAA was in possession of the land prior to submission of the environmental documents, he explained.

With either Site A or Site B, "we're into the 1980 time frame," Hall said.

ACCEPTANCE OF THE Aviation Division's offer, White said, would and should be a "local decision" by the SBAC. "My discussion was strictly in terms of what we're in a position to do."

Hall contacted White and Jim King, deputy secretary of the Department of Natural Resources, Wednesday to ask for consideration of his recommendation to "follow both avenues concurrently."

Hall said there was a "genuine reluctance" on the part of the executive branch offices to commit the \$30,000—which might or might not finance the entire study—knowing it might be spent in vain if approval was gained for Site B. White did say he would discuss the matter with the governor "the early part of next week," Hall said.

In the meantime, the SBAC is unwilling to "deviate from the master plan at this early stage of involvement. We're almost at a logjam," Hall said, but added, "I don't think I should say we're going to give up."

Forest Service offers films on wildlife, wood

New films on wildlife and firewood are available for free loan from the Forest Service Regional Office in Albuquerque.

The half hour wildlife movie, "Habitat: A Special Place," offers an in depth look at the everchanging relationship between wildlife and the elements it needs to survive—food, water, cover and a place to raise young. It was produced by the Forest Service in cooperation with the National Wildlife Federation.

The 15 minute firewood film, "These Are Our Forests: Firewood in the Southwest," deals with managing, cutting and using firewood. Filmed mainly on the Carson National Forest in northern New Mexico, the movie shows efficient ways to use wood for fuel and urges the use of all kinds of wood in areas where the favored piñon and juniper are becoming scarce.

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Help for drug dependency available now in Ruidoso

Physical and/or emotional dependence on drugs, once thought to be a problem unique to the younger generation, actually affects people of all ages, according to Don Hoover, director of the Counseling Center, Four Seasons Mall, Ruidoso.

Support and therapy for such persons, along with educational programs aimed at prevention of drug abuse, are among the services offered by the Counseling Center. Both the therapy and educational programs emphasize two major concepts: "Human life is too valuable to destroy through the use of chemicals," and "There are better and more effective ways of coping with the stresses of life," Hoover said.

The desire for relief from stress, anxiety and frustration is cited by Hoover as the primary reason that people turn to drugs. Traumatic events in the person's life, such as divorce, separation from a close friend, loss of a family member through death or loss of a job can precipitate dependence on drugs.

"While the use of medication can certainly be helpful in a crisis situation, with many people there is a tendency to continue relying on drugs whenever something goes wrong," Hoover said.

The ease of procuring drugs may be another reason for the increase of dependence cases, he added. Drugs can be obtained through prescriptions or from friends, and "once they become depen-

dent, it becomes a way of life. Whenever they're feeling down, the response is to take a pill," Hoover said.

With younger people, peer pressure and simple curiosity are factors which may lead to drug abuse, he said.

The first step in therapy for clients involved with drugs is to "define the problem (which led to dependence) and consider alternative solutions," Hoover said.

The counselors work with both individuals and families to help the client develop more effective "coping styles," he added.

"By talking to a counselor who is willing to listen and offer understanding and empathy rather than criticism, the client is more apt to find ways of changing, growing and valuing himself as a worthwhile person, instead of devaluing himself through the abuse of chemicals," Hoover said.

Drug dependence is usually marked by an increasing tolerance of the drug according to Hoover. A person who has been ingesting one tranquilizer per day may find that after an extended period of time, he needs two pills for the same effect.

Physical dependence also exhibits itself through "withdrawal" symptoms once the person stops taking the drug. Hoover outlined the symptoms of withdrawal from the various types of drugs and treatment programs which may be necessary to relieve the symptoms.

Narcotics addicts withdrawal symptoms

resemble a "bad case of the flu," Hoover said. The person experiences chills, muscular pain and headaches, upset stomach and diarrhea.

Cases of heroin addiction are generally referred to the Alamogordo counseling center, the parent agency of the local center. A methadone program, involving gradual reduction of dosage, is in operation at the Alamogordo office.

The most severe withdrawal symptoms are experienced by users of barbiturates, Hoover said. Hospitalization is usually required for clients discontinuing the use of these drugs, he said, since convulsions may result.

Amphetamine (speed) users generally suffer from headaches and depression during withdrawal. In severe cases of addiction, Hoover said, the person may also experience paranoia or psychotic symptoms.

Less is known about withdrawal from tranquilizers, Hoover said. Although there is no definite pattern or set of symptoms common to users of tranquilizers, some persons have experienced physical discomfort.

In all cases, after physical withdrawal from drugs, follow-up counseling is available from the center, for an indefinite period of time.

Staff members are also available to speak to groups of all ages on drug abuse. Appointments may be made by calling 257-5638.

Jicarilla tribe backs Apaches

The Jicarilla Apache Tribe has entered a statement of its amicus curiae in a case brought by the Mescalero Apache Tribe against the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, asking that the 10th United States Circuit Court of Appeals uphold a lower court decision against the state wildlife agency.

