## HUMANE SOCIETY SEEKS VILLAGE LAND

# Animal shelter proposed

The village trustees Tuesday evening unanimously approved providing village owned acreage for construction of an animal shelter, as proposed by the Humane Society of Lincoln County (HSLC).

This action is contingent upon determination by village attorney Ron Harris that there are no legal barriers to completion of a land use agreement, for the animal shelter, between HSLC and the village of Ruidoso.

HSLC president Ed Jungbluth, requested permission to construct a 2,700 square foot, completely enclosed animal shelter, on village property, situated between the existing sewage treatment plant and the village's hot mix plant.

Jungbluth advised the trustees that the proposed shelter:

- Would be constructed of cinder blocks on a concrete slab.
- Initially would provide 22 four-by-eight-foot holding pens, with 11 on each side of the building.
- Would include other rooms, for quarantine, or holding puppies and cats, putting the maximum capacity of the facility at approximately 50 animals.
- Will be completely contained, that animals would never be outside and that noise from animals would be virtually eliminated due to installation of a subdued noise system from within the building that would prevent animals from barking at outside noises, such as traffic or pedestrians. Jungbluth stated that no audible sounds from within the building would be detectable from any distance, outside the structure, exceeding fifty feet.
- The building would incorporate partial solar heat, that would also provide hot water.
- Parking would be provided for 10 vehicles.
- An animal cemetery would be provided.
- Construction time was pegged at 90 days.

—Confiscated animals would be destroyed within five days.

Jungbluth stated that HSLC would prefer "to operate the facility in toto," under contract with the villages of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs and Lincoln County. He said, however, that HSLC would be open to alternative suggestions for operation of the shelter, coupled with services by an animal control officer working under a contract agreement.

In supporting the structure, HSLC member Allison Walstead said to the trustees, "This will be the nicest building in the area."

Village clerk Jim Hine then stated: "I resent that remark, as my home is in that area and I violently object to the location of an animal shelter in that area."

Hine then advised the trustees that alternate proposals for animal control, pending hiring a full time control officer,

or completion of an animal shelter, had been submitted to him by Ron Kowalski and Jim Woodridge.

Trustee Sherman Atwood then suggested that Kowalski and Woodridge finalize their animal control proposals and submit them to the trustees at a later meeting. He also suggested that HSLC submit their proposal for employing an animal control officer to the trustees.

Mayor Lloyd L. Davis Jr., then advised HSLC members present to meet with Hine and village attorney Ron Harris to "work out legal problems" on the proposed land transfer in time to "discuss the facility with the trustees" at the April 29 meeting of the council.

Trustee Benny Coulston moved, pending legal clearance, that the village provide the necessary acreage, at the selected site, to construct HSLC's animal shelter; with second by trustee Frank

Sayner and all voting aye.

In other business the trustees: —Approved calling for bids for pressure cleaning equipment for sewer mains and culverts.

—Took no action, pending study of construction details received, on the Russian Fireplace proposed for installation in the Senior Citizens Center.

—Received, with no action taken, a letter of resignation from Sierra Blanca Airport Commission submitted by chairman Richard Hall.

—Approved annexation of the Driver Tract, zoned as light commercial, C-1 as defined by the Planning and Zoning Commission in a pending publication.

—Approved vacation of eight feet of street right-of-way on Lot 8, Block 17, Ponderosa Heights Unit III, to eliminate an encroachment on the street by a porch on a house.

## Speed limit change sought in midtown

A meeting between officials of the New Mexico Highway Department and the Retail Merchants Committee of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce will be arranged soon to discuss changing the speed limit in midtown and completing the crosswalks.

Retail merchants arranged to have the crosswalks painted in midtown last year, but since they were never completed, a true test of their effectiveness in protecting the pedestrian was never established.

The Village of Ruidoso has agreed to cooperate with the Highway Department to complete the crosswalk project, which would involve erecting no parking signs and painting no parking zones in appropriate areas throughout midtown.

Retail merchants also decided to sponsor a seminar on retail theft and agreed to split any costs incurred. Chamber executive director Ed Jungbluth said a shoplifting clinic held in late March

was "a good launching pad" toward obtaining more specific information, and suggested local merchants sponsor more informative clinics.

The committee's Easter egg hunt and "afternoon in the park" Easter Sunday were termed a success, with attendance at both considered satisfactory. Sunday's event put attendance at around 200 people, which merchants felt was good for the time of year and during a school vacation.

Merchants also decided to begin efforts to improve the appearance and serviceability of School House Park, especially in getting restrooms in working order for summer use.

Four members of the committee, Larry Langford, Ralph Bellon, Roger Marshall and Richard Sandoval, were recently elected to serve as Chamber board members. All said they wish to remain members of the Retail Merchants Committee.

## Ruidoso Downs using pens to hold stray dogs

Stray animals picked up in Ruidoso Downs are now being housed in a new temporary holding facility, a structure completed this week by police chief Ray Garner.

The facility consists of five cages measuring 3½ by 5 feet, and has already sheltered eight dogs, most of which were placed with local families, Garner said. The holding pens are located behind the Downs fire hall.

Animals will be detained in accordance with state law, for a minimum of 72 hours. An attempt will be made to contact the owners of the animals, he said.

Garner added that owners whose dogs are picked up will be cited for allowing the animal to run at large. The fine for that offense, as set by the village trustees, is \$25, Garner said.

If an owner cannot be located, "we will try to place the animals, with the stipulation that they are vaccinated for rabies and city licenses are obtained."

Dogs will be accepted to be placed for adoption, Garner said, but added they could be kept no longer than one week. Any Downs resident whose dog is missing, or who wishes to adopt an animal may contact the police department at 378-4421.

Total cost of materials for the shelter, including about 100 yards of fill material, chain link fencing, lumber and so on, was \$490, Garner said, with his labor provided at no additional cost. Operational costs, including salaries of officers performing the animal control work, will be no more than \$325 monthly, he said.

Since the Downs police department assumed the task of animal control last November, Garner said, "due to increased enforcement of animal ordinances, there has been a reduction in the number of animals running at large of probably 300 percent."

