Ruidoso's freight service still uncertain

Conflicting statements that have been issued from the home office and two branch offices of Sundance Transportation, the common carrier that has served Ruidoso at least ten years, have left merchants in Ruidoso bewildered for several weeks.

According to Roy Ratcliffe, terminal manager for the Ruidoso office, "Our bosses tell us that we're still in business. We're getting a truck in here every day from El Paso."

Ratcliffe told The News that Sundance sold their Dallas authority to the P.I.E. truck line about a month ago, but added, "We have received nothing official."

He said authority to continue serving the Ruidoso area was not sold and Sundance can still serve this area as well as the Las Cruces, Alamogordo, Hondo Valley and Roswell areas because the permit, "is so old, it's like being grandfathered in," he said.

Permits granting authority to serve a specific area are issued by the Interstate Commerce Commission, through the State Corporation Commission.

Once a need is proven for the service, a temporary, six-month permit is issued and normally is followed by a permanent permit within a year.

The News contacted the home office of Sundance Transportation in Phoenix Friday, and spoke with Harry Brown, director of terminals, who said, "We are still in business. We have curtailed operations... we have closed the Dallas terminal."

He assured The News, "we are still serving Ruidoso and will continue to serve Ruidoso." Brown also said the Albuquerque office is open and will remain open. These statements were repeated in a telephone conversation Tuesday to Ratcliffe.

However, local retailers using Sundance say they aren't getting the goods ordered from Denver, Albuquerque, Dallas and points in between.

For approximately three weeks, Sandra Marshall, Gambles, said, "We've been waiting on an order from Albuquerque we made that still hasn't been delivered. They said they tried every freight line in town and couldn't find one line to transport the goods to El Paso."

Joe Lopez, parts manager at Sierra Blanca Motors said, "I heard Sundance went broke and pulled out." He said he telephoned Sundance's home office in Phoenix, where the rumor was denied, but was told they were having difficulty obtaining fuel and having trouble making the usual routes. Lopez said, "I put in an order with Merchant (Fast Freight) who was to let us know when our order got into El Paso so we could go down there and get it ourselves."

Lopez said he has put local people off up to three months with the only excuse being he couldn't get the parts. Lopez said many of his parts are ordered from Dallas and since Sundance sold their authority to transport from Dallas to Albuquerque, another line must be used to get the goods as far as El Paso.

Lopez said he asked the Merchant line if they too have had trouble locating fuel supplies and was told, "We haven't had any trouble at all, anywhere."

"Sundance knew about this; they knew this was coming on for months and instead of telling me, they gave me the runaround about the fuel situation. I wouldn't believe a word they (Phoenix office) tell you," Lopez said.

Doris Langford, Village Hardware and Paint Store, said Monday, "We get our paint from Denver. We're having a heck of a time getting it." She said one shipment had to be picked up in Roswell and "once ICX (truck line) brought it up here." She said, "Some orders are still somewhere, but we don't know where."

Langford said goods delivered by ICX "arrived in such terrible condition, probably because of the way it got shuffled around" a lengthy damage statement had to be filed.

Robert Cates, Sonic Drive-In, said, "My supplier in Albuquerque told me that Sundance was no longer in business so I had to go to Alamogordo or Roswell to pick up anything. I heard that some of the smaller towns' offices were closing out, but I don't know."

Kathy Barnett, Barnett's Carpets, said they were forewarned by Dallas suppliers that a change was in the offing. "Probably about a month ago we understood that the Albuquerque terminal is now closed. We started tracing a piece of goods which was in El Paso, but the dock foreman wouldn't unload it because there wasn't enough room... that was on the Merchant dock."

Barnett also said a shipment from Albuquerque was supposed to interline with Sundance but Sundance wouldn't accept the shipment. "They said they hadn't been accepting goods for two weeks."

Barnett said they have discontinued using Sundance both from Dallas and Albuquerque, turning to other companies and have since had no trouble.

Because of an apparent "reorganizational process," according to Ratcliffe, the telephone number listed in the Albuquerque telephone book is wrong. Reaching the Albuquerque office of Sundance Transportation requires dialing two wrong numbers before reaching the office.

In an effort to discover if the Albuquerque office is operating, The News contacted it Monday. A spokesman said the terminal is "open to a certain point," but "we can't serve that area (Ruidoso) anymore."

The manager of the terminal was not available Monday and in contacting the office Tuesday, a spokesman said, "He is not giving out any statements at all to newspapers. Several papers have come by but he hasn't given any statements to any newspapers."

Ratcliffe told The News Tuesday that goods coming into El Paso on the Merchant line are probably stuck at the Merchant dock. "They're supposed to interline with us but aren't because they are trying to get authority to come up here."

John Elliott, a member of the State Corporation Commission, said Monday that Merchant Fast Freight has been issued a ten-day emergency temporary authority to serve the Ruidoso area effective July 16.


Elliott said the probable reason deliveries have been irregular since then is because "they are short of trucks, they're a brand new operation in your area," and had many arrangements to make.

Elliott said, "Sundance just pulled out... I believe the only terminals they have in operation are in Las Cruces and Silver City."

According to John Fawcett, New Mexico supervisor for Merchant, the company began regular runs to Ruidoso Monday. He said the company will cover all areas served by Sundance prior to the sale of their authority, and said, although the permanent authority to serve the New Mexico area could take up to a year to acquire, he expected to obtain temporary authority until then.

Merchant Fast Freight is an established company, working in Texas many years before branching into Deming last year. The home office for the company is in Abilene, Texas and their telephone number in Albuquerque is 842-9131. No local number was available.

As for Sundance, Ratcliffe said Tuesday, "We're still here and we'll continue to make daily runs."

County commissioners briefed on airport status

Lincoln County Commissioners conferred with George Shoemaker of the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) Tuesday on the latest developments regarding the proposed facility on the Fort Stanton mesa, during a regular commission meeting in Carrizozo.

Shoemaker explained that the SBAC had been offered \$30,000 by the state Aviation Division for engineering studies on Site A.

He asked the commissioners for their recommendations on the next step to be taken by the SBAC. He said the state had "threatened us that if we don't accept the \$30,000 and put in a new request for 300 acres (the minimum amount of acreage needed for development of Phase I) then no state money will be given to help us."