Game and Fish Department Director Harold Olson said the agency is working with the Attorney General's office to prepare a response to the Jicarilla statement and that the response will be filed with the court by July 20.

The lower court decision, handed down by United States District Judge Edwin Mechem, ruled that the state could not apply its wildlife laws and regulations — including hunting and fishing licenses, seasons and bag limits — to non-Indians hunting or fishing on the Mescalero Reservation.

The state has appealed. Olson said the Jicarilla statement contends that "state interest is restricted to controlling non-Indian conduct where no significant Indian property or tribal interest is involved," and that the state has not contributed personnel or money to the tribe's game and fish program.

"Recent federal court decisions in Montana and Washington have affirmed those states' authority over non-Indians hunting or fishing on reservations," Olson said, "and we are compiling, in our answer to the Jicarilla's brief, a rather extensive list of direct aid this agency has given the tribe in developing its wildlife resources."

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — One man who always manages to make himself heard in Santa Fe is Ron Chavez, of Santa Rosa. He knows what buttons to push to get attention—even publicity—for the programs in which he is interested.

One thing that always matters to him is tourists, and their care and feeding. (He has two eateries in the Santa Rosa area and wants to keep them busy.)

It's surprising that not all New Mexicans really appreciate how much of an economic influence tourism is. Many of us seem to feel that, since we do not ourselves make our living directly by taking care of tourists, this group of traveling Americans are not very important.

Fact is, each dollar a visitor spends probably "turns" as the economists say, from four to six times before it leaves the state, and that means it passes through a lot of hands which have nothing to do with the tourist business directly.

Will the current gasoline shortage have an effect on this segment of our economy? There is no way this century's major economic problem could do anything but hurt this business which is in many ways the backbone of our state's financial soundness.

Where does that leave our political leaders?

In a very tough spot indeed. As Larry Kehoe, Secretary of Energy and Minerals, admitted last week, the state has to keep encouraging tourists by telling them there is no gasoline shortage while telling the

rest of us there is.

The Department of Commerce and Industry, for example, which contains the Tourist and Travel Division, has been running radio spots in major markets reasonably close to our state borders to tell folks to come on and vacation with us. The invitation contains information which says our visitors will find they can fill up their gas tank while they're here.

As gasoline grows increasingly tight, that kind of message may seem less and less pleasant to those of us who live here, especially if it turns out that there isn't enough gasoline to take care of our needs.

But Commerce and Industry is stepping up the ads, in an effort to keep the tourist and travel industry busy. They were even prepared to go to the Board of Finance to ask for a deficiency appropriation (that is, money over and above their present budget) to keep the ads running after the dough assigned for them runs out.

That makes the contrast even sharper: Spend money you haven't got to bring visitors here, while you try to convince us local residents that we shouldn't waste energy on travel. It sounds pretty contradictory, as Rep. Nick Salazar from Rio Arriba pointed out to the Interim committee on energy and the environment. Answers given by members of the administration to his questions on the subject weren't very satisfactory.

At least Commerce and Industry was in process of cancelling \$20,000 worth of ads it had scheduled to run in National Geographic, just like it used to do in the days when there was no energy shortage.

That money will be spent to attract tourists, which will make Ron Chavez feel good but will still leave Nick Salazar scratching his head and asking, "Is there an energy shortage only for us stay-at-homes, or does it apply to tourists and travelers as well?"

Sense & Nonsense

If you read the Gospel according to IRS, you'll learn that the "wages of sin" are often higher than you think... sometimes \$1,500 higher.

For when the tax man descends upon us each April, he wields a mighty but unequal sword that lashes away at the most noble institution of marriage.

Here's what happens. A couple without children filing jointly and making a combined income of \$40,000 pays \$1,584 more income tax than if both had filed single.

On \$30,000 combined income, the "marriage penalty" is \$785 while couples making \$25,000 must pay \$535 more. At \$20,000 the penalty is \$356, but any way you look at it, it's a lot of money. The one thing that is very clear is that the two earner couple can live cheaper out of wedlock than in wedlock.

In fact, the Census Bureau has just reported that between 1970 and 1978 the number of unmarried couples living together has doubled, and increased more than eightfold among people under 25 years of age.

The so called "marriage tax" became effective in 1970 when Congress tried to end tax discrimination against single persons so none would pay more than 20 percent in excess of what married persons paid.

Now, however, the shoe has landed on the other foot. Married couples who make more than \$30,000 together pay 24 percent more than singles and the percentages increase right up the scale.

Each year about 20 million couples suffer this marriage penalty, paying out more than \$2 billion extra to IRS, and these numbers are sure to increase as more wives join the work force and more women move into higher income brackets. Already half the wives in our country work.

So when the wife brings home the bacon, hungry Uncle Sam is waiting around to snatch it up.

