

Downs' bond election to provide sewer

The Ruidoso Downs general obligation bond issue, to be voted on July 18, is to fund construction of a sewer system to service the village.

"I want to set the record straight," Mayor Norman Wheeler said to The News Tuesday. "Ruidoso Downs has no sewer system, there is no sewer system to im-

prove — all we have here are septic tanks.

"We have the funds to pay the village's share of the Regional Wastewater System (RWS) but we have no sewer system to tie into the mains serving the new treatment plant of the Regional Wastewater System."

The bond issue will provide funding to

install distribution lines and enable about 400 commercial and residential hookups, to establish the village's sewer system.

The planned system would serve the entire village, including mains and connections to property lines, Wheeler said. Individual property owners would then be able to hook onto the service.

The subdivisions to be served include Ruidoso Downs Heights, Los Lomas, Spring Park, River Park I and II, Palo Verde Townsite, Valley View and Mountain Home and commercial buildings west on Highway 70.

Included with the village's RWS funds will be installation of interceptor lines on

Entrance Road to Ruidoso Gardens, Central Street and Spring Road.

"Without the half-million dollar bond issue," Wheeler said, "there'd be no sewer system to connect to those interceptor lines."

Wheeler spoke of the village's comprehensive plan, in relation to the bond issue. "If we don't get the bond money, it'll

prevent future controlled growth as we have planned it. I know that having our sewer system will make possible a great future for the village.

"The sewer will upgrade the value of property and provide another attraction for new businesses, that are now dragging their heels because we lack a sewer system."

Com FIRE maps with evacuation routes readied

Emergency Evacuation Routes maps, designed by Com FIRE (Committee For Insuring Ruidoso's Environment) for use in the event of forest fire or other disaster, are being distributed in the village.

Rich Seeley, Com FIRE map distribution coordinator, said Tuesday the maps are available at:

- Any Realtor's office
- KRRR Radio
- The Ruidoso News
- Chamber of Commerce
- Fire Departments, including Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs and Bonito.

The village is divided into four areas: Upper Canyon, Gateway, White Mountain and Alto, with each area on a separate map.

"It is the intent of Com FIRE," Herb Brunell, chairman, said, "to have each resident of each area keep a map of that area prominently displayed in the home at all times.

"If the homeowners will cooperate with us in this regard, should forest fire or other disaster requiring evacuation of residents occur, all persons living in a threatened area should be able to reach safe ground with a minimum of confusion and much more quickly than attempting to leave by other routes."

The evacuation routes are marked in red on the maps, with the most accessible feeder streets shown leading into the main escape avenues.

Commissioners eye radio needs

Lincoln County Commissioners, meeting Tuesday in Carrizozo, heard reports from David Rouleau, M.D. and Bud Payne of Carrizozo about the Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) program in the county. Rouleau and Payne were present to request funding in order to equip the EMT's with "beeper" radio devices, making them more accessible to the public.

Rouleau told the commissioners that New Mexico ranks "second or third" in the rate of accidental deaths, the majority of which occur in rural counties. He added that Lincoln County was one of the leading counties in training and number of EMT's. The only problem with the current system, he said, was that it is sometimes difficult to reach the EMT's by telephone, because of the rural setting. He pointed out that it was agonizing for persons to be

unable to reach help quickly when "a loved one is dying before their eyes."

Later in the afternoon, Payne made specific requests for funding of the radio equipment, which he had incorporated into the total budget request for ambulance service. Final budget hearing and draft budget approval is scheduled for the next commission meeting May 22.

If the requests are approved, Payne plans to allot seven of the devices to Captain and Corona, respectively, six to Carrizozo, and eight each to Hondo and Alto. The areas with the most widely dispersed population would thus receive more radios, he explained.

Following an hour-long closed session devoted to review of numerous applications, the commissioners agreed to invite five individuals for interviews for the position of county manager. That office was vacated April 16 by Les Olson who resigned to take over as Eddy County

manager.

