## Man charged in two armed robberies here

An Albuquerque man, Nick L. Fena, 18, formerly employed in Ruidoso, will have a first appearance hearing today before Magistrate Jim Wheeler, Ruidoso, on charges of two counts of armed robbery and two counts of aggravated assault on a police officer, reported in separate incidents here early Saturday morning.

Ruidoso Downs Chief of Police Ray Garner told The News Sunday that the suspect, Fena, was apprehended near Socorro about 12:45 p.m., Saturday by Officer Jerry Urban, New Mexico State Police, on a statewide radio alert for the suspect.

Garner alleges the following incidents were reported, at times given, concerning movements by the suspect:

— 3:38 a.m., Florence Bruno and Helen Burget, Hollywood Inn employees, were allegedly held up at gun point, by a Spanish male, in the parking lot at the tavern, with the suspect taking \$30 in personal cash from Bruno. The suspect, the women said, had apparently waited for them, after the tavern closed.

— 3:30 a.m., Robert Pugh, Circle K Food Store clerk, reported an armed robbery, a Spanish male, allegedly held Pugh at gunpoint while ordering him to open two cash registers in the store and put the money in a brown paper bag. Pugh said the suspect fled on foot. Pugh alleged the suspected assailant was armed with a .44 magnum revolver.

— 3:36 a.m., Sergeant Gary Mixon, Ruidoso Downs Police Department, after responding to the robbery call from Circle K, in which it was estimated more than \$200 was taken, observed a blue, two door, Chevrolet, fitting the description of the vehicle the suspect reportedly drove away from the Hollywood Inn, headed west-bound on Highway 70.

Mixon attempted to stop the vehicle as it drove into the Hollywood 7-11 store. The suspect allegedly fired on Mixon. Officer John Layher, Ruidoso Police Department, in an attempt to aid Mixon in stopping the suspect's car, allegedly was shot at. The damage report to Layher's vehicle indicates a large caliber bullet hit the rear view mirror holder, causing the bullet to fragment, with portions of the slug lodging in the top of the cab, barely missing Layher's head.

The suspect allegedly drove off, sparking a chase, with many Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs police units involved.

"A blue Chevrolet, matching the description of the wanted vehicle, was found unoccupied off Carrizo Road, on the south side of the road, with a quantity of cash in the car and spread on the ground outside," Garner said. "The driver apparently lost control of the car."

— 4 a.m., a manhunt was launched for the suspect, Garner said, with officers

combing the area where the abandoned vehicle was located.

— 11:30 a.m., a blue Ford pickup was reportedly stolen from Riverside Construction Company, where it was parked at Gavilan Trailer Park. A radio alert was broadcast, resulting in the suspect's arrest near Socorro. A .44 magnum revolver was found in the truck, officer Urban said.

"There may be other charges filed against Fena," Garner said, "after his appearance today before Magistrate Wheeler. The judge set his bond at \$25,000, with no ten percent allowed, following Fena's arrest."

Garner said to The News, "I want to congratulate, and thank, the members of the Ruidoso police and state police for their cooperation resulting in the apprehension of the suspect."

## FmHA APPROVES \$600,000 PROJECT LOAN

# New village hall plans set

Village officials were advised Friday that the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) had approved a \$600,000 loan to finance construction of a new Ruidoso Municipal Administration Center.

Announcement of the loan approval was telephoned to Ruidoso officials Friday by Congressman Harold Runnels. Runnels said the loan, for the 7,400 square foot building, was approved at five percent interest over a 30-year period.

The new complex is to be located near the intersection of Airport Road and Cree Meadows Drive, with provisions made in

extend the building to the south as occasion requires.

The time schedule provides for awarding project bids in June, with construction slated to begin in July to have the building completed for occupancy early in the spring of 1981.

Two new services incorporated in the complex are a meeting room with a seating capacity of 100 and a driveup window for the convenience of persons paying utilities bills.

Offices will be provided in the new building for the cashier/receptionist,

accounting and records, Planning and Zoning Commission, maps and records;

Building Inspector; computers, programmer, board of trustees, mayor; village manager and secretary; assistant village manager and finance division.

