

King: 'I'll urge NMSU change airport stance'

Favorite Past Time wins Kansas

Favorite Past Time, a filly owned by Dr. Jack Frost of Centralia, Illinois got away cleanly in Sunday's 29th running of the Kansas Futurity at Ruidoso Downs and stayed on top all the way.

The filly kept clear of the bumping and scrambling which affected some of the horses in the 10-head field and ended the 350 yard dash with a precious neck lead.

Harley Crosby, a 25 year veteran, was in the saddle. Paul Walters does the training.

The Kansas Futurity, the first leg of the Triple Crown for two-year-olds, offered a gross purse of \$28,500 (including the two consolation). The winner's slice came out to a resounding \$173,659.

In the process, Favorite Past Time became the one to watch in the upcoming \$450,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity.

Favorite Past Time covered the distance in 17.99 seconds and returned tote prices of \$18.40, \$10 and \$5.20. Seco Mighty Talk, a 4-1 shot, closed with a big attack to finish second, but the filly was disqualified for interference and placed third.

This moved Pa Pa Wheelie—who was afflicted twice by bumping and in-

terference—into second place. The runner up slot was worth \$72,488. Pa Pa Wheelie is owned by B. N. Adams, an electrical contractor from Houston, Texas. Danny LaVerne was in the saddle. The mutual payoffs: \$5.40 and \$3.60.

Seco Mighty Talk was dropped to third by the stewards and had to be content with a pay check of \$33,897. The chestnut filly is owned by David Cryan and Charles Welk of San Antonio, Texas. The show price was \$3,600. Steve Fuller was up.

At about the halfway point of the dash, a spectacular fall almost threw a wet blanket on the race. Easy Tam, a filly directed by Jerry Burgess as nearly 10-1, was close to Favorite Past Time and running for all she was worth. Favorite Past Time was on the rail, having come out of the No. 1 slot. Easy Tam came out of the No. 2. The filly suddenly appeared to lose her balance, took a few uncertain strides, then lost her legs completely and went into a whiplash summersault. Jockey Burgess was rudely snapped to the turf, and Easy Tam went tumbling over him. Easy Tam groggily regained her feet, and tried to resume the race. Burgess was taken by track ambulance to Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, where early reports indicated he was shaken up but not seriously injured.

Here's the way the also-rans checked in, with purse money earned: 4th—Tonya Jay Bar (owned by Thomas Demmitt of Plains, Kansas, earning \$23,989; 5th—Washita Ted (Maureen and Lee Ware of Ruidoso), \$19,295; 6th—Charge It Papa (James Keng of Giddings, Texas), \$18,252; 7th—Great As Charger (Leland Hutton of Jefferson, Ohio), \$17,209; 8th—Easy Azuree (John May and Mack Yates of Ft. Stockton and Cherokee, Texas), \$16,688; 9th—Rebel Killoqua (Wayne and Jewel Scott of Tahlequah, Oklahoma), \$15,645; 10—Easy Tam (Darrell Kisse of Mlana, Oklahoma), \$14,602.

Easy Azuree raced as a lukewarm favorite at just over 5-2.

Pa Pa Wheelie, considering all the problems he ran into, turned in an excellent job. The colt broke a little crookedly, brushing Charge It Papa on his left. When he straightened out, Seco Mighty Talk had moved in his way. This caused the colt to pull up and circle around. But he got in high gear once again.

When he finally began to move, Seco Mighty Talk drifted out and brushed him

severely. This maneuver caused Pa Pa Wheelie to take up once again. The colt gamely came on once again—but even if he hadn't been bothered that second time, it seemed doubtful he would catch the high-flying Favorite Past Time.

The latter appeared to sew things up right at the start, getting out of the gate with a jet-propelled blast-off. She held about a length on the field right at the start, and kept churning up the dust. She was well in command all the way, although the competition was making up ground at the wire.

Favorite Past Time now hold a record of four wins and a second from five career starts. Her total earnings stand at \$191,157.

MAXFIELD, A 17-1 outsider, scrambled into an early lead in Saturday's \$76,139 Kansas Quarter Horse Futurity at Ruidoso Downs and held on for a length victory.

