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Hopes for building new airport brighten

A solution to the problems of locating a new airport on Fort Stanton mesa may be reached at a Wednesday meeting in Santa Fe.

Governor Bruce King, members of his airport task force, other state officials and Ruidoso men will discuss compromises at Wednesday's session.

State officials, at a meeting here Friday, indicated that the majority of the governor's task force "favored a new airport on Site B" and expressed optimism that the end result of Wednesday's meeting would be favorable to the airport.

The problems involved, to date, include refusal by New Mexico State University (NMSU) and the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to negotiate compromises on the use of mesa land, on which agricultural experiments are being conducted by NMSU.

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) June 11, after a public hearing on the airport, submitted a list of compromise proposals to NMSU, through Jim King, deputy secretary of the state Department of Natural Resources. King met with NMSU president Dr. Gerald Thomas and Dr. Bill Stephens, head of NMSU's agricultural department and state Secretary of Agriculture, last week to present SBAC proposals for their consideration.

King stated Friday that Thomas and Stephens received SBAC's recommendations but expressed no opinions. He indicated that NMSU's position would be

spelled out at Wednesday's meeting of the task force.

State officials here Friday included Jim King; David King, secretary of the department of Finance and Administration; John Salvo, director of the Department of Commerce and Industry; and Tom McAlmont of David King's staff.

DAVID KING STATED Friday that the crux of the problem of reaching a compromise with NMSU concerned the amount of acres required by the airport and if the three phases of the development could be timed to prevent disruption of NMSU's agricultural experiments on the mesa.

SBAC chairman Richard Hall noted that the new airport would require 275 acres for Phase I; an additional 100 acres for Phase II, with 750 acres, and not exceeding 1,000, actually needed to be fenced in for Phase III, at which time the length of the runways is presently projected at 13,500 feet.

The new airport would need air space control over approximately 2,000 acres of mesa land, Hall said, to insure flight safety. Agricultural experiments, however, could be continued on perimeter acres that were not fenced in, Hall said, if NMSU needed the space.

Following Friday's meeting Hall said, "I'm still not optimistic we'll be able to proceed with the original masterplan for the airport. But if a compromise can be reached with NMSU to gain the support of Governor King for our airport, I'm hopeful that Governor King will be able to con-

vince the Department of Interior to overturn the original action by BLM in denying the land application," for airport use.

THE GIST OF DAVID KING'S comments concerned a NMSU/SBAC compromise that would give NMSU advance notice, in the range of a minimum of five years, that additional acreage would be needed by the airport. This period would, King said, allow NMSU to gradually phase out experiments being conducted on acreage that would be utilized by the airport as it is expanded.

David King also said, at Friday's meeting, of the upcoming Wednesday meeting, "I would think that a Department of Interior decision can be expected in a couple of weeks," after the task force meeting.

Hall stated Friday, "Flight safety is the prime reason to develop the new airport; with economic gain (to the state and community) secondary."

Task force members include David King, Salvo, Reuben Miera of the Department of Transportation, Bill Huey of the Natural Resources Committee and Dr. Stephens of NMSU. "Three of the task force members," David King said, "are recommending Site B (preferred by SBAC and the Federal Aviation Administration) for the airport."

Attending the Wednesday task force meeting from Ruidoso will be Hall, mayor Lloyd Davis Jr., and Benny Coulston, Chamber of Commerce president.

Davis, Coulston issue airport statement; set bus trip

Ruidoso mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., and Chamber of Commerce president Benny Coulston Friday issued a joint statement following the meeting here with state officials on the Sierra Blanca Regional Airport site.

The statement: "We feel great progress was made today and are quite encouraged by the fact that

David King, secretary of Finance and Administration, assured us that the task force endorses the SBAC request for Site B for the Fort Stanton airport."

Mayor Davis also said, "A meeting is to be held this coming Wednesday with Governor King, the five members of the task force; Gerald Thomas, president of NMSU; Richard Hall, SBAC chairman; Benny Coulston, Chamber president and

myself. "The purpose of the meeting is to further negotiate a compromise agreement between NMSU and SBAC."

Coulston also said, "We are entering the meeting very optimistically; but are still urging the citizens of Ruidoso to continue their letter writing campaign to the governor and our Washington delegations."

