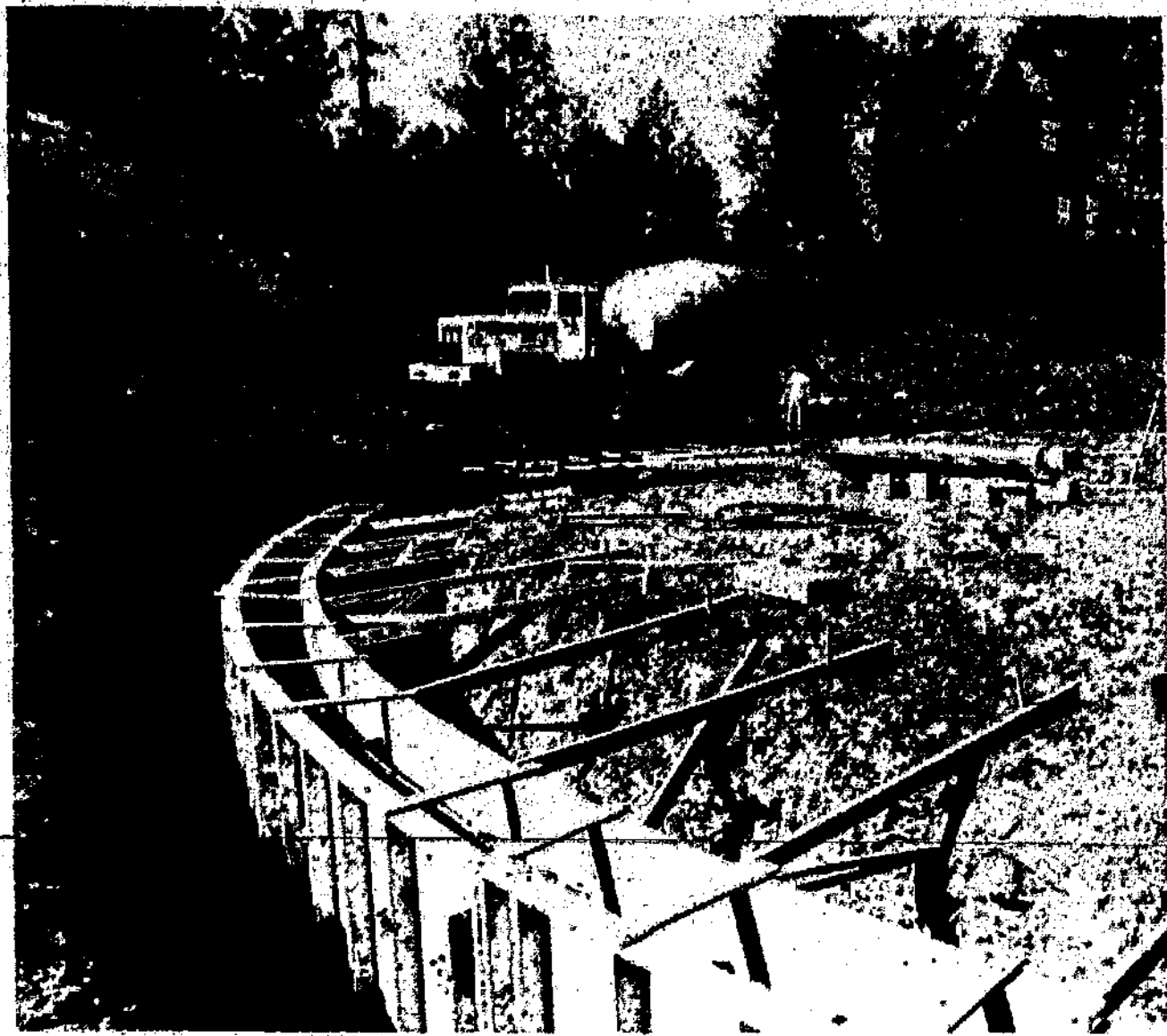

THE FOUNDATION for this one million gallon capacity water storage tank in the Kingswood area was poured Friday. This tank and another atop Alto hill will add six million gallons to the village's water reserves following completion this summer.

## Water storage tanks under construction

Work on the construction of two large water storage tanks, which will increase the water supply of the village by six million gallons, is progressing, with the pouring of the foundation for one tank begun Friday.

The larger of the two tanks, with a capacity of five million gallons, will be located next to an identical tank atop Alto Hill.

These two tanks will serve as feeders for the remaining 14 elevated tanks in the system, according to village water superintendent Jim Goodman.

The primary benefit of the new tanks will be to provide greater reserves for peak consumer demand periods and for fire protection, he said.

The smaller tank, with a one million gallon capacity, is designed to work in conjunction with one half its size, to serve the largest water zone, Goodman said.

That zone stretches from the lower portion of the Upper Canyon to the Pizza Hut and as far north as Innbrook Village.

Completion is expected by mid-summer for the Kingswood tank and late summer for the second Alto tank, Goodman said.

## Rotary serves enchiladas here Tuesday

Ruidoso's Rotarians will be serving enchiladas Tuesday, from 11:30 a.m.-1 p.m., and 5-8 p.m., at the Ruidoso Elks Lodge on Highway 70 west. The charge will be \$3 for adults and \$1.50 for children.

All proceeds from the semi-annual enchilada feeds sponsored by the

# Snow douses forest fire

An out of control forest fire, raging through an estimated 50 acres of timber southeast of Cloudcroft Friday, was snuffed out early Saturday morning when the area was blanketed with more than seven inches of snow.

An airplane dropping slurry, plus more than 100 firefighters, were battling the fire, whipped by very strong winds, when the storm struck.

