RHS marching band practicing

Marching band practice for the Ruidoso Warriors High School students began last week with rehearsals and meetings for drum majors and twirlers. Today marks the first marching session for new band members and the start of a year of performances under the direction of Danny Flores.

All new band members, which includes incoming freshmen and those not previously enrolled in band, began at 7:30 a.m., today, with all band students to report for rehearsal August 18 at 7:30 a.m., in the band room.

Flores said students should have all instruments repaired and in good condition and should be prepared to march an hour and practice an additional hour during the summer rehearsal program. He said band uniforms will be issued the second week.

All band students will be required to pay a \$5 uniform fee and supply white shoes at \$18 a pair, which can be ordered through the school. Students will also have to bear the expense of an overnight trip to Albuquerque, to participate in the New Mexico State Fair concert and parade September 12-13.

Flores outlined other scheduled per-

formances during the 1980-81 school year, with their first performance in Ruidoso September 5 during the Gadsden football game. Two other home games will feature RHS's band, September 19 and 26, followed by an all day trip to the New Mexico State Parade of Champions Marching Contest in Las Cruces October 4.

Then the marching band will be at home for two more football games, when Ruidoso hosts Cobre and Tularosa, October 10 and 17, respectively.

The final football performance has tentatively been set for Truth or Consequences, an away game, October 31.

A Christmas concert December 15 will close the first semester.

Flores scheduled the high school solo and ensemble contest, for all students who wish to participate in Las Cruces February 28. District Honor Band follows March 13-14 and a high school large group festival in Alamogordo will be held April 9. The final band performance will be during the spring concert May 5 or 12, 1981.

"Each student should have the opportunity to learn to play his or her instrument and march to the highest degree of proficiency," Flores said, which is made possible by cooperation of parents, students and employers.

Rumble strips possible soon

People who have ignored the pedestrian crossing area until now, may soon find they have no choice but to slow down in midtown.

The New Mexico Highway Department (NMHD) and the Village of Ruidoso have consented to consider purchasing rumble strips which would be placed at both approaches to the crosswalk area in midtown. Cost of the project has been pegged at \$3,000 to \$4,000 and the NMHD has agreed to install the strips, which are a means of slowing vehicles.

Although the rumble strips are not plowable with snow removal equipment, they will be placed at only two locations in the village, and could be bypassed during inclement weather, according to proponents of the program, the Retail Merchants Committee (RMC) of the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Ralph Smith, traffic supervisor for the NMHD, said the rumble strips are only a cosmetic solution to slowing traffic in the crossing areas. However, he said if a cooperative purchasing agreement could

be arranged, the NMHD would be willing to try the devices in Ruidoso.

The RMC and the village will also continue to work together to have more directional signs showing where Ruidoso is and continue to encourage lowering the speed limit on Sudderth.

MIGHTY DECK THREE WINS A-A TRIAL JAUNT

Thirty Five wins Speed 'cap

Thirty Five, a four-year-old gelding ridden by Charles Mueller, turned Sunday's 10th running of the Ruidoso Speed Handicap into an embarrassing romp.

Since the Speed Handicap covers only four furlongs, the winning margin is usually small — like a length or less.

But Thirty Five mercilessly stomped his foes into the heavy Ruidoso turf and roared off to an eight length win. Except for some brief early arguments from the public favorite, Al's Vest, it was pretty much a one horse race.

Thirty Five, owned by Rita Danley of Ruidoso Downs, collected a handsome victory purse of \$8,370 out of the total purse of \$13,950. He toured the distance in an off-track clocking of 47 2/5 seconds (well off the track mark) and handed out mutual returns of \$7.80, \$3.80 and \$3.40.

Thirty Five packed a moderate load of 115 pounds, compared to the top weight of 123 Al's Vest was asked to support. The latter, ridden by Richard Bickel, ended up a fatigued second — just a head in front of the onrushing 17-1 longshot, Cap's First.

AL'S VEST WENT OFF at just over 2-1, collected \$3,069 and handed out tote payoffs of \$4.20 and \$3.40. Cap's First, hauling John Cushing in a 116 pound assignment, got a paycheck for \$1,395. The show payoff was a bountiful \$9.60.

Al's Vest, breaking from the number 2 post, showed a lot of early lick and established about a neck lead down the backstretch. But Thirty Five, who came out of the rail slot, wasn't far out of it. The two were neck-and-neck as they turned for home. Everyone else in the field was clearly out of it.

During the turn, Thirty Five inched into the lead, and from that point on, it was clear Al's Vest was a beaten horse. The eight-year-old labored in the stretch run to salvage second place. Thirty Five, on the other hand, boomed ahead with big strides which left his foes pathetically out of reach.

Thirty Five is trained by Fred Danley. In Sunday's co-feature at six furlongs, Scott's Courtship established himself as a potential handicap star with a high flying

The commission also discussed possible revisions in the county's subdivision regulations with representatives of the state Environmental Improvement Division, the state Engineer's Office and the United States Soil Conservation Service.

One major decision arising from the discussions was that no subdivisions will

be accepted in the future unless approval is granted before any construction takes place. The group will continue to scrutinize the subdivision regulations at future meetings.

Airport land request postponed

The Sierra Blanca Airport Commission (SBAC) decided Thursday to postpone the submission of a new application for acreage on Fort Stanton mesa, largely as a result of the death of one of their staunchest supporters, New Mexico Congressman Harold Runnels.

The commissioners agreed to send a letter of condolence to the Congressman's widow, and chairman Fred Heckman of Ruidoso said it would be "difficult to perceive at this time" who might be willing and able to fulfill Runnels' role in their efforts.

The upcoming general election was another factor in the decision to postpone a new application, Wyndham Run-

ningwater, representing the Mescalero Apache tribe, suggested waiting until after the election, since the presidential administration might change, which would probably mean a change in cabinet officers, including Secretary of the Interior Cecil Andrus.

In a past application for lands at "Site B," on Fort Stanton mesa, the SBAC had appealed a negative Bureau of Land Management (BLM) decision, and that appeal was rejected by Andrus. The commission members agreed to submit a new application for a reduced amount of acreage at the same site.

Still another governmental personnel change might affect the fate of the application. Arthur Zimmerman, state director of the BLM, which controls the mesa land, is retiring this month, county manager Bill Billingsley advised.

The commissioners also voted to accept the offered assistance of the Lincoln County Bar Association in preparing the new application in the meantime, so that once all the personnel changes had been accomplished, the document would be ready to submit.

Also present at the meeting were Ruth Armstrong and Mary Thorpe of Carrizozo, representing that town's Chamber of Commerce and Woman's Club, and requesting that a Carrizozo representative be added to the SBAC.

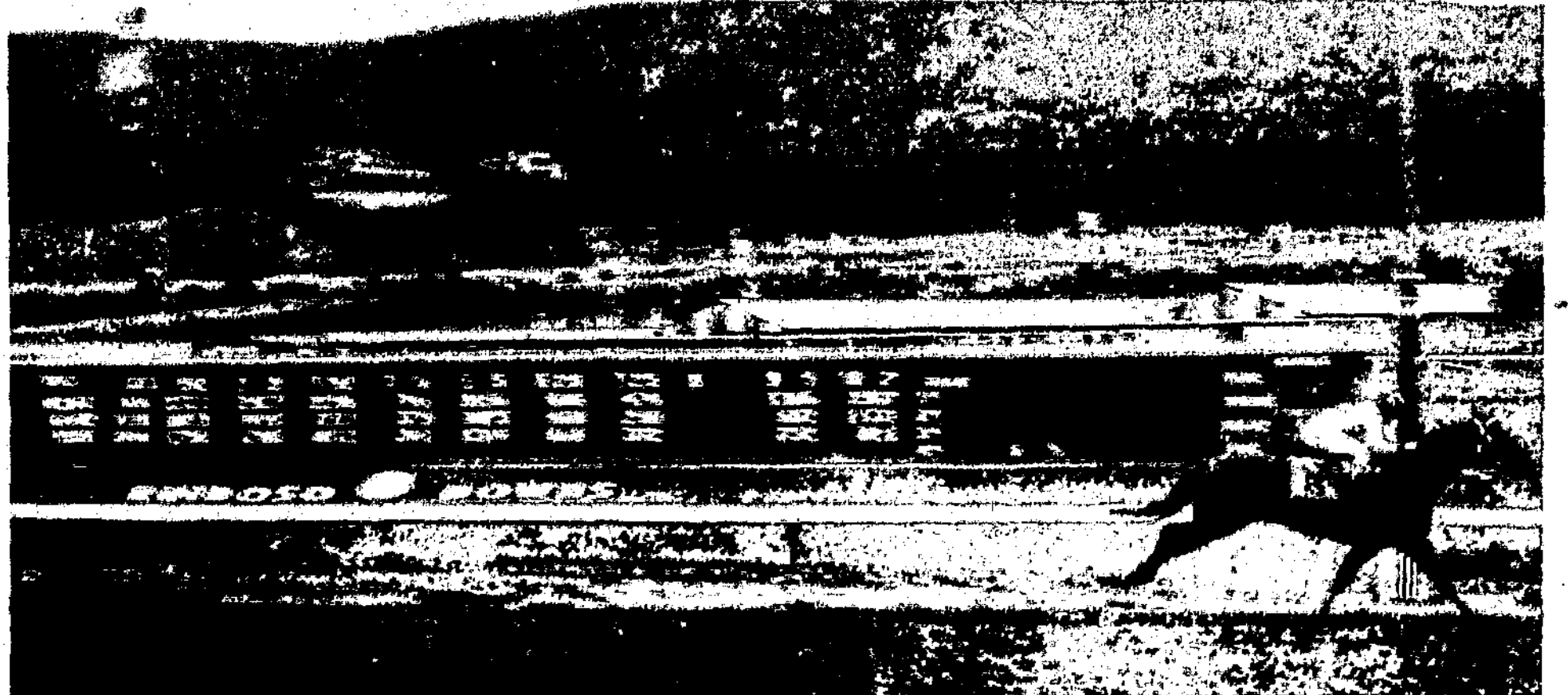
In making the request, Armstrong said that the Carrizozo group, "in no way wishes to interfere with" the effort to locate the airport on the mesa.