The land in question is controlled by the Bureau of Land Management and leased to New Mexico State University (NMSU) for long-term agricultural experiments.

Commissioner Ben Hall said he thought the \$30,000 study would be a waste of money, since the current owner of much of the Site A lands, Fred Dantonio, would probably not want to sell the land for that purpose.

Hall advised Shoemaker that he favored the submission of a new application for Site B acreage. In regard to the experiments on that section of the mesa, commissioner John Allen Hightower said, "I'm a rancher and I think they're overstating the importance of their research over there."

In response to questioning from the commissioners, Shoemaker said the possibility of locating the airport at Carrizozo had been discounted because it was "too far from Ruidoso," and if people had to drive that far, they might as well fly into Alamogordo.

Hightower responded that if the airport was meant to serve just Ruidoso, then the county should be "left out of" the financing of the facility, and the people of Ruidoso could pay for it.

Replacement of two bridges in the Baber Loop area of the Hondo Valley, damaged or destroyed in the June 8 flood, and four in the Bonito-Eagle Creek area, damaged in the December flood, has been scheduled

for September, under the direction of the engineering firm of Gordon Herkenhoff and Associates.

Herkenhoff, who acts as consulting engineer for the county, was given authority to begin designing a two-span bridge for the San Patricio area, which will cost in excess of \$130,000. The county has been asked to foot the bill for 15 percent of the labor or materials for repairs necessitated by the June flood, and the commissioners agreed to demolish the old Glencoe bridge as part of that obligation.

A low-water crossing on Gavilan Canyon Road near the Ruidoso Little League field will also be repaired. Bids will be let for the actual construction work on the bridges and crossing.

In other business, the commission:

— Turned down a request from Mr. and Mrs. Pete Mendiola to install two gates across a county road running through their property. Attorney Daniel Bryant said granting of the request would set a precedent which could lead to trouble in the future, and the commission agreed to look into re-routing of the road.

Tabled consideration of a lease-purchase of Motorola paging devices for county ambulance workers, pending contract changes.

— Appointed Ben Hall as the county's agent to receive and to administer disaster funds.

— Approved vacation of a road between the Smith and Dolf properties in the Sierra Blanca Subdivision.

— Agreed to do earthwork necessary before an addition can be made to the Bonito Fire Department building for their new ambulance. The construction of the addition will be done by department members and other volunteers.

— Awarded contracts for printing of

valuation notices to Ink Impressions.

— Were advised by Bryant that New Mexico counties were now required to approve an animal control ordinance which will call for an animal control officer, vehicles and an impoundment facility.

— Authorized Road Department superintendent Guy Henley to utilize present employees for overtime work when necessary.

— Tabled a joint-powers agreement with the Resource Conservation and Development group which sets goals for development of the area and appointments to the county Planning and Zoning commission.

Village bridge repair projects being readied

Repair work on two bridges in the village, damaged in the December 1978 flood, is presently scheduled with work on a third bridge being subject to action by the village trustees.

Village manager Jim Hine said to The News Monday that the bridges on Riverside Drive and the one leading to private homes east of the Chamber of Commerce office have qualified for flood disaster funding.

"We'll receive total reimbursement on the two approved bridges," Hine said, "and preparations are being made to call for bids on those two projects."

The Cedar Creek Road bridge, Hine said, "was not qualified for disaster funding as a result of the December flood and this project will have to be reviewed by the governing body to determine how to finance the necessary repairs."

County clerk McSwane fully eligible to serve



Doubts about the legality of the appointment of Jane McSwane as county clerk, raised Wednesday in Ruidoso are apparently unfounded.

The question came about when a local resident found a section of the state constitution which stated that county officers are ineligible to serve any county office for two years following the completion of two consecutive terms.

The section of the constitution was upheld in several rulings by the attorney general in 1921, 1959 and 1965. The office of the district attorney was notified of the section and rulings and began looking into the matter late Wednesday. However, a check of newspaper files indicated that McSwane was elected to only one term since 1974. She apparently would have had to be elected both in 1974 and 1976 for her to be declared ineligible now.



Mescalero hosting youth conference

The Mescalero Apache Tribe will host the third annual Indian Youth Conference August 14-16, at the reservation, for an anticipated 350-plus Indian youths aged 14-25.

The conference is the project of the New Mexico Native Youth Organization (NYO), sponsored by the New Mexico Inter-tribal Council on Alcoholism and the National Institute on Alcoholism and Alcohol Abuse of Rockville, Maryland.

The New Mexico NYO is comprised of Indian youths from all 19 Pueblos, two Apache tribes, the Gallup area and two urban Indian schools in Albuquerque.

The organization was formed in 1977 for the purpose of providing unified youth programs to address cultural and con-

temporary issues of concern to Indian people.

Because substance abuse ranks highest in concern among Indian youths and communities, the NYO's efforts are directed toward providing alternatives, information and services as a deterrent to substance abuse.

This year the conference will include workshops in Juvenile Justice, Youth and Family, Youth and the Elderly, Peer Pressure, Peer Counseling, Self-Concept, Education, Substance Abuse and Crisis Intervention.


Speakers will be from the All Indian Pueblo Council Pretrial Diversion Project, National Youth Council Ex-offender Program, National Indian Council on Aging, Laguna Service Center, Gallup

Interagency Alcoholism Coordination Committee, Eight Northern Indian Pueblos, SIP1 Alcohol Education Program and several social services programs in Mescalero.




How Streakin Six won Rainbow Futurity by a nose



1 — Streakin Six, left, Sages Bell Star start even




4 — Outcome was clearly in doubt at this point

Donna Clarke liked New Zealand

Visiting one of the most recently settled countries in the world proved to be an unusual experience for Donna Clarke, who returned July 14 from a Rotary-sponsored exchange trip to New Zealand. Clarke was one of two Ruidoso women chosen to represent the district in the 1979 international Rotary Club exchange program. She was required to participate in an intensive screening program prior to being accepted as an exchange student in February, 1978.

Clarke said she has been making plans to travel more than three years. She said saving money for her trip had occupied her life until she applied for the exchange program in 1977. She was turned down because of her age, but, not being a quitter, she re-applied and was accepted last year.