Forest Service officials had not determined the cause of the fire, starting Friday about eight miles from Cloudcroft, Sunday morning.

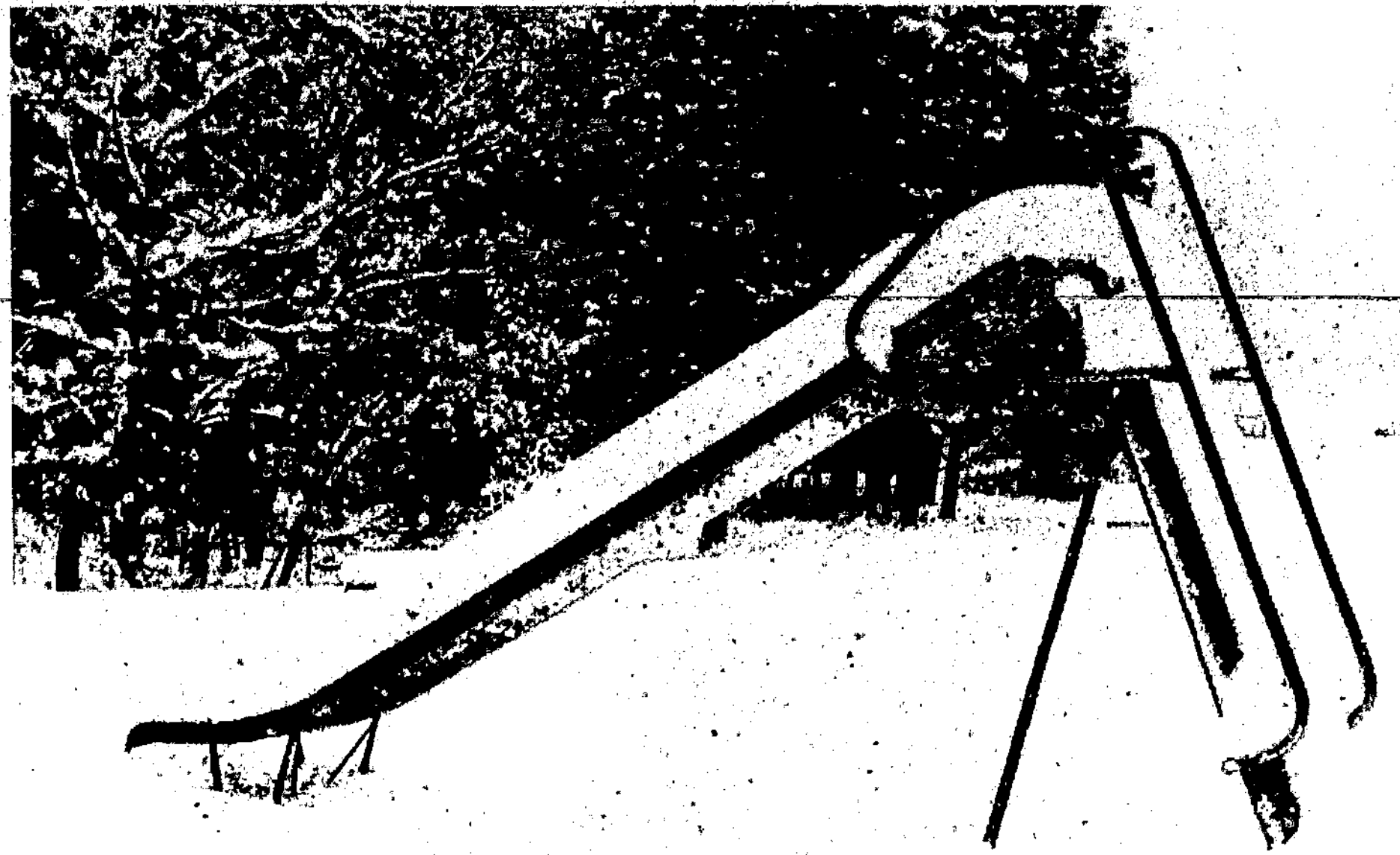
Transportation of firefighters from the area, beginning at 8 a.m., Saturday, was hampered by the heavy snow Forest officials said.

Snowfall in the Ruidoso area exceeded four inches Saturday morning, effectively eliminating the immediate forest fire danger, which had been rated between high and very high most of the past week.

Warm daytime temperatures, plus daily winds of more than 30 miles per hour, coupled with a lack of moisture the past several weeks caused the fire conditions to develop.

Traffic was slowed on all highways in the area leading into Ruidoso though most of the cars in trouble either slid off the road, or spun out of control to stop and block traffic. Throughout most of Saturday morning law enforcement officers and wreckers were at the scene of one car mishaps on Highways 70, 37 and 380.

Late Friday night traffic was halted on Highway 54 between Carrizozo and Alamogordo, and closed in the Corona area. Many travelers were housed in Roswell, under emergency conditions, when officials stopped traffic northbound out of the city.



QUIET PREVAILED at this slippery slide Saturday morning, as more than four inches of

snow falling overnight temporarily ended the small fry's enjoyment of spring weather.

Also, early Saturday morning as the snow storm struck Roswell, fire broke out in the Broadmoor Shopping Center, destroying 12 of the 13 stores, with

preliminary estimates placing the loss in excess of \$1.7 million. Saturday Jerry Hourigan, safety engineer, said, "Due to the extensive damage to the buildings, the

cause cannot be determined at this time. It will be days before the rubbish can be sifted through to make any determination at all.

# Concert series attracting national publicity for area

The Ruidoso area—and the planned Ruidoso Summer Festival featuring the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra—will be receiving nationwide publicity in the near future, following a planned visit later this month by a group of travel writers.