Maxfield is owned by Hubert Vestel and Dolores Gentempo of Houston. J. C. Wiley was in the saddle.

The colt, a son of the great Tiny's Gay,

zipped over the 350 yards in a tailwind clocking of 18.13 seconds and earned \$12,436. The mutual returns amounted to \$37.40, \$14.40 and \$6.40.

Johnny Drake, a 12-1 shot handled by Richard Bickel, nosed out Chick In Command (15-1) for place. Johnny Drake refunded \$14.80 and \$9. The show price on Chick In Command was \$4.60.

Rocket Jet Bug, a prohibitive favorite, broke sluggishly and was unable to make up any significant ground. He finished fifth in the only disappointing performance, so far, in his brilliant career.

Saturday's program also included the first running of the \$55,658 Norogro Thoroughbred Futurity at four furlongs.

The win went to Cut Shot, the heavy favorite ridden by Henry Uriegas. Cut Shot led all the way in an impressive performance, paid a meager \$3, and earned \$27,829. The colt is owned by the partnership of W. L. Clifton Jr., John May and Mack Yates.

Garbage, water rates increased effective July 1

The passage of Resolution 79-9 May 29, by the village trustees, increases the charges for pickup of solid waste, effective July 1.

The new residential rate will be \$3.75 monthly, up 25 cents from the previous charge.

Commercial pickup charges will be \$6 per pickup, per container. A business with one container, with pickup made once a week, will pay \$6.

A business having one container, emptied oftener than once a week, will pay \$8 per pickup.

The rate for multiple containers will be \$8 per container, per pickup. A business having five containers, picked up by the village crew three times weekly, would pay \$90 per week for the service.

The new water rate, effective July 1, will be \$3.50 for the first 1,000 gallons with a charge of \$1.10 per each 1,000 gallons additional.


Another change puts the minimum water bill, for less than 1,000 gallons, at \$3.50 with a 50 cent minimum monthly billing, for a total of \$4 per month minimum usage.

Clerk's office hub of village activities

Jim Hine has been the clerk for the village of Ruidoso nearly 20 years. Hine's main job is to coordinate all village offices for all facets of municipal government provided through elected officials.

Hine also works as a liaison between department heads and village trustees to see that city ordinances are carried out.

Hine's office is responsible for securing federal grant programs and as much state funding as possible. This fiscal year, the village expects to receive approximately \$500,000 in federal aid.

The sewage treatment plant, which was recently approved in a bond election, will be funded 75 percent with federal funds, or about \$4 million, Hine said.

Most state funding is used for upgrading sewer, water or street systems and several buildings have been constructed using both federal and state money.

Hine said the village hopes to acquire an asphaltic plant in the future which would give the village freedom to mix materials when they are needed rather than depending on someone else to mix them.

Also in the future, Hine said construction of a new village hall is inevitable. "The existing village hall has been outgrown. This building is 30 years old, and it has served us well, but its days are numbered," Hine said.

Looking to Farmer's Home Administration for a loan, Hine said plans are to erect a new village hall on property near the airport. "We own that land, and we really can't afford outlay for more land," Hine said.

When that move is made, the old village hall will serve public safety officials and emergency medical services. Eventually, Hine said, a new building to house public safety offices will be built.

In his years of work as a municipal employee, Hine said a constant problem the village faces is that 60 percent of the property owners live elsewhere during part of each year and services must be provided which meet their needs, as well as those of permanent residents.

Main services provided by the village include sanitation, water, garbage collection, fire protection, emergency medical service, airport, recreation and

police protection.

"I feel that in Ruidoso, with our basic industry of tourism, meeting these needs is more of a challenge than in a localized form of government where tourism isn't the main trade.

"Here, the village has to prepare not only for permanent residents but also for the huge numbers who come in for special occasions," Hine said.

The growth rate of Ruidoso, which has accelerated in recent years, has made necessary rapid policy changes which Hine feels will "ultimately benefit the public we serve."

Hine said over the years, elected trustees "have had a deep appreciation for

Ruidoso; therefore, it makes our work as administrators easier. We are in a better position to satisfy the unselfish needs of the people who come here," Hine said.

Hine said this support extends to the voting public; "No general obligation bond issue has ever been turned down."