## New Hondo Valley bridge in use

One of two bridges destroyed in the June 8 flooding of the Hondo Valley has been rebuilt and opened to traffic Monday.

Completion of the second bridge is anticipated by May 1, according to county manager Bill Billingsley.

The June disaster marked the second time these two bridges were destroyed. An

earlier inundation, in November of 1965, carried away the bridges, which were replaced with wooden structures.

Total cost of the current bridge projects was about \$349,000, Billingsley said, including contractors' fees, engineering fees and soil testing. The costs will be split, with the federal government paying 70

percent and the state and county paying 15 percent each.

In addition, the county has asked for additional federal funds to provide for riprap along the banks near the new bridges. If the funds are received, the county will provide labor for that part of the project, Billingsley said.

## Exhibitors registering

Fifteen artists have responded to invitations to participate in this year's Ruidoso Art Festival July 23-27, according to Ed Jungbluth, executive director of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

In a meeting of the Art Festival Committee Monday night, chairman Dave Wilson announced that all applications must be at the Chamber office by 5 p.m., May 1. The Selections Committee will name the 94 artists who will participate following a meeting in early May.

Wilson said he feels several problems encountered last year have already been alleviated for this year's festival. Last year, each artist was required to purchase an occupational license at village hall to participate in the festival. This year,

Wilson said, a blanket license costing \$100 was purchased.

Wilson said the large circus tents used last year have been contracted, and tie-downs will be repaired this week at the high school parking lot for the festival.

Wilson said the mounted patrol, which was used last year to guard all exhibits overnight, have agreed to provide their services again, and some type of perimeter fencing is being considered to prevent free entry into the festival and for better security.

The committee decided to offer two free artist booths, one to the Ruidoso Senior Citizens and one to the Mescalero Elderly Center.

Entertainment already scheduled to provide atmosphere during the festival include the Ruidoso Gymnastics

Association giving exhibitions, Blake Starr featured in a magic show, exhibitions by the Mescalero Pow Wow Dancers, an individual Indian dancer and a folk singer from Fort Davis, Texas.

Food booths already reserved include the Band Boosters, who will sell soft drinks and the Mescalero Rehabilitation Center, which will feature Indian fry bread and honey. Wilson said at least four other service organizations have scheduled booths, but food items have not been determined.

"We are ahead in the planning by a good month," Wilson said. "I feel like we'll have everything under much better control this year than we have had in the past."

Wilson called the next committee meeting for May 12 at 7:30 p.m., at the Chamber meeting room.

## Cancer clinic praised

Ruidoso's Cancer Screening Clinic has been praised in a state wide publication as "an ideal example of a community which is indeed in control," of an effective clinic program.

The local operation, based in the Ruidoso-Hondo Valley Hospital, received a two-page spread in Can-Trol (a combination of the words cancer and control), a magazine published by the University of New Mexico, Albuquerque.

The clinic provides a means of early detection of the most common and curable forms of cancer in both men and women, and was initiated by Southwest Health Care Corporation (SWHCC), under the jurisdiction of Presbyterian and St. Joseph's Hospitals and affiliates.

SWHCC conducted the clinic for one year, at which time the operation was taken over by the community. Five local doctors volunteer their time on a rotating basis to make examinations, and administrative work, such as setting of appointments, is performed by members of the hospital auxiliary or "Pink Ladies."

The clinic is held each Thursday afternoon and is free to men. A \$4.25 fee for women covers the cost of lab work for pap smears. A sixth doctor, a pathologist, donates his time to perform the lab work at cost.

Appointments may be made by contacting the hospital at 257-7381, extension 317. The clinic is generally held Thursdays and Fridays, depending on availability of the doctors.

The examination takes about 20 minutes, and clients are also taught various self-examination processes which they can perform in their homes.

The stated goal of the program is to make people more aware of the curability of many forms of cancer, particularly with early detection. Such knowledge helps to eliminate fear of the disease, said Dotti Quaid, clinic chairperson.

Another primary benefit of the screening exam, Quaid said, is the peace of mind which comes with a clean bill of health.

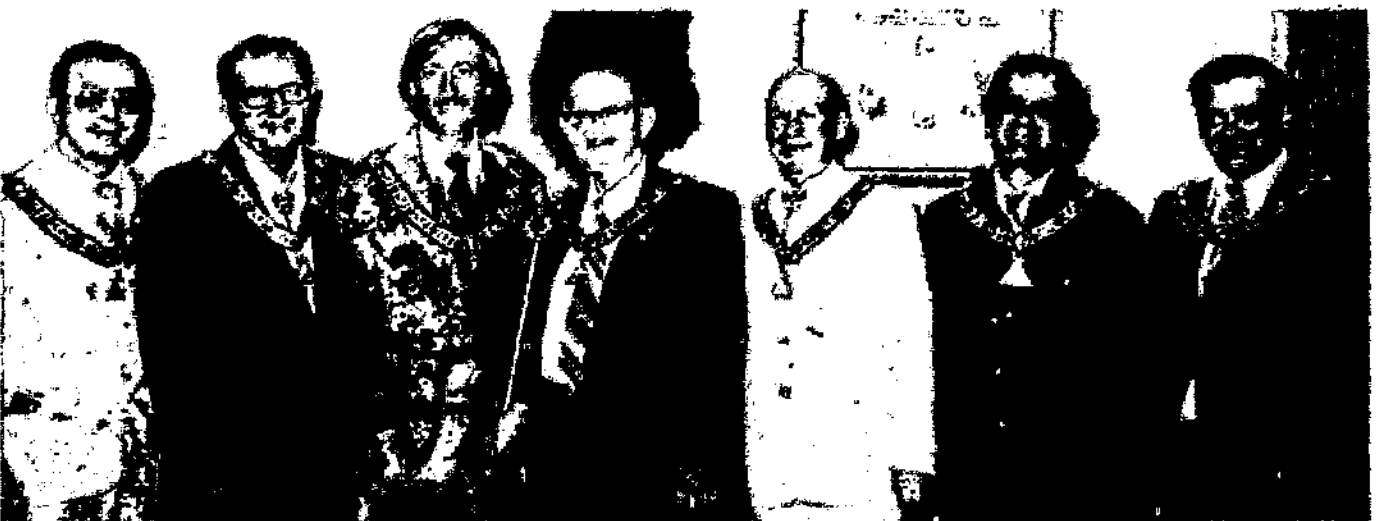

# Area 4-H Club formed Monday

"4-H is organized around the idea of learning by doing," Mary Ellen Payne told a group of Ruidoso youngsters Monday, when a Ruidoso area 4-H club was formed. About 20 persons attended the first organizational meeting designed to establish a 4-H club in the Ruidoso area. The meeting was coordinated by county extension personnel including Payne, extension home economist, Barry Herd, agricultural extension agent, and volunteer Sherry Hair, of Ruidoso.

