

# School aiding national DECA competitors

"A simple phone call to any board member or Pat Valliant would have cleared this matter up any day of the last week," school board president Dave Parks said at the regular school board meeting Tuesday night.

Parks was referring to the amount of money the board agreed to fund the Distributive Education Club of America (DECA) to attend the national convention in Houston.

According to Parks, "Last year we were very impressed and proud of the DECA students for the achievements they had at the state convention. It was brought to our attention by C. L. Wright (board member) that we should help with expenses for DECA concerning future trips."

"It was not voted on because it was the general consensus that we would put money in next year's budget so any

children who went on to state or national levels, we would help them any way we could.

"At the time of the budget hearing, the situation had not yet been brought up. There seems to be a misconception in town that we committed ourselves at that time to help DECA. We did allocate \$1,772 to pay for sponsors.

"My recommendation tonight is that whatever money DECA is short, as of tonight, the school board will find money to transfer to help finish out their budget," Parks said.

Eddie Parker, DECA sponsor, told The News Wednesday morning that \$1,000 was still needed to complete the \$3,320 budget to take 18 people to the national convention.

In a conversation with The News, Parks said, "Whatever money they're short, we'll give to them."

Parks also said that \$5,000 has been

earmarked in the 1979-80 budget for such trips and for elementary school field trips. He said, "It has been in the mill for a long time and we've been working on it for a long time."

Parks said that although the board can't budget for every situation, they "want to help the kids in every way possible. I want to make it abundantly clear that this has been the board's attempt and Pat's attempt for a long time."

The 1979-80 budget was reviewed by Superintendent Valliant and board members gave tentative approval, with final approval to come following the public budget hearing Monday afternoon. Valliant said he would take the budget to Santa Fe and register it with the state and expect the state's approval by Friday.

The budget will be on public display at the school district administration office until the budget hearing Monday. The hearing is set for 2 p. m., at the high school

library. Board members urge all parents, teachers, students and other taxpayers to attend the hearing. "This is a very important item and we encourage people to attend this hearing," Parks said.

Following an executive session lasting nearly an hour, board members approved the re-hiring of all personnel with the exception of high school art teacher Kim Tezak. Certified non-operational and non-certified non-operational personnel were approved subject to the receipt of federal and state money for Title I and II programs.

Frank Cannella, middle school science teacher, spoke to the board as a representative of the Salary Policy Committee. Cannella said the committee knew the board was bound by state and federal governments to hold wage increases to seven percent, but added that it only meant a four percent raise for personnel because the rest is taken out for

and other withholding items.

Because of the controls, teachers will not move vertically on the salary schedule, which means they will not be awarded raises for additional years of teaching. Parks said that if controls were not in effect the district could probably have raised salaries by 15 percent. He said the board hoped to make up for the shortcomings next year.

The board promised the committee that when controls are lifted, teachers would move vertically on the salary schedule according to the number of years they have taught.

In other business the board:

- Approved the Title I budget of \$50,168, which is federal funds for reading programs;
- Decided to table awarding of bids for instructional supplies, athletic supplies, a 16 mm camera and track equipment until a special meeting Monday. The meeting

will follow the budget hearing and bids will be awarded then, so board members can check on prices again;

- Called for bids on individual student picture packets for the 1979-80 school year and a seal coat on black tops on all school grounds;

- Approved the hiring of Beth Absher and Nell Jaramillo as substitute bus drivers;

- Decided to dismiss school at noon Good Friday;

- Heard a report from Nob Hill Principal Don Weems that parent-teacher conference at the two elementary schools and the middle school yielded 90 percent participation from parents;

- Accepted the resignation of Bruce Hancock, effective June 2. Hancock is the high school social studies teacher and gave financial problems as his reason for resigning;

- Tentatively approved the 1979-80 school calendar.

## Dr. Willard heads state veterinarians

Dr. F. Lynn Willard of Ruidoso took office last week for a one year term as president of the 200 member New Mexico Veterinary Medical Association at the annual convention in Santa Fe.



Upon his election, Dr. Willard directed his attention to the problems facing the profession in New Mexico. The main problems, he said, dealt with inadequate animal control in all state communities and the control of brucellosis and scabies in the cattle industry.

At the convention, which was attended by over 100 veterinarians from New Mexico and surrounding states, speakers presented education seminars on canine nutrition, kidney failure in dogs and cats and musculoskeletal problems in horses.

Several New Mexico veterinarians provided topics of their special interests. Allison Walstad, local registered veterinary technician, presented a topic entitled "The Use of a Veterinary Technician in a Mixed Practice."

Dr. Vernon Tharp, president of the American Veterinary Medical Association, was the key note speaker at a Monday luncheon of the convention.

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## TRUSTEES LAUNCH PINECLIFF PROJECTS

# Assessment district okayed

The Ruidoso trustees Tuesday authorized preparation of a resolution establishing a special assessment district in Pinecliff subdivision permitting residents to improve their property by adding curb, gutter, paving, water and sewer service.

Darrel Fowler, of Stern Brothers, Albuquerque, Ruidoso's fiscal agent, advised the trustees that bonding company attorneys are examining the plans for the improvements. "Once the project is approved by these attorneys," Fowler said, "notices of public hearings for Pinecliff residents will be published."