The selected applicants include: Christopher Hegg, Rock Island, Illinois; John S. Kormanik, Santa Fe; David G. House, Labadieville, Louisiana; Thomas M. Faughn, DeLand, Florida and Spencer Atkins, Alamogordo.

County Attorney Daniel Bryant advised the commissioners that easements had been obtained from property owners along the road to Bonito Lake. Securing of the easements was necessary for the county to proceed with base road work on a section of the road damaged during the December flood.

The county had previously entered into a cooperative agreement with the Forest Service to ready the road for paving. The preliminary work would return the road to its previous state, so that a federal paving project could begin.

Sewer bond vote Tuesday

Ruidoso's \$1.5 million general obligation bond election, to fund the Regional Wastewater System, will be held Tuesday.

Voters from all precincts, 11, 13 and 14, will vote in the multipurpose room of the Ruidoso Public Library.

The polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.

The bonds will provide \$800,000 toward construction of a new sewage treatment plant in the Biscuit Hill area, new lines and mains leading to the treatment plant and all costs related to land acquisition.

The remaining \$700,000 will fund installation of sewer mains to areas of the village not presently served. These lines would extend to subdivision boundaries, permitting private hookups at a later date.

The present treatment plant, wastewater superintendent Blair Halliday has advised the village trustees, is "now operating at capacity and there is no way to make it handle more."

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., said, of the need to approve the bond

issue. "If there is no new sewer treatment plant, there'll be no new developments and no new hookups to the present sewer."

WORD WAS RECEIVED Wednesday by village manager Jim Hine from Vernon Sorge of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) office in Dallas, Texas, that the "plans, specifications, design and contractual agreement" was approved April 30 by Sorge's office.

Sorge also advised Hine that the federal government's grant approval, the final step in government participation in the sewer project, "is forthcoming, following a review of the grant offer being compiled at this time." The actual review, by the EPA board in Dallas, is expected to be completed by the end of May, at which time, predicated upon passage of the bond issue, Phase III, or construction of the Regional Wastewater System, can be undertaken.

Voter eligibility in Tuesday's election includes all or any registered qualified electors of Ruidoso.

Tuesday's vote will be canvassed and the returns certified during the regular meeting of the Ruidoso trustees, at the library, after the polls have closed.

P&Z tables sign ordinance

The Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission Wednesday tabled the proposed sign ordinance after a crowd of 100 persons in attendance expressed their displeasure with the document.

The majority of those in attendance agreed that Ruidoso needed a sign ordinance. The majority did not agree that the one being discussed at the open hearing in the Ruidoso Public Library was the one they wanted.

Much of the discontent with the measure centered on the ordinance's dictate concerning the appearance of the sign. The ordinance stated earth colors were the only colors to be used. Some of the public there who expressed their opinions took offense to that mandate.

"If I want to use pink polka dots, that should be my business," John Hall, Sierra Development Company, said. "I feel like I have certain property rights." Hall's remarks drew applause from the crowd on

several occasions.

Floyd Buckley of Buckley Real Estate argued that the sole use of earth colors, brown, white, grey and black, were an infringement of his rights.

"My first reaction was it's infringing on my rights of my own creative ideas," he said. "It (using earth colors) would be such a monotonous looking deal nobody would notice my sign. I feel like I have my rights."

Commission chairman Mike Walden assured Buckley that the commission's "intent" was not to limit business owners from using other colors in their signs. He said he wanted to make the sure the "fluorescent greens and oranges" were not used in the signs.

Ken Buckley, also of Buckley Real Estate, said that as long as the document wasn't a stringent one, it could not be put into effect.

"Intent is the key word," he said. "Intent has no place in an ordinance. It's got to be black and white to be enforceable. If the next committee doesn't have the same intent as this one, then it's worthless."

Waldron expressed his understanding of Buckley's fears and said, "If we can get a group of you individuals to meet with us, that's what we'd like to do. If you will pick us a group to work with us, then we can make up this thing so it's palatable to you."

Don Dale of Dale's Furniture was not only critical of the proposed ordinance, but of the commission's right to propose one. He said the commission had too much power.

