CHAMBER URGING PUBLIC ATTEND

Airport meeting tonight

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) agreed Thursday to call a public meeting tonight at 7:30 in the Ruidoso Library to allow local residents, area and state elected officials and New Mexico State University (NMSU) representatives to air their views on the controversy surrounding the proposed regional airport on the Fort Stanton mesa.

The call for the public meeting came at the urging of Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce president Benny Coulston, and in the wake of a fatal air crash May 29.

Killed in the accident was Charles Ron Howard, Ruidoso, operator of CATV, Inc. Howard's son James, 18, and employee Alan Morel, also 18, were both seriously injured.

Coulston said that in telephone conversations with various "political aides" concerning the crash, "it began to dawn on me that every damn political representative of the state of New Mexico is in favor of an airport for Ruidoso, but not one is willing to take a stand supporting the most reasonable (site B) location, probably because of pressure from the university system, the Cattlemen's Association and the Bureau of Land Management."

Coulston, along with several members of the SBAC, expressed pessimistic views about the outcome of the appeal, now pending before the United States Secretary of the Interior, which requests acreage on the mesa for the airport.

"We're still on square one," he said. He referred to the May inspection of the sites by a regional department of Interior (DOI) representative, and other officials involved as "the viewing of the body", and added that "when the Secretary of the Interior holds the graveside rites, we'll still be on square one."

"We have sat here and let our destiny be decided by the University system, the board of regents (of NMSU) and the state Secretary of Agriculture," he added. "If there's any way to put the politicians on the spot, I say let's do it."

The commission members agreed with Coulston that they had "everything to gain and nothing to lose," by calling the meeting and voted to support the idea.

SBAC member George Shoemaker said that he expected some opposition to surface at the general meeting, but that "we might as well get it out in the open, so we know where we stand."

In a discussion about the recent air fatality, SBAC chairman Richard Hall said he had written letters to both Governor Bruce King and Secretary Andrus, advising them "We feel that continued operations from the Ruidoso Airport have those inherent risks exemplified by those conditions leading to the fatal crash." The final sentence of the letter to King asked "Can you help us?"

Hall said the pilot of the crashed aircraft was a highly experienced local flyer, and that "if it can happen to him, I'm wondering how soon it will happen again." He added that if the departure had been from the Fort Stanton mesa, he was "thoroughly convinced that he would have been successful in making an emergency landing."

Commissioner Wyndham Runningwater reported to the group on a recent trip to Washington, D.C. Although he made the trip for tribal business, he said he "touched base" with the DOI and talked with Larry Morgan, aide to Congressman Harold Runnels about the airport situation.

Runningwater said Morgan gave him some hope that if an unfavorable decision is handed down by Secretary Cecil Andrus, Runnels might be willing to make some

effort in their behalf through legislation. Runnels is a high ranking member of the public lands committee, he said.

Runningwater and Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Chamber of Commerce discussed the possibility of the SBAC and other local officials traveling to Washington to advance their cause with the DOI. Some of his contacts at DOI were surprised, Runningwater said, that few such trips had been made in the past.

Jungbluth said he was "afraid some people in the community had been depending on the tribe "to secure the needed land." He said the county, the village of Ruidoso and all the surrounding communities should continue to work on the project in a joint effort. "We should never slack up," he added.

Jungbluth agreed with Runningwater that perhaps it would be advisable for local people to travel to Washington to discuss the matters with the DOI officials directly.

"We've been blowing a lot of smoke at them," he said, but we haven't gone up there to build the fire under them."

A brief discussion was held concerning the possible cost of acquiring the Site A lands on the mesa. Hall said that the owner of the majority of the land, Fred Dantonio, was reluctant to sell the lands for the purpose of an airport.

Dantonio reportedly had set a price of more than four million dollars for the land last year. The SBAC members agreed that because of inflation and new development on the mesa, that price could now be considered "just a starting point."

Hall reiterated the commission's stand that "changes in time and circumstances" had rendered site A unfeasible not only because of the high cost of acquiring the lands, but also the improbability of gaining approval of an environmental impact statement for Site A.

Lodger's Tax Committee plans advertising campaign in Texas

In an effort to generate more early summer business, the Lodger's Tax Committee of Ruidoso voted Thursday to spend \$5,000 on an advertising campaign which will be aimed at markets in Texas.

Ed Jungbluth, executive director at the Chamber of Commerce, said Chamber members have noted a generally light season so far, but cited several reasons for lack of visitors.