Total maximum benefits to subdivision residents has been pegged at \$1,700,000, Fowler said, "and the cost of the improvements cannot exceed this figure and possibly will be less."

Fowler estimated the maximum benefits to property owners would average \$4,000 per lot in Pinecliff subdivision.

"Pinecliff's improvement plant has been submitted to all agencies involved for approval," Fred Burns of Boyle Engineering said to the trustees, "prior to setting the dates for public hearings."

Upon the recommendation of mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., the trustees unanimously set the protest percentage at 51 percent as a guide line for the village to determine the extent of the services to be provided.

Two protest meetings will be conducted by the trustees, at dates to be announced, to make deletions within the district. Following these meetings, the project can go to bids. Once the bids have established the actual cost of the improvements a final hearing will be held.

The trustees set the policy that entire streets within the subdivision must be improved, or deleted from the project.

"Deletion," Davis said, "would not raise the per front foot cost of the improvements to property owners desiring them."

THE TRUSTEES, on recommendation by Burns, awarded the contract for drilling wells and test pumping them, to Huey Drilling Company, Capitan, in the amount of \$82,524.50.

"We deem the bid of Chaparral Drilling Company, Ruidoso Downs," Burns said, "as unresponsive, due to waivers

requested."

The Chaparral bid of \$67,540, Burns said, included the request for waivers on bonding requirements, state wage rates and testing the alignment of the well.

Huey's waiver requests concerned eliminating the electric logging of the well and eliminating the cost of bonding.

"The Huey figure for logging was bid at \$13,000," Burns said, "and the saving on not bonding would be about two percent of the bid price."

AT THE CONCLUSION of the meeting Ray Farnell, representing Chaparral, said to the trustees, "We'll protest the awarding of this contract."

In other business, the trustees:

- Awarded the contract for a new hot mix plant, for street repair and construction, to N. C. Ribble Company, Albuquerque, in the amount of \$64,500. The price of the plant, with the asphalt product to meet state specifications, includes installation and putting the plant into operation. Conley-Lott-Nichols, Albuquerque, bid \$106,358 for a used plant.

- Accepted the bid of Ebling Manufacturing (EMCO) of Plainview,

Texas, for 200 1 1/2 yard garbage containers at \$29,400 and 100 three yard containers at \$20,700. Delivery of the new units was to begin Wednesday.

- Approved the bid of Service Contractors, Ruidoso, in the amount of \$78,469.51 for improvements, and flood damage repairs, at Twin Rivers Park.

- Accepted the bid of Jim Woodbridge, in the amount of \$8,600, to remove fallen trees from the Rio Ruidoso. This action is a result of the December flood.

- Were advised by Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, that the new animal control ordinance, in final draft form, would be presented to the trustees at the April 24 meeting.

- Were advised by village attorney Ron Harris that a new ordinance governing signing in the village is being prepared and that zoning changes will be incorporated in the ordinance.

- Were advised by village manager Jim Hine that "pollution of the Rio Ruidoso has been reduced as the new sewer line in-

## Ruidoso Downs facing police and budget trouble

The Ruidoso Downs Trustees, in making budgetary considerations for the coming fiscal year, are facing difficult decisions concerning salaries and the number of personnel in the village's police department.

The force recently lost one officer and a letter of resignation from Chief Lynn Martin was read at the Monday night meeting. His resignation will take effect May 1, or at such time as a qualified replacement is found.

Some of the problems discussed included the fact that the salaries paid Downs officers are substantially less than those paid in nearby communities, making it difficult for the village to recruit qualified personnel.

Village clerk Virginia Spall reported that in preparing the budget, no funds had been allotted for increased salaries and no allowance had been made for inflation. She said the budget was not finalized and that a change would have to be made to allow for inflation, which could run as high as 15 percent, since "There's no way we can live

with what I've proposed."

The trustees decided the only way they could increase the salaries would be to cut the force to three, which would mean longer hours for the officers. Martin and officer Ralph Romero advised the trustees that they would prefer to keep the force size at four rather than work the additional hours.

"They need the time off to moonlight," Martin said. The trustees also reviewed

# County considering \$1.7 million budget

Lincoln County Commissioners, meeting Tuesday in Carrizozo, made a preliminary review of the county budget for the 1979-80 fiscal year. The rough draft budget, prepared by county manager Les Olson, calls for expenditures of \$1,726,000. (The county budget for fiscal 1978-1979 was \$1,841,783.)

Included in that amount is \$401,912 for the county road fund, a total of \$24,651 for rural fire departments and \$23,172 allocated to the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, to be used in the construction of a hospital.

The budget will be further reviewed by the commissioners during the May 1 and May 22 meetings, with final budget document approval and submission scheduled for June 12.

The separate budgets for the various departments, including Fort Stanton, Bonto, Hondo, Lincoln and Negal, were

approved by the commissioners for submission to the state fire marshal.

The commission voted to send a letter of recommendation to the New Mexico State University (NMSU) administration for Barry Hurd, an applicant for the recently vacated county agent position.

Jack Wallace of the NMSU Extension Department introduced Hurd to the commissioners, who had already received an application and resume from the candidate. Wallace said Hurd had five years experience with the extension department as an agent and had received bachelor's and master's degrees in agricultural extension education.

He said he was presenting Hurd as "the applicant we feel would be the best job."

Wallace added that final selection of an agent would be made by NMSU officials.

