## Ruidoso DECA ranks second in nation

Ruidoso's Distributive Education Club of America (DECA) ranks second in the nation for achievement in national Pepsi Learn and Earn competition.

The accolade came during a Saturday night awards ceremony, capping a week of competition and activities, at the national DECA convention last week in Houston, Texas.

The major prize received by the Ruidoso club was 40 shares of Pepsi-Cola stock, worth \$1,000. Eddie Parker, DECA sponsor, said the stock cannot be sold for at least a year. "We do not plan to sell the stock; we want to keep it as a memento of winning second place nationally for this project," Parker said.

"These shares of stock will serve as a great learning tool," Parker said. "The kids are already learning how to follow the stock market in the paper, and will eventually see the benefits through dividends."

When dividends are realized, Parker said the club hopes to set up a scholarship fund or reinvest in more Pepsi stock.

The project was second to an entry from the state of Illinois, whose DECA club won 50 shares of Pepsi stock. Parker said eight tenths of a point determined the difference

between second and third place, with nearly three points being the margin between second and first place.

"I think it is a real accomplishment to receive this kind of recognition," Parker said. Other states whose projects were in the top ten included Alabama, California, Florida, New York, South Carolina, Tennessee, Washington and Wisconsin.

The Ruidoso delegation was the largest from the state and one of the largest nationwide, Parker said. "The number of local students showed the strength of the program and the support it receives from businesses, service clubs and the school board. We could never have done it without all this support."

Parker also recognized the efforts of parents who attended the convention as sponsors. They included Donna Parker, Janie Pritchett, Don Dale, Jeanne Whitlock, Jeanette Browning, Jo Ann Barnett and Charlotte Fuchs.

"These parents were great. They set up a luncheon meat bar and kept it open all the time so the kids would always be able to get something to eat. It really saved us a

lot of money," Parker said. Individuals who competed nationally also represented the state adequately, with five from Ruidoso earning recognition. Steve Cox placed second in human relations, food service-master employee competition and earned a medal.

Kristi Perryman, food service, Anne Fox and Richard Woodul, finance and credit, received Series Competency Awards for placing in the top 20 percent in the nation in their areas of competition.

"New Mexico as a state did exceptionally well. We weren't dominant but we were well represented," Parker said.

Planning for the future, Parker said the club is now working with the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce on a creative marketing project which will be entered in state competition next year. The project involves preparing a manual for new businesses entering Ruidoso's marketplace.

Tentative plans for next year's Pepsi Learn and Earn project could include the Pepsi/DECA refreshment cart at the Arts and Crafts Fair. "We got a lot of new ideas at the convention, so we may try something different next year," Parker said.

## Kansas Derby running Sunday

The 1979 Kansas Quarter Horse Derby, with a winner's purse of \$103,925 will be run Sunday at Ruidoso Downs Race Track.

The fifth running of the 400 yard dash is for three-year-old quarter horses and offers a gross purse of \$212,500.

Sunday's race is the first leg of the Triple Crown for three-year-old quarter horses, to be followed by the \$450,000

Rainbow Derby July 8 and the \$1 million All-American Derby August 26.

Vespero, the gelding who won the Rainbow Futurity in 1978 and ran fourth in last year's All-American Futurity, tied for first in the qualifying trials for Sunday's race with Flying Passem, at 20.45 seconds over the 400 yards, with both winning their divisions.

During 1978, with a 6-1-0 record out of nine starts, Vespero won \$232,288. This year, with three wins out of three starts the gelding has won \$8,769.

Flying Passem posted a 4-0 record out of 12 starts last year to earn \$159,466. This year, out of three starts the gelding's

## Chamber members urged to participate in politics

"I hope you understand that you must march," Ken Scarborough, National Chamber of Commerce officer, said to a crowd of 130 Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce members Monday night.

Scarborough was the main speaker at the annual Chamber banquet held at the Holiday Inn. His message for the evening relayed the hope that "people in the business community will continue to stay involved in the political system."

Retracing history, Scarborough said businessmen and women went through a time when "they left government in the hands of politicians."

"You have to beware of big government because it has become so big, so massive," Scarborough said. "But you have the finest system ever devised and I think the 1980's

will be one of the greatest times we have ever seen" because business people are pulling together.

Since 1974, Scarborough has been the membership action manager for the Southwestern Region of the National Chamber of Commerce. Prior duties included serving as a legislative political manager and urban rural affairs manager in the Chamber of Commerce regional office.

The local outgoing and incoming board of directors were recognized, and outgoing president Dave Wilson outlined progress of the Chamber over the past year. He cited a more stable budget, reorganization of the board of directors, creation and activity of subcommittees; growing membership and the hiring of Ed Jungbluth as executive director as the main achievements.

Benny Coulston, new board president, accepted the gavel and presented Wilson

with a plaque in gratitude for serving as Chamber president.

Plans for the upcoming year were reviewed with cost estimates given for each project. Events mentioned included joint sponsorship of the Mescalero Pow Wow June 1-3, Arts and Crafts Fair August 3-5, Cadillac Party August 22, Motorcycle Convention October 1-6 followed immediately by the Aspencade.

Advertising for the ski season will begin around November 1, the State of the Village luncheon will take place in January and the Mulekinners Trail Ride will receive Chamber backing later in the spring. Political issues and the Chamber's position on each were also discussed.

The meeting was closed by Jungbluth, who said, "I am pleased we had such a good response and I appreciate the support I have been given by the board in the months since I arrived."

## Downs trustees eye budgetary requests

With the start of the fiscal year close at hand, Ruidoso Downs trustees made further budget considerations, Monday night, reviewing request from Ruidoso Ambulance Service, the accounting firm of Nulf-Jones, animal control officer Mike Hernandez Jr., and a proposal for salary increases for police officers.