A CHARTERED BUS will leave Ruidoso Wednesday at 7 a.m., to arrive in Santa Fe just prior to the task force meeting. The trip will be made, Coulston said, to "demonstrate Ruidoso's demand for a fair hearing in this matter."

Schmitt favors new airport site

The following letter, dated June 15, was written by United States Senator Harrison "Jack" Schmitt to Department of the Interior Secretary Cecil Andrus, in support of locating a safe, jet capable, airport on Fort Stanton mesa.

Senator Schmitt's letter follows: "Recommend that extensive use of the existing airport in Ruidoso be discontinued as soon as possible and a satisfactory alternative be selected."

"It appears from my personal investigation that the transfer of BLM lands in the Fort Stanton Area represents the most economical and most generally satisfactory site, although some valuable agricultural experiments will be affected. "It also appears, however, that a number of compromises are possible between the position of NMSU in opposition to the site and the position stated in the original application."

"This may be particularly important in reducing the amount of land required in phasing of land transfer and what is actually needed for runway space as it occurs."

"Such a compromise may allow for the

logical termination of more valuable short term grazing experiments. It may also prove to be the most economical package for the local community."

CONVICTED RAPIST FACING NEW CHARGES

Woman identifies Harris as man who attacked her

Convicted rapist Larry Don Harris, 26, faces three charges following a Thursday court appearance before Magistrate S. M. Ortiz in Carrizozo.

The charges, stemming from a March 10 incident at Fort Stanton, include attempted criminal sexual penetration in the first degree; aggravated battery and aggravated burglary.

Ortiz ruled that bond on the charges, involving a female employee at the Fort Stanton Hospital and Training School, will remain at \$50,000.

The decision came after two hours of testimony by the victim, who was represented by attorney Gail Tawney. Tim Quigley of the public defender's office represented Harris.

The victim, an attendant at the school/hospital, identified Harris as the man who allegedly attacked her, saying "there is no doubt at all (about his identity)."

On the night of the incident, the victim testified that a man broke out several windows in the door to gain access to the building where she lived. He attempted to rape her, she said, then choked her until

she lost consciousness.

When she regained consciousness, she found her attacker had cut her on the throat, arm and chest area, she said. She added she discovered later that he had also inflicted a head wound with a glass bottle or bottles.

She also suffered a split lip, three broken teeth and other jaw injuries when the man kicked her in the face. Following the attack, the victim said the man instructed her to take a shower, and later offered to take her to the hospital (Fort Stanton's infirmary) or to get help for her.

Throughout the attack, the victim said, he asked her whether she could identify or describe him, and told her that if she contacted the police, "he'd come back and hurt me worse or kill me."

Under cross-examination from Quigley, the victim revealed that the assailant asked her, "If I give you a knife, will you kill me?" When she replied she would not, the man offered to kill himself, she testified, but she told him "that was stupid, or crazy."

When asked by her attorney if the attack had affected her attitude toward life, the victim replied, "No, I don't think so, except I know pretty well that if God hadn't

been there, I'd be dead."

Harris, who remained silent throughout the proceedings, had been serving six concurrent 10-50 year sentences in the State Penitentiary, Santa Fe, when he was transferred to Fort Stanton "for evaluation," arriving March 1. He was convicted in October 1977 in connection with three rapes in Albuquerque that year.

Harris was arrested on the grounds of Fort Stanton March 10. He was transferred to the forensic unit at Las Vegas for a 60-day evaluation period, during which it was determined that he was competent to stand trial. He was recently returned to Lincoln County Jail.

In mid-April, the victim filed a \$300,000 law suit against the state of New Mexico in connection with the incident.

Ruidoso men sought in drug trafficking case

Two Ruidoso men are being sought in connection with an alleged involvement in a trafficking in cocaine case, under investigation by Lubbock, Texas police.

Two suspects in the case, John Newsom, former shop operator, and Jerry Burgess, both Ruidoso residents, apparently fled early Thursday morning, Ruidoso police investigators said, when news they'd been indicted by a Lubbock grand jury was broadcast over radio.

Ruidoso Chief of Police Paul Lukens said to The News Friday afternoon, "As of today, we've received no official notification that Newsom and Burgess were wanted, though we're proceeding to try and locate them on the basis of the announced grand jury indictment."