"We just want to help," she said. She added that the Carrizozo town council had voted to request representation on the

commission, but were not seeking a relocation of the planned facility to their town.

"I'm sure that's the first thing that enters people's minds," when Carrizozo's involvement is discussed, she said. Consideration of Carrizozo as a possible location should be made, "only if all other efforts fail," she said.

The Carrizozo council had named Dale Goad as their preferred representative, with Armstrong to serve as an alternate. The SBAC advised the women they should have an amendment prepared by an attorney which could be added to the original joint powers agreement signed by Ruidoso, Ruidoso Downs, Capitan, the Apache tribe and Lincoln County. Each of the entities would have to approve such an amendment before Carrizozo could join the commission, Heckman said.

UPSETS PUNCTUATED each end of Saturday's Three Bars Handicap at Ruidoso Downs.

The first division, booked as the eighth race, went to Kennys Sam by a nose. He went off at just over 11-1. The second division, occupying the featured 10th slot, was taken by Overdrive Junior. The gelding was better than 7-1 in the waging.

Each end of the Three Bars 'cap handed the winner \$4,875 out of a gross purse of \$4,125.

Kennys Sam, ridden by Jay Lewis for Ray Mallinck of Duchesne, Utah, covered the 400 yards in 20.48 seconds. The track was listed as slow. When Overdrive Junior was running, the moisture in the track had dried a bit, putting the strip in "good" condition. Overdrive Junior was timed in 20.38 seconds.

Overdrive Junior is owned by Platte Valley Petro Energy, of Denver, Colorado. Don Knight was in the saddle.

Overdrive Junior broke in seventh place from the number 8 post. The issue was pretty much in doubt until the final stages. At the end, Overdrive Junior came on powerfully to win briskly.

Kennys Sam had a tough battle all the way, barely managing to nose out First Prize Rose. The two battled it out from the first jump.

Kennys Sam returned mutual payoffs of \$24.40 to win, \$9.40 to place, \$4.40 to show. Oh Shiney, the 8-5 favorite, ended up fourth after failing to get in contention.

Fans who backed Overdrive Junior in the second division got payoffs of \$18.40, \$12.20 and \$5.80.

It was another smashing day at the mutual windows as 7,490 fans turned out and bet \$734,139. This was the second best handle of the season — second only to the \$816,433 Saturday, July 5. A year ago to day (with one more race), the handle finished up at \$665,157.

CLEVER BUG, a gelding with earnings of nearly \$300,000, came through with flying colors in Friday's qualifying trials for the upcoming \$1,200,000 All-American Futurity at Ruidoso Downs.

The entire program — 19 races in all — consisted of first round elimination heats for the All-American. The top three finishers in each race advanced into the final qualifying round booked for August 22.

Clever Bug, operating as an awesome favorite in Friday's 11th race, grabbed the lead at the first jump. He opened up his advantage easily and ended the 440 yard jaunt with a 1 1/4 length lead. Nicky Wilson was in the saddle.

Clever Bug now holds a record of seven wins and two seconds from nine starts. His victories include the \$504,500 Kansas Futurity and a second in the \$587,500 Rainbow Futurity. He's owned by Vaughn and Mary Watkins of Madison, Mississippi.

Fans who backed Clever Bug in Friday's outing collected mutual returns of \$2.20 to win, \$2.40 to place, \$2.20 to show.

Another key qualifier was Jet View, who raced to a head victory in the 10th race, beating out the classy filly, Shake It To Em. Jet View has earned nearly \$150,000 thus far. He's the property of Dr. Jack

A second chance for troubled teens living at Mescalero is what will be offered at the Mescalero Youth Center (MYC), the first youth treatment center ever opened on an Indian reservation.

The MYC's official open house was Friday afternoon. The facility has a capacity of 12 boys, according to Harriet Aguilar, shift director at the MYC.

The center is a pilot project for youths, 10-18 years old, funded through the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) in conjunction with Helleman House, a treatment center in Mesa, Arizona. The concept of the center is to provide youths who may have special difficulties at home, a chance to remain on the reservation for treatment that will enable them to live productive lives.

Boys admitted to the treatment facility are referred by the Department of Social Services, the courts and sometimes by parents.

The 12 staff members and social worker Rebecca Verdugo, will work in shifts around the clock to counsel the boys and provide a good atmosphere for learning and adjusting to every day pressures. Verdugo said four of the five present residents transferred to the reservation from Helleman, which was formerly one of the accepted places to send troubled Indian youths.

Verdugo said the youths average expected stay at the MYC will be about two years, based upon the record at Helleman House. She said "when you try to revamp a child's outlook" that he's had for up to 18 years, "it takes a long time."

The success of the MYC will not be determinable until at least one year has passed, but Verdugo said it already shows signs of success. The boys who transferred from Arizona, "seem more relaxed here." She said some staff members were trained in Mesa, which also helps.

The daily routine is structured, yet designed to meet the needs of the program. Each resident is assigned tasks around the center, earning points for each completed job. At the end of each week, they are awarded an allowance; youths also earn the privilege to participate in special activities two nights a week — roller skating, the movies, and so on.

Four hours of school, to study English, math, science and history, take up the morning. After lunch, the boys meet with counselors to talk and "get in touch with themselves," according to counselor, Virgil Comanche Jr. Two hours is then allotted for the boys to participate in some physical activity. Verdugo said several have taken up jogging up to six miles a day.

After dinner, the boys must do their maintenance tasks, followed by a group project, with lights out by 10 p.m.

Verdugo said school credits are given through Tulare schools and are transferable to Ruidoso. The school is year around and the boys are taught by one special education teacher.

Friday's open house featured a program of speakers who explained the MYC's concept and goals, with words of praise for the staff and those who developed the program.

Wilson Barber, BIA superintendent, said the program was initiated many months ago, with the main goal being "to bring the Mescalero children back to their homeland." Under previous plans designed for troubled children, the youths could be sent many places but "they were learning different values and traditions — not what we wanted," Barber said.

Barber recognized the importance of obtaining input from non-Indians, and sought encouragement from everyone to make the program successful.

"The end result will be reflected through the youths who go through the Center," Barber said. He said the BIA is already toying with new ideas, such as making half the center for girls, expanding it and eventually formation of a non-profit corporation run by the tribe's members.

Other speakers Friday include Jesse Gonzales, master of ceremonies; Leon Botella, who gave the invocation; Mental Health technician John Shendo Jr.; director of the Mescalero Rehabilitation Center, Silas Cochise; Berlie Kaneah, representing the tribal council; Sue Hooser, bent-Mescalero principal; and Tom Young, MYC director.

Young presented appreciation plaques to members of an advisory board, consisting of Evelyn Breuninger, Richard Hendrickson, Shendo, Fred Paso and Cochise. A plaque was also given to tribal president Wendell Chino, for his efforts in making the program possible.

Brooks and George Gage of Arlington, Texas. He paid \$3 to win.

Another colt who made the grade was Pass Em Jet Star, who rolled to a half length score in the sixth race. He's owned by two famous men — Joe Greene and Mel Blount of the Pittsburgh Steelers. Greene is a defensive end, and Blunt is a defensive back.

Pass Em Jet Star paid \$14.20 to win. The victory was the second of his career.

My Kids Trouble, who's made over \$89,000 thus far, kept his hat in the All-American ring with a length win in the 16th race. The colt ran as a 4-5 favorite. He's co-owned by Joe Marconi, a former running back with the Chicago Bears and Los Angeles Rams.

MIGHTY DECK THREE continued to steamroll his opposition at Ruidoso Downs while blasting out a 3/4 length win on Thursday's program at Ruidoso Downs. The 440 yard duel was one of 19 elimination trials leading to the \$1,280,000 All-American Futurity.

Another 19 races were planned for Friday. The two days of qualifying heats constitute the first round in the new double elimination format installed for the All-American.

The top three finishers from each race during the two days will advance into the final elimination stanza set for August 22.

Mighty Deck Three, who's now earned over a quarter million dollars, went off as a staggering 1-9 favorite in Thursday's 11th race. Once again, he ran like a well oiled machine, leading from start to finish. Jockey Jerry Burgess kept a tight rein all the way.

The mutual payoffs were a stinky \$2.20 across the board. Mighty Deck Three, a gelding, is owned by Dan and Jolene Ur-schel of Canadian, Texas. Last month, he made easy work of the \$587,500 Rainbow Futurity at Ruidoso.