The wage increase request came from newly-appointed police chief Ray Garner. He proposed that the night dispatcher not be replaced, and the salary for that position be used to finance the raises, in order to attract qualified officers.

Garner advised the council that he would be able to use volunteer dispatchers for busy weekends. At other times, calls will be routed through the Ruidoso Police

Department, as is the current situation.

The chief also proposed and mayor Norman Wheeler recommended the hiring of a 29-year-old certified officer who has two years of experience with the Artesia department. That action was tabled on a motion from trustee Ray Parnell, who said he felt the matter should come before the

The only Derby entrant even close to the pace setters in winnings is Pass Em West, with 1978 earnings of \$63,600 from a 7-6-1 record out of 11 starts. This year the colt has won his only two starts, adding \$1,375 to his previous winnings. Pass Em West's qualifying time was 20.60, as the winner of his trial heat.

Other qualifiers for Sunday's Kansas Derby, with time set in the trials, include: Mr. Afton Bug, colt, 20.47 and trial winner.

full council. Trustees Juanita Burke and Lois Beavers were both absent from the Monday meeting.

The animal services contract, which had been pending, was approved by both the trustees and the animal control officer. The contract calls for a flat rate of \$800 per month for services rendered. Hernandez stated he would have one man working in the village at least 16 hours per week and that an animal control officer would be available, on call, at other times during normal working hours.

Hernandez added that the new contract would mean more effective services, because no limits were established, by financial or other considerations, on the number of animals to be collected.

The setting of a specific fine for violations of the animal ordinance was also suggested by Hernandez, and the trustees agreed to look into that change.

Funds in the amount of \$5,000 were approved as payment for the availability, personnel and vehicle maintenance provided by the Ruidoso Ambulance Service. Trustee Vada Leighton requested regular reports from Ruidoso on the number of calls made in the Downs area.

The request for \$2,900 from the accounting firm of Nulk-Jones reflected a ten percent increase over last year's payment for auditing services. The board agreed, however, that the cost was not unreasonable and approved the request.

In other business, the trustees:  
— Gave final approval to Ordinance 79-1, increasing residential and commercial water rates. The new minimum charge for up to 4,000 gallons will be \$9.50 for

residences, \$11.50 for commercial concerns and \$4 for standby status. The standard charge for each 1,000 gallons over 4,000 will be \$1.60 for commercial or residential.

— Tabled consideration of a quitclaim deed which would return the Downs community center hall and property to the original owner.

— Retained the firm of Coppler, Walter, Moonheimer and Bosson as bond counsel for the upcoming sewer bond election.

— Heard a Planning and Zoning (P&Z) report from Don Elerson.

— On the advice of P&Z, granted approval of an easement to Neil Smith for the

Smith Addition, subject to minor corrections to the plat by engineer Quentin Daniel.

— Announced a special meeting Wednesday to open bids for the entrance road bridge.

— Called for bids on park equipment including lighting, benches, dugouts and a cinder block concession stand.

— Heard a report from village clerk Virginia Spall on the joint Spring Subsection Conference of the Municipal League held in Santa Fe last week.

— Approved a replat of Lots 2, 3 and 4, Block 1, in the Spring Park subdivision.

— Announced that the final budget hearing will be held at the next regular meeting May 28.

— Granted occupational licenses to the following: Ceramic World, Ruidoso Flower Shop, Chaparral Motor Hotel, The Inside Rail, Jose Rodriguez, Rafael Palma and the Downs Drive-In Theatre.





### Removal of animals from wild oftentimes fatal

About this time of year, antelope fawns are being born, and bear cubs will soon be following their mothers in their foragings. During the coming month, elk cows will be dropping their calves, and deer, in June and July, will be fawning. And, inevitably, someone will spot one of these appealing little creatures hidden away under a bush, decide it's been abandoned, and take it home as a pet, says Ted Burt, chief of the Game and Fish Department's Law Enforcement Division. They shouldn't. "Taking these fawns, calves, and cubs is not only illegal, it's almost always harm-

ful, or fatal, to the animal itself," Burt said. "The young animals that survive the shock and the change of diet lose their fear of humans and become threats to their owners and in the public once they get some size to them." Fines for illegal possession of protected game or fur-bearing animals run from a minimum of \$50 up to \$500, and could be accompanied by jail sentences of up to six months. The young animals are rarely "abandoned," or orphaned Burt said: "Generally, the mother has left it hidden while she goes off to feed. It's a protective

measure which helps keep the fawn or cub from being exposed to predators." In cases where it's known that the animal is orphaned, such as a road kill, persons should contact the Game and Fish Department with information on the location of young animals. ## Thorough study of deer conducted by department

Deer trappings are being conducted this week near Carracas and Middle Mesa as a continuation of a Department of Game and Fish research project initiated in 1978 and at the B-Square ranch of former Governor Tom Bolack as part of a second research

project. The current trappings are in the Cabresto area south of Navajo dam and in the area between Pine and San Juan arms of Navajo Lake to the Colorado line, according to Walt Snyder, Game

Management Division chief. Radio collars placed on some deer two years ago are being changed, and vaginal units are being put in does for easier location of fawns this summer.

On each major study area of the continuing research project, biologists are studying deer population dynamics (numbers, productivity, age structure and sex ratios). They are also describing each area of deer range in terms of seasonal use, climate and physical, biological and

man made features. Mortality factors are also being identified, including the presence or absence of infectious disease, seasonal variations in available nutrition, and population levels and trends both of predators and of prey species other than deer that predators could take.