Members of the board of directors of Ruidoso Summer Festival Incorporated (RSFI) were advised Thursday by vice chairman Ken Green that he had received confirmation that a group of about ten writers would be traveling to the area the last weekend of April.

The writers will be arriving from several states to get acquainted with the area's attractions. In addition to those who will be here in person, Green said several

newspapers and wire services would be publishing feature articles based on releases furnished by a public relations firm which was hired to publicize the area and the festival.

The San Diego, California Union Tribune which is affiliated with a news service, is planning a cover story in a special Sunday section about the area, Green said. Ruidoso may even receive coverage in the New York Times, whose New Mexico-based reporter will be covering the festival, Green added.

Press releases concerning the planned week of orchestra performances have been sent to every daily newspaper in the country, he said.

A second writers' tour also is being planned, which will coincide with the dates of the festival, June 4-10.

With contracts insuring the per-

formances already signed, the RSFI board is concentrating on fund raising efforts and on such matters as production details, accommodations and transportation for writers and musicians, and printing of posters to promote the festival.

Donations of any amount to the non-profit corporation are being solicited and should be addressed to Ruidoso Summer Festival Incorporated, Box 1338, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345. More information may be obtained by calling 257-9317.

The board also agreed to solicit proposals from local caterers to provide food at the table seats in the sales arena at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track. Interested restaurateurs should attend the next meeting of the board, to be held at 10 a.m., Thursday at the law offices of Mel O'Reilly, to submit proposals.

In the matter of food and beverage service at the concerts, the board agreed that all profits from food and liquor would go to the caterers and the liquor license holders.

In other business, the RSFI board:

—Were advised that a group of women in Carrizozo will be sponsoring a hunt breakfast for the benefit of the festival. That event, which will be limited to 50 persons, will be held May 10 at a private ranch near Carrizozo. Tickets, priced at \$10, may be obtained by contacting Mrs. Stirling Spencer, Carrizozo.

—Approved acceptance of bank credit cards for purchase of a print by Gordon Sndow and for tickets to performances.

—Were advised that the Ruidoso schools had agreed to lend music stands and a conductor's podium for use during the performances.

## Mule Skinners' trail ride set

Plans for the April 26-27 overnight mule trail ride, sponsored by the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners, were finalized by the club's directors Thursday evening.

Riders will leave from the Briscoe West barn in Ruidoso Downs at 10 a.m., April 26 for the approximately 11 mile trail ride to the mountain camp site. The return ride is slated to begin at 2 p.m., April 27.

Saturday night's camp site activities include dinner, with Pete Woods as chef. Later there will be music, campfire singing and dancing on a platform built for the occasion by the Mule Skinners.

Sunday, following a standard "Working Cowboy's Breakfast," the entertainment includes balloon busting, polo, barrel racing and pole bending for mule riders, plus horseshoes. All events are jackpot.

"I want to tell everyone," Mule Skinners president Ed Hyman said, "That we welcome all horse riders to join us in this, our first overnight trail ride. You don't have to be riding a mule, bring your favorite saddle horse and join us in the fun."

In addition to the contest events for mule riders, there will also be events for horse riders, arranged by the riders.

The registration deadline for the ride is April 19. The per rider charge will be \$12.50, including dinner, breakfast and feed for the animals. Those wishing to drive to the camp site will be charged \$7.50 each, including dinner and breakfast.

"On the basis of inquiries," Hyman said, "we're planning on having more than 100 riders on the trail. In addition, I've heard

that there will be many more local folks driving to the campground, and staying overnight, just to enjoy the event and watch Sunday's action."

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# Causing forest fires costly to guilty persons

Being found guilty of starting a forest fire can be very costly. G. W. Werther, Fire Prevention Officer with the Smokey Bear Ranger District of Lincoln National Forest, said to The News Friday.

Werther said, "Under federal law, persons guilty of causing fires are liable for actual suppression costs and damages, in addition to any criminal charges that may be filed."

"In the Ruidoso area, damage is assessed at the rate of \$2,400 per acre, plus suppression costs."

Werther said that the costs of suppressing a fire "can be very high" depending upon the number of firefighters involved, equipment used and if slurry carrying airplanes are utilized.

"My personal opinion," Werther said, "is that there is no reason for the general taxpayer to foot the bill for someone else's negligent or malicious act."

"Very few of the fires I've seen couldn't have been prevented with some concern and diligence on the part of the person responsible."

"The trouble with fires is that they sneak up on you when least expected."

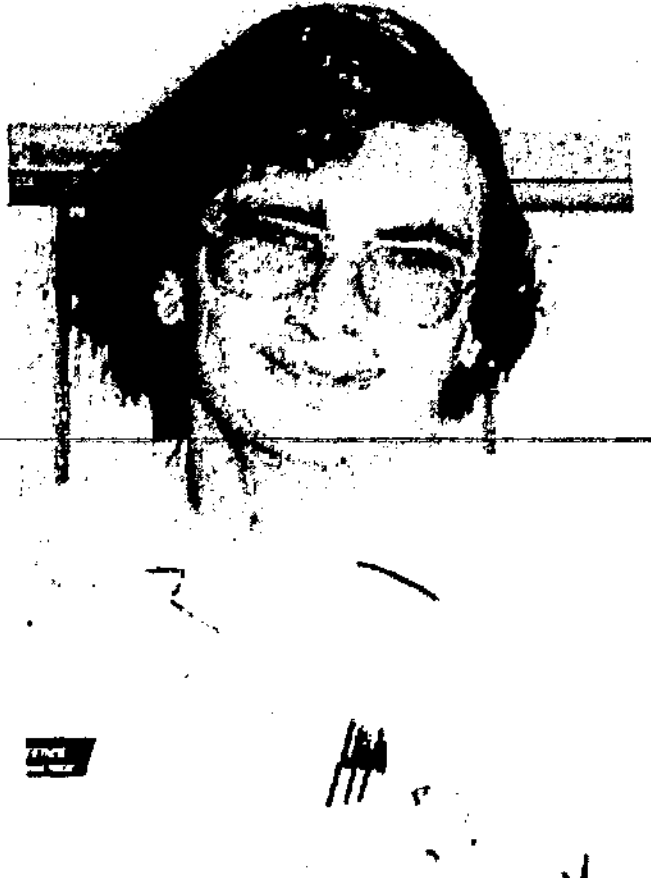
"Most of the people I've run into who accidentally started fires have been doing the same thing wrong for years with no bad results. Then one day they burn their whole world up."