Mighty Deck Three now holds a spotless record of eight wins from eight starts, and is enjoying a growing image as a superstar. He's won all of his eight races by far

margins.

A key favorite who failed to live up to expectations Thursday was Baby Hold On, a filly who'd earned \$234,196. She went in the fifth race as an odds-on favorite, but showed little punch and faded to seventh —

thus putting an early end to her All-American dreams.

Queen For Cash, a filly with earnings of over \$114,000, came through handsomely in the ninth race. She won by 1 1/4 lengths as an odds-on favorite.

The language and documents of banking, check processing, teller functions, deposit function, trust services, bank bookkeeping, and bank loans and investments are some primary topics. This course will be taught by Ms. Rita Martin, Ruidoso State Bank, Wednesday evenings from 7 to 10, beginning August 27. Martin has a BBA in Business Administration from the North Texas State University.

"Savings Banking" is a new entry just recently released and is an entry level course on mutual savings banking industry. The text basically covers the organization and services. The industry is in a state of flux change and the text addresses the current climate, as well as

looking into the future to exam probable development in this thrift field. This course will be taught by Richard D. Browning, executive vice president of Ruidoso State Bank, Thursday evenings from 7 to 10, beginning August 28. Browning has a BBA in Business Administration from the North Texas State University.

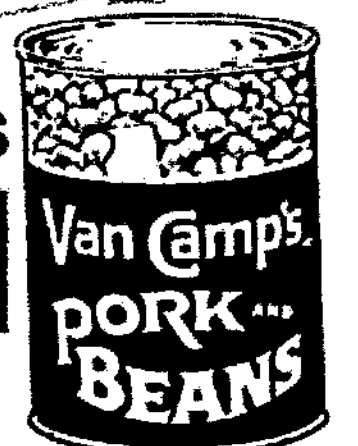

Terry cloth not just for towels

Terry cloth and velour are being used this summer for more than towels and beachwear. Fashions for dress and play in brightly colored terry and velour are available in wovens and stretchy knits, said Susan Wright, Extension clothing specialist at New Mexico State University.

If you plan to sew with terry cloth and velours, presink the fabric according to care instructions. Allow stretchy fabrics to relax overnight.

Do not allow the fabric to hang over the edge of the cutting surface when it is being cut. Use a "with nap" layout and cut a single thickness. Make markings for construction details with pins, tailor tacks or chalk.

Test the stitches on a scrap before you sew the actual garment. Use a sharp, size 11 (75) needle or one with a ballpoint. You

may need to decrease the pressure on the pressure foot and increase the number of stitches per inch. Stitch in the direction of the nap when possible.

Avoid styles that require buttonholes whenever possible. If you have to use them, place them in the direction of the least amount of stretch. Be sure to interface the areas with a nonstretch interfacing.

Hang terry and velour garments 24 hours before you hem them. This allows the fabric to hang into place. Use a catchstitch, machine or fused hem.

When using a straight stitch, stretch the fabric gently. A small zigzag or stretch stitch may also be used. If stretching is a problem, place tissue paper over the seams as you sew.

The Plant Corner by Sally Black

Dear Sally: One of my many jobs this summer is the care of the house plants and the greenhouse in our home. Can you tell me why the tips of so many of the plants turn brown? Also I heard the earthworm is good for the plants. Can you tell me more about the value of the earthworm? Thank you, George French.

Dear George: You bet I can to both questions. First the earthworm. Yes, they are very good to have in your house plant pots. Next time you come home from fishing put those left over worms into the plant pots. Two or three worms for the small pots, the larger the pot the more worms. Don't worry, they will stay in the soil. Worms breathe through their skins and it would be very hazardous to their health if they got out of the soil and become too hot. Be careful not to use too much insecticide when dipping the plants. Insecticide is also very hazardous to the health of worms.

Worms do help the plants to grow by stirring up the soil to let in the air and water. The holes also serve as little paths for roots to grow in. When the worms die, the bodies decay, so the soil becomes richer. Worms eat their weight in food each day. As this food passes through the waste is very rich and the best of fertilizers. You can feed the worms a little extra at times. Just lay a small piece of bread or some apple peel, etc., on top of the soil of the pot. The worms will come up and eat the food at night when it is cool.

Brown tips on the leaves of plants has been a problem to all of us at one time or other. There are many causes for this. You will need to choose for yourself which change to apply to your particular plants. Try to know the light, temperatures and water levels they prefer to begin with. Some of the causes are: 1. Improper light and temperatures; 2. Plants that like low light placed in too much light; 3. Plants get chilled or too hot; 4. Soil becomes too dry or wet too long; 5. Too much fertilizer, chemical burn; and 6. Pests of all kinds, red spider or other mites are the worst pests for brown tips.

George, with this guide to follow and your consistent care, I am sure you will have those plants looking good again very soon. Good luck and thank you for your interest.

More than 1,000 square dancers have a ball here

In 1958, George and Ruth Cooper of Ruidoso hosted 80 of their friends for a weekend of square dancing. This weekend, the Coopers hosted their 22nd consecutive August Weekend Square Dance — but this year, they had more than 1,000 guests attend.

The annual dance, now held at the Chaparral Convention Center, is enjoying prosperous days in its 22nd year. Saturday night's "Grand March," led by the Coopers, featured 50 squares, or 400 people, dressed in an array of brilliant colors.

The Coopers, who have been avid square dancers since the 1940's, have taken on the task of mailing brochures to clubs all over

the Southwest every year, and with very little help have continued to do so all 22 years.

They say the reason they do it is because "it's worth every minute to come out here and see all these people" having a great time square dancing. Over the years, the event has attracted couples from nearly every state within two days' drive. Many who attended the 1980 meeting planned their vacations so they could attend, and some lost lots of sleep a few nights to drive to Ruidoso from some Texas cities.

They come for various reasons, but many say it's one of the best dances they attend all year. The weekend features a Friday night dance, with round dance instruction (less popular but still a favorite of many). Saturday's schedule features afternoon workshops to learn new square and round dance calls, and all are put into practice in the Saturday night and Sunday morning sessions.

Also on hand at the dance are square dance clothing retailers, who offer an impressive variety of sizes, colors and

types of dancing shoes, neckties, "how to" booklets and tapes, dresses and probably the biggest sellers, petticoats.

The three days of dancing costs a couple around \$25 for all sessions, and gives them the opportunity to dance to different callers, learn new steps, meet people from everywhere and do what they enjoy most — square dance.

Also part of the dance package is free soft drinks, with free coffee and doughnuts on Sunday morning.

It's gotten to be quite a job for the Coopers, retired and living in Ruidoso. Cooper, who is also a sound technician, has had a bout with cancer and suffered a massive heart attack just before the 1980 meeting. "We didn't know if we'd even be here this year," Ruth Cooper said. But they attended every session, overseeing one of the only things they do for the community each year.

Once the Coopers sought assistance from the Ruidoso Valley Chamber of Commerce, to help with addressing envelopes, "but they wouldn't help us much because we're not Chamber members."

The Chamber provided a list of lodging establishments which is included in every mailout, and the Coopers spend many hours and dollars to arrange to rent the building, contact retailers, and to provide food and drinks and callers for each session. They still "babysit" small campers at their home for people who

come to Ruidoso once a year just to square dance.

The estimated attendance last year was 1,200 and some said it was down this year. The Coopers said it was still "a great time" and have lots of returning dancers to prove it. The two guest callers featured

on Saturday night's program have proven popular as well. Beryl Main of Golden, Colorado, has returned the last 14 years, and Melton Luttrell of Garland, Texas, has called at every August weekend dance.

The Coopers say they don't dance much anymore since the Ruidoso club has become inactive and they have to drive a substantial distance to dance. They still attend the annual New Mexico State Square Dance, where Cooper assists with setting up sound equipment. He's also a caller, and a very good dancer, his wife said.

She said they will eventually "get out of it," since it grows each year, but they won't let it disband altogether. "We couldn't just walk away and we won't until we find someone to carry on," Mrs. Cooper said.

Fields wins Cree Meadows title

John Fields of Las Cruces defeated Ruidoso's Tom Hornbuckle on the 14th hole to claim the title in the 32nd Annual Cree Meadows Invitational Golf Tournament Thursday.

Fields, who recently placed second by only one stroke in the Sun Country Amateur Tournament, jumped ahead on the front nine and never relinquished his lead.

Hornbuckle, who had played two days of superb golf on the 6,494 yard course, was off his game and could not seem to narrow the distance between he and Fields.

Fields sank a short putt on the 14th hole

in the match play tournament to end Hornbuckle's hopes.

"That's the worst round I've played out here in two months," Hornbuckle said. "I still don't know what happened, but I just couldn't do anything right."

Tournament director and Cree Meadows professional Bob Hickson said, "Fields is a true champion and one of the class players in the state. We had three days of great golf, a record number of matches that went to extra holes (17) and I don't know how many were settled on the 18th hole. It was our biggest tournament ever, and was really fine."

Ten flights of 16 golfers each played in the three day tournament, making it the largest ever Cree Meadows contest.

Thursday's final matches were preceded by morning semi-finals, in which Fields beat Carlton Blewitt, last year's second place finisher, and Hornbuckle whipped two time champion Jake Broyles.

"Those are four of the best golfers in the state, and it was great to have them playing here," Hickson said.

Physicals will be set up by the coaches this week for all players.

