## TWO PASSENGERS SERIOUSLY INJURED

# Ruidoso pilot crash victim

A Tuesday morning airplane crash here resulted in the death of the pilot and serious injuries to two passengers.

Killed in the accident was Ron Howard, Ruidoso, operator of CATV Inc., the firm burying telephone and cablevision cable in this area.

Injured were Howard's son, James, 18 and Allen Morel, 18, a CATV employee. Both were transferred by helicopter to Providence Memorial Hospital, El Paso, Texas at 3 p.m., Tuesday.

Hospital records state that both young men suffered multiple fractures and possible internal injuries. They were kept at the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital until their condition, reported as serious, was stabilized.

The plane, a Super Viking 300A Bellanca, was en route to Hill City, Kansas at the time of the crash.

The aircraft landed in a clump of trees at approximately 10:45 a.m., about in the middle of two vacant lots, just off Torreon Loop in Country Club Estates. In its descent, it struck the top of a pine tree some distance from the crash site; then took the tops of three trees in the back yard of the Lloyd L. Davis Jr., residence before crashing about 60 feet below the Davis home.

The aircraft did not explode or catch fire.

Members of the Ruidoso Ambulance Service, Police and Fire departments and White Mountain Search and Rescue exhumated the injured men from the wreckage. Ambulance director Ross Schwarz, at Tuesday's Ruidoso trustees' Meeting, publicly thanked the supporting groups and singled out "Jon Hall and Carl Blann for individual recognition and

thanks for their services." A team of Federal Aviation Administration investigators was at the

crash scene early Wednesday morning. Their report, municipal Airport manager Tim Morris said, "might not be completed

for several months." There was no indication Wednesday of any suspected cause for the accident.

## King promises action on new airport

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., Tuesday afternoon, telephoned Governor Bruce King relative to the morning airplane fatality here.

Davis said to The News, "I told the governor my back yard was the new airport in Ruidoso and that it was time to bring New Mexico State University (NMSU) into perspective and time for the governor to support a new airport for Ruidoso."

Davis also said to the governor, "We're not trying to rob the hungry mouths of the world by making minor changes in NMSU's experiment pattern." on Fort Stanton mesa, the proposed site of the new regional airport to serve Lincoln County.

Tuesday night Davis also said to The News: "I wonder how many hungry

mouths in the world are getting fed with the grass growing on the mesa, on NMSU's experiments." Davis also said, "I don't

think there have been 300 head of cattle there, collectively, during the 17 years NMSU has been conducting experiments on the mesa."

In a special comment Tuesday night, regarding the fatality, Davis said: "The names of Dr. Gerald Thomas, NMSU president, the NMSU board of regents and BLM officials should be on the death certificate as signifying authority for the plane crash."

Davis said he'd also advised Governor King, "There was no structure within two miles of the present airport when it was built and that we've been trying to get a new location the past 15 years."

Regarding NMSU's fight to retain use of mesa lands, Davis said: "The attitude of NMSU on trying to keep us from using 1,000 acres out of the 26,000 on the mesa is absolutely ridiculous."

Davis reported, following his conversation with Governor King and his urging of the governor to support the new airport on the mesa, that the governor told him, "I'll get on it immediately."

## Downs budget \$564,612

The Ruidoso Downs trustees Monday gave final approval to a municipal budget calling for \$564,612 in expenditures during fiscal year 1979-1980.

The budget will be submitted to the state Department of Finance and Administration, and pending approval of that office, will take effect July 1.

Village clerk Virginia Spall confirmed that the budget figures reflected less than the 15 percent increases recommended as an inflationary precaution, since the village simply didn't have the funds to provide for such increases.

Approximate figures of some of the major items are: general government,

\$104,103; police protection, \$69,049; fire protection, \$25,138; debt service, \$201,375; recreation, \$34,139; utility service, \$34,503; animal service, \$9,200.

The board also approved resolution 79-11, a more detailed version of an earlier resolution calling for the \$500,000 sewer bond election July 18. The action was taken after a recommendation from Don Monnhelmer of the firm of Coppler, Walter, Monnhelmer and Bosson, Santa Fe, which is serving as bond counsel for the election.

In reference to the bond election, mayor Norman Wheeler said, "I can't imagine any property owners in the village being against it. It's going to cost them a few extra dollars a year, but you've got to stop and figure what you're getting." He added that property values would be enhanced by passage of the bond issue and installation of the proposed sewer system. In other business, the trustees:

— Approved payment of \$500 per month to the village of Ruidoso for ambulance service in the Downs, on the condition that semi-annual reports on the service be submitted to the council.

— Approved a quitclaim deed to George Fuchs on the old Ruidoso Downs Community Center.

— Approved the appointment of Nancy Carruthers to the Planning and Zoning Commission.

— Were advised by mayor Wheeler that the village offices will be closed Wednesday, May 30, in observance of Memorial Day. Accepted the resignation of water clerk Dolores Garcia and agreed that members of the board would sign a letter of recommendation for her.