The commission also heard a report from Mary Rich on the past accomplishments and future plans of the New Mexico Health Systems Agency

(HSA) and the HSA Subarea Council.

Rich and Sherry Good advised the commissioners that plans were being made for dental clinic service in Corona, and, at a later date in the Hondo Valley.

Teenage alcoholism, sex education, rising health care costs, home nursing and care for the elderly were cited by Rich as health concerns which will be under study.

The commissioners were requested to begin consideration of possible nominees for a new member of the Subarea Council, preferably a Hondo valley resident. Rich also offered the council's service in reviewing health care related budget requests for the coming fiscal year, and the commission voted to accept the offer.

The current Carrizozo beautification project was also discussed by Rich. The plans include placement of half-barrel planters in front of businesses, planting of flowers and shrubs throughout the town and conversion of vacant lots to "garden spots" as part of the long-range plans.

She submitted a contract for consideration by the trustees asking for the lease of several lots adjacent to the old hospital to the TAERA Foundation, a non-profit organization. Those lots would also be planted as part of the project. The contract was accepted pending study by attorney Daniel Bryant.

In other business, the commission:

- Accepted a bid of \$18,995 from Summer's Ambulance and Coach Sales for a new ambulance.
- Heard a report from George Shoemaker, member of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission, on the scheduled on-site inspection of possible airport locations by David King, director of Finance and Administration and other state officials.
- Approved an appropriation of \$4,000 for repairs and modification of the Zia School, which would enable students to live on the grounds.
- Commended county manager Les Olson for his achievements in that

position. Olson will take over duties as Eddy County manager April 18.

- Made plans for regular visits to the courthouse to oversee the county government after Olson vacates the office.
- Approved payment of two prior year bills to Tularosa Cable TV and Addressograph-Multigraph. A prior year bill from Tom Lamay was not approved for payment.
- Appointed commissioner John Allen Hightower to the Carrizozo Health Center Advisory Board.
- Heard a request from Daniel Bryant for additional funding for increased legal services to the county.
- Approved a salary increase for a single road crew employee, to bring it to the amount being allotted a CETA-paid worker in the same job.
- Advised Mr. and Mrs. L.J. Lalli to present a request for a change in a subdivision to the county Planning and Zoning Commission.

# Ten law changes affect municipalities

At the initial meeting of the District 6 Municipal League Tuesday at the Inn of the Mountain Gods, officers were elected and Bill Fulginiti, Executive Director of the State Municipal League, was present to review major changes in the state laws which will affect municipal lawmakers.

Fulginiti said that of 28 priority items the municipal league presented for legislation, 23 passed both houses and all but a few were signed by Governor Bruce King.

"This is a tremendous amount to have go through both houses," Fulginiti said.

Fulginiti explained all the bills which passed and cited those which will have the most impact:

- The Small Cities Assistance Act will provide permanent ongoing general operating budget assistance to small municipalities. The bill becomes effective July 1 and the appropriation will come from the compensating tax fund.
- The stipulations on the act are that only municipalities under 10,000 population would be eligible, the maximum assistance would be \$3,000 to any one municipality and the amount of assistance could not exceed more than five percent of actual general fund expenditures for the previous year. The municipality must kick in funds also.
- This act was cited by Fulginiti as being one of the most beneficial to municipalities because it is permanent and it will help rural communities. Although Ruidoso was not included in this year's eligibility list, Ruidoso Downs was deemed eligible to receive \$4,583. Other communities in Lincoln County which are eligible are Capitan, \$3,348, Carrizozo, \$3,586 and Cornudas, \$333.
- Fulginiti said that there are a lot of restrictions on the bill, but it is flexible in that different communities can become eligible from year-to-year depending on the population changes and other factors.

- An Open Meetings Act Amendment permits closed meetings for discussion of issuance, suspension, renewal or revocation of a license, personnel matters affecting an individual employee, strategy sessions prior to collective bargaining, discussion of single source purchases exceeding \$2,500, discussions of pending or threatened litigation and discussion of purchase of real property or water rights.
- Any meeting, whether open or closed, must still be publicized and notice must be posted. No final action can be taken in a closed session and draft minutes are required to be available within ten working days.
- Fulginiti made it clear that no action can be taken in a closed session.
- Amendments to the Public Purchase Act increases the monetary limitation before requiring sealed bids. Previously, sealed bids were required for jobs of more than \$1,750, but now bids are not required unless the job exceeds \$3,500.
- Amendments to the Public Works Minimum Wage Act exempts municipalities from making wage determinations unless the project expenses exceed \$20,000. According to Fulginiti, this bill was introduced because wages differ in different parts of the state for various jobs. This law will allow municipalities to pay local wage rates for small jobs.
- The Uniform State Rule Making procedure established a regular publication of rules and regulations passed by the legislature. Copies of the State Register will be made available to everyone. Prior to this year, all laws were filed in Santa Fe and to read them, a person had to go to the file.
- Amendments to the Tort Claims Act covered a series of items in regard to tort claims by an employee and the methods of insurance coverage municipalities can obtain.
- The Municipal Mortgage Finance Act, sponsored by Representative Frank Horan

authorizes municipalities to provide financing for housing for persons of low and moderate income. It also authorizes municipalities to issue tax-exempt bonds and use the proceeds to purchase mortgages on single family residences.