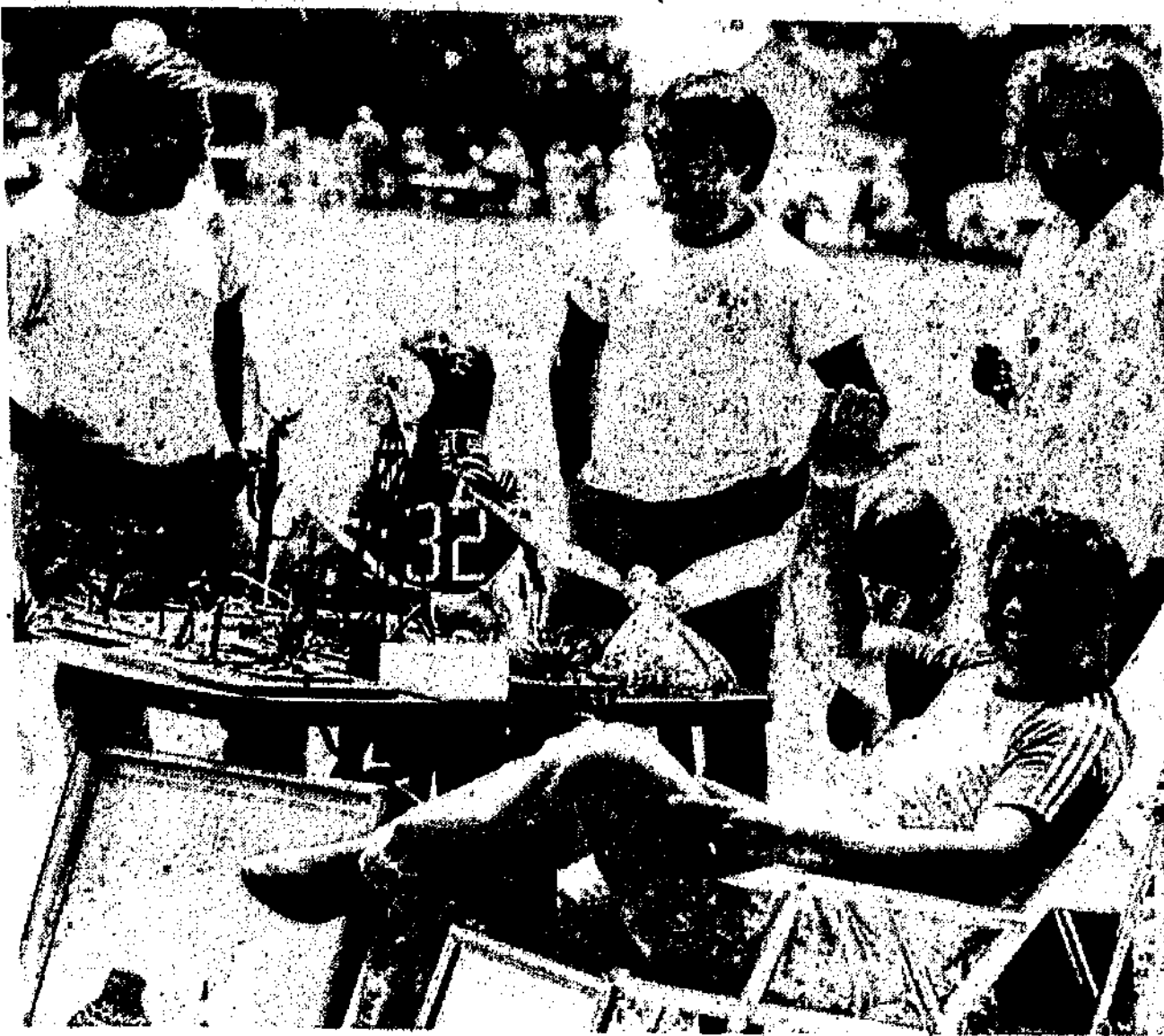

Game Department taking bids to build Raton office

The State Game Commission has given the Game and Fish Department permission to request bids on a new department office at Raton and to replace the well supplying water to Green Meadow Lake in Hobbs.

Meeting in Santa Fe last week, the commission also heard a request to ban use of leg-hold traps and corrected an omission in the big game regulation.

The Raton office, which will include a conference room, six office spaces, receptionist area and a passive solar heating-cooling unit, is expected to cost approximately \$100,000, according to Bill Montoya, assistant director of the department.

Construction is scheduled to begin in mid-September and be completed by late March. The solar unit is expected to supply half or more of the building's heating and cooling needs. Funding will come from the agency's capital improvements bond fund.

The Green Meadow Lake well in existence is uncased and starting to cave in, reported Fisheries Division Chief Dick McCleskey, who requested \$10,000 from

the bond fund. He said \$7,500 will be reimbursed by federal aid monies administered by the Fish and Wildlife Service. The well is the lake's sole source of water.

The commission included two antelope hunt units, left out of the northeast antelope hunt by oversight during unit renumbering, in the August 23-25 hunt. Those areas are east of Las Vegas in San Miguel and Mora counties and a strip east of the Canadian River in Quay and Harding counties.

The commission took no action on the request to ban use of leg-hold traps, pointing out it has no authority to do so in the case of coyote trapping and banning their use in taking protected furbearers would require an effective alternative method that does exist at present.

Earlier this year, the commission adopted more stringent trapping regulations than those used in the past, including limits on trap sizes and types of sets, and prohibitions against trapping near public roads, trails and campgrounds and occupied dwellings.

Fields wins Cree Meadows title

John Fields of Las Cruces defeated Ruidoso's Tom Hornbuckle on the 14th hole to claim the title in the 32nd Annual Cree Meadows Invitational Golf Tournament Thursday.

Fields, who recently placed second by only one stroke in the Sun Country Amateur Tournament, jumped ahead on the front nine and never relinquished his lead.

Hornbuckle, who had played two days of superb golf on the 6,494 yard course, was off his game and could not seem to narrow the distance between he and Fields.

Fields sank a short putt on the 14th hole

in the match play tournament to end Hornbuckle's hopes.

"That's the worst round I've played out here in two months," Hornbuckle said. "I still don't know what happened, but I just couldn't do anything right."

Tournament director and Cree Meadows professional Bob Hickson said, "Fields is a true champion and one of the class players in the state. We had three days of great golf, a record number of matches that went to extra holes (17) and I don't know how many were settled on the 18th hole. It was our biggest tournament ever, and was really fine."

Ten flights of 16 golfers each played in the three day tournament, making it the largest ever Cree Meadows contest.

Thursday's final matches were preceded by morning semi-finals, in which Fields beat Carlton Blewitt, last year's second place finisher, and Hornbuckle whipped two time champion Jake Broyles.

"Those are four of the best golfers in the state, and it was great to have them playing here," Hickson said.

In the championship consolation flight, Jerry Jones of Carlsbad defeated Jim McVey of Hobbs in an extremely close match.

Other matches decided Thursday: First flight, Doug Bass of Alto beat Reeves McGuire, also of Ruidoso; in consolation, Joe Thompson of El Paso beat Buck Lane of Carlsbad;

Second flight, Tom Woodal of Roswell

beat Don Riley of Odessa, Texas; in consolation, John Dahl of Albuquerque beat Blane Miller of Ruidoso.

Third flight, Ray Jernigan, address unknown, beat Don Farris, address unknown; in consolation, Travis Hunter address unknown, beat Sam Cope of La Mesa, Texas.

Fourth flight, Tom Battey of Ruidoso beat Button Silvers of Morton, Texas; in consolation, C. L. Davis of Floydada, Texas, beat J. B. Claiborne of La Mesa,

Fifth flight, George Middleton, address unknown, beat Wayne Jackson of Odessa, Texas; in consolation, Ken Braden of Sonora, Texas, beat Leo Daniels of Denver City, Texas.

Sixth flight, Austin Craig of Greenwich, Connecticut, beat Tom Hancher, address unknown; in consolation, Sonny Nance of Haslett, Texas, beat Ralph Barnes of Quanah, Texas.

Seventh flight, James Phillips of De Sota, Texas, beat Monty Staniforth of Plainview, Texas; in consolation, Bill Morrison of Ruidoso beat Guy Warnica, also of Ruidoso.

Eighth flight, Buck Morrison of Ruidoso beat Ard Smith of Lancaster, Texas; in consolation, Fred Boaz of Graham, Texas, beat J. P. Burdett of La Mesa, Texas.

Ninth flight, Dr. James Beall of Ruidoso beat W. G. Brownlee of Amarillo, Texas; in consolation, David Burch, address unknown, beat Richard Cliff of Alto.

The tourney, one of the last match play tournaments in New Mexico, began Tuesday and was only slightly hampered by rain, although Thursday's final round was interrupted by extremely heavy rainfall.

There were also various contests sponsored by the club: closest to the pin awards were won by Paul Dacy, Chuck Wheeler and Doug Bass; and a long driving contest was won by Carlton Blewitt and Wayne Jackson.

Cree Meadows will be the site of another large tournament in late September, the Second Annual Johnny Williams Memorial Partnership Tournament.

Many of this year's Cree Meadows tourney entrants are expected to play in the upcoming tournament.