— Granted occupational licenses to Ruidoso Animal Control, Concrete Products Co., Skyview Auto Clinic, Discount Turf Supply and The Tack Emporium.

A survey of gasoline distributors by the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce discloses that gasoline will be in good supply in Ruidoso, "at least through all of June." Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth announced Wednesday.

## Ruidoso approves \$4 million budget

The Ruidoso trustees Tuesday evening tentatively approved a budget of \$4,058,270 for fiscal year 1979-1980, beginning July 1.

The budget now must be approved by the state Department of Finance and Administration, following review by that body.

# Traumas of rape victim subject of local seminar

Area law enforcement and medical personnel May 24 attended a day-long seminar on rape, sponsored by the Law Enforcement Association of the Twelfth Judicial District, on behalf of the local counseling centers.

Speakers included Richard S. Swenor, of the United States Air Force Office of Special Investigations and president of the Law Enforcement Association; William Weng, training specialist with the state Sexual Crimes Prosecution and Treatment Program; Jim Trost, director of the forensic evaluation team for the Health and Environment Department; assistant district attorney Ed Schissel and Dorsey Grover, a volunteer with the Lincoln County rape-crisis program.

Weng kicked off the meeting with a discussion of evidence collection. Under the Sexual Crimes Prosecution and Treatment Act of 1978, evidence collection kits have been compiled and made available to hospitals and law enforcement agencies. The kits include most of the equipment necessary for evidence collection from suspected rape victims, and detailed instructions for their use.

The topic of Trost's speech was "Men who Rape," and was based on studies of convicted rapists and his own work in treating rapists.

Trost emphasized that rape is the fastest growing violent crime, and that the increase was not solely due to increased reporting of the crime. Rape is essentially a violent crime, he said, based on anger, and a need to control, humiliate and dominate the victim.

Alcohol was cited by Trost as the single most frequent factor in sexual crimes. Because 40 percent of all rapes are group rapes, "group dynamics" is also often a factor, meaning that men, especially juveniles, rape as a way of acquiring a sense of identity or "belonging to the group," he said.

Other "motives for rape" listed by Trost included feelings of sexual inadequacy, conflicts created by dependency on women, displacement of anger (taking out anger on another uninvolved person), covert homosexual conflict and an inclination toward aggression as a means of resolving conflict.

Trost also presented a profile of the "average" rapist. The criminals are generally between the ages of 18 and 30, of average intelligence but very deficient in education. Sixty percent of rapists have been married or were married at the time of the assault. Minority groups are overrepresented and rapists usually hold unskilled or semi-skilled jobs. Trost said many rapists are "socially incompetent or inadequate," unable to cope with the demands of modern society.

Severe mental disorders such as

schizophrenia occur in less than one percent of those who rape, although many "personality disorders," such as chronic inability to adapt, lack of empathy for others and lack of control over aggressive tendencies exist, he said.

Trost also explained some of the treatment programs for convicted rapists, including the use of female hormones, anti-male hormone drugs, behavior modification, and heterosexual training (teaching normal interactions).

Swenor discussed rape defense methods, explaining both aggressive and passive tactics and their probable effect. Aggressive action usually "escalates violence," he said, and some rapists find "fighting back" to be a "turn-on."

He mentioned a study made in Florida with six convicted rapists, who revealed that both kinds of tactics had been used with about equal success. Swenor advised that victims use passive tactics first, in any case, and to do nothing which would increase the assailant's fear of being identified.

Schissel spoke to the group about the importance of observing and making written reports of all details of sexual assault cases. Law enforcement officers should keep in mind that they are gathering evidence in order to prove that a crime was committed, that a certain person committed the crime and that corroboration of the victim's story is necessary, he said.

Grover spoke of the victim's needs following an assault. Reactions of victims are based on the individual personality and may cover a wide range of emotional responses.

Although the men in the rape victim's life generally react to the sexual aspects of the crime, the woman suffers more at the realization that "she has lost control of her life," Grover said. The sooner that control is restored, the better, she added.

The experience of rape is something which will change her life, Grover said, and the care she receives immediately after the assault is of the utmost importance.

The task of the rape-crisis volunteer, she said, is not to do "police work or medical work," or to convince the victim to prosecute, but to give support to the woman.

Rape-crisis volunteers may be reached by calling the Counseling Center at 257-5033 in Ruidoso, 648-2188 in Carrizozo or, after office hours, the 24-hour HELPLINE at 1-437-8800. All volunteers on the HELPLINE are trained in rape-crisis intervention, she said, as well as other areas of concern.

## Clem Weindorf new RC&D Area chairman

Clem Weindorf, Hondo, was elected chairman of the South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development Area (RC&D) at the group's annual meeting in Carrizozo Thursday.

Named to the RC&D steering committee were Wally Ferguson, Carrizozo, vice chairman; Delbert Nelson, Hildwell, secretary and Johnson Stearns, Carrizozo, treasurer.

Weindorf, who succeeds two-term chairman Bud Bagley of Corona, has been chairman of RC&D previously.