Action to increase the apprehension and conviction rate of persons causing wildland fires has been launched this year, with officers of the United States Forest Service and New Mexico Division of Forestry attending a recent Fire Cause Investigation course.

The course consisted of, Werther said, a three hour slide and tape program emphasizing fire behaviour, including reading burn patterns and tracing the patterns to the fire origin.

A second four hour practical session in investigation techniques, collecting and

preserving evidence, and actual reading of burn patterns in controlled training fires will be held in the Capitlan area in late April, Werther said, with the training programs to continue throughout the year.

# 'List' sales come to standstill here

Sales of 'The List' have slowed to almost a complete standstill in Ruidoso and the surrounding area, according to a local "monitor."

The List is a supposedly money-making proposition which has its investors spending \$100 in hopes of earning \$204,800. It involves selling lists of names and sending money to people listed, and then the buyer's name moves up the List. Future buyers are supposed to then send money to that buyer.

The state Attorney General's office has declared The List illegal, alleging it is a

"pyramid scheme," a fraud specifically prohibited by state law.

The List was brought to the area from Hobbs by a young Ruidoso housewife, who acts as a "monitor." She keeps track of The List and how sales are going. If The List is not moving, she helps find buyers and generally keeps it moving.

But it's not selling too well as of now, she said. Due to the Easter holiday.

"I think it has a lot to do with the Easter vacation," she said. "A lot of people are out of town and they aren't selling them. People aren't getting out and trying to sell them right now."

No one in the area has yet received money, she said, because enough lists haven't been sold.

"We're about one to two weeks behind right now," she said. It generally takes about two to three weeks before buyers start receiving money, she said. "They're still receiving money in Hobbs," she said.

Although The List has received considerable publicity, she said, some people still haven't heard about it.

"A lot of people still haven't heard about it," she said. Much of the publicity has been negative, but she felt that hasn't

really hurt sales. "Some people are skeptical of it because it might be illegal. But they're the people who wouldn't buy it anyway."

Local buyers of The List aren't discouraged because it's slowed down, she said, and they had a meeting planned for this week to discuss options to keep it moving.

She predicted sales would pick up soon, and if not, she said The List would be taken out of the area and sold to keep it moving. "We'll move it even if we have to take back to Hobbs," she said.

## Sewer system contractors check project

Contractors from Utah, Kansas, Colorado, New Mexico and Texas have personally inspected the Regional Wastewater System (RWS) project the past few days, preparatory for the opening of bids April 24.

The bid opening schedule: — RWS, Contracts I and II, multipurpose room of the Ruidoso Public Library, 5 p.m.

— Ruidoso Downs collector system, Ruidoso Downs municipal building, 7 p.m. The RWS project includes the main sewer transmission lines and building the new treatment plant and improvements in the existing Ruidoso system.

The project in Ruidoso Downs is the new sewer system, providing the first such service to the village, that will connect with RWS.

Paul Light, engineer with Daniel Engineering Company, Alamogordo, project engineers, said Friday to The News that "15 contractors personally inspected the projects, covering every inch of ground involved. In addition, about 60 sets of plans were distributed to potential bidders."

Village clerk Jim Hine said, "Once the

contracts are awarded, work can begin and within a couple of years the sewer system so badly needed for the development of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs will become a reality."

"And though it seems like it was long ago that Daniel Engineering completed the initial plans, the project is actually on schedule."

## School board meeting set Tuesday night

The Ruidoso Board of Education will meet at 7 p.m., Tuesday at the administration building.

Board members will hear a report from high school principal Tom Hansen on the cheerleading program and will consider approval of a motorcycle safety course at the high school.

Other major agenda items to be considered include opening of bids for athletic equipment and instructional supplies and a call for bids on property insurance, workman's compensation and surety bonds.

Following an executive session, the board will consider hiring of certified and non-certified personnel for the school system.

## Smith, Adams murder trial begins today

The murder trial of Jerry Richard Smith, Ruidoso and David Lee Adams, Ft. Lewis, Washington, convened in district court in Carrizozo today.

They were charged in connection with the shooting death last August 30 of Luis Ramirez and the wounding of his brother, Antonio Ramirez, at Schoolhouse Park.

The two were charged with an open charge of murder, meaning they could be tried for first or second degree murder, voluntary or involuntary manslaughter and aggravated battery. All these charges would include the phrase, "with firearm enhancement," which could add an additional year to any possible sentence handed down.

## Sewage storage lagoon planned by Alto Alps

The local offices of the Environmental Improvement Division (EID) have announced that a proposed sewage discharge plan has been submitted for approval to the state EID director by Alto Alps Condominiums.

According to the EID, Sam Moore, chairman of the board of Alto Alps, proposes to discharge 6,500 gallons daily of aerobically treated sewage from the condominiums' sewage treatment facility into an unlined storage lagoon located on the Alto Alps property.