Payne said 4-H is a national organization for youngsters from the ages of nine to 19, offering a "tremendously wide range" of activities. In addition to the better-known agricultural activities of 4-H, Payne said

the clubs also provide learning experiences in the areas of science, gardening, consumer education, home economics and a variety of creative arts and crafts.

Herd added that agricultural projects are still "a big part of 4-H. In addition to showing of animals, agricultural activities include judging contests of many kinds, he said.

Stephen Payne, president of the countywide 4-H council, explained some of the functioning of the council which consists of senior 4-H members (over 14 years old). He also mentioned other club activities available, including the county camp and district and state conventions and conferences.

Getting acquainted with other county youngsters with similar areas of interest is a fringe benefit of 4-H membership, Payne added.

Hair said she had been active in 4-H in Texas since the age of 12 and hoped to use her knowledge to help get the local club started. "It's a great experience for kids to belong to 4-H," she said. In addition to the possibility for learning, she said a major benefit of 4-H membership is the building of self confidence among the young people.

Information on various types of projects was distributed to the group, which agreed to meet again at 7 p.m., Monday, April 14 at the First Christian Church on Hull Road.

## The Plant Corner

### Sally Black

This column is devoted to growing healthy indoor plants. Address questions to: Sally Black, The Ruidoso News, Box 122, Ruidoso, New Mexico 86345.

Dear Sally: Whiteflies have invaded my greenhouse and taken over my tomato plants. Why is the best way to get rid of them? — Jim French

Dear Jim: Tomatoes, squash, pole-lettices and gourds are favorite foods of whiteflies.

Daily applications of malathion for one week, then once weekly for a month and once monthly thereafter will eliminate the pests.

Add a few drops of detergent to the insecticide spray, to help it stick to the leaves.

It is the oval shaped larvae, not the adults, that damage plants by adhering to the underside of leaves to suck the sap. The pest is difficult to control due to a five stage life cycle: egg, three larval and one as an adult.

It's a good idea to have a latch on the inside of your greenhouse.

# Altrusa sponsoring reading programs for young students

The Altrusa Club of Ruidoso, under the direction of the Literacy Committee, has organized an oral reading program for first and second graders at Nob Hill Elementary.

The program involves 11 women, Altrusans and non-Altrusans, who spend one to two mornings per week listening to children read.

The program, though still in its early stages, has proven itself, according to teachers. First grade teachers Greta Cabot and Nellie Ruth Jones said the children are reading better orally than before. "They are more confident in their reading and they're so enthusiastic about the program," Jones said.

Cabot said she can see a "noticeable improvement in reading orally. I can't believe the difference. They get more practice at reading and they seem to comprehend better."

In second grade, teacher Nancy McCarty said the program has been a very effective one. "Since there are so many children, it's very hard to give them the kind of individual attention they are getting with the Altrusa's reading program," she said.

Another second grade teacher, Sue Vinsant, said the program is "terrific. It's super for the kids to get to read orally each week," she said.

Coordinator for the oral reading program is Libby Sears, an Altrusa member who said members of the Literacy Committee had attended seminars to learn to teach people how to read, both English and non-English texts.

Sears said that although the seminars were well-publicized, it was some time before the Altrusa Club could apply the knowledge to a need that existed in the community.

She said the idea of "boosting the reading fluency for children" was suggested, and Sears coordinated the effort.

"No matter how good a teacher is, it's hard for them to have time to listen to children read individually," Sears said. She added that before the advent of television, children read aloud at home, but generally "that's not the case anymore."

Participants in the program include Mary Lois Green, Kathy Barnett, Betty Cuddy, Flodie Wilson, Sara Bertramsen, Gladys Knox, Margaret Bertramsen, Jessie Lee Hawkins, Lillian Fickett, Fern Shamon, Audrey Stevens and Jettie Hampton.

Sears said more volunteers are needed and while the job pays no salary, the rewards are "self satisfying," she said. To arrange to become a reading volunteer, call Sears at 257-4567.

Volunteers are in the classroom two hours a week, minimum, and some allocate more time. In first grade, a master list of children's names is used and as each child reads, they are crossed off the list. Volunteers have adjusted the amount of time each child reads so

children are reading at least twice a week for two to three minutes each time.

In second grade, the children are reading once every two weeks. In both grades, teachers said the children enjoy the individual attention they get and according to some, if a volunteer can't be there, the children are disappointed.

"They do make a difference," principal Don Weems said. "Anytime we can involve adults in our programs and when they can help the kids this much, we love it."

# Sierra Blanca sets record

Despite a late start, a relative lack of snow fall and high gasoline prices, Sierra Blanca Ski Resort did record business this year, breaking its previous high ticket sales by 14,000.

The best season ever had been the 1978-79 season, when the resort sold 185,000 lift tickets, but this year it topped that total with sales of nearly 200,000 tickets.

The record attendance occurred even though the resort got off to a late start (December 8) and had only 135 inches of snow, compared to 225 in 1978-79.

"It was a great season," manager Roy Parker said. The season ended Easter Sunday.

But it started out slowly. The resort had very little snow in the first weeks, and conditions were poor.

