

The suspense of being trapped in Carlsbad Caverns is a chilling experience

Richard and Judie Cothrun of Ruidoso may be talking about their first trip to Carlsbad Caverns for some time, but the beauties of natural limestone formations may hardly enter into the recollections.

The Cothruns, their daughter Carrie and nephew Chuck Smith, both 15, were among the 105 visitors trapped in the cave for five hours Tuesday while four armed men held a park employee hostage and brought park operations to a standstill.

Judie Cothrun said Wednesday that what impressed her most about the situation was the emotional reactions of those trapped.

Thing that amazed me was that with 105 people — and there were little babies and older people — there was never any panic," she said.

The group was shepherded into one section of the cave's "Big Room," by their guide, a young black woman who was completing her first day on the job.

"We felt that all the park employees were super," Cothrun said. The new guide "kept reassuring us and telling us that everything was going to be okay," she added. She also repeated her entire speech about the caverns, to keep them occupied.

Ironically, that same guide was the only one to become ill during the incident, later suffering convulsions, Cothrun said.

Cothrun added that she had wanted to inquire later about the woman's condition, but didn't even know her name.

"It's strange," she said, "Everyone is there together and you have this common bond, but you don't think about things like names. We all had in our minds what could

happen, but we didn't talk about that either."

Instead, the visitors talked about "what we'd do tomorrow, what we'd do when we got out," she said.

The trapped tourists were given little information about the happenings in the lunchroom during their stay. Their guide was in contact with her supervisor by emergency telephone, but the conversations were kept to a minimum for fear the gunmen would discover their presence in the Big Room.

As far as I know, they never knew we were there," Cothrun said. That knowledge, they felt, would have given the gunmen "more bargaining power," in addition to their hostage.

The group was not told at first that the men were armed, but Cothrun said, "We knew something was wrong and it wasn't just that the elevators were out of order. They didn't want to tell us because they

didn't want us to panic."

Although the panic remained suppressed, Cothrun said that feelings of claustrophobia began to rise at the thought of being underground for so long. The room is located about 750 feet below the ground.

"We all knew that, just below the surface, we could get hysterical. Another common element was the feeling of excitement, and then we felt horrible for being excited, when we knew that someone could be killed — that we might not get out."

Many of those trapped had members of their families waiting upstairs for them, which was another cause for concern, she said.

One of the 105 was a lawyer from Illinois, Cothrun said. He offered to mediate with the gunmen, although by that time they had been told that anyone caught on the trails would be shot.

The teenagers mainly complained

of the cold — the caverns remain a constant 56 degrees — and kept asking, "Why did you make me come here on this day?" Cothrun said.

The Cothruns found it hard to believe they were actually witnessing a dangerous situation. "We kept saying, 'This is one of those things you read about,' she said. "I guess these things are a sign of the times," she added, "but there was a happy ending, that was the best part."

She admitted they "didn't even look at the caverns on the way out," and "needless to say, I'm not going back. What was foremost in our minds was just to get out and see the sky."

Five hours in the depths of Carlsbad Caverns, she said, "was a totally unreal world. You see the beauty of the caverns, and then you see that same beauty change and become a prison for you."

\$1 MILLION IN SEWER BONDS SOLD

Improvement district hearing set

The Ruidoso trustees Tuesday set the protest hearing on Pinecliff Improvement District 4 for 9 a.m., September 11, in the Ruidoso Public Library.

Projects scheduled under the Pinecliff Special Assessment District include street paving, curb and gutter, water stubouts to all non-serviced lots and sanitary sewer connections.

The cost of the improvements has been pegged at \$1,700,374 by Stern Brothers, Albuquerque, fiscal agents for the village.

All documents to implement the district were prepared for filing July 10 by Stern Brothers.

"Roughly 300 property owners," Darrel Fowler of Stern Brothers said, "are involved in this project and all have the right to be heard at the public hearing."

"All property owners will be notified of the hearing by mail. The notification will include all documents concerned as well as the assessment rates."

The trustees, by unanimous vote, with mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., casting an "in favor" vote, declared an emergency involving implementing the improvement district, that the public hearing and dispersal of documents to property owners could be announced.

Pinecliff is the first subdivision, under the special assessment process, scheduled for street, paving, gutter, water and sewer

improvements. Plans for four other districts are being prepared, with the same procedures for approval to be followed in each.

Following the Pinecliff hearing the trustees will vote on the question of accepting the special assessment district.

The costs of improvements would be borne by the property owners. Once the work is completed, maintenance would become the obligation of the village.

THE TRUSTEES ACCEPTED the bid of Kirchner, Moore and Company, Denver, Colorado at an interest rate totaling 6.5509 percent on the sale of \$1 million in general obligation bonds to finance the village's portion of the cost of the Regional Wastewater System. (RWS).

This sale leaves \$500,000 of the \$1.5 million RWS bond issue to be sold at a later date.

"This method of selling the bonds," Davis said, "will give us the lowest possible property tax increase to repay them. This is one of the promises the village made to the voters before they approved the bond issue."

