Sewer plans need money

Bids opened by the Joint Use Board (JUB) Thursday afternoon, on construction of the Regional Wastewater System (RWS), exceeded engineer's estimates of the cost by more than \$2

Ruidoso Downs trustees Thursday evening learned that bids submitted for a village sewer system, to tie into RWS, came to nearly \$700,000 more than funds available for the project.

The RWS Project entails two contracts. one for the treatment plant, the second for the sewer lines.

The apparent low bidders were: - Timerman Corporation, Albuquerque, \$4,781,729 on the treatment plant.

- Kent Nowlin Construction, Albuquerque, \$3,327,962.18, on the sewer lines. Consolidated Constructors of Farmington submitted the apparent low bid of \$1,033,694.96 on the Ruidoso Downs sewer

Monies available for RWS as of Thursday, including the \$1.5 million in sewer bonds for Ruidoso, totaled, project engineer Quinton Daniels, Alamogordo, sald, \$6,036,805.

Sewer bond funds available for the Ruidoso Downs project total \$500,000.

\$3,473,958 on the treatment plant. \$2,790,275 on the sewer lines.

The sewer system cost for Ruidoso Downs was estimated by Daniels at \$666,338,60.

The amount of money needed for the projects, as planned, approximates: - \$2,072,906 for RWS.

- \$633,695 for Ruidoso Downs sewer system.

The difference in the engineer's estimate is due, in part, to the Environmental Protection Agency's requirement that cost estimates be submitted to EPA with Step One, the initial plans for the project, when the original request for EPA funding is made.

Records in Ruidoso's files show that Step One was completed September of 1978, with the estimated cost being \$6,026,667 as the eligibility amount approved by EPA. Step Two in the project, approval of final plans and advertising for blds, village records show, had the 1978 cost figure being carried by EPA in May of 1979.

Village files also show that EPA, in connection with Step Three, project construction, put the eligibility figure at \$8,284,223 in May of 1979, just \$237,556 over the cost EPA approved in September 1978. for Step One.

- JUB can hold the bids for 80 days. until June 23, during which time Daniels can analyze them and determine changes that can be made in the plans, to lower the costs, that would not affect the operation of the treatment plant or the sewer lines.

(Project portions that could be withheld, for example, would be to complete two holding tanks in the treatment plant, and adding two more when needed. The plant is designed to handle area needs for many years, into the 1990s or 2000s, in the construction plans, providing the opportunity to temporarily eliminate portions of the project that will be used only when the plant reaches maximum treatment capacity.)

- Application will be made to EPA, requesting that additional funds be made available.

Under provisions of the present JUB/EPA agreement, EPA is providing 75 percent of the total RWS cost; 12.5 percent is from state funds; with 12.5 percent from Ruidoso/Ruidoso Downs. This agreement divides the local share at 75 percent Ruidoso, 25 percent Ruidoso Downs.

Should EPA approve the increase in eligibility cost of the \$2 million, the breakdown would be approximately:

\$250,000 from state funds. - \$187,310 from Ruldoso.

- \$62,690 from Ruidoso Downs. Ruidoso's files show that the state funds are available for distribution to RWS, as soon as EPA's approval of the new cost is

Officials of Ruidoso and Ruidoso Downs express confidence that the villages' share of the added cost can be provided.

JUB officials, likewise, indicate that, as most of the cost difference is attributable to the about 17 percent annual inflation factor, that EPA will approve the about \$2 million change in eligibility cost.

At this juncture, RWS awaits EPA approval of the project, pending Daniel's study of possible deletions that would further lower initial costs.

"The RWS project is not lost," JUB chairman Norman Wheeler said to The News Friday afternoon. "We feel certain that EPA will, if funds for this project have not been frozen, go along with the plans as the need has been proven to them."