Hine said he feels the greatest challenge for the village will be to continue to take care of the basic needs of the public.

Hine gained experience in public administration at Littlefield Texas, where he was a school administrator before moving to Ruidoso. He holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Hardin-Simmons College in Abilene, Texas and a Master of Arts Degree from Texas Tech.

KENW films Mescalero Pow Wow

With the assistance of local residents, some creative planning and a lot of technical know-how, Keith Kolb of public television station KENW, Portales, hopes to produce a film which will capture the "essence" of an Indian Pow Wow.

Kolb, along with two crew members from Portales and another from Santa Fe, were at Mescalero this weekend, filming a one hour color documentary about the event.

The producer said he hoped to accomplish his goal (capturing the essence) through creative editing of the film. The dancing competition will serve as the major theme of the film, but the dance segments will be "intercut", Kolb said, with sequences which focus on other parts of the Pow Wow.

These will include interviews with participants, demonstrations of native cooking and the Indian arts and crafts displays on the grounds. The point of view of both participant and spectator will be considered, Kolb added.

The raw tapes will be made available to the Mescalero schools, Kolb said, and a copy of the finished film will be provided to the tribal council.

A copy will also be made available to the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce, he said, to assist with promotional efforts for next year's Pow Wow.

The crew used a camera mounted atop the KENW van, in addition to a more portable "mini-cam" operated by Santa Fe crew member B. J. Smith. Waburn Martin of the Bent Mescalero school provided them with a "feed" of the announcer's voice and the singing and drumming.

Kolb said cooperation of all those involved with the Pow Wow had been extremely good. Vernon Simmons acted as a liaison for the crew, Kolb said, and both Ed Jungbluth and Bill Hirschfeld of the Chamber helped with contacts and other arrangements. Hirschfeld acted as associate producer of the film.

Kolb said he was also grateful to Wheeler Gayton and Freddy Kaydabzine and the tribal council for their "super cooperation." He said the crew was given a "nice physical layout" for the filming as well as assistance with the setting up of equipment. Much of the "leg work" usually needed for such a film was already done by the time they arrived Friday, he said.

Although rain threatened the three day competition, it did not become a major hindrance to the crew.

"I was really bummed-out about the weather," Kolb said, "but it didn't start raining Friday (night) until we had already lost the light anyway."

The crew was unable to film the night performances, Kolb said. The mercury vapor lights at the area were insufficient for television film, and KENW's lights were inadequate for such a large outdoor area, he explained.

Other than the intermittent failure of the air conditioning system in the van, the crew experienced few equipment problems, he said. No specific date for completion and airing of the film was released.

Forest Service issuing free material permits

Permits will be required to take firewood, trees for transplant, cones and rock materials from Lincoln National Forest after July 1, according to Earl Blann, Forester, Smokey Bear Ranger District.

Blann said free permits will be issued because free materials were being taken from the forest and sold, which is a violation of the free use regulations. "Several citations have been issued and are due to be heard by the United States Magistrate's Court," Blann said.

Special areas will be marked for free use wood gathering under permit. Since May 1, Forest Service officials have reclaimed several cords of firewood, more than 60 trees for transplanting and two tons of moss rock, all taken illegally, Blann said.

A crew is now making an inventory of pinon and juniper wood supplies and when completed, will allow the Forest Service to regulate cutting so an adequate supply of firewood will always be available.

"For now, we don't have a limit on the number of permits we will issue. If we find our annual needs exceed our supply, we will have to adjust for that," Blann said.



Moore heads cancer crusade

Ken Moore, administrator at the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital, was named cancer crusade chairman Friday by the East Lincoln Chapter of the American Cancer Society (ACS). "I feel it's a real honor to be asked to be the crusade chairman," Moore said in his acceptance speech. "We've set a goal of \$2,300 and I would be very happy if we could double or triple that during the crusade."

The local ACS fund drive begins June 15 and lasts two weeks. "We have a great

need for a public education program in Ruidoso," Moore said, adding that some of the money raised in the crusade could be well-spent for the purpose of reaching out to cancer-victims and their families.