The 6.5 percent interest rate on this \$1 million in bonds compares to the 6.4 percent paid for \$2 million in water bonds April 1, 1976 and 7.01 percent paid on \$2 million on the same bonds October 1, 1976. "This is a very favorable rate," Fowler

said, "and reflects a considerable saving over what the village is having to pay on the water bonds."

In other business, the trustees:

— Approved Ordinance 79-7 establishing new building permit fees of six cents a square foot residential; eight cents a square foot commercial with a minimum fee of \$10 for small improvements including sheds, carports, sun decks and similar additions.

— Approved Ordinance 79-8, literally adopting the state code on animal controls. The new ordinance includes all domestic and wild animals, as well as domestic and wild fowl.

— Approved Ordinance 79-9, conforming to state statute governing the storage of motor vehicles. Under this ordinance, inoperable motor vehicles may not be stored within the village limits unless contained in a building, or otherwise screened, as to be closed to public view.

— Approved Resolution 79-19, the Provisional Order on Improvement District Four (Pinecliff), for improvements within the subdivision.

— Approved the appointment of Maureen Ware and Donald Swalander to the Ruidoso Public Library Board, as recommended by Davis, subject to acceptance by the appointees.

— Were advised by Frank Potter, village

administrative assistant, that state highway department employees would conduct a crosswalk study on Sudderth July 11.

— Authorized street superintendent Jack La May and zoning officer Emory Hatcher to improve driving safety in the vicinity of Highway 37 and Lucille Drive and to remove overhead gas storage tanks in that vicinity.

— Approved a request from the Cemetery Board to reduce the cost of infant burial in Forest Lawn Cemetery to \$50 per plot.

— Authorized Ted Hogsett of Boyle Engineering to advertise for bids for installation of sewer collection lines in the Swiss Chalet area. The trunk lines would serve the motel as well as a number of residents on adjacent streets.

— Were advised by Potter that Smith Machinery, Roswell, had submitted a telephone bid, the only one received, in the amount of \$5,200 to test pump the newly drilled Eagle Creek well. The trustees advised Potter to request the bid in writing and to continue to try and obtain additional bids on the pumping.

— Were advised of a 7 p.m., Thursday meeting in the Ruidoso Public Library to discuss formation of a humane society.

— Authorized La May and Potter to investigate river and stagnant water conditions on El Paso Street.

County clerk Lovelace resigns

The position of county clerk was vacated and then filled at Monday's meeting of the Lincoln County Commission in Carrizozo. Commissioners accepted the resignation of Barbara Lovelace, "for personal reasons," effective July 15.

They went on to appoint Jane McSwane, the current deputy clerk, to the office, a post she had held just prior to the election of Lovelace last fall.

Two separate residential delegations — from Lincoln and Ruidoso — filled most of the chairs in the commission chambers to discuss zoning ordinance amendments and

road problems in their respective communities.

Ron Servies acted as spokesman for the Ruidoso group, saying they represented some 105 residents of the Fawn Ridge subdivision. He asked the commissioners to consider improvement of the roads in the development, preferably with graveling and more frequent grading of the roads.

He described the roads as being "in pretty sad shape," having been graded only twice in the last year, and that many become almost impassable in bad weather. The entrance to the subdivision, off Gavilan Canyon Road was especially bad, he said, with no ditches to provide for

water runoff.

County road superintendent Guy Henley told the group that his department was unable to make a commitment on any particular road, even for the remainder of the year. There are over 1,750 miles of road in the county, Henley said, and the crews have been busy with flood damaged roads since December.

Commissioner Ben Hall added, "We'd like to have all the roads in the county gravelled, but we just can't find the time — and a lot of times the money — to do that."

Servies was told that the road crews were currently stationed in Corona, and would be moved to the Ruidoso district in September. Henley said he would do his best to include the Fawn Ridge roads but still could not make a firm commitment.

The Lincoln delegation was present for the board's consideration of two amend-

ments to Lincoln Ordinance 17, a zoning regulation. Both amendments were approved unanimously by the commission, and will take effect in 30 days.

The first amendment calls for conformance of new structures to the architectural style of the present buildings; the second requires new businesses to be approved by the Lincoln Historical Review Board.

In other business, the commissioners:

— Approved a lease agreement with the Four Seasons Mall, Ruidoso, for the new sheriff's department substation, subject to the drafting of a supplemental agreement which will remove the requirement of joining a tenants' association.

— Signed a cooperative agreement with the state Highway Department for paving

Downs sewer project meeting set Friday

Plans for financing and installation of a new sewer system to serve Ruidoso Downs will be aired at a public meeting Friday at 7 p.m., in the village's Municipal Hall.

Two alternatives to finance the system will be presented:

— Approval of the \$500,000 general obligation bond issue at the July 18 election; or

— Installing the new service with a \$500,000 Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) loan.

Downs mayor Norman Wheeler explained the financing choices to The Ruidoso News:

"Passage of the bond issue will be the cheapest route. The cost to the property owner will be less than \$13 per thousand dollars of assessed valuation. And I think it will be less than that.