Also incorporated will be a conference room and lounge, vault, storage and records room and extra offices for use during emergencies, such as floods and fire, and for future administrative needs.

The floor plan of the new building appears on page two.

## Road striping underway

Harris, who is in charge of the striping crew, said Thursday that the state Highway Department had received a federal grant to finance the striping project locally, because of the past difficulties in maintaining stripe visibility.

The striping was financed by a similar grant last year, Harris said, but this year's striping project will be different in several ways.

The department crews will be using their large striping machine this year, Harris said, which will be driven at a slower speed than before, resulting in a thicker application of the epoxy base

Another change will be an increased amount of glass beading, used as an overcoat, which will improve reflectance at night, according to the department spokesman.


Striping will cover a greater distance than last year. The crew will apply driving lanes from Ruidoso Downs Race Track,

# Symphony dates tentative

The Board of directors of Ruidoso Summer Festival Incorporated (RSFI) Thursday began setting a tentative time schedule for concerts by the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra.

The festival will begin June 4, with an appearance by Cho Liang Lin, at the opening performance at the Ruidoso Downs Race Track sales arena. June 5 classical guitarist Pepe Romero will be the guest artist, with the concert also scheduled to be held at the sales arena.

Saturday, June 6, an informal outdoor afternoon concert will be held at Cedar Creek picnic area, probably at 3 p.m. Another afternoon concert will be held Sunday, possibly on the grounds of the new First Christian Church.

A special family concert, carrying a price tag of one dollar per person, will be held at the sales arena Monday, June 7. That concert will be scheduled early in the evening to allow attendance by small children, the board members agreed.

The final concert, to be held at the sales arena, will be an evening performance featuring a guest artist to be announced.

The board also heard a report from vice-chairman Ken Green on a planned itinerary for a group of 10 to 14 travel writers who will arrive in Ruidoso Tuesday.

The RSFI board members will be supplying transportation for the writers, who will visit area tourist attractions including White Sands National Monument, Bonito

Lake, Sierra Blanca Ski Area, Capitan's Snokey Bear State Park, Old Lincoln Town, White Oaks, the Three Rivers Petroglyph site and the Mesquero area.

The writers will be given additional free time during their five-day stay, to explore the area on their own. A party for the writers will be hosted by Tom and Dorothy Knapp of Ruidoso Downs to introduce them to a group of local residents.

Expected to take part in the publicity tour are writers for papers in Dallas, Fort Worth and San Antonio, Texas and freelancers for dailies in Chicago, New York and San Francisco, Green said.

In other business the RSFI board: — Discussed catering arrangements for concerts with Melinda Hall of Not-


tinghams. Catering proposals will be presented at the next meeting of RSFI, to be held at 10 a.m., Thursday at the Ruidoso Public Library.

# Overnight mule trail ride ready

The trail ride will take approximately four hours, trail boss Murrell Schrimsher said.

Departure time Sunday will immediately follow the riding events, though groups can leave sooner. All riders, however, Mule Skimmers' president Ed Hyman said, "will be back at the West barn area well before dark."

The schedule calls for typical western fare: roundup style dinner Saturday evening, followed by musical entertainment at the camp site. A ranch style breakfast will be served Sunday morning, after which various competitive events to be run off.

"We want it clearly understood,"

Hyman said, "that trail riders may use horses instead of mules."

"Because this is a Mule Skimmers ride, the balloon busting, polo, barrel racing and pole bending events are for mule riders only. However, as any and all events are jackpot, horsemen may arrange their own races, and will be urged to do so."

Those making the trail ride will be charged \$12.50 each, including feed for their animal. Persons driving to the camp site will be charged \$7.50 each, which includes dinner and breakfast. ## ComFIRE eyes new fire season

The Committee For Insuring Ruidoso's Environment (ComFIRE) decided Thursday to begin scheduling showings of the Red Flag Fire Alert film produced here last April.

Steve Makowski, Fire Management Officer for Smokey Bear Ranger District, Lincoln National Forest, said the high fire danger season is here and showings of the film will increase community awareness of that danger.