By Christmas, however, the area had 22 inches, a decent base. Mother Nature came to the rescue, though, December 26, when 20 inches was recorded, upping the

undisturbed snow depth considerably, and skiers flocked to the area.

In fact, during the Christmas holidays, shortages of skis became a problem as Ruidoso's 4,000 pairs of rental skis were quickly rented, and lodging was in equally short supply.

Business boomed at the resort, and there were unconfirmed reports of having to turn skiers away because of a lack of parking space.

Part of the reason for the resort's success was the new Captain triple chairlift, which replaced the older T-bar, and that boosted the lift capacity to 1,800 skiers an hour.

Even with the new lift, waits of a half hour were not uncommon, but apparently no one seemed to mind.

"If we have adequate snow," Parker said, "the season traditionally runs from Thanksgiving to Easter." But even though snowfall was down 90 inches, the resort

still had a good year, with 121 days of skiing.

Parker attributed the success to the area's snow maintenance equipment and crew, headed by mountain manager Denny Grover.

"With our snow maintenance equipment and so forth," Parker said, "we know we can do a good job even if it's not a banner year for snow."

The base eventually stabilized at about 55 inches, but constant machine grooming kept the slopes in good shape, and aided by an occasional snowfall, skiers had quite a time tackling the 30 miles of trails.

Plans are already underway for next season. Included in the planning is a replacement of the beginner chair lift, as well as other improvements.

Chief among the improvements, however, is the repair of state highway 632, the road leading to the ski area.

Marred by chuckholes and showing the effects of repeated freezing and thawing, repairs are long overdue, according to state figures.

In 1978-79, 59,878 cars traveled the road, totaling 4,598,664 passenger miles, and highway officials predicted parts of the road "may fall off the side of the mountain some year, halfway through the season."

Some work had been done on the road before the season, including a new surface laid in September by state crews. But it didn't take long to virtually destroy the new surface.

The State Highway Commission, in a March meeting, made public plans to repair the road with a four inch base and double penetration.

Repairs are scheduled to begin April 15, and will take approximately six weeks to complete. According to highway engineers, the repairs should last approximately five years.

## Opening soccer games postponed

Saturday was to have been opening day for the spring 1980, edition of Ruidoso's Sertima Soccer League.

That's right — was. All seven premiere games have been postponed, league director Butch Grantham said. But unlike pro baseball, player strike is not the cause of the cancellations.

There just aren't enough players right now. "All our regularly scheduled opening day games have been postponed due to school holidays," Grantham said. "We just don't have enough kids to make a go of it. Everybody's out of town."

So, rescheduling of those games is currently in swing, and opening day will probably be Wednesday, April 16, Grantham said.

The season is seven weeks long, with one week of post-season championship play and an all-star game scheduled for June 7.

The seven postponed games will be played, probably during midweek, Grantham said.

"We should have them made up within two to three weeks," he said. "We already have two of them rescheduled."

All teams who wish to play in the Ruidoso Men's Softball League this year must pay their sponsor fees by 5 p.m., Friday.

The payment is a team entry fee. Player registration will be on a later date.

Game and Fish Department Director Harold Olson said the bonus bag limit on brown and brook trout was set as an incentive for anglers to fish for those naturally reared species, rather than the more expensive hatchery rainbows and the less common cutthroat trout.

The new 16 fish daily bag limit may include not more than eight rainbows, cutthroats or salmon, and the 32 trout possession limit may not include more than 16 fish of those three species, singly or in the aggregate. Up to 16 of the fish in the daily bag, and up to 32 in possession, may be brown or brook trout.

Olson said the two are easily identified by red spots present on their bodies. None of the other trout species in New Mexico has red spots. Anglers not sure of their fish's identity should keep it until they can get it to a hatchery for identification.

Other changes in the regulations include: an increase in the bag limit on northern pike to 12 fish; a limit of two trout, 16 inches or longer, in the quality water section of the San Juan River; and removal of special bag, possession and size limits on trout from Cabresto Lake.

Anglers are reminded that last season's licenses expired March 31, and new fishing licenses are required, and are available at over 300 locations throughout the state.

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# Inside The Capitol

**SANTA FE** — Those Highway Commissioners, once so jealous of their power to choose the boss of the department, were unable to agree on two or three names to suggest to the Governor. As we hear it, the best they could do was whittle the list down to seven.

That doesn't sound like it would be a lot of help to the poor guy who has to make the final choice — and who may have done so by the time you read these words.

One applicant, Ernie Coriz of the Department of Commerce and Industry, was reportedly so intent on getting the job that he placed a phone call to his boss, John Salvo, to ask for his support when Salvo was still in the recovery room of a hospital after a serious operation.

It's a good job, Ernie, but not worth imperiling somebody's health over.

**BATTLE OF THE HEAVYWEIGHTS:** Maybe if State Treasurer Jan Harke had gone at things differently he could have convinced the Governor that he ought to call a special session of the Legislature to take care of the interest rate we can offer for our municipal bonds.

Harke dealt his first blow, which clearly implied incompetence on the part of the King administration, in the news media. He knew that would make Bruce mad, which may in fact have been one of his reasons for proceeding that way. The other reason is a little simpler: If you share any of your ideas with the King faction, you quickly find them being played back to you — but they have been taken over by the administration and made its own.

Anyway, the fight between the two has boiled down to who mistreats the state's bankers. King wants Harke to pressure them to buy bonds with an interest rate of only 8 per cent out of gratitude for the \$8

million in state funds they got, on which they pay 8 per cent interest while they are probably earning 12 to 15 per cent when they put that dough out. Harke in effect says, "I'm not going to do anything like that unless you and the Finance Board order me to do so. It would be unfair to make bankers buy these bonds when they can earn more for their money elsewhere."

One thing you can be sure of: There won't be a special session unless Brother King has everything agreed upon and a whole script written for it before it is convened. He wants no risk of those legislators wandering around taking up things he feels they shouldn't be concerned with.

**LEASEHOLDERS:** There's nothing wrong with a member of the Legislature entering into business with the state of New Mexico by leasing land from the Land Office. We do, however, think the public has a right to know he has such holdings.