"Approval of the bonds by the voters will insure that the tax rate per \$1,000 of assessed valuation will drop as our total

assessed valuation increases.

"On the other hand, if the village has to float a FmHA loan the monthly cost to sewer users, as payments on principal and interest, will be \$18 per month. This will cost a lot more than paying for the system with general obligation bonds."

In either instance, Wheeler said, all sewer connections will pay a monthly service charge.

The village sewer system is designed to tie into the Regional Wastewater System (RWS) that will serve both Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs.

"Ruidoso Downs has \$389,675 from our original sewer bond election to pay for our share of RWS," Wheeler said. "Our engineer (Quinton Daniel of Daniel Engineering, Alamogordo) has estimated that we'll have about \$170,000 from this fund to apply to the cost of our own sewer system. If so, this will give us a little slack which we'll probably wind up needing."

At Friday night's meeting, Wheeler said, Daniel will explain the sewer system. Tom Ratcliff, Stern Brothers, Albuquerque, will explain the bond issue and how the \$500,000 in bonds will be handled.

"The new lines," Wheeler said, "will service all subdivisions added to the village since 1972. Everyone will pay and everyone will benefit. We wanted everyone in, because we don't think it would be fair to have three-fourths of the town paying for sewer and not using it."

Environmentalists, Wheeler said, have advised the village that present septic tanks are polluting the river and underground water.


"This means that development has stopped," Wheeler said, "because the only septic tanks that will be approved are those that won't leak and must be pumped regularly. This is very costly."

School office addition is okayed

The Ruidoso Board of Education Tuesday accepted a bid of \$19,734, the lowest submitted, for the first phase of addition to the administrative offices.

According to Alley-Connell and Associates, architects who prepared the plans for the addition, no bid could exceed \$20,000 for the entire job, and the bid submitted by Service Contractors, Incorporated of Ruidoso, will only cover the basic construction of the addition.

The last phases of the project includes building of cabinets and bookshelves and can be completed by school staffers, according to Pat Valliant, superintendent of schools.

Clardy's Dairy was awarded the bid to provide milk products to the schools next year, at a cost of .139 per half pint of white milk and .149 per half pint of chocolate milk.

The board approved the hiring of four teachers: Tom Tracey, high school special education; Sue Vinsant, second grade; Ann Lee Rhodes, middle school special education and Joette Maskew, sixth grade.

The board also:

- Agreed to assess the gymnastics organization \$100 per month for use of the middle school gym to practice;

- Approved a request by Karen Lafferty to use the high school gym for a Christian folk concert in September;
- Approved a request from the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce to use the high school parking lot for the Arts and Crafts Fair August 1-7;
- Heard a report from Valliant on condition of land given to the school near Marble Falls, Texas. Valliant said the land is on lake frontage and could be improved but will probably sell anyway.
- Decided to request donations from local businesses to treat 13 school employees to dinner at the Silver Dollar Restaurant since it is illegal to use school funds for such a function, according to Valliant;
- Accepted the resignation of Ruth Moore, who taught school more than 20 years;
- Approved budget increases of \$306 to the Title I budget; \$2,394, Title VI D; \$13,993, Title IV A and Debt service, Interest, \$765.

The next school board meeting will be August 14 at 8 p.m., at the administration building.

Wheeler compared the cost factor of repaying \$500,000 in general obligation bonds to paying off a FmHA loan in the same amount.

"Under the bonds, if a home is valued at \$5,000 for taxes, the taxes would increase about \$64.05 a year, maybe less. With a FmHA loan the cost would be \$18 per month for each user, or \$192 a year."

Areas in Ruidoso Downs not to be served by sewer include Ruidoso Downs Race Track, "who will tie in on their own," Wheeler said, All-American Estates and the Redman Club area.

The village plans to have the project ready to go to bids about October 1, to

coincide with Ruidoso's bid letting on the sewer improvement project as well as the RWS letting.

"We feel that we can save some money by going to bids at the same time," Wheeler said, "and if we can all work with the same contractor it will be better."

He stressed the value of Friday's meeting to village residents, saying, "This is our chance to go forward, to create new businesses and new jobs, to increase our valuation and lower our per \$1,000 tax bite. Besides, no one is arguing that we don't need sewer service. What we need is people getting out supporting this bond election and, maybe, after Friday's meeting this will happen."

Roswell men fined on arson of ambulance

An investigation of the May 6 explosion of the Bonito ambulance, by Lincoln County sheriff's deputies, led to the court appearance of two Roswell men on charges of arson and violation of motor vehicle laws.

Appearing before Magistrate Jim Wheeler in Ruidoso Monday were David B. Savage and Douglas William Woolsey, Roswell, on charges of negligent arson and

injuring or tampering with a motor vehicle.

A fine of \$1,000, with 364 days in Lincoln County jail, was imposed on both men by Wheeler. The fine and jail sentence will be suspended after restitution in the amount of \$5,631.70 is made by the two to the Alto Fire Department.