ComFIRE chairman Herb Brunell said he has arranged to have the tape shown on local cable television. "He's willing to show it as often as we like," Brunell said. In addition, the educational station in El Paso is compiling a 60-second promotional spot which will be copied and distributed to stations using the tape. Brunell said those spots will begin appearing on El Paso Channel 9 soon and copies of the spots will be available then.

Makowski said the Red Flag idea has caught on in Arizona and the Prescott Rotary Club has allocated \$1,500 to launch the program in that area. Makowski said they aren't "as fortunate as we were to have so much fine cooperation from the state agencies when we got started."

Working through the State Forestry Office, Ruidoso's ComFIRE program received more than \$1,000 in goods and in-kind services to launch the local Red Flag program.

Makowski said the Prescott group wants a 16 millimeter movie of the Red Flag tape, but said the cost is around \$50 per minute. He is currently negotiating with the regional office of the United States Forest Service to have one movie produced.

The Red Flag program has also gained interest in the Angel Fire area and State Forestry officials working with ComFIRE since its birth are working with Angel Fire citizens to start their program.

Brunell said Ruidoso Fire Marshal Derald Waltrip is trying to schedule a planned pine needle burn so everyone would be able to clean up their yards before this spring's fire season reaches the critical stage.

Brunell said a meeting with the Ruidoso Planning and Zoning Commission (P&Z) to discuss revisions in zoning regulations went well. He said village zoning officer Emory Hatcher is planning a meeting between ComFIRE and P&Z, which will also include village department heads involved, and the village attorney.

"This will probably be the quickest way to have the ordinances written and in-

corporated into zoning regulations," Brunell said.

ComFIRE, working with Forest Service officials and Boy Scout Troop 59, is canvassing the village with notices informing people of fire hazards around their homes and ways to remedy them. Member Rich Seeley said the program is working smoothly.

Guests at ComFIRE included former member Ken Schein, who was transferred to Santa Fe State Forestry offices in January, and Frank Smith, chief of fire prevention for the State Division of Forestry.

The jury acquitted David Lee Adams, Ft. Lewis, Washington of charges in the same incident.

Hewitt, 58, who has been District II highway engineer in Roswell, succeeds Chief Highway Administrator Fred O'Chesky, who resigned March 21 to join Public Service Company of New Mexico.

Hewitt assumed his new duties immediately and, with his wife Una, will soon move to Santa Fe.

Hewitt, following confirmation, doesn't anticipate any changes at this

—Discussed compiling a slide program to present to service clubs and others to inform them of the month-to-month activities of the Center.



## Altrusa's home tour Sunday

The Altrusa Club of Ruidoso will sponsor a tour of landmark homes Sunday from 2 to 6 p.m. All homes are located in the Hondo Valley and near Lincoln, with maps included on the tickets.

Homes featured on the tour include the following:

**Sentinel Ranch**—Owned by the Peter Hurd family, this spread was purchased by the family in May, 1934 and included 40 acres on the Rio Hondo River at San Patricio. Hurd purchased the property before his wife, Henriette Wyeth, had ever seen it.

The property has grown to include 2,200 acres and the main house, L-shaped, was on the property when purchased. In 1934, it consisted of four rooms for living quarters with the remainder filled with apples, according to the family.

The original rooms were converted and supplemented to create a hacienda. The 12-year conversion has given the home its own character, according to Sonya Smith, an Altrusan who has visited this home.

The Spanish style home features wooden floors and cozy fireplaces throughout, as well as two artist studios, those of Hurd and Wyeth. Onlookers will also see five adobe homes elsewhere on the property. Bill Phippen—Women will appreciate the design of this home, purchased in 1974 by the Phippens, local Realtors. The home, originally built by J. Emmet Reese features knotty pine walls, fireplaces and hand textured walls and ceilings, all done with a putty knife, according to Phippen.

The home was seriously damaged in a 1974 fire, but the Spanish style architecture features complete design by the Phippens, all renovated since the fire.

**Tom Perrett home**—This home was part of the original George Coe Ranch which was homesteaded in the 1800's. The structure was later purchased by the Browning family and Bruce and Georgia Griffith.