At the meeting, Dick Mutz, Natural Resources Administrative Services Division director, announced that the state will receive \$3.5 million in federal funds and \$750,000 from the state legislature for the next fiscal year. Allocations of these, recreation funds are based on 50 percent federal and 25 percent state participation, for communities under 15,000 population, with the community to provide the remaining 25 percent of the cost of projects.

Members of White Mountain Search and Rescue (WMSR) team traveled to Lake Arthur Saturday to assist with the search for a 13-year-old girl thought to have drowned in the Pecos River last Thursday.

Participating in the search were Mike Mulholland, Bob Chamberlain, Richard Saldin, Craig Surmick and Dave Travis. WMSR members also assisted with the initial rescue efforts following Tuesday's plane crash, and were later called on to guard the aircraft until it could be removed from the crash site.

# Ruidoso Downs sets bond vote registration

Voter registration, for the July 18 \$500,000 general obligation bond election in Ruidoso Downs, will close at 5 p.m., June 8.

Qualified electors, not presently registered, may register at the office of the Lincoln County Clerk, Carrizozo or with village clerk Virginia Spall at the Ruidoso Downs Municipal Building.

Eligible to vote in the bond election are:  
- All or any registered qualified resident electors;

- Registered, non-resident municipal electors, meaning any person who is a resident of Lincoln County, outside of the municipal limits of Ruidoso Downs, who is a qualified registered voter in Lincoln County.

Included in the non-resident elector's qualifications are that a property tax has been paid on property located within the village during the year preceding the election; and has filed a certificate of eligibility, announcing that person's intention to vote in the bond election, with the village clerk.

Certificates of eligibility must be filed with the village clerk not more than sixty nor less than 15 days prior to the election; putting the deadline at 5 p.m., July 3.

Absentee voting applications are available from the village clerk and must be completed and returned to the clerk not later than 5 p.m., July 13.

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

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# Fols Native wins Memorial Day Handicap

Fols Native demolished a blue ribbon field of three-year-olds in Monday's 24th running of the Memorial Day Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The colt really made it look easy while leading from start to finish. At the end, 3 1/2 lengths in front, the handsome colt looked as if he could run all day.

The stunning ease of triumph clearly established Fols Native as a giant among an already powerful thoroughbred division at the mountain track.

Fols Native coursed the 5 1/2 furlong distance in 1:10 1-5 seconds, grabbed \$4,050 out of the gross purse, and turned back meager mutual returns of \$4 to win, \$3.20 to place, \$2.80 to show. Richard Bickel was in the saddle for the rocking chair ride.

Fols Native, who ran up winnings of almost \$25,000 last year, now packs a near perfect career record of seven wins from eight starts. So far this year, he's turned two outings into victories.

The colt is owned by Tony Fenack Jr., and Wayne Fenack of Frisco, Texas. Joe Richard does the training.

Lawton Princess, a 6-1 shot, showed her mettle by lunging out from the middle of the pack to take second. Charles Mueller was aboard. Lawton Princess returned \$4.20 and \$2.80. Festos, a 4-1 shot, got third and paid \$3.

Right from the start, things began going Fols Native's way when jockey Bickel got him off to a hustling start. For a while, there was some competition from the 21-1 longshot, Leaderless. Draconic's Loom was also within striking range.

But it didn't take long for Leaderless to conk out badly, and Draconic's Loom had about all he could stand when he reached the halfway point of the back stretch. That's when Fols Native decided to shake off his foes, and shot into the clear. Turning for home, he had his struggling opponents hog tied by four lengths or so, and from the easy way he was traveling, it was clear there'd be no catching him.

The colt took a fairly wide turn into the homestretch, and Bickel used the whip to steer him back on course. At mid-stretch, Bickel slashed with the whip a few more times — probably to keep Fols Native from losing interest in the affair. The colt was still gliding easily when he flashed under the wire.

In Monday's co-feature, a 400 yard dash, Oh Shiney poured it on at the end to win going away by a length. It was the valuable colt's second straight win since running fifth to Moon Lark as an 18-1 shot in last summer's All-American Futurity. He paid a low \$3.40 to win Monday. Steve Fuller was up.

Racing resumes Friday with a scheduled starting time of 1:30 p.m.





With the signing of House Bill 294, the Health and Environment Department assumes funding and coordination responsibilities for residential treatment of chronically disturbed children in the State of New Mexico on July 1, 1979. Up to a total of \$900,000 available for at least 50 youth under 18 who are determined to be in need of such services. It is anticipated that approximately 3 children/youth will remain in their present out-of-state placements for the first year of the program. The average monthly amount available per child is \$1,450.00.

Definition:  
A residential treatment facility is a 24-hour facility which operates under the direction of appropriately qualified mental health professionals including but not limited to psychiatrists, psychologists, social workers and/or psychiatric nurses. A clinical assessment and treatment program in conjunction with an individual treatment plan of services and activities is provided. Lodging and supervision of children are secondary to the primary treatment function.