Of the sewer system for Ruidoso Downs, Wheeler, as mayor, said, "The bid puts us in a bind. We don't have another \$500,000. But, after Daniel can tell us what fat can be cut, we'll take a hard look at the cost and make every effort to come up with the money so it won't break the backs of everyone here."

The 1960-81 Ruidoso Municipal School budget of \$3,652,910 received tentative approval form the New Mexico Department of Public School Finance following a public hearing Thursday.

The new budget reflects an increase of \$406,926 over the 1979-80 budget of \$3,243,984. A summary of the budget shows

estimated revenue from local sources to be \$409,640 or 14.1. percent of total revenue. Federal revenue, now representing 4.1 percent of total revenue, totals \$119,594. State revenue of \$2,380,720 comprises 81.8 percent of all revenue sources.

penditures comes in salaries both for travel totals \$16,787. Pupil transportation certified and non-certified personnel. Last year, school employees accepted a seven percent increase in salaries, in keeping with federal guidelines.

To compensate for rising inflation, the Board of Education built into the new budget a 9.6 percent increase in salary for the superintendent, an average 10.5 percent salary increase for principals, an average 15.68 percent increase for cer-tifled staff and a 16 percent increase for noncertified personnel.

Salaries and benefits comprise 56.2 percent of the total budget, which is "about average" according to Rebecca Delgado, deputy director for the department. Delgado and financial assistant Liz Garcia reviewed the budget with local officials.

The budget also reflects three more staff maintenance personnel, purchased serpersons, an administrative assistant, a special education instructor, and a diagnostician.

Administrative costs, including Fixed charges of employee benefits, wo-

superintendent's salary, administrative staff, audit expenses, legal services. election expense, supplies and adexpenditure estimates. ministrative travel, including board travel, totals \$103,744, for a 19.6 percent increase over last year's budget.

Direct instruction, which includes teacher salaries, special education, teacher aides, substitute teachers and instructional supplies represent \$1,544,703 of the total budget.

Instructional support items, which include principals' salaries, guidance, diagnosticians, other professional personnel, testing supplies and instructional travel support represents expenditures of **\$**304,917.

Health survices, including registered The most notable increase in ex- nurse's salary, nurse supplies and nurse services, which includes bus drivers' salaries and benefits, vehicle insurance and rent represents \$211,437 of total expenditures.

Plant operation, which includes custodians' salaries, clerical assistants, fuel, electricity and telephone costs, and general supplies represents \$241,952 of the budget. This figure reflects a 38.5 percent increase over last year's actual expenditures of \$199,532. However, Superintendent Pat Valliant said the "mild winter" was a key factor in keeping those costs down.

Last year's budget alloted \$226,180 for fuel and other plant operation costs. "When compared with last year's budget, that figure is not astronomical," Valliant

RC&D names officers, six committee chairmen

At the annual meeting of the South Central Mountains Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) in Alamogordo last week, three of the current officers were reelected to one year terms.

Among those reelected were chairman Clem Weindorf of Hondo; vice-chairman Wally Ferguson of Carrizozo; and treasurer Johnson Sterns of Nogal, Taking over as secretary will be Tom McCalmont of Santa Fe, who is employed by the state planning office for this region. McCalmont will replace Delbert Nelson in that capacity.

Named to committee chairmanships were Bud Bagley, Corona, agriculture; Mary Rich, Carrizozo, health, aging and housing; Delbert Nelson, Roswell, water; Howard Shanks, Capitan, community development; Robert Bell, Weed, transportation and communications; and Chris Zamora, Lincoln, forestry and wildlife.

RC&D members discussed the allocation of increased acreage in New Mexico for wilderness designations.

Action is now pending in the United States Congress to designate an additional 573,000 acres for wilderness purposes. The amount of acreage was reduced from the 1.2 million proposed by the Carter administration and the 1.8 million acres proposed by the Forest Service, Weindorf

The organization voted to reiterate an earlier stand of opposition to increasing the size of wilderness areas. Weindorf agreed to contact the state's congressional delegation to advise them of that position.