Built in the 1930's, this home saw many changes while owned by the Griffiths, who added a guest house in 1939. In 1940 this home was chosen by a national magazine

as the most beautiful home in the state of New Mexico because of the beauty of the grounds and home.

A series of owners followed the Griffiths, but the grounds and main house were neglected, according to Smith, since it was primarily used as a second home. Perrett, also a Realtor, purchased the home in 1973 and completely renovated it. He saved much of the original paneling and tile to lend character to this adobe and rock home.

**Betty Martin home**—Built in 1850, this rambling gray stucco home has a shingle roof and an 80 foot front porch. It has seen many uses including a merchantile store, boarding house and a tuberculosis sanitarium. It was purchased by Martin in 1976 and has been completely restored since then.

The nine room home is supplemented by one other structure, a mill house behind the main house which was formerly used as a nurses' quarters.

**Buckhorn**—This home was originally built in 1902 and served the Hondo Valley many years as a popular watering hole. It was also a dance hall for a time, with part of the building partitioned off into smaller rooms. Also during its life, the building housed a grocery store and a barber shop.

When it was turned into a saloon, business dropped off because the new highway bypassed its front door. The

building was eventually closed down and vandals damaged most parts of it.

In 1970, Tom and Dorothy Knapp considered the structure as a home and purchased it with renovation in mind. Knapp, a bronze sculptor, set up a studio in one part of the building, and the two worked every spare minute to clean up the work of vandals.

Completely rewired, with new plumbing installed, this building has been turned into a comfortable home which suits the needs of its owners.

Tickets cost \$3 each and can be purchased at Smith Ltd. Gallery, the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, The Ruidoso News and the Artisan Shop.

Profits from the ticket sales are used by the Altrusa Club to sponsor community service projects throughout the year. Last year the Altrusa Club spent \$1,000 to sponsor an Emergency Medical Technicians course, which provided 14 additional ambulance staff personnel for the county. Other projects have included assisting the community choir and the Ruidoso Summer Festival, Incorporated.

"One of the prerequisites for being in Altrusa is that members must be in business as a professional," Doris Langford, public information chairperson, said. "These ladies take time from their businesses so they can help better our community," she said.

## The Plant Corner by Sally Black



This column is devoted to growing healthy indoor plants. Address questions to: Sally Black, The Ruidoso News, Box 128, Ruidoso, New Mexico 88345.

Dear Sally: I have my geraniums in the west window. I feed them every two weeks. The plants are growing tall and leggy, but no blooms. Please advise what I should do to get more flowers? — Robin White, Ruidoso.

Dear Robin: All geraniums, despite suggestions to the contrary, do grow in a reasonably rich moist soil, containing a high proportion of loam, with occasional feeding. Starved plants will flower more freely but not with the same good sized blooms.

For geraniums, use fertilizer with a high middle number for phosphoric acid content, with BR-61 (9-59-8) the highest I know. Geraniums flower more when the pot is full of roots.

Plants that have bloomed should be cut hard back, with cuttings from old stems taken in late August for new plants.

Geraniums need four to six hours of sunlight daily to flower. Fertilize once a week until they bloom, then only once a month.



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# Tracksters do well at Lovington meet — sort of

It was "close, but no cigar" for the Ruidoso Warrior boy and girl track squads Saturday at Lovington.

Coaches Darrel Stierwalt and Sergio Castanon were both pleased by their charges' performances, saying almost everyone had improved. But it still wasn't enough.

"We brought our times down," Stierwalt said, "but the competition was really tough. I'm a little disappointed because we didn't place better, but we tried hard. We just didn't place."

Castanon echoed Stierwalt's sentiments. "It was a pretty tough track meet," he said. "A lot of the girls had their best times ever, but the best we did was third place." It had been two weeks between the squads' last competition and Saturday's

meet, and both coaches admitted the long layoff might have affected performances.

"A long layoff will almost always hurt," Stierwalt said. "I don't know how much it affected us. I wouldn't say it hurt us too bad."

"It may have had some effect," Castanon said, "but then we had our best times ever, so I don't know."

The weather was not a factor, Stierwalt said, but Castanon thought it might have had some effect.