Other charges may be filed, or other action taken, in connection with this case, Wheeler said.

Guin Stone, president of the East Lincoln County Chapter of the American Cancer Society, announced Wednesday that the organization has surpassed the goal of \$2,300 for the fund drive held June 15-29.

Stone presented a certificate of appreciation to cancer crusade chairman Ken Moore, administrator of the Ruidoso Hondo Valley Hospital.

In presenting the certificate to Moore, Stone said the group felt he had "done an exceptional job" of handling the fund drive, especially considering the lack of "advance notice" and the brief period of time set to organize the crusade.

"Most crusade chairmen get about eight months to work on the project; Mr. Moore had about three weeks," she said.

The chapter, which includes Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, San Patricio, Hondo and Glencoe, placed collection cans in businesses in all of those areas. In addition, Stone said, "Mr. Moore made it possible for us to contact many of the businesses for donations."

A dance, held June 26, provided about half of the total collected, Stone said. Some residential canvassing was also done, and public service announcements were aired over KRRR and by Cablevision of Lincoln County.

The president also thanked Lynn Martin for making arrangements for the bands which played at the dance, including the Martin Music Company, Sundance and Kim Blakey's Last Roundup.

Donations are still coming in, Stone added. Contributions may be sent to the East Lincoln County Unit, P.O. Box 3354, Hollywood Station, Ruidoso, 88345. Checks should be made payable to the American Cancer Society.

By Wednesday, the total collected stood at \$2,306.27. Stone said she was "very pleased" at the response to the drive.

"We set a realistic goal for a community of this size," she said. Although the crusade was conducted quickly because the organization's year ends in August, Stone said the decision was made to launch the drive in order to build community awareness of the chapter's work, and of the disease in general.

Moore added that local doctors continue to donate their time to the cancer screening unit at the hospital.

"Had the doctors not picked up the operation of the clinic, it probably would have folded," he said. "Fortunately, we'll be able to keep this good project going."

Following the wrap-up of the funding campaign, Stone said the chapter would elect board members and officers and begin making plans for next year's crusade.



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I-n-s-i-d-e the Outdoors

Wow, have you ever stopped to think how ingenious the human race is? Just look at what the brilliant minds around the world have created.

There are razors you can buy for a few pennies and dispose of after just a few shaves. There are cigarette lighters and flashlights that will give many lights before their fuel and battery runs out, and then they too can be disposed of. Even baby diapers come in the "use-once-and-throw-away" models.

We are truly living in a world of "disposables," and "throwaways."

It has been over 15 years now that the throwaway revolution began with the occurrence of non-refillable bottles and cans on store shelves. The idea of not having to pay a deposit on the containers was well accepted by the consumers and the "no-return" bottles flooded the market.

Unfortunately, these disposables began to appear almost as frequently along roadsides, campsites, lakes and streams as they did on grocery shelves.

No, it's not the throwaways that cause the litter problem, but they do contribute to the problem.

A study conducted by the state two summers ago along a one mile stretch of I-40 found beverage related litter - bottles, cans, plastic containers, cartons and "pop top" tabs - to compose 69-86 per cent of all litter found.

Nevertheless, to stop the litter problem you must get to the real source of the problem - the litterbug. Nicknamed after the lowly pest, the litterbug has no excuse for his actions.

Yet, whether it be out of laziness, or simple disrespect for beauty, litterbugs are responsible for the 19 million pieces of

garbage that can be found scattered around New Mexico at any given moment.

This is the same litter that the State Highway Department is spending more than \$650,000 a year to pick up in an attempt to make our highway look decent. This is the same litter that the State Game and Fish Department and the State Parks and Recreation Division spend about \$100,000 a year to pick up in their public use areas.

All in all, on a statewide basis, a minimum of \$2,796,000 is spent annually on trash pickup. This figure comes from a study conducted by the Environmental Improvement Division in 1977 which concluded that at least twice that much money would be needed to provide a high degree of litter control.

Needless to say, the bulk of the money financing such clean-up efforts comes out of our own pockets, in one way or another.

So, how do we not only stop littering, but clean up our state too? Well, we might look at Oregon's or Vermont's mandatory deposit legislation that reduced their beverage container portion of the litter 75-85%.

Or, we might push for stricter enforcement of litter laws and encourage judges to assess higher fines for littering violations.

Lastly, we might consider the self-destruction we are creating with our own litter. Think about that used disposable diaper you saw laying on main street. Think about that goose you saw wearing the plastic six pack receptacle around its neck. And, don't forget that trout you cleaned with the pop tab in its stomach.

Then, give yourself a pat-on-the-back for a man's intelligence, and follow it closely by a kick-in-the-can (not trash can) for his ignorance.

SANTA FE—How important to New Mexico history is the role of the "unconscious voter"?

Well, the evidence seems to indicate that for one thing, if there were no such animal, our present governor would be named Joe Skeen.