Moore said the cancer screening clinic has met with a lot of success in Ruidoso—more than 500 people have been screened in the last 12 months—and said the program is now being sponsored jointly by local doctors and the ACS. "It is preventive medicine and the cost is nominal," Moore said.

Full moon programs at White Sands

"An endless sea of brilliant, white gypsum dunes by full moon. Certainly one of the most unusual experiences in the Southwest." So stated Superintendent Donald Harper of White Sands National Monument, in announcing the first series of summer full moon programs for 1979.

These special events will be held in the dunes picnic area at 8:45 p. m., on Saturday, Sunday and Monday, June 9, 10 and 11. Following the programs, the dunes area will be open until midnight.

Dr. Bernard McNamara, New Mexico State University astronomer, Las Cruces, is featured Saturday. Presenting a program called the "Birth and Death of Stars," McNamara will trace a star from its formative period through its nuclear burning lifetime and its final death. Covered in this unusual talk will be white dwarf stars, super-novas and black holes. McNamara has a Ph.D. in astronomy at the University of California, is a member of Phi Beta Kappa and the American Astronomical Society. An innovative scientist, McNamara teaches a new class at New Mexico State University called "Exotic Astronomy."

Sunday, Dr. Karl Wuerschling of New Mexico State University, Alamogordo staff, will give a slide talk called, "Man and Nature in the Tularosa Basin." Dr. Wuerschling is widely known in area historical circles. He holds a Ph.D. in geography from the University of Michigan and is well qualified to discuss the origin of the unique phenomena of the white sands. Wuerschling is best known in the area for spearheading the movement which resulted in the opening of the Sacramento Mountains Historical Museum in Cloudercroft, New Mexico.

Rounding out this series of special programs will be Mark Wimberly, well known area archeologist. Monday, Wimberly is president of Human Systems Research of Tularosa, New Mexico and will present a slide talk on "Pre-historic Man in the Great White Sands." Little known facts of man's early occupation of the Tularosa Basin will be revealed. Wimberly has a B. A. degree from the University of New Mexico and has done several comprehensive studies in this area. Wimberly recently completed an archeological survey of the western and little known portion of White Sands National Monument.

"This promises to be a top notch slate of speakers, so come on out and learn little known facts while you view the white sands at its best, by the full moon," Harper said. "When in the monument area, be sure and tune your car radio to 1610 AM for latest information."

Teachers are also available for several other courses, which should start in the near future. They include photography, tennis, furniture repair and refinishing, macrame, table tennis and camping and hiking.

The Community Center will hold an open meeting June 19 at the Capitan school cafeteria, beginning with a potluck dinner at 6:30 p. m. Anyone interested in teaching or enrolling in a class is urged to attend.







Emergency stockings save Red River fish

The Department of Game and Fish is stocking approximately 250,000 trout ahead of schedule to prevent them from being suffocated by silt brought into the state's largest hatchery by the flooding Red River.

R. L. Brashears, chief of the department's Fisheries Division, said losses among smaller fish at the Red River Hatchery, located below Questa, may run as high as 20 percent. Losses among larger fish will be less, but no final figures on losses or damage to hatchery facilities will be available for some time.

Stocking of the fish now will severely curtail the number of trout planted in streams and other lakes later this summer, Brashears said.

"Most of the fish were in the sub-catchable size, about seven to nine inches in length," Brashears said. "These were being reared for plantings scheduled later this summer. We won't remove any waters from our stocking schedules, but the number of fish available is down."

Because of the muddy, high water in most of the northern trout streams, the rescued fish are being planted in lakes, including McAllister, Cabresto, Charette, Clayton, Chloesa, Storrie, Maloya, Santa Cruz, Maxwell #13 and Eagle Nest.

"We had no choice but to move the fish

out or lose a very large percentage of them to suffocation," Brashears said. "We brought fish trucks in from all over the state to help move them out."

There were reports that some people were taking advantage of the situation, hooking or even netting over-limits of fish immediately after stockings. Game and Fish officers were increasing patrols to help curb the poaching.

The Red River flowed over spring-water collection boxes, muddying the springs, Brashears said, and washed out at least two of the four pipelines supplying water to the hatchery. Runoff water was also entering the hatchery through one of the broken pipes.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—They are all there, spread out as they would be on a bill of fare—every statute in the so-called "red books," plus opinions of the Supreme Court and the Court of Appeals which bear on those laws.