"I thought it was awful hot," he said. "The sun might've affected us, but like I said, we had our best times."

On the boys' squad, Joe Almager turned in the best Warrior finish, placing second in the mile with a 4:27 time. Cody Browning threw the javelin 141 feet for third place, Elroy Duffy ran the two mile race in 10:37 for fourth, and Ricky Dennis

ran a 2:09 880 for fifth place.

Duffy was not expected to race Saturday, after having been stung by a bee earlier in the week. Allergic to insect bites, Duffy experienced an adverse reaction and was not expected to compete.

But he ran Saturday, and Stierwalt said, "He was doing 'real good.'" He was in second place and collided with a runner from Lovington, the second time this season he has been involved in a track mishap.

"But he got up off the track and started running again," Stierwalt said. "He finally pulled up to about 20 yards from the leaders, but the best he could do was fourth. We thought he had a good chance at winning the race, but... he's okay and he should run next week."

The Warriors didn't do well in field events, although Steve Benway did have his best personal mark in the long jump

this season, recording 18 feet, six inches. But that wasn't good enough to place, Stierwalt said.

"Heck, fifth place was 19 feet, one inch," he said. But Stierwalt is proud of his team.

"We hadn't run against those teams before," he said. "We were exposed to an all weather track, which is what we have to run on next week. We got to see the other schools, and we improved our times. I'm proud of them."

Next Saturday the Warriors go to Artesia for a qualifying meet. A qualifying meet is doubly important, because in such a meet, tracksters can qualify for the state meet without actually winning, just so long as they beat a set time or height or distance, depending on the event.

"We'll qualify some people for state," Stierwalt said.

The lady Warriors had problems of their own, Castanon said.

"We improved, but didn't place," he said. "The competition was real tough. Overall, we scored 14 team points, which placed us fifth out of six teams. But our times were faster."

Kita Bob, Ruidoso's top miler, shaved 18 seconds off her time, finishing at 5:42, which placed her only fourth. In her first two meets this year, she won the mile with slower times.

Discus hurler Tammy McCulley placed third with a heave of 94 feet, one inch, her best effort this season, although not her best finish.

Sheri Dennis garnered thirds in the 100 and 200 meter dashes, with times of 12.3 and 27.5. Gleda Bob also placed third in the 800 meter dash, with a time of 2:40.

"We're improving," he said. "So what we have to do now is just stick with it and stay after it and try to bring our times down some more."

Next Saturday the lady Warriors compete at Tularosa, and Castanon admitted he has no idea how his squad will do.

"I don't even know what schools will compete there," he said. "I broke up our relay teams and put the girls in individual events, and Lovington was the first time they competed. I expect better things at Tularosa."



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# Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE — Was Warden Jerry Griffin of the State Penitentiary, transferred to another job "at his own request," pushed or was he shoved?

It has to be one or the other.

Certainly nobody who looked at the film of that press conference in which we were told he wanted to move could believe that he had voluntarily made such a request.

He hadn't — though he loyally acted as though he had. (Great work, Jerry. Still playing for the old team — though the team was going off and deserting you.)

Let's say there's a man who gets a phone call from his boss at 10:00 a.m. which tells him that, in a very short time, he will be one of the main attractions at a press conference in which it will be announced that he is being removed from office at his own request and given a different position. Would you say such a man resigned "at his own request"?

Not in the ordinary acceptance of those terms.

Fact is, Griffin was shoved out, as this column and other commentators on state-wide politics had long ago predicted he would be. There was nothing else to do with the man after an escape of 11 convicts and the in-prison murders of a minimum of

33 more.

But what's disturbing is that we had to go through some hollow charade which implies that you and me, the folks out there in the real world, will believe that this is not what has taken place.

What's griesome is that the Correction Department, and perhaps the Governor's office which stands behind them, believes that the citizens are so dumb they will swallow such a story.

What's deeply and steadily worrisome is that those who are now in charge of our penal system think the people can be conned.

Adolph Saenz, the \$40,000-a-year man now running that operation, gets criticized for his past record, which could possibly include some knowledge of the torture of prisoners in South American countries. He is, as even the Governor admits, short on experience in the correctional area. (To put it simply, he's a lifelong cop.)