"Hopefully, our community can solve our problems," he said. "Five people can not solve our problems. I do not feel you represent our community. I think you are an illegal entity and I'd like to see the

board dissolved."

By this time, it was clear the commission would not recommend the ordinance go to the village trustees in their meeting May 8. But it wasn't clear what steps would be taken to draft a new ordinance. Some, including Waldron, suggested the formation of a citizens group, headed by John Hall, to draft an ordinance. Others suggested staying within the old ordinance as long as it was properly enforced.

Bill Uihlein of Dan Dee Cabins was the most outspoken in the group on the lack of the necessity of a new ordinance. He said as long as the current ordinance was enforced, we didn't need a new one. Benny Coulston of Boyce and Coulston agreed. "Let's give the old one a try," he said. "We've used it for two months and we've

Postal Service banning small envelopes July 15

"Use up your small and undersized envelopes and cards before July 15," Postmaster Elwood Gradine reminds customers. That is the date when the Postal Service's new size standards become effective.

The Ruidoso postmaster said that after July 15, envelopes and cards measuring less than 3 1/4 inches high or 6 inches long will be returned to the sender if mailed.

Postmaster Gradine said that because the envelope and greeting card industries have had more than three years to prepare for the new standards, few retailers should still be selling undersized pieces.

"Many consumers, however, are likely to still have smaller envelopes and cards in their supply of stationery," Gradine said.

The regulations also prohibit flimsy cards. In the future they must be at least seven-thousandths (.007) of an inch thick. An official postal card, for instance, has a thickness of nine thousandths of an inch.

Undersized pieces and flimsy cards are being banned because they can become trapped in other mail, tear and jam mail processing machinery. As a result, the letters of others can also be damaged.


The standards also affect ovalized and odd-shaped pieces of mail. Gradine said, "For first class mail weighing one ounce or less, there will be a surcharge of 7 cents for pieces more than 5 1/8 inches high or 1 1/4 inches long."

For more information, the postmaster suggests customers check with a post office window clerk.



Another area of discussion will be "values clarification," which will focus on identification of the nurses' own experiences or feelings which might interfere with their communication methods.



DISTRICT TRACK MEET

'Dogfight' to settle loop title

BY JOHN NEYLAND
The AA district track tournament Friday in Animas will be a "dogfight," according to a man who should know what he's talking about.
That man is Ruidoso High School boys track coach Darrell Stierwalt, who said all four teams entered in the meet, Lordsburg, Hatch, Animas and Ruidoso, have equal shots at running away with the district championship.
"The district race is going to be very tight," Stierwalt said. "It's going to be a dogfight. I don't want to predict any one team because any of them could take it. It may come down to the mile relay," which is the meet's last event.
If the mile relay does decide the champ, Stierwalt thinks the Warriors could be sitting in the throne when the dust clears Friday. The mile relay consists of John Cabot, Jeff Elliott, Stan Cape and Borde Williams. They have posted a 3:54 this year.
"We feel like we have a good chance at the mile relay," Stierwalt said.
Stierwalt thinks Ruidoso has a good shot at taking other events as well. He's counting on productivity from senior Mark Dutton in the long jump and high jump. He's hoping Ruidoso can pull out a first in the 440 yard dash. That field is well balanced.
"Nobody has touched Dutton in the long jump all year," Stierwalt said. "The high

jump is up for grabs. A kid from Hatch has jumped as high as Dutton.
"There are five or six kids that are within a tenth of a second of each other in the 440," he said. "We have two or three kids that are among the best. It's going to be a real dogfight."
Stierwalt is also hoping for a high finish in the 440 yard relay. If the team of Mark Dutton, Steve Pletsch, John Cabot and Yon Rue can put four stretches of flawless running together, Stierwalt thinks they can finish high, maybe even win.
"In the 440 relay," he said. "We would have to run real fast and get some good handoffs to win. I think we can get second place. Another team could have a bad handoff."
Stierwalt is practically counting money in the bank in the distance runs. Joe Almager in the mile and Craig Sullivan and Jovian Smith in the two miles have done well all year. Stierwalt expects their solid performances to continue.
"We feel like we can win the mile," he said.
The achilles heel for the Warriors in the meet is likely to be the field events, where the Warriors have scored sparsely all season.
"The thing that's going to hurt us is the field events," Stierwalt said. "We will be hard pressed to get points there."
One of the advantages Ruidoso will have entering the meet is depth, Stierwalt said.