Fulginiti said this has already been done in Albuquerque and Clovis and has worked. Again, this law has a lot of restrictions, but he felt it was an important step.

8. A "Christmas Tree" bill, combining ten separate bills which would accomplish a number of things, was passed to yield a total of \$11.4 million to municipalities to use in various ways. This bill reverts more of the gasoline tax to municipalities in the future, provides an additional \$2 million for cooperative agreements with the State Highway Department, appropriates \$3 million to be used for sewer connections to indigent households, community assistance grants and provides money for various studies to be conducted.

9. An Alcoholic Beverage License Approval will give municipalities the burden of approving or disapproving liquor licenses. This includes a public hearing which can be presided over by an appointed officer and the state will give final approval. Prior to this law, the state approved or disapproved all liquor licenses.

10. A surplus of state funds will return \$40 per dependent to every taxpayer and \$30 to every person over 65.

Following discussion of legislation, officers for this year were elected. District Director is Richard Guilez of Tularosa, who will attend several meetings during the year as a representative of the district. Alternate District Director is George White of Ruidoso, who will fill in when Guilez cannot attend. Secretary is Frank Potter of Ruidoso, who will assist Guilez in arranging district meetings in the coming months.

Guilez is mayor of Tularosa, White is a Ruidoso village trustee and Potter is the Assistant Village Manager for Ruidoso.

# Turkey hunters warned of forest fire danger

The spring gobbler turkey hunting season opens Saturday and according to Charley Mook, Fire Prevention Officer at Smokey Bear Ranger District, "no fire or smoking restrictions will be imposed. The season closes April 27."

However, Mook said that extra care should be taken because the wind and little moisture have caused the ground fuels to become dry in recent weeks.

Mook cited several measures which should be observed by persons hunting in the forest. When a fire at a picnic or

campsite is used, extra care should be taken to insure the fire is out completely. The same is true for warming fires.

"People may assume a fire is out and the coals are cooled," Mook said. "However, because of the dry winds, the coals may begin to smolder again and could cause a fire."

When building a fire, clear an area to mineral soil at least 10 feet in circumference and build the fire in the center of the circle, Mook said.

"If possible, use a Coleman or propane stove to avoid fire danger," Mook said.

"When smoking, stop and clear a small area to smoke and always put out the fire completely before moving on."

Mook said that licenses must be purchased in order to hunt turkeys, and are available at any store where hunting licenses are sold. The licenses are issued by the New Mexico Game and Fish Department and cost \$5.25 for residents and \$5 for non-residents.

There is no deadline for purchasing licenses. More information can be obtained by calling the Game and Fish Department at 227-2338.





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

## Linksters practicing hard to improve

The Ruidoso High School golf team hasn't been tearing the links apart in recent weeks, so they did what all golfers do when things aren't going well. They practiced.  
Last weekend, the Warriors could be found hitting shot after shot off the practice tee at Cree Meadows Country Club instead of playing in the scheduled tournament at Lovington. Under the tutelage of coach Leroy Gooch, the seven golfers that compose the team were working on straightening out their hooks and slices.  
Besides needing the practice, Gooch said, the trip to Lovington would have been an all-day affair. The players decided they didn't want to make the trip. They needed practice more than tournament play.  
The golf team consists of Paul Kirk-

wood, Randy Wynn, Todd Peract, Kyle Kannady, Don Dale, Mike Dale and Tim Riley, who came out for the team less than two weeks ago. Helping Gooch coach the Warriors is Bob Dunn, who devotes his spare time and knowledge of the game to the students.  
Ruidoso has competed in three tournaments thus far this season. Their highest finish was a fourth place at Jal three weeks ago. Ruidoso totaled a 393 compared to Jal's winning 317. At Deming, the Warriors knocked a few shots off their total but finished way out of the money with a 386, 73 strokes behind the winner, Las Cruces Mayfield. Ruidoso also competed in a tournament in Roswell but left before the results were announced.  
Although the golfers haven't shown the consistency needed for tournament play,

Gooch said Kirkwood is currently number one on the team. That doesn't mean Gooch thinks Kirkwood is beyond improvement.  
"He's been playing since seventh grade," Gooch said, "but he has some bad habits. I've found that the longer a player plays with bad habits, the harder it is to break him of them."  
Bad habits aren't the only thing standing in Ruidoso's way of shooting some good golf. Inexperience is a factor too. Gooch said the kids are used to coming out and playing a leisure round of golf. But when it comes to tournament play, their inexperience surfaces. The only way to improve on that is to play a lot of golf.  
Gooch will get his wish April 27 and 28. The Warriors will host the Ruidoso Golf Meet. It is a two day, 54 hole event. Play will start Friday at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. Another 18 holes will be played later in the day at Cree Meadows. The final 18 holes will be played Saturday at Alto.  
Before the Warriors host that tournament, however, they will play at Fortales tomorrow. Gooch hopes to see the practice pay off there.