Jungbluth said steady rains and generally cool weather across many parts of Texas have influenced people to stay home until the skies clear. He also said that most schools in Texas closed last week and expects business to pick up now.

"I think everyone has noticed that people aren't making reservations as far in advance as they used to; they're waiting to see what's going to happen with the gas situation," Jungbluth said.

The main factors, the committee decided, have had enough impact on Ruidoso to merit a June campaign to urge vacationers to visit Ruidoso.

Jungbluth requested \$15,000 for three tourist advertisement campaigns, but the committee felt one would be adequate. "I think we'll have a capacity crowd here after July 4," Slover Cape, committee member, said. "I think we'll only need one fund drive for now. If we need another one, we can always vote more funds for it later."

Advertising will be bought in print and broadcast media in Dallas-Fort Worth, Lubbock, Midland, Odessa, El Paso and other areas usually covered in the

Chamber's winter ad campaigns. The campaign will be seen between June 20 and 24.

The committee also approved a \$600

expenditure for the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skippers to pay for advertising the mule races to be held in Ruidoso October 5-7.

May building permits miss \$1 million mark

Chamber seeks comments on new jet airport

The Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the 7:30 meeting tonight in the Ruidoso Library, is seeking comments from the public on the current effort by the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission to locate a new jet capable regional airport on Fort Stanton mesa.

"Our situation is," Chamber president Bennie Coulston said, "New Mexico State University and the Bureau of Land Management are opposing construction of Sierra Blanca Regional Airport on mesa lands, on the premise the airport would interfere with experiments underway on the growth of grass and cactus and rainfall statistics."

"The airport commission contends that even the maximum possible acreage, 3,000 acres, if the need ever arises, out of the 26,000 acres of public use lands on the mesa would not significantly interfere with NMSU's experiments. In addition the commission has stressed the economic impact the airport would provide in Lincoln County through increased tourism and air freight, besides the employment of county residents to operate the facility.

"In my opinion, the paramount issue involving the new airport on Fort Stanton mesa is safety. Safely, not only for the residents of Ruidoso but for those people flying in and out of our airport and forced to use the existing facilities."

Coulston "is urging" county residents to immediately "take the few minutes of time necessary" to write, stating personal opinions regarding the new airport, to the following:

"If each of us would take the time to contact any, or all of these individuals, especially the NMSU regents," Coulston said, "to express their opinions on the new airport, it could have considerable impact on the final decision of utilizing, or not utilizing, at the onset, about 500 of those 26,000 acres of mesa land to provide Lincoln County with a jet capable, safe to land and take off from, regional airport."

Theft, arson, rape charged over weekend

Area law enforcement personnel were kept busy this weekend with reports of theft, arson and rape.

Effie Watson and Carolyn Hammond Hendricks were arrested in the early morning hours Sunday and charged with larceny under \$100 in connection with an incident at the Winner's Circle. A spokesman for the Criminal Investigation Division (CID) of the Ruidoso Police reported that wallets were taken from several purses belonging to patrons at the business. The two women were to be

arraigned before Judge Jim Wheeler Monday morning on \$200 bond.

Nina Jones of Ruidoso was arrested about 8 a.m., Sunday and charged with arson. She is accused of starting two fires in two separate buildings on her property. Damage was less than \$1000, according to the CID spokesman. She was also to be arraigned before Judge Wheeler Monday morning on \$2,500 bond.

Ruidoso Downs police are investigating the reported rape of a 16-year-old girl early Saturday morning. No details of the crime are available from officers.

Flash flood slams valley

Residents of Glencoe, about 2 1/2 inches of rain fell in the Glencoe area within 15 minutes, around 3 p.m.

Four inches of water overflowed onto a Highway 70 bridge as river beds reached their limit. The only home reportedly damaged in the flood was that of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Gomez, a retired couple from Glencoe whose home is located in a draw near the highway. Water seeped into the home through doors and windows, leaving the family stranded until help arrived to rescue them through a kitchen window.

When the water level went down, the home was left with four to six inches of mud covering the floor.

One of the main bridges connecting Glencoe to either side of the Rio Ruidoso was completely washed away and the other main bridge was severely damaged. Some cars were using the damaged bridge, but the main footings were not sturdy once flood waters were gone.

Farther downriver, the home of Alfred McTeigue was also threatened, but the water level only came within two inches of overflowing into his home. "We're lucky this time," McTeigue said. "In '65, it was so bad it took all our outbuildings." Although water did not flow into the McTeigue home, the front and back yards were inundated.