The "unconscious voter," according to evidence given before federal district judge Santlague Campos in a case last fall, is somebody who goes into the voting booth and pushes the lever for candidates whose names are on the top line. Witnesses said as many as 3 to 5 per cent of the voters in New Mexico do this each election-time.

That gives a long margin to the top-liners, as anyone can plainly see. And who are those happy folks on the upper line? In New Mexico, from time immemorial, it has been the Democratic party.

That's gotta stop, Judge Campos said, and he gave the Secretary of State of New Mexico till Friday of this week to propose a system that is "neutral in character," as he put it, and which gives all parties an equal chance at the privileged position.

Does it make much difference? Well, last election, which took place after the judge's ruling, Bruce King beat Skeen by less than 4000 votes. If just 3 per cent of the 240,000 who voted that day were "unconscious" in the sense in which that word is used here, that's 10,200 people—more than King won by.

In other words, Skeen might have been

the winner this time and last time he ran if Judge Campos had ruled sooner.

If the Secretary of State, Shirley Hooper, who has to provide the suggested method of making things fair in the future, comes up with some sort of lottery (let's just flip-a-coin-and-see-who-gets-top-billing), that isn't likely to satisfy the Republicans who brought the suit in the first place.

As Bill Lutz of Las Cruces, attorney for Nita Baer and Jack Ermmons, the plaintiffs, said, "That isn't the kind of system we want." What some Republicans would like to see is a system which makes up for the losses they feel they have suffered in the past by being automatically relegated to the lower line.

So Mrs. Hooper's plan, which she has not hurried to make public, could affect the next decade's elections in New Mexico. Whatever her proposal, you can bet she put some sleepless nights into it. If you happen to be a loyal member of and successful candidate from a particular party, it's no fun to have some judge forcing you to make a ruling which may hurt your party. That's why Ernestine Evens, Secretary of State at the time the judge handed down his decision, went quietly out of office without attempting to come up with an answer. She left that responsibility as a legacy for her successor.

There are those, of course, who say the whole theory of the "unconscious voter" is made up out of the whole cloth by theoreticians who know nothing of reality. That could be true.

Whichever way it really is, we are liable to see some difference from this point forward if the Secretary of State follows the court's injunction and comes up with a plan which "takes account of all political parties."

Note: The Legislature could have acted to solve this problem and, like gentlemen, have spared Mrs. Hooper. They didn't want to touch it with a ten-foot pole.

Frequently a huge crane will pass in front of my office heading a short distance up the street to the Hart Senate Office Building, better known unaffectionately as the Great White Donkey.

This huge building, under construction, may some day stand as a monument to the unabashed grandeur that some Senators like to revel in, or perhaps more appropriately to the memory of the great American taxpayer.

When it was first authorized it was estimated the total cost of the Hart Building would be \$47 million, and that it would be ready for occupancy by 1980 at the latest. Today we have already sunk that much money into the building and the super-structure isn't even finished, and estimates are it probably won't be until 1983 at the earliest when we will have poured more than \$160 million (conservatively) of your money into it.

This new edifice will stand as a memorial to some men's propensity for lavish living. Two story-high offices for senators and their administrative assistants, a curved marble staircase, a huge 8-story atrium with a dangling million-dollar mobile, and a roof-top

restaurant for Senators only. Already spiraling costs have forced the builders to cancel plans for basketball back-boards in the elaborate gym. Costs also have forced the builders to forego plans for paneled Senatorial offices.

Those of you who have visited me here in Washington have discovered that we don't exactly work in posh surroundings, but that our office space is more than adequate. Lots of marble may be nice, but it is certainly not a necessity and now it is absolutely not required.

If the building is ever finished, and there are those of us in the Senate including myself who doubt that it should be, we will have the problem of filling it. No self-respecting senator with an eye on reelection would dare move in. And then there is the question of staff: it is estimated that three thousand new Senate staffers would be required to fill the Hart building at an additional cost to the taxpayer of between \$75 and \$100 million a year.

Of course there is another question. All the Senators who can't move into the Hart building would want equally spacious accommodations, and so it is estimated we will spend another \$100 million just to remodel the existing two Senate Office Buildings.

Last week, when a national television reporter asked me, what can we do about this great taxpayer drain, I thought and decided that just maybe we should put a shell around the building and erect a plaque: "A memorial to the American taxpayer and a reminder to the American legislator." Washington already has a lot of monuments, why not one more? It's already the most expensive one we have.

Now that the four major stumbling blocks to locating a regional airport on Fort Stanton mesa, i.e.,

- Governor Bruce King's refusal to support the plan;
- The Bureau of Land Management's position against locating the airport on Site B;
- New Mexico State University's refusal to consider compromises on the use of Site B acreage; and
- Secretary of Interior Cecil B. Andrus' denial of utilizing Site B for the airport;

are known, the members of Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) must choose, with great care, the methods to pursue to provide this new, jet capable and safe airport to serve Lincoln County.

It is hoped that SBAC will proceed with all of the speed dictated by prudence, because at this juncture the commission's setting in a five stud card game without an unknown hole card.