So, shortly after firing Warden Griffin while pretending not to, what's the first appointment he makes to his staff? Another guy as innocent of correctional experience as he is, Herb Hardin, who served in the same organization which may well be implicated in South American hanky-panky.

Meanwhile, Saenz is resisting like sixty the appointment of a California correctional man to teach somebody something about how to be a warden at the penitentiary. (Whom? Griffin, the only warden we had, has been put out to pasture.) He's also dragging his feet on signing a contract with a Washington expert on penal work, maybe because he's uncomfortable with anyone who served along the Potomac when the institution he served for so long was being phased out of service, with considerable quiet and some embarrassment on the part of the administration.

In other words, things are not all nice and neat in that department of our very own state government which, despite the smokescreens it is presently putting up, has to take its share of blame for at least 33 murders of prisoners by one another.

Those who will lie to us about resignations at one's own request will not necessarily be truthful to us in other matters.

Obviously, there are many situations concerning the state prison system that have not been made public. It is also unlikely that all facets of the recent riot at Santa Fe will be released after the investigation ends.

The brief prisoner squabble at Bernalillo County jail last week indicates that a method for housing felons, sentenced to prison terms, must be found. Soon.

Thursday's announcement by state Finance Secretary David King that he'd advised Governor King that the Radium Springs prison for women is unfit for holding felons, further compounds the problem of handling medium and maximum security convicts.

Transferring medium security convicts, due to lack of housing facilities, to honor farm type operations having no means of containing inmates developing a wanderlust, will surely result in more walk aways.

The current figure being kicked around on providing a new prison is in the neighborhood of one hundred million dollars, a neighborhood the planners could soon be leaving as building costs soar.

We believe that the overall prison/prisoner situation is sufficiently serious that Governor Bruce King should call a special session of the legislature, solely to delve into prison problems — and solve them. Soon. —CD



In addition, \$3,500 of the \$8,000 was returned to the Village which reduced the Village cost to a mere \$4,500 which was very inexpensive advertising.



# Raising racing mules requires much patience, even more dedication

With the proliferation of organizations devoted to improving the status of minority groups, it seems only natural that the "movement" should spread to some of the more maligned members of the animal kingdom.

So if you are one of those unenlightened souls who believes mules are only good for plowing, packing supplies and other mental chores, think again. Mule racing, breeding, showing and organized mule rodeo and trail events may be on the way to becoming Ruidoso's next major developing tourist attraction.

One Ruidoso couple who seem to be getting in on the ground floor (pasture floor?) of the mule movement are J. B. and Gayle Rogers, who have established a mule ranch just outside Ruidoso Downs in the Mogjo Valley.

Rogers' Long Ears Ranch, as it has been christened, was purchased about three years ago by the Rogers, who also maintain a ranch home in Crane, Texas. After attending the mule races and events sponsored by the Ruidoso Downs Mule Skinners last fall, they decided to begin their own local mule operation.

The Rogers are already the proud owners of five mules which they plan to enter in races and other competitions. The group includes:

— Maude, the championship running mule for 1979, who has been named second champion mule for the current year.

— Illink Kate, a two-year-old, who placed second in her first start at last year's mule races, and brought the highest price of any mule at the sale two years ago.

— Angel, the Rogers' largest mule, who will probably be entered in roping events this year, and has an "A" speed rating.

— Dooley Did It, a three-year-old who'll enter the future this year.

— Charlie Pride, another two-year-old, who is in training for his first start.

Gayle Rogers said they plan to begin raising mules in the near future, and their jockey, Susan Anderson, will be here this week to begin the mules' spring training.

As might be imagined, there are a few more complications involved in training mules than in training horses. "You have to break them, discipline them, teach them to stand in the gates and to come out of the gates," Rogers said. "That last task is one of the most difficult," she added.

"If you can get them to come out of the gates and they can run at all, you've got half the battle won," she said. The training then progresses to the art of "running straight."

Mules can no longer be stereotyped as old broken down beasts of burden, since they are now being produced from good

quality thoroughbred and quarterhorse mares, Rogers said; but there are still a few temperament problems.