The proposal must include but is not limited to the following:

1. The number and types of children to be served. Specify age and/or diagnostic category limitations if any.
2. Estimated costs per child. (Present available funding averages approximately \$1,450 per child per month.)
3. Goals, objectives and methodology.
4. Geographical catchment area.
5. A description of the facility to be used.
6. The proposed staffing pattern.
7. The types of services to be offered. (See below.)

Residential Treatment Services include: (See Standards for Detail.)

1. Intake study and treatment planning
2. Individual therapy and group therapy
3. Routine daily care
4. Family liaison and/or therapy
5. Educational and vocational training
6. Community consultation and education
7. Medical and dental care
8. Transitional treatment
9. Follow-up coordination with child's home community resources, including outpatient mental health, developmental disabilities and substance abuse services.

The following process for referral to the program is under discussion within the Division, if a community (i.e., school, court, social services), state agency, and/or evaluation services primarily to the needs of BHSD supported residential treatment program. (See Standards for Detail.)

Referral must be made to what are presently known as the juvenile forensic evaluation teams, regardless of whether or not the child has come into conflict with the law. In those instances where juvenile evaluation teams do not exist, the present adult forensic teams will serve this screening evaluation function. These teams cover the entire state, providing diagnostic and evaluation services primarily to the courts and are located in Santa Fe, Roswell, Las Cruces, Albuquerque and Farmington. To avoid delays, additional evaluation back-up will be provided by either the local mental health center or privately contracted professionals. The chief of the local forensic team will arrange for these back-up services when necessary.

The evaluation team's recommendation for or against residential treatment and the recommended facility (if the child needs residential treatment) will be reviewed, approved, and verified placement in accordance with the clinical recommendations, provided services are available.

The Interagency Residential Treatment Review Panel, which heretofore served as a screening and placement panel, will act in an advisory capacity to BHSD and the Mental Health Bureau Chiefs on policies and procedures, proposal evaluation, and in resolving differences in placement recommendations.

# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — It's the Legislature that makes the laws and authorizes the expenditures, but it's the administration which actually carries everything out.

Where the two come together is before the Legislative Finance Committee, to which members of the administration come to report how they are doing. Last week it was David King's turn, reporting for the Department of Finance and Administration.

These are some of the things he told us. — The Legislature wasn't just boasting when it said 1979 brought some very substantial tax cuts to the citizens. The 12 laws that cut back taxes have saved the citizens about three-quarters of a million dollars in the first six months of this year, and during the fiscal year that starts July 1, that total will pass \$60 million. (At this point, loud cheers from the taxpayers. Sixty million certainly ain't hay. Now if my taxes had just gone down a little more sharply . . .)

— The state will be in good shape when we start that new fiscal year on July 1. We can expect total income to the state this year to run at least \$6.5 million more than outgo, and it could be more than \$21 million more than the state actually spent. Even if it's just the lower figure, we will end the year with about \$85 million in the bank, as compared to the \$76 million with which we started this year.

— But next year, we're going to be glad we had that surplus on hand.

During the 68th fiscal year, which runs from July '79 through June '80, we have already authorized more than \$765 million in expenditures. That's not up too steeply from this year, when inflation is taken into account, but expected revenues won't rise that sharply. (That's the result of those tax cuts we were rejoicing over just a few paragraphs above.) Income that year is only expected to be \$744.6 million. Even those of us who can barely balance a checkbook can see that's more going out than coming in.

So the \$85 million surplus will come in handy when the books have to be balanced at the end of that year. The surplus will go down to \$74 million.

— When we're projecting all the way to June of 1980, we know we can't do it with any accuracy. Too many things could happen in the meantime to change our figures. If shortages of gasoline continue in California, for instance, what effect will that have on our tourist industry, which accounts for 20 percent of the state's economy?

travelers we see are either coming from or going to the Golden State? Or suppose the federal government cuts back on revenue sharing. The state is in good shape in this regard because it doesn't spend this money before it gets it, but lots of counties and cities can't make that same statement. If their revenue sharing is cut off, they'll be in Santa Fe crying piteously for help.

But there was one cheering note on the subject of predicting revenues far ahead. Rep. Colin McMillan said he had done some fast calculating and, if Congress does deregulate the price of oil, he figures the state's revenues could go up by about \$50 million. Sort of "free" money, you might say, that we hadn't counted on.

We saved that till last, so we could end this column on a happy note.

"When I came down here to Texas I was looking for something. I didn't know what. It seems like you added up my life and I'd spent it all either stompin' other men or, in some cases, gettin' stomped."

"Had the some money and had me some medals, but none of it seemed a lifetime worth the pain of the mother that bore me."

It's like I was empty. Well, I'm not empty anymore. That's what's important.

"To feel useful in this old world. To hit a lick against what's wrong, or to say a word for what's right, even though you get whalloped for saying that word. Now I may sound like a Bible-beater yelling up a revival at a river crossing camp meeting, but that don't change the truth none."