"I chose Italy, Greece or Scotland for the program, but when they asked me if New Zealand was okay, I jumped at the chance. None of my choices have Rotary exchange programs," Clarke said.

She wasn't disappointed, finding the language barrier very easy to adjust to. "They speak English there, but it's British-English and the accent is so strong, you can't really understand them at first," she said.

Clarke had four host families during her stay in the northern half of the country, which is smaller than the state of New Mexico. Clarke said the first thing she noted was, "they all think of the United States in terms of what they're used to. For instance, one person asked me if I knew a friend of theirs that lives in Washington!"

Clarke lived in or near the city of Dannevirke, which is smaller than Ruidoso and primarily supported by farming. Clarke said the country, which was settled only 150 years ago, is totally dependent on exports and farming for income.

The cost of living was lower than here, according to Clarke. Because the entire nation is one of farmers, food is not usually expensive. The equivalent of a pound of hamburger could be purchased for around 70 cents during Clarke's stay, and a visit to an American movie cost \$1.25.

However, clothing is twice the price charged in the United States, and taxes are generally higher because of a socialized health care program for the country, good unemployment benefits and a government structured like that used in Great Britain.

Clarke's four host families were varied in occupations, but she said, "They were all very nice and did their best to make me feel at home," which means, she said, "they fed you all the time." She admitted to gaining 30 pounds during her 11 month visitation.

Eating in New Zealand was a treat, Clarke said. "They serve up a big plate of food for every meal." Most meals featured mutton or lamb, potatoes and three to four vegetables. No bread is served with meals, only with sandwiches.

The legal drinking age is 20 but Clarke said, "It's not enforced," and noted that people seem to drink "a lot more than here. They tend to start younger too, because the laws just aren't enforced."

Her first host was a farm family with five children who raised sheep, cattle and garden vegetables. Clarke said she had the opportunity to shear sheep and participate in some farm tasks for the first time ever. The family visited Wellington, one of the country's main cities and went to the beach during her stay, which was during the summer season, August to October.

The second host family had two grown sons. "He was a sign painter and she was a school teacher. I spent Christmas with them, and they had a very traditional English Christmas for me," Clarke said. Because summer was at its peak, "it was almost too hot to eat the main meal. I remember we went sunbathing Christmas Day."

Traditional Christmas foods served included steam pudding, a huge meal and fruit cakes, which are kept from year to year.

Clarke said, "I didn't like them at first but now I miss the fruit cakes — they grow on you."

The third host family had three young children. The father was the county engineer and also a pilot. "He took me flying over the area and it was beautiful." Clarke spent Easter with this family, which welcomed the fall season in the country.

The last family was a couple who had no children living at home and owned a clothing store in the village. Like all host families, they were Rotary members and Clarke said "They were very nice people."

Because the seasons are different than in America, Clarke attended school the first two months she was there, then was

off two months before starting the new term. She feels the school system is much harder than in this country.

"At the end of the year, they give tests and only 50 percent will pass — it's purposely set up that way. Everything depends on this final exam, so the pressure's on at the end of the term," Clarke said.

Clarke said dropouts weren't a problem. Being a country of farmers, the students could usually find jobs on farms and those that wished could continue into a college-preparatory course. Clarke chose relatively easy classes, enrolling in French, economics, geography, English and Maori, the native language which is hardly used. "I wanted to learn as much as I could about the country and not so much about biology or math."

A two-week bus tour was arranged for the 95 exchange students in New Zealand. Visits were made to several cities of note, as well as an old mining camp called Shantytown.

Clarke said Shantytown visitors had the opportunity to pan for gold and keep a specimen, which she did. "It really wasn't that old; only 100 years or so," she said, "and it was the most breathtaking scenery I've ever seen."

Rainfall in New Zealand amounts to 120 inches per year, resulting in lush green ground cover as far as the eye can see, Clarke said. "It's also a very clean country and land is hard to buy; it's just not readily available and if it is, it's usually very expensive," Clarke said.

Television is very good. "They had two stations and show a lot of English and American-made programs. There's more variety; they'll run the best six episodes of a series and then switch to something else. You seldom see a re-run."

Clarke said, "They have very good newscasts too. They show a lot of world news, which is important since they export everything. When Ruidoso's December flood happened, they even mentioned

that," she said.

Her trip cost about \$2,200, which included the plane fare of nearly \$1,000. "It was worthwhile. You learn to rely on yourself and I'm sure I learned a lot more for the money than I would have had I gone to college instead," Clarke said.

Clarke said she and the other exchangees are planning a get-together in January, 1980, somewhere in Colorado "to talk over old times." She plans a trip back to the country in six years with a friend she made who lives in Nebraska.

Meanwhile, Clarke is finishing the summer as an employee in the money room at Ruidoso Downs Race Track. She will enroll at New Mexico State University in September and plans to major in business economics.

An assertiveness training program will begin August 7 at the Counseling Center, Four Seasons Mall, Ruidoso.

The program is designed to help people overcome passivity and the anxiety which often results from their refusal to "stand up for their rights" and "say what they

think," according to Don Hoover and Sandy Taylor of the center.

The group sessions are scheduled for 2 to 3:30 p.m., each Tuesday in August, and are open to all interested persons.

Direct instruction, verbal rehearsing and role-playing will be included in the

training. Participants will keep notes on their experiences to provide feedback to the group.

Fear of rejection, according to Hoover, is a major cause of passivity. However, individuals who undergo assertiveness training often find that they gain respect from others as well as confidence in themselves, he said.

Learning to respond assertively involves several abilities, Hoover added. The first is the recognition of the rights one has and how these rights are being violated. Another is recognizing one's personal inhibitions about responding assertively. Responding so as to maintain those rights without jeopardizing one's well-being is a third ability which can be learned.

The difference between assertiveness and aggression will also be emphasized, Taylor said. Confidence, she added, is a key word in defining assertiveness, while aggressiveness involves the intention to dominate another person or persons.

A real property sale in violation of Section 7-38-7 is void.