Albuquerque man jailed on fraud charges

An Albuquerque man was arrested here Friday by officers of the Criminal Investigation Division (CID) of the Ruidoso Police Department on charges of fraud. Arrested was Terry Christie, Albuquerque, on charges of fraud over \$100, a fourth degree felony, a CID spokesman said.

Christie, in a first appearance hearing Friday before Magistrate Jim Wheeler, had bond set at \$2,500 with no ten percent allowed, on the charges.

Specific charges against Christie involved an advertising promotion, allegedly involving Safeway, whom Christie did not represent.

Wheeler set Christie's preliminary hearing here for 10 a.m., June 22.

A late development Friday had Alamogordo police investigators taking Christie from the Ruidoso jail to Alamogordo to face similar charges there of alleged fraud.

More flood aid possible

Long range studies and flood planning will probably take place in Ruidoso as a result of a meeting held Tuesday.

A meeting requested by mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., was organized by Senator Harrison Schmitt's regional office in Roswell to discuss the possibilities of future flood planning in Ruidoso.

Present at the meeting were Jim Hine, village clerk, Louie Chant and Chuck Northington, Federal Disaster Assistance Administration; Harvey Abercrombie, South Central Mountain Resource Conservation and Development; Bill Trammel, Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service; Jim Landfair, Soil Conservation Service; Bill Reives, State Planning Division; Kurt Groepier, Jr., and Larry Blair, Albuquerque Army Corps of Engineers (ACOE); Paul Gordon, Smokey Bear Ranger District; and Betty King, Schmitt's representative.

Citizens present at the meeting included Jack LeMay, village street supervisor, William and Ann Wilson and Chris Collier. Spokesmen from each agency explained guidelines they are required to follow and limitations of their offices.

Specific needs of Ruidoso were also addressed, and, although the meeting was lengthy, Hine said later he felt he had found new avenues to explore in receiving help for the village.

ACOE will probably provide the most help, because they can provide medium and long range planning, according to Blair. He said medium range planning includes projects which take two to five years to complete and provide flood protection to river banks, in clearing and snagging operations and other small flood controls on a limited basis.

Blair cited several cautions. "Where other groups operate, we are not allowed to because each agency has its own authority," he said. "A local sponsor, such as the village, is needed, to work with the ACOE so that when controls are finished, the local sponsor will agree to maintain them."

Local sponsors must generate as much as 20 percent of the total cost of projects, under President Carter's newest cost-sharing guidelines.

Long range programs, Blair said, sometimes take up to 20 years to complete and eventually involve many entities, such as local, county, state and federal governments.

Hine said he has begun the long process of requesting federal help through the ACOE's Section 205 program, a long range planning program and study. In addition, he said the village currently has access to sandbags, and if needed, will need to be filled first.

Hine also learned that private property owners, such as the Wilsons and Collier, have access to low cost flood insurance which is subsidized by the federal government. Hine plans to encourage people who own property on a flood plane to take advantage of the insurance.

"I felt like I learned the limitations of the various agencies," Hine said. "We have found that we still have some unexplored sources and we plan to follow them up."

The Wilsons and Collier attended the meeting to discover if they were eligible for any public assistance. Wilson said a

large amount of rocks and other debris were hauled out of the river and placed in a more dangerous position, probably endangering more of his property than before.

The couple owns property along the river and manages Playland.

After seeing the damage done by the flood of December 19, Wilson decided to use the debris to build a protective levee which would offer them a shield against a future disaster.

They attended the meeting in hopes of receiving technical advice on building the levee. They said they have had some cooperation from the Soil Conservation Service who "came and looked and promised to go back to their office and consider any emergency assistance they could give us," Wilson said.

The ACOE told them technical assistance is available if they request it, which they plan to do. "We feel like the meeting brought us to these two groups.

We have a place to start now," they said. Collier said he hopes the city will sponsor something to avert another disaster. "I think they're trying, but it's up to the rest of us to keep up with the problem."

Collier owns property across the river from the Wilsons and lost a chunk of land washed away by the flood. He hoped to have it rebuilt, but now he said, "I guess I'll do a little at a time on my own and then I won't owe anybody anything."