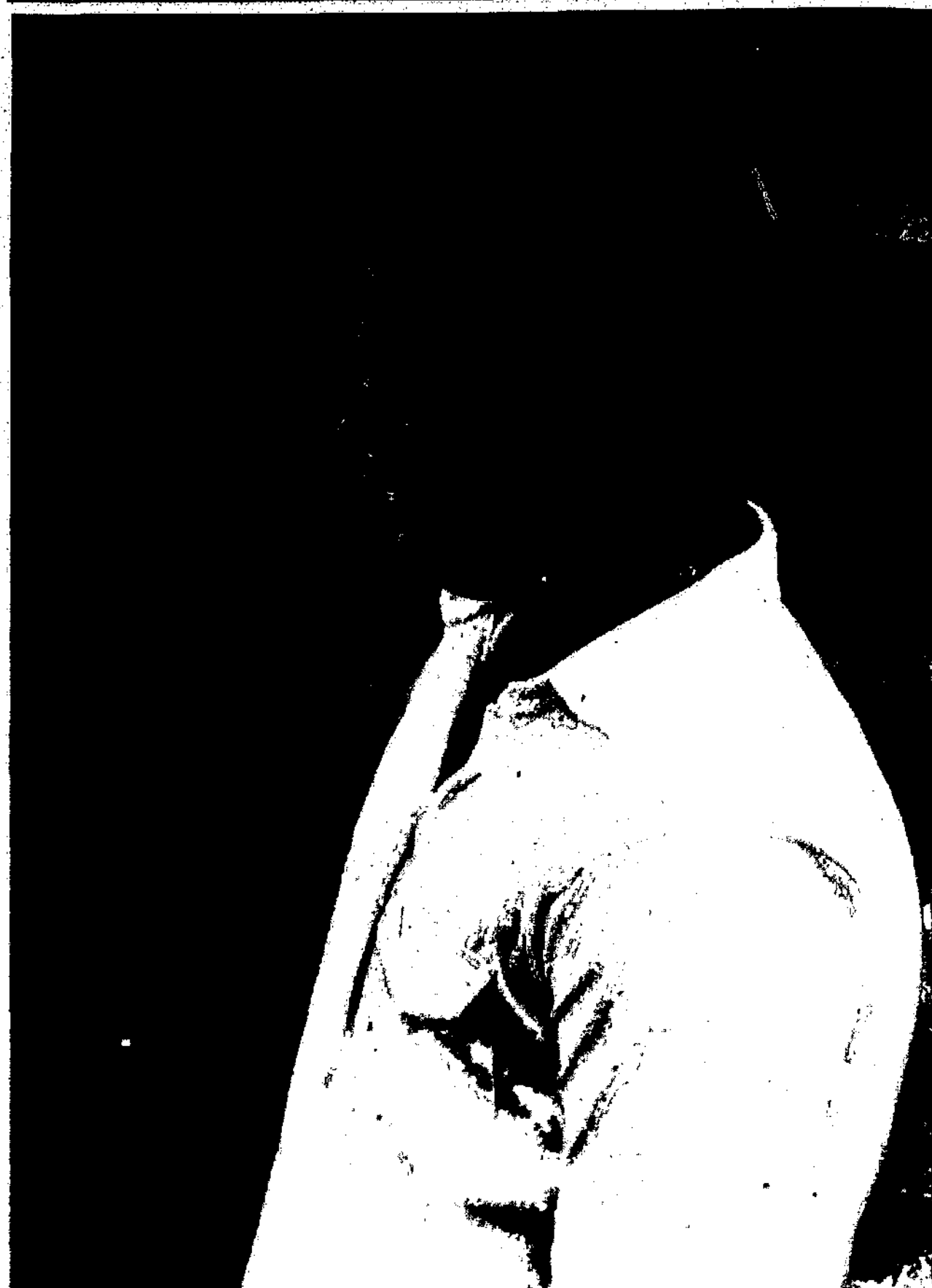

Game Department taking bids to build Raton office

The State Game Commission has given the Game and Fish Department permission to request bids on a new department office at Raton and to replace the well supplying water to Green Meadow Lake in Hobbs.

Meeting in Santa Fe last week, the commission also heard a request to ban use of leg-hold traps and corrected an omission in the big game regulation.

The Raton office, which will include a conference room, six office spaces, receptionist area and a passive solar heating-cooling unit, is expected to cost approximately \$100,000, according to Bill Montoya, assistant director of the department.

Construction is scheduled to begin in mid-September and be completed by late March. The solar unit is expected to supply half or more of the building's heating and cooling needs. Funding will come from the agency's capital improvements bond fund. The Green Meadow Lake well in existence is uncased and starting to cave in, reported Fisheries Division Chief Dick McCleskey, who requested \$10,000 from

the bond fund. He said \$7,500 will be reimbursed by federal aid monies administered by the Fish and Wildlife Service. The well is the lake's sole source of water.

The commission included two antelope hunt units, left out of the northeast area antelope hunt by oversight during unit renumbering, in the August 23-25 hunt. Those areas are east of Las Vegas in San Miguel and Mora counties and a strip east of the Canadian River in Quay and Harding counties.

The commission took no action on the request to ban use of leg-hold traps, pointing out it has no authority to do so in the case of coyote trapping and banning their use in taking protected furbearers would require an effective alternative method that does exist at present.

Earlier this year, the commission adopted more stringent trapping regulations than those used in the past, including limits on trap sizes and types of sets, and prohibitions against trapping near public roads, trails and campgrounds and occupied dwellings.

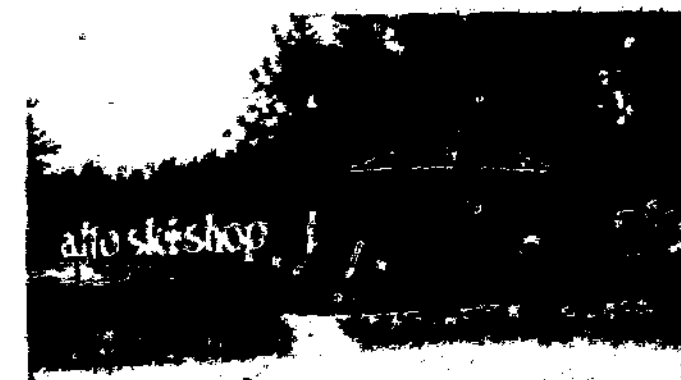

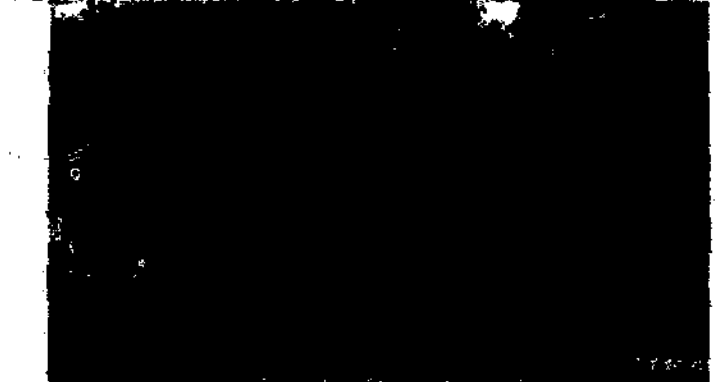

Alto Alps sewer plant improved

A group of about 25 Sun Valley residents were told by state environmentalists Saturday that Alto Alps manager Jim Wimberly is bringing that facility's sewage treatment system in compliance with state regulations, and that past problems with the system are being solved.

The treatment plant became the object of a letter writing campaign by Sun Valley Residents last winter, when they complained of raw sewage draining onto their property, adjacent to the Alto Alps complex.

Since that time, they were told at the Saturday meeting, Wimberly has made numerous changes in the system, in order to meet requirements of the state offices which licenses such plants.

Conducting the meeting were EID personnel Percy Blair, John Burkstaller, Ken McCollum, John Gulm and local EID staffers Hari Mukhoti and Brown Edwards.

— Building of a dike around the treatment pond to insure against overflow.

Other regulations, which are to be met by a September 30 deadline, include Wimberly's providing for monitoring of nitrate levels in nearby wells, to determine if pollution of the water table is taking place; and that the system would have to have a total capacity designed to handle peak use.

They told Wimberly, who also was present for the meeting, that he would have to limit construction to no more than 30 additional condominium units (130 total) with the current sewage treatment system. Further expansion of the units would necessitate a new EID permit application, they said.

According to the environmentalists, changes made in the system in the past year include:

- All sewage being pumped into a lagoon, with no discharge being made into a draw which drains into Sun Valley.
- Installation of alternative pumping system, as a fall safe measure, timers and alarm devices.
- Installation of a backup pump, timers

Most of the residents' complaints at the meeting concerned foul odors associated with the plant. Burkstaller and McCollum told them, however, that once the plant is in full compliance, the odor should be much less noticeable.

The environmentalists also agreed to advise the residents' group of any changes in the system, in advance of issuing a permit. In addition, the permit will be issued for a period of one year, they said, after which time, they would meet with the Sun Valley residents again to insure that they were satisfied with the plant's operation.

Wild horse adoption set in Albuquerque

A number of New Mexicans, including several from Albuquerque will be adopting wild horses at 8 a.m., August 15. The adoptions are part of the Bureau of Land Management's Adopt-A-Horse program which started in 1976.

public rangelands to be adopted by individuals that have applied to the Bureau of Land Management. Each individual can adopt up to four animals per year and after a year of humane treatment can apply for title.