4. A sale properly made under the provisions of No. 7-38-7 constitutes full payment of all delinquent taxes, penalties and interest that are a lien against the property at the time of sale, and the sale extinguishes the lien. The property is sold subject to the lien for property taxes for the year of the sale, provided those taxes are not yet delinquent. SANTA FE—Well, let's see now, it's been almost two weeks since the President got on the tube and told us we ought to straighten out our lives.
 "Stop being so materialistic and so selfish" was what the sermon part of his speech came down to. Nothing new about that. We've heard those ideas from every pulpit in the land—though he may be the first elected official to have looked us in the eye and said them straight-on to us.
 So how have we heeded his words here in New Mexico? Has the state of our spiritual life improved in any appreciable manner? Well, here are some straws in the wind you can judge by.
 The glow of the TV tube had hardly faded that Sunday night before our Secretary of Energy and Minerals, Larry Keches, was telling the newspapers to tell us we better get our wagons in a circle to keep from having all our energy ripped off. The way he put it is that "they"—some mysterious "they" who always lurk out there—are going to "ride roughshod over us." That sounded more like Paul Revere warning us that the British are coming than it did like Saint Francis of Assisi preaching to the birds, which was what the President wanted.
 Then the Governor came up with a couple of ideas which didn't seem to be so much in the unselfish mode either. He implied that those folks back in the Big East would be out here trying to make an energy colony of us.
 Not only did he say that here at home, but he went up to Denver and told it to all the other Western governors. Hardly seemed like a friendly thing to do.
 Then he got to thinking about all that money that's suddenly going to be flowing

through the pipeline for synthetic fuels. He pretty much announced that our state will be out there wrestling to get our full share of that good stuff—and nobody had better try to stop us.
 Both of those positions sounded more like boys squabbling in the schoolyard than they did like Saint John saying to the early Christians, "See how they love one another!"
 (Of course, one or two of those guys who got sacked from the Carter cabinet within a few days after the Boss' allocation may not have thought the spirit of primitive Christianity was prevailing on the Potomac either.)
 Some of us took to mumbling because the man back there in Washington didn't say enough about nuclear energy, and we've maybe got our dough tied up in uranium stocks, which will skyrocket if the nuclear business picks up at all. And some were griping that he didn't say enough about solar energy, which is what they're into. Hardly anybody really seemed to be satisfied with the speech or what came after it; everybody who wanted to could find something to grumble about.
 Maybe—just maybe—we would all have been able to show ourselves a little less materialistic and not quite so selfish if the President himself hadn't talked, that night and over the next few days, about so much money the government is planning to spend. We're certainly not going to tell a President what to do, but we have noticed when you toss that dough around is when the ugly side comes out in most people.
 Oh, well, what it all boils down to, here in Santa Fe at least, is business as usual—or every man for himself. Conclusion: The effects of President's sermons don't last any longer than those from ministers or priests.

The "above board" includes a set of by-laws, approved by the American Mule Association. Also, there will be an accounting of every penny handled by the Mule Skinnners. For example, general operating funds are deposited at Ruidoso State Bank with all purse monies for the October 5-7 meeting in a security bank account, withdrawable only to pay the winners of races.

The Chamber of Commerce is actively supporting the Mule Skinnners. The Chamber and directors of the Mule Skinnners agreed at the time the group was formed that there be strict accountability of all funds and that all activities be thoroughly controlled.

What's needed right now is financial help in sponsoring the purses for this year's races; plus 40 to 50 willing and knowledgeable volunteers willing to work long hours for no pay to make mule racing and show events a permanent attraction here.

Mules, with the cooperation of area folks, can become the biggest fall drawing card in the history of Ruidoso/Ruidoso Downs. — CD

Charles Mueller took Sunday off from riding at Ruidoso Downs and a well deserved rest it was. For he had already ridden nine winners in the previous three days, including six Thursday, making him an easy choice for Jockey-of-The-Week honors at Ruidoso Downs.

each, but Werner had five runnerup finishes.
Mueller won on six of eight mounts Thursday and added a third place finish for extra measure. It was the best single day total for a regular 13 race card this season. Twice before Danny Summerow had won four races on a regular card. Last month Jerry Nicodemus won seven on a 21 race card.
Moving along, Mueller won two races Friday and added a solo win in the 13th

race Saturday. Sunday, Mueller was at The Downs of Santa Fe where he rode in the feature race.

All totaled, Mueller was 8-1-6 in 23 starts. Werner won the fifth race Saturday and captured the fourth race Sunday to earn his title. The tie breaking runnerup finishes came earlier. Werner tightened the girth on solo second place finishers Thursday and Friday, then scored with three runnerup spots Saturday.

Hugh L. Tucker continues to lead the overall trainer standings with 28 wins. The only change in the standings came at the bottom where Clifford C. Lambert and Jack W. Brooks swapped places.

Mueller bolted into fourth place with his performance, but Gary Sumpter remains the overall leader followed by Summerow.

Racing continues Thursday and Friday with full 13 race cards featuring quarter horse and thoroughbred action. Saturday, the First Lady Handicap for fillies and mares tops the day. Added money of \$7,500 will draw a field of three-year-olds and older. Distance is 5 1/2 furlongs.

Sunday's topper is the 11th running of the \$102,726 World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic over 440 yards. Ina Gates Gal was the fastest qualifier in trials held last week. The winner will collect \$51,363. First post each day is 1 p.m.

CHARLIE MUELLER electrified Thursday's attendance with six victories on eight mounts. He also added a third place finish. Mueller won the third, fifth, sixth, eighth, tenth and thirteenth races. The tallest longshot Mueller brought in was in the third race, a six furlong maiden spin for New Mexico bred. Aboard Tyloonal, Mueller rode the 16-1 longshot to a wire-to-wire win. On the day, Mueller won four thoroughbred races and two quarter horse races. It was the winningest day for a jockey on a regular 13 race card this season. The previous best was by Danny Summerow who carded four winners twice this year. Jerry Nicodemus won seven races on a 21 race card last month.

IMA GATES GAL set the fastest qualifying time for the World's Championship Quarter Horse Classic in trials held Friday. The 440 yard dash will be staged July 29 and carries a gross purse of \$102,726. The winner will collect almost \$52,000. It is fashioned for three-year-olds and older. With Gary Sumpter aboard, Ina Gates Gal won the first division in a time of 21.93 seconds. Ina Gates Gal is trained by Roger C. Fagan.