That's why we were a little amazed to find that only one member, Frank Bond of Santa Fe, listed such cases on the conflict of interest statement every lawmaker is required to file with the Secretary of State. In all, 17 per cent of the House members, or members of their immediate families, have such holdings. Dan Berry, for instance, leases 5,911 acres, John Higbee and his brothers, 13,320, Senator Don King and his brothers 24,084, and so on.

It would seem to us that a law which is supposed to let us know where legislators' business interests lie would cover this matter, since they have the power to treat the Land Office in a privileged manner if they feel the urge to do so.

We recommend everybody list such holdings next year.

#### A THIN STRAW

The fact that the Iranians are enraged by Shah Mohammed Riza Pahlavi's move to Egypt does not necessarily mean further delay in release of the American hostages. It is plainly a complicating factor, however, the more so because the Iranians are afflicted with national paranoia and blame Washington for everything that goes wrong.

This paranoia was much in evidence at a protest rally in Tehran called by a clerical coalition. A statement issued by this group blames "American imperialism" for "getting the fugitive shah out of the Iranian people's grip," and declares that if he and his property are not restored to Iran "the trial of the hostages by the representatives of the people is the people's demand."

The one consoling thought is that the mullahs have not yet triumphed in the Iranian power struggle, and cannot be sure that their interpretation of "the people's demand" will prevail. Like all statements that emerge from Iran, this one has to be taken with a grain of salt. There still appears to be a chance that the Americans in Tehran will be freed in realization that keeping them captive now serves no even marginally rational purpose and merely aggravates international ill will toward Iran.

That is a thin straw to grasp. All the same, there is some basis for hope that the country's leaders, in a rare access of common sense, will recognize two evident though unpalatable facts. One is that the shah has escaped their clutches and found a secure haven at least for the time being. The other is that in light of this there is no longer any point in continuing to hold the American hostages as a bargaining chip to force extradition of the shah. — Alamogordo Daily News

#### RIDE UNDER CHANNEL

The British bulldog is still dogged. Serious thought is again being given to digging the "channel," an under-the-channel link between Britain and France first suggested as long ago as 1802 by one of Napoleon's engineers.

An initial attempt began in 1818 on the British side, but work was halted when Britain's leadership had second thoughts about a possible invasion. In 1974 another start was made—but that time escalating costs did it in. Now the British government has given the go-ahead again, but with a catch: the channel must be privately financed.

Some economists figure it could be profitable, even with an estimated \$1.7 billion outlay. So maybe, one of these years, we'll be able to take a train under the Channel after all. — Alamogordo Daily News

President Carter Monday produced two aces he's been holding in the poker game he's playing with Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, with the stakes being the 50 American hostages held by the Iranian militants holding the American embassy in Tehran.

Carter ordered the Iranian diplomats to pack up and ship out of Washington by midnight Tuesday, thus severing diplomatic relations with Khomeini's revolutionary government. In addition, all entry visas to the United States held by Iranians have been declared invalid, which will keep those holding them out of our country, for the present.

Carter also directed that all trade with Iran, including food and medicine, be halted.

These seemingly drastic steps by Carter will not, if past threats and actions are any criteria, affect Khomeini's decisions regarding the hostages in the least. Khomeini, after all, has the belief, obviously, that the United States will make no military moves against Iran because of the importance we attach to the safe release of the hostages.

The hostages are Khomeini's hold card, his sole hope for the return of the Shah, with the Shah being completely out of American control now that President Sadat has assumed responsibility for the shah's safety.

We can only hope that Carter is holding some other aces that he can produce to get the Ayatollah's attention, aces that'll prove Carter's not bluffing, though it does seem as though Carter's the wolf, huffing and puffing, with Khomeini successfully thumbing his nose from the sanctity of his soundly built, wind proof, bluff proof, abode.

Unfortunately, it seems as though Carter's going to have to pick up his axe and attack Khomeini's tree and let the chips fall where they may. Even if it costs him a second term. —CD

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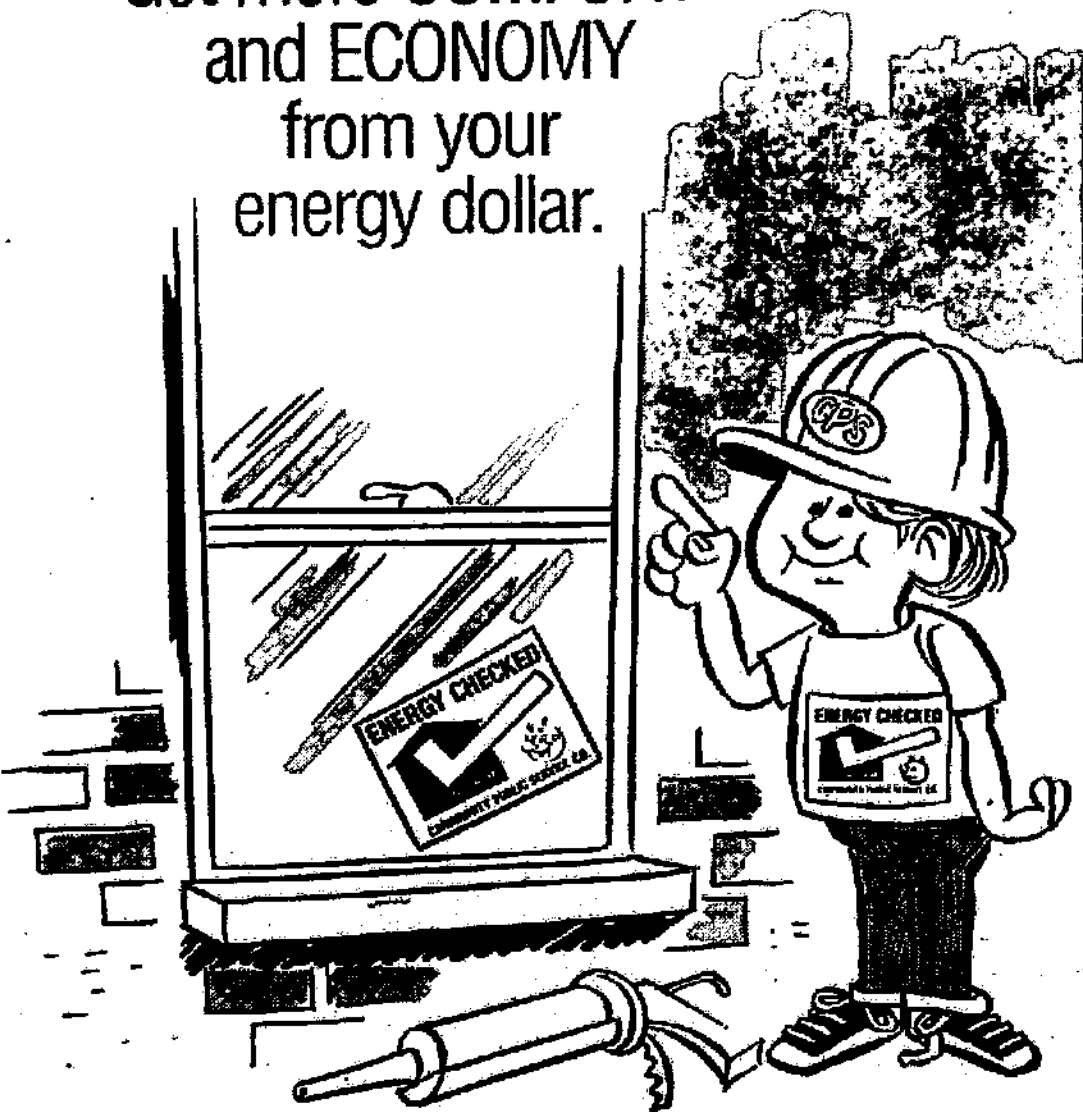