This marriage tax is one reason why so many young people prefer to stay single. Many just cannot afford the penalty our government imposes on us to walk to the altar.

For all these reasons, I have joined with 20 other United States Senators and 103 House members in sponsoring legislation which would permit a married person to file his or her tax return individually and use tax tables now applicable only to singles. The tax rates for singles and married couples wishing to file jointly would not be changed.

In addition, our bill would allow married persons who file separately to take advantage of credit for employment-related expenses such as child care, just as single persons do now.

The entire point is that if a couple wants to remain unmarried that should be their prerogative, but it shouldn't be imposed on them by the taxing whims of Uncle Sam.

It was tap city for a big, big car when Body No. 9975763622 dropped on to its chassis on Ford's assembly line at Wixom, Mich.

Being assembled was a Lincoln Continental Town Coupe with vinyl roof and all the accessories that go with a classy car. It was the last of the biggies — a "Detroit leviathan" that measures in excess of 19 feet, weighs almost two and one half tons, gets 12 miles to the gallon and costs \$11,467.

Oh, there will be Lincoln Continentals turned out in future years, but they will be shortened and trimmed in weight to gain better mileage. An effort will be made to offer a luxury car, but the days of royal coachwork are as dead as the Duesenbergs.

Twelve months ago there would have been a scramble for the last of such a prestigious line — as there was for the last of the Cadillac convertibles — but lines at the service stations made buyers wary. There is about a four-month supply of Lincolns available at the various dealerships across the nation.

It's a shame, in a way. With the passing of the Lincoln Continental goes a way of life. Look on the bright side, though. Who needs that much iron with a tapeworm in its tank? — News-Bulletin, Boise

NEWEST CAR

The newest idea in automobiles is the aluminum, water and air powered car. An official at the Lockheed Missile and Space Company in California said recently such a car is being developed.

One would change aluminum plates every 900 miles, rather than fill up with gasoline. That would be an estimated 30 pounds of plates. The plates react with water and air to create electricity.

There would be no emission or pollution problems. And no problem in finding fuel, presumably, since sufficient aluminum electrodes and water are likely to be available.

And there's still plenty of air. It's still free. — Santa Rosa News

The Associated Press report of President Jimmy Carter's address to the nation Sunday night contained this paragraph:

"At his desk in the Oval Office, the president conceded that his leadership has become too focused on 'what the isolated world of Washington thinks is important,' rather than on the real concerns of the people."

That's a real concession. Especially from a president who has not heretofore heeded — at least publicly — the widely circulated criticism of his regime from the Congress, labor, manufacturers, minorities and the man in the street, as reported by the media.

He is, apparently, belatedly picking up his cudgel of righteous indignation to attack the energy problem. And he's planning to take his ideas to the Congress. The notable change in his new approach to have his programs considered by the Congress include this phrasing: will request, will propose and will ask of the Congress. After more than 30 months in office seems he's gotten the message that he, as president, can't demand anything from the Congress.

The president's ideas have plausibility, though his proposal that coal be used by energy producing plants instead of petroleum products could have the environmentalists attacking him with gusto. Even the most practical of his ideas, producing synthetic oil, will come to naught if the Congress doesn't implement them.

Though his politically motivated, albeit with sincere purpose, Camp David sessions with people in a position to help him solve the energy problems were held at least 18 months later than the clearly impending oil crises indicated: let us hope the result will be a solution to our energy needs that we can all live with. — CD

When Carlos Rivas was driving for the finish line in the Billy The Kid Handicap, little did he know that while passing Don Howard he captured the Jockey-of-The-Week title at Ruidoso Downs.

Jimmy D. Claridge, winner of only five races before the weekend, brought in four champions to take the Trainer-of-The-Week title.

Rivas and Howard both had five wins going into the 11th race Sunday. Young Danny Summerow was ahead with six wins, but had fewer second place finishes. Going down the backstretch of the

\$11,300 Billy The Kid Handicap, Rivas and his mount, Rushing Silver, were some 15 lengths behind the leaders at one point. Going wide around the turn, Rivas opened with a tremendous charge as did Howard, who was aboard the favorite Double B Express on the rail.

At the wire, Rivas was ahead by one half length over Howard. It gave him six wins for the weekend to add to his four runnerup spots. Summerow had only two second place finishes. Both Howard and Gary Sumpter followed with five wins each.

Rivas collected double wins Thursday, Saturday and Sunday for his total. Sum-

merow again piloted four winners, performing the trick Friday.

Claridge scored a pair of wins Thursday, including 11-1 outsider Gentle Heritage. Roy Owl, who set a seasonal best time over 7 1/2 furlongs, was his only winner Friday followed by Copper Freckles winning Saturday.

Harold E. Nolen, who was behind Rushing Silver, and Hugh L. Tucker had three winners each.

Sumpter continues to lead the overall jockey standings with 37 wins. Jerry Nicodemus, who only had two mounts this week—one a winner and one second—dropped to third when Summerow tallied his 34 win. Nicodemus has 32 wins.