Speaking at the afternoon meeting in Alamogordo was Audi Miranda, director of the state Soil and Water Division, who discussed the Carter administration's policies on small communities and rural development and "how RC&D fits in," with those policies.

Non-licensed contractor fined \$800

Pirollo was assessed a fine of \$800 and was given a six-month suspended sentence in county jail.

fund and cafeteria expenditures total \$226,051; for a total budget of \$3,652,910. The only items not reflected in the budget that will hopefully be funded will be special projects, including Title I, Title IV and Title IV-Indian education. All are federally funded programs and if and when they are approved, a budget increase will be announced.

Final approval of the budget will not come until mid-August, when local assessed valuations will be known. If that figure is different than figures in the proposed budget, according to Valliant, state funding will decrease and local funding will increase.

Delgado said the budget was "a good one" and showed good planning. She said that teacher salaries were very generous, adding, "Of the 39 budgets we have received to date in Sante Fe, the average increase in teacher salaries is 14.2 percent; you are well above that."

She said the legislature recommended that salaries be increased by at least 14 percent with special consideration given to lower paid employees. She said that, "teacher's salaries increased by 15.3 percent so it goes beyond what the legislature was shooting for. And, you did this even though the new money coming

into the district was only 13.4 percent.". Representative John Bigbee attended the hearing and, as chairman of the Legislature's Educational Study Committee, said his committee will hold hearings in Roswell September 16 and 17 to "look over the rules of the department and see what we can do to help" in problem

Bigbee said they will address? specifically, discipline, violence, vant dalism and social concerns. "Maybe the only thing we can do is call the problem to the attention of parents; but we know there is a problem in some areas."

Dear Sally: My African Violets have very healthy looking leaves but have not flowered since the original flowers fell.

What is your advice to produce more-flowers — Pat French, Ruidoso.

Dear Pat: Established plants will flower from feeding with any one of the popular African Violet fertilizers. If plants produce lots of lush leaves, but seem reluctant to flower, it will help to change to a tomato. fertilizer used in weak dilution weekly rather then occasional heavy doses,

For extra humidity, place the plants on a tray of pebbles almost covered with water. African Violets do not thrive id chilled or placed in direct sunlight. Place the flowers under a light evenings during the winter months. Proper light is vitally important to produce more flowers.



SANTAFE — Some Albuquerque folks got miffed when Al Dietz at Commerce and Industry suggested we should take some steps to see that new industry coming to the state locates somewhere other than the Big Town.

Maybe they had a point. It would seem a little discriminatory to use statutes to prevent that happening.
But there's another way to look at the

whole issue.

What Dietz seemed to be calling for was not so much an "anti" thing — keep companies from going to Bernalillo county — as it was a positive thing — give them reason to consider locating elsewhere.

Besides, as Jim Garvin of Albuquerque Industrial Development Service points out, the big city gets its share of whatever good happens to the state — at home or in some other county. Albuquerqueans ought

to be happy to pitch in to help find industry for every corner of the state. Fact is, as Dietz is well aware, it takes a very special kind of industry to want to locate in such a place as Mora county. The logic of the situation is such that most companies will look first at the larger towns in the state. One irony is that for some firms Albuquerque has already grown too big; they prefer Las Cruces or Alamogordo or some town in their size

Dietz is only proposing that some steps be taken to carry out the pledge his boss, John Salvo, made when he first took over Commerce and Industry. Some of us wondered at the time what steps he had in mind when he said he was going to try to help the emptier parts of the state get a share of the industrial operations. Now Dietz has told us.

In a memo to Billie Holder, who runs the state's economic development board (though the Governor is technically its chairman), Dietz suggested some kind of statuatory incentives for plant locations outside Albuquerque, He also wants to pursue some ties between industry and schools outside the Albuquerque area.