Ruidoso can enter as many people in an event as they want, which has not been the practice in past meets. Stierwalt needs the additional entrants to score points, not necessarily win.
"We need to get some third, fourth and fifth place finishes from some people," he said. "We don't necessarily need to win those events. We need to score enough points by placing third and fourth to offset opponents' first place finishes. That's one place we have an advantage. We have a lot of depth. If we can score a few points in the field events and place in the sprints, it'll be a dogfight."

Rock Lake resumes full production

Rock Lake Hatching Station is back in full production, and preliminary indications are that disinfection of the facility has likely eliminated two fish diseases that were causing problems in the trout ponds and raceways.
Tom Moody, fisheries research biologist with the department's Fisheries Division, was in charge of the disinfection operation. He said that 30 days after putting fish back into the system, biologists had found no signs of any outbreaks of the two problem diseases, enteric redmouth and furunculosis.
Both are harmful to trout, he said, but have no effects on warm blooded creatures, including humans.
Approximately 287,000 fingerling trout have been transferred from the hatching troughs at Red River and Lisboa Springs hatcheries to the Rock Lake facility, where they will be reared to catchable size and stocked later this fall, mostly in the winter trout waters of southeastern New Mexico.
The Red River and Lisboa Springs hatching facilities were also disinfected, then quarantined against most entry to

prevent reintroduction of disease into the Rock Lake station.
Moody said that the department also plans to supply the Rock Lake facility with fish that have been immunized against enteric redmouth as a further barrier to reintroduction of the disease. Immunization is pending and will be done as budgets allow.
The diseases increase fish losses in the hatchery system and also slow the growth rates of surviving fish, he said. Disinfection and immunization should help keep down the costs of rearing the trout.

Due to a lack of eight and nine-year-old kids to fill the rosters of the four teams in the minor league of the Ruidoso Little League, registration has been reopened.
Boys and girls who will be eight-years-old before August 1, or will not turn 10-years-old until after August 1, may register for the league for a limited time. Thinkin in Lincoln

By Mary Ellen Payne Extension Home Economist

Are you concerned about the National Wilderness System? Do you want to know more about the roadless areas proposed for New Mexico? You will have an opportunity to learn more and ask questions on these topics May 10. On this date the Range Task Force from New Mexico State University will be in the County Commissioner's Room at 2 p.m., to discuss the issues.

During an initial inventory, the Bureau of Land Management identified 329 roadless areas in the state with a total of nearly 6 million acres. Out of this total, they chose 75 roadless areas totaling 1.8 million acres as warranting intensive

inventory for wilderness characteristics. On March 12, the BLM opened a 90 day comment period on their proposals. During this period, they are requesting the public to assess the accuracy of the wilderness characteristics inventory and comment on whether they agree with the BLM's wilderness recommendations.

The Lincoln County program, May 10, will be structured in the format of a panel discussion. Each team member will give a ten minute presentation which discusses the impacts of wilderness on range management, livestock grazing, wildlife management, recreation, mineral and energy development and "off road vehicle" use. Both pro and anti-wilderness views will be presented. In addition, if you have any specific questions, the Task Force will try to discuss them also. After a question and answer period, you will be presented with a "Roadless Area Field Examination Checklist" to assist you in evaluating individual areas for wilderness potential.





Inside The Capitol

Santa Fe—Maybe this might be the week to have lunch with Hartz Hartz.

He's out of work, after all, so we could spend a leisurely hour going back over how it all fell apart—from director of the Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Commission, which some think is a most powerful police body, to one more out-of-work attorney, looking for a job.

But come to think of it, Hartz probably wouldn't tell us anything. The group he headed has always been the most secretive organization in New Mexico—in fact, some of us thought it was so secretive that it never even told us what it did.