The horses, 44 in all, are coming from the public land ranges of Wyoming. Rounded up in recent weeks, twenty studs and twenty mares are expected, in addition to two mares with colts.

All of the prospective adoptees have already been contacted, however, in the event that any of the 44 horses are not picked up, on site applications will be accepted on a first come, first serve basis.

The 44 horses will be corralled at the Bernalillo Sheriff Posse Rodeo Arena at 8501 Edith Boulevard, N. E. in Albuquerque. Each adoptee will pay a \$90 per head fee which covers the cost of transportation from Rock Springs, Wyoming, veterinary fees and feed at the holding corrals.

Inside The Capitol

SANTA FE—News coverage from up here tends to have an early morning slant to it.

That's because of deadline pressure, which just makes things work out that way. The TV stations have to file reasonably early in the day to allow for editing brief segments which will air in the early evening. All daily newspapers in the state, with one exception, are afternoon publications, so they need stories by noon or early afternoon, to get them into type.

As a consequence, afternoon sessions of many interesting meetings go largely uncovered. When a wandering soul like this relatively unaffiliated reporter walks in on one late in the day, you can see the look of wonderment on the face of participants. (What's he doing here? Nobody comes to late afternoon meetings unless he's suspicious of something.)

As a result, of course, you often learn interesting things at that time.

For instance, the Kings had better be prepared for further onslaughts on Sam Garcia, their own hand-picked investment officer, by the Legislative Finance Committee, which has developed some suspicions that money in the permanent fund is not being managed with professional expertise.

Maralyn Budke, chief of staff for the LFC, is in touch with the New York broker who accuses Garcia of losing \$40,000 for the state in the sale of 240,000 shares of Burlington Industries stock at \$18.75 a share, when the broker claims the state had an offer of \$19.00 a share for the same holding.

The charge, first publicized by former LFC member John Irick, brought an unwise fit of temper from Garcia, who is, as Senator Alex Martinez pointed out, a "sensitive" man. Garcia sees the charge as an effort by a specific group of stock consultants and financial advisors to take over as consultants to the Board of Finance. The firms involved are presently retained to counsel the LFC.

Budke has also questioned why the sale was made on the Chicago exchange, instead of in New York. Garcia says that was to avoid some taxes. It turns out, however, that all that was saved that way was \$450. The LFC obviously thinks there may have been another motive.

What Irick's motive was in lighting this fire under Garcia is not entirely clear; he may want to achieve what Sam claims he wants, or he may just be interested in the highest yield for state moneys. But Budke is now bulldozing the investigation, so the investment officer had better keep a low profile.

Some here suspect the LFC staff's interest in the matter may go back to the fact that Ms Budke serves on the board of directors of the Public Employees Retirement Association, where Garcia was formerly the investment man. She was obviously amazed to learn, on joining that board, that it sold profitable holdings in the amount necessary to cover losses on unprofitable ones, in an effort to show that it had not suffered reverses. That kind of finagling does not impress those who believe you should go for true profit on trust funds, but take your lumps and admit them when the market deal you a low blow.

WHY USE CELSIUS?

They'll never convince us that the American public will be won over to the Celsius scale for reading thermometers. The reason is that it just isn't dramatic enough.

You always say wow when someone comes inside from the heat and declares that the mercury has topped 100. But when he comes in and says it's 35 — well, who is impressed by such a nondescript two-digit number?

The Celsius plan is a fraud in the first place. It has been pushed off on us as an important part of the metric package, which the powers that be say we have to adopt.

They are going to have a hard time justifying the connection. Celsius was a Swede, not a Frenchman, and his system, sometimes called centigrade, developed apart from French measurements. TAINTED SPONSORS

Stories about exploitation, or narrowly averted exploitation, of Cuban refugees underscore the need for great care in finding sponsors for them. This is easily said, granted. It is not intended as adverse criticism of agencies taking part in the relocation process. All the same, the point is valid.

Thus far some 114,500 homeless Cubans (and there is the possibility that more will be coming) have arrived on our shores in recent weeks. Sponsors are being found for thousands of them in processing centers at Eglin Air Force Base in Florida and at other locations in Pennsylvania, Wisconsin and Arkansas. Several cases have come to light in which, refugee officials say, "sponsorship" is being offered not for humane reasons but to exploit Cubans for sex or profit. That is an intolerable distortion of the generous impulse which has led our country to provide haven for men, women and children fleeing the Castro regime. — Alamogordo Daily News

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Stone's slayer sought

More than a year ago, a rancher stumbled across the badly decomposed body of a young white male.

The body turned out to be that of Air Force Second Lieutenant Harley R. Stone. Its discovery solved just one part of one of Albuquerque's most perplexing homicides.

Stone had disappeared April 16, 1979, shortly after calling his girlfriend from a pay phone booth near a Northeast Heights Circle K store. His girlfriend told police that the phone went dead at 10:10 p.m., and that Stone failed to show up for his University of New Mexico Accounting Class April 17 and 18.

April 25, Stone's vehicle was found in Williams, Arizona. Detectives from the Albuquerque Police Department, using Stone's vehicle, tried to retrace the route taken from Albuquerque to Williams, but were unable to locate anyone who remembered seeing the vehicle or its occupants.

For a time there was speculation that perhaps Stone had orchestrated his own disappearance or that he might have suffered an attack of amnesia. But this speculation was laid to rest when Stone's

body was found near a dirt road on the Laguna Indian Reservation, some 20 miles west of Albuquerque. Stone had his hands handcuffed behind him and had been shot several times in the head.

Detectives, using evidence found at the murder scene and at the site where the vehicle was recovered, were able to develop investigative leads which eventually led to a warrant being issued in September, 1979, for 28-year-old James Elbert Skibo.

Skibo, described by detectives as "a transient, always on the move," is a white male, 5-11, 150 pounds, with brown hair, hazel eyes and has a small vertical scar between his eyes and on the bridge of his nose.

At the time he allegedly abducted and killed Stone, Skibo had his two young children with him.

Originally from Vidor, Texas, Skibo is believed to now be living in the Austin, Texas, area. He has an extensive arrest record, including convictions for forgery and petty larcenies.

His victim, Harley Stone, was described as an "All-American Boy." Originally from Dexter, Stone was an Air Force

Academy honors graduate and had recently been named aide to the Provost Marshal of the Air Force.

This week the State Crime Stoppers Commission and the Albuquerque Crime Stoppers Program are offering a total of \$2,000 in rewards for information leading to the capture of Skibo.

Anyone with information which could help law enforcement officers snare the wandering fugitive is asked to call the State Crime Stoppers Commission at its toll-free number, 1-800-432-6933, or the Albuquerque Crime Stoppers Program at 842-8000. Callers do not have to reveal their identities and their calls are not taped or traced.

The Commission and the 35 local Crime Stoppers programs also pay cash rewards for information leading to the solution of other major crimes in addition to the "Crime of the Week." In the past two weeks, a total of three arsons, two frauds, an auto theft and four larcenies have been solved with the help of calls to the State Crime Stoppers Commission. Since the Commission began operation last September 1, a total of 202 major crimes have been solved with the help of citizens' telephoned tips.

Laser use seen in irrigation

A laser aligned traveling trickle irrigation system, in the research stage in California, may one day be a part of modern irrigation in New Mexico systems, said Tom Kerby, Extension cotton specialist at New Mexico State University.

"The use of trickle irrigation concepts applied to a traveling irrigation system could improve irrigation efficiency in row crops and help solve the economic and labor problems imposed by conventional solid set trickle irrigation systems," Kerby said.

The system consists of a main tower and several wheeled towers operating laterally from a water filled, concrete lined irrigation canal. The main tower uses the canal as a track and the field towers are kept in perfect alignment by a vertical laser plane coming from the main tower.

Multiple cell laser receivers on each field tower connect with small electric motors which move the towers. The receivers sense when a tower is going too fast or too slow and change the speed of

the motor to bring the tower back into alignment.

The water, taken from the canal by the main tower, moves to trickle irrigation drop lines that deliver the water in any present amount to within inches of plants. No water is "wasted" between rows, Kerby said.

Right now, the system only carries water. But someday it may also carry fertilizer, herbicides and insecticides. The system may someday be rigged to carry solar panels to charge batteries to make the system self contained and self powered.

A computer program can be written to operate the system. The program will include weather and soil information that will take into account solar radiation, air temperature, humidity, wind speeds, soil moisture, soil evaporation and plant transpiration. As soil and weather sensors indicate the need for water, the system will be turned on by the computer until the crop's water needs are satisfied.

"Eighty-five percent of the total irrigated land in the United States is in the

17 western states. In many instances, much water is wasted. Gravity irrigation systems are the least water efficient methods because the soil is needed to transport the water over long distances, resulting in uneven distribution," Kerby said.

All photography entries must be filed by the deadline of Tuesday, September 2. Categories for competition include professionals, youth, amateurs and color transparencies. There is a limit of four works in each area.

Youth entries are limited to contestants under age 18.

Complete details and entry forms in any of the fair's art areas may be obtained by contacting the entry office at the fairgrounds in Albuquerque.

Coal increases state's revenues

"New Mexico has one of the greatest likelihoods of rapid coal-related development by 1990," said Bob Coppedge, Extension economist at New Mexico State University. "A constant question is the cost of providing public services to accommodate that growth."