# Balance carries girls to win; boy thinclads capture second

The Ruidoso girls' track team rode a team effort to win first place in the Lincoln County Relays Wednesday at Carrizozo. The boys, unable to compete in the speed events with eventual winner Capitán, finished 13 points behind in second place.  
Kristi Perryman was the dominant force for the girls, scoring a total of 32 points in five events, with the rest of the team combining to garner 88 overall points and a nine point margin over Carrizozo.  
"Everybody pitched in," coach Sergio Castanon said.  
But it was the senior who got the ball rolling. Perryman won the 200 yard dash, the 100 yard dash in 12.2, the 110 yard hurdles in 17.9 and the 80 yard hurdles in 12.2. She finished second in the long jump.  
"She scored the most points in the track meet," Castanon said.  
Ruidoso made the most out of the high

jump. Pam Stone and Connie Howard finished fourth and fifth, respectively, to add to the Warrior total.  
The Warriors took third place in the 440 yard relays with a time of 67.57. Running for Ruidoso were Cyd Wright, Kelly Millholland, Stone and Karen Boose. The girls took another third place in the 880 yard relays with a time of 2:08. That team was Wright, Millholland, Debbie Jo Almager and Stone. The 880 yard medley relay found the Warriors in third place again. Running in that event were Wright, Millholland, Stone and Jenny Delhotal. The Warriors picked up a fifth in the mile relay. Running that event were Howard, Patricia Evans, Celesta Cise and Almager.  
In the 80 yard hurdles won by Perryman, Almager and Evans ran a close third and fourth, respectively. Almager's time was

14.1 while Evans' was 14.2. Ruidoso also had three girls place in the 80 yard hurdles. Along with Perryman, Cyd Wright ran a 19.9 which was good for third place and Jenny Delhotal ran a fifth place time of 20.4.  
In the mile run, Ruta Bob ran a 6:57, which was good for third place. Ruidoso placed three girls in the discus: Lisa Delhotal, Tammy McCulley and Margaret Walsh were second, third and fourth, respectively. Walsh topped Ruidoso performers in the shot put, gaining a third place finish. Ellen Blizell took a fourth. In the high jump, Connie Howard took a second place finish.  
In the boys' meet, Ruidoso's failure in the speed events, the field events and a headache, kept the Warriors from possibly pulling the meet out.  
Capitán won the meet with 88 points; Ruidoso was second with 84; Carrizozo was third with 82 followed by Corona with 48 and Hondo with 18.  
"I was disappointed," Stierwalt said. "They've got a lot of speed. I knew they'd do good in the 100 and 200. We just couldn't stay with them. We couldn't get any points in the field events. I was disappointed with that."  
Stan Cape got the ball rolling for Ruidoso by winning the 120 yard hurdles in 17.7. Cape also took a second in the 440 yard dash with a 56.9 and a fourth in the 220 yard dash with a 26.3.  
In the 180 yard hurdles, John Cabot came in second with a 24.2. Pat Matthews ran third in 24.3 with Scott Neal in fourth at 24.6. Stierwalt was pleased but he thought Cabot would win. A mixup in the heating arrangements may have cost Cabot the win.  
"He was way out in front when he ran so he really wasn't pushed," Stierwalt explained. "They heated it up wrong. If they had heated the two together, Cabot might have won."  
Ricky Dennis took third place in the 880 yard run. Joe Almager, running his slowest time of the season in the mile, won that event in 5:14. Jovian Smith won the two mile in 11:45 with Craig Sullivan taking third. Marlon Palmer took fifth with a 12:32, which pleased Stierwalt.  
The Warriors did well in the relays. In the mile medley, Ruidoso came from behind to win the event in 4:15. Joe Almager ran the anchor, which brought Ruidoso from ten yards behind to 20 in front.  
The mile relay team of Cabot, Cape, Borde Williams and Mark Dutton took a first place with a time of 3:56. Ruidoso took third and second in the 440 yard and 880 yard relays, respectively.

There will be five events spread out over the two days including a ladies and a juniors event. Trophies and buckles will be awarded to winners of each event by classes.

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

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
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

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission April 4 granted Cree Meadows Country Club a six month extension for the use of a mobile home as their clubhouse.

—Resolved to meet the first Wednesday of each month for one calendar year.

—Listened to and granted a request for aid from Distributive Education Clubs of America's (DECA) representative from Ruidoso High School, Gracie Rose, in establishing a packet for incoming business to study and abide by. Rose said the packet would be entered in DECA competition next year.

—Expressed concern that new business permits were being granted without proper compliance with village ordinances.







The committee operates under the auspices of the Chamber and was formed because of the growth of businesses in Ruidoso.






Regulations are not all bad. But duplication and red tape add unnecessary cost that must be passed along in the price of the home.

Towns and villages all across America have adopted growth control ordinances that mean fewer, more costly homes on already scarce land. Even the state of Montana has such legislation.

This amounts to an anti-housing philosophy in our nation—an attitude that says "build it somewhere else." It often seems to overprotect some qualities of life at the expense of the quality of life that comes with satisfactory housing. 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# Resale housing boomed nationally during 1978

A record 3,905,000 resale housing transactions was recorded in 1978, according to final figures published by the National Association of Realtors.

The record sales volume shattered the previous year's record of 3,572,000 units by 9.3 percent and marked the fourth suc-

cessive record-setting year.

The record sales generated record dollar volume as well: \$216.7 billion in 1978 as compared with \$171.1 billion in 1977 for a whopping 26.7 percent increase.

National Association president Donald L. Hoyde said the market was spurred on by a growing number of young households entering the prime home buying age range of 25 to 35, and by an increasing number of investment-conscious buyers seeking an effective hedge against inflation.