Rivas moved into the top 10 with 21 wins, good enough for eighth.

Tucker is the leading trainer with 28 wins. John A. Goodman moved into second with 21 wins followed by William F. Leach at 20.

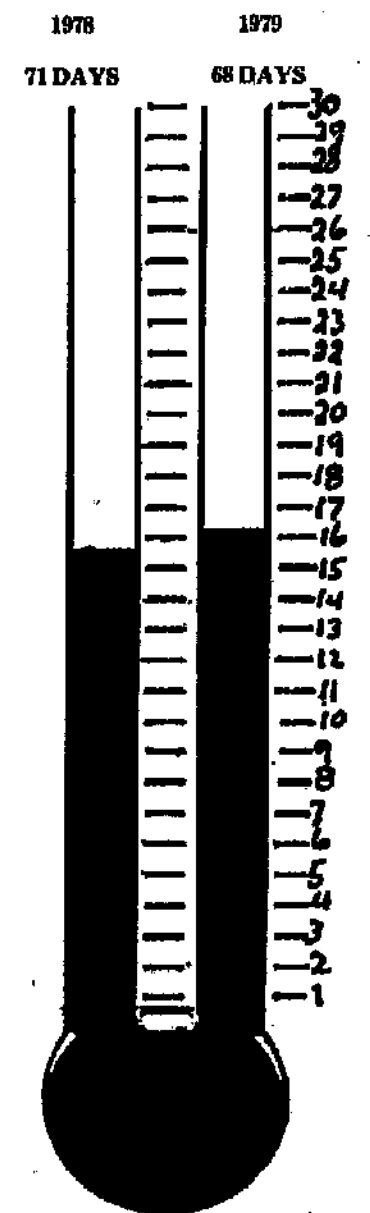

How R. Dee Hubbard acquired speedster Denim N Diamonds

For a man whose roots in quarter horse racing began with the purchase of a riding horse, R. Dee Hubbard is doing very well for himself. Thank you very much, but please save the applause for the winner's circle.

Hubbard has marked July 22 on his calendar, hoping he has an appointment with sportscaster Dave Johnson for a television interview after his filly, Denim N Diamonds captures the \$500,100 Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The Rainbow Futurity is the second jewel in the quarter horse Triple Crown for two-year-olds. The winner will collect \$173,285.

Denim N Diamonds survived the grueling elimination process that determines the 10 finalists, emerging as a definite favorite. The California-bred filly established the fastest time of 20.11 seconds over the 400 yard dash in the second of two qualifying trials.

With a near perfect record of 3-2-0 in five starts, Denim N Diamonds is sure to draw considerable mutual attention in the Rainbow Futurity if not ample praise and affection from the 10,000-plus attendance expected in the mountain retreat.

It is the first time that Hubbard has made the finals of a Triple Crown race—he once missed just by the flip of a coin—and marks his successful return to the track. Hubbard was born and raised in Kansas. After attending Butler Community College, he coached basketball for one year before entering the glass manufacturing business in Wichita. He also became a distributor for Coors beer. Hubbard has expanded his glass business to Kingsport, Tennessee making his home in both parts of the country.

In the early 1960's, Hubbard shared ownership in the Red Bee Ranch in Kansas. He helped purchase a riding horse for his partner's daughter and that was the catalyst needed to enter the racing business.

"About this time racing was just coming into its own," Hubbard said. "They started breeding horses from show to race. We decided that if we were going to get into the horse business, we would buy a couple of race horses."

From a mild interest, Hubbard's stable grew into a profitable venture. He once sold 48 head for an average of \$12,000 each in a major sale. At one time Hubbard recorded the highest selling price for both a mare and stallion.

The Red Bee Ranch sold out and Hubbard was absent from the racing business for a few years, although he did invest in Ruidoso Downs stock for two years.

Soon, Hubbard attended the All-American Select Yearling Sale, the most prestigious quarter horse sale in the nation. It is held every year on the Ruidoso track grounds in conjunction with the \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity—the third jewel in the Triple Crown.

Sitting in the audience, Hubbard caught the fever again.

"I don't know what made me do it. I just started bidding on this mare," said Hubbard.

After purchasing Joan Dale 3, a filly by the three-time world champion Go Man Go, for \$15,000, Hubbard had to go look up an old friend, trainer H. Don Farris.

"When I bought her, I didn't know what I would do with her. So I just walked over to Don Farris' barn, I guess I hadn't seen him in about 10 years, and asked him if he would train her for me. It so happened that he had a half-brother to this mare in his stable and he was a pretty good runner. So Don took her," Hubbard said.

Farris was introduced to Hubbard's stock while training in California. "At that time we were looking for the best trainer in California to run our horses," Hubbard said. "The name of Don Farris was recommended to us many times. Don has been very instrumental in our success in the horse business. I would not buy a horse without his approval."

Joan Dale 3 never produced as a runner but became the foundation for Hubbard's resurrected stable.