One approach would seem to be to have an audience of SBAC representatives with Andrus arranged by our Congressional delegation. Senators and Congressmen can make requests of appointive administration officials that are hard to refuse.

At a meeting with Andrus, SBAC officials could determine if an opportunity for putting an airport on the mesa exists so far as Andrus is concerned. If not, they could probably learn why not. Thus armed, it would seem that the issue of public necessity and convenience could be interjected into the next application to put the airport on the mesa. With the thought being that the objecting agencies would be hard put to come up with proof that agricultural experiments are a public necessity. — CD

IMPORT WOUND SALVE

As a general principle, those who suffer injury as a result of government policies adopted for the common good are entitled to redress. This principle is rightly invoked in legislation, just passed by the House, which would broaden protection for workers and companies hurt by increased imports.

It is our hope that the Senate, too, will approve of this measure without watering it down. For, while such law has been on the books for 17 years, the amended version contains marked improvements. No basic change would be made in this aid program for workers who lose their jobs and companies that lose business because of rising imports in their field. Those thrown out of work would still be entitled to receive unemployment compensation and job retraining; arrested companies could get technical assistance and low-interest loans to help them weather the storm.

The program would be improved in certain important respects, however. Most significantly, the law as amended would apply henceforth to companies (and their workers) which supply parts to injured firms. In the automobile industry, for example, this means that not only the big auto makers but their suppliers throughout the country would be safeguarded against the impact of higher imports.

Objections to this were voiced, mostly on grounds that extending the benefits to companies other than those that make the final jeopardized product would be too expensive. Cost must be taken into consideration, but we think the added cost should be borne in the interests of fairness to all who are hurt.

Another improvement has to do with the test for a worker's eligibility to receive benefits. The amended version eliminates the provision that a laid-off worker must have been employed by only one firm during the test period of 28 of the previous 52 weeks. This, coupled with extension of the critical period to 40 out of 104 weeks, will bring in affected workers who would have been excluded before. And that, of course, is the whole idea of this program: to help those who need help because of competitive imported goods. — Alamogordo Daily News



Gary Sumpter won his second Jockey-of-the-Week title at Ruidoso Downs, bringing in seven winners. Johnie A. Goodman grabbed his second Trainer-of-the-Week title in the last three weeks by entering the winner's circle five times as Ruidoso Downs concluded its biggest weekend of the summer during the July 4th holiday period.

Sumpter rode at least one winner each day except Saturday. Two of his seven wins came Friday during the Rainbow Futurity time trials. Both mounts, Sages Belle Star and Call Me Smooth, qualified for the rich finale. Sumpter also qualified three to the consolation.

Sumpter closed out the week with three wins Sunday. All totaled, Sumpter notched

a record of seven wins, five seconds and nine thirds on 37 mounts.

It was his second Jockey-of-the-Week title this season after winning the third week's honor. The big weekend vaulted Sumpter back into the overall jockey standings lead.

Goodman recorded his five wins in the last three days. He qualified one starter to the Rainbow Futurity, Nine Ohs, who was the fourth fastest of the day.

Goodman came back to notch two wins Saturday and Sunday. The five wins moves Goodman from fourth to third in the overall trainer standings. Two weeks ago, Goodman was the Trainer-of-the-Week. In the last three weeks, Goodman has won 12 races compared to just seven wins in the six weeks of racing.

Sumpter leads the overall jockey standings with 32 victories, one ahead of Jerry Nicodemus who missed the weekend of racing due to a slight injury. Nicodemus follows with 31 wins while Danny Summerow, who rode That's Class to an upset win in the Peter Hurd Handicap, trails with 28 victories.

Hugh L. Tucker continues to lead the overall trainer standings with 23 victories. H. Don Farris, who qualified three to the Rainbow Futurity, moved to second place. He was tied with Goodman and William F. Leach with 19 wins each, but takes the advantage due a better second and third place record.

Breaking into the top 10 was Gerald E. Marr, who brought home two winners last weekend.

Racing continues today and Friday with full 13-race cards featuring thoroughbred and quarter horse racing. Saturday, it's the Zia Stakes for New Mexico-bred and three-year-old quarter horses as the highlight. The \$5,500-added dash will cover 400 yards.

Sunday's topper will be the Billy The Kid Handicap. The seven furlong sprint is fashioned for three-year-olds and older and carries added money of \$10,000.



Ruidoso Downs Hoofbeats

ONLY ONE OF THE Kansas Futurity finalists has made it to the next jewel in the two-year-old quarter horse Triple Crown, the Rainbow Futurity. Pa Pa Wheelie, a colt purchased for \$1,200, was one of 10 head that made it through two sets of trials in the past two weeks. June 28-29 a field of 411 was narrowed down to 84 in 42 elimination trials. Time trials were held July 6 with the top 10 fastest times advancing to the July 22 grand finale and the second fastest 10 moving to the July 21 consolation. The Rainbow Futurity packs a gross purse of just over one-half million dollars.