"There's right and there's wrong. You gotta do one or the other. You do the one and you're living. You do the other and you may be walking around, but you're dead as a beaver hat."

In our "sophisticated and enlightened" age, some people would brand those words corny, jingoistic, right wing, and other unsavory and erroneous things.

That minority of Americans is entitled to its opinion.

I prefer Ms. O'Hara's opinion, the actress tearfully commenting before the subcommittee, "John Wayne IS America!"

I am a year round resident in Ruidoso and am also the mother of two pre-school age daughters. I have recently been giving a great deal of thought to the learning opportunities for young children in this community. With the exception of the excellent offerings at the Library under the direction of Kathy Moore and what ever teaching and learning activities that are taught in Sunday School there are virtually no situations where a child under the age of five can learn a skill or an ability in a structured situation under the guidance of a qualified instructor.

I am more than willing to teach my daughters as much as I can but there are some things they are interested in that I don't feel capable of teaching them. Experts tell us that children at this age need to be stimulated in order for them to reach the full potential when they start school but this is a difficult thing to do in Ruidoso. I realize that we are not living in a large city and I don't expect our community to be able to offer things that are taken for granted in more populated areas, but I also know that Ruidoso has a fair share of highly skilled and talented people that could instruct our pre-school children.

I'm not asking for a free handout. I would be more than happy to pay for ballet lessons, or music lessons or gymnastics or something to help my children develop potential. I know many mothers that feel the same way I do. Many of the talented people in town reply that children this age are too immature or don't have an attention span long enough to warrant the time and energy spent, but I feel that this is not always the case and may in fact rarely be the case. At least an instructor could put a child on a trial basis and see if it works out.

Not long ago the Olympathon '79 was broadcast, many talented performers in sports and the arts performed. Many of these people said that they began their training very early in life or at least developed an interest in their tender years that sparked desires for higher achievement later on.

We have potential Olympic athletes, skiers, pianists, dancers, etc., right here in Ruidoso and even if these people never become famous the skills and experiences they learn in childhood will benefit their communities, families and selves later on.

I would be interested in hearing from other parents or people who are interested in spearheading a program in this direction.

One final thought, summer is here, where can I find a person to teach my girls how to swim? This could be a life saving skill for our little ones. WE DO HAVE A NEED!

I don't know whether Ron Howard's skill as a pilot or the Good Lord placed Howard's airplane on that vacant lot in Country Club. In either case, the residents there, and the entire community, can be thankful.

There isn't a pilot who takes off at the Ruidoso airport who won't admit to more apprehension about takeoff emergencies from this airport than from most. And with good reason.

There's simply no place to go. But down.

Howard's plane didn't burn. Many do. If it had, his passengers would have lost their lives along with him. And the people in the surrounding homes in Country Club wouldn't be talking about their good fortune right now.

But, what if the next plane does burn? Or, what if it makes it just a little farther? Like, maybe, as far as White Mountain School.

Or, let's say the trouble happens even farther away and at a little greater altitude. What if the pilot can make it to the Ruidoso Downs Race Track? That's what all pilots leaving the Ruidoso Airport say they hope for—the race track.

One gas tank from Ron Howard's plane was half a block away from the main wreckage.

What if the next pilot does, indeed, make the race track. But, the plane burns. In your mind's eye, put that gas tank, aflame, up in the stands on a Saturday afternoon.

If this airport is not moved, a disaster is surely going to happen here. It may happen before the airport can be moved. But, it may not.





## Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

 Cut Shot, an impressive looking colt by Blade, set the fastest time of the 10 qualifiers to the Norgor Futurity. The four furlong sprint is for two-year-olds and carries a purse of \$56,220. The winner will collect \$27,029. Forty-seven head entered the trials, which were held May 25. The top two finishers from each of five divisions advanced to the grand finale.  
 Cut Shot, ridden by Henry Uriegas, won the fifth division of the Norgor trials by 5 1/2 lengths, covering the four furlongs in 47 2/5 seconds. Running Restless was second. Lovers Question scored the longest winning margin when she won by six lengths over Groton Spy in the third division. Lovers Question's time was 47 4/5 seconds. I Fool Around won the fourth division over Right Cute by 2 1/2 lengths in 47 3/5 seconds. Winning the first division was Jeb's Arrow, nosing out Ski Mask at the wire in 48 seconds. Fresh Egg captured the second division by edging Dino's Dynamid in 48 2/5 seconds.  
 Gary Sumpter and Charles Mueller qualified two mounts each to the Norgor Futurity finale. Sumpter was on Jeb's Arrow and Dino's Dynamid while Mueller piloted Ski Mask and Lovers Question. Both were later involved in a three-horse spill in the fourth division. Rounding the turn, Happy Issue, ridden by Don Howard, fell. Two horses successfully jumped over