The exact location of the lagoon in one-half mile north of the village of Alto, 1S, R13E, Section 28, Lincoln County, Ground water most likely to be affected is at a depth of about 190 feet with total dissolved solid concentration of approximately 300 mg/l.

Interested persons may obtain further information from the Ground Water Section, Water Pollution Control Bureau, EID, and may submit written comments to the New Mexico EID, Box 968, Crown Building, 725 St. Michael's Drive, Santa Fe, New Mexico, 87503.

Prior to ruling on any proposed discharge plan, or modifications to discharge systems, the director of EID will allow 30 days to elapse to provide for submission of comments and requests for a public hearing on the matter.

Request for a public hearing, Edwards said, should set forth reasons why the hearing should be held. A hearing will be scheduled if the EID director determines that significant public interest in the matter exists.

## Three cited for forest violation

Two persons have recently been cited for cutting and killing live trees in Lincoln National Forest and another for abandoning a camp fire.

Dagobert Avila, La Mesa, was charged with abandoning a campfire during 40 mile per hour winds in the Bonita Lake area Easter Sunday and is to appear in Alamogordo Federal Magistrate's Court on the charge, if he does not forfeit bail.

William Thacker, Carlsbad, and Carl Broughton, Holloman Air Force Base, were cited for cutting and killing live trees at South Fork Ground for campfire fuel. Both are to appear in Alamogordo Federal Magistrate's Court on the charge, if bail is not forfeited. The maximum fine on the charge is \$500, and/or six months in jail.

In a separate incident, Ernest Trujillo, Capitlan, forfeited \$25 bail on a charge of allegedly taking 12 live trees from the Jicarilla Mountains. Trujillo had previously forfeited \$25 bail on a charge of cutting timber without a permit.

## Court Report

In District Court in Carrizozo last week, Danny Horton and Bobby Tegada of Roswell were found not guilty of residential burglary, in connection with an incident in Ruidoso January 14.

Judge George Zimmerman presided at the jury trial. Tim Quigley of Ruidoso and Donald Wall of Carrizozo represented the defendants, with prosecution handled by assistant District Attorney Charlie Wyman.

In another trial, George Wayne Benson of Tatum was convicted of vehicular homicide, in connection with the death of Jerry Asberry of Odessa, Texas last October.

Benson's car collided with a motorcycle being driven by Asberry on Highway 380. A pre-sentencing report will be prepared by the probation officer, and a sentence will be handed down at a later date.

Valentino Valdez, who had been serving a 10 to 30 year sentence on a habitual criminal charge at Camp Sierra Blanca, was convicted last week of failure to return from a furlough on July 29, 1979.

He was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary to be served concurrently with his other prison term.

March 31, Andy Needham of Ruidoso was granted a continuance for his trial for commercial burglary. No new trial date has been set for Needham.

Appearing in Ruidoso's magistrate court, before Judge Jim Wheeler recently, listed with charges filed and action taken, were the following:

Anthony Lathan, Lacey Lamphere and Forrest Lathan, count one, burglary and count two, larceny over \$2,500, preliminary waived, all bound over to district court.

Barbara Lynn Muffler, fugitive from justice, felony warrant issued from Clark County, Nevada; bond set at \$5,000, no ten percent allowed, committed to county jail.

Mike Hernandez Jr., embezzlement over \$2,500 in the alternative receiving stolen property over \$2,500, case transferred to magistrate Leroy Montes, Capitlan district.

## Lincoln County commissioners meet Tuesday

Lincoln County Commissioners will meet at 10 a.m., Tuesday at the county courthouse in Carrizozo.

Major agenda items to be considered include a review of a resolution prepared by the Sierra Blanca Airport Commission and a replacement for George Shoemaker who has resigned from that commission; opening of bids for fire fighting equipment and a water pressure system for the courthouse; appointments to the county Planning and Zoning Commission and the Public Employees Retirement Board. The appointment of a county energy coordinator will also be considered.

All commission meetings are open to the public.

## Two fire calls over weekend

Ruidoso firefighters responded to two calls this weekend, with both blazes apparently originating in fireplaces.

The substructure of the floor and piping beneath the floor of one unit at Canyon Cabins was destroyed about 7:15 Sunday morning. The fire was under control within about 15 minutes, according to Butch Jacobs of the fire department.

The wall of a home located on Carrizo Canyon road was damaged in another blaze, which was reported shortly after 6 p.m., Saturday night. That blaze was also contained within about 15 minutes, Jacobs said.

## Seventy-nine traffic deaths in two months

There were 79 traffic fatalities in January-February 1980 in New Mexico, according to figures released by the Traffic Safety Bureau. Thirty-eight deaths occurred in January and 41 occurred in February.

Of those cases in which it was known whether or not alcohol was a factor, 73 percent were alcohol-related. Most of the accidents (73 percent) involved motor vehicles. Twenty-five percent involved pedestrians, while only two percent involved motorcycles.

McKinley County led the list with fatalities, with San Juan County reporting nine. Santa Fe County was third with seven fatalities.

### The Plant Corner by Sally Black



This column is devoted to growing healthy indoor plants. Address questions to: Sally Black, The Ruidoso News, Box 123, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345.

The number one variety for home gardeners is the "Patio Tomato." Though small, about 16 inches high and 14 inches wide at maturity, one plant will produce about 20 tomatoes.

Plant a marigold beside each tomato plant to repel many insects and make the soil inhospitable to nematodes. Basil planted with the tomatoes improves the flavor of both.