In addition, wildlife conservation officers are taking about 50 head of deer from the Bolack ranch near Farmington. Bolack has offered to bear half the costs of the second research project to study the survival rates and activities of deer moved into unfamiliar territories. Deer taken from the B-Square ranch will be released in the Carracas and Middle Mesa areas, as well as three other major study areas.

Trappings in the areas this week are being done by hazing deer into nets with helicopters.

# Solar home tax credit available

A New Mexico resident who uses the sun to heat or cool his home can claim a credit against his personal income tax of a maximum of \$3,200 under combined state and federal solar credits now available.

A taxpayer who completed the installation of solar equipment after April 19, 1977 and before January 1, 1979 can file an amended 1978 federal income tax return to claim the federal solar credit.

The New Mexico solar tax credit can be claimed by using the appropriate form PIT-18 from the Revenue Division of the State Taxation and Revenue Department.

The New Mexico solar heating and cooling tax credit regulations allow a credit "not to exceed \$1,000 on an amount equal to 25 percent of the cost of equipment used in the taxpayer's principal residence for solar heating, cooling or heating and cooling if the residence is located in New Mexico." This also applies to the cost of solar equipment and in connection with the taxpayer's residential swimming pool for heating purposes.

The federal solar tax credit is included under renewable energy source provisions of the residential energy credit recently enacted into law. This credit is computed by taking 30 percent of the first \$2,000 and 20 percent of up to the next \$8,000 of the expenditures for solar, wind powered, or geothermal property for the home.

A major difference between the two tax credits is that the New Mexico regulations allow credit for certain passive solar applications while the federal regulations so far rule out virtually every passive system which is feasible in New Mexico. For instance, the federal regulations specifically exclude greenhouses, and for all practical purposes, also exclude

trouble walls, skylights, windows, and roof overhangs.

On the other hand, New Mexico's regulations include provisions for certain percentages of equipment costs for drum walls, trombe walls, rock beds or water tanks, greenhouses, skylights, and glazing for south-facing windows. To assist the taxpayer who installs a passive system, a special workform has been designed to determine the actual amount that can be claimed for credit.

The state credit is for equipment only while the federal credit is for installed costs of the system. Solar systems installed since January 1977 are eligible under the state regulations. However, a New Mexico taxpayer has up to three years (from the end of the year in which his return was due) to claim the credit so that if he began to install a solar system in 1975, he still can claim the credit up to December 31, 1978.

Under the federal renewable energy source provisions, solar equipment installed after April 19, 1977 is eligible for credit and the full \$2,200 allowable credit for such expenditures can be spread over several tax years.

The application must be accompanied with copies of invoices for the equipment installed or an accounting statement from the contractor along with a blueprint or drawing of the system installed.

All solar heating, cooling or combined heating/cooling equipment must meet the standards of the Intermediate Performance Criteria for Solar Heating and Combined Heating/Cooling System and Drawings as set forth by the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development.

## BLM pays state \$35 million on mineral sales

A check for almost \$35 million was sent to the state of New Mexico this week by the Bureau of Land Management as the state's share of receipts from the sale of minerals on public lands in New Mexico.

The \$34,982,051 represents the state's share of the federal revenue for the first half of fiscal year 1979 that ended March 31.

With the exception of Alaska, each state having public lands receives semi-annual payments of 50 percent of federal revenues collected within that state from leasing

bonuses, rentals and royalties.

Since 1920, mineral leases on federal lands have generated \$4 billion in revenues, and of this amount, \$1.7 billion was returned to the states. Leases for the mining of oil and gas, coal, potash, sodium and phosphate accounted for the bulk of the revenues.

Payments to the states from mineral receipts in fiscal year 1978 total \$100 million, of which \$49,509,872 was paid to New Mexico.

## Some unemployment claimants must pay federal income taxes

Some New Mexico Unemployment Insurance (UI) claimants will have to pay Federal income tax on benefits this year, Employment Services Division Director Eric P. Serna said May 3.

Serna said a new Federal law requires single persons with income over \$20,000 in 1979 and married persons filing jointly with incomes over \$25,000, including any UI benefits, to count those benefits as income for tax purposes. Since the New Mexico state income tax is closely tied to the Federal tax, benefits will also be subject to state income tax.

No taxes will be withheld from Unemployment Insurance benefit payments and claimants will be responsible for payment

of taxes due. The Employment Services Division will be required to report the amount of benefits paid to each claimant during 1979 to the Internal Revenue Service and to claimants during January 1980. All claimant notifications will be sent to the last known address, and claimants who move after benefits have been paid should notify the Division of their new addresses in order to receive their notifications.

## Wilderness Wisdom with Wayne Galloway

Dear Wayne - I recently read that the meat of buffalo (bison) contains less cholesterol and more protein than beef. I have never eaten it and wondered if it tasted similar to beef.

Could you tell me if it is possible to buy packaged buffalo meat, and if so, where? William P. New Jersey.

Dear William - According to claims made by suppliers, buffalo meat contains considerably less saturated fat and 25 percent more protein than beef.

Its texture is not too unlike beef, nor is the taste, but it is drier due to the lack of marbled fat and should be cooked in a manner which keeps it moist. Properly prepared, it is delicious.

A letter to: The National Buffalo Association, P.O. Box 708, Custer, SD 57730; should bring all the information you need on availability of meat and prices. The availability of buffalo meat is increasing, but you can still expect to pay considerably more than for beef.

## Ruidoso-Dallas air service started

Ruidosians will now have direct air connections to the Dallas-Fort Worth area, which began Friday with the inaugural flight of Peruvian Airways' nine-passenger plane.

The Navajo twin engine aircraft, manufactured by Piper Aircraft Company, is one of three new machines which will be used to service the Ruidoso area. Piloting the first flight was vice president of Peruvian Airways Pat Perez, who said the flight "was nice, super smooth and we had beautiful weather."