"What I'm trying to do is put back together a band of broodmares. I have about 22 horses now with six mares who were stakes winners. I'm shooting for about ten to 12 good mares," said Hubbard.

Who is Hubbard's top mare right now? "I guess I really would have to say Denim N Diamonds," he said.

Hubbard purchased Denim N Diamonds in last year's All-American sale for \$32,000 with the help of Farris.

"I liked the darn," Farris said, on his attraction to Denim N Diamonds. "Her mother is a great mare and great producer."

Denim N Diamonds is by the 1973 All-American Futurity champ Timeto Thinkrich out of the Rebel Cause mare, Bachelor's Dream. Winner of seven races and over \$20,000, Bachelor's Dream produced four foals of racing age, all

Register of Merit winners, before Denim N Diamonds.

The sire, Timeto Thinkrich, was a world running champion, winning 15 races including the All-American Futurity. His earnings of \$612,888 was second on the all-time list until last June when Moon Lark surpassed him.

"The breeding was there and I liked the way she looked," Hubbard, who eventually purchased three others in the sale, said. "Of course, there is always a certain amount of luck involved in a sale, and then you have to keep them sound. We're just extremely lucky with Denim N Diamonds."

Farris views the evolution from a different angle. "You can't see that heart at a sale. No one knows what kind of desire they will have then, but Denim N Diamonds knows she's a runner."

Denim N Diamonds made her racing debut at Sunland Park where she whipped a maiden field by one length as an even money betting favorite. She qualified for the Sun Country Futurity after placing second in her trial heat, but was scratched out of the finals.

Moving to Ruidoso this summer, Denim N Diamonds was nosed out in her trial heat for the \$521,500 Kansas Futurity, however her time was fast enough to just reach the consolation. She came back two weeks later to easily win the consolation.

"I felt like in those early trials that she wasn't breaking very well and was getting left behind. We made some equipment changes on her and now she's able to break out faster," Farris said.

Unlike most of the major quarter horse races, the Rainbow Futurity requires two sets of trials to qualify for the finals. The opening round was staged June 23 and 29 where a field of 411 head was narrowed down to 84. Twenty-one trials were held each day with the top two finishers advancing to time trials July 6. Those recording the top 10 times advanced into Sunday's Rainbow finals.

Denim N Diamonds won the first race by one half length over Easy Tam, the fallen horse in the Kansas Futurity. It was only the second time in seven races that Easy Tam did not go off as a betting favorite. That role was assumed by Denim N Diamonds. Although time was irrelevant for that race, Denim N Diamonds recorded a 20.23, seventh best over the two day period.

At the time trials, Denim N Diamonds was matched against Sages Belle Star, a big futurity winner from the bush track circuit. An Easy Six filly, Sages Belle Star had never placed lower than second. Faced with a tough decision, the betting public selected Sages Belle Star as an even money favorite while Denim N Diamonds went off at just over 6-5. It was the first time in her career that Denim N Diamonds was not the favorite at the windows.

Hubbard's filly responded with a striking half length win over Sages Belle Star, after spotting her a half length advantage out of the gates. Her time of 20.11 seconds equalled a 95 speed index for Ruidoso Downs and tied the seasonal best for 400 yards.

"I felt pretty confident up to that race (sixth of nine divisions) that we would have the fastest time. After the day was over, I was extremely pleased that we had the fastest time," Hubbard said.

Danny Cardoza, the nation's winningest quarter horse jockey last year, was aboard Denim N Diamonds. He was substituting for Jerry Nicodemus, Denim N Diamonds' regular jockey who was injured two days before the trials.

Farris feels Denim N Diamonds will be the favorite, but he has to share his time with two other horses in his stable. For the second time in his career, Farris has qualified three finalists to the Rainbow Futurity.

Streaking Six and Easy Maneuver, a pair of Easy Six offspring, are also conditioned by Farris. Streaking Six set the second fastest time of 20.18 seconds while Easy Maneuver followed at 20.27 seconds, which tied for sixth.

"I would have to say that Denim N Diamonds will be the favorite with Streaking Six right behind," Farris said. "Sages Belle Star (whose time ended up third best) will be tough in the race. If anybody makes a mistake, she'll win it."

Streaking Six was honored with the lowest odds of any of the finalists, just over 3-5, and returned the favor with a solid two length win in his time trial.

Another colt that could figure into the running is Pa Pa Wheelie, who nosed out Easy Maneuver in the time trials. Purchased for a mere \$1,200, Pa Pa Wheelie is the only Kansas Futurity finalist to make the Rainbow. He has the tallest money line of \$113,888 going into the finals.

Rounding out the field will be Nine Ohs (20.25 qualifying time), Chicks Charger Bar (20.26), Call Me Smooth (20.29), The Wheel Horse (20.33), and That's Honey (20.35).