Flood disaster funds to aid Hondo Valley

Governor Bruce King Friday signed a disaster declaration for Lincoln County at the request of Lincoln County Commissioners.

Commissioners determined Tuesday that they were unable to finance rehabilitation work of the Baber Loop area of the Hondo Valley which was badly damaged in a flash flood June 8.

Estimates made by county road supervisor Guy Henley put bridge reconstruction costs at "around \$150,000" for the two bridges which will be replaced in the area. This figure includes the cost of installing a temporary bridge at one site until a permanent bridge can be constructed.

Since King has signed the disaster declaration, the county is now eligible to apply for assistance from the state to reconstruct the bridges, according to a spokesman for the governor.

"The eligibility will be determined by the Department of Finance and Administration, who control those funds," the spokesman said.

Administration of funds are channeled through the State Planning Office, where coordinating efforts begin and needs of the

area will be surveyed. The spokesman said a planning team was in the valley Friday to investigate damages and make a favorable recommendation to the governor before the declaration was signed.

Al Lobato, disaster coordinator for New Mexico, said "I think we have a pretty good feeling for what happened but we won't know the exact costs until later."

King draws Chino's ire on airport

President Wendell Chino of the Mescalero Apache Tribe is obviously perplexed and disturbed by remarks made by Governor Bruce King at the recent Western Governor's Conference in Idaho. Chino's comments, to The Ruidoso News, on the matter included:

"The remark attributed to Governor King stated that he would desire less control of the Bureau of Land Management regarding those lands under the control of the Bureau.

"Evidently Governor King is talking out of both ends of his mouth when it comes to the functions of the Bureau of Land Management.

"He saw fit to use the influence of his office by requesting the Bureau of Land Management to oppose the efforts of the Tribe, Ruidoso and Captain to realize an airport on the Fort Stanton lands. It is apparent that a federal agency is alright as long as it concurs with a biased position of the Governor's office.

"There is no doubt about the fact that an airport pursued by a group of southern New Mexico entities can have a huge and tremendous economic impact for all of southern New Mexico, which, incidently would far outweigh the experiments that are alleged to be conducted at Fort Stanton.

The Mescalero Apache Tribe years ago consented to allow 1,000 acres to be utilized by the state of New Mexico with the remainder of the land to be returned to the Tribe. Governor King's effort to thwart



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Catonie grabs Futurity win

Tee Up went into Sunday's Kindergarten Futurity at Ruidoso Downs with a fat money line of nearly \$60,000.

Despite the porry bankroll she was still looking for her first stakes win. Most of the fans at the mountain course figured the filly's time had come and turned her loose in the four furlong dash as a 3-2 favorite. But Tee Up took it on the chin when she encountered Catonie, the 5-2 second favorite, in the final half-furlong.

Catonie, a filly piloted by Robert Roller of El Paso, Texas, was not too impressed with Tee Up's credentials and put away the people's choice with surprising ease. Tee Up obviously had more than she could handle and wilted readily.

Catonie was moving at full throttle when she swept under the wire with a bulging two length lead. The winning time of 46 2-5 seconds was a seasonal mark by two ticks.

Catonie, who now climbs into the front seat among New Mexico bred two-year-olds, carries the colors of Jo Ann Hitt of El Paso. Her husband, Billy Hitt, does the training.

The Kindergarten packed a gross purse of \$37,155. Of that amount, \$18,577 went into Catonie's account. Her previous earnings, from two career starts, amounted to only \$1,410. Fans who supported Catonie in the Kindergarten got back tote prices of \$7, \$3 and \$3.

Tee Up, ridden by Stuart Dolphin for John Coates of Austin, Texas, earned \$7,431 for second and refunded \$3 both to place and show.

Fashion Boy, a 13-1 outsider handled by Arturo Vallejo, came on for third and dished out \$5.20 to show.

The Kindergarten was clearly a two horse battle from the start. Tee Up, breaking from the No. 4 slot, took over the lead slot and settled on the rail. Catonie gradually emerged out of the pack and was side-by-side with the people's choice as the two approached the turn for home.

At the head of the lane, Tee Up delivered all she had, but couldn't shake herself loose. At once, it was apparent the favorite

was in trouble. Jockey Roller asked Catonie to finish off Tee Up and Catonie literally bolted into the clear. She had plenty left when she hit the wire.