That got Albuquerque City Councilor Sondra West a little miffed. She wants any

advantages given industry to apply everywhere, Albuquerque included.

From a strictly logical point of view, that's fair. But Albuquerque hasn't seemed to need that kind of help. Maybe there were very good reasons for their absence from the graveside services, but to have them called for and not respond created an embarrassing moment for the State Police.



HARD TO EXPLAIN

There is something to be said for not imposing a jail sentence on a 75-year-old man in failing health who pleads quilty to a misdemeanor charge of conspiracy.

But when the offender is former Representative Daniel Flood and the conspiracy count involves soliciting and accepting bribes in exchange for official favors, we think something less convenient for the congressman than a year on probation is in order.

The specifics of Daniel Flood's crimes-! those to which he pled guilty and others the


Justice Department chose to forget bespeak a pattern of systematic corruption pursued for whatever price the market would bear.

In his first trial, which ended in a hung jury last year, prosecutors charged Flood with peddling his influence as the powerful chairman of the House Appropiations subcommittee for \$50,000 in bribes from businessmen and others seeking to enrich themselves at the taxpayer's expense. Several of the bribers have been convicted and ordered to jail.

After 31 years in Congress, Daniel Flood certainly should be held to at least as high a standard as those in private life whose greed overcame their civic and moral responsibility.

United States District Judge Oliver Gasch could have sentenced Flood to a year in fail and fined him \$25,000. As it is, Flood escaped with nothing more onerous than the requirement that he check in from time to time with his parole officer.

It is the sort of miscarriage of justice that is hard to explain to a 19-year-old kid serving time for rifling the cash drawer at the corner service station. Worse, yet, it is indicative of the judicial and prosecutorial leniency accorded all too many fallen legislators in recent years. — News-Bulletin, Belen

Continued action and perseverance by village officials in pursuing a Farmers Home Administration loan in the amount of \$600,000, to build a Municipal Administration Center really paid off, as the 30 year loan was approved at an interest rate of five percent.

We congratulate the officials directly concerned with pursuing this loan on their efforts, because it was this diligence that made it possible for the loan to be granted at five percent — virtually a matter of hours before this interest rate was discontinued by FmHA.

The loan will be repaid through the sale of revenue bonds, with FmHA buying the bonds at par, with a five percent interest rate. That's an unbeatable deal.

The village will retire the bonds from sales tax revenues, accruing into the general fund, This payment method should appeal to local residents, as a portion of the cost will be borne by tourists and non-resident shoppers.

We respectfully suggest to Ruidoso's Rotarians, as they continue their street name post project this spring, that their first priority be installing the posts on Cree Meadows Drive between Highway 37 and Hull Road. The reason being, if the street posts are installed before the new village hall is opened, when it is, it'd be so easy to give directions by saying: "Go north on Highway 37, turn east onto Cree Meadows Drive and keep going until you get to village hall." That's so simple it's fooiproof - almost. --CD


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



Claude Akins is no stranger to country music—or the 'Academy of Country Music Awards.' He's been a presenter on the show since 1974. This year he'll join Loretta Lynn and Charley Pride as one of the hosts when the special will be broadcast live on NBC-TV Thursday. May 1.

'Movin' On' ran from September, 1974 to September, 1976. Akins then went head on into country music with another series, 'Nashville 99,' on CBS in 1977.

It was filmed on location in Nashville, and enlisted many country music performers as guest stars playing themselves. In a police series, Akins played a Southern lawman fighting crime in the country-and-western capital of the world. Country music star Jerry Reed played his partner and sidekick.

Akins chuckled, as he recalled an amusing incident,

again having to do with his singing.

"I had to sing 'Amazing Grace' as a solo number in one episode," he said. "As we were doing the scene, I spotted Reed mumbling to someone while I was singing. After it was over, I went up to him and asked him what he was saying while I was singing. What he said was that if I was going to do much more singing they'd have to pay him more money!"




