NEW LINE WOULD SERVE GROUPS OF TOURISTS

Bus service hearing held

The New Mexico state Corporations Commission held a public session in Ruidoso Thursday to hear witnesses testify in behalf of Ponderosa Lines, Inc. The company is seeking a certificate of public convenience and necessity to operate a bus service within a fifteen mile radius of Ruidoso.

The service, which is currently operating under a temporary permit, transports passengers to Sierra Blanca Ski Area and Ruidoso Downs Racetrack.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe had protested the application, because with the original wording of the documents, the service could conceivably have developed into competition with the already certified tribal bus service.

The tribe owns two coaches which serve guests at the Inn of the Mountain Gods.

Presiding at the hearing were commission chairman Charles Rudolph and Eddie D. Abeyta. Abeyta explained that ski area service was to be an exception to the 15-mile limit.

Shortly after the opening of the hearing, Jack Detloff, manager of the Inn, tribal attorney Kim J. Gottschalk and Mel O'Reilly, the attorney representing Ponderosa Lines, took part in a brief conference to amend the wording of the application, to clarify that it was not the intention of Ponderosa Lines to compete with the tribal system.

In the agreed upon version, entered as part of the application, the incorporators ask for certification for "a bus service transporting passengers within a 15 mile radius of Ruidoso, New Mexico, over irregular routes under non-scheduled service, provided however, that no passenger would be allowed to originate a trip to Sierra Blanca Ski Area or Ruidoso Downs Racetrack from any point on the Mescalero Apache Tribe Reservation."

Following the amendment of the application, Gottschalk withdrew the protest, and the commission then heard from witnesses who favored continuance of the service.

Ponderosa Lines manager Bud Nickles spoke first, describing the company's equipment, three renovated school buses, complete with safety devices, such as chains.

He said the demand for the service had been "well over the expectations" of the incorporators, serving primarily schools,

churches, and groups referred by travel and tour agencies.

Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, confirmed the need for the service, saying the Chamber received "numerous requests weekly from out-of-town guests," seeking transportation to the ski area.

He said the service was "most desirable" one that "the community has to provide," and that tourism would increase as a result.

Some discussion centered around whether Ponderosa Lines would be entering into competition with a certified transportation service operated by Richard Cull.

However, Cull also testified at the hearings, saying the new line would fill "a

need I can't presently handle." He explained that his certification limited him to a "large van size" (15 passenger) vehicle, and that he and Nickles had agreed that Ponderosa would handle only groups of 15 or more, effectively eliminating any competition.

Louie Maldonado of El Paso, Texas, one of the incorporators, testified to the mechanical fitness of the buses, saying each had been checked "from one end to the other" and all "are in perfect working condition." Maldonado, who will be in charge of major maintenance, added the buses will be serviced approximately once a month.

The commission also heard from Morgan Clough, who voiced his support of the application in his capacity as a

Ruidoso ski-shop owner and former ski instructor.

He stressed that "skiing makes a major contribution to the economy," and thus, "the more skiers, the better the economy." He added that if groups were assured of the transportation service, business would be better.

James O'Leary, president of the corporation, made a final plea for certification, saying the business had the support of the community, and that plans for expansion of the service would be considered as the need arose.

The application will now be reviewed by the commission, which also includes Columbus Ferguson and John Elliot. Abeyta said a decision would probably be reached within six weeks.

Flood damage briefing set for irrigators

A briefing by the Federal Disaster Assistance Administration for irrigation system representatives will be conducted at 10 a.m. Tuesday in the Hondo School in Ruidoso.

Al Lobato, representing the State of New Mexico, said the briefing, to be presented by both state and federal representatives, would concern

the repair of irrigation systems in Lincoln county damaged by the December 19-22 floods.

"The briefing will be very important to irrigation system representatives," Lobato said. "Through this briefing they will obtain information concerning the full benefits of President Carter's flood disaster proclamation for Lincoln county."

Chamber makes slide offer to photographers

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce has announced preliminary plans for development of an "image bank" of slides for use in promotion.

The slides will be available for use by state agencies or for any promotion project on Ruidoso, Dave Wilson, Chamber board president said Friday.

"We'll have a collection of original slides and only give away the duplicates so we can maintain and not deplete the bank."

Initially the Chamber will only purchase filing materials and slides at \$1 each through funds donated by various banking institutions.

Later they will consider purchase of production equipment.

Slides judged as fitting set criteria by a panel will be purchased and with no limits to the number from any individual "as long as our resources hold out and they are judged as useful," Wilson said.

Set as firm criteria were: 35 mm full frame transparencies or slides.

Set in 2-inch X2-inch mounts. Horizontal shots, no verticals will be accepted.

Sharp focus, proper exposure and in good physical condition.

"The slides become the property of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce and if used, there will be no further compensation or credit to the photographer," Wilson said.

The Chamber also set some preferences as:

Use of Ektracrom film.

Shots of people in activities.

Strong Ruidoso identification.

Strong or attractive composition elements.

Conform with recommended subject categories which include scenics within 25

miles radius of Ruidoso in all seasons, outdoor activities such as hunting, fishing, tennis or golf, Ruidoso's night life, racetrack, tribal activities, and special events such as Ascencade parade or the Arts and Crafts fair.