The flight schedule runs Thursday through Monday with daily arrivals in

Ruidoso at 11:05 and departures at 11:15. Arrival in Midland-Odessa is 1:20 and connections can be made on Braniff Airlines to leave Midland at 1:40 for arrival in Dallas at 3:30.

From Dallas, takeoff is at 8:30 a.m., and arrival in Midland at 9:30. Peruvian leaves Midland at 11 and arrives in Ruidoso at 11:05, according to Don Parsons of Parsons Travel Agency, handling reservations in Ruidoso.

Cost of the flight, one way, is \$39 to Midland and \$28 from Midland to Dallas. Total cost one way is \$67.

"We don't anticipate the cost of tickets going up right away (because of predicted fuel shortages)," Perez said. "Nobody

knows where the end is going to be. Fuel costs can go up quite a bit before it affects rates."

Perez said response to the direct connections has been good. "We've had a lot of inquiries; the phone is literally jumping off the hook," he said.

The maiden flight carried nine passengers, among them the president of Peruvian Airways, John Andrews. Perez said flights into Ruidoso Saturday and Sunday would each have at least four passengers. "It will take awhile before people know we're operating," he said.

## Water quality improvement project eyed for Rio Hondo

Agricultural producers whose lands are part of the upper Rio Hondo watershed may soon be authorized to receive partial funding for construction of water quality improvement projects.

At a Tuesday meeting in Carrizozo led by Allen K. Trammell, Lincoln County, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) executive director, local government officials, interested landowners and representatives of conservation agencies discussed what specific practices and projects would be of greatest benefit to area producers.

Trammell was assisted by John A. Cooper, county ASC committee chairman and Fred W. Pfingsten, county vice-chairman. They told the group that a plan had to be developed and submitted to the state by May 23. The local officials will then meet with the state ASC people to discuss the plans and determine if changes are necessary, before a submission is made to the Federal government.

Trammell said a total of \$275,000 was available for the project, and that up to 80 percent (perhaps more) of the cost of individual practices could be paid by the agency, with the landowner paying 20 percent. A maximum of \$3,500 would be paid yearly, Trammell added.

General conservation practices already eligible for the program include permanent vegetative establishment or improvement, strip cropping systems, terrace systems, diversion systems, grazing land protection, windbreaks, contour farming, water impoundment systems, rangeland moisture conservation, sediment control, stream protection, spreader ditches and dikes, sod waterways, animal waste control facilities, forest planting or improvements, and permanent vegetative cover in critical areas.

Following the listing of these eligible practices, the group made suggestions for additional methods they felt were needed

locally. The suggestions, which will be subject to state approval, included streambank stabilization and protection, to be added under the vegetative cover in critical area heading. Such projects would help to alleviate the erosion effects of the December flood, the group agreed.

Trammell said he would also attempt to include work on arroyos which fed into live streams. The arroyo work would probably fall under seeding practices designed to prevent soil, water and air pollution (mainly from erosion) Trammell said.

The possibility of 80 percent funding was also discussed, and Trammell said such funding might be approved in the county if the projects benefitted large numbers of people in the area. The participation of low-income residents would also be a

factor in the amount of funding received, he added.

Funding might also be extended for two additional years, Trammell said, if effective programs were developed. For this reason, Paul Gordon of the U.S. Forest Service suggested that a highly visible program might be helpful in convincing the federal government to continue the financing.

Several areas were mentioned as possibilities for fulfilling the "highly visible" criteria: the Indian Divide Area near Capitan, the Nogal area and the area below the Ruidoso Downs racetrack extending to Biscuit Hill.

Trammell indicated that certain areas of the Mesquero Apache Reservation could also qualify for the funding, if the land involved was owned by agricultural producers such as the cattle growers association.

The group was assured by Trammell that even those producers who had received emergency aid for conservation purposes after the flood, could still be eligible for this program.

Many different agencies were represented at the meeting, and Trammell said he hoped all could work together on the various projects. "The more different agencies cooperate and the more community benefits, the better off we'll be," he said.

## Wilderness areas workshop set

Potential wilderness areas in southeastern New Mexico will be the subject for comments as a public workshop May 24 from 6-8 p.m., at the Roswell Municipal Library. The United States Bureau of Land Management (BLM) will also have workshops in Hobbs and Carlsbad.

The BLM in New Mexico concluded its inventory of "roadless" areas in March and recommended to the agency's state director in Santa Fe those areas which seemed to warrant further inventory as possible wilderness.

The Roswell district of the BLM recommended that about 49,000 acres, or 1

percent of the public lands in the district, be included in the intensive inventory to begin in July. The six recommended areas are in Eddy and Otero counties adjacent to national park and national forest lands.

Unlike the informational open houses the BLM held in March, the public workshops this month are designed to obtain public comment on the recommendations. BLM wilderness specialists said they want to know if their inventory of roadless areas were accurate; Did they miss roads in these areas? Are there roadless areas of 5,000 acres or more that haven't been inventories?

The BLM also wants to know if there are other roadless areas that should be included for further study during the intensive inventory, or if any of the six areas recommended for further inventory obviously lack wilderness characteristics. Comments supported with specific examples will be particularly helpful in making decisions, the BLM officials said.

Those attending the workshops may submit written comments or have their oral comments recorded at one of several tables manned by BLM Roswell district office employees.

Workshops will also be held at the Hobbs Holiday Inn May 23 and the Carlsbad Rodeway Inn May 23 from 7-10 p.m.

# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—Last week was a big one for communication problems in Santa Fe. (Voice from off-stage: So what else is new? Every week is a big one for communications problems in Santa Fe.)

But most of these communications problems revolved around the head of the biggest man in government, the Governor himself.