Temperature and humidity are important in raising tomatoes, with minimum temperature above 60 degrees. Lower temperatures can result in no fruit.

A loam-based mixture is ideal for starting plants in pots, using only fresh material which will protect the plants against verticillium wilt. The old standby, manure tea, gives the plant a boost now and again.

Proper watering is so important, a moisture probe should be used. Deep watering once a week, when plants are started, is necessary and plants should be in full sunlight.

To pollinate each flower, use a feather duster, spray the plants overhead or use a small electric fan, rotating it completely around the plants.

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# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Getting mail is fun, as long as it doesn't come in window envelopes.

Even we old curmudgeons brighten momentarily when the post office lays a letter on us. Secretly, we're a little amazed that anybody would put out 15 cents just to send us a message.

It warms our heart to be allowed to rip open that envelope, even if all you write for is to tell us we're jumpy.

Take Richard Getchell, here in Santa Fe, for instance, who writes letters that contain sentences like this: "In your position of trust, do not mislead the people." Or this: "What I want to do is help you people in the media understand inflation."

That's a laudable object, surely. It's quite possible that we media folks think we understand something when we don't. In fact, that very thing happens quite frequently, especially as one grows older.

So what the heck, if Getchell understands it, why don't we just let him explain it to you?

Here's what he says: "Inflation is an increase in the money supply, and the federal government is the culprit responsible. I know the media like to define 'inflation' and 'inflationary' as an

increase in prices, but this is only the reaction to the fact that the federal government has made more money available.

"By definition, the state's annual spending, the employees' wage raises and higher interest rates are not 'clearly inflationary.' They are only an attempt to provide survival measures. Inflation is debasing the currency, not raising interest rates or salaries."

That's a pretty good example of the economics lessons he gives, though it doesn't quite catch the spirit of all his material. There are other passages which imply pretty directly that columnists who don't know even these fundamental facts should be ruled incompetent, immaterial and irrelevant.

He's probably right at that, but whoever claimed to be perfect?

But you gotta watch this guy or he'll whiff things right past you.

For instance, he says, "Unfortunately you are right in that at some point wages, prices, money rates, pensions, etc., all chase each other."

Our point exactly. What we are saying in those columns on how even state government contributes to inflation is that if somebody doesn't start resisting, everything drives everything else up — or as Gresham said, bad money drives out good.

(Do you sense a kind of smart-ass attitude hidden in that phrase about "unfortunately you are right...?" Is this guy trying to slip in the thought it is highly unlikely that a McCaffrey could be right on anything? You can get to brooding about things like that.)

We'll bet a pretty penny that after this column runs we'll hear from Brother Getchell again — presuming that is, that inflation (which means debased currency), hasn't eaten up the last 15 cents he was saving to pay the postage.

As we say, we love to get that mail, even the "Dear Sir: You cur" kind. Just keep them cards and letters comin'.

### Clipped comment

#### OUR AUTOS SAFER

Cars built in the United States scored well above foreign imports in recent crash tests conducted by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

In occupant protection tests, five of six popular foreign models failed—and conclusions have not yet been reached on the sixth.

A total of 25 United States models were subjected to 35 mph crashes into fixed barriers and to rear-end collisions to check fuel system integrity. Nine passes occupant safety tests and five of the nine passed all the tests to which they were subjected.

The tests are the first in a series to provide consumers with information on how various models compare under identical crash conditions.

This sort of information is important because traffic fatalities across the nation are still rising and the proportion of deaths in subcompacts has risen from 25 to 30 percent in two years. In those crashes involving both subcompacts and larger cars in the same accident, 85 percent of those killed were occupants of the subcompacts.

We hope that the same ingenuity that developed these safety factors in American-made vehicles can be applied to breakthroughs in fuel economy—an area where imports have had the advantage. — News-Bulletin, Belem

#### CARTER AND INFLATION

The terrible inflation news released in late February — prices took their biggest surge in January ever—makes it crystal clear the Carter Administration continues to fail the American people in the fight against inflation.

The suspicion grows, and was reinforced when the White House reaffirmed on the day January's inflation figures were released that price and wage controls are not being considered, that the Carter Administration is content to live with record inflation.

If this continues, it could easily cost Carter the 1980 election; it must thus be assumed Carter strategists feel the rate will slow later this year. But they have been expecting that, and saying that, for almost two years now.

Current, all-time high, inflation, is costing millions of elderly people a standard of living they have worked and saved for. It is reducing everyone's standard some, and weakening the already weak dollar more and more.

One reason for the January surge was Carter's new budget. It was highly inflationary, included another big deficit, and didn't contain cuts of the bureaucracy or wasteful federal spending. That budget which Carter had promised to balance may be the albatross around the Democratic Party's neck in November, and perhaps should be. — Santa Rosa News

The Humane Society of Lincoln County, in offering to provide the community with an animal shelter, is making Ruidoso an offer that's hard to refuse.

An important aspect is that no village funds will be required.

The building would be of cinder block construction, with no dogs or other animals being outside at any time they were being held.

Initially, 22 dogs could be kept in individual four-by-eight-foot pens, with other holding areas for an additional 28 puppies and cats.

The construction of the building is such that animals can't hear outside noise; and, society officers state, noise from within will not be detectable to the human ear beyond a distance of fifty feet outside.

There would be no odor from the enclosed building. Once the present sewage treatment plant is closed, this fact should be fully appreciated by those now living in the area in which the animal shelter will be built.

As need dictates, the society can enlarge the building to handle future needs.

Society officers have stated that funding is available from humane groups across the nation, a source that will be pursued as soon as village land is made available to construct the new animal control facility.

Ruidoso needs an animal control facility. The society is offering to build one at no cost to the taxpayer.