Denim N Diamonds will be the finest effort Hubbard has placed in a major race at Ruidoso Downs. In the early 1960's, one of Hubbard's horses tied for the 10th fastest qualifying time to the rich All-American Futurity. A coin flip was needed to determine the open position, and Hubbard's luck was not with him that day.

After returning to racing, Hubbard campaigned a filly named Donna Dodad who won the 1976 Sun Country Futurity at Sunland Park.

Now it's Denim N Diamonds' turn to carry the Hubbard colors, and perhaps she is the best qualified to do so—if in name only.

"We didn't get to name her because we bought her at the sale," Hubbard said. "Let's just say the name is very appropriate."

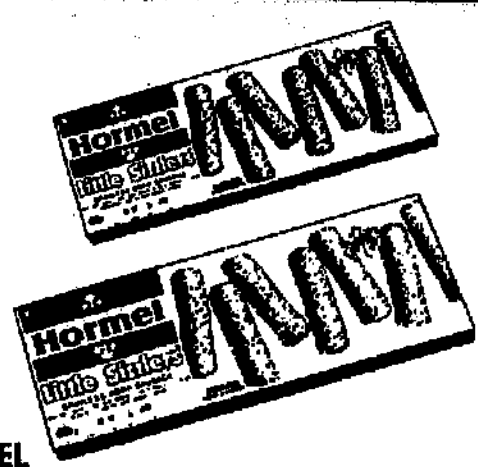

Mountain Christian Fellowship

... a non-structured church

Mountain Christian Fellowship is one of the newest churches in the area, formed in September, 1977 by a close-knit prayer group.

The congregation is non-denominational, with most members leaving traditional churches to join the group, now comprised of about 25 members from ten families.

The original prayer group grew large enough to merit meeting at the Holiday House in a meeting room. After several months, the congregation decided to meet in homes, which they continue to do.

"We believe that a

church is composed of people rather than buildings," Jack Leavitt, minister of the church, said. "We make religion too expensive, I think," he said.

As for building a church, Leavitt said, "We can't tell right now if we'll build or not. We're beginning to outgrow houses, but no one has really thought much of building a church."

Church meetings are held every Sunday at Leavitt's home, 102 Clover Street, in Ruidoso, at 11 a.m. Tuesdays the group meets at the home of Dorothy Apodaca and Saturday evening meetings are held in the Frank Silva home five miles west of Capitan.

Leavitt said, "Meeting in houses has helped draw the people together. It's a people-centered church."

He said ministering to such a church is his favorite way of teaching. "You can get more intimate with the congregation."

"We're getting back to what the early church was — back to the basics of religion," Leavitt said.

Leavitt attended Southern California College in Costa Mesa, California which is primarily an Assembly of God school. He was licensed to preach in the Assembly of God church and did so for 14 years. He also attended Southwestern Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas for a year.

"I got my start in preaching by holding street meetings in the late fifties," Leavitt said. He said he likes the freedom offered by a loosely structured street meeting,

which in some ways, is similar to the house meetings. "You are free to say what you wish, what's in your heart and the relationship is based on the people," he said.

The Mountain Christian Fellowship is governed by a council of five people: Al Lane, Frank Silva, Linda Silva (secretary-treasurer), Richard Portillo and Leavitt. This group decides business questions, but any major decisions are made by the entire congregation, Leavitt said.

"We are not structured but we keep organized books. We also help support a missionary living in Mexico," Leavitt said.

"We are all looking for an alternative to the institutionalized church, and we think we've found it here," Leavitt said.

United World of the Universe camp delights group of Mexican children

Children from the Mexico Multiple Mission (3-M) in Guadalupe, Mexico accompanied by sponsor Irene Logsdon, have spent the past two weeks enjoying the "United World of the Universe" camp facilities, located at the junction of Gavilan Canyon and Eagle Creek Roads.

Youngest members of the 3-M home for children attended the second week. Logsdon said, "They have really enjoyed their stay in these mountains. Most of these kids never even saw a tree until they came here," and they were impressed, she said.

The camp was a five-year project headed up Fred Segal, an El Paso, Texas businessman who donated the 60 acre spread to locate the camp. Segal also solicited donations from associates and interested parties who wished to support the camp, which pays for all expenses of the campers. The camp opened in early June.

Caretaker John Vester said the groups who have attended the first summer of week-long sessions have "really enjoyed it."

Vester said, "People in Ruidoso have been great to donate time and services to the camp. One of the stables donated free horseback rides each week and a local motel donated use of their swimming pool." Vester said he hopes more people will be willing to donate time to the camp because "It's really a great thing for these kids."

Logsdon said, "It is interesting to me to see the interest that various people in town

have shown in donating time, money and services to the children."

The camp is a non-profit organization, and sponsors who attend camp with the children are responsible for planning activities, but receive assistance from Vester when necessary.

"This group is pretty active. They are really taking advantage of the beautiful land around the main buildings," Vester said.