In a race situation, "if they're not in the mood, they won't do it," Rogers said. "Mules are different from horses — if they're tired or feeling stress or strain, they'll just quit, whereas a horse will run its heart out for you."

There are exceptions, Rogers added, like their champion Maude. "She's just as consistent as she can be," she said.

Handling is also a little more difficult than with horses, she added. "A mule has to know you and get attached to you before you can handle it well," she said. "But if they really like you, you won't have many problems with them."

On the positive side, though, mules are less delicate than horses, or "easier to keep sound." Another advantage, especially in recreational riding, is their sure footedness, even in rough terrain, she added.

Rogers also pointed out that even the temperamental nature of mules can provide entertainment for their fans.

"They're so much fun to watch," she said. At the races, she said, "they may start off down the track and then just quit about halfway through the race. You never really know for sure what they're going to do."

The Rogers' ranch is equipped with a training track, of about 400 yards in length, complete with gates. Trainer Buck Bingham has also equipped a large barn, so that the mules may be ridden even in adverse weather conditions.

Training begins each spring, and usually lasts 60 to 80 days before races or other events. The first of this year's American Mule Association (AMA) sanctioned races is scheduled for June 12 in Durango, Colorado and the Rogers' animals will be participating.

Gayle Rogers serves as chairwoman of the advertising committee of the AMA, which will sponsor five or more major mule events this year. The AMA operates in a manner similar to the American Quarter Horse Association, with an official point system and a set of rules to govern the mule events, she said.

To Rogers, the future of mules — in all manner of activities — looks bright.


In addition to races and trail rides, there are "packing classes, jack shows, halter performances — so many different aspects. I don't see how it can keep from growing when people see what you can do with them."

Another source of enjoyment for mule aficionados is watching their own enthusiasm spread to the uninitiated.


Attending their first mule race or rodeo, Rogers said, "People are so amused at first, and then they wind up right in the middle of it, just like the rest of us."





## The Dreamer

**Spring Makes A Second Beginning**

Winter, unusually reluctant to leave the scene of action this year, brought record-breaking cold and snow into places like Arkansas, Missouri, and some other state wherein the flowers had already spread their many-colored carpet over Mother Earth who was all dressed up in a dress of new green.

Here in the land of the White Mountain we had a share of this weather in the blizzard of the twelfth and the cold night of the thirteenth. Down at the lower end of the Ruidoso Valley the new leaf and blossom parade was stopped in its tracks, as Jack Frost blew the whistle signalling that the festivities were postponed until further notice.

Now today, on the seventeenth, Spring has very cautiously made a second start. The little pair of swallows has returned after having departed for some warmer spot during the snow storm. The measure of the completeness of the surprise is seen when we remember that the swallows are hardly ever wrong in judging the time for their return from Mexico.

One of several of Mother Nature's children who was not caught out in the cold snap was the Oak Brush. Yet today there is just the faintest change in the pink color of the steep fields of oak brush all along the hills on the south side of the valley.

At a spot just up from the house there is what you might call a high water bank on the south side of the river. You can stand on the edge of this bank and look into the tops of the walnut and oak trees growing just below, and through the almost bare branches you can see the river gleaming and shining as it runs, between its low-

water banks.

A giant oak reaches its branches almost brushing the mossy rocks at the top of the bank; and right at the edge grows the oak tree's little brother; a small brush of the oak brush.

The little oak seems to be asking the large oak if it is time to begin leafing out. They must have talked the matter over quite seriously because the oak tree is just barely swelling its buds while if you look closely you can see the tiny leaf buds on the oak brush turning pink as they very cautiously begin to open. The walnut close by is even more doubtful of the weather.

Latest of all the leaf family to venture out is the Mezquite. There are some here in the vale on the sunny side of the world, happy here among the pinon and cedar although far from their Texas home.

There is an old Texas saying handed down from the Early Spanish: "El Mezquite sabe." (The Mezquite Knows). The meaning is that the Mezquite will not leaf out until all danger of frost is past.