First of all, he seems not to have been sufficiently clear in telling Cabinet secretaries that some people who work for him have his power of attorney, as it were; when they speak, it is as though he had spoken.

Then, when Cabinet secretaries started kicking up their heels and doing what they thought was right, he had to come right out and say that, head-on. (He doesn't like to say things, especially less-than-pleasant things, head-on.) He even told us exactly which people can speak for him (Linda Kehoe, Bill Giron, David King and Leo Griego). Then some people acted like he hadn't communicated that, either.

The Albuquerque Journal, for one, said he was setting up a system like Richard Nixon had in the White House—and we all know how that came out, don't we?

Then the Governor communicated very clearly. He said he thought the Albuquerque Journal was well, a mess. Meanwhile, in another part of the Roundhouse, David King (who can speak for the Governor) and Larry Ingram (who can't) were setting their little communication problem.

That wasn't too hard to do. All Ingram had to do was give in on everything and reshape the top of his department in exactly the way David wanted to see it done. Now the two of them say they are communicating again—which seems to mean, if we are any judge of communication, that next time David tells

Larry to do something, Larry will do it straightaway, without trying something, else first. For those who feel that this in effect makes David King Secretary of Human Services as well as Secretary of Finance and Administration, about all we can say is that there must be some problem in the way we have communicated it.

At week's end, the Governor was still grousing about how none of us paid any attention to him when he talked, and he hadn't really said these lucky four were going to be assistant governors, and of course everybody knew who the Governor of New Mexico really is, and so on.

In other words, the Governor feels very put upon and is suffering from a fit of self-pity.

None of this would ever have happened if he had said right from the outset that these four people can speak in his name. But he didn't want to say that. He hoped all of us would intuit it or otherwise guess it for ourselves, and act as if he'd said it.

But some of us, including Larry Ingram, just don't seem to be that smart. We thought Governors spoke for themselves. Ingram even thought he was going to be allowed to run his own department.

Well, we're all smarter now. Communications have been improved. The Governor came right out and told us how he intends to run things, and we heard him, so we can be sure.

Can be sure, that is, if he doesn't change his mind—in which case, we'll just have another problem in communications, won't we?

## Sense & Nonsense



U.S. Sen. Pete Domenici

WASHINGTON, D.C. — With double-digit inflation gnawing at America's fiscal sanity, I'm reminded of an old military sarcastic gripe.

To paraphrase it and link it with today's economic woes: "There will be no relief for taxpayers until their morals improve."

If America must adhere to that non sequitur, one way to improve morale would be a fair return on tax dollars.

A "dollar-for-dollar" government spending cut that would return those cuts to Americans' rapidly-emptying wallets. For instance, trimming \$20 billion from all channels of government spending in fiscal years 1980 and 1981 and returning that \$20 billion to the taxpayer.

I proposed such a measure in the Senate last month, a bill that would have accomplished that dollar-for-dollar return to the taxpayer, in the form of a \$20 billion tax cut.

Plus, it would have given added adrenaline to a balanced federal budget for fiscal year 1981.

With the budget-cutting mood Americans are in, it is somewhat surprising that the bill was defeated on the Senate floor 58-55.

But that vote was the largest affirmative

number to date on any amendment to the 1980 budget recommendations.

A moral victory, perhaps, but still short of the concrete mandate needed to boost this country's fiscal morale.

I will introduce it again soon, with a heavier lobbying effort directed to my colleagues in the Senate.

Some of the negative votes last month have reconsidered and swung to the dollar-for-dollar concept.

They're realizing that when American taxpayers falter on the fact that we have bought a balanced 1981 federal budget for a cost of almost \$50 billion in new taxes, those Americans are going to demand a dollar-for-dollar package of this nature. Congress, in my opinion, had best take steps to improve the morale before it has to deal with the mutiny.

As this is written, the Senate has passed an emergency standby gasoline rationing plan for the nation, with the House in debate over it.

As I've commented numerous times, no rationing plan is desirable, but the Senate-passed plan assures that New Mexico will be treated equitably should rationing be needed.

I can't emphasize enough that this rationing plan can only be implemented — in its present form — in the event of a dire national emergency, as in a wartime situation.

After the House has hammered it out and taken action, I will explain fully in this column all its machinations and effects.

## Clipped comment

### SAFETY QUESTION

The continuing controversy over where to put a new jet-capable airport to serve the Ruidoso area is getting bogged down in government study and investigation which is not the speediest way to come to a decision.

One important point which seems to be overlooked was voiced Thursday by a spokesman for the Federal Aviation Administration when he said it is "only a matter of time before Ruidoso has a major air disaster."

The existing Ruidoso Municipal Airport has also been called "extremely dangerous" by the same official, as well as by an airport master plan study.

Gov. Bruce King has sent a task force, Secretary of Interior Cecil Andrus has sent an envoy, Sen. Pete Domenici and Rep. Harold Runnels both have sent representatives.

Yet with all the discussions and arguments, the Bureau of Land Management — which manages the land which has been called most acceptable for an airport site — stands firm on its decision not to allow an airport to be built on Fort Stanton Mesa.

The reason for BLM's decision is that an airport would interfere with range research being conducted by New Mexico State University, which has a 20-year lease on 17,000 acres there.

On the other hand, the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission has said that an airport can co-exist with the range research.

While NMSU may be most knowledgeable on whether an airport will interfere with research, the FAA certainly is more knowledgeable about air safety.

The question to be answered is whether range research is more important than the lives of those who use the existing Ruidoso Municipal Airport.

It seems obvious that this question will not be resolved in the immediate future, and we must take the FAA statement to heart.

It is beyond the scope of the BLM to deny a lease of public lands to the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission if such a denial puts lives in danger.