## Zip Zoro takes upset West Texas Derby win

Zipp Zoro, a 4-1 second favorite handled by Jerry Nicodemus, charged to a surprising upset in Sunday's \$65,375 West Texas Derby at Sunland Park.

The filly muscled her way into the lead at about the halfway point of the 400 yard dash, then steadily put away the heavy favorite, Bold Love.

The latter earned strong backing in the Derby since her previous spin, in the Derby trials, resulted in a 3 1/2 length win to set an American record of 19.17 seconds for 400 yards.

But Bold Love had more than she could handle this time. She fought back bravely, in the final 100 yards or so, but was unable to keep Zipp Zoro from taking command. Zipp Zoro had a neck lead when she bulletted under the wire.

The filly, owned by Earl and Virginia Shapiro of Festus, Missouri, collected \$12,587 and returned mutual prices of \$10.80, \$4.20, \$2.40. She's trained by David Fry.

Bold Love, ridden by Jackie Martin, had to settle for the runnerup paycheck of \$11,113. Pans who turned her loose at 20

cents on the dollar collected \$3.40 and \$2.20.

The outcome might have been a bit frustrating for Martin, since he was also the pilot of Zipp Zoro in last week's trials. The filly had won her qualifying heat by nearly four lengths, and had set the second best clocking of 19.23 seconds.

Zipp Zoro won the Derby in 19.54 seconds. A steady tailwind was blowing. The Derby triumph pushed her career earnings up to \$50,731.

Hasty Request, the second choice at 5-2, had good early speed but couldn't get the upper hand on the two leaders. He finished third, a neck behind Bold Love, and earned \$8,537. He's the property of Leopoldo Lopez of Laredo, Texas. The show price was \$2.20.

Here's the remaining order of finish, with purse money earned: 4th — Manifesto, \$4,578; 5th — Clifton Hill, \$3,268; 6th — Brown Wind, \$2,613; 7th — Power Swivel, \$1,981; 8th — Rockets Flame, \$1,307; 9th — Klaus Glame, \$653; 10th — Shift N Time, \$653.

The Derby was a two horse race pretty much from the first jump. Bold Love, if she had an excuse, could point to a sliding start. The filly bobbled a bit on her first jump and had the ground slide out from under her. But she quickly gathered herself up, hardly missing a beat, and stormed into the lead. Zipp Zoro also got away crisply and was never far behind. At one point, Bold Love appeared to be as much as a neck in front.

But just as it seemed she would run away with the race, and reaffirm her record breaking performance of a week earlier, she found herself against a serious threat from Zipp Zoro.

The latter steadily applied pressure, grabbing a bit of terrain with each jump. For a while, the two leaders appeared to be on even terms. Finally, Bold Love had more pressure than she could handle. She weakened just a bit, and that was the toehold Zipp Zoro needed.

At the end, there was no question as to the outcome. The winner came out of the Derby with a 1980 record of 2-2-0 from four starts. Bold Love got her first taste of defeat this year from four outings.

Bold Love, owned by Thelma Spencer of Edmond, Oklahoma is also trained by David Fry.

## Turf Club expansion planned for next year

A proposed million dollar expansion of the All-American Turf Club and grandstand at Ruidoso Downs is being studied by Ruidoso-Sunland, board of directors president W. L. Sunny Edwards announced last week.

An Odessa architectural firm has been commissioned to present plans and a feasibility study to the board for its decision.

"We'll have to reach a conclusion soon," Edwards said. "If we decide to accept the plans we'll start construction right after Labor Day to be ready for the 1981 season."

Labor Day is the traditional closing date at Ruidoso Downs which had its most successful season last year, when the \$1.28 million All-American Futurity — the World's Richest Horse Race — is staged in the mountain retreat.

"The proposed expansion will extend the Turf Club and grandstand area 125 feet northeast over the present main office and paddock area," Edwards said. "The extra seating will accommodate an additional 1,500 patrons."

Under the proposal, the paddock and jockey quarters will be moved into the infield just north of the totallator board. New main offices will be incorporated into the extension. An underground passage leading from the grandstand area to the new paddock will be built to accommodate owners and trainers when their horses saddle up before a race. Horses will be brought to the new paddock via a crossing at the top of the stretch turn and a path that leads in front of the "R" pond in the infield.