THE FIRST DIVISION of the Classic trials advanced four to the finale. Behind Ina Gates Gal came Rubys Gold in a time of 22.00; Magic Injun, 22.15; and Elgh Bid Man, 22.31. There were a total of 42 head entered, setting up five trials. Here are the remaining qualifiers: Luicks Image Girl, 21.96; Oh Shilney, 22.11; Vespero, 22.16; Dickeys Fireman, 22.23; Birdies Bar, 22.31 and Core Of The Apple, 22.33. Core Of The Apple had tied Kennys Sam with a 22.33 clocking but advanced after a shake was held the following morning.

THE TRAINER-JOCKEY combinations of Hugh L. Tucker-Slave Fuller and Paul J. Sopchak-Jesse Yeakum sent two horses each to the finale. Fuller was aboard Luicks Image Girl and Oh Shilney while Yeakum rode Core Of The Apple and Elgh Bid Man. The only other division to send more than one horse was the eighth where Vespero, Birdies Bar and Core Of The Apple advanced.

JERRY NICODEMUS, riding only his fifth mount in the last 12 racing days, won the featured 11th race Thursday. Nicodemus, who injured a shoulder before the Rainbow Futurity time trials, placed first and second on his only two mounts two weeks ago. On his first ride Thursday, Nicodemus placed fourth in the second race on Disco Dances. Aboard Easy Crimson in the 11th, Nicodemus guided the Easy Jet colt to the lead immediately and

held on for a full length win over Shebestor bug. Azurelana was third. Nine-to-five favorite Gentlemens Feature, the 1978 Kansas Futurity winner, was sixth.

A COUPLE OF BIG NAMES failed to qualify for the Classic. Seco Mia, third in the All-American Derby and winner of the Top Deck Stakes last year, finished fifth in


the first division behind High Bid Man. She was a solid 1-2 favorite. Easy Dandy Dan, who was good enough to be invited to the 1977 Champion of Champions race at Los Alamitos, finished third in the second division but was not fast enough. Easy Dandy Dan was turned out last year and had won his last outing at Ruidoso. Song O My Heart, a colt owned by Jody Miller, placed second behind Vespero but was disqualified down to eighth place for interference in the stretch. Mr Afton Bug, winner of the Kansas Derby earlier this year, placed third in the fourth division but was not fast enough.

A DEAD HEAT for the second place in the 13th race produced a rare double payoff in the Big Q Friday. Mike's Glory, ridden by Roland Ramos, and Shy Sue, ridden by Carlos Rivas, hit the wire at the same time behind winner Bar None Pappa. Coupled with Greek Sir and Boca Chica from the 12th race, two Big Q payoffs were needed. With Mike's Glory the return was \$2,742.20 and with Shy Sue the payoff was \$1,959.20. There were a total of 12 winning tickets. The respective quinela returns were \$137.40 and \$165.60.

FOR THE THIRD TIME this season, the same post position was involved in the Daily Double. Saturday, the horse charging from the ninth post position came in first in the first and second races. True Rounder, with Danny Summerow aboard, captured the opening race while Speed In Deed, with Jack Wallace up, won the second race. The payoff was \$11.69. July 14 the five post position won both races for a \$15.50 pay off and the fourth position was the winner June 22 for a \$29.40 return.

CINCO PISTOL, running clear on the outside, sped to a 1 1/4 length victory in the Rainbow Futurity Consolation Saturday. Breaking from the ninth post position, Cinco Pistol steadily pulled away from the field. He added almost \$15,000 to his bankroll. Take Five Too finished second followed by Tonkawah, who was the fastest qualifier. Time on a track labeled good was 20.60 seconds. Carl White was aboard the winner.

BUSINESS WAS REALLY humming at the mutual windows over the weekend as the four day stretch produced a whopping handle of \$2,169,638. That averages out to \$540,171 per day. On the same weekend last year, the four day total was \$1,775,144 (a daily average of \$443,786). The big weekend helped push the seasonal daily average ahead of last year's record pace. After 43 race days, the current average stands at \$423,485, which is a gain of 2.47 over last year's \$413,254 at the same point. Fans are currently betting a per race average of \$32,515.

Let's say it's a scorching summer day in the Texas Flattlands, and you're on the speed, anxious to get where you're going for a summer vacation.

The highway is hot enough to turn a pancake into curled up carbon paper. You've just about had it when you turn the radio dial, and these words float into your summer-baked eardrums: "Here are the race results from Ruidoso Downs, home of the All-American Futurity, the world's richest horse race. It's about 76 degrees here in the cool, pine country..."

Maybe you don't care about getting the geyoffs on the daily double, but that image of pine trees swaying in the cool mountain breeze, the implication of crisp blue skies, gurgling streams flowing down from Sierra Blanca—well, it's enough to make an overcooked flounder put his gas guzzler into a 90 degree turn and head for the high country.

The man behind that beckoning electronic voice is Ed Hyman—and he's been going through his summer race routine for the past 11 years. Actually, the bit about the cool mountains takes only a few seconds—his job is to give the race results, not Ruidoso weather report. But when he drops an item about the summer climate, he does it with routine surety. It's enough to get a body hankering for the mountains, let alone the horses.

Folks who've been listening to Ed Hyman over the years tend to think of him as tall and slender. "I guess I've got a tall slender voice," he said. "Actually, I'm just about average—five feet, ten inches and about 180 pounds."

The man behind the so-familiar voice occasionally goes up front. For example, he's been the pitchman in a number of television commercials used throughout the Southwest. And he's taken several turns before the big screen camera. Remember that scene in "Casey's Shadow," when Walter Matthau is being interviewed after winning the All-American Futurity? How does it feel to win, the announcer asks. Matthau responds with the tobacco-chewing line about having nearly wet his pants, and the announcer (played by Hyman) blushes under the strain of such a mass media calamity.

About a decade ago, the quickly forgotten track movie, "Tiger By The Tail," was shot at Ruidoso, and Hyman had a 3-4 minute part in which he plays an airport manager and discusses a possible plane crashup, or something to that effect, with Christopher George.