Estimates by the Congressional Budget Office of the United States Congress say that by 1990 annual revenue surpluses from coal in New Mexico could reach \$15 million. This revenue is an excess of public costs of that growth — such as streets and public utilities.

These net revenues represent only costs and revenues of local and state governments, Coppedge said. Severance taxes are excluded, as are any private business sector costs and revenues.

A Threat To Public Financing

In 1974 Congress enacted Presidential public financing to cleanse the political system of "fat cat" giving and the undue influence that large campaign contributions wield. Today the activities of a group of so-called "independent" political committees working for the election of Ronald Reagan threaten to unravel that law and return us to the pre-Watergate influence of money in Presidential elections.

One of these committees, Americans for Change, hopes to raise and spend up to \$30 million in behalf of Ronald Reagan. They say it's all "independent" of the official Reagan for President campaign committee. Under campaign finance laws, any candidate who accepts public funds for the general election cannot accept any private contributions for the campaign. To side-step these limitations, Americans for Change, and other like-minded "independent" committees are proposing to raise and spend up to \$50 million in support of Ronald Reagan — themselves.

According to the New York Times, Kenneth Boehm, Treasurer of the Fund for a Conservative Majority, another "independent" committee, notes that the members of his groups were scrupulous about not discussing their plans with Reagan campaign aides "to the point that we avoid them at cocktail parties." But he then went on to say, according to the Times, that contact is unnecessary since "we pretty much know what the Reagan campaign strategy is from the newspapers."

Common Cause believes that these committees are in violation of the public finance laws and a major battle is brewing in the courts over a suit Common Cause filed against Americans for Change, and other so-called "independent" committees.

Americans for Change was formed to promote Ronald Reagan's candidacy for President. But that is not Common Cause's reason for filing suit. We would be first in line to sue any similar "independent" committees organized to seek the election of President Carter or any other candidate eligible to receive public funds.

The Common Cause lawsuit points to a provision of the public finance law which specifically prohibits organized political committees from spending more than \$1000 in behalf of a Presidential candidate who accepts public financing. The Common Cause suit also challenges Americans for Change's claim to be "independent" operators.

This "independent" committee is chaired by Harrison Schmitt, a Republican Senator from New Mexico who went to the Detroit convention as a pledged delegate to Ronald Reagan. Stan Huckaby, Assistant Treasurer of Americans for Change, is also the Treasurer of the 1980 Republican Unity Committee, a committee affiliated with the Reagan for President Committee. Anna Chennault, another official of Americans for Change is also Chair of the Nationalities Division of the Reagan for President Committee.

Congress still hasn't cleaned up its own campaign financing. But as John Gardner put it, Presidential public financing caused "a quiet revolution in American politics." We cannot risk the threat against public financing that Archibald Cox warned against in a recent speech. The former Watergate Special Prosecutor and Common Cause Chairman said, the "independent" committees "threaten a return to the pre-Watergate tactics and influence of money in elections." Those were the days in which 163 individuals contributed \$20 million to Richard Nixon's re-election campaign efforts.

Americans for Change and the other "independent" committees are a clear and present danger to the integrity of our citizen-financed Presidential elections.

Common Cause will fight to prevent these so-called "independent" committees from corrupting the Presidential public financing system.

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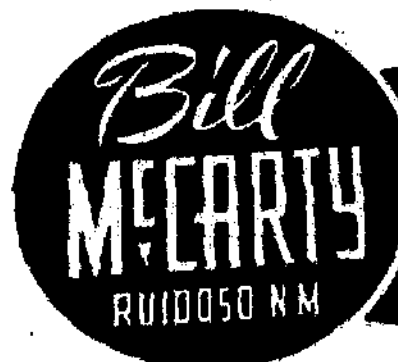
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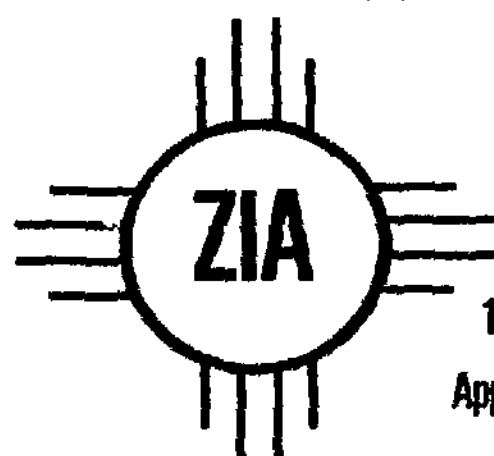
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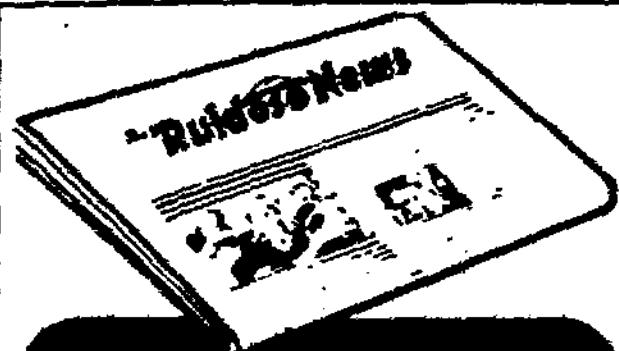
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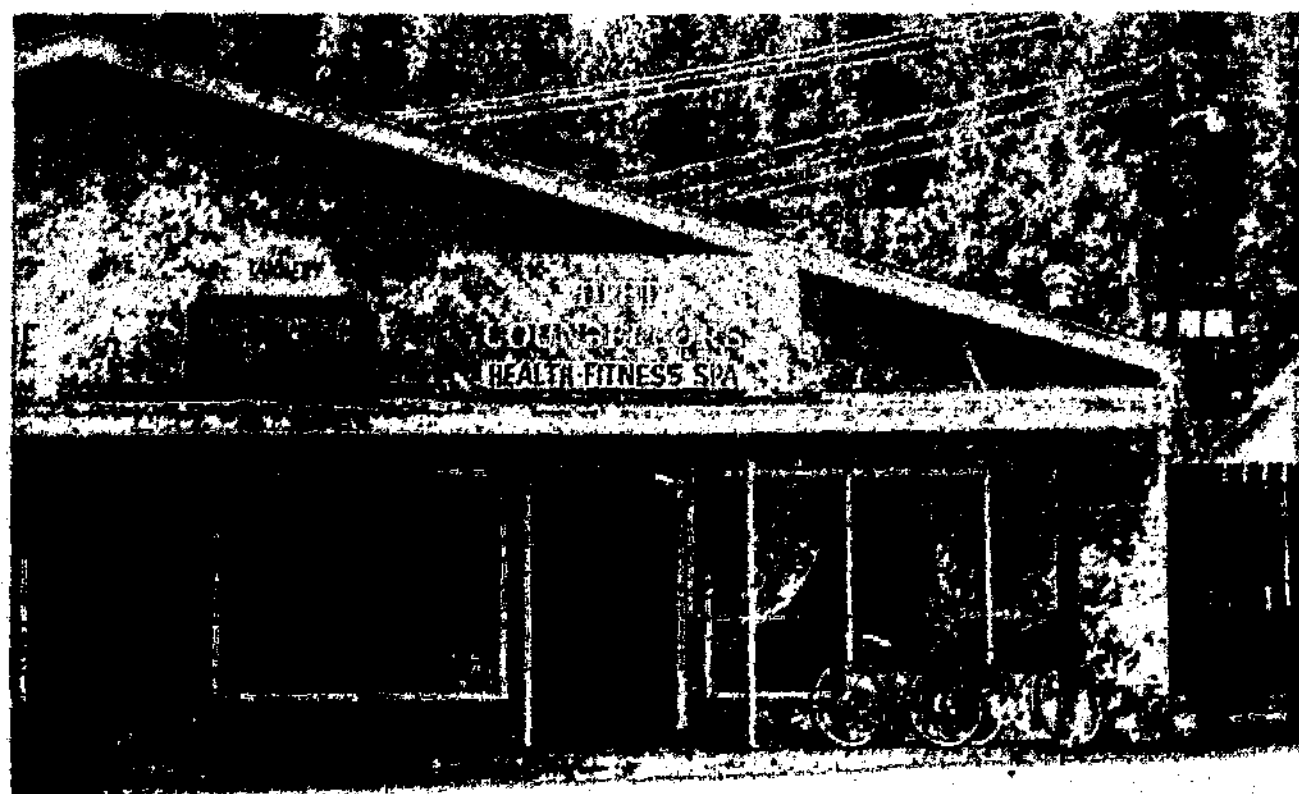

Hunting and fishing are sports millions of Americans participate in and enjoy annually. However, those of us living in this part of the country often take these privileges for granted and don't stop to realize there are organizations fighting to stop our hunting and fishing opportunities.

Therefore, a few years ago it was decided a special day should be observed in honor of all dedicated hunters and fishermen, and the sports they love. This special day, called National Hunting and Fishing Day, will be observed September 27 this year and numerous New Mexico sportsmen organizations have grand things planned for it.

NATIONAL HUNTING AND FISHING DAY SET FOR SEPTEMBER 27

When it was first proposed, National Hunting and Fishing Day (NHFD) seemed like a good idea. Since then NHFD has become an annual classic. It is observed on the third Saturday in September and has had the endorsement of the United States Congress, the President, governors of the fifty states and a large number of mayors. More important, many millions of people, many of whom are new to these sports, have attended these events every year and gone home favorably impressed.