While no other homes were reported damaged, a car was seen floating downriver. It was later identified as being an abandoned car parked near the riverbank which was swept up in the current. Also, reports of a horse which did not reach high ground and took a trip downriver were verified by the Lincoln County Sheriff's Department, but no other information was available.

Lincoln County Sheriff Ernest Sanchez, said he received a call at 3:07 p.m., that floodwaters were reaching Glencoe. "We couldn't believe it," Sanchez said. "It was so nice in Carrizozo; we figured it was some little farm bridge they were talking about instead of the state highway bridge."

Sanchez said he dispatched nine deputies to the area to help control traffic and warn people who lived near the river. "We were fortunate because we had a little time to get people to move to higher ground," Sanchez said.

Hail ranging in size from baseball to marble-sized stones were mixed in with the rainfall, according to Glencoe and Hondo residents.

County road and bridge department estimates costs to repair the damaged bridge and rebuild the destroyed bridge in Glencoe will reach the \$60,000 mark. No apparent damage was done to the state highway bridge, but more extensive investigation is being conducted today.








Area students to Business Week



The allowance dash will span six furlongs and puts a \$2,700 purse on the line.

First post, Thursday through Sunday, is 1 p.m. Thirteen race cards are slated each day. Matters reach a highpoint Sunday as two-year-old homebreds slug it out in the grand finale of the \$35,000 (est.) Kindergarten Futurity at four furlongs. Tee Up, the filly who ran second in the rich

Riley Allison Thoroughbred Futurity at Sunland Park, looms as the one to watch.

In Thursday's main event, Native Swoon will be lightly weighted at 111 pounds and will have the sharp apprentice, Jose Martinez, calling the shots.

Next, the filly was shipped to Ruidoso Downs, where she kicked off her mountain campaign in a 6 1/2 furlong maiden trip May 28. But the colt was disqualified for interference, and that put the victory in Native Swoon's hands.

As a two-year-old in 1978, she went to the races six times, but ended the year as a maiden. Nevertheless, she showed plenty of promise by picking up three seconds.



Fols Native wins Aspen Stakes

Fols Native, the kingpin three-year-old at Ruidoso Downs, re-emphasized his point in Sunday's eighth running of the Aspen stakes.

The dark brown, glistening colt left his foes in shambles—once again—while running off to a 2 1/4 length win in the six furlong spin which packed a purse of \$7,250.

With another clear cut win to his credit, Fols Native obviously ranks among the finest three-year-olds in this part of the country. At Ruidoso, you can call him No. 1, and you won't get any argument.

It wasn't so much the ease of his win in the Aspen Stakes, but the way he did it—lugging a back-breaking 125 pounds into an early lead and staying on top all the way. After the turn for home, the colt turned on the after burners and opened up daylight in a hurry, and jockey Richard Bickel—who hardly used the whip—had to look over his shoulder a few times to see if the opposition stood any chance of mustering a challenge.

Another impressive aspect was the clocking of 1:13 1-5 seconds, which trimmed three ticks off the seasonal mark established a few races earlier by the older stakes winner, Strate Miss.

Fols Native did a workmanlike job all the way, traveling the first two furlongs in a sizzling 22 2-5 seconds, then clocking the half in an equally terrific 46 2-5. He relaxed a bit at the end, to four five panels in 59 4-5. The colt was merely coasting when he glided under the wire.

With the Aspen Stakes now in his account, Fols Native holds a stunning career record of eight wins from nine starts. So far this season at Ruidoso, he's two-for-two (having polished off the Memorial Day Handicap by 3/4 lengths the last time around).

Sunday's romp was worth a winner's slice of \$4,350, and this pushed his 1979 bankroll up to \$9,800. His total earnings stand at \$37,520. Fols Native is trained by Joe Richards for Tony Fenack Jr., and Wayne Fenack of Frisco, Texas.

Few patrons in Sunday's crowd were intimidated by the 125 pounds Fols Native was asked to carry. So the colt got away as a solid favorite at 40 cents on the dollar. The mutual returns were \$2.80, \$2.40 and \$2.40. Coupled with Lawton Princess, the runnerup horse, Fols Native triggered a

depressed quiniela payoff of \$5.20.

Lawton Princess, ridden by Charles Mueller as the 5-1 second favorite, was a distant fifth in the early going, and once again had to really ramble through the stretch. But she never got within striking range.