"By putting the paddock in the infield, this will allow the fans from almost every seating position in the track to watch the saddling," Edwards said. "Before only a

few patrons on the northeast side of the track could see the paddock."

A larger jockey quarters will be built with separate jockey quarters and paddock facilities for the male and female riders. Placing the jockey quarters and paddock in the infield will also provide greater security for the riders and horses, Edwards said.

But the most impressive part of the project is the expansion of the Turf Club. Approximately 750 more seats will be offered on a seasonal ticket basis, doubling the present current capacity of the Turf Club.

Underneath the Turf Club there will be expansion of the box seating and grandstand area as well as the concourse. Additional reserved seating and sun deck seats will be added to complement the present arrangements.

"Of course, there will be additional mutual and concession facilities in both areas," Edwards said. The estimated \$1 million tab will be the largest improvement package Ruidoso-Sunland has proposed since assuming control of the track two years ago. Last year the track was re-surfaced — and will undergo additional maintenance work again this year — to highlight a list of improvements that included overhauling and replacing kitchen equipment, a new roof and purchasing tractors, a new water truck and ambulance.

This year's improvements include a remodeling of the track kitchen and new water lines to the grandstand and Jockey Club and the installation of a new duplex tote system.

"The board members are very excited about this proposal," Edwards said.

"Ruidoso fans have been faithful over the years and we're going to continue to improve the track to insure their comfort."

Racing this summer begins May 10 and continues through Labor Day with 60 race days. The basic schedule is the usual Thursday-through-Sunday format. Highlighting the season are the nationally famed Triple Crown races for quarter horses.

The two-year-old Triple Crown begins June 1 with the \$835,000 (est.) Kansas Futurity and follows with the \$500,000 (est.) Rainbow Futurity July 20. The pinnacle is the \$1,280,000 nationally televised All-American Futurity Labor Day. The winner collects \$440,000.

The three-year-old counterparts include the \$225,000 (est.) Kansas Derby May 18, the \$325,000 (est.) Rainbow Derby July 5 and the All-American Derby August 24. For this year only the Derby will surpass its younger sister with a \$1.5 million (est.) purse. This year will also mark the Derby's debut on national television. Regional television telecasts include the Kansas and Rainbow Futurities.

Other major races include the \$100,000 (est.) World's Champion Quarter Horse Classic July 27 and the \$125,000 (est.) Ruidoso Thoroughbred Futurity August 21. Last year Ruidoso Downs experienced its most successful season in its 33-year history. A total handle of \$32,255,028 and daily average of \$474,045 were both records. The meeting wrapped up with back-to-back million-dollar handles, including an all time high of \$1,062,630 Labor Day.

More important to the horsemen, however, was the record \$8,538,714 purse distribution. That figure included \$1,313,650 handed out Labor Day, the largest one day disbursement in racing history.

## Hondo valley to employ pipe irrigation system

Conservation Service (SCS), the county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee (ASC) and landowners, almost 200 acres of farm, ranch and orchard land in the Hondo Valley soon will be served by a pipe irrigation system.

The cost of the pipeline, which is currently under construction, will be shared by those groups, with the SCS providing technical engineering services as their share, and the county committee paying for the bulk of the installation costs.

County ASC executive director Bill Trammell said the pipeline will help prevent excessive sedimentation of the river, in addition to conserving irrigation water.

The project will serve 106.8 acres and nine landowners on the Ambrosio Chavez Ditch System, which provides water to orchards, permanent pastures, gardens and even alfalfa fields, Trammell said. Total cost of the system was pegged at \$88,000.

"It's just a better means of managing irrigation water," Trammell said.

"Part of the job of the SCS is to develop irrigation systems to fit individual pieces of land in the most efficient manner," said Lewis Figueroa, SCS conservationist.

"Cost sharing is designed to help the small farmers and ranchers who otherwise couldn't afford such a system," he added.

In addition to the 12-inch plastic pipeline

now being installed, the new system includes two sluice boxes, which also cut down on the ill effects of sedimentation. The water is diverted into the concrete box, equipped with a valve system, to trap debris and flush the water back into the pipe, preventing clogging.

The pipe has other benefits, too, over the open ditch. With the old system, water loss is never uniform along the ditch, Figueroa said. In addition to water which is "stolen" along the way by various forms of vegetation, there is also the problem of animals such as gophers whose burrows can divert "tremendous amounts of water," and beavers who build dams along the system, he said.

Although the open community ditches are preferable to no irrigation at all, they necessitate the diversion of much more water than is actually needed, in order to provide irrigation to the last acre on the system, he added.

One could "write a book with a million chapters on water management," Figueroa said, "but the basis of them all would be this — conserving water wisely provides more water for users downstream."

Of the approximately 40 ditch systems in the county, Trammell said this is the sixth to be cost-shared in this manner. The new pipeline is part of the Water Quality Special Project, for which \$200,000 was appropriated by the United States Congress for Lincoln County in 1979. The same amount was approved for the

current year, and because it was intended as a three-year program, Trammell said he expects the same to be appropriated for 1981.