Maybe that made his in-fighting that went on there extra dramatic. Since none of us were ever allowed to see anything of the inside of the organization, we had to imagine what it was all about.

And when we asked for answers of any kind, we never got them.

The day Hartz was fired, for instance—or "resigned," as the saying goes—The Albuquerque Journal said this: "When asked if King had told him to fire Hartz, (the chairman of the commission) walked out of the room, slamming the door behind him."

That's the kind of answer you usually get from anybody connected with this organization. In these times, you could find out more about the FBI or the CIA than you could about the Crime Commission.

And that bothered lots of New Mexicans. Of course we know police work has to be secret—but, paradoxically, it has to be public too. That is, a time comes when whatever has been discovered by investigation must be unveiled. Sometimes it turns out, on a closer look, that evidence is not as good as it should be and so some who have been accused sometimes go free.

What was troubling about the Crime Commission was that almost no results of its investigations ever came to the notice of the public. Oh, it did say some things about the liquor business in New Mexico and it did some digging into the backgrounds of people who ran racetracks here. But the rest of the time, it just seems to keep on amassing evidence that never sees the light of day.

At least one judge has told us he finds that extremely disturbing. "Too easy for all this stuff to become a political tool," he says. "It has always seemed to me that good police work ended up in court—and court is a public, not a secret place. Somehow I always feel safer when things are done in the full light of day."

That same judge says he also feels we have enough layers of police activity in New Mexico now. He isn't for some super-cops, just because he doesn't think we need them.

Well, we have them. The Governor's Organized Crime Prevention Commission goes on, still underground, still a little mysterious, still a tiny bit melodramatic. Maybe we need it, and maybe we don't. As long as we can't be trusted to be told what it does, it's hard for us to decide.

But of one thing even we outsiders can be very sure: it takes itself very seriously. If it didn't, we wouldn't have seen these fights to the death and so many bodies littering the landscape.

Sense & Nonsense



U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici

Washington, D.C. — Look for a heated confrontation in the Senate when the SALT II treaty comes up for debate later this year.

There are a number of problems with this treaty, "verification" being the dominant one.

Without adequate methods for the U.S. to verify that the Soviets are living up to the letter of the treaty, the document is meaningless.

But the USSR doesn't cotton to us checking to ensure that they are abiding by the limitations as the treaty stipulates, and as we will certainly have to.

Presently, unless that sticking point and some others are resolved, I lean against the SALT II treaty.

The Soviets have never given us or any other country reason to take their word at face value. This issue is simply too critical for us to play nice guy and finish dead last.

The annual growth of the American worker's productivity from 1948 to 1955 was 3.1 percent. It dropped to 2.3 percent from 1955 to 1965 and it plummeted to only 1 percent from 1973 to 1977.

Last year worker productivity increased a dismal .4 percent.

What did the federal government do

about it?

It abolished the federal agency that monitors falling output.

What we don't know won't hurt us, right? Your Turn — Frustration, anger, and underlying fear.

That's the prevailing mood in America today and the mail I receive certainly reflects that mood.

As taxes, prices, inflation, and government spending continue upward, the boiling point of Americans responds in kind.

The following excerpts from New Mexicans' letters clarifies that point very well, and very depressingly:

"Besides the monumental tax we had already paid, because we both work and don't freeload, we had to send the IRS nearly \$1,000 of it. This year we have about \$500 left and now we have to send the IRS another \$400, which leaves us no savings."

"Last evening I finally mailed off my state and federal income tax returns. I am still so angry at the total disregard of our elected officials for the middle income worker that I just don't know what to think."

"What a ripoff! We pay and pay and pay and still one out of every \$5 we earn goes for direct federal taxation."

"Inflation and taxes continue to erode our savings. We are paying too high a price for our thrift, which is no longer a virtue but fast becoming a millstone around our necks."

"I give up trying to be a good citizen. I can't trust or believe what the government says."

"It's a pretty sorry state of affairs when the country has to pay for the whole world, then turn around and cut veterans' health benefits."

I am acutely aware of your mood, and I think we're going to see some positive steps this Congressional session to respond to that mood.