My Spanish Lady, a hard fighter who tried to make up ground on the rail at the turn for home, got in third. She was less than a length behind Lawton Princess at the wire.

Lawton Princess was good for place and show prices of \$2.60, while fans who backed My Spanish Lady to show got back \$5.20.

Draconic's Loom, as expected, tried to duel Fols Native in the early going, but was eventually beaten back severely and finished a fagged-out sixth.

It was a solid day at the mutual windows. The handle soared up to \$482,599.

Ruidoso racing resumes Thursday at 1 p.m. and extends through Sunday, as usual.

PIOUS MARY, A 3-1 SHOT directed by hot riding Danny Summerow, stormed to a 1 1/4 length win in Saturday's feature race at Ruidoso Downs.

The win was Danny's fourth of the afternoon, and gave him 16 for the season. It also put him a tie for first place in seasonal jockey standings with Gary Sumpter.

Sumpter was aboard Mr. Clyde, the even money favorite in Saturday's topper, but had to settle for third. Mr. Clyde came out of the pack to battle for the lead in the final drive of the seven furlong duel, then flattened out just as Summerow was getting Pious Mary through between horses.

Pious Mary, owned by Jerold Casey of El

Paso, Texas was pulling away sharply at the wire. The filly clocked the seven furlongs in 1:26 2-5 seconds, which was a seasonal record by some three seconds.

Fans who backed Pious Mary got \$30, \$3.80 and \$3.80. Royal Minds, who gamely tried to steal the race with early speed, held off the tiring Mr. Clyde by a nose to take second. Royal Minds paid \$11.60 and \$4 as a 13-1 out sider.

Core drilling proposed on wilderness acreage

A proposal to conduct core drilling and geological explorations in a section of designated RARE II forest lands and White Mountain Wilderness Area was discussed in a meeting Friday at Smokey Bear Ranger District.

Superior Oil Company's proposal was to drill three holes on the forest lands in an effort to locate molybdenum deposits, a metal used as an alloy with specialty steels.

Representing Superior Oil at the meeting were Rob Berry, David Plaza, Steve Dalton, land men, and Hugo Dummett, senior geologist, all from Tucson, Arizona.

Also present at the meeting were two representatives of the Sierra Club, El Paso chapter, Janice Cordere and Tanya Hoppes; Bruce Morrison, New Mexico Game and Fish Department; Joe Spehar, Lands and Recreation Manager for Smokey Bear Ranger District, and Paul Gordon, district ranger.

Superior's main spokesman, Dummett, explained his company's position with the aid of slides which showed previous drilling sites, equipment used, and revegetation of the sites after machines were lifted out.

Dummett said all drilling equipment is outfitted with spark arrestors and plastic liners so waste from the operation can be caught.

Superior Oil officials have determined that only one site will require clearing, drill site number three, which is located near the floor of Bear Canyon bordering wilderness lands.

All equipment which will be used will be airlifted into the drill areas by helicopter, but Dummett said, "We would prefer to use a road to reach site 3, if possible."

A primitive road exists leading into proposed drilling site 3 (in Bear Creek Canyon) and poses a problem for Forest Service officials — because the area is designated for RARE II consideration, the Forest Service is barred from doing any rehabilitation on the road, which is badly eroded.

"We would prefer that they use the road. If they would use it properly and drain it properly, and revegetate it when they finish the drilling, they'll actually leave the area in better condition than it's in now," Gordon said.

The proposal also suggested that Superior Oil may wish to continue explorations in the same general area if the preliminary findings prove worthwhile. Dummett said the company would work within a five year time frame and may wish to drill up to 25 holes. He said five years was needed because drilling can only be conducted certain months out of the year.

If allowed to conduct preliminary drillings, each site will take a maximum of four months to explore, according to Dummett. Sites 1 and 2 will probably be drilled simultaneously with Site 3 to follow. Superior hopes to begin drilling by August.

Gordon said if the company was allowed to drill the first three holes, each hole they wished to drill after that would have to be considered in public hearings and environmental assessments.

"It's so difficult to talk about major mining operations now," Dummett said. "Only about one in every thousand drill sites yields anything."

If molybdenum is found, an environmental impact statement would be prepared before mining could take place, Gordon said. If other metals, such as silver, are found, Dummett said he didn't think deposits would be large enough to merit a full-scale mining operation. "If we found them in addition to molybdenum, all the better."

Revegetation of drilling sites would be the responsibility of Superior Oil Company, but Dummett said they request recommendations from the Forest Service and follow them so virtually no signs of drilling are seen when the revegetation is completed.