Happy Issue, but Sumpter's and Mueller's mounts tripped, sending both jockeys to the turf. Sumpter was excused from his next mount, but came back to ride in the final three races. Mueller was taken off his remaining mounts Friday and Saturday, but returned Sunday to ride.  
 In that spill, jockey Don Howard was injured as the horses passed over him. He was taken to Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital with facial and head injuries, then transferred to Sierra Medical Center in El Paso. He is listed in stable condition, recovering from a fractured jawbone.  
 The 1979 All-American champion Moon Lark set the fastest qualifying time for the \$100,000 Los Alamitos Derby over the weekend. Moon Lark, who is now the richest active quarter horse with earnings over \$637,000, covered the 400 yards in 21.87 seconds, matching the time of Easy Treasure. Regular jockey Jackie Martin was aboard. Kiply's Charger, one of only two horses ever to defeat Moon Lark, was the third fastest qualifier. Two popular Ruidoso horses failed to make the field. Six Te ran the 11th fastest time, making the also eligible list. Osage Juana was the 13th fastest.  
 Moon Lark had a brief delay in reaching the California track. While on the road in Arizona, trainer Jack W. Brooks' truck, driven by Moon Lark's owner James Howard, broke down. Luckily, a passing

rancher offered his pickup for the trip while Brooks' truck was being repaired. A bit run down — it lost a headlight during the trip — the truck was able to pull Moon Lark's trailer to the coast. Jockey Jackie Martin said the truck looked as if it came right out of the movie, "Casey's Shadow."  
 Lucks Image Girl, a four-year-old mare who hadn't raced since November, made up for lost time from a poor start and ran away with the Mr. Jet Moore Stakes Saturday. Breaking from the number nine post with Gary Sumpter up, Lucks Image Girl traded positions with Number 10, Sister Parr, at the start before getting her footing. Striking on the outside, the H.C. Werner trained charge nosed out Lillie Bug at the wire. Lucks Image Girl, who picked up \$3,200 for the win, went off at a 7-3 shot. Last year, Lucks Image Girl ran second to 1978 Quarter Horse World Champion Miss Thermolark, losing by just a nose in the All-American Derby trials.  
 Sages Belle Star established herself as one to watch in the upcoming Rainbow Futurity. The Easy Six filly, who has earned over \$49,000, made it four wins in four starts Sunday. Sages Belle Star won the fourth race, a 350 yard allowance test by a length as an even money favorite. Sages Belle Star did not enter the Kansas Futurity trials, but loomed ahead in July in the \$450,000 Rainbow Futurity.  
 In early stewards' rulings, seven trainers were fined \$25 each for being late to the paddock on race day. They include J.B. Montgomery, Ronald Summerow, Clifford Lambert, Joe D. Merrick, Fred Danley, William A. Thompson and Dorothy L. Cornstubble. Trainers William F. Leach and Gene Teferter were fined \$200 each for failure to bring their horses to the paddock for their races. Two jockeys, Donald Knight and Leroy Coombs, were fined \$50 each for failure to have control of their mounts away from the gate. Jockey Steven F. Fuller was suspended three racing days, May 25-27 and Danny J. Laverne was suspended four racing days, May 25-29 for careless riding and interference, both resulting in their mounts being disqualified from first to second. Also, the horse Oh Lawton Oh has been denied entry into New Mexico pending clarification of his age, and Azure Sno was reinstated after the track veterinarian reported he is capable of racing without medication.

Double B Express became the sixth horse of the season to record two wins Sunday when he captured the \$8,335 Mescalero Apache Handicap in a tremendous stretch drive. Coming from six lengths off the pace, jockey Danny Summerow guided Double B Express past Miler Dunes and Be A Chum to win the 5 1/4 furlong feature. Double B Express won an allowance test covering 5 1/4 furlongs last week. Other two time winners this early in the season include Mr. Afon Bug, Cut Shot, Mr. Easy Street, Dualistic and

Supply Boat Johnny. Trait Driver, with Tony Trujillo, captured a 3/4 furlong sprint Sunday, honoring country and western singer Faron Young. The popular vocalist was in Ruidoso for a show and dropped by the track to present the winning trophy. Other guests to the track included Wendell Chino, president of the Mescalero Apache Tribal Council and his wife, Chino presented the winning trophy in the Mescalero Apache Handicap, which was won by Double B Express.



### Jockey/Trainer of the week

 Tireless Gary Sumpter survived a spill Friday, then went on to capture Jockey-of-the-Week honors while William F. Leach extended his lead in the trainer standings with five wins, earning him the Trainer-of-the-Week title at Ruidoso Downs.  
 Sumpter, who is averaging almost nine mounts per day, took home seven winners, including one stakes champion, to run away with the honors. Richard Biekel followed with six wins, including the Memorial Day Handicap.  
 Leach trained five winners during the holiday weekend. His first win came Friday in the Norgor Futurity trials where

Cut Shot set the fastest qualifying time. Leach then entered three winners Saturday, including two in a row in the seventh and eighth races. He wrapped up the honor when Go Go, ridden by Sumpter, won impressively Monday.

Leach's five wins doubled his previous season total, now giving him 10 wins and the lead in the overall trainer standings. Leach also has three second-place finishes and one third.