When I looked at the oak buds it was mid morning, and now it is mid afternoon. I see that the pink and white spring daisies have burst into bloom, along with the New Mexico pint, the little ancestor of the carnation. And one bloom has come out on the little apple tree. There is a heavy incense all through the warm air filling all the glen. This is the box elder trees along the river rapidly leafing out, leading the way for all the other river trees telling them: "come on out, we are late and Spring is here."

So Spring is on the move again ready to bring us untold treasures in beautiful days filled with happiness. Let us thank God for Glorious Spring.







## Behind the Scenes

### Karen Black turns TV cop

New York—Although Karen Black hasn't been categorized as one of Hollywood's 'superstar' actresses, the glamorous native of Park Ridge, Illinois is regarded as being one of the most respected and hardest working thespes in show business. Her ability to actually become the character she portrays has made her a valuable commodity.

This week Karen will have the privilege to star in the final episode in the 'Police Story' anthology series on NBC, entitled 'Confessions of a Lady Cop.' "My character studies specific cases and tries to crack them, but this lady is also cracking under the pressure. She's lost some of her friends and breaks up with her lover," Karen told me from her home in California.

Ms. Black who has lensed some 24 films was first discovered by Francis Ford Coppola after starring on Broadway in 'Playroom.' Her first major film followed shortly thereafter in Mr. Coppola's 'You're a Big Boy Now.' "It doesn't bother me to be in front of a camera. I have a cheerful personality and that helps a lot. If it were a pressure situation it would be harder. But to me acting tends to be easy. Acting is creating. It's getting ready for a role that brings pressure. You have to think of everything for everyone to do. You're being paid not to be caught short. That's why I agree with the perfectionism of a Streisand. She sees what's wrong. And if you like a part, you're inspired to do things in order to make everything just right. It's like being in love," Karen claimed.

Although Karen loves TV she loathes the idea of doing a series. Said Black: "I just couldn't do it. I can't see myself doing the same character for a year." Toward that end Karen is looking forward to broadening her horizons, whether it be a film, play or whatever. "I have two movies coming out that I'm excited about. One of the films stars Richard Harris who is so gorgeous, it was a kick working with him. I also have a friend writing a play about Isabella of Spain that I might do. Ideally though, I would want to be in a musical and do more comedic work. I seem to gravitate toward portraying comic-tragic figures," the beautiful thesp related.

Karen though is somewhat upset about the way present day Hollywood producers operate. She lamented, "The studios seem to be mind-jammed. They have problems and part of the problem is they never seem to think that they are wrong about anything. But fortunately this doesn't apply to every studio or producer."

Does Karen have any qualms about some of the work she has done over the years? "I don't regret what I have done. My only regret is what I haven't done," she proudly stated. And therein lies the reason why Karen Black continues to be a force in Tinseltown.

Well, apparently co-producer **Leonard Goldberg** is not at all opposed to the idea of **Kate Jackson** returning to the show. Ms. Jackson's agent has been approached about the possibility of her returning on a limited basis. Kate just might go for the idea. There have been reports elsewhere of the most celebrated angel of them all, namely **Farrah Fawcett**, returning to the 'Angels' on a regular basis. Supposedly, Farrah's career in the movies is in such perilous decline that she would love the idea of returning to prime time on a weekly basis. Forget that idea—if the beauty returns to 'Charlie's Angels' next season it will be on the same schedule as this season. But don't count out the possibility of a new angel being picked. Although **Persis Khambatta** is being bandied about as the most likely choice, I happen to think it's wishful thinking, either on Persis' part or, more likely, her publicist's. **Priscilla Presley** is the front runner, but there is one little problem: she can't act. The competitors in the chat-show championship include **Johnny Carson**, the undisputed lord of late-night TV whose 'Tonight Show' attracts 7.8 million viewers in 212 cities for NBC-TV. **Phil Donahue**, 'Baron of the Breakfast Viewers' attracts 8.3 million viewers in 175 cities. **Mike Douglas**, who's being dumped from his syndicated show, despite his 4.8 million viewers, **Merv Griffin**, whose prime-time show is syndicated in 100 cities and is seen by 5.3 million viewers.