Photographs of past drilling sites in a forest in California illustrated replanting work done by the company. "We feel their work is satisfactory; they're responsible people," Gordon said.

Morrison said he didn't feel wildlife in the area would be significantly disturbed unless drilling extended into spring, when some birds use the area for nesting.

Sierra Club members questioned the noise level of drilling equipment. Dummett said it would be "50 to 55 decibels, or a little less loud than a chainsaw." Comfort level is 30 decibels and discomfort is around 70 decibels, Dummett said.

Hoppes told The News, "We have no position at all. We are at the point of trying to gather information and will submit a written statement next week."

Written statements regarding the drillings will be accepted at Smokey Bear Ranger Station until June 15.




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
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
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
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Nogal Road construction contract let

Construction is set to begin on blacktopping the 4.6 miles of State Highway 47, from the Angus turnoff to the blacktopped section ending south of Nogal, a State Highway Department spokesman advised The News Friday morning.

The terms of the contract, let Friday, call for construction to start within 60 days, with 225 working days allotted for the project. Under these terms, completion of the blacktopping is scheduled for July of 1980.

At Friday's bid opening in Santa Fe, Kent Nowlin Construction Company, Albuquerque, was the apparent low bidder at \$2,718,149 on the project. The engineer's estimate was \$2,847,362. A total of seven bids were opened.

The project, cancelled earlier this year, was reinstated May 21 when the Highway Commission, on recommendation by Governor Bruce King, approved issuance of \$5 million in bonds to qualify for \$50 million in matching federal funds for highway construction.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — She is the widow of the man most responsible for the details of the most recent redistricting of our state's House of Representatives. She now serves in the same seat he held, entirely in her own right. It's ironic that the next redistricting of that body could affect her most sharply.

She is Adele Cneli Hundley, from District 14 in Bernalillo county, whose husband Gene, now deceased, once represented that same district. He drew most of the lines on the map which set up the 70 more-or-less equal districts from which House members are chosen.

The districts were set up back in the late 1960's, with some adjustments after the 1970 census, because the U.S. Supreme Court had said that "one man, one vote" meant legislative districts had to be about equal. Five per cent divergence, plus or minus, seemed to be about as much as the court was willing to allow.

So, for our House districts, we divided the state in 70 roughly equal districts. But are they equal now, in 1979?

That's what Bill Feather of the Associated Press, who is fascinated by such matters, got to wondering. He did a little calculating and came up with interesting results. In his lengthy story on

the subject, he expressed everything in numbers — "District 29 in Bernalillo county," for example — and most readers have no notion of where District 29 is or who serves in that seat. We'd like to look at those numbers in human terms.

What we observe is based on two beliefs. Since one-seventieth of the total registration in the state is 8,539 registered voters, and since the Supreme Court allows a 5 per cent imbalance, an ideal voting district should now have between 8112 and 8966 voters for each House member.

By that criterion, Representative Hundley's district, which now contains only 6261 voters, will almost certainly have to be greatly expanded after results of the 1980 census are in.

And please note: When you expand a Representative's territory of responsibility, you bring in new voters who may not know him or her so well, and you consequently endanger that seat. Representative Hundley, therefore, should look out.

So, most of all, should Cecilia Rosales of Gallup, whose district, with only 5548 registered voters, is the smallest in the House.

Twenty-nine other districts suffer from the same plight. One of the smaller ones, with just 6118 registrants, almost 2000 below the apparent legal minimum, belongs to the potent John Mershon, from Lincoln and Otero counties, who will probably still be running with great vigor in 1982, when next census figures will probably have caused new districts to have come into being. Maurice Hobson and George Fettingler, also from Otero county, are also in districts which have to be revised sharply upward, as is the current speaker of the House, Gene Samberson from Lovington.

Hoyt Pattison, Republican floor leader and key man in the present conservative coalition which runs things, could also be in trouble. His district is only 68 voters larger than Ms. Rosales' and therefore subject to sharp revision upward.

Those whose districts will be geographically diminished, led by Rep. Hal Stratton of Bernalillo, with 84 per cent more voters than the norm, have reason to smile bithely. If expansion is had, a cut-back is wonderful. To a politician, a door which can go unknocked is a lovely door.

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The Washington Post recently lead a story thusly: "Sens. Pete V. Domenici (R-N.M.) and Daniel Patrick Moynihan (D-N.Y.) entered themselves yesterday in the congressional churl-of-the-year contest."