The co-feature, a mile route for older horses, turned into a shining success for the 10-1 outsider, Chili Pepper Pie. The colt took dead aim on the tiring favorite, Mr. Clyde, and caught his adversary on the final jump. The winning margin was a slim nose.

Chili Pepper Pie, ridden by Don Howard, rewarded his backers with sweet returns of \$20.80, \$8.60, and \$4.80. Mr. Clyde, piloted by Mike Meaux, took control during the backstretch after the field had settled into a sluggish pace.

But Mr. Clyde was obviously weary when he hit mid-stretch, and it was just a question as to whether he had enough in reserve to hold off Chili Pepper Pie. Unfortunately for him, Chili Pepper Pie was able to deliver that knockout blow just as Mr. Clyde was running out of gas.

Racing at Ruidoso Downs resumes Thursday at 1 p.m. This week's highlights include the Rainbow Derby trials on Friday and the 870-yard Flying Charm Stakes (\$7,500-added) on Sunday.

MICKEY MOUSE DANCER, who hadn't won a race in at least two years, cashed in handsomely in Saturday's six furlong feature event at Ruidoso Downs.

The five-year-old, cleverly ridden by leading jockey Danny Summerow, delivered a big rush on the rail, squeezed through a silver of daylight in the upper stretch and zipped down the straightaway for a clear-cut win.

Large John, with apprentice Joe Martinez up, came flying down the lane, but ran out of real estate in a strong try and had to settle for second. Special Hearing, with Robert Roller aboard, took third.

Rebel Leader, piloted by Carlos Rivas, paid \$17.40 and \$8.80. Jerri Pleasure, a 40-1 darkhorse, took third for an \$11.60 return.

The heavy favorite, Thomas Vogel, tried to advance in the backstretch but went wide at the turn for home and flizzed out.



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Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — At least once a year, every typewriter-pounding columnist has to wring the hands and ask some version of the question, "Whatever happened to the spirit of rational debate?"

It's a requirement for our franchise in this business, like the ability to cry wolf, and it has about the same effect: a slight yawn and a tiny shrug from the reader, and "He's off on that old chestnut again."

Too bad, because once in awhile we grope our way to some fleeting insight about why the spirit of rationality is so essential.

Just take New Mexico right now. We live in a state which, from its mineral resources to its technologically trained intelligences, is at the heart of nuclear power and all its uses. For gain or loss, for good or evil, no one has a greater stake in that game than we. We desperately need an intelligent, comprehensible plan for our state's relationship with this genie we have let out of the bottle and can never get back in again.

And we can't just drift. For a number of reasons, like the proliferation of nuclear waste even as we argue about its disposal, our famous and in some ways attractive trust in "manana" just won't hack it.

We need rational discussion, and we need it now. What do we get? Picketing and tee shirts, emotion and bumper stickers, pro and contra, fisticuffs and name-calling. That won't do it, gang.

This is too important a topic for shrill and hysterical discussion. Of course it's emotion-laden; anyone who has thought about it for 60 seconds knows it's life-or-death, on a scale human beings have never before experienced. But that's a reason to contain and channel the emotions into fuel for our best and finest intellectual efforts, not for letting them run rampant.

Sure, we get lousy leadership from the top. Those guys are politicians, and politicians don't get where they are by staying in front of public opinion. Like generals, they "lead" from the rear. Forget about them. This is something we the people are going to have to fight our way through for ourselves. We can tell the bosses what our decision is after we have made it.

But we have to make it with our brains, not with our guts.

That requires a steady flow of factual information to these brains, the kind of "hard" information on which dispassionate judgments rest. Who can give us that? Principally the news media, who have here to a degree they may never have experienced before an obligation to provide objective and unbiased journalism.

There is no room in this continuing story for the reporter with pro-nuke or anti-nuke bias. This one can't be seen through the kind of glasses which turn some into good guys and some into bad guys. This one is hard to get and hard to write; it may take the knowledge of a scientist to understand the facts and the skill of a tightrope walker to present them without slant.

Are we getting that? Judge for yourself. But to one observer, by-lines in the state's papers grow as familiar as the almost "professional" witnesses at nuclear hearings — and as predictable in their approach.