Sumpter's biggest win came Saturday in the \$8,650 Mr. Jet Moore Stakes, covering 400 yards. Despite a poor start, Sumpter guided Lucks Image Girl to a nose victory over Top Deck Stakes champ Lillie Bug. It was Sumpter's second win of the day.

Friday, in the fourth division of the Norgor trials, Sumpter's mount tripped over a fallen horse, throwing Sumpter to the ground. A bit sore, Sumpter was excused from his next mount, but returned to ride in the next three. He recorded 11 total mounts Friday and Saturday each before slacking off to eight Sunday and four Monday.

Sumpter scored dual wins Friday, Saturday and Sunday with one victory circle ride Monday.

His record for the season stands at 14-10-10 in 94 mounts.

Racing at Ruidoso Downs continues Friday with the second consolation of the Kansas Futurity as the highlight. The \$48,220 Norgor Futurity and the first consolation of the Kansas Futurity top Saturday's action. The Norgor Futurity stretches four furlongs while the two Kansas Futurity consolations cover 350 yards.

Sunday, it's the \$525,000 Kansas Futurity grand finale, which is the first jewel in the two-year-old Triple Crown for quarter horses.

First post Friday and Saturday is 1:30 p.m., with a 1 p.m., post in effect Sunday.

**AFTER 11 RACE DAYS** the total handle at Ruidoso Downs is \$4,078,044, for a daily wagering average of \$370,731 and a per race betting average of \$29,551 over 138 races. Last year, after 10 racing days and 126 races, the handle was \$3,868,196, daily average \$386,820 and \$30,699 per race. The current daily wagering average is down 4.1 percent from last year.

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
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# Seco Mighty Talk eying Kansas Futurity

 Fatherly instincts led Charles R. "Bob" Weik to Seco Mighty Talk. And now the full sister to Seco Mia may be leading Weik to his first share of a quarter horse Triple Crown title.  
 Seco Mighty Talk established the fastest qualifying time for the \$526,500 Kansas Futurity, which is set to run at Ruidoso Downs Sunday. The chestnut filly covered the 350 yard trial in 18.20 seconds against a stiff headwind and on a slow track.  
 The Kansas Futurity is the first jewel in the quarter horse Triple Crown. It is followed by the \$450,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity July 22 and the \$1,200,000 All-American Futurity September 3.  
 Weik, an electrical contractor in San Antonio, Texas has had moderate success in the racing business. Louton's Angel took seventh in the Kansas Futurity, won the 1978 Rainbow Futurity Consolation and placed sixth in the All-American. Last year, Weik teamed up with Frank Merrill of Purcell, Oklahoma to own Holma Maid, who finished third in the All-American.  
 In 1974, Weik owned Rebel Rainbow, who reached the finals of the Kansas and Rainbow Futurities but never finished

stronger than ninth.  
 A few years ago, Weik had his eye set on Seco Mia, but couldn't urge David Cryan, also of San Antonio, to sell a partnership in her. Seco Mia didn't fare well as a two-year-old, however, she came back the following year to win the Top Deck Stakes and place third in the All-American Derby.  
 Weik was impressed with the breeding of Seco Mia and later purchased a share in the sire, Mighty Te. He then sought out some of Mighty Te's offspring.  
 One day, while watching some workouts on a Texas bush track, Weik noticed Seco Mighty Talk, who again was owned by Cryan. This time Weik convinced Cryan, who now owns Seco Mighty Talk's dam, Talked About, to sell 50 percent of the filly.  
 "My main interests were: I liked the filly when I saw her and I was interested in the offspring. I wanted to see that she had the best shot possible," Weik said.  
 In late April on the Vol Veele Downs track, Seco Mighty Talk won a trial heat for the Alamo Quarter Horse Breeders Association Futurity, but failed to qualify for the final. She later took fourth in consolation.  
 "Her first time out I thought she ran

extremely well," trainer Hugh L. Tucker, who owns a fourth of Mighty Te along with longtime friend Billy Reed, said. "But her time wasn't fast enough and then she slipped out of the gates in the consolation."  
 Seco Mighty Talk traveled to Ruidoso with the intention of gaining entry into the Kansas Futurity, or at least one of the two consolations. The five fastest horses from each day of trials advanced to the finale. There were a total of 299 head entered.  
 Running from the third post in the fourth qualifying division, Seco Mighty Talk — going as a 13-1 outsider — defeated Rebel Killoqua and My Afton Bug, a pair of fillies who have won almost \$100,000 together.  
 "I knew she was a real good filly but I didn't know how she would measure up to this kind of field," Tucker said. "Making the top five, that's asking a lot of a horse. We knew she was a bonafide runner and she did run well, but I still don't think she got off all that well. Rebel Killoqua got off much better."  
 "Surprised? Yes, I was surprised," Weik said after seeing the time. "I felt we would qualify for some part of the Kansas. I had expected she would come in a close second to Rebel Killoqua."  
 Guiding Seco Mighty Talk was a crack rider from the bush circuit, Steve Fuller.  
 "I saw him ride in Laredo for the first time and he really impressed me," Tucker said. "I saw him ride about two weeks later. I came home and told my wife I had seen the greatest young rider ever."  
 Fuller was the nation's leading non-partisual jockey, recording 50 wins more than his nearest foe.  
 Despite the fact Seco Mighty Talk set the fastest qualifying time, Tucker is a little hesitant to label her as the Kansas favorite.  
 "I've really liked her from the time we broke her in. She's the most athletic filly I've ever seen, but you have to look hard at the horses that have made the most money," Tucker said. "I was really impressed with Favorite Past Time and Easy Azures. Still, there's not a clear cut favorite."  
 Easy Azures was the third fastest qualifier, behind Rebel Killoqua, and Favorite Past Time was fourth.