"Particularly now, we're interested in skiing pictures showing activity, new snow or powder taken in bright sunlight at both areas or night at Ruidoso Ski Area," Wilson said.

Lists of the criteria and preferences are available at the Chamber or at locations in Ruidoso selling film or processing.

First deadline is March 31 and later deadlines will be set for other seasons.

Each person entering must also include a stamped, self-addressed envelope so slides not chosen can be returned and a check for slides selected may be sent.

School board meets Tuesday


The Ruidoso Board of Education will hold their February meeting at 7 p.m., Tuesday in the administrative offices.

Motor vehicle registration deadline nears

The Motor Vehicle Division of the New Mexico Transportation Department reminds motorists that the deadline for vehicle registration is close at hand. Motorists registering by mail must enclose a check for the proper fees and return all copies of the registration statement postmarked no later than February 15. After that time, the Motor Vehicle Division will not have sufficient time to process registration applications to return a sticker and meet the March 2 deadline when all vehicles are required to display a 1979 validation sticker on their license plate. If a motorist wants to register a vehicle in person at a local field office, the Motor Vehicle Division advises that applicants register there promptly in order to avoid the long lines which form as the March deadline approaches. After March 2, vehicles driven on New Mexico highways which are not displaying 1979 validation stickers are subject to an added registration fee of ten percent and a charge of one dollar (\$1.00) for each day that the vehicle has been unlawfully operated or transported.



"I was really pleased," Ames said. "I think we did real well. I'm impressed with the way we're doing."

The way the Warriors are doing is holding their own. In the three matches this weekend, Ruidoso won 11 and lost 13. Ruidoso's worst showing came Friday against Cobra. Ruidoso won only three matches while losing five. They also forfeited four other matches. The result was a 54-13 Cobra win. "It was pretty neat," Ames said. "Ronald was pretty funny about the whole thing."

There is nothing funny about the way the Warriors are performing on the mat. Ames thinks as many as five wrestlers have a good shot at winning district, especially Atkinson.

"There isn't a kid in district who has touched him," Ames said.

There haven't been many kids anywhere

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

SANTA FE — Some loose notes and jottings, found among the lint in the corner of an old sportcoat pocket.

DIGEST: If forced to it, we could summarize "Hamlet" in a few short words. Just see how Bob Huber's Capitol Observer, which covers all Statehouse activity, boiled down this human drama into spark phrases for its edition of February 5. "Senator Emilio Naranjo, D-Rio Arriba, resigned; replacement, Abedon Lopez, Jr., sworn in."

QUERY: As of the 21st calendar day of this 80-day session of the Legislature, only 279 bills had been introduced in the House and 223 in the Senate. That's a total of 502 bills — just to save you the trouble of adding. Where are the others? CAMPAIGN PROMISES

Now he tells us straight out he will veto such legislation.

Now Bruce didn't exactly lie about Right to Work during the campaign last fall—he just didn't tell us the truth and regardless of how the issue is settled, Bruce comes out with clean boots.

If the bill passes the legislature and winds up on his desk, he vetoes it and labor unions love him. If it goes to a vote of the people via a constitutional amendment and is approved, he tells the unions it was out of his hands.

A LOOK AT FARMING

ONE OF THE THINGS the colonists went to war with King George over was "The right peaceably to assemble for a redress of grievances." They made sure this right was spelled out in the first amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

Assembling is one thing; keeping it peaceable is another. The American Agriculture Movement's tractocade in Washington has taken several ugly turns. It doesn't make a whole lot of difference who starts the fight, the farmers or the cops, the image of agriculture is hurt by such episodes.

Farmers from this area, where production costs are so high, probably are in the worst cost-price bind of any producers in the nation. But we wonder if militant protest is the solution to their problem. To judge from the reaction that the nation is having from the Washington demonstrations, it isn't.

Ironically, what AAM spokesman most clamor for is further government intervention in the industry. That is more of the hair of the dog that bit them.

Commodity markets are still dominated by government programs which prevent realistic adjustments to conditions of supply and demand.

Taking the cure to rid themselves of government dependence is hard medicine for the American farmer. However, the only long-term alternative is virtual servitude to his federal master. The presence of the demonstrating farmers in Washington is acknowledgement that they know where the power center is.

At the same time that farmers are demonstrating for high government supported commodity prices, another major part of American agriculture is strangely silent. The cattleman is seeing the price of some live cattle exceed \$1.00 a pound.

The cattleman suffered through a difficult cycle and is now seeing better days. He has a minimum of government intervention in his affairs.

This lesson in the interrelationship of economics and politics is apparently lost on the angry farmers. We sympathize with their plight, but we question their solution. —Hop Graham, Lovington Daily Leader.

HUMOR

What this country needs amid cold, unemployment and deficits is more humor. One sees precious little of it on commercial television.

Where are replacements for the venerable "Three Stooges"? Where are the replacements for Charlie Chaplin, Ben Blue, Will Rogers, W.C. Fields, Laurel and Hardy, the Marx Brothers, etc?

Today's New York style of humor, unfortunately adopted by television, is loud-mouth yelling, brass and aggressiveness. In other words, common or cheap behavior poses as humor. Give us back slapstick, corn and subtle humor, some slowly developing, delicate absurdities. —Santa Rosa News