Generally, though, Hyman restricts himself to the radio microphone—since that medium is his bread and butter. In the straight world, he tells as owner, manager and chief creative force behind KRRR Radio in Ruidoso. During the summers, Hyman—assisted by wife Marion at the controls—beams his dulcet tones out of the radio booth atop the track grandstand. The race result network covers about a dozen major markets in Texas—including El Paso, Dallas-Ft. Worth, Lubbock, Odessa-Midland, Abilene, San Angelo and Wichita Falls. Some of the stations, such as KHEY in El Paso and KWFT in Wichita Falls, reach out several hundred miles. Put them all together, and you'll see why Ed Hyman's race reports are likely to reach a lot of ears.

Once, while visiting with a radio station manager in Brady, Texas Ed stopped in a store to buy something or other, and one of the patrons listened to Ed talking to the clerk. "Aren't you the guy who broadcasts the races?" he asked. This, of course, led to a long conversation about horse racing and other customers came over to take part. It's not uncommon, Ed says, for folks to associate his voice with race results.

Before settling in Ruidoso, Hyman spent 16 years in San Antonio as operations manager for WOAI-TV. He handled special events, and sports, and weather, among many assignments. He also announced Southwest Conference football for NBC-TV. But he gave all that up when he happened by Ruidoso one summer, liked it, and came back and bought the radio station. That was in 1964.

Later, he learned the Ruidoso race results went with the territory, and when announcers handling it either left for better jobs or didn't pan out, he took the assignment himself. That was 11 years ago. Since then, he's missed only two race days. (He had to return to San Antonio, Texas for a funeral.)

Doing the race results and keeping a balancing act with a dozen stations is not

always a piece of cake. Once, when network snags developed, he wound up doing 35 three-minute broadcasts in one afternoon. "After a while," Ed said, "I can get tired of listening to me."

Before Ed can give his race report, the stations are lined up by the telephone operator in a conference call. Each station tapes the report for airing a few minutes later. Once, as Ed was beginning his

report, a frantic fellow cut into the line. "Wait! Wait a minute!" he yelled. "My tape machine is burning up!" Sure enough, his equipment had caught fire and was pouring smoke into the studio, so the network had to wait while this fellow scrambled for a fire extinguisher.

Another time, a weekend disc jockey at a key station took it on his own not to use the

results. "Why aren't you airing the race results?" Ed finally asked him. The matter-of-fact answer: "I'm against racing on religious grounds." Ed's next call went to the station manager and that got things back on schedule.

Once, in the midst of a network report, a lightning bolt landed in Texas and kayoted the race results. No real problem, though. A team of operators re-routed the network feeds (after some hectic maneuvering) from Roswell, to Denver, to St. Louis, to Dallas, to Albuquerque and finally to all the stations.

Dealing with the weekend jockey can offer a surprise or two. Maybe it's just the nature of the breed. Ed's had his share of

surprises with people on his payroll, let alone those he had to convince they were supposed to take the race results. One day he came to work and noticed an oil blot in the carpet in the KRRR studios. He called the carpet cleaners and the stuff turned out to be crankcase oil. The explanation: the weekend disc jockey had decided to wheel his motorcycle into the studio and change the oil between records. Shortly afterward, Hyman said, this disc jockey "kind of went away."

But whether it's an oil blot, a lightning bolt or weekend personnel who've never heard of the race results, Ed Hyman takes it all with an unflappable smile—and keeps telling you who won the daily double.

"No, No, No! If I've told you once, I've told you a thousand times—No!" Or, to put it in more simple, good plain English—"No!"

No, you CANNOT keep an eagle, hawk, owl, or vulture. These birds, often collectively referred to as "birds of prey", are protected by law.

Eagles are protected by the Eagle Act which expressly prohibits the taking, possession, sale, purchase, barter, transportation, export, and import of bald and golden eagles, their parts, nests, and eggs.

This Act became effective for bald eagles June 8, 1940 and was amended October 24, 1962 to extend protection to golden eagles.

The New Mexico law protecting hawks, owls, and vultures is a more recent one than is the Eagle Act, however, it is by no means a new one.

This act, effective since March 12, 1971 states, "it is unlawful for any person to take, attempt to take, possess, trap or ensnare, or in any manner to injure, maim or destroy birds of the order Falconiformes, comprising all of the species and varieties of birds represented by the several families of vultures and hawks, and all of the order Strigiformes, comprising all of the species and varieties of owls.

Even though neither of these laws is new, our officers continue to find these birds of prey being killed or possessed illegally.

The majestic nature of these birds seems to entice people to want to possess them, whether it be as a pet or as a stuffed wall decoration piece.

Of course, the birds of prey law has certain exceptions just as do most laws. The exception which is probably the most important to the general public is that of the falconry permit holder.

Any person in New Mexico who wishes to keep raptors (birds of prey) under captive conditions, must apply for and obtain a New Mexico falconer permit. Raptors held under these permits may not be used for hunting any game species whether wild or pen-raised, EXCEPT as specifically provided by Commission regulation.

The falconer permit does not include permission to take raptors from the wild. However, such a permit (raptor-taking permit) can be applied for by a holder of a falconer permit. If a permit is granted by the director of the Department of Game and Fish, it will specify the area from which it must be taken.

Persons interested in obtaining a falconer's permit must meet several qualifications which include residential status, minimum age, experience,

examination, fees, facilities and equipment.

The exam itself is very difficult and requires more than just a general knowledge of raptors. It involves primarily biology, care and handling of raptors, laws and regulations, disease, literature and other appropriate subject matter. A score of at least 80 percent is required for passing.

Get concerned with the welfare of New Mexico's birds of prey. Let these birds live as they are protected by law. Don't try to take them as pets because they are not only illegal to possess, but can be very

dangerous as well. Don't keep birds you have found wounded, but do report them to a game and fish officer. Don't pick up road-killed birds with the hopes of having it mounted by a taxidermist, because you will still be in illegal possession.

Community United Methodist Church formed by group of dedicated people



THE BELL IN THE TOWER of the Community United Methodist Church is heard throughout the village every Sunday. According

The Community United Methodist Church was organized in Ruidoso in the Mid-1940's by Hazel Kennedy and many friends who missed their church when they moved to the village.

Kennedy said when she and her husband Ike moved to Ruidoso in 1945 from Lubbock "I decided I wasn't going to live here without my church."