DENIM N DIAMONDS was the fastest qualifier of the day, covering the 400 yards in 20.11 seconds, which ties Oh Shiny for the fastest time of the season at that distance. Denim N Diamonds was purchased for \$32,000 in last year's All-American Select Yearling Sale at Ruidoso Downs. The brown filly was one of three H. Don Farris — trained entries to qualify for the rich finale, where over \$173,000 will go the winner.

ALSO QUALIFYING for the Rainbow Futurity are Streaking Six, 20.18; Sages Belle Star, 20.18; Nine Ohs, 20.25; Chicks Charger Bar, 20.26; Pa Pa Wheelie, 20.27; Easy Maneuver, 20.27; Call Me Smooth, 20.29; The Wheel, 20.33; Thats Roney, 20.35. Qualifying for the consolation are Tonkawah, 20.40; Rocket Jet Bug, 20.41; Lets Do It Again, 20.41; Chickarun, 20.44; Jamie Jay, 20.44; Take Five Too, 20.44; Call Me Reveille, 20.45; Cinco Pistol, 20.46; Gallants Miss Bar, 20.46; and Oh Bar Oh, 20.46.

THE FIRST AND SECOND division trials produced five horses each to either the finale or the consolation. Nine Ohs won the first division followed by Chicks Charger Bar, Call Me Smooth, Tonkawah and Cinco Pistol. Pa Pa Wheelie captured the second division followed by Easy Maneuver, Rocket Jet Bug, Chickarun and Call Me Reveille.

H. DON FARRIS was the top trainer of the trials. He pulled three starters into the finale; Denim N Diamonds, Streakin Six and Easy Maneuver. Farris originally had 12 starters in the elimination trials and advanced seven to the time trials. Danny Cardoza, the nation's leading quarter horse jockey last year and now riding at

Los Alamitos, flew out to ride Farris' mount. Gary Sumpter was the only other jockey to qualify more than one mount. He piloted Sages Belle Star and Call Me Smooth. Sumpter also guided three of the consolation qualifiers.

SOME OF THE TOP NAMES who failed to qualify for the Rainbow Futurity includes Great As Charger, seventh place finisher in the Kansas; Washita Ted, fifth place finisher in the Kansas and Sun Country futurities; Tonya Jay Bar, fourth in the Kansas; Easy Tam, the fallen horse in the Kansas and betting favorite in the Sun Country and West Texas futurities; and Easy Azuree, the beaten favorite in the Kansas.

FLYING OUT WITH Cardoza for the trials was Terry Lipham. Both are among the top four riders at Los Alamitos, along with Kenneth Hart and Steve Treasure. Lipham returned Sunday to ride Dickey's Fireman in the Rainbow while Hart rode Speck A History and Treasure guided Black Sable. As of June 20 in the Los Alamitos jockey standings, the four have 152 wins among themselves.

OVER THE WEEKEND the half-way point for the 1979 season was reached and the handle inched ahead of last year's all-time record pace. With 35 race days now in the books, the daily average stands at \$408,929. Last year at this point, 34 race days had been chalked up, and the daily average stood at \$407,463. The strength of the mutual trend in recent weeks indicates the 1979 season will be another record-breaker.

THREE RUIDOSO JOCKEYS are recovering from minor injuries suffered last week. Jerry Nicodemus slightly injured his shoulder when Pa Pa Wheelie stumbled during workouts early in the week. He was excused from all of his mounts the entire weekend. Tony Trujillo was thrown from his mount, Walkin Talkin, during the 10th race last Friday. He got up and walked to the jockey's quarters but was excused from the remainder of his mounts the rest of the weekend. Joe Ober was flipped off his mount, Big Brown King, during the running of the seventh race Saturday. There were no injuries, however he was excused from Sunday's mounts. Two jockeys involved in a spill Thursday in the seventh race, Joe Martinez and Dave Mello, returned to ride over the weekend.

IN THE BIGGEST weekend of stakes

aces this season, none of the three favorites won the thoroughbred races. Lawton Princess upset favored Double B Express in the Governor's Handicap July 4. With Joe Martinez in the saddle, 6-1 Lawton Princess won the 6 1/2 furlong sprint by 3/4 length over Honken Henry. Thursday, Catalie, with Robert Roller aboard, held on boldly for a victory in the Futurity Prep Stakes. Favored Cut Shot took the early lead but faltered to fourth at the finish. In the Peter Hurd Handicap Saturday, That's Class, ridden by Danny Summerrow, bolted past favored Fel's Native at the wire.

AFTER THE DEALING for the third nominating payment to the 1980 All-American Futurity, there are more horses eligible than there were original nominations to this year's All-American. A total of 1,741 head remain eligible to the 1980 All-American after the third payment was due June 15. Seven of those were prepaids. There were 1,678 original nominations and nine prepaids to this year's All-American and 1,370 made it to the third payment. There are a total of eight payments that begin 20 months before the All-American.



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Wilderness Wisdom
 with Wayne Calloway

Dear Wayne — Two years ago I dug a pond on my farm. The primary intent was to provide an available water source in the event of fire around the barn or other outbuildings. Needless to say, I hope it's never used in this capacity.