All you need to do is punch the right buttons and ask the right questions, and what you need to know is pumped out by the computer and printed on the cathode ray screen right before your very eyes.

By late this year, the brand-new 1979 statutes will be added to the program, along with opinions of various Attorneys General over the years.

So where do you go to plug into all this information? Well, for one place, to a back office at The Governor's Place, fourth floor of the Roundhouse, where Gina Federici, attractive young computer-question-asker, can get the answers for you.

Sorry, not just anybody can walk in. You have to be a cabinet secretary, or the attorney or legislative liaison for a department to use the magic machine.

At least that's the way it is for now. A day may come when attorney's offices all over the state are plugged into the program.

Here are some of the kinds of things you can do.

Say somebody wants to know what people the governor gets to name to what boards and commissions.

You decide for yourself that most such groups will probably appear in law under titles which contain the words "board of." So you ask the machine how many times and where those particular words appear

in the statutes. After a very brief cogitation, it gives you an answer, which turns out to be 1800 citations — too many to be searched line by line.

So you try a new tack. How about the words "governor's appointment"? This time you get only 96 citations. So you ask the machine to print out each one of them on the screen for you to check in detail. From them you can begin to build your list of posts the governor gets to fill.

Or say John Salvo, at Commerce and Industry, has a question: Does the law state at any point what shall be a passing grade on the tests given contractors before they are licensed? Some say it does, some say it doesn't.

You go through the same process. Ask where "contractors licensing" is mentioned in the law. Then call up each of the citations given you and search them for references to testing. In a very few minutes you have your answer: if a specified passing grade is required, it does not come from law and must be set only by regulations within the department, which can therefore be changed without action by the Legislature. That's just what John Salvo needed to know.

Another convenient use is with proposed legislation. If you're contemplating a law which will repeal or amend some present one, you ask to see everything on the subject at issue. That makes sure you achieve two things: you know exactly what the law says on the subject; and if you go ahead with a planned change, you know every previous section which must be repealed or amended.

Like any computer, this does the "busy work" faster than human brains can. It was a great help during the last legislative session keeping track of the financial impact of every act introduced and everything passed into law. That kind of hour-by-hour running total can prevent some horrendous blunders.

Computers are inhuman, with inhuman faults, but they can be used to make government operate more smoothly.

Among the things not making sense in Ruidoso is the fact that the people in the community are refusing something for nothing; with that something being the free Emergency Evacuation Routes maps that could, conceivably, save their lives in the event of forest fire or other life-threatening disaster.

The Committee for Insuring Ruidoso's Environment (ComFIRE) has had printed a sufficient quantity of evacuation maps so that each household, and other types of living and business edifices, can have one on display.

This is all a part of ComFIRE's concerted plan to cope with forest fire, and the evacuation of residents, should that danger occur.

The maps, which have been offered for several weeks, are generally gathering dust at real estate offices, Smokey Bear Ranger District, Ruidoso Fire Department, KRRR and The Ruidoso News.

Certainly, most residents know which route to take to reach safety in the event of forest fire. But do they have knowledge of an obscure secondary route in the event the main thoroughfare is closed?

What about strangers? If the map was prominently displayed, these guests could quickly pinpoint their location and determine which route to follow should an evacuation be necessary.

ComFIRE's maps represent a lot of work by a lot of people concerned with everyone's welfare. Odd, isn't it, that people don't seem to be willing to pick up a map that could result in the life saved being their own? —CD

Well, not very long ago a majority of the Arizonans questioned in a statewide poll on this subject opted for sticking with the limit established by Congress as a safety and fuel conservation measure. And now legislative action in both California and Oklahoma has rejected proposals to increase the speed limit in those states to 65 miles an hour.

Many drivers in all parts of the country champ at that 55 mph bit. A lot of them take it in their teeth and drive at maybe 65 much of the time they're on the road. But Americans in great numbers have come to realize that the speed limit has the effect intended: it saves lives and reduces fuel consumption. The actions in California and Oklahoma reflect this responsible view. —Nannigards Daily News