He pointed out that all this happened in spite of rough winter weather which plagued sales in the first quarter of the year; sharply rising mortgage rates which eventually exceeded 10 percent; and a diminishing flow of money into thrift institutions.

"The six-month market certificates introduced at mid-year undoubtedly saved the year for real estate," Hoyde said. "Indeed, the resale market for the last quarter of the year reached a seasonally-adjusted annual sales rate of more than 4 million units."

Regionally, sales volume was highest in the South, where transactions were up 19.2 percent over the previous year's level. Sales gains were more modest in the other three regions: 8.4 percent in the West, 8.1 percent in the Northeast and 2 percent in the North Central region.

The median price of an existing single-family home soared \$5,000 in 1978 to reach \$48,700 by year's end. The 13.5 percent increase was the sharpest rise registered in the 11 years the association has been collecting data on the resale market.

Regionally, prices advanced 7.9 percent in the Northeast to \$47,900; 13.3 percent in the South to \$45,100; 15 percent in the North Central region to \$42,200 and 16.4 percent in the West to \$68,700.

Nationally, prices are almost two and a half times higher than a decade ago, according to the Realtors. The median price of an existing single-family home in 1978 was only \$21,100.

Hoyde noted that most of the increase has taken place over the past five years. "Since 1973 the median price of resale properties has climbed at an average annual rate of 11 percent. During the previous five years, prices rose at an average annual rate of only 7.5 percent," he said.

As home prices have steadily increased, homes priced under \$30,000 have become more rare, Hoyde said. Homes in this category accounted for 72.8 percent of the nationwide market at the beginning of the present decade. By 1978 they comprised just 17.9 percent of all sales activity.


Correspondingly, homes priced at \$50,000 or higher have become more common. Homes in that category accounted for only 6 percent of all sales

activity at the outset of the decade. They now account for nearly half of all transactions.

Three-bedroom homes continued to be the most popular in 1978, according to the Realtors, a trend that has not changed noticeably in the past decade. Just under 56 percent of all existing single-family homes sold during the year had three bedrooms. In 1968, three-bedroom properties comprised 56.5 percent of the market.

Over the past decade, Hoyde said, there has been a modest increase in sales of homes with four or more bedrooms, and a corresponding drop in sales of properties with two or fewer bedrooms.

Sales of existing homes with four or more bedrooms comprised 25.6 percent of the total sold in 1978, up from 22.4 percent in 1968. Over the same time span, the market share for homes with two or fewer bedrooms fell from 21.1 percent to 18.7 percent.

**Real estate market outlook unpredictable**

"These are perilous times for economic forecasters. Recent policy moves by both the Carter administration and the Federal Reserve to dampen inflation have introduced a great deal of uncertainty about the future course of the general economy and the real estate sector." Kenneth J. Kerin, director of economics and research for the National Association of Realtors, said and also noted in his department's annual real estate market outlook that there is no consensus among forecasters. He attributed this to the fact that the future path of the economy will be set primarily by unpredictable political judgments and misjudgments, rather than by market forces.

The Realtors' forecast is one of "cautious optimism," Kerin said. They predict that a mild recession is possible, but available, if federal policy makers don't go overboard tinkering with monetary and fiscal policy—and if the temptation to impose wage and price controls is resisted.

The action the Federal Reserve already has taken in its anti-inflation struggle, along with strong credit demands, will guarantee continued high mortgage interest rates in 1979, according to the market outlook report. Rates will remain above 10 percent and may climb as high as 11 percent.


While mortgage money will be available from most lenders, the report says, the real squeeze will be in the 18 states which have usury limits of 10 percent or below. Unless these limits are raised, consumers will find mortgage credit difficult or impossible to come by.

The salvation of the mortgage credit market will be twofold, the report indicates. The six-month money market certificate, tied to the Treasury Bill rate, has maintained savings and loan deposits at a high level and should continue to do so in 1979, the report says. And strong support will be provided through the Federal National Mortgage Association, the Federal Home Loan Mortgage Association and the Federal Home Loan Bank.

"The mortgage market consumes more than a third of all credit raised by the non-financial sectors of the economy, with residential mortgages taking the lion's share," the outlook report says.

"However, for the first time it will bear only its fair share of the administration's anti-inflation program, rather than being called on to carry a disproportionate part of the burden."

**DALLAS COWBOYS' STAR**, Robert Newhouse, turned up in the winner's circle at Sunland over the weekend. The well known running back for the outstanding Texas team was in El Paso as the main speaker for "Free Enterprise Week" at UTEP. He presented the trophy for the Southwest Matchmaker Stakes Saturday.

**IN STEWARDS' RULINGS:** Trainer Donnie Stewart has been suspended and his case referred to the New Mexico State Racing Commission as a result of a positive drug test on the horse Larkin Royal, winner of a West Texas Derby trial March 31. Stewart is denied privileges of the grounds of New Mexico racetracks and his horses have been ordered transferred to an approved trainer. Larkin Royal may be reinstated only upon a written report from the track veterinarian indicating the gray colt is capable of racing without medication.

**A FULL BROTHER** to Real Wind, the 1976 All-American Futurity winner, made quite a splash in Saturday's second race. The freshman colt, Brown Wind, carried 52-1 odds as he surprised the fans with a 1 1/2 length victory in the quick 350 yard powerburst. His only previous career start produced a third at Lubbock Downs. John Lewis directed the son of G With The Wind who paid mutuels of \$106.20, \$21.60 and \$14.60.