But then, I'm a born optimist.

Clipped comment

PEANUTGATE???

A policeman's lot is not a happy one, for sure. Nor does a President's lot seem much fun any more.

Attorney General Griffin Bell, the nation's number one policeman, hasn't yet satisfied critics that he's totally following the new Ethics in Government Act. The prosecutor he's named to look into the Carter peanut business and election financing won't have the same power the Watergate prosecutor had, nor such a staff.

Meanwhile, a presidential trust, through trustee Charles Kirbo, has just bought a parcel of land from brother Billy giving Billy a \$219,770 profit! Billy, coincidentally is now safely protected from prying media in a naval alcoholic facility. (He has already on one occasion taken the fifth amendment to avoid answering questions about finances.)

The American people have become curious enough about Carter financial maneuverings to want to hear Billy, the President, Bert Lance, Charles Kirbo, and perhaps other key insiders, testify under oath as to various financial transactions. It's already beyond much doubt that some financial records have been falsified.

Newly-named prosecutor Paul Curran is suspect by critics as a patsy who'll keep the Carter investigation within the narrowest possible limits — in fact he immediately indicated that to be his goal. This should not be enough for a "Mr. Clean" President, who has repeatedly told the American people they could trust him, that he wouldn't lie to them. There should be, of course, a complete and thorough investigation — leading wherever facts and evidence take investigators.

If this isn't forthcoming, Republican members of the Senate Judiciary Committee can and should go to court, to see that the full intent of the new ethics in government law is carried out — in this first precedent-setting since its enactment. — Santa Rosa News

The victory margin was 5 1/2 lengths. Trainer Jake Pletcher goes into the finals with two other qualifiers as well — Brave Ruler, a four length winner, and even odds trial favorite Pickle Pocket.

Wildlife law enforcement alone is not the entire answer to wildlife preservation, but more and more it is becoming more important as human populations increase and wildlife habitats decrease. Most sportsmen agree that there is a need for laws and regulations that are wisely conceived, for an adequately trained body of professional people to administer these laws, and for strengthened support of the courts. Public opinion plays an important part in any enforcement program, for unless wildlife legislation and control grow out of the demands of an amused populace, a large proportion of our wildlife resources may be sacrificed to the interests of special groups or of misguided individuals.

where a deer brought \$150 and rabbits were sold for \$5.50 apiece. It was a profitable trade, and the profits of the poaching ring is estimated in the hundreds of thousands of dollars a year.

Proof that the general populace living in the area where the illegal killing was being done not only allowed it to happen but approval of it was shown one night when the poaching ring killed seven deer in a two mile radius of built up rural neighborhood in Jackson County, Michigan. One deer was actually killed less than 50 yards of an occupied house where lights were burning brightly, yet not one word of the poaching violations ever reached a Michigan wildlife enforcement officer. Public apathy makes it easier for poachers to apply their skills and steal the wildlife that belongs to you and your children.

The lessons of the poaching ring broken in Michigan apply to all states where wildlife is concerned. There is an urgent need for strict laws relating to wildlife, and there is a definite need for better public support for conservation departments who work diligently to safeguard fish and wildlife.

If you are a law abiding sportsman, no matter where you live, it is very likely that poachers are stealing your deer, elk, antelope, pheasants, ducks, trout, bass, and other species of wildlife from you. The poacher is a crook and you are the victim.

Operation Game Thief works, as some wildlife poachers can already testify; but it needs the support of everyone who cares for wildlife. Become involved in the protection of New Mexico's wildlife and report all wildlife law violators by calling the toll-free number 1-800-432-4263.



The fragrant lilacs, blooming in the yard, the purple-lavender colors shining in the mellow sun, bring memories of our father and mother, more fondly clear than ever. And during the heavenly month of May, the spirit of our beloved father and mother will be close to all of us, rejoicing with all the loved ones in the joyful month of May.

Today, on the last of April, the weather is perfect for April to welcome in the month of May.
Light clouds are hovering in the air, with light showers adding a freshness to leaf, grass and flower.