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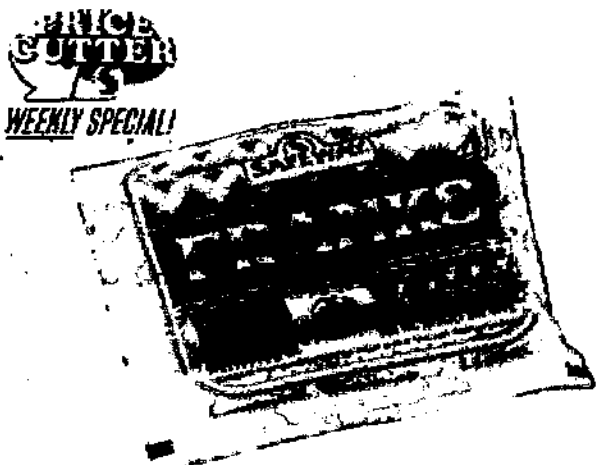
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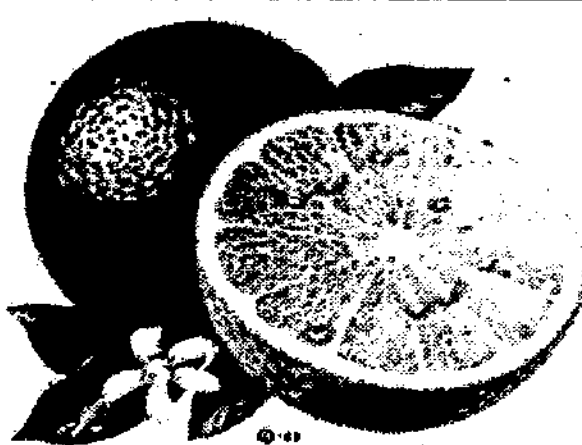
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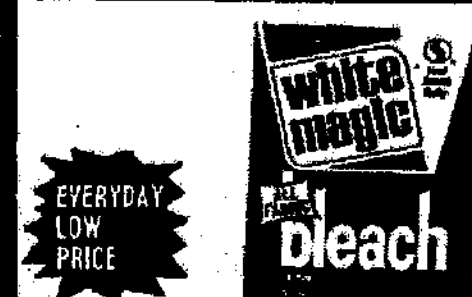

## Wind power electricity testing set by NMSU

New Mexicans who are considering using wind power to generate electricity for their farms, ranches and homes may become cooperative partners with New Mexico State University (NMSU) in obtaining site-specific wind data over a one year period.

Under a contract from the state Energy Research and Development Program, the "State of New Mexico Wind Site Survey Equipment Loan Program" has been funded by the Physical Science Laboratory (PSL) at NMSU.

"In addition to helping individuals determine whether purchase of an electric generator would be cost effective, a second benefit would be derived from the program," said principal investigator George Fugate, PSL. "Wind data obtained will contribute to the wind resource knowledge now being compiled for the state."

For the investment in a wind system to be economical at present commercial electrical power rates, current models of wind generators need an average wind speed of about 15 mph to generate sufficient electricity.

Under this contract, 20 sets of wind measuring equipment will be made available at an annual rental cost of \$25 per set to individuals who can provide a heated area for the wind data accumulator box. This small box can be placed on a desk, shelf or a table.

There will also need to be space to erect a 33-foot guyed antenna type mast or other suitable mount for an anemometer near the wind data accumulator, as well as a site where wind flow can be measured without blockage from buildings. Persons renting the equipment will be needed to help with equipment installation and must agree to provide weekly data to NMSU.

Final site/participant selection, Fugate said, will take into consideration the locations in relation to other existing wind data locations since an overall goal of this project is to provide information for the entire state.

## Pension offset applies to some government employees

Are you a Federal worker or a State or local government employee whose job is NOT covered by social security? And have you been coming on receiving a dependent's benefit on your spouse's social security record in addition to a pension from a public agency?

If you answer "yes" to both questions, then you may be affected by a provision in the social security law called "public pension offset." Many government workers nearing retirement have been asking about this.

The public pension offset will not affect most people until December 1982 and later. However, it's something you should know about now so you can plan your financial future.

Here's how the offset works: The amount of your social security benefit as a dependent or survivor is reduced—dollar for dollar—by the amount of your public pension. For example, if your potential social security benefit as a wife is \$250 a month and your public pension is \$250, your actual wife's benefit would be \$0.

The offset will NOT apply if your Federal, State, or local government job IS covered by social security on the last day you work.

The offset applies only to social security spouse's and surviving spouse's benefits. You can still receive retirement or disability payments on your own social security record without reduction if you have worked long enough under social security.

There's an exception to the offset if you now receive a public pension or will soon be eligible for one. But it will apply only if both of these conditions are met:

- (1) You must either receive or be eligible to receive your government pension before December 1982; whether or not you actually apply; and
- (2) You must meet all requirements for social security dependent or survivor benefits as they existed and were interpreted in January 1977. More specifically:

If you are a divorced woman, your marriage must have lasted at least 20 years, rather than 10 years under present law.

If you are a man, your wife must have provided at least one-half of your support; you can't qualify if you were divorced from your wife.

## Man's murderer sought

The folks knew him as "Pelicano," a shambling little man who in the twilight of his life had descended into the depths of alcoholism and poverty.

He lived in a ramshackle two-room hut that had no water or heat and his only source of income were his welfare and railroad retirement checks.

His real name was Carmen F. Sanchez. He was 66 years old. And he died a violent, horrible death at the hands of an unknown

killer, who stabbed him more than 20 times in the chest back in February, 1979.

This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission is offering a \$3,000 reward for information solving the Sanchez homicide.

Reports from the Hidalgo County Sheriff's Department and State Police indicate Sanchez was last seen alive February 3, 1979. Investigators say he had just received his welfare check and had purchased some groceries and wine for the weekend.

His landlady saw him enter his residence early Saturday night. His body was lying on a couch, partially nude, Monday morning.

There was no sign of forced entry and at first investigators thought Sanchez had hit his head and died of asphyxiation. It was only upon closer examination that the stab wounds were discovered.

Robbery is considered the prime motive for Sanchez' death. Investigators theorize that the killer robbed Sanchez of \$11 or \$12, then stabbed him to death with a small pen knife.

Time and the lack of physical evidence have conspired to work against investigators.

Now it probably will take a confidential informant to help detectives solve the case.

Anyone with information regarding the case is asked to call the State Crime Stoppers Commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-6883. Callers do not have to reveal their identities and their calls are not taped or traced.

The State Crime Stoppers Commission and the 32 local Crime Stoppers Programs also offer cash rewards regularly for information leading to the solution of other crimes committed in New Mexico.

Last week a tip to the Mora County Crime Stoppers Program via State Crime Stoppers led to the capture of Andy Romero, wanted on felony warrants charging him with aggravated battery in Colfax County.

To date, a total of 124 cases have been solved with the help of tips called into the State Crime Stoppers Commission.