**NURSANICKEL MOVED** into an elite category at Sunland by knocking off his sixth win at the meet in Sunday's final race. The gelding moved to an early lead under the urging of helmsman John Cushing and distanced fellow claimers in the 5 1/2 furlong sprint by plenty of daylight. Only one other horse at the meet has achieved that many victories — Sildin Billy who holds a tally of seven.

**CHRIS O'DELL** looked more like a rodeo rider than a jockey aboard Call Me Kimmie in Friday's sixth race. The four-year-old mare bucked repeatedly after leaving the gate in the 400 yard trip and O'Dell finally bailed off at the midway point. But he was uninjured and returned to action Sunday for a second place finish aboard Rebel Three Chick in the third race.

**SUNLAND'S DAILY MUTUEL** average for the spring season is up to \$261,064, and that's a gain of 11.2 percent over the \$234,780 at this time last year. The gross handle is ahead almost \$1.66 million (after 44 race days). Betting per race is averaging \$22,007, as compared to \$21,004 at this point a year ago.

## Wilderness Wisdom

Dear Wayne — I am fourteen years old and just beginning to hunt alone. There are several large tracts of woods nearby that I would like to explore, but I know the chances of getting lost are pretty good. I have a compass and it seems to be a good one, but I don't really understand how it should be used to find the way out of a woods. Would you please explain? Gary C., Virginia

When you wish to retrace your route it will only be necessary to change direction 180 degrees. If your original bearing was less than 180 degrees, add 180 to obtain the new bearing. If it was more than 180 degrees, subtract 180. For example, if the original bearing was 15 degrees, add 180, and the bearing to retrace the route will be 195 degrees. If, on the other hand, the bearing was 217 degrees, subtract 180 and the new course will be 37 degrees. Practice in a familiar area. Happy trails, and trials.

Dear Gary — I'm sure you are aware that using a compass only after you're lost in a woods is a little late. It might keep you walking in a straight line, but not necessarily in the direction you should be heading. The only way to determine the direction out of a woods is to know what direction you took on the way in.

Before entering a strange woods, take a compass sighting at a distant tree and note the bearing. Walk to the sighted tree and make another sighting on the same bearing. Pick out a feature on that bearing and walk to it. By repeating this procedure you will walk in a straight line. If you wish to change direction, do so only at a prominent landmark that you will remember. Otherwise it will be necessary to count paces between direction changes. And you should sketch a crude drawing of your trail, complete with compass bearings.

Any notion of burning out a woods should first be discussed with a professional forester. A logical beginning is the forestry department of your state. They can determine the feasibility of the project and provide detailed safety information, such as firebreaks and weather conditions. And they will likely be responsible for issuing the permit necessary for burning.

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# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — There is a split between Governor Bruce King and Lieutenant Governor Bob Mondragon, and it grows worse with the passage of time.

What's more, it's not just two personalities clashing. It's rooted in an ethnic difference which has caused problems for our state intermittently from its earliest days.

It's the old Spanish vs. Anglo war that seems always to be somewhere just under the surface in New Mexico, not least of all in the politics of the state's Democratic party.

Lots of people don't like to come right out and say things like that. They think it's crude to allude to such problems, and they think if we all agree to take no notice of them, they will go away.

But, like most problems, this one just hangs on. It will continue to hang on till it's faced and something is done about it.

What got the Governor riled over the last couple of weeks was statements from such groups as LULAC and IMAGE, both organizations for Spanish-speaking Americans, that he hasn't done nearly as much as they had hoped for in the way of naming members of their ethnic group to appointive office.

"Let them run for governor if they don't like the way I'm doing it," the Governor snapped. And he added, singling out his own running mate, "That goes for the Lieutenant Governor too."

So all is not harmony between the two offices of the state's highest ranking officials in Santa Fe.

The Governor's advice is not very practical — and it wasn't meant to be.

After all, we only have one governor at a time, and he's got the job tied down for the next three and a half years.

Besides, he knows very well what many of the most knowledgeable of the Spanish-Americans who registered their complaint also know: There's a fairly evil undercurrent of prejudice in this state, not entirely confined to the East and South, which makes it unlikely that a Hispanic will be elected to the highest office anytime soon. Look at the track record. Bruce King is the twenty-second man to hold that job — and there are exactly three men with Spanish surnames who have shared it with him in the last 67 years.

Telling one of them to run for governor is the equivalent of saying, "Get lost."

The simple fact is that King has the job, and he can appoint almost anyone he wants to almost anything he wants. The largely Spanish-speaking North may be in fact mostly responsible for his being there. They voted for him in numbers which fattened his slim margin of victory.

But unless he plans to run again for statewide office, which isn't likely, he doesn't need them, or anyone else, ever again. He's home free, and there are no pressure-points at which anyone can grab him.

That's frustrating to those who see him doing things they don't like, but it's true. As Roberto Mondragon said one day while musing on the differences between his position and that of the Governor, "I guess what it comes down to is that his enchilada has cheese on it, and mine doesn't."

Sad but true, Bob, sad but true.