So, as we pitch and toss our way into a fitful sleep of nights, we worry and hunger — for someone who will help us get the straight of it, for the coming of sweet reason to a subject which has room for nothing more.

There is little we farmers can do when one of these things hit, except grin and bear it. There goes your fences, gardens, fruit, dams, bridges, ditches and whatever. The waters that trapped the five people in the Gomez home did so only because of faulty drainage protection. The old-dike that protected the east side of the canyon was not extended to the bridge, leaving a gaping hole which allowed the torrent to run through and vent destruction for a quarter of a mile on the north side of US 70. The hole is on the right-of-way of US 70, and was 100% responsible for the destruction of the Frank Gomez home, and

the extensive damage to the Mendoza farm property, and but for a miracle could have drowned five people.

The crime in the matter is that our good Highway Engineers shy away from any responsibility connected with the entire matter, and cry out "Act of God." A little compassion for the victims in an instance of this sort would go a long way. The engineers didn't come to the scene of the crime of their own accord, they had to be rooted out, and when they appeared they didn't say they were sorry about the error, or we will amend it and see it doesn't happen again. They took the position that in no way did they err, and there was nothing, absolutely nothing they could do to help. Really? The whole bunch should be hung by the neck! Bureaucracy is indeed on trial right now. For lack of an airport our bureaucrats take the position of sacrificing human life to satisfy personal ambition, and herein lies more of the same. We've come a long way towards nothing.

LET'S COURT MEXICO

NEVER there were time and a place for two nations to better their relations, it is now and here between the United States and Mexico.

Mexico, far behind her neighbors to the north in economic development, has turned the corner and is attempting to catch up. Mexico badly needs technology and tools to make the advances she is attempting.

The United States, now highly industrialized, is running low on natural resources. Mexico has them in abundance. Considering the fact that the two nations are contiguous residents of the same continent, it is astounding that commerce has been so slow to develop.

There is 5,000 miles of water between the U.S. and Japan, but Mexico is just across the fence. Goods can be exchanged by highways, railroads, and that marvelous

modern common carrier, the pipeline. But government policy and treaty problems on both sides have slowed development.

There are no north-south railroads, and the highways carry only local traffic, tourists, and an occasional produce truck. One big natural gas pipeline has been built from the Reforma fields on the Gulf to the border at Reynosa below McAllen, but the link has not been completed.

If ever there was a project that deserved the attention of national policy makers, this is it. President Carter's recent trip to Mexico, which was executed in the poorest of taste, was only symbolic. There is no follow through, no continuing effort. There is no policy being implemented.

All of the U.S. border states should be sensitive to this need and trying to do something about it. New Mexico has an opportunity to be a leader. The state administration and the four-member Congressional delegation should make improving U.S.-Mexico relations and building more trade between the nations a continuing lead priority. — Hop Graham, The Lovington Daily Leader

ON ARMS SALES

The administration has been much embarrassed by its lack of success in reducing United States arms sales abroad. Both in his campaign and after taking office, Mr. Carter had urged a stringent curb on the international arms trade. Early reports made it plain that the President had tackled a hydra wont to grow a new head whenever one was lopped off. This engendered a certain amount of sympathy at first.

By now, however, a study from the Center for International Policy finds the effort so enfeebled that some administration people "are dropping unobtrusive hints that arms restraint is almost a dead initiative." Though this group's conclusions are not gospel, it is evident that something has gone badly wrong.

Exports of U.S. arms to East Asia, for example, reportedly will be almost twice as much in fiscal 1980 as in fiscal 1977. That requires some explaining by an administration that set out to reduce total sales.

The Center for International Policy makes another point of interest. While the blame in this instance is less tightly focused on the present administration, the point is calculated to raise taxpayer hackles. According to this study, General Accounting Office inquiries have shown repeated Pentagon failure to recover costs incurred in arms sales and provision of military training. The GAO is said to have found that in the past six fiscal years the Pentagon's faulty accounting forced the public to absorb "up to an estimated \$370 million in costs" which should have been paid by foreign governments.

It seems clear that, for one reason or another, the administration has gotten off the track on arms sales reduction. Congress could serve the public interest by investigating this failure of a sound policy initiative. — Alamogordo Daily News

editorial

NMSU president Dr. Gerald Thomas Wednesday displayed his impervious nature in comments to the press in which his unbending stand against locating a safe jet capable airport on Fort Stanton mesa became apparent.