She began a long process to organize a new church by visiting the bishop and district superintendent to "see if we could have a church" in September, 1945.

She was told by the bishop, "If you can get Dr. Thomas S. Barcus from Tularosa to come and help you, I'll help you build a church."

Kennedy then composed a list of 21 prospective members and contacted Barcus, who felt sure a church could be formed. "We decided to meet in the school building for a while. We had Dr. Barcus come up on Palm Sunday, 1946 for our first communion and I remember Carmen Phillips made a picture of it."

Church was held at the school until September 30, 1946 when the group had their first board meeting and decided to move Sunday meetings to a small rock building located on a lot adjoining the property where the Shell station now stands. The building was owned by White Mountain Development Company and was used because two company owners, the late George McCarty and Mrs. Dulcie M. Palmer, were also church members.

Not long after that, McCarty and Palmer donated a lot to the church valued at \$600 in 1946. "We started with \$257 in cash donations from people to build that church," Kennedy said. Ground breaking ceremonies were held the Wednesday preceding Thanksgiving, 1946 and Kennedy was one of two to break the ground for the new church.

"We had the foundation in before Christmas. Harry Fairbanks designed the church and it was a tiny church at first. Ike Wingfield put on the siding to finish it," she said.

A bell was purchased by Emmett Reese for the church. "It was a bell from the middle of the street where the Exxon Station is now. It was off an early locomotive," Kennedy said.

The church was ready for use by Palm Sunday, 1947 but the congregation was still meeting in the rock building. "We marched over to our new church on Palm Sunday . . . I'll never forget how pretty it was," Kennedy said.

The church was paid for 19 months after the groundbreaking and was dedicated by Bishop Angle Smith. The first wedding ever held in the Methodist Church was that of Corrine Kennedy and Dan D. Swearingin, married October 18, 1947.

Pastors who have served the church over the years include H.L. Graves, the first assigned pastor, the late Hugh Bailey, the Reverends Frank Matthews, Tom Richardson, Charles Crutchfield, Earl Bell and Ed Diferline, who saw the church grow to three times its original size during his service.

An education building was eventually added and was "three lumber sheds which were donated by Kiel Bonnell," Kennedy said.

When the charter was closed in 1947, 109 members belonged to the church. Over the years, Kennedy said the women's organization has been very active on the local, sub-district, and district levels. Church officers "have been very faithful . . . for instance, Gladys Knox was the church treasurer for 18 years," Kennedy said.

Nora Pistole was the first Sunday School superintendent and started a tradition of keeping "a good Sunday School." A.E. Hunt kept the ball rolling and Mrs. Floyd Coville continues the practice today.

The Reverend Noble Wiltshire now pastors the church, and has lived in Ruidoso four years. He grew

up in Texas and attended Gainesville Junior College, Oklahoma University, Oklahoma City University, Central State University at Edmond, Oklahoma and completed his theological work at Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University in Dallas.

Wiltshire served in the Oklahoma Conference 24 years before coming to Clovis and the New Mexico Conference. He has also served at Odessa, Pecos and Las Vegas.

The church now has 273 members with an average summer attendance of 140 and winter congregation of 90.

The structure of the church's governing body is set up like that of the United States government. In fact, the Methodist Church was established before the government, and the government saw how effectively the structure worked and decided to copy the idea, according to Wiltshire.

Kennedy said some very dedicated people served on the administrative board as chairmen including Dan D. Swearingin, the late Ike Wingfield, the late R. K. Knox, Travis Hicks, Emmett Reese, Robert Pearson, Dr. Dale Wynn, Roy W. Ratcliffe and Dave Parks.

Current board members include Edith Burns, Mary Parsons, Paul Trout, Lou Horton, R.L. Jones, Parks, Jessie Lee Hawkins, Kennedy and Kathy Edwards.

The board makes the final decisions for the church, but receives recommendations from various sub-committees. "All programs are reviewed by the board," Wiltshire said.

Regular worship services are held Sundays at 8:30 and 10:30 a.m., with church school at 9:30 a.m. The church youth group meets at 6 p.m., every Sunday and the United Methodist Women's group meets at 7 p.m., Wednesdays. Open communion is held on Maundy Thursday, at noon through Holy Week and every Christmas Eve.

The Community United Methodist Church is located in the Palmer Gateway area in Ruidoso.

Runnels chairing WIPP hearings

Congressman Harold Runnels, D-N.M., has announced that he will chair oversight hearings next month on the Waste Isolation Pilot Plant (WIPP) proposed for construction in southeastern New Mexico. Runnels said the Subcommittee on Oversight and Investigations of the House Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs will hold hearings August 8 in Carlsbad and August 10 in Albuquerque.

The Subcommittee has invited a large number of people to testify during its New Mexico hearings. Among those invited include the Department of Energy (DOE), Bureau of Land Management (BLM), U.S. Geological Survey, Nuclear Regulatory Commission, the New Mexico Governor, State Attorney General, county and local officials, company representatives, and concerned groups in New Mexico.

"WIPP has become a most confused subject," stated Runnels. "In the past two years, the Department of Energy has altered their position as to the mission and scope of the proposed project, causing considerable concern in Congress. This confusion has been complicated by the fact that the President has yet to deliver to Congress his recommendations on waste management which we have been told contains a position on WIPP."

Runnels said the Subcommittee is especially interested in plans for implementing the commitment from DOE officials that the State of New Mexico will have an active role in deciding whether or not WIPP is to be located in the state. "Frankly, the officials who made those commitments to New Mexico may not be in the government much longer," Runnels said.

"What, then?"

The Subcommittee also intends to determine where DOE stands in regard to construction of WIPP, to clarify the exact mission and scope of the proposed project, as well as address the many concerns related to WIPP.

Runnels said that the Subcommittee wants to assure that the concerns of the citizens of the state are heard and considered by Federal officials involved with WIPP and that if the project is ultimately constructed, that "highest priority be given to the health and safety aspects of possible transportation and storage of wastes in New Mexico or any other state."

The August 8 hearing in Carlsbad will be held at the Rodeway Inn and the August 10 hearing in Albuquerque at the Albuquerque Convention Center. Both hearings are to begin at 9:00 a.m.