As soon as the land is available, construction plans can be finalized to have the building completed within 90 days. This would help solve the problems that arise each fall when hundreds of dogs and cats are abandoned in Ruidoso as our summer visitors return to their homes. — CD

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# Numerous area waters offer fishing challenge

Warmer weather has brought anglers outdoors in droves, and at times area waters may seem a bit crowded.

There's little reason for this, for there are about as many spots to fish in the area as there are anglers.

Here is a list of the more promising area waters:

**Bonito Lake** — Located 15 miles from Ruidoso off highway 37 (just follow the signs). It's one of the top fishing waters, especially for rainbow and cutthroat. There are also brook and brown trout, and the lake is regularly stocked. The lake is open from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m., and yes, you probably will get into serious trouble if you try to fish there before or after those times.

But the scenery is beautiful, and you might spend as much time looking around

as you do fishing. It's mighty hard to waste a day at Bonito, but avoid it on the weekend, because it's usually crowded.

**Alto Lake** — Only three miles from Ruidoso on highway 37. It has rainbow and some very large, very crafty bass. It too is open only from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m., and there are other regulations posted.

**Rio Ruidoso** — the fast moving river flows right through the village, and is stocked every other week. Rainbow are generally what you'll catch, but there are also brownies and brook trout. You will probably have to ask a landowner for permission to fish at the best spots, but generally they're more than gracious to let you try your luck.

**Carrizo Creek** — this small stream runs alongside Carrizo Canyon Road, and offers rainbow, browns and cutthroat. Again, you should probably ask permission before fishing, 'cause you might be trespassing.

**Rio Hondo** — located farther down the valley, just about anywhere off highway 70. Find a landowner who will let you fish, and you'll probably hook yourself a rainbow or a brown, or even a scale-tipping black bass.

For all the above waters, you will have to have a New Mexico fishing license. Two waters, however, do not require licenses — Rainbow Lake and the Mesquero Apache Tribe lake.

**Rainbow Lake** just might have the largest fish in the area. And it's the place to go if you really want to catch fish. All equipment is provided — pole, line, hook, bait, even someone to take the fish off the hook.

There's a catch, of course — you pay for the fish, at 20 cents an inch. But you get some good eating, and it's a blast for the kids, especially those who haven't caught fish before. And you can show them what a

trout looks like, if nothing else.

The tribe's lake is fairly large, and they have guides who will show you to the best spots. It is also the only area lake that permits boating.

To fish there, you must have a tribal permit, which can be obtained in Mesquero, or at the Inn of the Mountain Gods. Strict adherence to the rules is strongly advised.

For most fishermen, salmon eggs, float bait, corn, worms and lures will prove to be best bets for success; but don't use live bait (for example, minnows). Live bait is prohibited in area waters by state law.

The new fishing season began April 1, and almost without exception, anyone who fishes here must have a New Mexico fishing license. Fishing without one — and getting caught, of course — will probably mean a heavy fine.

Licenses are available at over 300 locations statewide, and the fees help keep various wildlife programs in operation. So don't fish without one.

For state residents, a license is \$7.50, and non-residents must pay \$15.50. Around here, you may as well buy it with a trout validation, which adds \$4 or \$5 to the cost. (You can buy a regular license and have it stamped later, which will allow you to fish for trout, but that will cost you either \$4.25 or \$5.25 more.)

Children under the age of 12 need no license, but youngsters ages 12 and 13 and oldsters over 65 licenses are \$1.25, with a \$2 trout validation charge. Out of state residents in those categories can fish free of charge.

There are other licenses available, such as one and five day licenses, and handicapped persons' licenses. Check the 1980 fishing rules brochure for details.

There are also new bag limits this year. Sixteen trout is now the bag limit, with eight rainbow, cutthroat or salmon total included in the 16. (In other words, if you catch eight rainbow — or any combination of those three fish totaling eight — you can keep fishing for brook or brown trout only. Or if you have eight brooks, keep fishing, because you can have 16 of those or eight rainbows.)

## Floor Fashions

SMALL RUGS or area rugs can serve a big role in oversize rooms. Such rooms, especially where there is too little furniture and no other design elements to break them up, can end up looking and feeling like barns, cold and uninviting.

### The Blossom Parade Comes Marching Up The Valley

On the eighth of April, you remember there was a turning point in the weather. There were many sure signs of the return of true Spring, such as the arrival of the swallows and the buzzards.

That night there came a light frost and a low temperature that left a thin film of ice on the meadows.

Still this did not slow down the advance of Spring, and early in the morning you could feel all through the mountain land that the Queen of Seasons was stepping up its pace. About mid morning I approached the crossing to make a little trip down the valley; and I was welcomed by an old friend of many years, a faithful messenger of Spring's full tide — the snow melt, turning Old Man Ruidoso's clear crystal complexion to a light amber hue, and widening and deepening the stream, so that it flowed at a lively speed raising its voice, singing its song of mid Spring and early summer.

Here at the house on the ninth just a blossom or two on the little pear tree came smiling forth to celebrate the beginning of the main blossom time.

Years ago, Johnny Thomas, for years an orchard man in the Ruidoso Valley and now a rancher over near Lincoln, called my attention one year to the fact that the blossoms do not always bloom forth in the same order saying that every year it is "A little bit different".

The usual order here in the valleys of the White Mountain is: apricots, plums, peaches, cherries, pears and apples.

Down in the upper end of the vale of Glencoe, the cottonwoods and poplars were just bringing out their golden buds, ready to burst into leaf. The pear trees had added the first of their foamy white blossoms to the early spring scene. As you journeyed farther down the new green of the field cottonwood and giant willow trees begin to welcome you with their first new golden green leaves.