The present airport is surrounded by mountains. Sierra Blanca is to the west, and off the end of one of the runways is a hill. The terrain rises rapidly, and the runway is not level. Also, at that elevation, an aircraft does not have the lift it would have at lower levels.

As Ruidoso gets set for the annual influx of visitors — an economic shot in the arm in the area — more and more people will be using the facility.

No one doubts that a new airport is needed. We just hope there will be a rational decision made as soon as possible. — Howell Daily Record

### editorial

No gross injustice was done Benjamin Kincheloe of Midland, Texas when the state Court of Appeals reversed his district court conviction on possession of heroin, because a Ruidoso policeman made an unauthorized search and seizure.

Obviously the attorney filing Kincheloe's appeal knew his points of law. Court of Appeals verdicts are not rendered on a person's guilt or innocence, but on points of law — a point of law in this case that Kincheloe's rights were violated.

It is equally obvious that the attorney prosecuting Kincheloe blew it.

Facts in the case indicate an Informer telephoned detective Dave Pfeffer, Ruidoso Police Department, advising him that Kincheloe was en route to Ruidoso, carrying heroin.

Pfeffer followed through. He determined Kincheloe was five days over due in returning to Texas, under terms of his parole. In a search for firearms, heroin was discovered in Kincheloe's pocket.

It is against the law to be in possession of heroin.

Obviously the prosecutor didn't make a proper case on the charge, by failing to establish the points of law on the search and seizure by proving Pfeffer had probable cause to search Kincheloe.

The prosecutor really has no defense against losing the case against Kincheloe — other than the obvious fact that he blew it. With the end result being that the people suffered a gross injustice. — CD

Anyhow ... them four school boarders up and potted up themselves ... to go and listen/see/learn ... so bolly for you good old school board members.


### ON SAVING GAS HERE

## Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

 Vespero and Flying Passem, two of last year's All-American Futurity finalists, tied for the fastest qualifying time for the May 20 \$212,850 Kansas Derby. Both were clocked at 20.45 seconds over the 400 yard burst. Vespero, the 1978 Rainbow Futurity winner, won the sixth division by a length while Flying Passem took the eighth division by 1 1/4 lengths. Vespero, trained by Marilyn M. Asmussen, is the leading money winner with \$239,057. Flying Passem has a bankroll of \$145,319.

Here is a list of the Kansas Derby finalists and their qualifying times: Vespero, 20.45; Flying Passem, 20.45; Mr. Afton Bug, 20.47; Song O My Heart, 20.54; More Excuses, 20.57; Oh Greedy, 20.60; Pass Em West, 20.60; Pass Em Boy, 20.61; Rocket Lights, 20.61; Miss Jetta Bar, 20.64.

Some well known horses from last year failed to make the finals. Topping the list is All-American winner Moon Lark, who is now the second leading money winner of all time in quarter horse racing. Moon Lark, a 1-5 favorite, battled a strong headwind in the first race for a time of 20.69 seconds, just five-hundredths of a second away from qualifying. Moon Lark still won his division, whipping the field by over a length.

Right after Moon Lark ran, the wind died down and reversed to a tailwind. Moon Lark's time held as the fastest through the next three races, but Mr. Afton Bug blazed to a new low of 20.47 seconds in the fifth. Vespero, Pass Em West and Flying Passem all took advantage of the wind to win the next three divisions

respectively. Combined with the tailwind and the fast pace set by the winners, the sixth, seventh and eighth divisions sent seven finalists to the Kansas Derby.

Despite an impressive field of Kansas Futurity champ Gentlemens Feature, Golden State Futurity winner Six Te, and West Texas Derby champ The First Edition in the ninth division, the pace was not fast enough to advance any one of the three standouts to the Derby finals. Six Te, after being in ninth place at the start, closed hard for a nose victory over The First Edition in a time of 20.88 seconds. Gentlemens Feature was third, losing by a head.

Other notables who missed out in advancing to the Kansas Derby finals include All-American finalists Oh Shilney and Copasetti. Oh Shilney won the third division as a 1-2 favorite, but his time was a slow 20.78 with a tailwind. Copasetti was a 3-5 favorite in the fifth division, but finished sixth, almost five lengths behind Mr. Afton Bug.

The 10th division of the Kansas Derby trials was won by Song O My Heart, a bay colt owned by famed country and western singer Jody Miller. Song O My Heart qualified for the finals based on his quick 20.54 time. The 6-1 outsider returned the second highest win payoff, \$13.20, of the trials, which were dominated by seven favorites finishing first. Longshot of the trials was Mr. Afton Bug, a 7-1 outsider who returned \$18.60.

Pass Em Up, sire of the great filly Pass Over, has three of his offspring in the Kansas Derby finals, including Flying

Passem, Pass Em Boy and Pass Em West. All totaled, the trio has earned over \$227,045. Pass Over was the winner of the Kansas Futurity and All-American Derby.

Trainers H. Don Farris and Johnie Goodman have two Kansas Derby finalists. Farris trains Mr. Afton Bug and Rocket Lights while Goodman handles Oh Greedy and Pass Em West. Jerry Nicodemus was the rider on both Farris entries and W.R. Hunt rode both of Goodman's mounts.

After finishing second in four consecutive races, Mr. Clyde finally made his crowd-pleasing stretch drive work for him in the Inaugural Purse Friday. The Ralph Miller-owned gelding turned on the power in the middle of the backstretch, passing four horses around the turn and heading for home. He then pulled out to a length victory and earned \$3,900. Mr. Clyde has never finished out of the money in his last 13 starts, eight of them runnerup finishes. Be A Chum finished second and Warrior's Time, a gelding who defeated Mr. Clyde in the Thunderbird Handicap the last time out, took third. Mr. Clyde went off at 7-2 odds.