Eric P. Serna heading state employment office

Employment Security Department Secretary Eric P. Serna, newest member of Governor Bruce King's cabinet, was sworn in recently by Chief Justice of the New Mexico Supreme Court Dan Sosa.

Serna is the first Secretary for the newly established department, but the 18th person to head the agency which administers Job Service and Unemployment Compensation programs in the state. The agency was first established as the Unemployment Compensation Commission in 1938 when New Mexico passed an unemployment compensation law in compliance with the Federal Social Security Act. Responsibility for operation

of the New Mexico State Employment Service was also given to the new commission under Chairman/Executive Director Clinton P. Anderson.

In 1941, the agency became the Employment Security Commission (ESC) of New Mexico. Although the state employment service was absorbed by the U.S. Employment Service under the War Manpower Commission from 1942 until 1946, the commission continued to operate the state's unemployment compensation program during the war years. On March 31, 1978, the agency became a division of the New Mexico Department of Human Services under state government reorganization.





Roswell grazing projects planned

Basket-like wire test "cages" were among proposed federal range projects reviewed last week by the Roswell Grazing Advisory Board. The five-member board meeting with Bureau of Land Management (BLM) officials in Roswell gave a tentative go-ahead to range improvement projects which will cost an estimated \$127,500.

Board members, however, said they hope the projects can be kept to minimum cost. They said they would also like to consult with ranchers affected by the projects before giving complete support.

Roy Stovall, operations chief for the Roswell district of the BLM, presented a recommendation that \$8,500 be used for materials to build test cages to protect study plots in the East Roswell Grazing Environmental Statement area. The BLM will use the 9.6-square-foot plots to determine how much forage is used by livestock and wildlife.

Other proposed projects include drilling a water well on the Charlie James allotment southeast of Carlsbad. The project will tie into an existing pipeline and supplement a well already on the allotment. The BLM would allocate a maximum of \$20,000 for the project.

About \$28,000 in funds would be used to replace fencing around part of the proposed Mesalero Natural Area 35 miles east of Roswell. BLM officials said because part of the present fence is deteriorating, cows have wandered into the natural area and have been stranded.

Two combination cattle shades and livestock waterers will be built on the Cap Kelly allotment on public lands near Carlsbad. The shades, resembling carports, will be built of heavy wooden posts supporting slanted roofs of corrugated steel. Rain hitting the roof runs into a metal gutter leading to a 21,000-gallon

storage tank and a waterer. BLM is allocating \$30,000 for the project.

Similar water catchments, these for wildlife, will be built next summer by the Youth Conservation Corps with \$25,000 allocation. The BLM will also experiment with "natural" catchments. Wax mixed into the soil will "seal" a natural water-

shed to direct moisture into a catchment. The process has been successful in Arizona.

Four funnel-like water catchments will be built with \$15,000 in funds. Invented "umbrellas" of sheet metal will funnel rainfall into a 1,000-gallon storage tank and waterer for use by wildlife.

Grazing Advisory Board members suggested that the BLM not restrict waterers to wildlife but also open them to livestock. The board also asked the BLM to investigate the possibility of tying into existing pipelines or drilling new wells to obtain better water supplies than the catchments could provide.

**Pappy Johnson
Celebrates Birthday**

Willis Ronald Johnson better known as "Pappy" to his many friends will celebrate his birthday on Monday, July thirty. He was born on this day in 1910 in Fort Chadbourne, Coke County, Texas. His father's name was Don Johnson and his mother was Hettie Kirkland Johnson.

Pappy was named after two of his mother's brothers, Willis and Ronald Kirkland. Willis Kirkland was a locomotive engineer all his life. He pulled the first locomotive over the Kansas City Mexico and Orient railroad after it was completed in 1918. This railroad went from Alton, Oklahoma through Hamlin, San Angelo, and Fort Stockton and turned around at Alpine, Texas. Pappy remembers that this railroad was "built with mules", saying that bull dozers were unheard of in those days.

His uncle Ronald Kirkland worked in the roundhouse as a boiler repairing the locomotives and keeping them in condition.

For a little while, around 1928, when he was "just a kid" Pappy worked as a fireman on the locomotive operated by his uncle Willis.

Old Times Remembered

Pappy recalls many happy days of his boyhood home on the farm at Fort Chadbourne. He remembers especially the days of the depression of the late twenties and early thirties.

"We raised our living tips," said Pappy. "We did not have much money, but we all helped each other."

Pappy went on to say that they raised cotton, maize, corn and many garden products. They raised hogs and chickens, and milk cows. Pappy remembers churning with the hand churn to make the butter.

The community around his home was like one big happy family, Pappy remembers.

"We worked among ourselves, helping each other with the farm work. If you got sick your neighbors would gather your crop for you, and look after your stock, and bring you medicine or get the doctor for you."

"We had parties and dances in our homes, and the neighbors came from miles around," Pappy remembers. "Model T's were very scarce in those days of my boyhood. Mostly we traveled by wagon, buggy, horseback or walked."

Pappy remembers the first car his father bought, a 1919 touring car Ford Model T, which was started by a crank, or by "pulling it with mules."

Married in 1936

On March three, 1936 Pappy was married to the former Mildred Fore in Brownfield, Texas. Pappy and Mildred have one son and four daughters.

Mildred has recently retired from work at Fort Stanton Hospital and she and Pappy are happy on their little farm and orchard home in Ruidoso Downs.

About forty years ago, Pappy began his career as a dirt contractor in the oil fields around Crane and Odessa. In 1960 he came to Ruidoso for the first time and has been coming back every year. In 1975 he retired and settled at his home in Ruidoso Downs, where he raises some of the best apples and pears in the world and a grand garden.

Planning to be present at the occasion of his birthday are his son Jack and his wife, Souja and their children from Odessa; Joyce and her husband, Jim Anderson and children from Crane; and Jean Mathis and her daughter from Crane; and Joan Mathis and daughter Jean from Odessa.

Also planning to visit are Mrs. Johnson's sister Arlene Carrol and her husband, D.S.

We wish Pappy many happy returns of the day and all God's blessings. And we are happy that his wife, Mildred's sister and her husband will be present at the joyful gathering.