**Beautiful Memorial Season**

This is being sent to you on May twenty-eight, and I can scarcely remember a more beautiful Memorial Day season. During the past week or so there have fallen some very wonderful rains, a very unusual thing for the month of May.

My memories of May here in the vale back through the years have been of hot dry days, with no wind. The creek would be getting very low due to the lack of rain and the snow melt on the mountain having been over with long since. On these dry May days you could smell the golden Algerita blooms everywhere in the still air, mingled with the incense of the pinon twigs baked out by the hot sun. Up from the gently-murmuring stream the cool fragrance of the wild grape blossoms would float up to you, so strong on the air of a thirsty land that it was almost like a refreshing drink offered by the wild grape vine winding up through the walnut trees. The grape vine close by the riverside, with its roots in the moist earth, would send its cheerful blossom message out across the dry earth, as if to show its thankfulness for the blessing of the running stream.

Yes, it seemed in days gone by here in the land of the pinon and pine that during the month of May, the mesa country, the foot hills, and the mountains stood dreaming patiently, basking in the warm sun waiting with calm faith for the rains of July.

The pinon and cedar trees, and the oak brush on high, looked down happily upon the oak and walnut and box elder trees by the river. The trees and bushes of the hillsides have learned through long experience how to conserve their strength through the dry month of May and the still-drier month of June. With roots deep in the steep mountain sides they have strength stored up from rainy seasons and snow winters. Little do they care for two or three dry months when they are able to survive a whole year of drought.

During the evening, just between the gloaming and the twilight, you would hear a little song of summer — the call of the little frog beside his little pool in the slow winding stream, calling in Spanish for rain:

"Querero agua." (I want waaa-water)

How different from the May days of other years is this day on May twenty eight.

The grass everywhere on the mountain meadows and hillsides is green like in July. The oak brush is putting out new growth, making the hillsides shine. The pinons are putting forth little tassels of new growth that send a sweet and piny incense into the moist air. The little sprouts of new pinon growth are like little golden candles on the branches, making

the smaller pinons like little Christmas trees decorated by Mother Nature in the late spring time.

The Indian paint brush, and the dark blue wild verbena and the white mountain daisy flash the colors of our flag all through the green world during our Memorial Day season.

**The River Sings A Song of Rain**

As we say, so often in the month of May, the river trees look down into the stream and see it flowing slowly and more slowly, wondering if it might go dry in June. Today the river is colored with the red and amber colors of many canyons up the way — and the river trees close to the bank are delighted with the sight of river rushing past their feet. They cast roots farther into the bank, taking a stronger hold on the ground.

**The Little Calf And The River**

The youngest calf, born May eleven, is the very picture and spirit of happiness and the pride of life. He is with his mother and yearling sister here in the pasture by the home.

The other calves are all up the hill, so little Spot Jaw has no one his age to play with. Therefore he thinks he is grown up. He walks along wherever the other cows go, and eats the new grass like a grown bull.

When he was only a week old I saw him across the creek with his mother. The river was pretty swift even then, and it seemed he would get washed away if he crossed in a deep place. His mother stepped in, and in he jumped. The water came half way up his side, but he came on across, bracing himself against the current.

Today, it seemed that the river was up too high for the little fellow, so I went down to have a look. There were his mother and the yearling calf across the creek among the tall grass. But where was Spot Jaw? His mother sensed that I was worried so she went on down the river. Still the little calf was nowhere to be seen. The mother cow then crossed and the yearling followed and then galloped up the hill.

They headed toward a clump of cedar bushes, and there you could see a little red and white figure raise its head. Little Spot Jaw had been dozing right where his mother had left him, telling him to wait till she got back.

The young mother cow knew that there were places in the river where the calf might have trouble crossing. No doubt she wanted the calf to learn to stay away from the river during rainy seasons when the creek might rise.

Cows are wise, faithful, and devoted mothers; and the little calves are devoted too, and very obedient — quick to catch the slightest message of voice or movement of their mother.

I see the three lying under a cedar here near the house in mid afternoon, the picture of devotion, trust and "sweet content".

This will reach you on the threshold of the glorious month of June. Let us do all we can to bring happiness to one another; and let us rejoice in the beautiful weather and thank God for all our blessings.

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