While Mr. Clyde was in the winner's circle, most of the attention was centered on Smoothentangle, who had fallen in front of the grandstand. Smoothentangle was not injured merely needed a rest. After catching his breath for five minutes, the 6-year-old gelding jumped up and walked away, much to the delight of the fans who gave him a warm ovation.

The first race of the season sent Cut Shot to the winner's circle with the largest winning margin of the weekend. The bay colt went wire-to-wire in a four furlong maiden contest, winning by five lengths. Cut Shot had opened up to a six length lead before crossing the finish line handily.

Jestasmappytom made his return to Ruidoso a profitable one by winning the second race, a 550 yard claimer. The chestnut gelding hadn't won at Ruidoso since August 28, 1977. He was in the money five more times at three various tracks before being turned out in July of last year. Running at a 2-1 shot, Jestasmappytom held the lead throughout, heading 8-5 favorite Easter Bunch by an impressive two lengths.



## Jockey/Trainer of the week

Apprentice jockey Joe Martinez and trainer Bob Arnett teamed up late on Sunday's card to run away with their respective Jockey and Trainer of the Week titles in the opening weekend of racing at Ruidoso Downs.

Martinez rode the winner of the 12th race Saturday, then took the 8th and 11th races Sunday, giving him a record of 3-1-1 in 14 starts. He was tied with four other jockeys, each with three wins, but earns the title based on his four second-place finishes.

Arnett was the trainer for both of Martinez' last two rides, moving him into a tie between four other trainers with two wins each. However, Arnett claims the crown, notching two runnerup finishes. His record stands at 2-2-1 in 11 starts.

Following Martinez were Gary Sumpter (3-2-2), Charles Mueller (3-0-5), Steve Fuller (3-0-2) and Donald Knight (3-0-1). There were three jockeys tied with two wins each and 15 took one winner each.

Those trailing Arnett include William Leach (2-1-1), Thomas Riley (2-1-0), H. Don Farris (2-0-2) and Hugh Tucker (2-0-2).

Sumpter and Knight rode the season's first two stakes winners. Friday, Sumpter guided Mr. Clyde to an impressive victory in the Inaugural Purse while Knight rode Lillie Bug to the winner's circle in the Top Deck Stakes Sunday.

Gilbert McClanahan trains Mr. Clyde and Don Drake handles Lillie Bug. Both were two of eight trainers who won in their only starts for the week.

**THE HANDLE** at Ruidoso Downs Race Track for the opening three days was \$989,293, the daily wagering average \$329,764 and the average betting per race, for 36 races, was \$27,480. In 1978, with two race days, the handle was \$781,569; daily average \$390,784 and the per average wagering, over 24 races, was \$32,565. The current daily wagering average is down 15.6 percent from last year.

## I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

Behold the angler! An epitome of patience, an example of dedication, a library of fish knowledge, the angler is a self-created artist of a fine art called fishing.

Of course, that description has been made by another member of that elite group of individuals - me.

A member of the non-fishing group might define us collectively as "jerks on one end of a line waiting for jerks on the other end."

Needless to say, my definition is much more accurate.

Fishermen (a more casual term for anglers) are usually a well informed lot of individuals when it comes to the laws pertaining to their sport. That is, those laws which designate bag limits, possession limits, season dates, etc.

However, there is a new school of thought concerning certain laws which might pertain to fishing. It is these laws I would like to acquaint you with now.

The first of these is a general purpose law which applies to everything. It is, of course, Murphy's Law which states, "If anything can go wrong, it will."

From there we advance to O'Toole's Commentary on Murphy's Law: Murphy was an optimist.

4. Johnson's Law (Clovis), "Once you arrive at your fishing spot, you discover the fish quit biting yesterday."
5. Goodwin's Law (Carlsbad), "The fish will be biting the only thing you don't have in your tackle box."
6. Weatherpoon's Law (Artesia), "When you make a cast to a rising fish, your line will backlash or tangle on your reel."
7. Hennington's Law (Lovington), "Anytime you make a cast to the perfect spot, your plug fouls on your line."
8. Barracough's Law (La Luz), "When you finally discover a plug the fish are biting on, you will hang it up and lose it."
9. Barracough's Corollary #1, "When you lose your plug, you discover that was the only one like that you had in your tackle box."
10. Ialer's Law (Ruidoso), "If your wife is fishing with you, she will catch more and bigger fish than you will."
11. Pafford's Law (Carrizozo), "Anytime you return to work after a long, fishless fishing trip and tell all your co-workers the fish weren't biting and that no one was catching anything... a picture appears in the paper with an angler holding a big stringer of fish caught at the same lake you just left, during the same time you were there."

The more fishing trips you make, the more likely you are to encounter all of these laws. Perhaps, you have discovered how to beat some of these laws. If so, congratulations to you.

Wait! Southeast Area Supervisor Ruben Gonzalez just walked into my office with a gleam in his eyes and said he just figured out how to beat the "you should've been here last week" syndrome.

His solution is to go ahead and plan for your fishing trip at a certain time, and then go a week earlier.

Which in conclusion brings me to Howe's Law: Every man has a scheme that will not work.


The open house sessions will be held May 17 from 1-8 p.m. at the following locations: Alamogordo - Lincoln National Forest Supervisor's Office, Federal Building, Carlsbad - Guadalupe Ranger District Office, Federal Building, Room 145 Mayhill - Mayhill Ranger District Office Ruidoso-Smokey Bear Ranger District Office

The RPA directs the Forest Service to assess the amount, ownership, condition, demand for and supply opportunities related to our nation's forests and rangelands.