Groups invited to attend the first year of the camp included the Mexico Multiple Mission for two sessions, the El Paso Boys Club, six sessions, El Paso Girls Club, two sessions and El Paso State Center for Human Development, two sessions.

The camp is equipped with numerous diversions to delight the hearts of the underprivileged children who attend the camp. Board games, puzzles, color televisions, stereo, playground equipment, horses, cattle, hiking trails and picnic areas have been supplied for the children.

A baseball diamond, tennis court and play areas are also within walking distance of sleeping quarters.

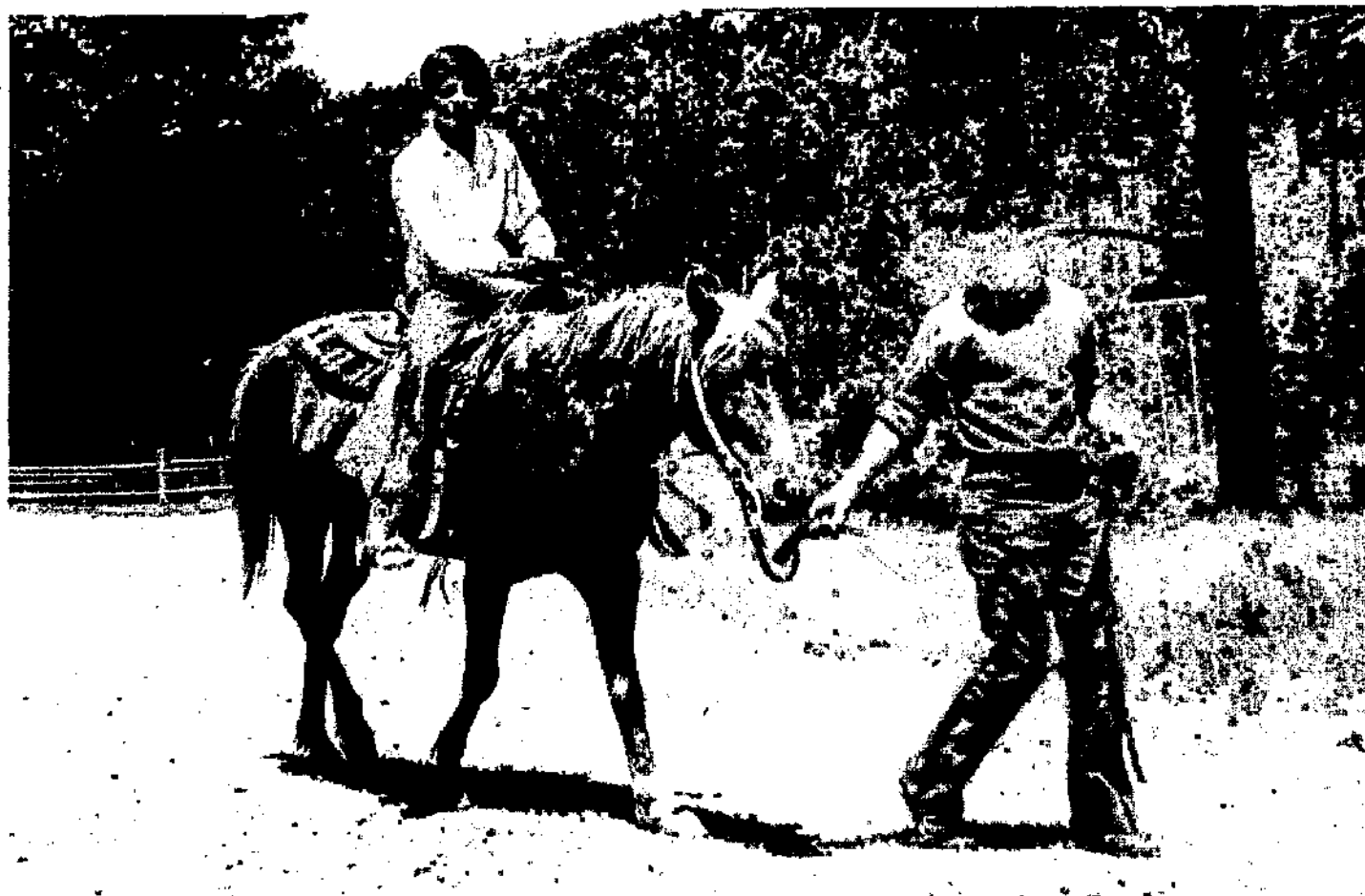
The Mexico Multiple Mission spent most of their mornings studying English and the Bible. "Most of these kids led horrible lives before they came to the 3-M home for children, but most of them have a lot of faith in God," Logsdon said.

All meals are prepared by sponsors but food is provided by the camp. "If a kid comes here with a nickel in his pocket, he'll probably leave with a nickel still in his pocket," Vester said, "and he'll have a great time while he's here."