I would like now to stock it with fish. The pond is fairly large and probably has an average depth of six feet. What would be a good variety of fish to stock and how many would it support. Randall R., South Carolina

Dear Randall — The most likely occupants for your pond would be largemouth bass and bream (bluegills, sunfish). A ratio of about one pound of bass to three or four pounds of bream sound about right. Since you didn't really say how large the pond is, a stocking rate can't be determined. If you contact your local county extension and soil conservation offices they will provide you with lots of information. Chances are they will physically help you measure and stock it properly. Possibly even help with the stocking costs. And they can provide suggestions for management to help it yield its full potential. Their job is to assist you — use them.

Tip from reader — The one gallon plastic milk jugs must have hundreds of useful applications besides storing milk.

Before your next camping trip or outing, fill one about three quarters full with lemonade or other ade drink, cap loosely and freeze solid. You'll have an effective coolant for your ice chest and as it melts it will provide an ice cold refresher. Jane R., Arkansas

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Cars consume most household energy

"Private automobiles consume 28 percent of the nation's petroleum, making them the largest single energy-consuming device in the typical household," Charles Hohn, Extension agricultural engineer at New Mexico State University (NMSU) said. "With today's ever-rising prices for gasoline, it makes good sense to investigate every possibility that would extend gasoline economy."

Selection of an Automobile.
The most significant variable affecting fuel consumption in an automobile is its weight. A 5,000 pound car uses more than twice as much fuel as one weighing 3,000 pounds.

An air conditioner typically increases average fuel consumption by nine percent and by as much as 20 percent when operated in stop-and-go traffic on a hot day.

Convenience accessories, such as an automatic transmission and power steering, add to gasoline consumption. Power steering can cost nearly one mile per gallon (mpg) in fuel economy. A

manual transmission will save only about .3 mpg in a full-size model, but it can save 1.3 mpg in a small car.

Cars powered by diesel engines achieve 40 to 70 percent improvement in fuel economy over conventional gasoline engines.

Emission control devices have an often unwarranted reputation for being fuel wasters. Although they may decrease fuel economy in full-size cars by as much as 15 percent, according to the Environmental Protection Agency, these devices actually improve slightly the fuel economy of cars weighing less than 3,500 pounds.

— Driving Habits.

A speed is a primary consumer of gasoline. A steady speed of 50 miles per hour instead of 70 mph can save four mpg in the average car. Remember also that wind or an incline can have the same adverse effect on gas mileage as increased speed.

For example, driving 50 mph into a 20

mph headwind results in about the same fuel consumption as driving 70 with no wind. Similarly, driving 50 up a four percent grade is comparable to going 70 mph on a level surface.

Jackrabbit starts require twice as much fuel as smooth starts. There is a saving in energy and repair parts when both starts and stops are smooth and gradual. Fast stops and needless stops can waste two miles per gallon in fuel economy, Hohn said.

Common sense planning to accomplish as many tasks as possible in one trip, combining trips with neighbors and car pooling are obvious fuel savers.

Remember that automobiles use 70 percent more gasoline per mile on short trips than on long trips.

Car pooling is probably the most important action consumers can take to save gas. "Our nation could save 33 million gallons of gasoline daily if the commuter passenger load were increased from 1.3 people per car to 2.3," Hohn said.

Excessive "warming up" of an engine on a cold day is a waste of fuel. Only a minute is sufficient for your engine oil to do its job with today's lubricants.

NMSU Cooperative Extension Service is working with the New Mexico Energy Extension Service to provide this information.

Excessive "trunk" weight is a gas waster. Remove excessive gear from your trunk and you can improve your gasoline mileage one percent for every 50 pounds removed.

Anything which adds to friction or air resistance increases fuel consumption. Snow tires with studs reduce mileage. Driving over gravel roads requires about 35 percent more fuel than driving over smooth paved surfaces.

— Maintenance.

A well tuned engine is essential to gas economy. A malfunctioning carburetor can waste three mpg. A misfiring spark-plug can waste two mpg. A clogged air filter can waste one mpg. These are little


things, none of which cause immediate concern to the driver, but they add up to waste.

Tire inflation is important to gasoline economy. Under inflation is another one mpg waster. Before you get carried away with more air for more saving, remember that there is a federal law which prohibits inflating passenger tires over 36 pounds for safety reasons. However, cars used in the famous "economy runs" use special tires and they maintain tire pressures up to 70 pounds, Hohn said.

Radial ply tires allow up to six percent better gas mileage because they produce less rolling friction than conventional bias ply tires.

Consult your owner's manual for the proper octane rating of gasoline for your car. Use gasoline in this range for best performance.

Purchase slightly less than a full tank of gas and allow room for fuel expansion. This prevents overflow and spilling of gasoline.



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
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


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The Silver Lining

The Mountain World
Glows Ever Brighter

Day by day the mountain land glows brighter still, with new flowers blooming each day along the way side, and the leaves of bush, shrub, and tree are turning a richer more glossy green.