Currently, the Forest Service is preparing the 1980 RPA Assessment and Program. Public Review and comment is encouraged on all assessment and support documents which will be available at the open house sessions. Specifically, comments are invited on (1) the prospective demand-supply situation, (2) a desirable direction for Forest Service programs, (3)

the criteria which should be used in determining program direction and, (4) the identified issues. Public views will be considered in selecting Forest Service program direction which will be submitted to Congress in early 1980.

Copies of the assessment and program documents are also available at all Forest Service offices. Written comments must be received at the USDA-Forest Service, Southwestern Regional Office, 517 Gild Avenue, SW, Albuquerque, New Mexico 87102 by or on June 8, 1979, however, earlier comments are urged, if possible.

## Easy Tam in Friday's trials

Easy Tam, a filly who's been frustrated in stakes attempts this year, goes after big money once again when she steps onto the track at Ruidoso Downs Friday.

The filly, owned by Darrell Kissea of Miami, Oklahoma goes in the sixth race. The 350 yard dash is one of 16 elimination trials Friday which will set the field for the June 3 grand finale of the \$525,000 (est.) Kansas Futurity.

Those contenders who came up with the top five times Friday will join the top five from Thursday in the regionally televised finale June 3. All together, 289 two-year-olds were entered in the two day trials.

Fifteen races are set for Friday, which means the starting time will be 12:30 p.m. Weekend action continues with 12 race programs Saturday and Sunday. Liftoff time Saturday is 1:30 p.m. Sunday activities begin at 1 p.m. Sunday's spotlight will be on Vespero in the finale of the \$212,850 Kansas Quarter Horse Derby.

All gas stations in the area, according to the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, will be in business as usual throughout the weekend. No gas shortage is anticipated.

Easy Tam, who'll have Jerry Burgess at the helm in Friday's fifth race, will break from the No. 5 post. Last spring, the filly

shipped to Sunland Park with a fast-growing reputation. Easy Tam had kicked off her career in the Oklahoma bush track circuit, and finished second in a big money stake, despite slipping at the start on icy footing.

At Sunland, she readily qualified for the rich West Texas Futurity, but caught a haymaker in the finale from the hard slugging upstart, Rocket Jet Bug. She had to settle for second, a half length behind, and earned \$20,723. That pushed her career bankroll up to nearly \$31,000.

She tried to even the score with Rocket Jet Bug in the finale of the \$222,695 Sun Country Futurity, but once again the going was too rough. Easy Tam slumped to third, and had to be content with a paycheck of \$18,261. So, despite having failed to win a stakes race, Easy Tam will go into Friday's showdown with earnings of close to \$50 grand.

Pullafastone, the filly who set the top qualifying time for the Sun Country but conked out in the finale, drew into Friday's third race. Jerry Nicodemus will be up.

Washita Ted, a late nominee at a cost of \$3,000, is in the 13th race. Special interest will be focused on Easy Dimple, the filly who brought \$160,000 in last year's All-American Sale. That figure was the highest in the history of the Sale.

## Bat flight programs underway at Carlsbad

Evening bat flight programs have resumed at Carlsbad Caverns National Park along with daily lantern trips through New Cave and longer visitor hours at the main cavern.

The primitive New Cave lantern trips, which require reservations and are limited to a maximum of 25 persons each, will be at 10 a.m. and 1 p.m., daily. Reservations

can be made by calling (505) 785-2233.

Visitor hours at the main cavern will be from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m., for complete, walk-in tours, and from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., for Big Room trips. Hours for the park's visitor center building will be from 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. Visitor hours at the park are to be further expanded on June 3 with the start of a new summer schedule.

The park entrance fee is \$3 per carload daily, or an annual Golden Eagle or Golden Age Passport. The commercial bus passenger rate is \$1 per person. Annual permits are available at the park visitor center.

**I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors**

Hurray for our side! The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish and its many dedicated volunteer hunter training instructors have been recognized for outstanding achievements for 1977-1978 in the field of hunter safety education.

May 7, an award in honor of this recognition was presented to Governor Bruce King and the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish on behalf of the National Rifle Association (NRA) and the International Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies (IAFWA). This award was presented by Mary L. Peterson, Arizona and New Mexico Field representative of the NRA.

The primary criteria for selecting a recipient of such an award is the overall quality of a state's game and fish commission's programs. Of which, quality of instructors and instruction, teaching aids and methods used, and other aspects of the program are integral parts of the selection criteria.

New Mexico is one of ten states chosen by the IAFWA and the NRA to receive the Hunter Safety Education Award.

New Mexico's hunter safety training program was born in 1965. In its early stages many problems arose as there were few guidelines to follow for such a program. Some dissent within the ranks of the Department for the creation of such a program caused further complications.

Nevertheless, thanks to the interest and enthusiasm of a man named Carl Berghofer and then director Ladd Gordon, the hunter training program began to grow in strength and by 1970 had blossomed into its own.

It was in 1970 that the New Mexico Legislature passed the Hunter Training Act, making this training program mandatory for the shooters under 18 years of age. It was at the end of this same year that fewer hunting accidents had happened than for any one of the previous ten years.

When the Dingler bill was passed federal monies became available for hunter training programs and New Mexico was the second state to apply for these funds.

Needless to say, our hunter training program has come a long way since 1965. Not only has the information in the materials improved, but the materials have improved as well. There are handbooks, films, filmstrips, videotapes, charts and handouts used in teaching this course.

However, the real accomplishments of the program have been achieved as a result of the volunteer instructors. Those teachers you had for your course are not paid and receive no compensations in any capacity for their efforts.

They donate many hours of time, effort and money to the program they believe in. Southeastern New Mexico hunter safety groups conduct some of the best classes in the state. My hat is off to them and all the other active instructors that have made our program what it is today.