The erudite Post often displays a propensity for the tongue-in-cheek, especially as concerns Congress.

But in this case I'm flattered by being labeled a churl, which means (I admit, I had to consult Webster), among other things, a rustic or a medieval peasant, or being stingy or miserly.

The Post was referring to legislation that Sen. Moynihan and I introduced, a bill formulated to melt down the pork-barrel projects that Congress spreads over the landscape like a radiation cloud.

Our legislation would remove Congress from most water-project selection procedures, allocating states \$4 billion annually to help pay for the water projects states desire, with each state footing a fourth of the project's cost.

That \$4 billion, by the way, is approximately the amount being distributed now in an unplanned manner.

The bill also provides that projects be on a "need" basis, with expeditious completion of same. Currently, the Army Corps of Engineers requires an average of 28 years from application submission to finished water project. Numerous projects — some almost completed — are being scrapped throughout the nation because costs have become prohibitive over the

years. A revamped and independent Water Resources Council would have a final veto power over any state-selected project not approved by the federal agency that would build it, and the legislation would cover work now done by the Corps of Engineers, the Bureau of Reclamation, and the Soil Conservation Service.

Governors (with input from agencies and state legislatures) would be empowered to choose the water projects most desired by their states, and a state's decision for construction would be approved automatically unless the Water Resources Council stopped it or a neighboring state's governor objected that the project could have adverse effects in his state.

I'll be the first to admit that this legislation won't be greeted with unbridled glee in Southern states. But two-thirds of the 50 states — especially Western states like ours — will gain more water development funds than they have in the past.

If putting some partial brakes on a pork-barrel run amok garners the moniker of "churl," then I'll gladly wear it.

Because if this bill gains a favorable foothold in Congress, successfully traversing the heavy flak from my Southern colleagues, New Mexico and other water-starved Western states could receive some equity in water projects.

And the perspicacious Post can continue to clamor to the clarion call of hyperbole.

How, pray tell, did the planners of the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport agree on a site that would conflict with an existing experiment that had been in progress for a number of years by the University of New Mexico? With the very limited knowledge of the experiments the University is working on, I understand it has something to do with the improvement and development of ranch land which is certainly a commendable project, but could it not be conducted as efficient and successful at another location? Is this experiment perennial? I realize as long as you are handling public money and there are various levels of government involved, some bureaucratic politician is probably going to have to concede defeat of one of his pet projects, however I think the problem of location of the airport could be settled with a minimum amount of discussion by answering some logical questions:

3. What project would generate the most revenue supporting the area involved?

6. Have all legal questions been satisfied with both factions? As you will see at the conclusion of this letter, I am a Texan. However, I do own property in your state, and have enjoyed many weeks of pleasure in the Sun Valley area of Ruidoso. I figure this entitles me to this fifty cents worth of opinion. I think we should show the committee in existence that is responsible for selecting a site for the airport that we support them, and let's get the project going.

PBS in the spotlight

Commemorating Johannes Brahms

At the age of twenty, Johannes Brahms was formally introduced to the lieder ("songs" in German). From that time, until his death 57 years later in 1897, Brahms embraced them with an almost mystical devotion. A selection of his most exquisite songs comes to public television on Wednesday, June 13, in "A Brahms Lieder Recital With Christa Ludwig and Leonard Bernstein."

Melody, craftsmanship, and more than a hint of national pride are intrinsic to Brahms' lieder. Brahms' biographer, Karl Geiringer, noted that "a further feature of Brahms' songs (lieder) is their splendid organic unity and completeness. If we examine a Brahms song merely from an architectural standpoint, we shall almost always find a symmetrical, beautifully complete, and even form."

"Liebestreu" or "True Love," Op. 3, No. 1, performed in this recital telecast, is full of strength and tenderness. Even Brahms regarded "Liebestreu" as one of his most beautiful creations; rarely did any of his work please him. Often self-deprecating, Brahms said that he made a living composing only because the public had forgotten so much of the music of the past.

Just as "A Brahms Lieder Recital" presents the composer in a most distinguished light, so too does it illustrate his basic textual difficulty. He often looked at words exclusively from a musical point of view rather than with a greater appreciation of their literary value, and he was frequently cavalier in the treatment of stress and accent. But the melodic inspiration in his lieder cannot be disputed: Brahms' musical gift is at its most striking in these songs.

The production, taped at the Tel Aviv Museum, is a presentation of WNET/New York.


THE LAST OF THE GOOD GUYS