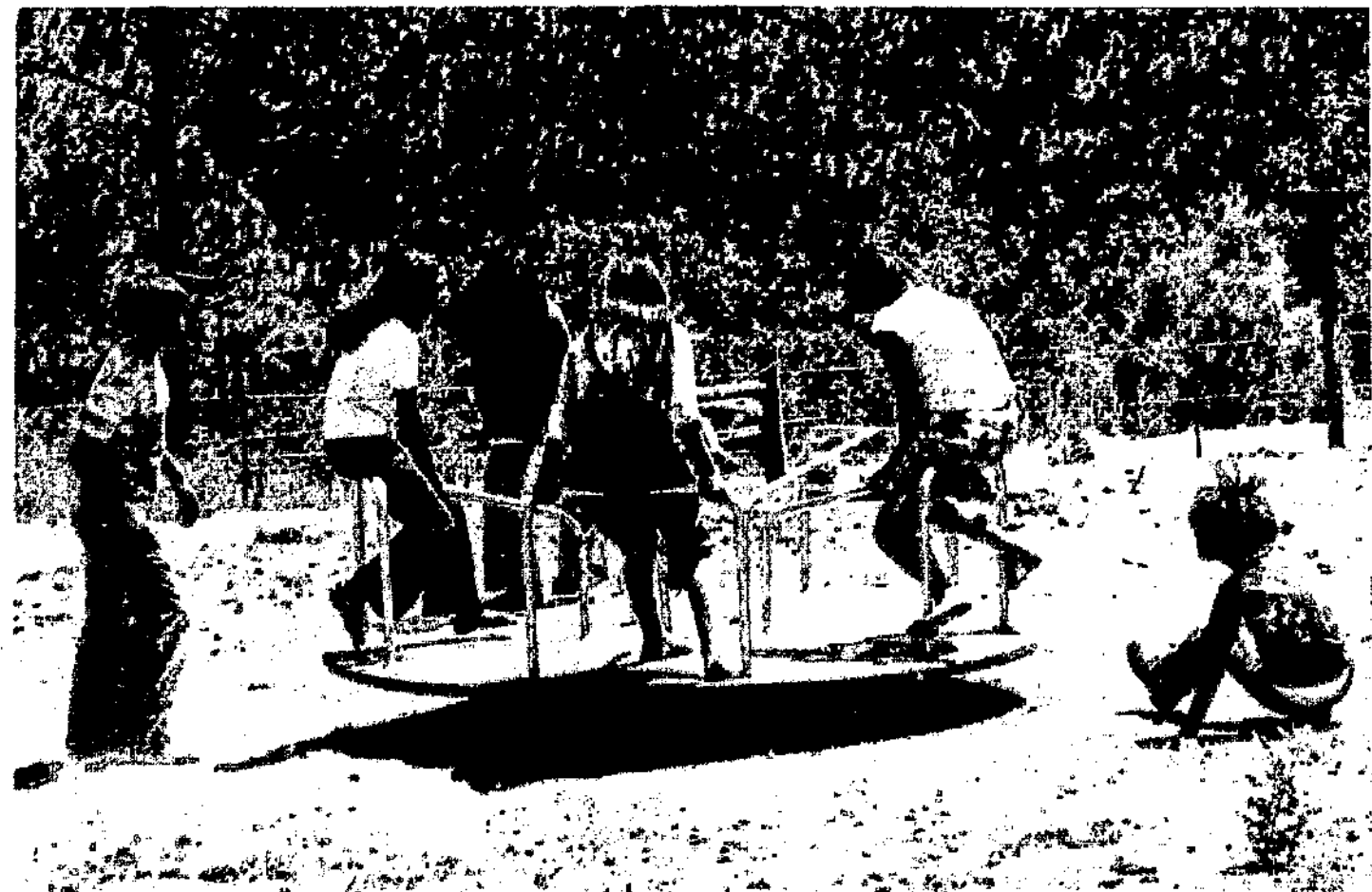

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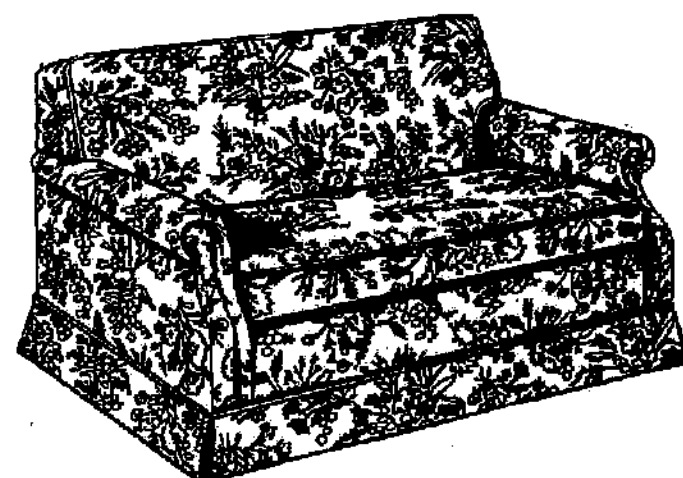