Monday's Ruidoso News stated that "the animal control committee Thursday reversed their decision to recommend trapping of wild and stray dogs." This is incorrect. The committee to this date has made no formal recommendations as to possible solutions. We are researching a complex and long existing problem. We need to investigate all aspects so we can present an educated information package to the village trustees.

Many committee members have been opposed to trapping from the start. We spent many weeks devoting our energies to studying the animal ordinances and their possible revisions to include 1) lifting extraneous legal burdens from the animal control officer and 2) providing stiff penalties for people who are not responsible pet owners. For taking this direction the committee was publicly criticized in

articles appearing in the Roswell paper and on the front page of the Ruidoso News on three separate occasions. Each committee member has his own opinion concerning possible solutions. The fact that one vocal member thinks we need harsh measures does not mean the rest of the members concur; nor does the fact that a federal trapper was invited to speak to our group mean that we endorse trapping.

The majority of committee members are responsible and caring individuals who have shown their dedication to the animals and citizens of this village for many years. That any solutions be legal, fair and humane is certainly paramount in our thoughts.

Dear editor:

Your editorial in your April 5, 1978 Ruidoso News showed your concern over the wild dog problem. It also shows that you are not accurately or adequately informed on the subject of steel jaw traps.

First, I do not agree that it would be more humane to gut-shoot a wild dog with a 22 hollow point, than to trap him. If the wild dog could be located to gut-shoot, then shot, he could suffer up to several days before he died. If not badly injured, he could become violent and injure someone. Wild dogs become nearly as smart as their coyote relatives. Finding them to shoot can be very difficult and nearly impossible.

On the other hand, if a reputable trapper traps the dogs, the dogs could suffer very little. If the trap jaws are gapped one half inch when the trap is closed, blood circulation in the dog's leg continues and chance of bone breakage is minimum. When the traps are checked once every twenty-four hours, the dog suffers little from the small amount of pain exerted by the steel jaw trap.

Second, I cannot agree to your feeling it would be unwise to encircle the area with traps due to the alleged possibility of small children getting caught in a trap. A number three trap is not going to catch a child large enough to be roaming the woods unless the child stuck his fingers in the trap. The number three trap is standard size for animals the size of dogs but is small enough that it would not catch or hold an average child's foot. Most number three traps do not have vicious steel teeth in them and they are smooth jawed. Properly set traps are perfectly concealed to even the brained eye of another trapper. Thus, unless the child tripped and fell or was crawling, the chance of his getting a

hand in the trap is very slight. Generally traps are not set in places a child would play. An extra caution on the part of the trapper in locating the traps would further reduce the possibilities of catching anything but dogs and other predator type animals.

Traps may not be the answer to the dog problem. If the use of 10-80 and strychnine poisons had not been eliminated by the numerous uniformed, "Do-gooder" groups, we would not have a wild dog problem now. The M-44 cyanide gun is still legalized for predator control if used by authorized fish and wildlife personnel. This may be another solution to eliminate the dogs. Let's don't rule out traps until all facts are known and expressed to all concerned.

Let's face it. Either do something to eliminate the dogs or enjoy the consequences that can result from the ever increasing wild dog packs. Some of these consequences may be: 1—trash scattered about town; 2—rabies; 3—bubonic plague; 4—maimed and mutilated people and livestock; 5—possibly a child viciously and horribly killed by wild dogs. I wonder if one local attorney would be happy to take that first case?

### NAMES ON WELFARE

The federal government plans to create a computerized list of all welfare recipients throughout the nation. The list could be used to identify cheaters and to determine the effectiveness of programs designed to train welfare recipients for private employment.

Federal law protects the privacy of welfare recipients by prohibiting the publication of welfare rolls. But there is no law against sophisticated record-keeping by the federal government.

The amount of money spent for training and rehabilitation programs justifies the computer costs — estimated at \$1 million — in order to determine whether these programs do any good.

Social Security records will show the employment records of those welfare recipients who are trained for employment at government expense.

In recent years the welfare system has increasingly become federalized but records have remained fragmentary, being kept only at the county or state level. The computer list for the first time will give the Congress complete information on what is happening in welfare offices throughout the country.

That will be an invaluable source of data for research into the causes and possible cures for the growing burden of welfare dependency among our people.

Ruidoso's trustees took a positive step at Tuesday's meeting in adopting Resolution 79-6, providing for participation in the "Municipal Mortgage Finance Act", signed into law by Governor Bruce King April 6.

This action will eventually result in the availability of mortgage monies, at interest rates estimated at between 6 and 8.5 percent for home buying and remodeling.

Privileged to participate in this mortgage program are the low and moderate income citizens of New Mexico. The proposed one family maximum income (per household) is \$26,000 based on the last Form 1040 for federal income tax purposes. The mortgage maximum, in Ruidoso, under this plan would be \$52,000.

This resolution has a long way to go to provide the means for low and moderate income families to qualify for loans; but it's a matter of slicing through the red tape, getting banks and Savings and Loan institutions to make the funds available . . . and once the program is instituted, overall housing in Ruidoso stands to improve immeasurably.

It's also entirely possible, under the terms of this plan, to substantially eliminate mobile housing and the problems arising from such units involving infractions of zoning ordinances and tax collections.

Once again, the village trustees are to be congratulated on their far sighted outlook to improve housing in Ruidoso, to enable our growth to include residences of sufficient value to indeed make Ruidoso one of the finest resort/permanent residential areas in New Mexico. — CD