Although NHFD is a cooperative venture endorsed by a number of different conservation and sportsmen's organizations, the National Shooting Sports Foundation has been the prime mover in promoting the event. This year's observance will be held on September 27 and the theme will be "America's Sportsmen are America's Conservationists." A key element will be a poster contest for youngsters based on this theme. Local sponsors will present awards and there will also be thirty-seven national awards totaling \$3,700. The grand prize is a \$1,000 United States Savings Bond.

Terry Bradshaw, star quarterback back for the Pittsburgh Steelers and the 1979 pro football player of the year, is serving as Honorary Chairman of 1980 NHFD. An enthusiastic outdoorsman, he has praised sportsmen for programs they have created to teach youngsters about conservation and for introducing them to the traditions of hunting and fishing. All indications are that the 1980 event will be the best ever.

Focus on Small Business

Dear Mr. Shafer, "Women make up over half of the work force but own only a very small percent of the Nation's businesses. What is being done to reduce the barriers for women business owners?"

A good deal is being done and even more is in the works.

It should be remembered that women entrepreneurs encounter the same problems faced by all small business people:

- Lack of adequate capital;
- Lack of management and technical assistance; and
- Lack of significant opportunities to secure government contracts.

The woman business owner also is faced with further barriers imposed by societal attitudes which persist in the business community, the result being only 4.6 percent of the nation's businesses are owned by women. No legislation or executive order can reverse those attitudes but government is trying to make capital, management assistance and government contracts more available. For example, President Carter's new budget calls for several new initiatives to support his Women's Business Enterprise Policy. Under the budget proposals, direct loans from the Small Business Administration (SBA) to women business owners would be increased 50 percent. A lending program aimed at helping women business owners would increase to \$13.8 million in the fiscal year beginning October 1, as compared with \$2.5 million in the previous fiscal year. At SBA, special efforts are underway to direct more federal work to women

business owners. SBA also will expand management training, counseling and other support services to small firms owned by women and to women interested in starting their small firms.

SBA also is making special efforts to add the names of 15,000 women-owned businesses to the agency's computerized list of small companies which are capable of performing work on federal contracts.

Women business owners were well represented at the recent White House Conference on Small Business. The delegates recommended that:

- Private lending institutions should be required to provide equal access to commercial credit for women in business. The Federal Reserve Board should monitor such performance;
- SBA should establish targets for banks to increase the dollar volume of loans to women;
- The President should initiate an executive order and Congress should enact legislation establishing mandatory goals and reporting requirements for all federal contracts, and that 10 percent of all government work be targeted for women-owned businesses.

Last year, SBA created a pilot "mini-loan" program for women who need up to \$20,000 to expand an established business or begin a new one. That program has been especially well received.

SPORTSWHIRLED—In Chicago, the 'Bad News Cubs' continue to invent new ways to lose ballgames. The fans of Chicago deserve a better ballclub. How long can the front office say that they are rebuilding the team? Dave Kingman spends far too much time mouthing off in his newspaper column, and the front-office lets people like Miguel Dilone get away, figuring that he's nothing more than a minor league player. With the Cleveland Indians, Miguel is amongst the league leaders in stolen bases and is hitting over .300. Bruce Sutter, who represents the best that the Cubs have, says he is unhappy. If the Cubbies ever intend to become pennant contenders they should consider trading Sutter for a starting pitcher and a hard-hitting outfielder... What's wrong with the Reds' George Foster? Nobody knows for sure. Some say he's putting too much pressure on himself, while others claim that he's never fully recovered from a pulled rib cage muscle in May... The St. Louis Cardinals, who were expected to win the N.L. East flag this year, but came apart when the pitching staff went pfft, could become a contender again in 1981 if they trade one of their blue-chip catchers. While NBC should get a pat on the back for hiring such attractive personalities as Bryant Gumbel and Cyndy Garvey for 'Games People Play,' one wonders whether the network finds that shows like 'Real People,' 'Speak Up America' and 'Games People Play' are the cheapest way of attaining prime-time superiority. I thought you had to spend money to make money. Sorry guys, I can't buy this one.

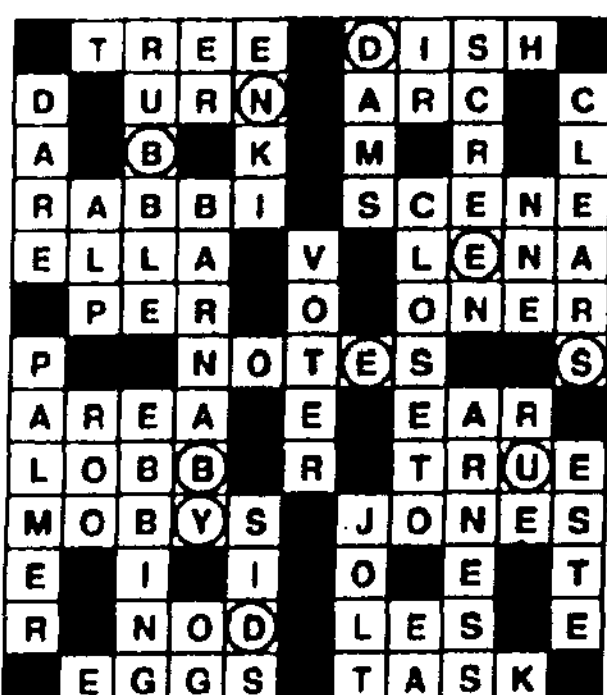

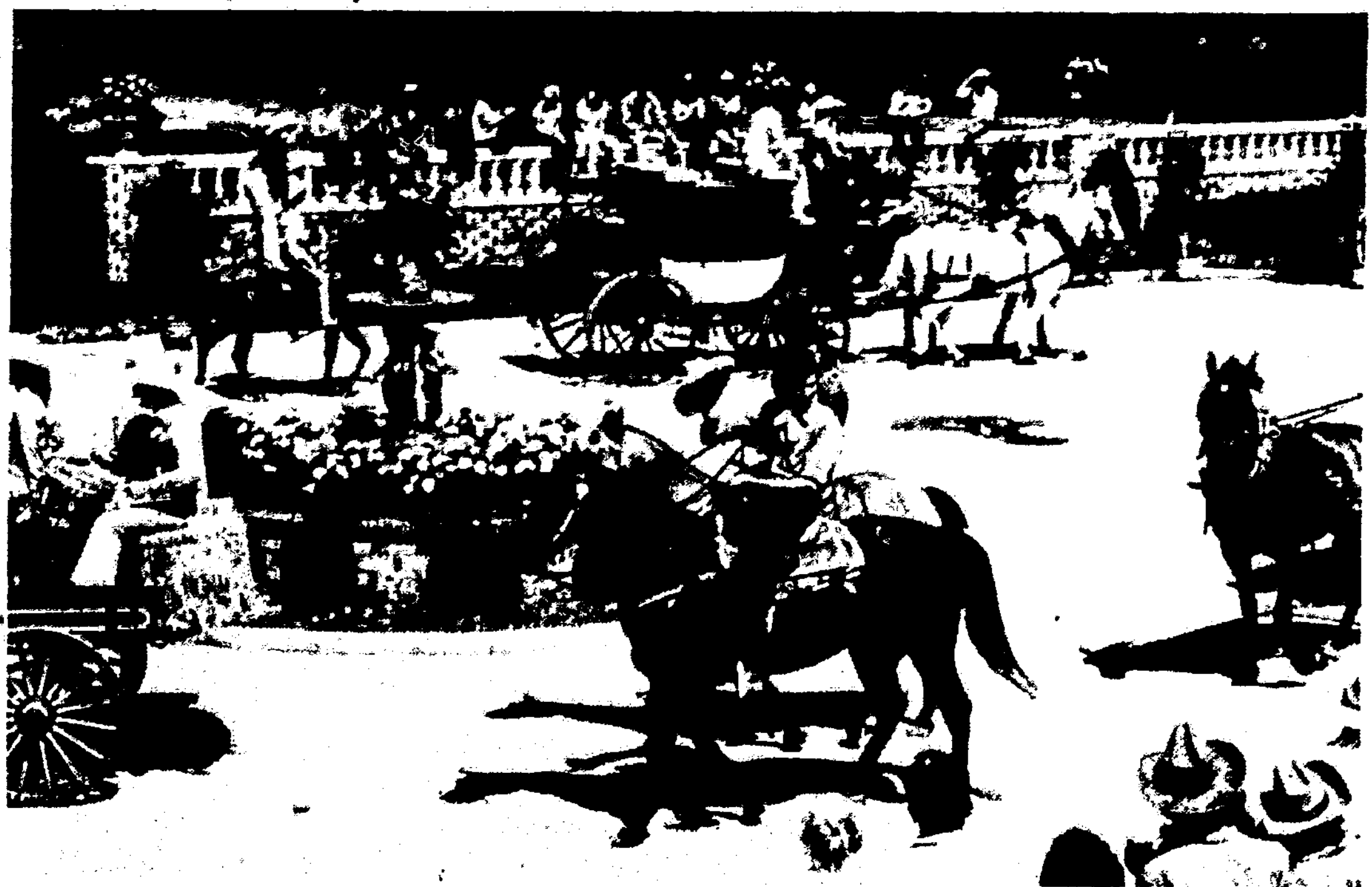