In the community of San Patricio the Cottonwood leaves and willows were almost half size in shining green, and the

pear trees were little cascades of white blossoms, closely massed in foamy white like a flowing fountain. How strange to see the pears blooming while the cherry trees were still holding back in bud.

At the lower end of the vale of San Patricio you could see the beginning of the crystal white blossoms of the cherry, delicately spaced out on the branches so the sun shone through the transparent petals — turning the three into a gleaming giant bouquet of glistening, shining flowers like something in a dream. The first of the snow white plum blossoms now began to welcome you from the wayside. And so on the plum, purple and red plum, sweet cherry and early blooming pear were all out together.

Down at Hondo the early blooming plum and the apricot were out in new leaf, the blossoms already having turned into fruit (we hope). Surely there will be a few apricots and certainly some early plums.

Through the wide valley the cottonwoods, giant willow and lombardy poplar form a background and color base for the cherry, pear, peach, and plum blooming all together, displaying their different shades of white, and pink here and yonder all in spring time glory.

Here near at hand is a tree with large pink and white blossoms just out in their very first blooming today. This is the apple, signalling the beginning of the blossom parade up the valleys.

Now is the time to make a trip around the valleys to see the beginning of the blossom parade. Spring is a fast-moving season with every day a new picture of spring time glory.

### A Summer Flower In Early Spring

This is a late spring, slow in arriving. And yet here on the tenth of April, twenty days into the season of spring, the spring time weather has come smiling through all in a day.

In mid afternoon the temperature is seventy-nine, a summer day. Out on one of the small apple trees you can see the first fruit buds of its life beginning to show pink. And out on the little meadow the grass is turning greener before your eyes, and there is a little touch of velvet purple. The wild verbena, a summer flower, and one of the great favorites of the Southwest in the desert, prairie and mountain land.

Spring has brought its magic again. Happiness is in the air. Let us thank God for the blessing of spring.

## Behind the Scenes

### Karen Black turns TV cop

New York—Although Karen Black hasn't been categorized as one of Hollywood's 'superstar' actresses, the glamorous native of Park Ridge, Illinois is regarded as being one of the most respected and hardest working thespians in show business. Her ability to actually become the character she portrays has made her a valuable commodity.

This week Karen will have the privilege to star in the final episode in the 'Police Story' anthology series on NBC, entitled 'Confessions of a Lady Cop.' "My character studies specific cases and tries to crack them, but this lady is also cracking under the pressure. She's lost some of her friends and breaks up with her lover," Karen told me from her home in California.

Ms. Black who has lensed some 24 films was first discovered by Francis Ford Coppola after starring on Broadway in 'Playroom.' Her first major film followed shortly thereafter in Mr. Coppola's 'You're a Big Boy Now.' "It doesn't bother me to be in front of a camera. I have a cheerful personality and that helps a lot. If it were a pressure situation it would be harder. But to me acting tends to be easy. Acting is creating. It's getting ready for a role that brings pressure. You have to think of everything for everyone to do. You're being paid not to be caught short. That's why I agree with the perfectionism of a Streisand. She sees what's wrong. And if you like a part, you're inspired to do things in order to make everything just right. It's like being in love," Karen claimed.

Although Karen loves TV she loathes the idea of doing a series. Said Black: "I just couldn't do it. I can't see myself doing the same character for a year." Toward that end Karen is looking forward to broadening her horizons, whether it be a film, play or whatever. "I have two movies coming out that I'm excited about. One of the films stars Richard Harris who is so gorgeous, it was a kick working with him. I also have a friend writing a play about Isabella of Spain that I might do. Ideally though, I would want to be in a musical and do more comedic work. I seem to gravitate toward portraying comic-tragic figures," the beautiful thespian related.

Karen though is somewhat upset about the way present day Hollywood producers operate. She lamented, "The studios seem to be mind-jammed. They have problems and part of the problem is they never seem to think that they are wrong about anything. But fortunately this doesn't apply to every studio or producer."

Does Karen have any qualms about some of the work she has done over the years? "I don't regret what I have done. My only regret is what I haven't done," she proudly stated. And therein lies the reason why Karen Black continues to be a force in Tinseltown.

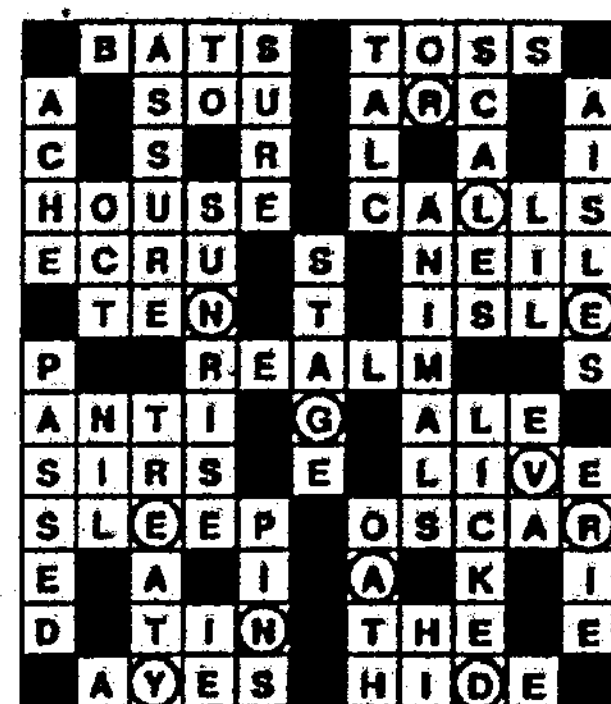