Though Thomas was advised the airport's total utilization of mesa acreage through 1999 would not exceed 400 acres of the mesa's 26,000, and knowing NMSU's present lease expires in 11 years, he remained adamant in his position that NMSU's agricultural experiments should continue, regardless of the possibility they could be of no economic value.

Thomas' stand borders on being ludicrous. The "experiments" underway on those 400 acres — from NMSU's records — are: measuring moisture and growth of cholla cactus, plus a plot for herbage, which could include measuring the growth of noxious weeds.

Why won't NMSU move their rain gauges a few hundred yards, measure the abundant cholla's growth elsewhere on the mesa and reseed the herbage outside of the airport's perimeter?

Thomas' words were: "I think it is our responsibility to discuss our research with Secretary Andrus, and his responsibility to make a decision, not ours."

We believe Secretary Andrus, Governor Bruce King and New Mexico's congressional delegation should consider Thomas' stand as blatantly idiosyncratic.

The time is now to launch the last ditch fight to build this airport by whatever means can be employed to put the pressure on those persons with the power and influence to override Thomas' idealistic bias. — CD





John Wayne
We all feel we know John Wayne personally, and folks throughout the world feel the same way.
As he won his way more and more into a favorite spot in our hearts through the years of his long career, he became more and more a credit to his profession and a source of pride for our country.
All his pictures were clean and wholesome in the best American tradition; and he portrayed two of our favorite characters, the American Cowboy and the American Service Man, in their true heroic light.
Yes, all owe a debt of gratitude to this beloved American, our John Wayne. He will be greatly missed and kindly remembered always in our country and throughout the world. We are thankful John left so many of his pictures so that we may enjoy his great work as an actor, again through the years.
We send up a prayer of thanks to Our Lord for John Wayne who brought so much happiness into our lives.
And now we rejoice that John is safe and happy with our Lord in Heaven, where we will all meet some day.

The Cowboy Tradition
Now that John Wayne has been called Home by Our Lord, I am thinking back to the cowboy actors of the days of my early childhood.
The first movie I saw was "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs", one of the first motion pictures made, in Juneau, Alaska.
Many years later I was to have a lasting experience of inspired pleasure as I saw "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" a masterpiece of the immortal Walt Disney.
Before motion pictures came in, the stage was already set for the popularity of cowboy pictures by western story writers, led by the great and beloved Zane Grey. The first western actor I and my brothers watched was William S. Hart, many of whose pictures were directed by our uncle Jerome Vincent Storm, a pioneer in the motion picture world who directed more than sixty successful silent pictures. Uncle Jerome, possessed of a remarkable memory, drew upon highlights of his own boyhood to brighten up his pictures; and he set a pattern for wholesome family-style moving pictures.
Riders Of The Purple Sage
A land mark in western stories was set

by Zane Grey when he wrote "Riders of the Purple Sage", acclaimed as the greatest Western Novel ever written. The book came out in 1912; and in 1917, it must have been, the moving picture came out starring the western actors William Farnum as Lassiter, and Harry Carey as Venters.
This picture had a far-reaching effect. William Farnum and Harry Carey became world famous; and western moving pictures took a leading position which they still hold to this day.
My brothers and I saw the picture at the Vining theater in Ashland, Oregon. And we have never been the same since. Cowboy costumes for boys appeared in the stores over night, and all of the Storm boys went about dressed as cowboys. I still have my chaps hanging within reach, that I wore riding out sheelard pony, Prince, a legendary character in the family.
So deeply did the cowboy tradition influence us that today our brother Lynn has some of the finest cattle in the world at his ranch in Dripping Springs, Texas. And Mark is one of the leading Western painters and sculptors in the world. Through his life as a cowboy here in Lincoln County, Mark puts the true life of the west into his painting and sculpture.
Many people who know horses say our brother, Mark, is the best horse painter in the world.
Through the magic of the Western Tradition, we came to this land of the Pinon and Pine where we spent our youth. And here I am today still playing Cowboy as I did in the days of William S. Hart and Riders of the Purple Sage. And my brothers, when they return to the land of their youth, have their spirits renewed and uplifted.
